I've been invited to the First Lady's reception for her book next Thursday at 4 p.m., so immediately before or after would be the ideal time for me to take a brief tour, should I be fortunate enough to receive your permission for such. A word with the President or First Lady on this subject - and this subject alone, I assure you - would of course be cravenly appreciated.

But the main thing is to justify my newspaper's expenditure on plane fare with a nice feature that might please both your office and the readers of San Francisco. And should the resulting article wind up behind glass in some discreet nook of the Library, I would of course be only too happy to die and go to heaven immediately.

The only catch from where I sit is that, in order to take advantage of seven-day advance fares, I would love to have an answer and - if it's favorable - to authorize purchase of the tickets by tomorrow, Nov. 21. I've been told that next week should be an even busier one around the White House than usual, so I deeply appreciate any help you can offer me in this matter. To report this story, especially in what comes across as one of the more literate administrations in quite some time, would be a real thrill for me. I look forward to hearing from you soon.

Thank you very much for your letter of april 4th. As you will probably understand, I'm still extremely eager for an interview with Mrs. Clinton. In the past, Ms. Brard for example already made a documentary about the situation in Kosovo, a poor tribe in Ghana, and a prison for women. Also she visited a great number of well-known personalities like Mohamed Al Fayed, Vivienne Westwood, Jools Holland and Denzel Washington.

TV-show "Wetten, dass..?" of German Television ZDF

The entertaining show "Wetten, dass..?" was started in 1981 and is broadcast six to seven times per year by "Zweites Deutsches Fernsehen" (German Television ZDF), one of the leading TV-networks in Europe. As the most popular TV event in the whole German speaking part of Europe "Wetten, dass..?" is considered to be the most successful European TV show. According to research-polls, the show reaches over 51 % of the German households. "Wetten, dass..?" is broadcast live via Eurovision also by ORF of Austria and SRG of Switzerland. Additional popularity is gained by reports and stories about the show and its showmaster in all kinds of print media.

The basic concept of "Wetten, dass..?" is the performance of apparently impossible bets by 'ordinary' people who have the skill to perform the bet and who have never been in TV before. "Environmentally wise." The phrase causes many people to cringe. It comes with an unspoken burden of extra work for the consumer, the resident who wants to buy something, use it and toss it in the trash...as in the 'good old days.' Yet research shows that even household chemicals - disposed of incorrectly - pollute the air, water and land. Produced by Building Blocks Television Ltd. of Baltimore, Maryland and ultimately intended for a national audience, the program covers such topics as Indoor Air Quality, Hazardous Household Chemicals, Lawn and Garden Care, Stormwater Management, Drinking Water, Household Wastewater and Household Waste.

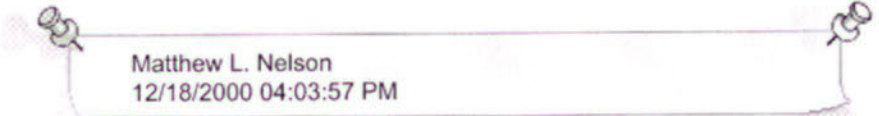
