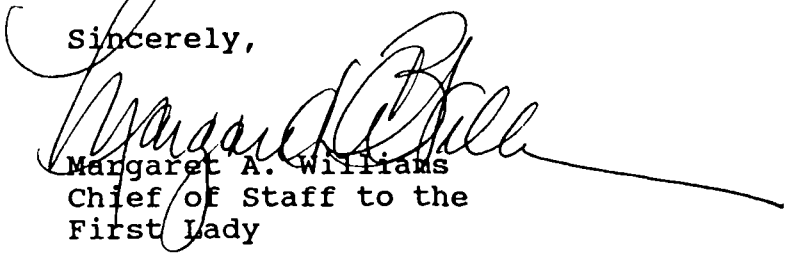

I write at the suggestion of Peter Edelman to invite Mrs. Clinton to address a panel that will meet in Cambridge on January 26-27, 1994, to help shape the next phase of the American Academy's Initiatives for Children.

The program has now succeeded in enlisting many academics and practitioners in a range of projects. Wherever possible, we have linked our studies to people outside who are in position to improve the condition of children. For example, Professor Martha Minow of Harvard Law School has brought experts from around the country concerned with home visiting together with people from federal and state government interested in shaping legislation on that topic.

We have a large multi-faceted study of indicators of the status of children - economic, education, health, violence, family status, etc. involving Nathan Keyfitz, Robert Solow, Martin Feldstein, Christopher Jencks, Lincoln Moses, Fred Mosteller, and others. Jerome Kagan and a committee are well along in a project involving literacy tutoring by trained senior citizens for six-year olds in the Cambridge school system. Derek Bok chairs a group that includes Patricia Graham and Henry Rosovsky and that is examining the responsibilities of America's universities with respect to K-12 education. Felton Earls and his group are scheduled to meet with Janet Reno to determine how the Academy can produce information and insights on the problems of violence in children that would be useful to the Department of Justice. Myron Belfer and Allan Brandt are assembling people who will look at how the nation is spending money on the problems of substance abuse and with what outcomes.

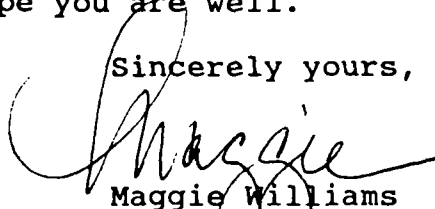

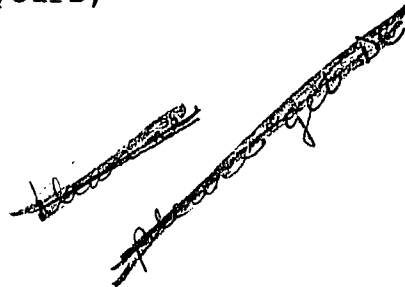

Lawyers studying children's issues disagree over immigration policy

BOSTON — A member of a lawyers' group studying children's issues drew a sharp rebuke Saturday when he suggested changing the immigration policy that sank two candidates' hopes of becoming the first female attorney general.

The federal ban on hiring illegal aliens "has put American families in an untenable situation" and should be changed for families who hire domestic workers, said James Stillwagon, a New York lawyer and member of an American Bar Association working group on children's social and legal issues.

The panel's chairman, federal appeals court Judge A. Leon Higginbotham Jr., quickly stepped in.

"The major focus we have is not to be doing something to aid someone who is making a half-million dollars a year to make their employment situation easier," said Higginbotham, who serves on the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia.

Zoe Baird, a \$500,000-a-year corporate lawyer from Connecticut, and U.S. District Judge Kimba Wood of New York withdrew from consideration for attorney general after it was disclosed that they hired illegal aliens for household

help. The withdrawals were a major embarrassment to President Clinton.

The lawyers' group that met Saturday was not intended to address the needs of well-to-do families, Higginbotham said. The judge said he wanted a consensus they are concerned about child care issues for "all children and not the children of those who are affluent."

The exchange pointed out the difficulties lawyers face in working on an agenda to help children who are arrested, need health care or family support, or are abused or neglected by their families.

The ABA group hopes to come up with a proposed plan by this summer, but at its first meeting Saturday members struggled to define their goals and keep them narrow enough to be achievable.

The main focus must be on the poor, said Maria Foscarnik of the National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty in Washington, D.C.

Stillwagon insisted the issue of hiring illegal aliens is a problem for middle-class families too, not just the wealthy.

And Michael Barber of Sacramento, former chairman of the ABA's family law section, cau-

tioned that "this generation's dysfunctional middle-class family may be the next generation's family in poverty."

The lawyers also debated whether they should concentrate on getting more public money to provide lawyers for children who wind up in court, or on encouraging private lawyers to donate more of their time.

