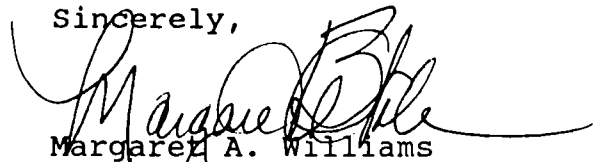

D'Amato Wields the Big Lie

WASHINGTON — The essence of modern political defamation consists primarily of the following Big Lie techniques:

—Abbreviation of alleged information past the point of distortion.

—Endless repetition of the libel to a point where an ethically challenged press begins passing it on literally.

—Endless raising of questions that gradually degenerate into self-supplied "answers."

—Ritual condemnation of the victim's statements as a substitute for factual refutation.

—Complete disregard of specific, sworn and unchallenged statements on all the key points as if they had never been made.

By such reprehensible behavior have Sen. Al D'Amato of New York and his Whitewater Committee Republicans attempted to place Hillary Rodham Clinton's chief of staff at the center of a "crime" that not one shred of evidence shows ever was committed.

As spun out on the Senate floor last week by D'Amato's designated hatchet man, right-wing windup toy Lauch Faircloth of North Carolina, the fact-free theory masquerades as narrative.

Supposedly, as Faircloth theorized, Margaret Williams helped Mrs. Clinton get incriminating material from Vincent Foster's office on the night of his suicide two years ago and, in the days that followed, conspired to limit the official search of his office and then lied about it repeatedly *under oath*.

Never mind that Maggie Williams' in-

tegrity is held in awe by all who know her — as I have, off and on, since she got her first political job at the Democratic National Committee more than 15 years ago. Her unblemished reputation aside, it's enough simply to follow the Big Lie, which covers all three critical moments at issue.

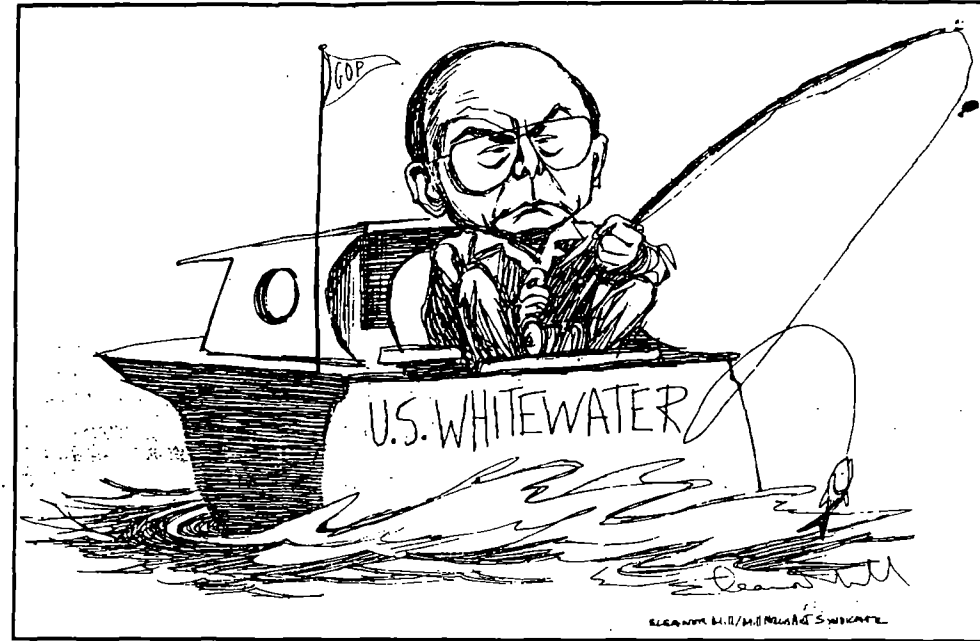
D'Amato himself offered a classic example on television last week as he was pushing his unnecessary subpoena "controversy" to a pointless vote in the Senate. Williams, he said, had been seen that first night carrying a large batch of documents out of Foster's office.

That is vintage distortion through abbreviation. The truth is that a uniformed security officer has testified that he saw her emerge from the suite of White House counsel offices. Even if he were correct, he testified that he never saw her come from Foster's office in the suite, never saw her take documents from it and has no knowledge of what he says she was carrying.

Williams flatly denies she was carrying anything that evening. Her account has never varied, through interviews with investigators at the time, two polygraphs that she passed, meetings with the independent counsel, testimony before a grand jury here and three appearances before the Senate committee.

