WHAT IS RITES OF PASSAGE?

rites of passage is the English term that expresses the African concept wherein a young female member of an African community crosses from puberty into womanhood. This crossing over is a particularly special time to the community at large especially the sisterhood. This is so because there is now one more daughter that has come of term to assist in the building of clan and nation. It heralds another woman joining the pool from which she may emerge as queen, queen mother, prophetess, teacher, mother, wife, sister and friend. In traditional African society every woman is a daughter of the most high Lord of Heaven and Earth.

WHY IS A RITES OF PASSAGE NECESSARY FOR AFRICAN WOMEN OF THE DIASPORA?

It is important because it brings a woman back to her roots. It is necessary that each woman be confident in herself that she is a woman. Until a female understands what a woman is, she will feel a void within herself. As Africans of the diaspora we have been cut off from our roots, in various forms and oftentimes African principles have been replaced with manmade philosophy.

In Genesis Chapter 2 Verse 23 it reads: And Adam (Ahdama) said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called woman, because she was taken out of man. This woman was an African woman. This lone African woman wears the title of honor recorded in Genesis Chapter 3 Verse 20; and Adam called his wife's name Chawayaha (Eve); because she was the mother of all living. This title was not given to every woman of every race. It was given to the first woman and it is through her that all females must claim descendancy.

HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE?

Rites of passage is a serious and complex institution in traditional African society. The amount of time given to this celebration of coming into womanhood can vary from a few months to a few years. However, this will be a five (5) week curriculum that will be divided into seminars, workshops and lectures. Some seminar topics will

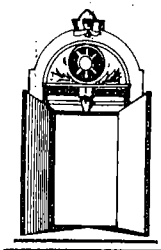

Dear Ms. Williams:

I am writing on behalf of Justice Tamara MORSHCHAKOVA and Mr. Igor PETRUKHIN of Russia who will be visiting the United States under the auspices of the International Visitor Program of the U.S. Information Agency. They will be accompanied by U.S. Escort-Interpreter, Ms. Sylvia Koslov and will be in Washington for programming March 17-23, 1994.

Justice Morshchakova and her husband Mr. Petrukhin are both deeply involved in the constitutional reform movement in Russia. They are coming to the U.S. to speak at several universities about the changes in Russia and their efforts in contributing to judicial reform. They will then begin their International Visitor Program which will provide an overview of our judicial system.

Justice Morshchakova had the honor of dining with Mrs. Clinton and Ambassador Jack Matlock during Mrs. Clinton's recent visit to Moscow. Justice Morshchakova requested that Mrs. Clinton be apprised of her visit to the U.S. and hoped that Mrs. Clinton would have time to renew their acquaintance.

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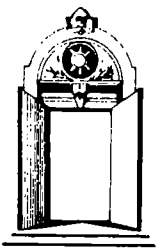

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

Justice Morshchakova and Mr. Petrukhin are travelling to the United States for the first time by invitation of the Universities of Chicago, Wisconsin, Toronto and California at Berkeley where they have been asked to lecture and participate in seminars. Following these lectures, they will travel to Washington, D.C. for a one-week program under the auspices of the International Visitor Program of the U.S. Information Agency.

While in Washington, Justice Morshchakova and Mr. Petrukhin would like to better understand the U.S. Federal Legal System. Personal exposure to the U.S. legal system will aid them in court duties and legislative drafting. They would like to learn about the function and responsibilities of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, U.S. District Courts, the Office of the Attorney General and Solicitor General. They would like to meet with members of the House and Senate Judiciary Committees, the Federal Judicial Center, and the National Center for State Courts. In addition, Justice Morshchakova and Mr. Petrukhin wish to collect information on constitutional and criminal law including criminal investigation procedures conducted by the FBI. Mr. Petrukhin would also like to examine the U.S. jury system and to report his findings in the evaluation of the implementation of the Russian jury system which he is conducting for the Office of the President.

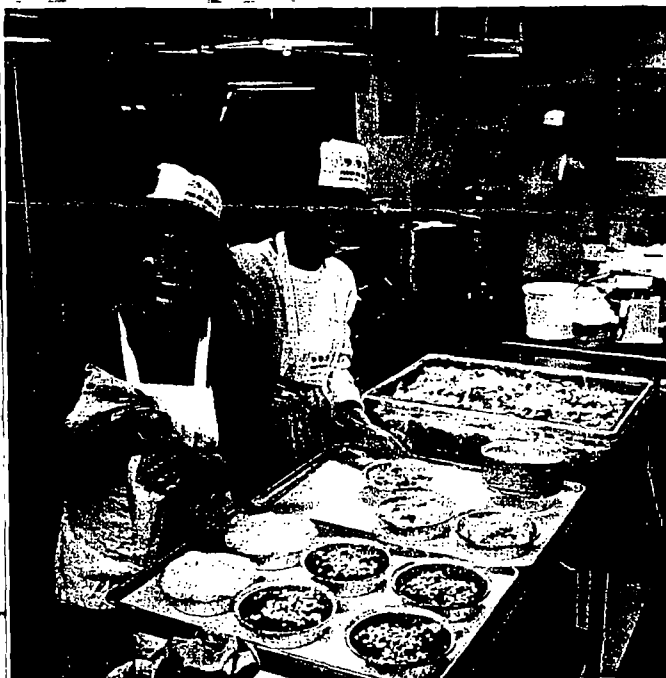

With These Pies, Who Needs Dessert?

First there was fast food. Now, several decades later, there is beginning to be *good* fast food.

Among the entrepreneurs making lunch and dinner better are the people at Pies on the Run, who will deliver their goods seven days a week over a range of daytime and evening hours.

What they deliver is pies. These are savory pies—not sweet—that have a top crust but no bottom crust. They come in meal-sized portions and are delivered hot. That they are delivered only in a three-mile radius around the Barcroft Plaza shopping center in Northern Virginia is a shame for people who live elsewhere.

The pies are lovely to look at and outstandingly tasty to eat. They tend to be highly seasoned and generously portioned. The chicken pie contains huge chunks of tender chicken breast in a creamy sauce. The shepherd's pie—whose mashed-potato crust makes it a maverick in the group—is full of ground lamb, carrots, and corn suspended in an excellent stew-like sauce.

Pies on the Run has recently opened a storefront operation that handles walk-in customers as well as telephone callers. This is indicative of the seriousness of Pies on the Run: Owner Linda Ambrus closed down the business during the weeks of transition to a storefront operation because she was afraid quality would fall off during the move. Since the November 1 reopening the old customers have come back, Ambrus says.

Prices? Not bad at all. A lunch-box special that includes an individual pie (your choice; portions are very generous), a good tossed salad, and a large homemade cookie costs \$5.95. A two-person version of the same idea is \$11.85. Pie-only prices are \$4.85 for one, \$8.95 for a two-person pie, and \$16.95 for a four-person version.

What does a Psychology major from Swarthmore College with an M.B.A. from Carnegie-Melon choose to be her vocation? If you guessed owning and operating one of the most promising catering-take-out restaurants in Fairfax County, you're correct. Linda Ambrus, proprietor of Pies On The Run, winner of this year's Small Business Product of the Year Award, worked for several years pursuing psychology and business separately before she found a happy medium as the owner and creative force behind one of the hottest meal tickets in Fairfax County.

After working with autistic and MBD children for a few years upon receiving her B.S. in Psychology, Linda moved towards more business-oriented pursuits, helping a friend start a small business of which she eventually became the general

manager. The chemistry between Linda and business became obvious, so she headed back to school to get her M.B.A. After working for a Fortune 500 company for several years in Strategic Planning, Linda decided it was time to finally do it on her own and set out to find a need in the community that warranted a new business.

The need turned out to be something Linda encountered every evening upon coming home from work, too tired to cook but bored with the order-out-pizza-or-Chinese syndrome. Linda figured she was not alone in her desire for high quality, convenient and affordable food that would allow a busy lifestyle without sacrificing a healthy, tasty diet. The challenge was to find a food that would maintain its quality and consistency and that would keep if de-

livery or delay in eating were necessary. Dinner pies seemed like a great solution as they kept well in transit, could be frozen without losing their flavor, and provided a home-cooked meal that was more satisfying than pizza or burgers.

With the help of an associate who had experience in the restaurant industry, Linda rented a kitchen facility that provided the space and equipment necessary to conduct a large-scale experiment. She then surveyed 150 people to determine which dinner pie varieties were most appealing. Next, 100 people selected received three pies to taste and critique. Recipes were adjusted to comments made, a store site was found, and the rest is history.

After being open six months, Pies On The Run had exceeded estimated sales by \$20,000. With eight pie varieties and a menu expanded to include side salads, entree salads, dessert pies and cookies, Pies On The Run is fast becoming a solution all of Fairfax County is turning to for their dining needs.

Linda Ambrus has been eager to show her gratitude by establishing a firm commitment to the community. Just two months after opening, Pies On The Run donated 200 pies to Martha's Table to help feed the hungry and homeless. Pies On The Run is also active in working with schools for learning disabled children and other volunteer organizations, employing children to distribute flyers for marketing projects. The Chamber is happy to acknowledge Pies On The Run as the deserved recipient of the Small Business Product of the Year Award for 1990. ■

Enterprising woman finds success in world of fast food is easy as pie

Entrepreneurs have a hunger. But Linda Ambrus was hungry.