There are few incentives for lawyers to represent children because the money and prestige are low, said James Morales of the National Center for Youth Law in San Francisco.

It shortchanges the system to rely too heavily on private lawyers donating their time, said Marshall Wolf, chairman of the ABA's family law section. Such lawyers don't have time to develop the expertise they need on children's issues, he said.

But Debbie Segal, executive director of the Atlanta Volunteer Lawyers Foundation, said it is relatively easy to train private lawyers on children's issues.

Frank P. Cervone, director of Philadelphia's Support Center for Child Advocates, said his group started years ago with a few cases "and all of a sudden we've got big law firms talking about little kids."

Federal Judge Leads ABA's Effort to Aid Poor Children

BOSTON — The American Bar Association has lots of grand ideas and impressively named programs and task forces, but ultimately their success comes down to a question of who is behind the effort.

That's why one new one is taking off in a hurry: The ABA Summit Conference on Children, devised to use traditional and not-so-traditional pathways through the legal system to address unmet needs of children, is headed by chairman A. Leon Higginbotham Jr.

He is a senior judge on the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia. Last year, the black jurist caused a stir when he wrote an "open letter" to Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas, which was openly critical of Thomas.

The summit here was the kickoff for setting a national agenda on the needs of children and their families in child welfare, family support and youth services, juvenile justice and corrections, court services, health care, housing, education and other issues.

An effort of this sort, to help children living in poverty, was the No. 1 recommendation of the ABA's Rodney King Task Force, said Howard A. Davidson, director of the ABA's Center on Children and the Law. The center is based in the ABA's Washington, D.C., office, and has

lobbied the last 14 years for legislative reform in areas such as the physical and sexual abuse of children.

"I still believe there is sufficient decency in the American people that it is possible to deal with the issue of poverty and the lack of justice for those who've been excluded from this society," Higginbotham said.

Higginbotham has announced he will be retiring from the bench next month and "will devote his main efforts to this," Davidson said.

"Judge Higginbotham speaks passionately about this issue and people are really moved by him," Davidson said. Higginbotham's cachet is expected to boost help from the various ABA sections in the effort.

"It's reaching out to sections that aren't usually involved in children's issues," Davidson said. He gave examples of the Real Property, Probate and Trust Section, which can help on housing issues, and the Taxation Section, which can help with innovative ways of restructuring tax formulas to help with funding.

"This is the first time the ABA has gone to its broad-based membership and said, 'Let's all get together and do our best in this,'" Davidson said.

While the ABA has called more and

more in recent years for the public to understand the need for greater funding for the judicial system, there has been no sharp focus that would bring that need home to them. The social problems that result from the unmet needs of children living in poverty may help do that, organizers believe.

Focus on Courts

One theme of the new Task Force on Children will be the treatment of children of families that appear in the courts, in matters of child abuse, delinquency and neglect, for example.

"Because of crowded dockets, judges are forced to hear cases without enough time to handle them thoughtfully," Davidson said.

Higginbotham's task force has attracted a lot of interest and talent from within the ABA since its inception last month, and Davidson said the timing coincides with the Clinton administration's interest in children's issues.

"I hope our report would raise consciousness," Higginbotham said.

Further, he said, he hopes the task force's report, when completed, will contain specific recommendations that can guide state, local and federal govern-

I am writing about a matter I hope will be of interest to you. You may already know about this matter. It may be common knowledge on the Wellesley campus at this time. However, in the event you may be unaware, let me remind you that our nation has an opportunity this summer to celebrate the centennial of one of our most beloved patriotic hymns, which was written by the head of the English Department of Wellesley College.

O beautiful for spacious skies, for amber waves of grain,

America! America! God shed his grace on thee,
And crown thy good with brotherhood from sea to shining sea!

Then as she reflected on her rearing in Massachusetts and the heritage of faith and freedom she personally had received from her Puritan forebears, she wrote

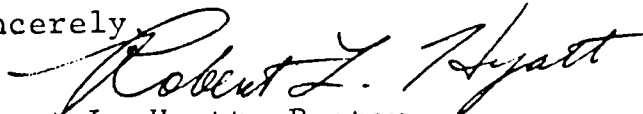
O beautiful for pilgrim feet, whose stern, impassioned stress
A thoroughfare for freedom beat, across the wilderness!
America! America! God mend thine every flaw,
Confirm thy soul in self-control, thy liberty in law!

In spite of all our problems today we have so much for which to be grateful in this still evolving land we call America. I am glad when I think of the gifted Wellesley graduate and English professor at that historic college, who 100 years ago this coming summer penned the lines of this beloved patriotic hymn. I am equally proud of another Wellesley graduate, you yourself, one of the greatest First Ladies this nation has ever known.

