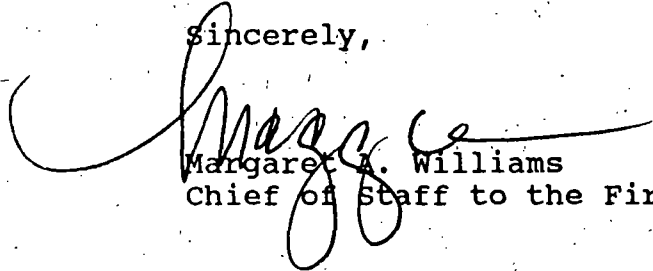

Clinton team takes women seriously

In October 1992, one month before American voters elected Bill Clinton president, more than 400 women made history in Colorado by pulling together to raise a million dollars for the Democratic cause. The event, "A Million Dollar Day: Serious Issues, Serious Women, Serious Money," was a policy forum at which Hillary Clinton, Tipper Gore and other influential women proposed innovative ideas for America's future.

In 1992, it was clear to many women that federal policies were out of touch with the everyday realities we and our families face, not only on so-called "women's issues," but in economic, public safety, health care and other key domestic areas. So we designed a symposium involving participants from all walks of life. Our voices were amplified by taking a deep breath and adding to our checks one or two extra zeroes. Very serious zeroes.

Now two years have passed. Has the president lived up to the expectations of women voters who helped elect him? As the three principal organizers of the Million Dollar Day, we believe the Clinton-Gore team is more than fulfilling its pledge to women, both in its leadership on issues affecting women and in appointments of women to key policy roles. Many barriers have disappeared and new doors are opening.

Consider the positive impact of Clinton policies on America's women and their families:

The economy: More than 90% of small businesses (most of which are started and run by women) benefit from new tax cuts. Small businesses also benefit from increased availability of capital

through SBA-guaranteed loans, decreased regulation affecting credit, and continued low interest in an expanding economy.

Family leave: President Clinton supported legislation allowing up to 12 weeks of unpaid, job-protected leave for employees to care for family members. This greatly reduces the career-family conflict for working parents.

Earned Income Tax Credit: This year, 14 million low-income families will have less financial strain due to this form of tax relief.

Children: Proven health, nutrition and education programs (such as free immunizations and Head Start) have expanded to benefit many more economically disadvantaged children.

Women's health: Initiatives addressing pressing health concerns of women have been introduced and funded. For example, Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala has established a National Action Plan on Breast Cancer to coordinate the prevention, treatment and ultimate eradication of this major cause of death among American women.

Crime: The Clinton crime bill is helping make our communities safer by financing local criminal justice and crime prevention initiatives. It includes the Violence Against Women Act, with more than \$1.6 billion targeted at domestic violence prevention and intervention.

Reproductive rights: The administration, while not advocating abortion, stands firmly for women's right to control their own reproductivity, supports access to safe contraception, and has signed laws protecting the rights and safety of women seeking treatment at family planning clinics.

Those are a few of the domestic achievements. Internationally, improving the status of women is the

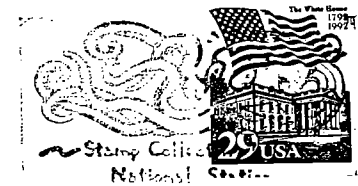
centerpiece of President Clinton's policy of promoting environmentally sound economic development. At the recent population conference in Cairo, the U.S. reversed its previous policies by supporting the civil rights of women and promoting stronger roles for women in the economies of developing nations. Undersecretary of State Tim Wirth understands that as girls become educated and women gain economic power, population growth and pressures on the global environment will decrease.

Candidate Clinton said his administration would look more like America. President Clinton delivered; nearly half of his appointees are women, and his cabinet represents more of our nation's diversity than in any previous presidency. Attorney General Janet Reno, Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary, Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders, Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, U.N. Ambassador Madeleine Albright, Office of Management and Budget director Alice Rivlin, and Council of Economic Advisers chairwoman Laura D'Andrea Tyson, are among the hundreds of accomplished women leaders, managers and advisers recruited to help run our country.

