We are writing to invite your participation in a National Town Hall meeting 10am, Tuesday, August 27th, in Chicago at the Downtown Hilton & Towers.

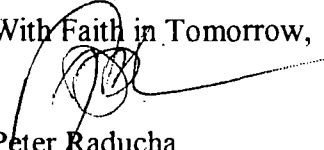

With another presidential election cycle rapidly closing in, many political discussions are surfacing in regard to strengthening America for future generations.

At the same time, many young Americans feel that they do not have a voice in ensuring that their opinions and ideas are being heard. Are today's politicians framing issues in a way that resonates with the youth of America?

The **mission** of the First National Youth Conventions is to provide a viable forum to bring together our nation's leaders--and potential leaders--to empower and encourage citizen responsibility in the next generation of American voters.

First National Youth Conventions

MISSION

To provide a highly visible forum for young people to share their issues and solutions for a better America.

ACTIVITIES

The First National Youth Conventions are non-partisan events that will be held in San Diego on August 12 and 13 and Chicago on August 26 and 27 concurrent with the Republican and Democratic National Conventions.

Leading up to the Conventions, the voices of America's youth (ages 10-24) are being collected through our YouthLink web site (www.youthlink.org), by mail, and through national youth organizations and schools.

300 Youth Delegates at the San Diego and Chicago Youth Conventions will present responses from the web site in the form of a National Youth Platform to the Presidential Candidates and national media.

KEY OUTCOMES

- ◆ **Improved citizen responsibility among youth.** National recognition for young people and their issues will motivate and empower all youth towards greater involvement, leadership, and responsibility.
- ◆ **Increased voting by young Americans** by encouraging young adults to vote and minors to cast their "ballot" as part of the National Student/Parent Mock Election.
- ◆ **Educational and civic curriculum** to accompany the Youth Conventions that will engage youth in ongoing discussions and activities regarding youth issues, community solutions, and citizenship.
- ◆ **National collaboration.** A wide spectrum of America's youth, youth-serving organizations, and corporations are working together to improve America's future -- today.
- ◆ **Long-term sustainability.** The national telecommunications infrastructure and web site will remain in place to provide an ongoing voice for youth.

NATIONAL COLLABORATION

Contributing to this event are over 30 national youth organizations with thousands of regional affiliates along with corporate sponsors and supporters including Microsoft, Chicago Hilton and Towers, Netscape, Discovery Channel, Close-Up Foundation, Channel One, and Rock the Vote. San Diego Unified School District and Chicago Public Schools are co-hosting these events. In addition to broad participation and support, over \$450,000 in cash and in-kind contributions have been received to date.

The National Youth Conventions are being coordinated by the Foundation of America, a nonprofit organization whose mission is to promote the health, safety, and well-being of children and youth through education, advocacy, resources, and services.

FOLLOW-UP ACTIVITIES

The National Youth Conventions will be repeated every four years concurrent with the Presidential elections. The national infrastructure that is created will allow for on-going youth communication, civics education, and a national voice leading up to Youth Conventions 2000 and beyond.

The Youth Conventions will serve as launch events for a national Challenge for Children Campaign. The campaign will raise funds for a National Trust Account for children and youth. Revenues will be disbursed towards integrating effective and accountable solutions into communities on behalf of children and youth.

Town Hall Meeting

- Why: To create an equal opportunity forum to highlight youth and adult perspectives and solutions for improving America.
- Who: Youth issue panelists from the First National Youth Conventions, young adults (18 - 30) are invited adults representing political, entertainment industry, authors, etc. Goal 15-25 participants - minimum 5 - 7 youth from Conventions issue panel leaders and other young adults (18 - 30) should make up ½ of panel.
- Where: Chicago Hilton and Towers. San Diego City College.
- When: 10am - 12pm, August 13th in San Diego
10am - 12pm, August 27th in Chicago
- What: An interactive, moderated discussion around key issue areas developed within the National Youth Platform. The discussion will focus on **solutions** to better America and highlight the importance of developing ongoing cooperative youth and adult partnerships.

Day One

Goal - To finalize National Youth Platform solutions for national presentation (key issues have been decided in July)

Methods - Two workshops involving entire youth delegation.

Morning session - issues panelists, report on their research and share potential solutions regarding their key issue areas.

11am - 1pm: Key media leaders are being invited through the Close-Up Foundation to give young people an overview and media perspective. This session will involve youth participation and will become part of a recorded close up on C-Span T.V. segment.

