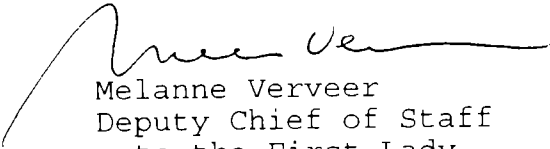

Enclosed please find a copy of our research study, *Caring for Our Children: Labor's Role in Human Services Reform*, by Laura Ginsburg of the Public Employee Department, AFL-CIO and Marcia Calicchia of Cornell University. The report was commissioned by the Annie E. Casey Foundation in response to the foundation's concern that public employees and their unions were not being adequately involved by human services managers and reformers in efforts to improve the system.

Among its findings, the report points out that a major reason public sector unions have not been sufficiently involved in reform efforts is because managers have failed to solicit union participation, or have actively resisted it, despite the fact that it is those union members who are on the frontlines of providing child and family services to America's poor. The authors sought out and found five examples of model public programs where social service unions have been integral to reform efforts, and these are highlighted in the report. The document also examines barriers to union involvement and problems (such as loss of accountability and the higher costs and lower quality of service) that result from efforts to privatize human services. You will also find two examples of guidelines for how to develop cooperative labor-management programs--the Cornell University model and the model for joint labor-management committees developed by the U.S. Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

Based on the findings in this study, the Casey Foundation has awarded a second grant to the PED and the State and Local Government Labor-Management Committee to develop more labor-management partnerships in the field of human services. Work on this project is now underway.

We hope you find the report useful and welcome any comments or questions you may have.

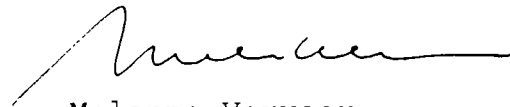

The other day, I ran into a friend who I hadn't seen in a long time. We are both Holy Trinity alumni parents. (My son Jason attended 2nd - 8th grades, 1986 -1991.) During our brief conversation, I told her that I had become very active in special education issues in the District of Columbia. I told her that there are many, many children in the District who are not receiving special education and/or special education services. Of some concerns: from July 1, 1995 - June 31, 1996, there were approximately 760 special education cases heard in the District of Columbia Public School's Student Hearing Office and, again, just recently, the DC public school's budget was cut. By September, 1997, 900+ positions will be eliminated. I also mentioned that the Child Find program under IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act)---a program, designed to locate and identify children, who may need special education services, does not exist in the District of Columbia.

Because of Mrs. Clinton's caring interest in children's issues, I mentioned to my friend that I wanted to notify Mrs. Clinton's office about two very important upcoming public meetings regarding special education in the District of Columbia. These meetings will be conducted by Dr. Thomas Hehir's, Director of OSEP's (Office of Special Education Programs) offices, the U.S. Department of Education, telephone (202) 205-9179. It is my understanding that the first meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 4, 1997, 9:00 - 10:30 a.m., at 3400 Martin Luther King Avenue, S.E., Washington, DC., and the second meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 5, 1997, 7:00 - 9:00 p.m., at the Logan Building, located at 3rd & G Streets, N.E., Washington, DC (located near Union Station). The purpose of these public meetings is that it allows concerned citizens, parents, advocates and others, the opportunity to express their concerns about special education in the District, including non-compliance's of IDEA.

My friend urged me to write to you. What I would truly like to see is, a representative from Mrs. Clinton's office, or a White House official, attend these meetings. If this is not possible, I would appreciate any recommendations you may have in notifying the White House of these two meetings. She (my friend) mentioned that you are also a Holy Trinity alumni parent.

I look forward in hearing from you at your earliest convenience. Any help and advice is appreciated.

Notes: CHA's *Balanced Budget Plan* was reviewed by the Bureau Group, LLC, of KPMG Peat Marwick, LLP. Revenue and savings estimates are based on recent Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimates of the size of similar budget proposals. Some totals may not add due to rounding.

Balancing the federal budget is essential to keeping America strong and preserving our ability to meet the needs of future generations.