In our view, women who supported the Clinton-Gore team in 1992 got what we bargained for: real change. Change is tough, inevitably leading to tension and resistance. But there's still more to do, and we're in this together for the long haul.

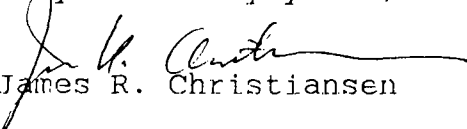

Dear Ms. Williams:

I am very happy to see that Hillary has decided to pursue the suggestion that I made on March 29, 1994 as with respect to health care, "Give every American what Congress gets." When I make this recommendation and you wrote back to me on May 17th, I did not know that Hillary herself might pick it up, or some third party would do it. In any event, it appears to be successful judging from Robert Dole's and Newt Gingrich's initial outrage and the continuing defensiveness of opposition Congressmen.

The June 24, 1994, Wall Street Journal reports that it is a "sure-fire applause line" and that "focusing on Congress's benefits may be a stroke of political brilliance." The Wall Street Journal article, however, goes on to claim that Congress's health benefits aren't that generous. It then goes on to report that it is the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Standard Option Plan, one of the plans available, is not as good as some company plans. These benefits may be substantially downplayed. When I worked for Congress approximately 40 years ago, Congressmen not only had a physician on call at all times whom they could consult free of charge, but they could also get red carpet treatment at a military hospital like that in Bethesda Naval Hospital or Walter Reed Hospital. What the present situation is, I do not know.

I did want to urge that the only way to get popular sentiment back of a complex issue is to keep it simple and straightforward. "Universal coverage" and "what Congress gets" is enough. Do not ask the voters to understand complex financial issues that as subject to many future variables. The details will take care of themselves once the initial concept is sold, particularly when the other side cannot supply any financial details of their own that would provide the same benefits.

I learned this lesson long ago when I was seeking to incorporate cities in Southern California. After getting my "nose bloodied" a couple of times, even when the incorporation of the city had been a bonanza to the local taxpayers and citizens, I learned my lesson from a person who had great experience at that time. His recommendation was to come out with the economic justification first and early, and then say as little as possible

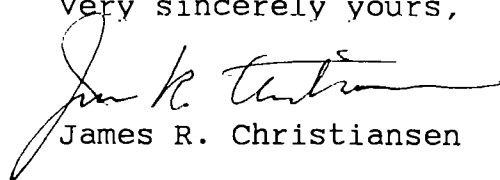

about it. Thereafter the emphasis was solely upon, "Do you want to govern yourself." It worked like a charm. We were able to defeat opponents such as Chevron Oil Company, Southern Pacific Railroad, and the California Taxpayers Association even though they spent considerable sums of money opposing the incorporation.

Otherwise, you can get bogged down in details, and the opposition can always destroy you on details. According to the old saying, "The figures don't lie, but liars figure." In any event, let me wish the effort good luck, and if there is anything that I can do, please do not hesitate to call upon me.

Dear Mrs. Clinton,

My friends here in Java have just shown me an article in a local newspaper which says that you will be seeing more of Indonesia than just the ride between the Jakarta airport and the hills of Bogor. This encourages me to write to you and suggest that you stop and visit the city of Solo, Java to see the Karaton Surakarta (palace of Solo). I came here three years ago having heard stories about its architecture. But what I found is a living piece of history which stands a chance of surviving the travails of the 20th century and continuing on with its rich culture intact.

The Karaton Surakarta palace complex is revered as a reflection of the order of the cosmos in miniature, although they are also in need of some repair and paint. But the place is amazing not so much for its buildings, but more for the traditional life that continues to go on there. The older generation of the palace has been quietly keeping the cycles of religious ceremonies (a mixture of animism, Hinduism and Islam) in relative obscurity while the world around them, including other such places in Asia, adapt to tourist necessities and the modern world. It is at least partly the product of strong beliefs and the benevolent neglect that comes with a lack of money. Those of the younger generation of the palace who haven't fled its walls to seek a modern career in Jakarta are attempting to chart the best path for the future between tradition and development.