Afternoon session - Through ICA process delegates recommend collective ideas for solutions and vote on top recommendations for the national presentation.

Day Two (flexible date to accommodate Presidential Candidate Scheduling)

Goal - To present National Youth Platform to key political leaders and national media.

Methods - Town Hall meeting and platform presentation.

Morning session - Town Hall meeting

Goal - To recognize the importance of the voice and solutions of America's youth.

Method - A moderated Town Hall format where invited adults and youth issue panel spokespeople discuss solutions for a better America (tentative schedule 10am - 12pm).

Afternoon session - Presentation of National Youth Platform to political leaders and media.

Method - Youth spokespeople representing each issue area reads the top recommendations/solutions for their issue (approx. 2 - 3 minutes).

A youth spokesperson will also give an overview of the National Youth Conventions and explain how the platform was achieved.

If there is a presidential candidate or political representative, each issue panel will be allowed 2 - 3 questions to ask the candidates for responses to particular aspects of their solutions presented.

FIRST NATIONAL YOUTH CONVENTIONS GIVE POLITICAL VOICE TO AMERICA'S CHILDREN AND YOUTH

SAN DIEGO - For the first time in American history, youth from across America will present their issues and concerns to the Presidential candidates and the national media during the First National Youth Conventions, two non-partisan assemblies to be held simultaneously with the Republican and Democratic national conventions in August.

The First National Youth Conventions will bring together our nation's leaders -- and potential leaders -- to empower and encourage citizen responsibility in the next generations of American voters. President Bill Clinton, former Senator Bob Dole, Vice President Al Gore and House Speaker Newt Gingrich have been invited to participate in dialogue with the delegates regarding the National Youth Platform.

A special web site, "youthlink", has been created to capture the opinions of American children regarding politics, policies and the country's future. Young citizens with Internet access can dial into the web site for the National Youth Conventions at <http://www.youthlink.org>, and participate through chat rooms or by answering key questions about their communities and their country. The ideas and solutions expressed on-line will be used to formulate the National Youth Platform.

"If we truly want to make long-term positive changes in our country, we need to empower and engage America's youth. The National Youth Conventions are designed to give them a high profile forum to share their issues and ideas for improving America," says Peter Raducha, Executive Director of the National Youth Conventions.

First National Youth Conventions and National Student/Parent Mock Election, the largest voter education project in the United States, recently announced an alliance to promote the participation of young Americans in the democratic process. The National Student/Parent Mock Election is held October 30 in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and overseas. Five million "mock" ballots were cast in 1992. Over 80 national organizations representing thousands of regional and national children and youth organizations are collaborating on these events.

"Thousands of young Americans are adding their voice daily through the youthlink web site," says Raducha. MTV, Channel One, Handsnet, Netscape and others have helped get the word out via newscasts, classroom outreach and web site affiliation. "Young people are constantly telling us that they do not want to be regarded as a part of a distant future. They want to, and can make a positive difference today," adds Raducha. Alex Sanchez, student at San Diego's Hoover High School and a

Convention Board Member comments, "This event is a gateway for youth. We want adults to know that we care about what's going on and we want some of our issues recognized."

"Advertisers have proven the effects young people can have on adult purchasing decisions. It won't be long now before we will be able to prove the effects educated and informed young Americans can have on adult voting decisions," says Steven A. Dowling, President of MacMillan/ McGraw-Hill and Chairman of the National Student/Parent Mock Election.

The National Youth Conventions will be held during the Republican Convention on August 12-13 in San Diego and the Democratic National Convention on August 26-27 in Chicago. The Youth Conventions are a project of Foundation of America, a non-profit organization whose mission is to promote the health, safety and well-being of children and youth through education, advocacy, resources and services

As Mayor and on behalf of the City of Chicago, I am writing in support of the National Youth Conventions in San Diego and Chicago.

