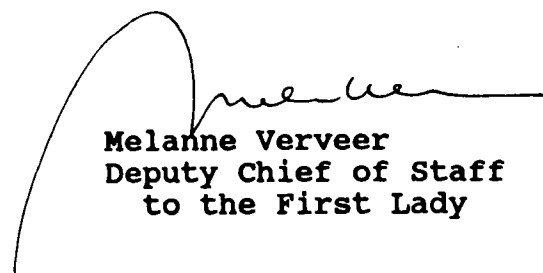

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

I was elated to hear on a TV interview in the past couple of weeks, that a conference on Human Services and the Needs of the Nations Children is being planned for the spring. Please consider me as a delegate to that conference and allow me to share with you why I see it as invaluable.

I am a retired high school math teacher, guidance counselor, and Drug Free Schools Coordinator, and am currently Executive Director of Children's Services for Gallia County, Ohio. I have spent 35 years of my life working for and with children and have found this latest venture to be a most rewarding and challenging one.

As an Executive Director, I understand that my three main responsibilities are personnel, finance, and public relations; however, I really want to make a difference in the lives of children, and am not in any way satisfied with the status quo.

I realize I am relatively new in this job capacity, but I also know that I have knowledge now from 'both sides of the fence' - looking at children's services from the outside and now seeing it from a different view. I also feel very strongly that too often those who take part in national conferences are district and state offices who are not in the trenches like we in a very rural area. My county for example has a 'kid population' of approximately 3266 (1990 statistics) with 28.5% of children age 1-17 years old living in poverty (State of Ohio 1994 statistics). This I believe, is above both the state and national statistics.

Our small agency personnel {1 Ex. Director, 4 Protective Service, 1 Foster Care/Adoption, 2 Bookkeeping, 1 Case Aid} manage a tremendous case load. In addition, we also operate a Children's Home {1 Coordinator, 1 Caseworker, 8 Residential Care Workers}. This Home may not be cost effective on paper, but to the community it is extremely valuable. In the month of December, 1995 we had 20 children in placement, either our children's home, foster care, therapeutic foster care, or psychiatric hospitalization. All of these operations take place on a budget of less than \$660,000. Our agency is extremely understaffed, underpaid, overworked, but with a tremendous attitude for helping every child and every family that we can.

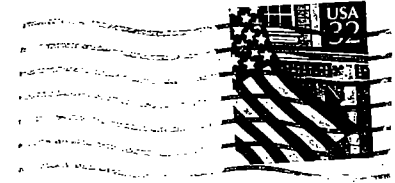

These stories can stand by themselves or be combined into a book as I've done. The ten women who I've chosen to be the subjects of these stories are: Gertrude Jekyll, Rachel Carson, Mary Fairchild, Eleanor Roosevelt, Jane Addams, Patty Berg, Clara Barton, Helen Keller, Maria Louis Sanford and Frances Densmore. Each chapter is 700 to 1,000 words long. Each of the stories takes a parent roughly five to seven minutes to read aloud to their children. A second or third grader will need ten to fifteen minutes to read each story themselves. At the end of each story, is a simple biography about the woman who is the subject of the story, along with their photograph. This part of the story gives an adult and a child a chance to talk a little history. It's a learning opportunity that a parent and child can share together.

For young children to gain a sense of history, they must have some understanding of the concept of change. Children, have a thought process that is dominated by perception. Change is a difficult concept for them to learn. Changes for children must appear as magical and unrelated to logic as any other changes they experience. It is difficult, if not impossible to introduce to a child a factual sequence of changes and event that took place in a past person's life. The stories in this book give a child an introduction to a famous person and what her life's work was on a level they can understand. Fiction can be a valuable tool to getting children interested in history.

When Jane Goodall came to Minneapolis to speak it was covered on TV. Reporters spoke to those who were attending her lecture. The striking thing was how

many fathers and their daughters were there. The fathers told the reporters that they had brought their young daughters to hear a famous woman of science. Ann Richard's, the ex-governor of Texas, told an interviewer that her role model growing up was Wonder Woman. Children, especially girls, should have flesh-and-blood women to choose from for female role models. Largely, growing up female means growing up without famous, larger-than-life females to emulate. The ten women in my book will inspire children to response to restrictions, obstacles and stereotypes. The absence of women whose messages are worth hearing is still lacking when history is introduced to young children. This 'invisibility problem' women have still exist in what is written for children aged 4 to 10.