"I got so tired of pizza or Chinese," said the former paper company executive. "I was getting home so late that those were my only take-out choices."

A restless appetite combined with the desire to build a business of her own inspired Ms. Ambrus to start Pies on the Run, a saucy carry-out and delivery operation with two Northern Virginia locations.

The Falls Church and Arlington shops cater to busy offices and households with such fare as chicken, turkey, vegetable and seafood pies. The shepherd's pie of lamb and curry is a best seller, and the pie of the month can be anything from spinach Florentine to this month's tangy beef.

Ms. Ambrus' pies are generously spiced and stuffed with large chunks of meat. Although her pies have acquired the gourmet label, Ms. Ambrus prefers to think of them as nutritious. The Virginia chapter of the American Heart Association has certified half the menu with its "heart healthy choices" designation.

But with two-thirds of all food delivered, the emphasis is on convenience.

In 1990, just seven months after the first store opened, the Fairfax Chamber of Commerce gave Pies on the Run its "Small Business Product of the Year" award.

The company delivered 700 boxed dinners to the Inaugural Committee headquarters in January, but the backbone of the business is nearby office workers who can't get out for meals. The dinner

brus, as she used to be: wiped-out white collars grabbing a hot meal for themselves and their families after a hard day.

"I knew I wanted to open my own business instead of running somebody else's," said Ms. Ambrus, sipping an Orangina after the lunch rush one recent afternoon. The Buffalo, N.Y., native was a strategic planner at the Hammermill Paper Company in Springfield when the entrepreneur's obsession gripped her.

ing in on me — even though I really wasn't that high up," she grimaced.

Ms. Ambrus, who holds an MBA from Carnegie-Mellon University and never considered herself a cook, knew that a carry-home food was the product to sell. After a year of researching eating, working and health trends, poring over industry analyses, talking to chefs and tinkering with recipes, she decided savory pies were the perfect convenience food.

"I needed to find a food that could be delivered and survive," she said, "and these are better than pizza."

Advantages include a dense filling that won't easily slosh, and a crust that holds in the heat. They can be reheated — conventional ovens do better than microwaves.

After four humbling months in a rented test kitchen in 1989, Ms. Ambrus, 36, created recipes good enough to test-market by delivering to 100 randomly selected people. Her friend, a market researcher, designed the questionnaire and selected the recipients.

"Pies have versatility and identity," she said, sitting at a steel work table in the delivery-staging area in the back of the Falls Church shop, in the Barcroft Plaza strip mall.

Opened in November 1989, the 1,500-square-foot storefront turns out crusts, fillings and salads for both carry-out stores. A second, 1,000-square-foot shop opened in December in Arlington's Ballston Commons neighborhood. It has a counter with eight seats.

Pies on the Run employs 12 full-time workers and 40 part timers. It relies on a small handful of suppliers for its ingredients. An average weekly shopping list includes 250 pounds of chicken, 600 pounds each of carrots and chopped onions, and 1,000 pounds of flour, with provisions arriving daily.

After settling on a product, Ms. Ambrus raised \$250,000 in start-up

capital from friends and colleagues. An additional \$100,000 in fr-

venture capitalists she met at networking organizations like the Entrepreneurial Inc. in Columbus, Ohio, and the Baltimore Washington Venture Group. Last year, the Small Business Association loaned her \$200,000 for the second store, bringing the total investment to just over a half-million dollars.

Ms. Ambrus chose her location because they were middle-class and residential. The Ballston store has strong draw from area businesses market the entrepreneur said she hadn't thought about until officially started requesting pies.

To cater better to office eating habits, Ms. Ambrus added a pair of breakfast pies, heavy on the eggs, the Ballston menu.

Although the business plan has been true and the company is meeting revenue expectations — she expects total sales to top a million dollars in 1993 — the entrepreneur admits she hasn't kept to her timetable.

"The goal isn't to hit the black, but to grow as quickly as makes sense," she said. "This was always meant to be a chain." Or a national franchise.

In the longer term, she said, "My goal in 10 years is to be a \$100 million company."

**Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women in this country- exceeding auto accidents, rapes and muggings combined.*

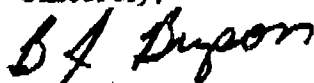
**According to the American Medical Association, 22 to 35 % of women who visit emergency rooms are there for injuries related to on-going abuse.*

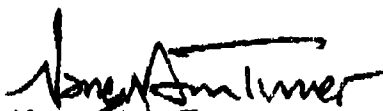

Every 15 seconds a woman is battered in the United States by her husband, boyfriend, or live-in partner.

Recent findings by the Surgeon General reveal that domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women between ages 15 to 44, more common than automobile accidents, muggings and cancer deaths combined.

Other research has found that half of all women will experience some form of violence from their partners during marriage, and that more than one-third are battered repeatedly every year.

Although official estimates of domestic violence rely largely on FBI, police and emergency medical room reports, in fact, many women also report domestic violence to friends, family, relatives, churches, synagogues, physicians and nurses. These sources of information are not included in national crime surveys. In addition, most reports do not show the number of violent incidents experienced by individual battered women and their children. Hence, statistics do not accurately reflect the amount of violence experienced in intimate relationships and in the home.

However, what the statistics do reveal about domestic violence is alarming. For example:

28. There are at least 4 million reported incidents of domestic violence against women every year. Almost 20 % of these are aggravated assaults in the home. (Angela Browne, Senate Judiciary Committee Hearings, December 1990)

29. Women are six times more likely than men to be victims of violent crime in intimate relationships. In 1991, more than 90 women were murdered every week. Nine out of ten were murdered by men (Senate Judiciary Committee Report, *Violence Against Women: A Week In The Life of America*, October 1992)

30. Weapons are used in 30 % of domestic violence incidents. (P. Claus & M. Ranc, *Special Report: Family Violence*, Bureau of Justice Statistics, undated)

31. 15 to 25 % of pregnant women are battered. (Evan Stark & Anne Flitcraft, 1992)

32. In 95 % of all domestic violence assaults, crimes are committed by men against women. (*Report to the Nation On Crime and Justice*, Bureau of Justice Statistics, 1983)

33. 22 to 35 % of women who visit medical emergency rooms are there for injuries related to on-going abuse. (*Journal of American Medical Association*, 1990)

34. Medical expenses from domestic violence total at least \$3 to \$5 billion annually. Businesses forfeit another \$100 million in lost wages, sick leave, absenteeism and non-productivity. (*Domestic Violence For Health Care Providers*, 3rd Edition, Colorado Domestic Violence Coalition, 1991)

35. Abusive husbands and lovers harass 74 % of employed battered women at work, either in person or over the telephone (Caroline Wolf Hallow, *Female Victims of Crime*, Bureau of Justice Statistics, 1991), causing 20 % to lose their jobs. (Schechter & Gray, *A Framework For Understanding and Empowering Battered Women*, 1988).

36. More than 53 % of male abusers beat their children. (Lenore Walker, 1984)

37. As violence against women becomes more severe and more frequent in the home, children experience a 300% increase in physical violence by the male batterer. (M. Strauss and R. Gelles, *Physical Violence in American Families*, 1990)

38. Approximately 1 out of every 25 elderly persons is victimized annually (Candace Heister, *Journal of Elder Abuse and Neglect*, 1991). Of those who experience domestic elder abuse, 37% are neglected and 26% are physically abused. Of those who perpetrate domestic elder abuse, 40% are the adult children of the abused person. (National Aging Resource Center on Elder Abuse, 1990)

39. In 1990, California passed the first anti-stalking law, making stalking a crime. In 1992, 28 states added similar laws. They are Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Kansas, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Nebraska, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

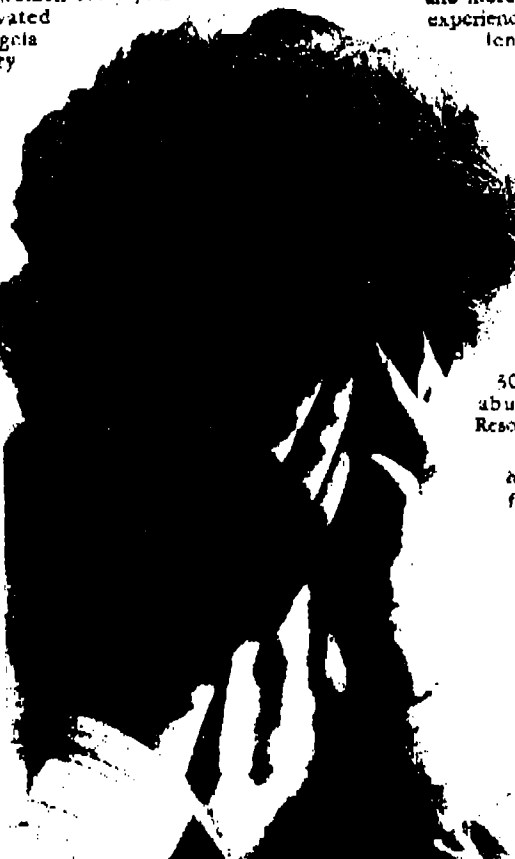

Domestic Violence is Under Reported...