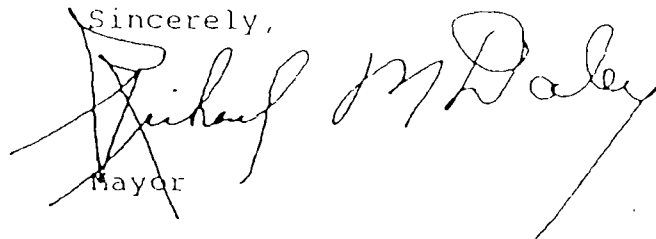

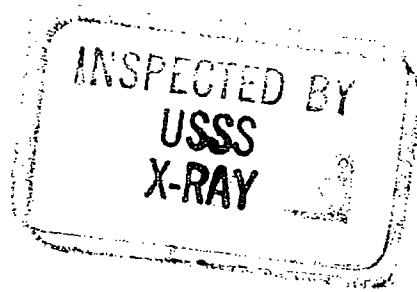

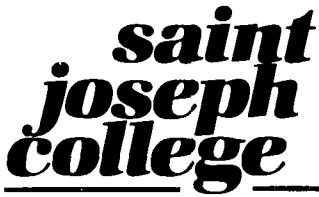

STATEMENT

**Mark Fabiani

February 29, 1996

Today is a major turning point in the Whitewater inquiry. After two years and \$4 million worth of work, the final results of the Pillsbury Madison & Sutro inquiry on behalf of federal regulators are in. The report examines and then undermines the central allegations that are the subject of Senator D'Amato's Whitewater hearings. Its conclusions remove any responsible argument for extending these hearings endlessly.

The final Pillsbury report, made public today by Congress and completed on behalf of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), concludes that there is "no reasonable basis" to pursue a claim against the Rose Law Firm. The final FDIC report, which includes a review of the newly discovered billing records, reaches the following conclusions:

◆ The FDIC's final report dismisses many of the prevalent Whitewater conspiracy theories. According to the report, "it simply would not be persuasive to argue that, for \$21,000, McDougal corrupted the Rose Law Firm and convinced half a dozen lawyers, most of whom he did not know, to join him in a scheme to violate the law The conspiracy theory is hopelessly flawed."

◆ There is nothing to support allegations that Mrs. Clinton somehow did anything improper in drafting an option agreement for Seth Ward. The FDIC's final report concludes that "a trier of fact is highly unlikely to conclude that Mrs. Clinton either knew of any wrongful purpose connected to the option (if there was one), or had the intent to aid in the commission of that hypothetical wrong."

-- "The evidence, taken together, suggests that Mrs. Clinton prepared this option in two hours and probably without much discussion as to its purpose. As she explained, Ward had a habit of dropping by and demanding product immediately. This looks like one such occasion."

-- "The evidence strongly suggests that the option as drafted described the wrong property and therefore was modified . . . by somebody other than Rose Law Firm personnel This suggests that Mrs. Clinton had not been told the entire reason, or perhaps any reason for the option; after all, she had evidently misunderstood what property it was to cover."

◆ The 1988 decision by the Rose Law firm to discard certain records was not improper. According to the FDIC's final report, "the discarding occurred in a seemingly innocent context, as part of a general effort to discard unneeded files. There is no evidence that Mrs. Clinton knew anyone might need the files The worse that can be said is that Mrs. Clinton should have checked with her client before discarding files that belonged to it." The FDIC's final report concludes that the theory that the files were improperly destroyed "is highly unlikely to persuade any trier of fact."

◆ There is "no hint of fraud or intentional misconduct" in the way in which the Rose Law Firm was retained by Madison Guaranty. The report observes: "There is no suggestion that the money was to be a gratuity (as opposed to payment for work performed),

nor is there any suggestion of an improper quid pro quo. Again, there is no proof of fraud, intentional misconduct or harm to Madison Guaranty."

- **"Even if all the retainer had been earned in fees, Mrs. Clinton's share would have been less than \$20 a month."**
- **"The suggestion that the Madison Guaranty business was economically significant to the Clintons (or, for that matter, to the Rose Law Firm) finds no support."**
- **"A trier of fact is highly unlikely to find that there was anything untoward, let alone fraudulent or intentionally wrongful, in the circumstances of the Rose Law Firm's retention by Madison Guaranty."**

◆ **There is "no substantial evidence that the Rose Law Firm aided and abetted whatever wrongdoing McDougal might have engaged in" regarding Madison's acquisition of the IDC property. In fact, the report observes that "the billing records found at the White House and other newly acquired evidence . . . weakens to some extent the conclusion that Ward was a straw man or nominee, and that the acquisition therefore was wrongful."**