Great women should get equal time with men right from the start also. Why do girls have to wait to be adults before they find their heroes? The stories I've written are like stories we heard growing up. Those stories we heard then were always about George Washington cutting down the cherry tree or of Abraham Lincoln walking twelve miles to return change. These are still the stories heard first by young children. Famous men are introduced to children as soon as possible. Why aren't women? There's a market out there of parents and teachers who know that children need female role models just as much as male ones. My book is fiction based upon history, that will provide entertainment information and inspiration, if allowed the chance. Your time and patience in reviewing my work is greatly appreciated.

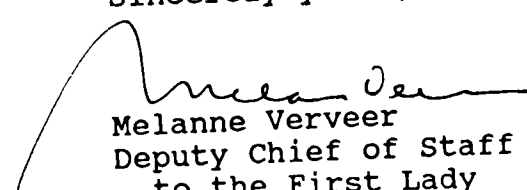

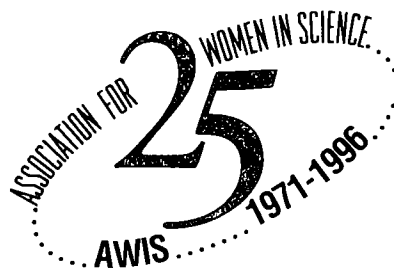

As you may know, AWIS is a 25-year-old, non-profit organization founded in 1971 and dedicated to increasing educational and employment opportunities for both girls and women in all fields of science and engineering. We have over 5,000 members spanning the life and physical sciences, mathematics, social sciences, and engineering. Over 60% of our members have doctorates in their respective fields, and represent all levels of industry, academia, and government. In the last year alone, the number of local AWIS chapters increased by over 25% to a total of 74 chapters nationwide, representing 38 states. Most of our programs are implemented through our local chapters.

Two of the programs we are currently working on that highlight mentoring and leadership for women in the sciences are *The Association for Women in Science Mentoring Project*, funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF), and *Women Scientists in Academia: "Warming Up a Chilly Climate,"* funded by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. The NSF project established community-based mentoring programs at twelve locations nationwide. The Sloan project will develop a model program offering workable options for institutions committed to enhancing the academic climate for women science faculty.

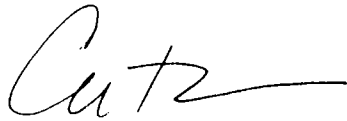
In addition, AWIS has had a great deal of involvement in every phase of the FWCW. Activities included:

- * Contributing to regional and national preparatory meetings.
- * Securing grants for the US Department of Energy and the National Science Foundation to fund AWIS exhibits, to send an AWIS delegation, and to underwrite a post-conference report.
- * Moderating the science and technology caucus in Beijing.

* Co-sponsoring the FWCW Session at the American Association for the Advancement of Science meeting in Baltimore in February, 1996.

I hope we will have the opportunity to work together to increase the retention of women in science and technology and to support women in all aspects of their lives. 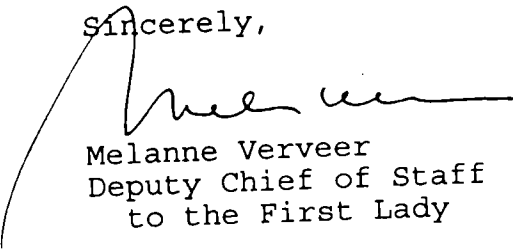

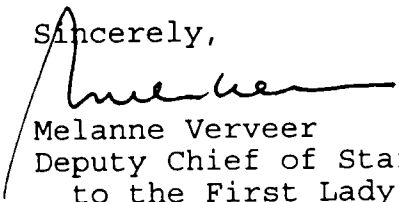

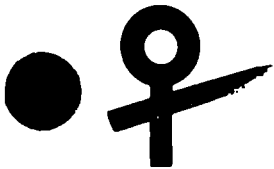

It was a pleasure to talk with you last week regarding the possibility of a visit to the Mi Casa Resource Center for Women by President Clinton. The First Lady's visit in July of 1995 still holds a very special memory with the clients and staff at Mi Casa.

As you know, the mission of Mi Casa is to provide quality employment and education programs that promote economic independence for low-income, predominantly Latina women and youth. One month before President Clinton signed the welfare legislation, Mi Casa celebrated its 20th anniversary of helping women who either want to get off welfare or who no longer want a life of poverty. The women who gave birth to this dream were the very women who wanted a better life: a group of Head Start mothers.