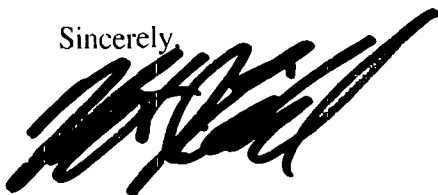
Bob and Peggy Barry were here last month to attend a special ceremony and although it was a long time to sit cross-legged, I think they came away feeling they had been part of something special. Colin Campbell, the President of the Rockefeller Brothers Fund (the source of my original research grant), also spent an afternoon at the Karaton Surakarta and enjoyed it immensely.

The Karaton Surakarta has recently worked with USIS Jakarta which supported a two week training seminar in architectural documentation techniques last month and the Getty Grant Program is considering an application for a major architectural conservation project. When I post this letter I will enclose literature that gives some background information.

I've been here for three years doing research on the architecture and, more recently, working with a prominent Indonesian business figure, Dicky Turner, and other concerned members of the royal family trying to help the palace community to document its rituals, maintain its rich performing arts tradition and restore its buildings. I would be pleased to give you a tour and introduce you to my friends at the palace if you were to come to Central Java.

In any event, I hope you and the President have a productive and enjoyable time in this part of the world. I wish you much success in all that you are doing.

ROBERTSON COLLINS AND HELEN JESSUP VISIT THE KARATON

On March 2nd, the Karaton hosted a visit by two special guests from abroad. Helen Jessup and Robertson Collins came to Solo at the invitation of the Karaton to discuss approaches to the proposed conservation of several Karaton buildings. Also attending the round-table discussion held on the open, marble floored Maligi Hall in the Karaton's tranquil central courtyard were several members of the Royal Family and some long time supporters of the Karaton.

Although the meeting was called in the name of architectural conservation, the issues raised ventured far beyond buildings to explore the fundamental questions of the continued existence of the traditional life of the Karaton itself. If the comments of the foreign guests are any indication, prospects for the future look much better than has been assumed in recent years.

The essential change from past assessments is signaled in part by a change in people's perceptions of the role of traditional culture in the world heading into the 21st century. The ravages of modern industrial development in the west succeeded in re-awaking many people's appreciation of the value of environments and lifestyles that have evolved slowly over centuries. There are now signs that Indonesia's own successes and excesses of industrial development are inspiring a conservation ethic in Indonesia.

A rising climate of greater concern in Indonesian society, new

government regulations protecting cultural heritage, and perhaps most dramatically, a change in the market forces of tourism, all point towards greater respect for the past in the future. This bodes well for those who are concerned for the future of the Karaton and its life of quietly keeping the practices of Javanese culture alive and living.

But as the threat of slowly declining into irrelevance recedes amidst hopes of revitalization through charitable donations and tourism development, there is a healthy wariness that sweeping measures aimed at saving the fragile life of the Karaton can be harmful if handled improperly. Poverty is often referred to as the greatest ally of conservation, and it was argued at this gathering that neglect by the outside world had worked quite well in preserving its traditions.

In this context, the discussion turned towards the Royal Family's vision for the future of the Karaton and how best to get there from here while respecting and retaining the subtleties behind the magic atmosphere that prevails inside its walls. There was common agreement that the focus on plaster mouldings, wood carvings and paint that passes for conservation in other places falls far short of meeting the challenges faced in Solo.

Prominent Indonesian architect Adhi Moersid summed up the comments of the group by saying, "There is an awareness that the true meaning of preservation in this situation is for the daily traditional life of the Karaton to be retained and revitalized." Mr. Moersid is the recipient of the prestigious Aga Khan Award for his design of the Said Naum Mosque which is credited with establishing a new idiom of Islamic Architecture in Indonesia.

Robertson Collins offered warnings of the dangers of an improper approach to tourism. "You should always do everything for the benefit of the court and the residents, not the visitor" he advised, making the point that someone interested in this palace or its arts will be sympathetic to the necessity of placing the living Karaton first, and in fact, enjoy it more. Mr. Collins is an American living in Singapore where he has been instrumental in the promotion of architectural conservation and tourism. As a longtime member of the Pacific Asian Tourism Association (PATA) with whom he currently serves as Chairman of their Committee on Cultural Tourism, he was instrumental in organizing their conference hosted by the Karaton in 1985. This
