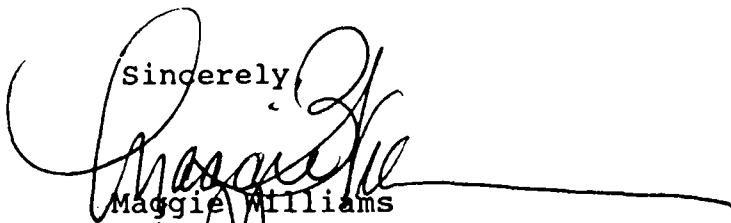

The 1994 Event of the Year is planned as a television spectacular originating from New York City to be shown both nationally and internationally. The theme will be an appeal from the children of the world to the adults of the world to address themselves to the pressing needs of children and the environment or there will be no future.

The spokesman for the children will be a Native American child. Four musical episodes in dance and drama will be told by Shaman from the north, south, east, and west of our western hemisphere. There will be six pairs of children representing the globe. They will come from Nepal (the highest), the Dead Sea (the lowest), Hawaii (the wettest), Chile (the driest), Siberia (the coldest), and Ethiopia (the hottest). These children will perform with a musician from their country. There will be 1,000 children from the New York area that will be performing in various parts of this extravaganza. 1,000 Native American children will do self-portraits that will be combined to make a mosaic a city block long as the backdrop.

The show will run approximately 1 1/2 hours. Many national and international stars will be involved. Judy Collins has already written the theme song "Other Side of the World." In addition there will be musical compositions from other world-class composers, David Amram and Max Roach among them. The event is scheduled for May 22nd and 23rd of 1994 and will be held at the Paramount Theatre.

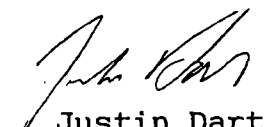
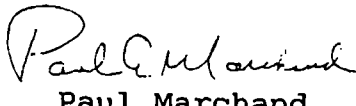
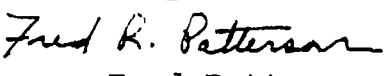
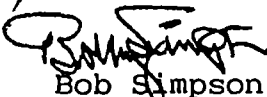
1. President-elect Clinton, in a written statement to the Summit, reaffirmed his strong commitment to "full implementation and enforcement of the ADA." Not all differences were resolved, but common goals were identified, and the Summit voted to establish an ongoing committee to facilitate cooperative pursuit of those goals.

Once again Americans have come together in the great tradition of our Constitutional founders, and democracy has advanced. Let us join together to keep the promise of the Summit, and of ADA.

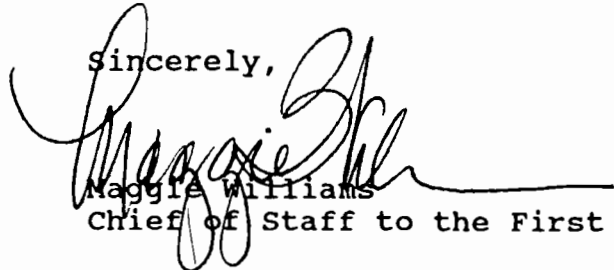

Dear Ms. Clinton,

The National Denturist Association would like to take this opportunity to thank you for taking on the critical issue of health care reform. There is no issue that is more important in our society today.

We want to share information with you about a cost-effective, high-quality way to provide consumers with an essential health care service - denturism.

You and the President have talked much about health care choice and access, cost containment, and consumer protection. Denturism fits that bill on all counts. And yet, it is unavailable to the majority of Americans.

The practice of denturism allows the public to purchase their dentures directly from a denturist, who fabricates dentures for the public without requiring them to make this purchase through a dentist at twice the price. Denturists are skilled in the art of crafting dentures for the public, with extra training in oral health and the associated sciences.

In the states and provinces where denturism is legal and regulated, the practice is working, including Oregon, Idaho, Montana, or the federally-sanctioned Indian Denturist Program in such states as Oklahoma, not to mention internationally-recognized denturism programs throughout Canada and Europe. After more than 30 years in America, denturism continues to work effectively. No major problems have surfaced. Complaints are at a minimum. Consumers are pleased with the quality of the dentures and related services they are receiving from denturists. And, most importantly, consumers - primarily seniors - have saved millions of dollars from the purchase of dentures.