Presidential Character Counts _ But How to Gauge It

WASHINGTON _ When we look at the men running for the presidency, we have a hard time getting a handle on character, though we believe that it matters a lot.

The candidates themselves are in a double bind. We demand that they make some show of religious belief and give generously to charity _ only to doubt their motives when they do.

But in matters of faith and charity, we do have some solid clues to go on, including the way candidates talk and live their religion, how their votes match their stated beliefs, and how much they give to good causes. Such factors reveal a complex mix of constants and contradictions, sometimes a surprising depth of belief combined with a willingness to compromise long-held values to get votes.

Bill Clinton, Bob Dole and Ross Perot and their wives are far more generous in their charitable contributions than the average American. If everyone in America gave proportionately as much as they do, the country's charities would be in better shape.

All three candidates also have a long history of church attendance. Just two years ago Clinton and Dole worshiped together quietly at the Foundry United Methodist Church in the heart of urban Washington _ until private worship became political fodder.

That's when the Institute for Religion and Democracy, a conservative think tank, accused Foundry's senior pastor, the Rev. J. Philip Wogaman, of "theological and political liberalism" that included welcoming gays and lesbians into the congregation and criticizing the "Contract With America," a topic Wogaman says he never addressed at the pulpit.

Foundry had hardly experienced a sudden liberal conversion. Gays had been welcome in the church for many years while Dole worshiped there.

Only when Wogaman became "much more visible as a liberal spokesperson" than his predecessor did he incur the wrath of the religious right, according to the Rev. Dennis Campbell, dean of the Duke University Divinity School.

"At that point the association became a political liability for Dole," says University of Tennessee religion professor Charles Lippy. Elizabeth Dole switched to the National Presbyterian Church, a more conservative Washington congregation. Her husband followed. Clinton, a Southern Baptist, continues to attend Foundry United Methodist with his wife, Hillary, a member of the church.

"I was sorry," says Wogaman. "I thought it would have been a very powerful symbol to the country if, in just this one instance, two candidates just happened to be in the same local church."

Dole said little about the political or religious motives behind his departure. Lippy notes that Midwestern Methodists tend to view religion as a private matter. And the Rev. Edward Bauman, who retired from Foundry in 1992, believes that while "God is important" to the senator, Dole does not want to use "religion for political gain."

The Rev. Glenn Tombaugh, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Russell, Kan., where the senator retains membership, believes that Dole hesitates to talk about faith because it's not the "undercurrent that influences all" as it is for his wife Elizabeth, an outspoken evangelical Christian.

"His form of religion is not one that speaks to me so much," says Tombaugh, who describes Dole as "very typical of the older-than-boomer generation. (Religion) is one factor of everything else that's going on in society and you leave it in its place."

Supporters and detractors alike credit Bill Clinton with knowing the language of faith and how to use it, whether he's talking to the nation in the aftermath of the Oklahoma bombing or eulogizing Ron Brown. "The Southern Baptists have a tradition of ... giving your testimony," says Lippy. "It's a force of habit to make biblical allusions."

Some observers suggest that the president's use of religious rhetoric can be politically calculated, and wonder whether he even knows when he is quoting the Bible to score points with believers.

"When people say somebody is manipulative, they usually mean somebody throws the switch on or off at will," says Penn State University professor of philosophy Carl Vaught, the son of the president's late pastor in Little Rock, Ark. "He's much more complicated than that. Sometimes he doesn't know where the switch is."

But even those who think that Clinton is prone to manipulation tend to attribute his comfort with God-talk to the central role religion plays in his life. Wogaman says, "He is a person of integrity and seriousness about faith."

"One night I saw him live in Bosnia and there he was in his pew the next morning," says Wogaman.

If Ross Perot has steered clear of the controversies that ensue when religion meets politics, it's because he mentions his faith even less often than Dole. The Rev. Clayton Bell, his pastor at Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas, notes that he shows up at church most Sundays, and "his faith dictates his response to people in need," as shown by his record of charitable giving.

