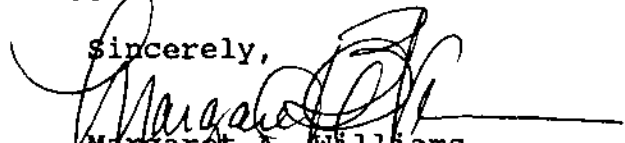

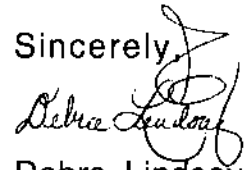

Valleywide chapter claims 50 members

SUN CITY WEST — Bet Moses may be a self-proclaimed Republican, but when she heard "Tonight Show" host Jay Leno spent five whole minutes bashing first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton during his Oct. 31 show, she decided to send Leno a piece of her mind — via a letter.

Moses, a resident of Sun City West, is the chairwoman of the newly founded Hillary Rodham Clinton Fan Club of the Sun Cities and Phoenix.

"When I heard him bashing her every which way, I got really mad," said Moses, wearing a green-and-white Hillary Rodham Clinton Fan Club button. "I thought it was high time we start respecting our leaders."

Moses wrote a letter to "The Tonight Show" stating her feelings

about Leno's monologue.

"We are writing to let you know that we think it is time to modify the rhetoric and the jokes aimed at our President and his family," wrote Moses. "Whether we agree or disagree with the White House politics, we all owe some respect for the office and what it represents."

"Our first lady Hillary Clinton is doing a great job under very difficult circumstances, and we should all give her the credit she deserves. So, keep us entertained as you always do, but please, not at the expense of our first lady."

The local chapter of the non-profit Hillary Clinton Fan Club has about 50 members and is the only group of its kind in the state.

There are 43 similar clubs throughout the country, with more than 7,000 members. The fan club also has chapters in Denmark and

Moses, a retired Oklahoma school teacher, said she heard about the national organization through a magazine article.

"Many of us have been increasingly disturbed by the lack of respect shown our leaders, whether they are Republicans or Democrats," she said. Moses said she believes the media is to blame for the "Hillary bashing."

"I consider myself a loyal Republican, in an era of shifting party philosophies and I am really turned off by the growing influence of religious conservatives," she said. "We need leaders who do things. Mrs. Clinton fits that definition. I admire her efforts to improve people's lives and get them involved in their communities and government."

"As a lifelong registered

Republican, I find Mrs. Clinton has the strength of character and basic beliefs that all Americans can support," she said. "I became so fed up with the Hillary bashing, and when I heard about the club, I jumped to become a part of it."

Moses said the goals of the fan club are:

- To show respect and admiration for Hillary Rodham Clinton.

- To support the projects on which Mrs. Clinton is, or will be, working on.

- To protest the bashing of Hillary Rodham Clinton.

"These simple goals of support for the Clintons and their programs have met with amazing success for a truly grass roots organization," said Moses. "Some chapters hold rallies and meetings, but mostly our members watch the newspapers and television

shows for content. When we see or hear any unfair or unfavorable criticism of Mrs. C., we respond by letters."

And they get responses, too.

A correspondent from "The Tonight Show" responded to Moses' letter in January.

"Thank you for sharing with us your suggestions for improving the show," the letter said.

Incidentally, the first lady also wrote Moses a letter thanking her for her support.

"Thank you for your thoughtful letter," the first lady wrote on White House stationery. "Your words of encouragement and support mean a great deal to me."

"It is a pleasure to hear from individuals, who share a vision of a better life for all Americans," she said. "A common belief in family, community, and country, guides each of us, as we work

to realize the promise of America. Your ideas and thoughts offer added inspiration, as the President works to ensure that every American's future, is filled with courage, hope and confidence."

Moses wrote to Clinton telling her about the Arizona fan club that supports her ideas.

"It was nice to receive a letter back from her," she said. "Even though I'm a Republican, I still believe in what she's about. I've got friends who are also Republicans, but they have also joined the club. They laugh at it and so do I, but in the end, they still become members."