1. Until recently, few states collected enough information to indicate how many crimes reported to the police were committed against women and how many were committed against men. Crimes reported as aggravated assault by husband against wife were not distinguished from crimes reported as aggravated assault by unknown assailant. (Domestic Crimes in the U.S. Survey, Senate Judiciary Committee, 1991)

2. In 1991, only 17 states kept data on reported domestic violence offenses. These reports were limited to murder, rape, robbery, and serious bodily injury and no other forms of domestic violence. (Senate Judiciary Committee Report, October 1992)

3. Injuries that battered women receive are at least as serious as injuries suffered in 90 % of violent felony crimes, yet under state laws, they are almost always classified as misdemeanors. (Joan Zorza, *The Gender Bias Committee's Domestic Violence Study*, 1989)

4. In nearly 31 of the states, under many circumstances, it is legal for a husband to rape his wife (National Clearinghouse on Marital and Date Rape, 1993). In one study, 37% of the women who had been physically battered by their husbands were also raped by the husbands. (Diana E. Russell, *Rape in Marriage*, Revised Ed., 1990)

5. Although more than one million women seek medical treatment each year for injuries caused by their husbands, ex-husbands or boyfriends, doctors correctly identify the injuries as resulting from battering only 4 % of the time. (E. Stark & A. Plotnick, *Medical Therapy as Repression. The Case of the Battered Woman*, 1982)

Why Don't Batterers Leave?

This is the more appropriate question, yet many people ask why battered women stay or don't get help. The facts are:

1. Although divorced and separated women compose only 7 % of the population in the United States, they account for 75 % of all battered women and report being battered 14 times as often as women still living with their partners. (Patsy Klaus & Michael Rand, *Special Report: Family Violence*, Bureau of Justice, 1992)

2. Women who leave their batterers are at a 75 % greater risk of being killed by the batterer than those who stay. (Barbara Hart, 1988)

3. Currently, there are 2,000 battered women in America who are serving prison time for defending their lives against their batterers (Stacey Kabot, Remarks from presentation at Harvard School of Public Health, June 1991). FBI statistics indicate that women convicted for killing their male partners are frequently sentenced to longer prison terms than are men. (Angela Browne, *When Battered Women Kill*, 1987).

4. Up to 50 % of all homeless women and children in this country are fleeing domestic violence. (Elizabeth Schneider, *Legal Reform Efforts For Battered Women*,

1990). Yet, there are nearly three times as many animal shelters in the United States as there are shelters for battered women. (Senate Judiciary Committee Hearings, 1990).

5. After being sheltered, 31 % of abused women in New York City returned to their batterers primarily because they could not locate longer-term housing. (Dwyer & Tully, 1989)

6. Violent fathers use school records or the presence of children at school to track down the mothers. (Lee Ann Hloff, *Battered Women As Survivors*, 1990).

7. Abusers keep or destroy documentation like birth certificates and immunization records, thus preventing or seriously delaying the family's receiving welfare benefits or housing assistance. (Peter Jaffe, David Wolfe & Susan Kaye Wilson, *Children of Battered Women*, 1990)

8. In the first year after a divorce, a woman's standard of living drops by 73 % while a man's improves by an average of 42 %. (Action Notes, 1989)

RESEARCH AND STATISTICS

(Adapted from *Family Violence Revisited: Attitudes and Obstacles to the Battered Women's Movement*, ADAMS, LARSEN, DOBASH, DOBASH, Douglas, Fine, Jackson, Kula & Lauby.)

Research and statistics about domestic violence have aided the efforts of the battered women's movement and have been used by policymakers, social service agencies and funders to support these efforts. However, the battered women's movement has worked hard to expose common myths about domestic violence, myths which were frequently reinforced by the methodology and theories adopted by social science researchers.

A feminist based analysis of battering leads one to ask different questions about violence against women, shifting from a focus on the "pathology" of individuals or families to the particular social policies, norms and practices which tolerate woman abuse. Since research findings and statistics are used by those who influence these social policies, norms and laws, it is crucial to understand the methodology and ideology which influences the ways in which research is conducted and used. It is also important to remember that many incidents of domestic violence go unreported, even in academic studies, due to the battered woman's fear, shame, or lack of knowledge that domestic violence is a crime. A critical analysis of this research must include: a careful review of how battering is defined; whether the social context of abuse is understood; whether intent and effects of violent behavior are taken into account; who was included in the study; whether credible sources are used for support; and what conclusions are drawn from the data. Without such a critical analysis, findings can be misleading and result in ineffective social policy which does not address the social and individual needs of battered women and their children.

This fact sheet was compiled by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCADV). We are a private, non-profit membership organization committed to empowering battered women. 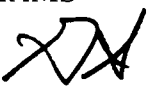

SUMMARY

I strongly urge that the First Lady participate in CalBioSummit '93, a conference being held in San Diego on October 22nd. I attach a copy of the invitation to the First Lady from Ann Ryder Randolph and the conference program.

As the invitation notes, the meeting will be attended by more than 1,000 leaders of California's healthcare and biomedical industries and will be covered by the national media. I believe the summit would be an excellent forum for the First Lady to address leaders of the cutting-edge biotechnology and medical-devices industries in the crucial state of California, as well as industry leaders at large through the media.

DISCUSSION

The biotechnology industry has been extraordinarily vocal in its support of this Administration on the economic plan and on NAFTA. Many in the industry are very concerned, however, about what health care reform holds for them. Regardless of the facts of the plan, uncertainty about the Administration's intentions in the area of price controls has had an adverse impact on the financial health of the biotechnology industry and a concomitant adverse impact on their political support for the Administration.

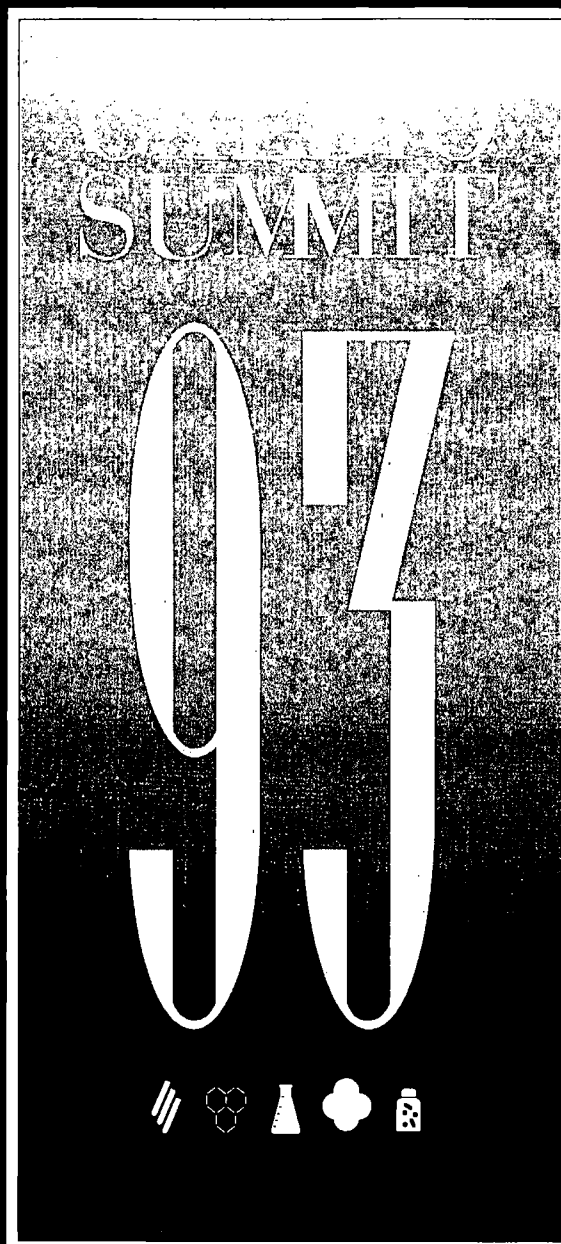

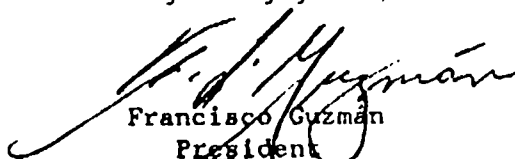

The following enclosed documents are self explanatory. The primary physician involved, Dr. Milne J. Ongley, is scheduled to be sentenced this Friday, the 26th of February, 1993, in Santa Fe, New Mexico. The presiding judge is the honorable Judge Bruce E. Kaufman. Not only those of us who have embraced alternative health care, but also thousands of other Fellow Americans are outraged by this obvious miscarriage of justice. This persecution of a visiting teacher/physician is un-American.

I have taken the liberty of contacting you as the spokesperson for those of us who have indentified the injustice of the limited health care modalities currently available to Americans, most of which are costly and oftentimes ineffective. While the nation's cost of medical care escalates, this and other physicians worldwide present us scientifically proven methods which are less costly and more effective, yet they are ignored by the mainstream medical societies of the United States. Mrs. Clinton, I appeal to you to intervene and fully inquire into the circumstances surrounding Dr. Ongley's conviction. A precedent such as this conviction must not be allowed to stand. Without the free exchange of knowledge between professionals, progress in any scientific field will come to a halt.

UNDER FIRE

The American Medical Establishment's Assault On Alternative Medicine

by David Houser

THE OPPRESSION OF PROGRESSIVE MEDICINE IN SANTA FE

Brace yourself. The story about to unfold exposes the very worst side of human nature. This is the story of how greed for money has created a torture chamber of pain for countless thousands of Americans. People in desperate need of help, who instead find themselves victims of an endeavor designed to prolong their suffering, while draining their bank accounts. The guilty parties in this conspiracy include the health insurance industry, pharmaceutical industry and the established "medical-industrial complex." Together they are bankrupting our families, our businesses and our federal budget. For a clear insight into exactly how this is happening, we will examine a revolutionary breakthrough in effective treatment of chronic low back pain, and how two M.D.s find themselves being prosecuted for this work instead of being honored as they deserve.