- **"The evidence, new and old, suggests that the Rose Law Firm had little or nothing to do with the sales as such, much to do with the research, which in and of itself seems quite innocent, and a little but no much to do with Ward's relations with McDougal."**
- **"The liquor and sewer research projects are well-documented and appear to have involved straightforward legal work. No theory has been advanced that this work aided any sort of wrongdoing."**

Today the White House also is making public the transcript of the First Lady's interview with the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). As the White House previously announced, the interview was conducted on February 14, 1996. The final

Pillsbury report uses the information obtained from this FDIC interview in formulating its recommendations and conclusions. The President and Mrs. Clinton have cooperated fully with the FDIC and the Resolution Trust Corporation and have previously given testimony under oath by means of written interrogatories. The transcript of the February 14, 1996 interview has been finalized by the FDIC, and the White House is making the transcript available to the public and the media.

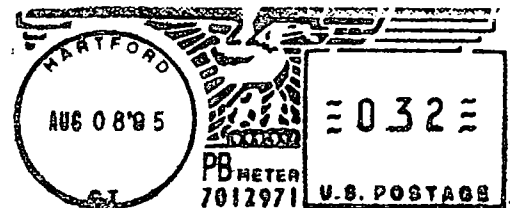

Dear Mrs. Clinton,

thank you very much that you make time for our request! It is a great honour and pleasure for me to write to you and I gratefully seize the opportunity, following Mr Rüdiger Löwe's suggestion, to contact you directly. More than a year ago we learned from Simon & Schuster that you were planning to publish »It Takes A Village and Other Lessons Children Teach Us«, and since that time we were very eager to edit this book in German language. By January we received a copy of the finished work, and were at once very enthusiastic about your wise and sincere, warm-hearted and often humorous reflections on children and their needs, on the tasks of parents, schools, church and social institutions, based on your rich experiences from all over the world.

Concerning the German translation rights we had to negotiate with Mohrbooks, the Swiss agency. We were the first to open the bidding and we seriously improved our first offer when other German publishers expressed their strong interest, too. Among our non-fictional titles your extraordinary book would have been well placed as the main title of the Fall '96-programme and supported by an outstanding advertising and press campaign. But suddenly we were informed that Simon & Schuster had already decided to go with Hoffmann & Campe and that the German rights had definitely been sold. Obviously we were very disappointed by this way things developed, but we wish you the best of success for the German edition.

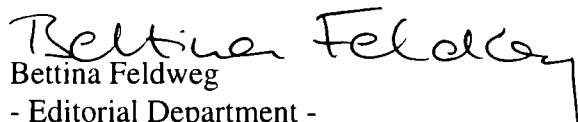
Anyhow, we trust there could be future projects on which we might cooperate. Obviously there is an unlimited store of questions and topics about which German readers would like to know from you. It would be phantastic to read your entire autobiography as soon as possible - but of course we understand your position, described in »It Takes A Village...«, concerning your memoirs, which still have to wait. Since you have explained your attitude towards children's needs, it would be most promising to read your reflections on women, too. You have already had such a great influence on women's concerns and essentially contributed to their improvement in many parts of the world. In addition to that general approach we would be happy to hear about your personal situation, being the First Lady of the USA and the most important woman world-wide. How do you regard your own identity and self-image as a woman, living side by side with the President of the United States? And what about your female self-realization - did you have to renounce many of your individual desires? Please excuse me for asking so frankly. I absolutely do not want to intrude upon you, but there is so much we would like to know from you, and your thoughts and opinions are surely of general interest. To mention another example, we should be grateful to hear more details about your own motherhood and your experiences with your growing-up daughter Chelsea.

Dear Mrs. Clinton, do you think we could get in touch some day on your future book projects?

Looking very much forward to hearing from you whenever you should find the time to contact us.

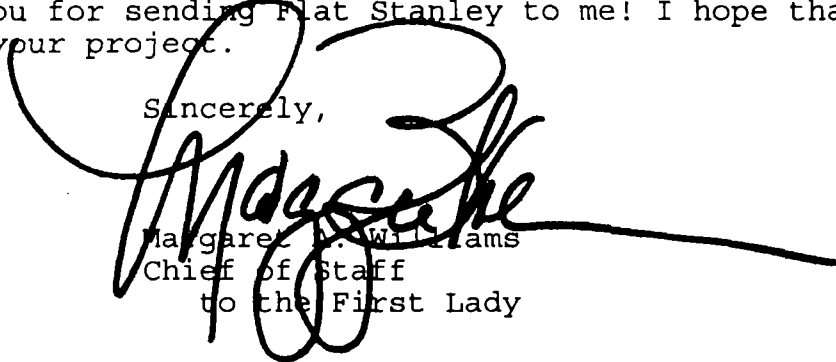
I have received Flat Stanley in the mail. I think the project you are doing is a great idea!