It is because of Mi Casa's history that we know there is an important difference between moving women off welfare and moving them and their children out of poverty. It requires that participants recognize their personal responsibility in moving towards self-sufficiency and that government recognizes the necessity of investing in their education, training and child care.

Dear Dr. Dass,

The First Lady has made us aware of your desire to help Chaldean children in Iraq and asked that we provide you with any relevant information that might be of assistance. I would like to pass on the results of our inquiries on your behalf.

First, Iraq's acceptance of UN Security Resolution 986 will create the opportunity for long-needed relief to reach all of the people of Iraq. The Resolution allows Iraq to sell up to \$2 billion of oil every six months to purchase food, medicine, and other humanitarian supplies. In central and southern Iraq, these goods will be distributed by the existing government rationing system but with UN observers monitoring the process to ensure that supplies are distributed equitably throughout the population and are not diverted by the regime to its cronies. In northern Iraq, distribution of humanitarian goods will be organized and implemented by the UN itself, in conjunction with humanitarian relief organizations already operating in this part of the country. We expect that this carefully-watched and managed program should mean a measurable improvement in the lives of all Iraqis and alleviate the humanitarian tragedy created by Saddam Husayn.

Second, the First Lady indicated that you had asked about delivering humanitarian relief to Chaldeans in Iraq. There is no US law or policy that prohibits such aid deliveries. Indeed, our policy has been to encourage private groups and other Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) to try to provide humanitarian supplies to ordinary Iraqis. However, because of the international sanctions, US laws, and US government policies, humanitarian aid to Iraq must conform to a number of strictures. First, as part of the UN sanctions against Iraq, all air travel to and from Iraq is forbidden. Second, all humanitarian goods shipped to Iraq must meet stringent US regulations designed to ensure that the supplies are delivered to the intended recipients and are not diverted by the regime to its followers. Third, because of the US passport ban on Iraq, US citizens generally are prohibited from traveling to Iraq.

If the Chaldean-American community would like to send humanitarian relief supplies, you will have to apply for an export license through the Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC). If your community is interested in pursuing this option you should contact Steve Pinter of OFAC at (202) 622-2480. We have alerted Steve to your interest in this issue.

Last, the First Lady also told us that you had expressed an interest in bringing sick children out of Iraq. In this case as well, there is no US law or international prohibition that would prevent you from bringing sick children out of Iraq for medical treatment. However, there are, again, certain strictures that must be observed. First, the children would have to be brought out of Iraq by car or truck (or ambulance, if necessary) overland to Jordan or Turkey. Second, US citizens could not go into Iraq to bring them out. Third, the children would have to apply normally for visas for medical treatment in the United States, assuming that this is where the community would propose to treat them.

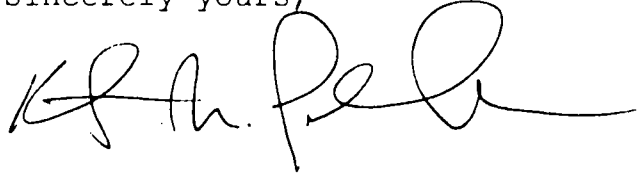
If the Chaldean-American community would like to pursue this initiative, you should begin by contacting Mr. Frank Seaver of the International Committee of the Red Cross at (202) 963-4079. We have spoken with Mr. Seaver about your interest in this matter. Judy Chavchavadze at the State Department's Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration also might be able to provide some useful information. She can be reached at (202) 663-1036. Alternatively, the United Nations Department of Humanitarian Affairs suggested you contact Ms. Noel Berney of the British group Kurdish Life Aid, at (United Kingdom) 44-191-281-2608. Kurdish Life Aid has undertaken similar humanitarian missions in the Kurdish controlled areas of northern Iraq and Ms. Berney may be able to provide you with some guidance or assistance. Likewise, the ICRC suggested that Shep Loman at the US Catholic Conference, (202) 541-3073, may also have information that could be useful on such an initiative.

As a final note, you should be aware that it is possible to obtain a waiver to the passport ban. There are four potential categories of US citizens who may be considered for a waiver. In the case of the Chaldean-American community, you could reasonably expect to fall into the category of humanitarian assistance. If you would like to apply for a waiver to the passport ban either to transport goods into Iraq or to help bring sick children out, should contact the Office of Passport Policy and Advisory Services in the Department of State's Bureau of Consular Affairs. Their telephone number is (202) 955-0231. We have attached the State Department's Consular Information Sheet on Iraq which

contains relevant information regarding travel by American citizens to Iraq.