(FIRST OPTIONAL TRIM BEGINS)

Clinton's churchgoing started as a child. Years later, while his wife Hillary, a devout Methodist, went with their daughter to a local Methodist church, Clinton worshiped with Arkansas' largest congregation, Immanuel Baptist Church in Little Rock, a Southern Baptist church where he is still a member. He sang in the choir and developed a close relationship with the pastor, the Rev. Worley Oscar Vaught, a biblical scholar and father figure who offered him non-judgmental counsel on such issues as capital punishment and abortion.

Dole has also gone to church since he was a boy, though his record of attendance has been uneven. During the years Dole attended Foundry United Methodist in Washington, Bauman says the senator often missed church "because he was on Sunday morning talk shows." And Dole hasn't attended Trinity in Kansas "in a couple of years at least," Tombaugh notes. Parishioners were surprised, he says, during the senator's last campaign trip when he left Russell on Sunday morning instead of coming to church.

Still, the Rev. Craig Barnes, senior minister of National Presbyterian Church, the Doles' new church in Washington, says that the senator and his wife, Elizabeth, "are here most Sundays (and) they bring their Bibles with them when they come."

(FIRST OPTIONAL TRIM ENDS)

Both Clinton and Dole have stressed the connection between biblically based values and political action, a subject that Perot has rarely addressed. But Clinton's translation of religious concerns into personal and public policy decisions has been problematic for many conservative Christians.

The conservative ruling faction of the Southern Baptist Convention, however, voted last summer to rebuke the president for his veto of the partial-birth abortion ban and they differ on such issues as gay rights. The Catholic bishops have also criticized Clinton's veto.

Even among progressive Christians there is dissension, showing that the

connection between spiritual values and political positions is in the eye of the beholder. Children's Defense Fund President Marian Wright Edelman, an evangelical Christian, is among those who object strenuously to Clinton's support of the welfare reform bill, which they see as a betrayal of the biblical mandate to care for the poor.

Many Dole supporters, including the Christian Coalition, like his tough

love approach to problems of poverty, his support of a constitutional amendment on school prayer, and his rejection of partial-birth abortion.

When you look at their charitable giving, the Clintons and Doles regularly give nearly 10 percent of their incomes to charity, following the biblical mandate to tithe. That compares with 1.8 percent for the average American household. Perot, who was regularly referred to as "billionaire philanthropist" before he became a presidential candidate, has given close to \$100 million over the past 15 years in highly creative and sometimes impulsive gestures.

The most recent available tax information released by the White House says that the president and his wife gave about \$30,000 of their \$316,000 income to charity in 1995.

The Clintons did not release a breakdown, announcing only that two-thirds of the contributions went to the three churches the Clintons attend and the rest was divided among 19 charities. They declined to publicize those charities; White House press officer Mary Ellen Glynn said they didn't want them to receive "undue publicity."

Senator Dole and his wife contributed \$57,603 of their 1995 income of \$583,000 to 22 charities in 1995. The bulk of the money — \$51,178 — went to the American Red Cross, from which Elizabeth Dole is on leave as president.

Since 1991, Dole has been required under Senate rules to give all his speaking fees to charity. Most of that money went to his own Dole Foundation for the Employment of People With Disabilities; to Sarah's Circle, a Washington center for the elderly poor; and, before he stopped attending, the Foundry Methodist Church.

Dole's Foundation for the Employment of People With Disabilities, founded in 1983, is highly respected in the philanthropic world. The group, which has modest administrative expenses, has given out more than \$7 million in grants to find good jobs for people with disabilities.

The Dole Foundation is controversial, however, because of the source of its money. It is supported in large measure with six- and seven-figure donations from longtime supporters of Dole's political career, including the Gallo wine family, Dwayne Andreas of Archer Daniels Midland and tobacco companies.

Ross Perot, who made more than \$1 billion with the 1984 sale of his company, Electronic Data Systems, to General Motors, is in some ways an exemplary philanthropist.

Perot has given \$7 million to the Salvation Army because, he says, "They feed the poor, they don't write books about it."

Over the years, Perot has donated \$39 million to the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas where four scientists have done research that won them Nobel Prizes. He donated \$15 million to help build Dallas a new symphony hall, which he named for longtime aide Morton Meyerson. Another Dallas beneficiary, the local arboretum, found Perot "intrusive" when he dictated where trees should be planted.