By contrast, the security officer's testimony has changed with time. Moreover, he was called back five times by the independent counsel's office, which has refused requests by committee Democrats for his testimony.

It goes on. Williams is on record (as is



Mrs. Clinton), under oath, testifying that Mrs. Clinton did not tell her to limit the subsequent examination of Foster's office contents. She also has testified flatly that she gave no such instructions to anyone else.

There is no contradictory evidence, but that does not stop the Big Lie. What D'Amato, et al, do is to ignore the testimony and claim that because there was a flurry of phone calls the morning of the foolishly limited search that are not remembered, that therefore the calls were conspiratorial.

The Lie extends, finally, to the removal to the White House residence of Foster material that was personal to the Clintons, where it was stored in a closet until claimed by their attorney.

Again, Williams was explicit and uncontradicted. She said then-counsel Bernard Nussbaum summoned her after the search and told her he had this box containing the Clintons' material. Williams said she called Mrs. Clinton at once and was told to contact another aide and bring the box to the residence. Both Williams and Mrs.

Clinton (in a deposition) said they never looked at the contents until it was retrieved by the attorney.

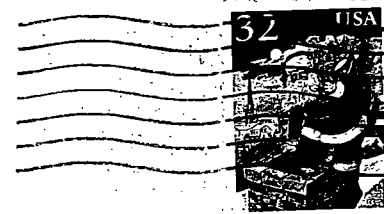
A memory lapse here, a morsel of hearsay there — and with committed partisans at work, the questions go on endlessly. Amazingly, D'Amato's defamation campaign continues despite Williams' explicit testimony on the key points; in more than two years not a shred of direct, factual evidence has contradicted it.

Undeterred, D'Amato pronounces her testimony not credible, Faircloth flat out calls her a liar, and the repetition of the defamation drowns out her sworn words.

The safe course is to sit back and watch this farce unfold, magisterially reserving judgment. Where someone of Maggie Williams' impeccable character and reputation is concerned, however, that is moral complicity.

The fact is that her word remains unchallenged by anything more than politics and libel. The treatment of this universally respected truth-teller by D'Amato — and its toleration by others — is disgusting.

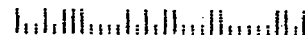

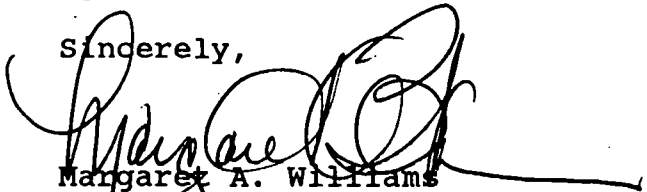

The National Credit Union Administration is preparing its agenda for its financial services symposium "Serving the Underserved". The symposium will be devoted to discovering ways to provide financial services for those lacking adequate access to financial institutions. The Symposium will be held August 9-10-11, 1996, at the Hyatt Regency O'Hare, in Rosemont, Illinois.

I attended several roundtable discussions in Little Rock, Arkansas which were chaired by Christopher Hyland. Mr. Hyland suggested that I write you to ask your assistance in requesting that the First Lady give the keynote address at the opening session in the evening of August 9, 1996. I feel that the topic of this symposium might be near and dear to her heart.

An official invitation was sent from the National Credit Union Administration on November 1, 1995, a copy of which I am enclosing. My itinerary takes me to Washington D.C. often. Perhaps during one of my trips we can meet to further discuss this matter in the near future.

On behalf of the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA), I would like to invite you to be the keynote speaker at NCUA's national conference on "Serving the Underserved" on Saturday, August 10, 1996, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel-O'Hare Airport, in Chicago, Illinois.

Since the turn of the century, America's credit unions have been focusing on bringing financial services to low-income people who were unable to obtain low-cost services elsewhere. By doing this, credit unions have helped their member-owners empower themselves. Credit unions today offer services to all segments of society, as does the White House Federal Credit Union, while still reaching out to bring the underserved into America's financial mainstream.

The NCUA, as the independent agency responsible for chartering, supervising and insuring the nation's federal credit unions, recognizes there are millions of people in our country today who for reasons such as language, educational, and geographical barriers, still lack access to basic financial services at reasonable costs.

The purpose of this conference is to bring together credit unions of all sizes so that they may learn from each other, and develop plans of action to focus on breaking down whatever barriers keep people of small means from becoming part of the American free-enterprise system. We will address such subjects as: How can a credit union reach out to an underserved community? How can credit unions offer more services to their existing members?