Wouldn't it be a good idea for you to suggest to your esteemed husband that he proclaim Sunday, July 4, 1993 as "America the Beautiful Day" and suggest that we citizens sing this hymn as we gather for worship and for patriotic celebrations that day in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of this hymn's composition?

Materna—Samuel Augustus Ward

This hymn classic, which every American school child should know, was written on an evening in 1893 after Miss Bates had returned to Colorado Springs from a visit with a party of friends to the summit of Pike's Peak. According to her own account, they

gazed in wordless rapture over the expanse of mountain ranges and seelike sweep of plains. . . . It was then and there that the opening lines of "America the Beautiful" sprang into being.

In the *Journal* of the National Education Association she is reported to have said:

476

Our Hymnody

(My friend took me to the great World's Fair, whose White City made such strong appeal to patriotic feeling that it was in no small degree responsible for at least the last stanza of "America the Beautiful." It was with this quickened and deepened sense of America that we went on, my New England eyes delighting in the wind-waved gold of the vast wheatfields.)

It was Miss Bates's first trip into the great West. She was spending a part of the summer of 1893 teaching in a summer school in Colorado Springs, when there came to her these experiences revealing the beauty and wonder of her country, and inspiring her to a patriotic outburst that has seldom been equaled. Her prayers: "God mend thine every flaw," "May God thy gold refine," and the repetition emphasizing "God shed His grace on thee," more than justify its inclusion in any book of sacred song.

In 1928 Miss Bates was in attendance at the Sixty-sixth Annual Meeting of the National Education Association of the United States, held July 1-6 in Minneapolis. At one of the sessions at which "America the Beautiful" was sung by a chorus of girls representing twenty different nationalities, Miss Bates was introduced to the members of the convention and said, in part:

It is not work to write a song; it is a great joy, and this is, in reality a very simple song, a simple framing of words. . . . I remember writing the opening stanzas in a notebook that was traveling with me, a notebook that I did not open again for two years. It was not until the summer of 1899 that I came upon that notebook and copied out this song and sent it to a Boston concern which very kindly published it. To my great surprise, people began immediately that very year to write music for it. It has been sung to many tunes.

All through these years requests have come to use the song in one way or another, in our colleges, in hymn books, in one form or another. I am only too glad to give it free as my own slight gift to my country, but my only condition is that they hold to the authorized text, so that we may not have as many texts as we already have tunes.

One of the suggestions that was most insistently made in these later years was that I add a stanza to express international brotherhood. It has not seemed easy to do that, for although I long for world brotherhood and am among those who look forward eagerly to the day when the United States shall enter the League of Nations, yet the song is long enough already, and is written for one special thing. So the best suggestion I can make is that when you sing the first stanza, you think of "From sea to shining sea," as applying from the Pacific to the Atlantic, around the other way, and all the states in between, and that will include all the nations and all the people from sea to shining sea.

"Materna" was written by Samuel A. Ward in 1882 as a setting for the hymn "O mother dear, Jerusalem," and the combination of hymn and tune appeared in the Protestant Episcopal Hymnal of 1894. Not long after Miss Bates's "America the Beautiful" became known, the tune became somehow inseparably associated with her words.

Samuel Augustus Ward was born at Newark, New Jersey, December 22, 1847, and died there, September 28, 1903. He was a dealer in musical merchandise and was prominent in musical circles in his native city, being for fourteen years conductor of its Orpheus Club.

In connection with the centennial of the writing of the patriotic hymn, "America the Beautiful," this is the information I have concerning the author, Katharine Lee Bates:

Born at Falmouth, MA Aug. 12, 1859

entered Wellesley College in 1876, one year after college was founded

received her B. A. Degree from Wellesley in 1880

received her M. A. Degree from Wellesley in 1881

received the honorary LL. D. Degree from Wellesley in 1925

became an English instructor at Wellesley in 1886

became a full professor of English at Wellesley in 1891

became head of the English Department at Wellesley

(I'm not sure what year.)

continued as a full professor of English until 1925, at which time she was made professor emeritus

died at Wellesley March 28, 1929

She wrote the opening stanzas (probably stanzas 1 and 2) on a summer evening in Colorado Springs, CO in 1893; had gone on a trip to the summit of Pike's Peak with a group of teacher friends and was impressed with the beautiful fields of ripened grain -- "amber waves of grain".

I am not sure when the completed hymn was first published or when it first appeared in a hymnbook, but it is a documented fact that the opening stanzas were written on a summer evening in 1893, at which time she was a full professor of English at Wellesley College.

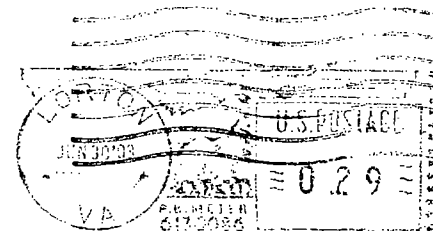