THE ONGLEY SOLUTION

The July 18, 1987 issue of **THE LANCET**, one of the most well respected medical journals in the world, documents a medical breakthrough achieved by Dr. Milne J. Ongley. These medical studies were conducted at the Sansum Medical Research Foundation in Santa Barbara, California. The article's summary states, "Eighty one patients with chronic low back pain were randomized to two treatment groups. Forty received an empirically devised regimen of forceful spinal manipulation and injections of a dextrose-glycerine-phenol ("proliferant") solution into soft-tissue structures, as part of a program to decrease pain and disability. The other 41 patients received parallel treatment in which the main differences were less extensive initial local anaesthesia and manipulation, and substitution of saline for proliferant. When assessed by disability scores the experimental group had far greater improvement than the control group. At six months an improvement of more than 50% was recorded in 35 of the experimental group versus 16 of the control group, and the numbers free from disability were 15 and 4 respectively." Eighty eight per cent of the patients treated with the Ongley solution were free of pain at the end of the observation period. They had been in chronic pain for 10 years or more before entering the study.

OUTMODED ESTABLISHED PROCEDURE

Let's compare the value of Ongley's solution to the established procedure in terms of dollars and sense. It is estimated that pain is responsible for up to 70% of all doctor visits. Back pain alone is a 200 billion dollar a year industry in the United States. Now let's examine how that money is spent. Suppose you are suffering with a bad back. You are directed to an orthopaedic surgeon for x-rays, and surgery is scheduled. After surgery you are enrolled in a six month program of physical therapy, which has never been proven to bring relief. This is probably followed by a series of cortisone shots which can provide pain relief for up to a couple weeks, but with possible side effects including weakening of the ligaments, tissue deterioration, infection, weight gain, cataracts, bone loss and others. Eventually you realize that the pain is not going to go away. It is therefore "chronic." Finally, psychiatric care may be recommended. After the bills are tallied, chronic back pain costs patient and society an average of \$120,000 per case, including loss of wages.

Eighty eight per cent of the patients treated with the Ongley solution were free of pain at the end of the observation period. They had been in chronic pain for 10 years or more before entering the study.

The medical establishment has a problem with the use of "THE ONGLEY SOLUTION"; it would make many orthopaedic surgeries unnecessary. Many orthopaedic surgeons would be put out of business.

In comparison, Dr. Ongley's treatment costs a patient under \$2,000, or 1/60th the current average cost. More importantly, it is also the only treatment for chronic low back pain that has been proven in a double blind study. If "THE ONGLEY SOLUTION" were accepted and used by the medical establishment, the 200 billion dollars that Americans now pay out each year would be cut by 196.7 billion dollars, not to mention the relief of human suffering. Over 1 million injections using the Ongley solution have been given with no documented lasting side effects.

The medical establishment has a problem with the use of "THE ONGLEY SOLUTION"; it would make many orthopaedic surgeries unnecessary. Many orthopaedic surgeons would be put out of business. Rather than embracing the truth and getting on with progress, they have chosen to perpetuate pain and suffering at an exorbitant cost.

PROGRESS SUPPRESSED

This is by no means an isolated incident. The AMA has a long history of suppressing progress in order to keep the status quo intact. To fight Dr. Ongley and other progressive practitioners like him, the AMA formed a task force called the National Council Against Health Fraud. The purpose of this "task force" is to eliminate alternative medicine in the United States.

The task force has been indicted and found guilty of anti-trust law violations. The AMA transferred responsibility for financial support of the National Council Against Health Fraud to the pharmaceutical industry, which supports them at this time. Although rich and powerful, these institutions can be fought in a court of law. In 1992 the AMA was found guilty of forming a conspiracy against chiropractic medicine and was forced to pay \$80 million for their illegal efforts to destroy chiropractics. The courts are the American people's only chance against this plot. If justice is not upheld in the court of law, sooner or later, all of us will become victims.

In 1992 the assault on alternative medicine entered our judicial system in Santa Fe. Dr. Ongley has been found guilty of practicing medicine without a license. At his sentencing, which is scheduled for January 21, 1993 he faces up to 18 months in prison. Since Santa Fe is recognized worldwide as a center for leaders in the alternative medicine movement, Dr. Ongley's case has enormous ramifications for all forms of alternative medicine throughout the United States.

DOLLARS AND SENSE

After THE LANCET published his discovery in 1987 the heat was turned up on Dr. Ongley. Two separate assassination attempts were made against Dr. Ongley. The Sansum Medical Research Foundation which tested Ongley's solution under scientific conditions and performed the study which was published in THE LANCET, found itself being persecuted as well. The California Attorney General threatened to force withdrawal of financial grants unless either: 1) They discontinued Ongley's proliferant therapy or 2) The physicians involved in the study agreed not to support Ongley in his legal battles.

In another act of persecution it is believed that undercover agents recruited the former Olympic gold medalist, Dwight Stone, to set Ongley up on a malpractice charge. After Stone's career was for all practical purposes already over, he came to be treated by Dr. Ongley. Witnesses saw him improve after treatment, yet Stone testified against Ongley. Could it be that a bribe was accepted? The case was settled out of court. Was this due to pressure from the malpractice insurer based on the fact that it would be easier to settle outside of court due to Dwight Stone's popularity?

There is a long trail of persecution following Dr. Ongley's remarkable career. Yet all of the efforts brought by the State of California to charge him as a felon have been unsuccessful. In a desperate attempt to entrap Ongley, California authorities alerted the New Mexico Board of Medical Examiners that Dr. Ongley would be attending an international medical seminar hosted on behalf of the American Academy of Neural Therapy, by Dr. Dietrich Klinghardt, M.D., in Santa Fe on May 4-5, 1991.

In the 1950's Milne J. Ongley was tutored by James Cyrtax, M.D., Honorary Consultant Physician in Orthopaedic Medicine, St. Thomas Hospital, London. Dr. Cyrtax is the author of Textbook of Orthopaedic Medicine - Treatment by Manipulation, Massage, and Injection, first published in 1914 and now in its 30th edition, as well as six other books on the subject.

After Medical School in Ireland, Dr. Ongley practiced in England, New Zealand and Australia. In 1969 he went to California and taught Orthopaedic Medicine under the supervision of a California M.D. for one year, as a pre-requisite to becoming a licensed physician in the United States. The second requirement was to pass the Flex Exam where a score of 65 and above is the passing score. Dr. Ongley sat for the exam three times receiving a score of 64.5 each time. Dr. Ongley claims the test scores were tampered with. However, Dr. Ongley remained active at the Institute of Orthopaedic Medicine in both teaching and treating patients for another 20 years - under a provision of the California law, which allows those qualified to practice under the supervision of a California licensed M.D. Dr. Ongley worked under both Bjorn Fek, M.D., Orthopedic Surgeon and Dr. Lou Schlom, D.O.

STING OPERATION-THE PERSECUTION CONTINUES

New Mexico Attorney General, Tom Udall, mounted a sting operation at the seminar by recruiting a retired doctor, Randall W. Briggs, to attend the seminar "undercover." He took Janis Rutschman, an investigator from the Attorney General's office with him who represented herself as a medical assistant. She carried a tape recorder in her purse.

Prior to the seminar, Dr. Klinghardt contacted the Board of Medical Examiners of New Mexico to inquire regarding the particular regulations that must be followed in order to conduct such a seminar. He was informed that The Board did not regulate such seminars. It is common knowledge that during such seminars visiting physicians who are not licensed in that particular state may be supervised by the licensed course director to receive and give instructions in the methodology of the procedures being taught at the seminar. In this case such learning and teaching techniques have been construed as the practice of medicine without a license.

JoAnn Levitt, M.D., the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of Medical Examiners of New Mexico, contacted the State Attorney General, Tom Udall, and suggested that technical improprieties might take place at the seminar in question. Dr. Klinghardt was not informed of Dr. Levitt's action. It appears that the Attorney General's strategy was to entrap Ongley and Klinghardt in order to abolish "proliferant therapy." They could have easily stopped the seminar, but instead chose to permit it to take place so they could prosecute later. The undercover agents were "uncovered" at the seminar, but allowed to remain in the teaching facility. Dr. Klinghardt, was confident that no laws were being contravened. Dr. Klinghardt taught the seminar, which included the demonstration and injection techniques. Dr. Ongley was at times asked to demonstrate his particular technique and was on several occasions asked to share his scientific knowledge regarding orthopaedic medicine.

At a later date Dr. Klinghardt, and Dr. Ongley were arrested. Dr. Ongley was charged with practicing medicine without a license; Dr. Klinghardt was charged with aiding and abetting an unlicensed physician by teaching at the Santa Fe seminar. A trial by jury was held concerning this charge against Dr. Ongley. The State's position was that Dr. Ongley did not, at the time of the seminar, possess a valid medical license in the state of New Mexico.

The Defense argued that there was no intent to practice medicine and "in fact" the practice of medicine did not occur, because the sole purpose of the seminar was educational. The State based its case on the fact that because injections were given, "medicine" had been "practiced". The fact that these were merely salt-water demonstration injections given in the context of teaching was considered by the State to be irrelevant. The State ruled that Dr. Ongley had engaged in the practice of medicine without a license.