Perhaps one of Moses' biggest supporters is the Sun City West Democratic Club.

"I'm really proud of being a Democrat," said Robert McLahlan, president of the Sun City West Democratic

Club. "I'm probably more proud now than I was before the blast of infamy that occurred in November. It's great that Bet has formed a group like this."

McLahlan said there are approximately 4,000 Democrats in Sun City West, a predominately Republican community of about 26,000 people.

"It's difficult to be a Democrat here, but we gotta just hold up our head and not take the bashing," said Jack Ormsbee, club secretary and public information officer of the Sun City West Democratic Club. "Some of the Democrats are reluctant to stand up and say they are a Democrat, but they should."

McLahlan agreed and said, "Our time will come again."

I represent a child welfare agency, ChildServ, which recently celebrated its 100th anniversary of helping children to build better lives. "My boy, he began to translate things back into English for me. Pretty soon I discovered I was learning just as much as he was.

"After a while, my family educator told me about a class in English as a second language, and she helped me enroll. Pretty soon I was looking for chances to use English.

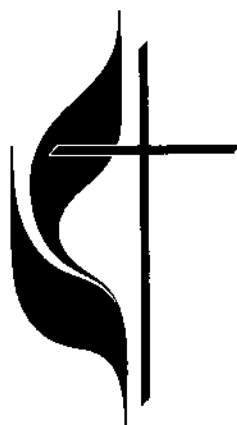
"Soon I think it will be good enough for me to go to cosmetology school. Before HIPPY I never even dared think about it, even though it's something I've wanted to do for years."

Luisa Rivera, Dorothy Taylor and Charles Meadows are not exceptions. They are typical of the growth and hope HIPPY brings families in the program. Social services professionals call this empowerment, helping people take control of their lives.

HIPPY:
Turning Lives Around

HIPPY is short for Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters. It is a home-based program that shows disadvantaged parents how to help their four- and five-year-old children prepare for success in kindergarten and the classroom.

Developed in Israel with the support of the U.S.-based National Council of Jewish Women, the program is active in countries on five continents and 13 of the United States.

ChildServ introduced the program in two Chicago neighborhoods in 1989. It has since been expanded.

HIPPY uses paraprofessional home visitors (family educators) and role playing to teach parents how to teach their children. The method helps parents with poor education succeed as their children's first teacher. The Chicago program uses specially developed bilingual materials for Hispanic parents who speak little or no English.

By the end of its first year, HIPPY children were testing on a par with or above those in conventional Head Start programs. The first HIPPY children also ranked at or near the top of their kindergarten

class, according to reports from their teachers.

ChildServ developed the program to create this kind of results for the children. But equally remarkable is what the program has done for the parents who participate. Here are some of their stories in their own words. The names and some details have been changed to protect the privacy of the families.

Dorothy Taylor is raising four children in a disadvantaged West Side neighborhood. Sometimes she works two jobs to make ends meet. That does not leave a lot of time to get involved in her children's school.

"Frankly, I never wanted to get involved. I hated school, and I dropped out. But I want something better for my kids. I used to figure there was nothing I could do for them, so I left it all up to the teachers, and I never went near the school unless there was a problem.

"My girlfriend got me into the program with my four-year-old, and I liked it. And my little girl really took to it, too.

"Then I got to be a family educator, and I discovered that I had something that could help

other people. It made me feel real good....

"HIPPY taught me that I can do a whole lot of things I never thought I could do. And you know what? I'm good at it. Even got my GED."

Charles Meadows, Sr., was married and a father when he was barely out of high school. A series of frustrating, dead end jobs strained his family life, and when HIPPY came along, Chuck saw a chance to spend quality time with his son.

He also discovered something about himself he never suspected. "I was bored in high school, and I never did as well as I should've. But when I started the program with Chuck, Jr., I found out I really liked teaching him.

"It gave me a whole something new to do with my life. So now I'm in college studying early childhood development."