I hope this information is useful to you and to the members of the Chaldean-American community.

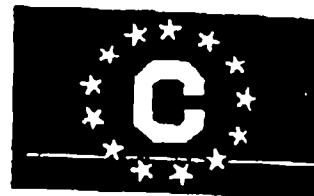

Consular Information Sheet

Iraq

September 15, 1994

Warning: The Department of State warns all U.S. citizens against traveling to Iraq. Conditions within the country remain unsettled and dangerous. The United States does not maintain diplomatic relations with Iraq and cannot provide normal consular protective services to U.S. citizens. U.S. passports are not valid for travel to, in or through Iraq, unless they are specially endorsed by the U.S. Government. There is a U.S. trade embargo which severely restricts financial and economic activities with Iraq, including travel-related transactions.

Country Description: The Republic of Iraq is governed by the repressive Revolutionary Command Council. Iraq has a developing economy that was seriously damaged in the 1991 Gulf War. U.N. trade sanctions have also affected the economy. Islamic ideals and beliefs provide the conservative foundation of the country's customs, laws and practices. Tourist facilities are not widely available. The work week in Iraq is Sunday through Thursday.

Entry Requirements: Passports and visas are required. On February 8, 1991, U.S. passports ceased to be valid for travel to, in or through Iraq and may not be used for that purpose unless a special validation has been obtained. Without the requisite validation, use of a U.S. passport for travel to, in or through Iraq may constitute a violation of 18 U.S.C. 1544, and may be punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. An exemption to the above restriction is granted to Americans residing in Iraq as of February 8, 1991 who continue to reside there and to American professional reporters or journalists on assignment there.

In addition, the Department of the Treasury prohibits all travel-related transactions by U.S. persons intending to visit Iraq, unless specifically licensed by the Office of Foreign Assets Control. The only exceptions to this licensing requirement are for journalistic activity or for U.S. government or United Nations business.

The categories of individuals eligible for consideration for a special passport validation are set forth in 22 C.F.R. 51.74. Passport validation requests for Iraq should be forwarded in writing to the following address:-

The request must be accompanied by supporting documentation according to the category under which validation is sought. Currently, the four categories of persons specified in 22 C.F.R. 51.74 as being eligible for consideration for passport validation are as follows:

[a] Professional reporters: Includes full-time members of the reporting or writing staff of a newspaper, magazine or broadcasting network whose purpose for travel is to gather information about Iraq for dissemination to the general public.