Like the Clintons and the Doles, Perot gives to his church — \$4.5 million over the past 15 years to Highland Memorial Presbyterian Church.

In charity as well as in religion, interested observers see a disparity

between private beliefs and public actions. Heads of charities contend, for example, that the candidates' model private giving is out of synch with their public actions. Specifically, they fear that the welfare bill, passed by Dole and his Congress and signed by Clinton, will leave charities with a responsibility for the poor they can't possibly meet.

The Rev. Fred Kammer, head of Catholic Charities USA, the nation's third most successful fundraising charity after the Salvation Army and the American Red Cross, believes that both Dole and Clinton have deserted the nation's poorest families. He acknowledges that their giving is "an important part of their personal moral lives."

What's missing from the campaign, Kammer said, is the idea that it is the duty of the larger community to share its resources with the poor. "The pope

said it well," Kammer said. "'One should not give in charity what is due in justice.'"

Elizabeth Dole's Humane Gesture Skips Crucial Detail

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WASHINGTON _ Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole and his wife, Elizabeth, are conscientious givers, but they have committed one notable charity faux pas.

Mrs. Dole followed a noble impulse in adopting a dog from the Washington Humane Society rather than buying a pedigreed pup. She rescued Leader, now 13, part-Schnauzer, as a present to mark the day her husband became Senate GOP leader. Mrs. Dole signed the standard Humane Society contract pledging to have the pet neutered within a week.

In this case, however, her word was not her bond. Five years later Leader became a father to eight puppies born to Chelsea Marie, the miniature schnauzer belonging to Dole's senate colleague Strom Thurmond.

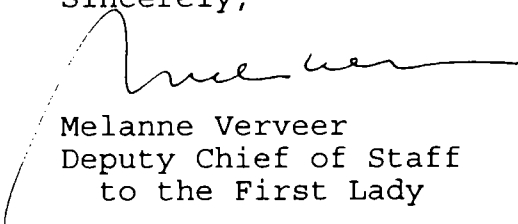

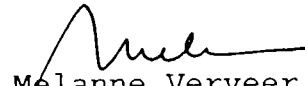

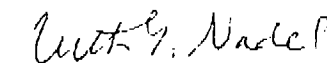

It is essential that this work not cease with the preparation of the two reports. These important documents should serve as springboards for future activity within the Federal government and in the NGO world. No single agency can elicit the priority attention required for these issues.

We count on you to build on this experience and move rapidly forward toward full empowerment of women.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

HEALTH CARE WITHOUT HARM

1. The health care industry is a major source of environmental harm.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, medical waste incinerators are one of the largest sources of dioxin emissions in the United States. Dioxin is an unwanted bi-product that's created when chlorinated chemicals, like PVC, are burned. The dioxin escapes through the incinerator stack, travels by air currents and settles onto grass, which is then eaten by cows, cattle and chicken in their feed. A similar process occurs when dioxin is released from pulp and paper mills that use chlorine in their bleaching process, where it is absorbed by fish.

The EPA estimates that humans receive 90% of their dioxin intake through food. We eat contaminated dairy products, meat and fish and take the dioxin into our bodies, where it is stored in our fatty tissue for years and builds up over time. This is especially problematic for child bearing women, who pass dioxin to a fetus in utero or to a breastfeeding baby. In fact, the infant is the most vulnerable member of society to being poisoned by this chemical.

The EPA also estimates, in its 1994 Dioxin Reassessment, that the average levels of dioxin in all Americans is "at or approaching levels" where we can expect to see a variety of health effects. Some of the health effects linked with dioxin exposure in human and/or animal studies include cancer, endometriosis, testicular atrophy, increased miscarriages and birth defects, damage to the immune system, neurological damage, alterations in hormone function and a host of other problems. Given its ubiquity, and the fact that we are already carrying a high dioxin burden in our bodies, all Americans should be concerned about their exposure to dioxin.

Medical waste incinerators also release a large amount of mercury into the environment.