Luisa Rivera lives in a neighborhood in Humboldt Park where she never has to speak English. When she had to visit school for her older children, she always took along an interpreter.

Jones takes reins of leadership

Celebrating its 100th birthday was not enough excitement for the agency. ChildServ also welcomed a new President and Chief Executive Officer this year.

James C. Jones became the agency's first African-American leader when he joined the staff this past summer.

Jones, former Executive Vice President at the Central Baptist Children's Home, is no stranger to child welfare issues. For the past 19 years Jones has focused his career on issues that affect children and ways to bring about positive change.

A graduate of Northwestern University's J. L. Kellogg Graduate School

of Management, Jones began his career as an Adult Education Instructor and later as a Social Worker, both in Newark, New Jersey. His professional career in Chicago began in 1975 when he joined the

staff of the Central Baptist Children's Home.

His career with Central Baptist has covered nearly 20 years. During this time he served as a Family Counselor and Foster Care Caseworker, Program Supervisor, Senior Supervisor in the Primary Educational Resource Center and Family Counseling Program; as both Director of Programs and Deputy Director for the Cook County Services Division and as the Executive Vice President. In this last position, Jones responsible for a \$12 million operational budget encompassing 40 distinct programs for 2,000 families in 11 area sites.

In joining the staff of ChildServ, Jones will be faced with similar challenges and anxiously looks forward to initiating additional innovative programs for the 22 sites ChildServ comprises. "I am not only encouraged, but impressed by the dedication shown by the Board of Trustees, staff and supporters for ChildServ," Jones said. "This will enable the agency to continue to emerge as an innovative leader in the field of child well-being services as we begin the work before us."

ChildServ offers programs to empower children and families



Therapeutic Foster Care:

ChildServ administers four major programs to foster care children with special needs:

Project 90:

Provides comprehensive care for boys who have been sexually abused and are now abusing other children. This is believed to be the only program of its kind in the country.

Specialized Foster Care:

Provides foster care and therapy for special, emotional and behavioral or social problems. These include developmental disabilities, poor attention span, hyperactivity and other conditions that require particular training for the foster givers.

Teen Mom Foster Care:

Some teen moms are unable to continue living with their natural parents. ChildServ obtains foster care for them which may begin during or after their pregnancy, and also arranges for pre-natal and post-natal care.

Medically Complex Foster Care:

Provides care for children with severe medical problems such as HIV or AIDS, and for drug-addicted or alcohol-fetal-syndrome babies.

HIPPY (Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters):

HIPPY is a family literacy program that helps parents in disadvantaged communities prepare their four- and five-year-old children for school.

Emphasis is placed on the importance of the parent's role as the child's first teacher. The program helps parents become involved in their child's education.



Kids' Place

Kids' Place (Lugar Para Ninos):

A drop-in center where pre-teen children get help with their homework and enjoy supervised play, this program encourages creativity and is a powerful alternative to gang involvement.

Family Home Day Care:

This program recruits and trains community residents, who become licensed by the state, to provide day care in their homes for the children of young parents. Providers often become mentors for the young mothers, helping them build their parenting skills.

Parent Empowerment Program (PEP):

This in-home program provides services to parents with children whose ages range from newborn to three-year-olds. Young mothers are taught what to expect as a child develops, together with in-depth information concerning the impact of a mother's care on that development.

Tutoring:

An in-school program for children who are experiencing classroom learning problems. Tutors for this program are all volunteers.

Interweave:

Professional, early intervention counseling for children who are exhibiting emotional problems in school. Families of the children are involved as counselors and strive to understand and mitigate problems.

Licensing and Adoptions:

This program licenses foster home and adoption conversions and offers Preparation for Adult Living (PAL): a method of teaching children how to live independently after leaving the foster home.

Family Foster Care:

ChildServ provides family foster care for children in the Chicago metropolitan area who are removed from their homes because of abuse or neglect. The goal of this program is to return the child to the natural parents, whenever possible. If returning a child is not possible, the agency explores adoption or long-term placement. In every case, ChildServ seeks to do what is in the best interest of the child.