My home-state of Oregon has had an effective, consumer-oriented statewide denturist program for 14 years. It was instituted through the passage of a state initiative (by a 5 to 1 margin) organized in 1978 under the leadership of denturists and senior advocates, including now-Congressman Ron Wyden (D-Ore.), allowing qualified individuals who complete a comprehensive educational program and 300 question examination to be licensed in Oregon to practice as denturists. The program, governed by the State Board of Denture Technology, continues to work effectively, with no significant problems.

The right of denturists to practice independently to provide consumers with quality, less expensive dentures is a critical consumer, freedom of choice issue that allows the public to choose where they will purchase their dentures and how much they will pay. Although more than one-fifth of all Americans have lost all or part of their natural teeth, most states do not allow their citizens the freedom to choose how they receive denture-related services, whether it be from a denturist or a dentist.

But, more importantly, denturism is a health care cost containment issue in tough economic times. National policy-makers have the opportunity for the American consumer to save significant health care dollars through the purchase of quality dentures at half the price. For some it will mean actually getting needed dentures they could not otherwise afford. There also is the opportunity for state/federal welfare systems to save millions of dollars annually by purchasing dentures for Medicaid/Welfare-eligible clients through denturists rather than dentists.

A recent study, conducted by the Oregon State Denturists Association, comparing the average cost of a full set of dentures purchased in Oregon from dentists and denturists found that the 54 dentists and/or clinics surveyed charged an average of \$1248.17 per set of dentures while the 24 denturists in the study charged an average of \$584.79 per set of dentures. There was a similar finding in the state of Washington. This research trend would presumably hold true nationwide.

Denturism is also a consumer protection issue. The implementation of guidelines for denturists protects the public by moving toward setting standards and procedures for competence, training, examinations, professional conduct, product quality, and basic consumer protection. Currently, dental laboratories, where most dentures are fabricated, are totally unregulated.

An obvious question stemming from this discussion: why is an apparently cut and dried consumer/health care cost containment issue having such problems becoming a reality in America. The answer is simple: the dentists.

Although consumer and senior advocates and the general public remain overwhelmingly supportive of the practice of denturism, the national and state dental associations have made it a mission to try to stop the development of denturism nationwide. The dental field wants to retain their complete monopoly over the provision of denture services and their right to charge inflated prices for dentures.

There is no question Denturism would be commonplace if it weren't for the money and clout put forth by the American Dental Association and their state affiliates to defeat denturist legislation in state after state; denying consumers their right to choose a far less expensive denture service option. For example, in Washington State, the State Dental Association put more than \$160,000 into the 1992 election campaign (second only to the state Medical Association), with an eye on denturism legislation in the 1993 session. Consumers are at a complete disadvantage fighting this kind of financial power.

The real issue for dentists is not consumer protection, but simple economics. Dentists stand to lose a lot of money with consumers having the opportunity to purchase quality dentures at a reasonable prices outside dental offices. In reality, if dentists and denturists were to establish a cooperative, professional relationship, more consumers would take advantage of dental/denture services. Everyone would benefit.

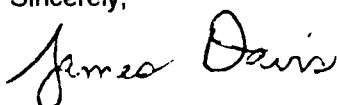
In tough economic times such as these, it would seem difficult for policy-makers to turn their backs on the opportunity for consumers to save millions of health care dollars through the purchase of quality dentures at half the price from denturists rather than dentists. For some, it means finally getting properly fitted dentures or even having dentures after years of doing without necessary dentures because they cannot afford the cost of dentures purchased through dentists. For others, it will mean no longer having to pay far more than necessary for dentures because they weren't aware of the services of local denturists.

State welfare systems also could save millions of dollars a year if they purchased their dentures for Medicaid/Welfare-eligible clients through denturists. Citizens in need of dentures include both young and old, many of whom have serious physical and mental health problems.

The time has come for citizens to have the freedom of choice to go directly to skilled denturists to purchase their dentures and receive denture-related services. Denturism is a proven, cost-effective health care practice by denturists skilled in the art of crafting dentures for the public.

As you and the President craft a health care reform proposal for America, I hope you will consider making legalized denturism a part of that plan.

As the new press secretary for the Democratic Leadership Council, I wanted to send this brief note and introduce myself.

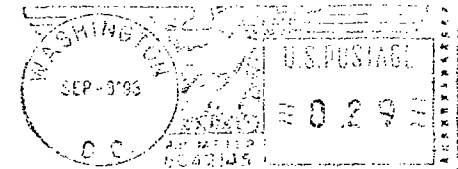