The jury agreed with the State, and Dr. Ongley was found guilty. He is currently facing up to 18 months in prison. It is difficult to believe that these jurors were randomly selected, as several of them are related (cousins, wives, etc.) to government and law enforcement officials. All jurors who in the past had any positive experience with "alternative medicine" or had experiences with "mainstream medicine" were dismissed. In addition to this, there were three separate incidents representing grounds for a mistrial. Judge Kaufman found his way to dismiss all of them. Is Judge Kaufman just another puppet on Udall's string?

It should be noted how unfairly the trial was covered in the press. One headline read "\$25,000 Cash Bond Set on Fake Doctor". It appears that Attorney General Udall may have instructed the press on how the trial would be covered. The Albuquerque Journal, The New Mexican, and the Santa Fe Reporter have not adequately investigated and reported in this case. Several jurors admitted reading the newspapers and conferring about these articles with other jurors during the trial.

During the trial, Barbara Mulvaney, prosecutor for the Attorney General, continuously insinuated that Ongley was really a "criminal" with a "dark past", slowly convincing the jury of his guilt. Judge Kaufman did not once reprimand her. However, when Don Cron, Dr. Ongley's attorney, came close to indicating that there may be a positive, different side to the story, Judge Kaufman had one of his well known and much feared temper tantrums. The effect was that everything that appeared in any

During Dr. Ongley's early years in California he had established an outstanding reputation and was sought after by Olympic medalists and sports teams for treatment. In spite of continued harassment from the California Board of Medical Examiners, Dr. Ongley helped to build a thriving practice. Dr. Ongley's teaching is recognized throughout the world as one of the most important breakthroughs in the treatment of chronic pain. Numerous articles and medical textbooks have been published on his method.

In January 1991, at a New Mexico Board of Medical Examiners meeting, Secretary-Treasurer JoAnn Levitt stated, "this is the year we will get Klinghardt's license".

way negative about Dr. Ongley's past was permitted to be brought up in front of the jury and anything positive was not permitted. Dr. Ongley's role in the seminar was that of a teacher. Teaching is covered under the 1st Amendment. A freedom of speech issue is therefore protected and not in need of a license. Judge Kaufman dismissed this appeal stating that his court is not a forum on constitutional issues.

The Medical Practice Act, 61-6-17, (which Dr. Ongley supposedly has violated), approved by the legislature April 3, 1991, one month before the seminar, reads:

"The Medical Practice Act shall *not* apply to or affect, a properly trained... technician... performing under the physician's direct supervision *any* medical act." (In this case Dr. Ongley's performance under Dr. Klinghardt's supervision.)

In other words, any person, with or without medical training, whom the doctor trains, can do anything—including injections—under the doctor's supervision. However, if a person who happens to be a physician with 45 years of medical experience and the recognized world expert on Proliferant Therapy, who is currently licensed to practice medicine in England, does the same section of the Medical Practice Act not apply?

After Dr. Ongley's conviction, State prosecutor Mulvaney said the State will proceed with the prosecution of Dr. Dietrich Klinghardt who faces a felony count of being an accessory to the practice of medicine without a license and, if convicted, also faces up to 18 months in prison.

CHRONIC PAIN SUFFERERS LOSE TO THE SYSTEM

Several of Dr. Klinghardt's patients had already been victims of the medical establishment's conspiracy. Typically it works like this in Santa Fe: If a worker is injured, the Worker's Compensation agent funnels the patient directly to a pawn of the insurance industry like Dr. W. K. Jones or one of the physicians at the Center for Occupational Medicine. After a five minute, several hundred dollar, superficial exam where the patient is often never physically touched, the patient is typically sent to the Santa Fe Imaging Center¹ where preliminary tests are done, such as x-rays and MRI scans, at a cost of \$1,500 or more. The patient is put through physical therapy which may be ineffective, cortisone shots, orthopaedic surgery, perpetuating chronic pain at great financial expense—in effect transforming patients into victims.

Dr. Jones then testifies against his patient so he/she gets the lowest possible insurance settlement, i.e. enough to pay all of Dr. Jones' medical bills and nothing more to compensate for the patient's personal hardships such as loss of income, etc. The expenses to the Worker's Compensation Program are kept at a minimum, a steady flow of patients to Dr. Jones and others of his type is assured, and so is their income. The patient's quality of life is compromised. It's easy to see why surgeons are major stockholders of most health insurance companies.

DR. KLINGHARDT PERSECUTED

Dr. Klinghardt's trouble began when he testified on behalf of his patients who had been victims of this conspiracy—an act of courage which is unprecedented in New Mexico courts. Dr. Klinghardt's testimonies forced in some cases payments of up to \$500,000 from the fraudulent insurance companies.

The health insurance companies retaliated by instigating an FBI investigation into Dr. Klinghardt's past, with the sole intent to remove his license to practice medicine. No evidence was found and the investigation was dropped. Next, the Immigration and Naturalization Service began an investigation, but also dropped it after no evidence of wrongdoing was found.

In 1986 Dr. Klinghardt opened his medical practice in Santa Fe where he quickly built a thriving practice, attracting chronic pain patients from all over the country. In 1988 he went to California to be treated by Dr. Ongley with Proliferant Therapy for neck injuries suffered in an automobile accident, and subsequently Dr. Klinghardt received training in this method.

We all have a responsibility to face the truth here. The ethical and moral crimes that perpetuate a conspiracy designed to keep people suffering in pain, while simultaneously milking their last pennies and whatever dignity they may have left, demand that we not turn our heads the other way.

In 1989, Dr. Klinghardt published an article entitled "Bee Venom Therapy for Chronic Pain" from which a treatment for muscular dystrophy was created in France. Here in the United States, it caught the attention of the National Council Against Health Fraud. Two months later Dr. Klinghardt's office was broken into and the "Bee Venom Research" files were stolen.

In early 1990 Dr. Klinghardt was nominated as the honorary chairman for the "Symposium on Pain Control Without Drugs" in Madrid, Spain. Over 5,000 participated, giving Dr. Klinghardt international recognition. In June 1990, Dr. Klinghardt founded the American Academy of Neural Therapy in Santa Fe. Its purpose was to promote safe nontoxic treatment of pain. The Academy conducted workshops and courses on the subject. In December 1990, the files with the names of all course participants were stolen from his office. Since that time over 30% of course participants have been harassed by the Internal Revenue Service.

In January 1991, at a New Mexico Board of Medical Examiners meeting, Secretary-Treasurer Jo Ann Levitt stated, "this is the year we will get Klinghardt's license". Was this a self-proclaimed prophecy or proof of a planned conspiracy? You decide.

In February 1991, Dr. Klinghardt mailed through the Santa Fe Post Office 2,000 fliers to promote his upcoming seminar in May. Mysteriously, none of the fliers reached their destination. On May 6, 1991, the day after Attorney General Udall's sting operation of the May seminar, six agents searched Dr. Klinghardt's office without a search warrant. The agents confiscated patient records and rare medical textbooks, and video taped his medical equipment. A warrant was produced several hours after the illegal search. On May 7, 1991, the patients whose records had been stolen threatened to sue the State for invasion of privacy and the records were returned.

On May 8, 1991, in order to find out whether his office was bugged, Dr. Klinghardt staged a trick conversation implying he was "bringing his medical equipment into storage." That night his storage locker was broken into and some useless, outdated medical equipment was destroyed. Apparently agents had bugged his office. In August 1992, Dr. Klinghardt was hit with a devastating IRS audit.

On December 10, 1992, Dr. Ongley was unjustly convicted of a completely erroneous charge. In January 1993, Dr. Klinghardt faces the prospect of the same ordeal. If this is allowed, the ramifications are enormous and far reaching. In particular:

- No new knowledge will be permitted to be demonstrated in the State of New Mexico via the medium of medical teaching seminars similar to this one, using "hands-on" teaching workshops.
- The position of the State of New Mexico will be fully advertised so that all physicians will be informed that this state has broken with current established medical teaching methods and will prosecute any and all physicians who would dare to come to this state to participate in any similar teaching seminar.
- This ruling by the State of New Mexico will serve notice to all that a precedent now exists for the state to control the previous freedom of expression of medical knowledge and how it is taught and what is being taught. Until now, medical seminars and accompanying demonstrations have been considered, throughout the United States, as a free speech activity and had been protected by the First Amendment.

The State of New Mexico must formulate and publish the rules and regulations pertaining to the conduct of all medical seminars that may be held within the State of New Mexico. At this time no such body of information exists. In the courts in this state, the words persecute and prosecute seem to be one and the same. Outside of how these court decisions affect the health and well being of New Mexicans, they establish a precedent for other states to follow.

On an even broader scale, we all have a responsibility to face the truth here. The ethical and moral crimes that perpetuate a conspiracy designed to keep people suffering in pain, while simultaneously milking their last pennies and whatever dignity they may have left, demand that we not turn our heads the other way.

Each coin has two sides and the other side of this one is the opportunity to expose and thereby dismantle this plot. The timing is right for this to take place. We have a president-elect who understands that health care costs are ruining this country and has promised to take on the health care insurance industry. He is only one man. He needs the American people to back him. The time is NOW. The opportunity is yours.

N.M. Hostile to Alternative Medicine

I am a member of a group who is interested in promoting the latest modalities in health treatments.