Group Homes:

ChildServ operates three group homes: two are for girls and one is for boys. Each home provides a safe, home-like environment for children 13 to 17 who have behavioral and family problems. The primary goal is to return the child to its natural home. If this is not possible, alternative arrangements are made.

The professionals who manage the homes give the children a feeling of genuine warmth and security.

Church-Community Consultation:

Working with congregations and community groups throughout Northern Illinois, this program provides advice and consultation to those who are developing programs that address community of life for children families.

Specialized Foster Care:

Provides foster care and therapy for special, emotional and behavioral or social problems. These include developmental disabilities, poor attention span, hyperactivity and other conditions that require particular training for the foster care-givers.

Medically Complex Foster Care:

Provides care for children with severe medical problems such as HIV or AIDS, and for drug-addicted or alcohol-fetal-syndrome babies.

Moms' Place (Lugar Para Madres):

This drop-in center is for mothers of infants and toddlers. Activities help to develop attainable goals among both children and mothers. ChildServ staff provides mothers with

life skills training while their children engage in supervised play in a nearby room.

1994: A Year in Review

It's been a year that we will never again experience - ChildServ's 100th anniversary! And, we have had a celebration that will long be remembered as we begin our second century of helping children and providing for their well-being. ChildServ, formerly the Lake Bluff Children's Home, began its centennial celebration last year at the Tangle Oaks Educational Center with a Centennial Brunch. Friends and supporters were on hand to wish the Agency well and applaud the accomplishments of the past. This occasion was made more special as former

administrators returned to Lake Bluff to participate in the celebration. Margaret Brooks, the senior of the previous administrators and who served as the agency's superintendent from 1942-1954, came from Colorado and former staff were delighted to see her. Former executive directors Robert Beers (1954-1961), Robert Petracek (1961-1967), and Coyd Taggart (1967-1984) were joined by Alice Jeffords, widow of Erikine Jeffords, who served not only as an executive director, but also as the agency's executive

secretary. Mr. Jeffords was affiliated with the agency from 1946-1966. These former directors recalled activities and programs under their leadership and spoke of delight in the agency's development over the years. The Centennial Brunch served as a "kick-off" for the activities that were to follow during the year, recognizing 100 years of service by loyal and dedicated staff, friends and supporters. Let's take a look at other festivities that made 1994 such a remarkable year for ChildServ.

International expert on preventing child abuse keynotes first annual symposium

ChildServ's Annual Meeting and first annual Symposium featured Dr. Richard D. Krugman, international expert on the prevention of child abuse, as the keynote speaker for both events. Held at the Bethany Methodist Home and Hospital in Chicago, the Annual Meeting, hosted over 100 friends and Society of ChildServ members.

The inter-disciplinary symposium drew a crowd from various disciplines and was cosponsored with Cook County Hospital and Cook County Children's Hospital.

Child Abuse and Neglect Crisis: Interdisciplinary Challenges provided an educational forum for professionals in child welfare areas, who came together to strategize on ways to effectively serve the abused and troubled child, to address concerns while identifying state-of-the-art methods and recommendations for alleviating the

problem.

Cook County Public Guardian Patrick T. Murphy, Attorney Marilyn J. Wood, former Assistant

Chief Counsel with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services, Dr. Michele A. Lorand, director of Cook County Children's Hospital's Child Protective Services Unit, Social Work Coordinator Brenda Chandler, also in the Cook County Children's Protective Services Unit, and Ramon L. Nieves, Jr., vice president for Programs, ChildServ, served as speakers and panel leaders. Dr. Agnes D. Lattimer, medical director of Cook County Hospital and Chairperson of the ChildServ Board of Trustees, served as the event's moderator.

The symposium was of particular interest, not only because of its topic and speakers, but because a young woman was introduced who spoke to the group on how the system does work. Kasha Mullens, a volunteer at ChildServ's Grand Boulevard office and participant in the agency's Teen Mom's program, provided insightful
