During my trip to South Asia with my daughter, I thought often of my mother wishing she could have shared that experience with us. When I was growing up, my family did not travel much; we took the same summer vacation every year to visit my father's family in Pennsylvania. There were occasional side trips to New York or Washington, D.C., and one year we even drove to Florida for a week during Christmas vacation. But, even though I did not have the firsthand travel experience that Chelsea has already had, my mother made the most of all the places we ever visited.