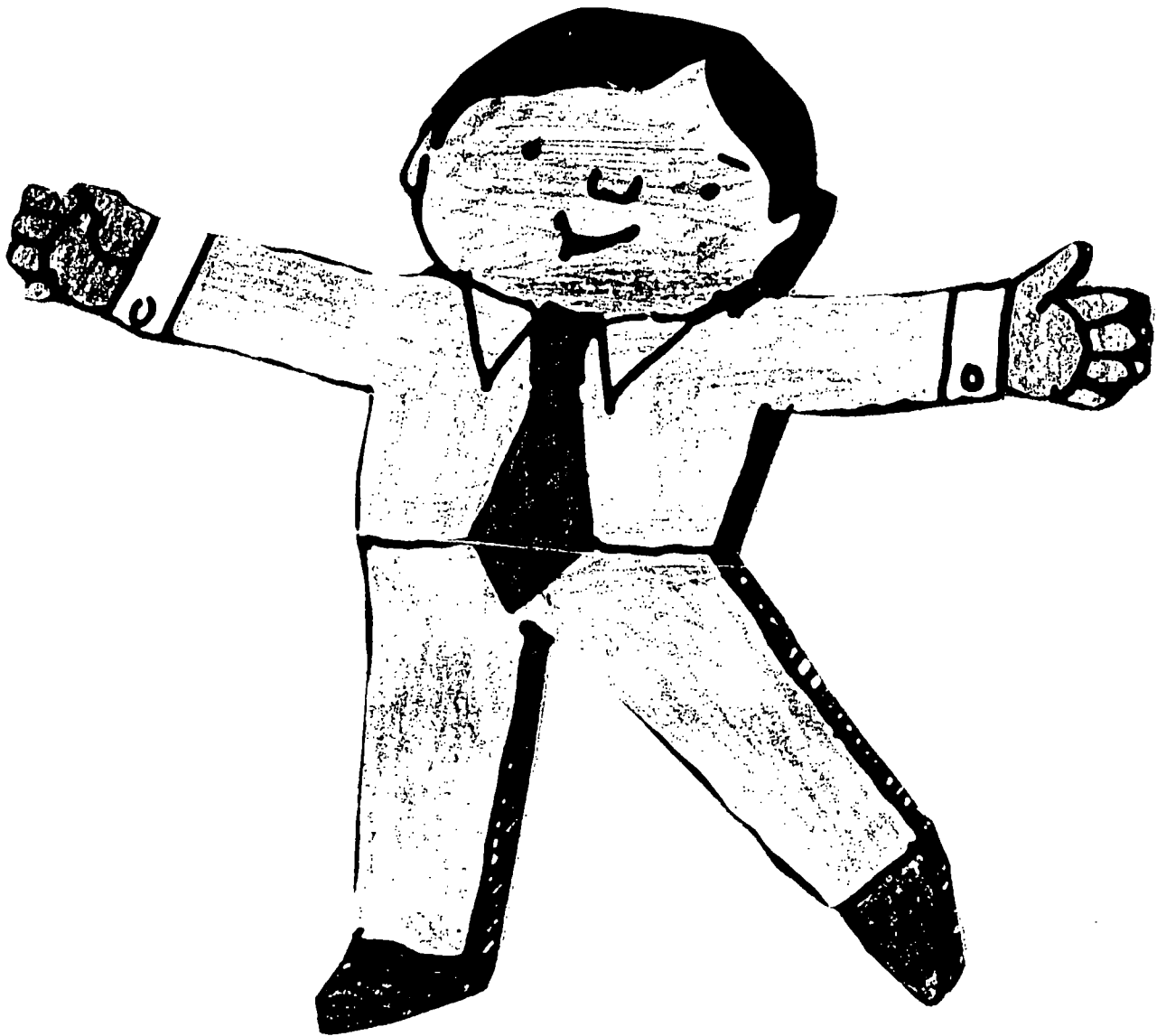

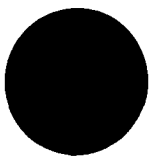