I recognize a conspiracy when I see one! Having observed over

7 years the attempts by the medical establishment to prevent the citizens of this country and our state from access to new and better methods of the treatment of dis-

by parties considering alternative treatments, it is easy to see that the case of Dr. Ongley here in Santa Fe is yet one more attempt to persecute an M.D. who has some new ideas.

Here we have a State Medical Board conspiring with the Office of the Attorney General, who in turn is conspiring with the California authorities to engage in the nefarious practice of a "sting" operation to catch a group of medical profes-

s who is exchanging views and medical techniques at a legal teaching, medical/workshop. A workshop that is a standard procedure all over the country.

The workshop had been organized by Dr. D. Klinghardt, a licensed physician, after he had made correct inquiries to the Medical Board.

He received no reply.

The "sting" agents were unmasked by Dr. Klinghardt and were allowed to remain because Dr. Klinghardt had no reason to believe there was any illegal procedure at the seminar. The law allows such seminars. Because New Mexico was behind the times, the Legislature approved the law on April 3, 1991, one month before the seminar. It clearly allows teaching seminars for anyone, provided the seminar is led by a licensed medical doctor, which Dr. Klinghardt clearly is.

The "sting" agents lied about their identity until Dr. Klinghardt unmasked them. It is illegal for anyone to "conspire — threaten, or intimidate any citizen in the free exercise — of any right or privilege secured to him by the Constitution, etc." U.S.C. Title 18, Sec. 241. This, however, does not matter to the attorney general.

At the time of the prosecution, Dr. Ongley was under a temporary restraining order from California. Since legal authorities could not agree whether a temporary restraining order is binding in New Mexico and since Judge Bruce Kaufman ruled that a civil matter in California has no bearing on a criminal matter in this state, why was the excuse of accusing Dr. Ongley breaking the temporary restraining order from California made at all?

In spite of the judge's ruling,

Assistant Attorney General Barbara Mulvaney brought the matter before the court. The judge restrained her from going into details. This intentionally harmed the defendant, because the jury was not allowed the truth. The jury was left with hints of "dark and dangerous" deeds. Mulvaney's persistence in disobeying the court should have been grounds for an immediate mistrial, and she should have been cited for contempt of court.

One of the witnesses claiming to be an "expert" gave testimony damaging to the defendant, then later admitted he was not an "expert!" The trial should have ended there and then.

The conspiracy continues. Since the current law in New Mexico allows visiting physicians, whether licensed or not in the state, to perform under the guidance of a New Mexico licensed physician, no law was broken.

Since this was a teaching workshop, no medical treatment was given. No money exchanged hands; none was asked for or received. This was a legal medical, teaching workshop.

Did Dr. Ongley, a licensed M.D. in four countries of the world, respected and recognized for his skills and experience in his field, come deliberately to New Mexico to break the law? Or did he come to share his experience and knowledge with other physicians and to

advance the practice of medicine for the benefit of us in our state? How outrageous to deny the people new knowledge! Perhaps we should ask, "why this persecution?" It happened before. Like many others who try new ideas, Dr. Ongley is a threat to the conventional medical practitioners. It hits their pockets.

Without doubt all citizens concerned with improving their health should take notice. I am particularly concerned that our courts seem to have strayed so far from fair play and justice. At stake is the very foundation on which our legal system was founded. We must take notice. It is not just the letter of the law which counts but the spirit. Dr. Ongley did no harm; there was no danger to any of the participants.

It is time for clemency and it is within the power of Judge Kaufman to give this. After all, if certain men in high positions, convicted of serious crimes against the U.S. can be pardoned, why cannot Dr. Ongley, who has harmed no one and not broken any law, receive clemency? This must be done, or else the people of New Mexico can forget justice, especially when it comes to the persecution of alternative medical practitioners. A misled jury has found Dr. Ongley guilty. A wise judge can give clemency.

I am a Special Investigator for the State Bar of CA. However, I am writing you as a private citizen on behalf of Milne J. Ongley.

The primary goal of the State Bar of CA is to protect the public from willful misconduct by attorneys licensed to practice in the State of CA. I have obtained more public discipline and resignations of attorneys than any other investigator in the history of the State Bar. I routinely deal directly with all levels of various prosecutorial or investigative agencies and the judiciary. I fully understand and support the concepts of the protection of the public, vigorous prosecution, and most importantly, fairness and justice.

I have known Milne J. Ongley for over eleven years. I first met him in 1981 while he was employed as a licensed medical assistant to Bjorn Eek, M.D. Dr. Eek was and still is an orthopaedic surgeon licensed in the State of CA.

I had been referred by another physician to Dr. Eek for treatment of numerous serious injuries I had suffered in an accident. I had been previously examined and treated unsuccessfully by several orthopaedic surgeons and a neurologists. Dr. Eek was both then and now using medical techniques and procedures Mr. Ongley developed while practicing as a licensed physician in several countries other than the United States.

When I first met Dr. Eek and Mr. Ongley, I asked Mr. Ongley if he was a medical doctor. He told me that he was not licensed in the United States but he had been licensed and practiced in several other countries. I also met with four other California licensed medical doctors who were and are still using the techniques developed by Mr. Ongley.

I received treatment and injections into my knees, back, neck, and shoulders by Dr. Eek or Mr. Ongley. Dr. Eek at all times directly supervised Mr. Ongley. The solution injected was composed of glycerin, phenol, dextrose, and sterile water. The solution is sometimes referred to as the "Ongley solution".

The goal of the injections were to heal and strengthen the injured joints and ligaments. As a result of those injections I was

symptom free in one year and able to avoid previously recommended radical knee surgery. I suffered no adverse effects from the injections.

Eventually I referred three friends suffering from back injuries to Dr. Eek. All of them had been treated unsuccessfully by other licensed physicians. Dr. Eek treated them with Mr. Ongley's assistance. All of my friends were cured of their symptoms and suffered no ill effects from the treatment.

In 1986 I suffered severe injuries in a head-on auto crash. I was again injected with the "Ongley solution". Again, within a year I was symptom free and suffered no ill effects from the injections.

During the course of my treatment and in the following years I became good friends with Mr. Ongley, Dr. Eek and numerous other California licensed physicians, including, Louis Schlom. Most of these physicians use the techniques developed by Mr. Ongley. The few who do not, refer many of their patients for treatment to physicians who do use the techniques.

Sometime in 1989 I had a conversation with Dr. Schlom. He mentioned to me that another licensed medical doctor had offered to video tape, as a teaching vehicle, an injection procedure for strengthening and healing injured neck ligaments. The video taping could only be scheduled for a certain time. None of Dr. Schlom's patients who were candidates for the procedure were available for the video taping.

Consequently, I volunteered to act as the patient and receive the treatment. I did this for several reasons. I had previously received the treatment for a neck injury. As a result of the treatment my neck injury had been cured. I knew the treatment would not harm me, and it would further strengthen my neck ligaments. I was very appreciative of the medical services previously provided to me by Dr. Eek and Dr. Schlom, both of whom used injection techniques previously developed by Mr. Ongley. I wanted to contribute to the teaching of the procedure.

Subsequently, we did video tape the procedure being performed upon me. I understand the court has viewed the tape.

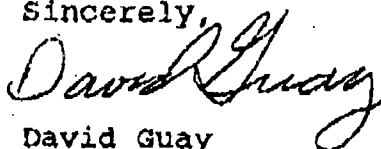
In the eleven years I have known Mr. Ongley I have found him to be a gifted physician, teacher, and a person of the highest integrity and moral character, both personally and professionally. Every person who I know, who also knows Mr. Ongley, shares my opinion of him.

In determining the sentence for Mr. Ongley I respectfully ask the Court to consider the following: Mr. Ongley is an internationally known and published physician who has devoted over thirty five years to the furtherance of orthopaedic medicine. 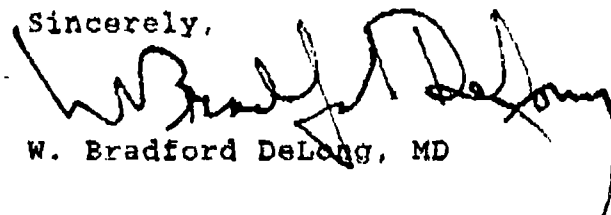

The purpose of this letter is to relate to you my personal experience with Dr. Ongley, but the first question I ask myself when I receive a recommendation on a person is: "Who is the recommender, and how knowledgeable and valuable is his opinion?" For that reason only, I will briefly identify myself to you.

I am eighty-three years old, and nine nine years ago, I retired as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Associates Corporation of North America, which is headquartered in Dallas, Texas. This company had over 10,000 employees and over 1,000 branches worldwide. Also, I was listed in Who's Who in America for the last twenty years of my business activities.

I am an active outdoors person, and one of my strong hobbies is tennis--I play six or eight sets each week. About nine years ago, my left knee began to give me trouble which got progressively worse, until I was faced with the necessity of giving up tennis. I went to see my good local doctor and personal friend, Dr. Ben Fowler, who was an orthopedic surgeon, and at that time, he was President of the Orthopedic Division of the American Medical Association. Dr. Fowler X-rayed my knee and made a complete examination. His report stuck in my memory, for he said, "Your problem is that you have a seventy-five-year-old knee, and there's nothing we can do about that."