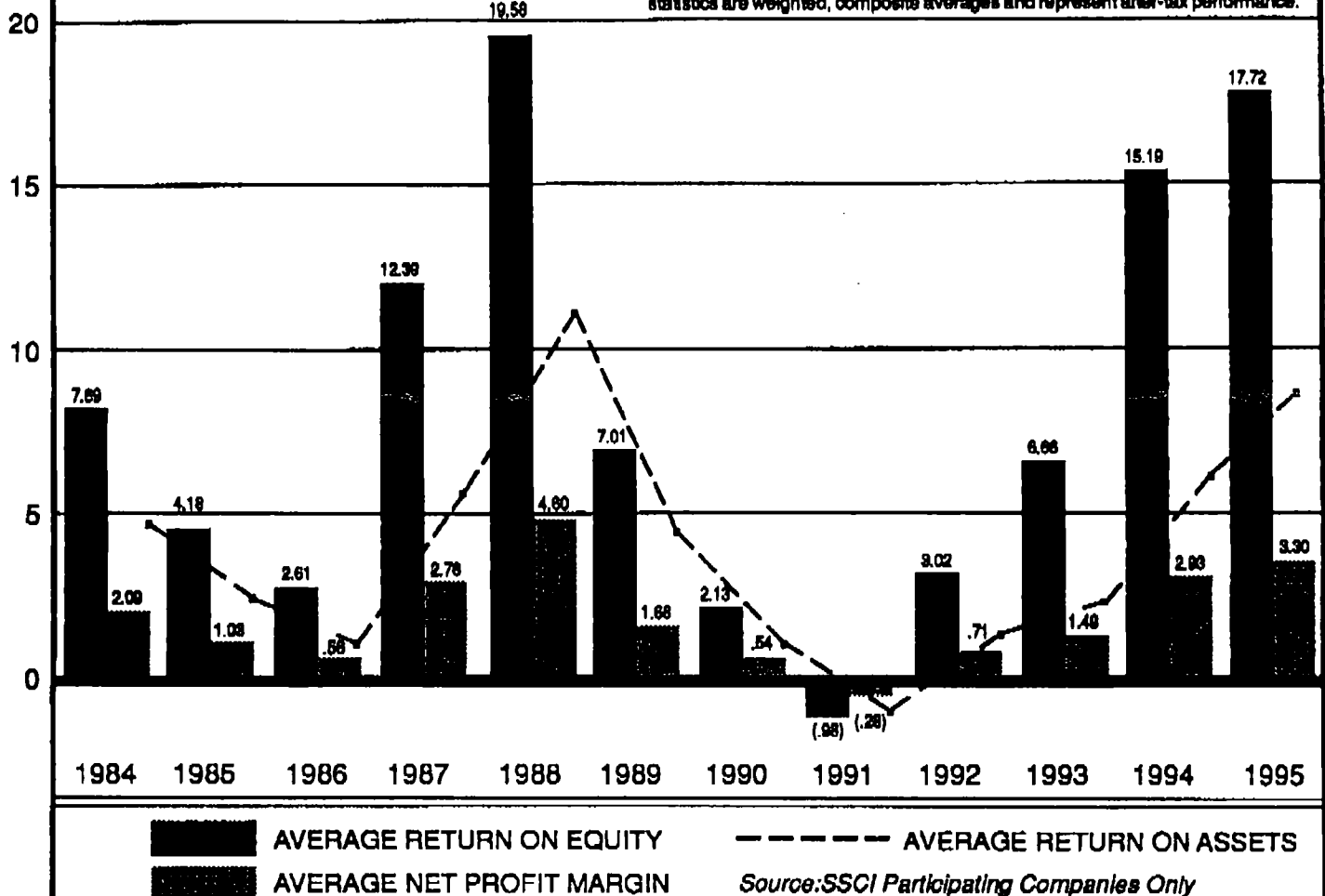

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE OF SERVICE CENTERS



Steel Service Center Institute

NOTE: The statistics for service centers are generated from survey forms submitted by companies who wish to participate. These companies do not form a sample that can be considered to represent the industry statistically. Nevertheless, they have been useful over time to gain some understanding of the industry's performance as it relates to the general economy and other industries. These statistics are weighted, composite averages and represent after-tax performance.



Profitability for the steel service center industry improved in 1995 for the fourth year in a row. The composite average, after tax return on sales (net profit margin) was 3.30%; the return on equity was 17.72; and return on total assets was 8.05%. These returns were achieved on the highest volume of shipments ever recorded for the U.S. industry - 27.1 million tons (est), while Canada shipped 3.4 million tons, the first year Canadian shipments have been tracked.

The industry's real return on equity, derived by subtracting the increase in the consumer price index from the nominal return on equity, was 15.2%, almost equal to the 15.6% registered in 1988, a banner year.

The service center industry is primarily privately held. Only about 10-15% of the companies are publicly held, and some of those are "closely" held. There is, therefore, little incentive to achieve a "high" profit margin. The data also reflect compensation for owners. Nevertheless, these data are useful for analyzing the relative performance of the industry over time.

Financial data cited in this report are from an annual financial survey that, in 1995, included 195 U.S. firms and 21 Canadian firms. Results indicate that for reporting companies, the typical increase in dollars sales over 1994 was more than double the increase in tonnage shipped. This indicates that service centers experienced improvement in both tonnage volume and pricing in 1995.

The low point for the industry in terms of financial performance occurred in 1991, when the industry earned negative returns. Since then, expense control, more than any other factor, has driven the consistent improvement in industry financial performance. While the typical gross margin percentage has improved only slightly over the period (only a two point