We will hear from pioneering credit unions such as \$2 million-asset Lower East Side Peoples FCU in New York City. The credit union allows homeless people to open share savings and share draft accounts, and provides them with safe-deposit boxes to store their medications and other valuables that could otherwise be stolen on the street. Community development credit unions from South Texas, South Central Los Angeles, and many other inner city and rural low-income areas will be at this conference, as will credit union people who have never before attended a national conference.

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

I know that your schedule on your upcoming trip to China is a full one. Nevertheless, I felt it important to bring to your attention the fact that the long planned Chinese-American Children's Medical Center in Shanghai is under construction. Because of your interest in the welfare of children the world over, we felt the enclosed material would be of interest to you.

The Shanghai Children's Medical Center will be the first western state-of-the-art hospital in all of China. Our commitment towards this effort is \$38 million in private funding with the Chinese contributing double that for construction. They also donated the ground for our center two years ago.

This will be a successful venture as well for American business, because so many of the medical equipment manufacturers and others such as AT&T and Hewlett-Packard have committed to the donation of materials. For example, General Electric is providing us with all of the radiology equipment needed, a gift which will approximate \$10 million. The hospital itself, in addition to benefiting the children of China and all the Chinese people as a training center, will also become a permanent trade fair for the American equipment utilized within it. Should your schedule call for you to be in Shanghai, I know our staff would be more than delighted to meet with you and brief you on the project.

We feel the symbolism of the Children's Hospital in Shanghai can serve the purpose of demonstrating that the American people are interested in the future of China and the recognition that the children of today will provide the leadership of tomorrow.

You have our very best wishes for a successful mission to The Women's Conference in Beijing.

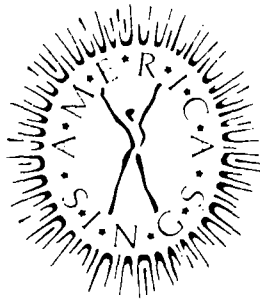

Dear Ms. Williams:

Kim Lafferty in Marian Wright Edelman's office suggested I write to you to extend an invitation for Mrs. Clinton to attend the America Sings! festival at the Washington Monument on Mother's Day weekend, May 10 or 11. Marian has been the guest speaker at two past America Sings! festivals but is unable to attend the festival this spring. Would Mrs. Clinton be willing to speak for a few minutes to approximately 4,000 young singers, their directors, and parent chaperones?

The America Sings! organization is a nonprofit educational corporation founded by John Jacobson to provide young singers with the motivation to use their time and talents to do community service work to benefit disadvantaged children. America Sings! also gives the singers a noncompetitive opportunity to share their music with kids from all over the country. Our organization is not affiliated with any religious or political organizations and is dedicated "To kids who feel they have no hope, from kids with hope to share." The choirs that attend are primarily junior high through high school students who will spend time this school year holding benefit concerts for needy causes in their hometowns; collecting donations at their concerts of canned goods, mittens, coats, etc., for local charities; performing at hospitals, homeless shelters, and day care centers; or other community service projects. The America Sings! festivals are celebrations of music and of all the hours of service work these kids have done in their communities.

We estimate there will be approximately 100 school choirs attending the Washington festival with a total of over 4,000 singers. They will meet at the Sylvan Theatre for an Opening Concert/Rehearsal at 7 p.m. on Friday, May 10. On May 11 each choir will perform individual concerts on several outdoor stages we erect at the Washington Monument. Then at 7 p.m. on May 11, they will join voices in an enormous Massed-Choir Finale, performing four songs they have learned in advance. This Finale is quite a spectacle! It is at this concert that we would love to have Mrs. Clinton address the multitude to thank them for their music and to inspire them to keep up their good works back in their hometowns. The Opening Concert/Rehearsal on Friday would be alternate opportunity to speak.

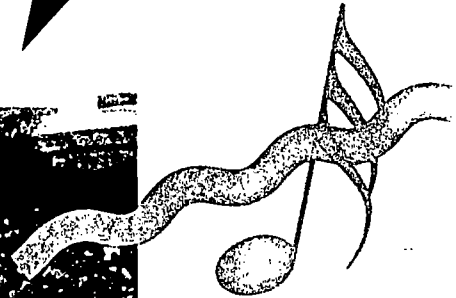
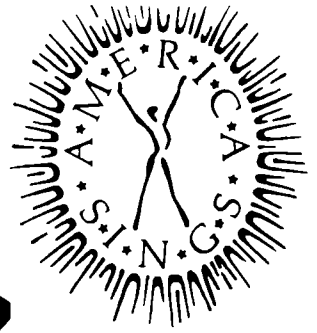