I was determined to find some treatment that would help me and put me back on the tennis court, if such was possible. I put my American Branch Managers in a search for an outstanding knee doctor, and one of them reported to me some good results that had been produced by a local doctor named Ongley. I was frightened by the possibility of ending up in the hands of a quack, so I communicated with Dr. Ongley and asked him for a list of recent patients whom he had treated. I became interested enough after communicating and getting favorable reports from all these patients, to where I made a trip to his office. I was still suspicious, for I was sure that if the doctor had only a 50% success ration, he would only give me the names of the successful patients. I talked to Dr. Ongley very frankly, and he told me that he could not completely cure my knee but that he could give me probably 75% relief and put me back on the tennis court. I then asked for the privilege of sitting in his office and visiting with the patients who came in to see him, so I could get a true cross-section of his results, rather than a list selected by him. I then spent a day and a half sitting in his office, visiting with the patients waiting to see him, during

which time I talked extensively to eighteen or twenty of his patients. Actually, I was amazed at the highly enthusiastic reports I received from each of the patients interviewed. In the middle of the second morning of interviews, I decided to go ahead and let Dr. Ongley treat my knee.

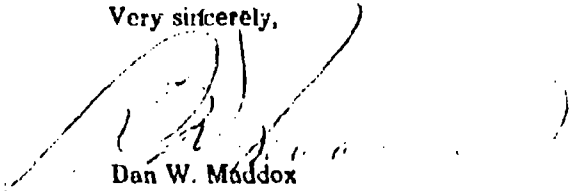
Dr. Ongley made some injections into my knee and gave me some instructions on an exercise program to follow, and I ended up making six consecutive weekly visits to Dr. Ongley. The net result of his treatment was a substantial recovery of my left knee to a normal function. As a result, I have enjoyed a continuation of my tennis playing, and in fact, my wife and I played three sets of doubles last night with a couple who are friends of ours.

Incidentally, my fifty-year-old wife had a shoulder problem that was giving her a great deal of trouble when I was being treated by Dr. Ongley, and she decided to have him look at her shoulder. She too had her problem treated by Dr. Ongley, so I am asking her to write a separate letter to you covering her experiences with Dr. Ongley.

Over my long lifetime, I have dealt with quite a number of doctors, and I have never had one who was more frank and honest to tell me what he could and could not do for me than Dr. Ongley. As a result, I trust him completely, and I would accept without question any medical advice he gave me.

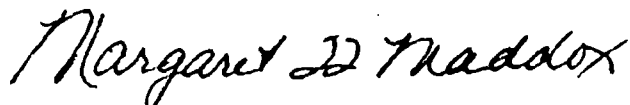
Some nine years ago, when I was in my early thirties, I experienced a malfunction of my left shoulder to the point where I could not raise my left arm above eye level. Being right-handed, this problem did not incapacitate me too severely, but I frequently experienced intense pain in my shoulder when I would turn over during the night which would wake me up.

Re: Dr. Milne Ongley

I have personally written you a letter on January 6th, advising you of my very satisfactory results with Dr. Ongley's treatment of my left knee.

In this letter, I advised you that I was aware of the various state medical boards' hostility towards Dr. Ongley, and I invited you to phone me collect so that I might give you this unpleasant information. Since that time, I have checked more fully into this whole situation, and what I have found makes it obvious to me that the various state medical boards are off-base and pursuing an improper vendetta. I have discussed this matter fully with my friend Ned McWherter, Governor of the State of Tennessee, who discussed this matter with his friend, New Mexico's Governor Bruce King. He suggested that I write you directly and give you the following information.

After my and my wife's most satisfactory results with treatment from Dr. Ongley, over the next two years, I sent eight of my friends to him for treatment of various back and joint problems, and all of them were happy with the results of their treatment. As a result of this, I became interested in trying to bring Dr. Ongley to Nashville to live and practice--all that was needed to permit him to be licensed in Tennessee, was to lower the Flex Examination grade requirement by a minor amount (one-tenth of a point for every year out of school). My wife and I along with the other eight friends who had been treated by Dr. Ongley appeared before the Tennessee legislators and told them of our most satisfactory experience with Dr. Ongley, and the Tennessee Legislature approved the proposed bill that would have permitted Dr. Ongley to be licensed to practice medicine in Tennessee.

When the Tennessee legislature passed this bill, the California State Medical Board immediately instigated an indictment of Dr. Ongley for practicing medicine without a license in California. I knew that the California State Medical Board, working through the office of the Attorney General, could not

make these charges stick. On each and every occasion that I received treatment from Dr. Ongley, it was under the direct supervision of a California licensed orthopedic surgeon. Dr. Ongley would have it no other way.

As I knew would be the case, Dr. Ongley prevailed in each of the cases brought in California, but it took several years for him to do so. This completely destroyed the plan to move him to Tennessee.

I have tried to get the Tennessee State Medical Board located in Nashville to make an investigation into Dr. Ongley's treatment. This treatment is badly needed, particularly by the aged, and I have offered to pay a reasonable cost of the investigation, but they don't even want to discuss this. I frankly don't understand why the various state medical boards are so determined to not accept a low-cost solution to many of the major aches and pains suffered by so many people, particularly the aged.

To bring you completely up-to-date, Dr. Ongley now practices in Mexico. He does not have a licensing problem. For those who are suffering, to journey to Mexico due to pain can be impossible--

costs are greatly increased, and it is very inconvenient. Why must a United States citizen travel to another country to receive the treatment of his choice which is also the best treatment for his particular condition?

I would like to remind you of the facts of the situation that occurred in New Mexico when Dr. Ongley demonstrated at an internationally advertised medical workshop/seminar. Dr. Ongley was not the only unlicensed physician demonstrating at this particular medical workshop/seminar; yet, Dr. Ongley was the only visiting physician who was charged with a crime. No patients were treated; no money was charged for the demonstration. Dr. Ongley paid his own way to the seminar, and he received no fee whatsoever. This can hardly be construed as practicing medicine, when all he was doing was teaching. A single instance does not constitute practicing, which by dictionary definition means over and over. After the international seminar, Dr. Ongley returned to his home. He did not canvas any patients, but merely participated with other physicians in a seminar which is the accepted method of teaching medicine throughout the United States of America.

The above facts would indicate that Dr. Ongley has been convicted of a crime which obviously he did not commit. Under your current law, no crime was committed. He did not go to New Mexico to practice medicine without a license; he went to this seminar/workshop, as did other visiting physicians for the free exchange of medical knowledge.

Judge Kaufman, your allowing this conviction to stand will give a stamp of approval to other state medical boards in future similar instances. For medical education to continue, legal, fully advertised medical seminars and workshops in the State of New Mexico must be encouraged. This will be consistent with your most recently enacted law which brings New Mexico up to the recognized medical standards of the other states.

Judge Kaufman, punishing an innocent 70-year-old man with incarceration will merely deprive those who require and deserve his services. Thank you very much for your time and consideration.

Dear Mr. Jordan:

You will surely recall my correspondence of 6 December 1992 written to you in your capacity as Co-Chairperson of the Clinton-Gore Transition Team, requesting a meeting with then President-Elect William Jefferson Clinton on behalf of the Coalition of Ethiopian Political Opposition Parties and Organizations in the U.S.

Perhaps you will even recall that you were kind enough to respond to my request in your letter of 2 January 1993, confirming your recommendation that the meeting be included in the President-elect's schedule, and that you had forwarded the request to the Scheduling Office.

Since that time, my Administrative Assistant has made at least 15 telephone calls to seven different persons in the Transition Office, your law office, and the White House. In addition, four packets of the entire correspondence on this subject-matter request have been forwarded to various high-level Administration executives. Accordingly, it is not without a little dismay, frustration and indeed some embarrassment that I now find myself imposing upon your time as a private citizen to again request your good offices intervention to assist me in my ongoing efforts to confirm your aforementioned recommended appointment. I am hopeful that such a meeting might be scheduled hopefully with the President himself, as originally requested, but at least with Secretary of State Warren Christopher, and/or indeed my old professional friend and colleague, Assistant Secretary of State Clifford Wharton, who was (during his tenure as Chancellor of the State University of New York) an ardent supporter of my Foundation's African-American History Month official programmes and my many appearances as the Founder of Black History Month in the SUNY system.

This appeal to you is particularly prompted by the mounting frustration of the Ethiopian political opposition parties which as you may be aware, launched a well-attended Rally at the Senate Park in Washington, D.C. this past Friday, 5 February. The speakers denounced the failed policies of the Bush Administration and expressed their anticipation of a "change" in U.S. foreign

policy towards Ethiopia by our new Administration. Their fervour, frustration and anger has been heightened by wire service reports of mounting repression in Ethiopia, exacerbated by public statements in Addis Ababa allegedly made by the U.S. Ambassador, (which I quote), "What's all the fuss about?...It's only Amharas who are killed. They are anti-Oromo... And they are no better than our niggers".

Therefore, I am even more of the opinion now than I was at my first letter to you of 6 December 1992 that the group of highly educated, accomplished, cultivated and politically astute representatives of all the various Ethiopian political opposition factions in the U.S. can make a valuable contribution to the mass of information which I'm sure you will agree should be factored into our government's policy-making processes. In addition, such an exchange would provide the Ethiopian political opposition an experience in that kind of free and open discourse that we regard as normal in a Democracy and which as you know is not a normalcy in Ethiopia under the present Transitional Government. The U.S.-installed Transitional Government has obviously been attempting to consolidate its power by replacing its transitional status with a permanent one, sustained by that form of Cold War ethnic balkanization and repression, which elsewhere in the world has proven to be a regressive, not progressive problem-solving mechanism.