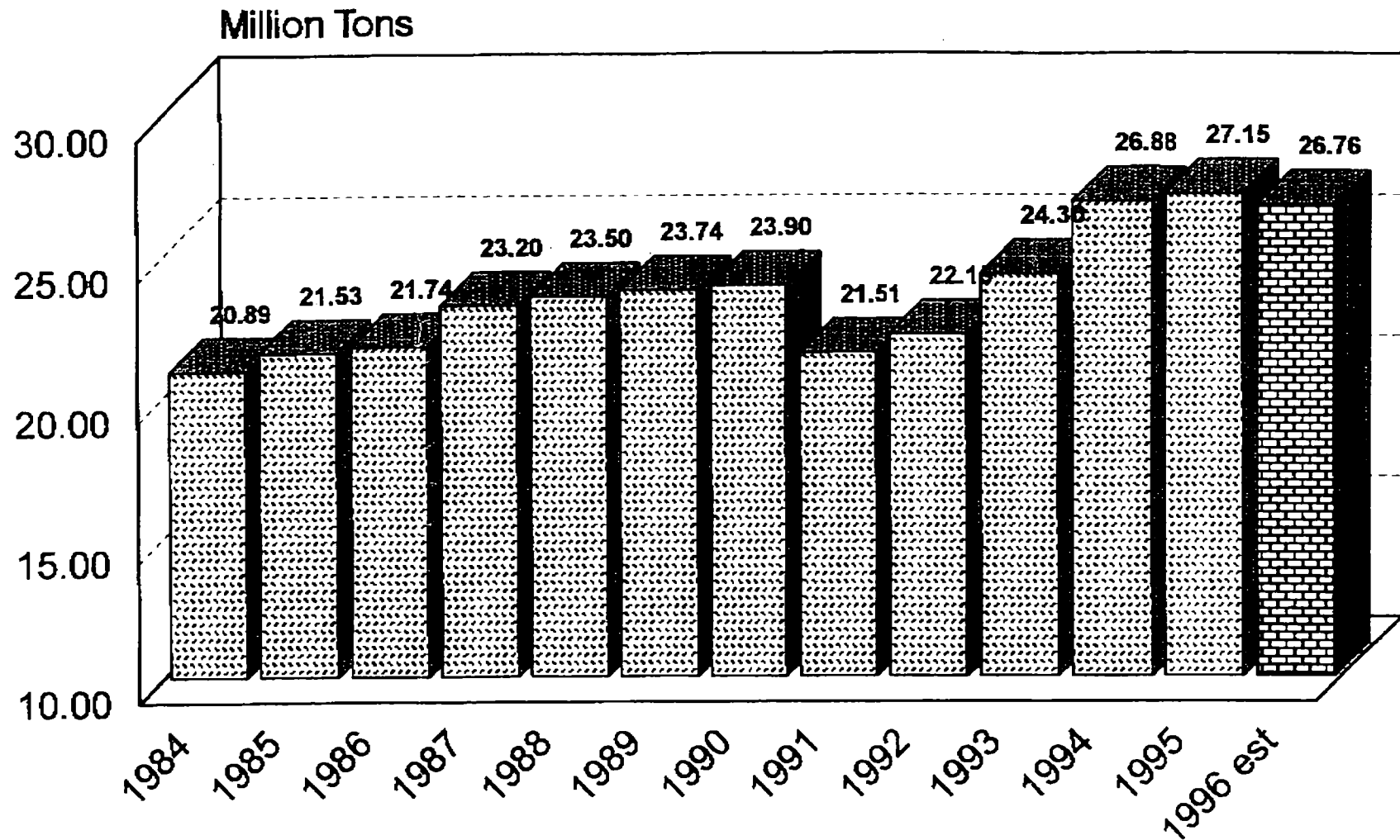
improvement over the four years and a slight decline over the last two), operating expenses as a percent of gross margin have declined from a high of over 90% in 1991 to just over 70% in 1995.

Fundamentals look favorable for continued good performance by the service center industry, though volumes will likely be slightly below the record levels of 1995. The Federal Reserve has achieved its sought after "soft landing," and the economy is predicted to grow 2.5% and 1.9% in the third and fourth quarters of 1996 following first and second quarter growth of 2.3% and 3.1% respectively. Domestic car sales, appliance shipments and housing starts all show double digit year-to-date gains over last year through the first several months of 1996. Total durable goods manufacturing is expected to grow 5.3% in 1996.

The steel industry as a whole has been helped in recent years by an increase in the steel intensity of the U.S. economy (steel consumption per capita) due to the shifting of manufacturing capacity back to the United States following a movement offshore in the 1980s because of the strong U.S. dollar. Additionally, trends in foreign trade have also been favorable. Imports of steel dropped almost 20% in 1995 while exports increased over 85%. This trend has continued into 1996 with imports declining 30% and exports increasing 25% in the first quarter.

While business will remain relatively strong for the service center industry in 1996, volume levels will likely be 2-5% below the record levels of 1995, and there does not appear to be any broad-based increase in price that is likely to drive significant improvements in profitability. Therefore, the steel service center industry is likely to continue to rely on cost reduction and improved asset management to drive improved financial performance.