In this regard, Mr. Jordan, can you imagine how far those nine counties in the State of Kansas (which have more recently declared an intent to secede to form a new state of West Kansas) will get in their ill-conceived problem-solving "nightmare" to bring about economic parity with the rest of the State of Kansas? Indeed, how far could those Black apostles of neo-segregation get in seeking solutions to the problems of racialism (which had surfaced to gargantuan proportions during the Civil Rights era), who argued for the creation of several all-Black populated states in the South? And how far could the otherwise magnificent figure of Marcus Garvey have gotten in the earlier part of the century in his efforts to solve the problems of racialism in our country by his "Back to Africa" movement? If any one or all three of those movements had succeeded, such a success would have also been noted by history as the failure of our democracy to consolidate its inexorable drive to the creation of a truly multi-ethnic/multi-cultural and unified American society.

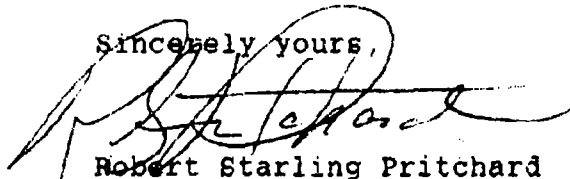
If the Bush Administration's support of those same dynamics in Ethiopia are to be validated by our new Administration... and quite frankly I could not even imagine that could happen... then future generations of Free World societies are destined both to preside over and to be formidably affected by world economic and political upheavals which would issue from such foreign policy supports for the balkanization of the whole continent of Africa along ethnic and tribal lines.

Mr. Jordan, the Ethiopian political opposition parties ask only to be heard in a high-level American forum where history has taught them that all points of view to any given issue always have an equal opportunity to be presented. Accordingly, I trust that you will agree with me that their request for an opportunity to brief our Administration on points of view that until now have not been heard is a reasonable one (and which has already garnered your support). I would therefore hope that you might once again assist me in immediately confirming a date for such a meeting ... particularly given the Scheduling Office's assertion to my Administrative Assistant that such a meeting would be scheduled soon after 1 February 1993.

Needless to say, your assistance in this matter would be most gratefully appreciated, not only by me, but by the men and women of the Ethiopian political opposition parties.

Dear President-Elect Clinton:

I have the honour to submit for your consideration the enclosed draft Proclamation for the 1-28 February 1993 Centenary Celebration of the Evolution (1893-1993) of African-American History Month.

On the occasion of the launching of this special Centenary Year Observance, our Foundation-sponsored African-American History Month (State and Regional) Founder's Commissions have the honour to invite you, Mr. President-Elect, to issue the nation's first A-AHM Centenary Proclamation of 1993. The enclosed draft-Proclamation calls upon all Americans to join with American citizens of African descent in celebrating the Cultural Diversity of America to which African-Americans have so splendidly contributed.

As former Governor of Arkansas, you may be aware that for 27 years our Foundation has issued Black History Month (renamed African-American History Month in 1989) Proclamations to Governors of all fifty states and to Mayors of countless numbers of cities, towns and villages with significant African-American populations.

As you will note from the thematic content of the draft-Proclamation provided by our Foundation, we have for three decades taken a national leadership role in placing the Observance in a multi-cultural, as well as an international context. This service has attracted widespread commendation from Governors and Mayors. No less enthusiastic is the pride our Board of Directors and members of the A-AHM State and Regional Founder's Commissions have experienced in contributing to the development of a Holistic Observance dear to African-Americans which has been as catholically received as other such Observances of Ethnic America as St. Patrick's Day, Columbus Day, The Oktoberfest, et. al.

Should this Draft Proclamation meet with your approval (subject to any alterations you may consider appropriate), we would appreciate your response to this request at your earliest convenience in order that we may recommend an appropriate venue and guests for a brief Proclamation Ceremony.

Assuming your interest in implementing this Proposal, and in the hope that you would not regard the following recommendations as presumptuous, we would suggest a Proclamation Ceremony guest list that includes the leadership of the three major organizations identified with the evolution of African-American History Month:

1. The National Association of Coloured Women's Clubs [still existing with over 35,000 members (mostly educators) and Chapters in 38 States], a successor to the Coloured Women's League of which the late Mrs. Josephine Bruce, wife of Reconstruction Senator Blanche K. Bruce of Mississippi, who was an Incorporator who introduced the first "Negro History Observance" Resolution in the early 1890's to an assemblage of leading Black women of the day;

2. The National Council of Negro Women which was one of the progenitors of the National Association of Coloured Women's Clubs, and to whom Dr. Pritchard contributed indefatigable efforts towards the organization's successful fundraising effort to erect the Mary McLeod Bethune Sculpture Monument which stands in Washington, D.C.'s Lincoln Park.

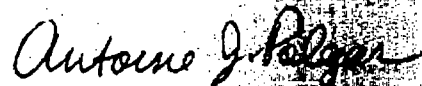
3. The Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History (with National Headquarters in Washington, D.C.) founded in 1915 as the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History by the late Dr. Carter G. Woodson, founder of Negro History Week;

4. The African-American History Month Founder's Commission, presided over by Dr. Robert Starling Pritchard, Founder of Black History Month and National Chairman of the Commission, whose parent organization, the Panamerican-Panafrican Association is headquartered in a 23-room English Tudor Estate in the suburbs of Syracuse, N.Y.

5. In addition, representatives of the Houston-based organization, "Juneteenth, U.S.A.," founded by Texas State Representative, the Hon. Al Edwards (author of the Bill designating Juneteenth as an official Texas State Holiday) support the A-AHM Founder's Commission in the organization of the forthcoming Centenary Observance of the Evolution of A-AHM.

African-American History Month Draft Proclamation

1993 African-American History Month Centenary Celebration Theme:
"Love of Country; Kith and Kin Cultural Affinity"

WHEREAS, FEBRUARY 1993 MARKS THE CENTENARY CELEBRATION OF THE EVOLUTION OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH from the 1893 Coloured American Day Observance (variously referred to as Negro Day, Jubilee Day and Negro Jubilee Day) officially proclaimed at the Chicago Columbian Exposition (World's Fair), presided over by *Frederick Douglass* (1817-1895), Commissioner of the Haitian Government Pavilion, Abolitionist, Orator, Publisher and one of the first African-American Diplomats (U.S. Minister to Haiti, 1889-1891); supported by the Negro History Observance Resolution presented to an assemblage of leading Black women of the day by *Mrs. Josephine Bruce* (1877-1923), "Feminist" wife of Reconstruction-era U.S. Senator from Mississippi, *Blanche K. Bruce*; through the founding in 1926 of Negro History Week by *Dr. Carter G. Woodson* (1875-1950), Scholar, Howard University Professor, Founder of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, and Father of Black History as a scholarly discipline; to the Black History Month Observance, founded in February 1969 by Concert Pianist/Composer *Robert Starling Pritchard* (as the American Festival of Negro Arts month-long precursor to the Premier Festival Mondial des Arts Nègres [First World Festival of Negro Arts], Dakar, Senegal, 1966), renamed African-American History Month at Lincoln University, PA, 1989; and

WHEREAS, The annual observance of African-American History Month, is an occasion for Americans of African descent to reaffirm their patriotic ties to the United States, their cultural ties with the people of Africa and with their kith and kin throughout the Lands of the African Diaspora; and

WHEREAS, All citizens of the diverse ethnic and cultural communities of the United States are invited to acknowledge and celebrate the vital individual and institutional contributions of African-Americans to the economic, political, cultural, scientific, educational and religious life of the nation; and

WHEREAS, The members of the African-American History Month (State and Regional) Founder's Commissions urge all Americans to participate in appropriate A-AHM Centenary Observances in their communities from that same holistic American perspective afforded such other official and unofficial Observances of Ethnic America as St. Patrick's Day, Columbus Day and The Oktoberfest; and

WHEREAS, The A-AHM Founder's Commission will continue to prompt national private and official-sector consciousness-raising efforts in support of popular strivings for democratic government and the flourishing of free market economies particularly in Ethiopia, Somalia and the Sudan through hands-across-the-sea programmes to alleviate human suffering at the hands of famine, drought, religious and ethnic discord and despotism; and

WHEREAS, The African-American Community reaffirms its support of political, economic and social equality in South Africa, and calls upon all Americans to support the rest of

racial equality in South Africa, and calls upon all Americans to support the goal of majority rule in a democratic South Africa; and

WHEREAS,

Americans of African descent support our country's new Administration's Agenda for "Change" in all sectors of American life that all Americans might enjoy equal access to equal opportunity,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, _____, do hereby proclaim the month of February 1993 as

AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

in the United States of America and call upon all our citizens to join me in recognizing the contributions of Americans of African descent to the evolution and greatness of the United States.

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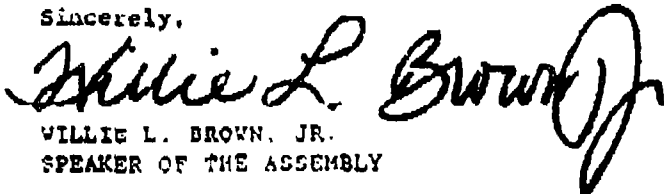
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