Mercury is a toxic metal that affects the human nervous system, liver and kidneys, while mercury-contaminated fish eaten by pregnant women can affect fetal development. Given that safe substitutes exist for health care products containing mercury, there is no reason whatsoever that hospitals should be spewing this dangerous chemical into the air.

2. Safer and cost effective solutions to medical waste incineration already exist.

Many hospitals around the country have conducted waste audits of their overall operations and implemented a variety of pollution prevention measures that have saved the hospital money and yielded a more efficient use of medical materials. Beth Israel Hospital in New York, for example, has saved \$600,000 a year in disposal costs by instituting a program to dramatically reduce its red bag waste and recycle more of its materials. Fletcher Allan Hospital in Vermont also recycles its waste and has implemented a model food composting program that saves money in disposal fees, and provides the fertilizer to grow organic fruits and vegetables that serves the hospital food program.

3. The use of PVC (polyvinyl chloride) plastic in hospitals and health clinics is a significant public health threat.

PVC is used widely in the production of IV and blood bags, plastic tubing, and an array of other hospital products. Not only does PVC contribute to dioxin formation when burned, but it contains a chemical called DEHP that can leach out of the blood or IV bag and enter the body of patients receiving blood infusions or IV fluids. DEHP has been recognized by the EPA as a probable human carcinogen. It is also a chemical that disrupts the normal functioning of the hormone system.

The health and environmental concerns regarding PVC are so great that the American Public Health Association (APHA) recently passed a resolution calling for its phase-out from the health care setting. APHA noted that while safer and cost effective alternatives to some PVC products already exist (eg. IV bags), it is the responsibility of the hospital suppliers to develop and market non-toxic replacements for the remainder of PVC applications.

4. The federal government has a responsibility to pass stringent medical waste disposal rules that encourage the wise use of hospital materials, as well as safer waste disposal.

The EPA is under a court order to set regulations for medical waste incinerators by July, 1997.

Unfortunately, the EPA has operated in a schizophrenic way on this issue. While its scientific experts are concluding that dioxin is much more dangerous than anyone previously believed and that Americans already carry a dangerous body burden of this chemical, its policy arm has proposed weak incineration standards that would continue to allow high levels of dioxin emissions into the atmosphere. For example, under the proposed rule, small incinerators would be allowed to emit from 10 to 75 times more dioxin than municipal or hazardous waste incinerators. It is unacceptable for the government to promote this double standard in regulations.

Perhaps because we are of the same generation, I feel that I understand your husband, and I believe that he is authentically concerned about all of America and committed to bridging and healing of the gaps and wounds among its people. I believe that his leadership qualities can help America transcend beyond the evils of a former era and foster new and exciting relationships with Africa as well as among Americans of diverse ethnicity and different gender. It is my wish to encourage President Clinton in his good works, and to assist, to contribute, in some small way through conveying this message to him.

Please pass the herein message to President Clinton along with my sincere well-wishes and encouragement for his work on better relationships between Africa and America as well as among the American people themselves. It would be a great honor to have an opportunity to meet you and your daughter Chelsea during your visit in Tanzania. My wife, a Tanzanian very active in gender issues, and my three children would be very pleased to meet you as well. We can appreciate your busy schedule, but if a short visit with you is possible, Ms. Henderson of the Embassy here would know how to reach me.

Mrs. Clinton, I strongly encourage an opportunity for other American citizens to meet you during your visit here as well, particularly Pete O'Neal and his wife Charlotte. Pete and Charlotte left America in 1970 and have been involved with good community service work in Arusha. They have established a viable community center outside of town along the road toward Kilimanjaro Airport that is called United African American Community Centre (UAACC) and are successfully carrying out two very meaningful projects; Heal the Community, a program now focused on Kansas City and Arusha youth, and a Kansas City-Arusha Sister City Association. Folks like Mayor Cleaver of Kansas City, Missouri and myself are quietly working to reconcile some of the grave injustices of the past so that more people could benefit from the significant contributions that Pete and Charlotte have to offer Americans and the world. If nothing else, I strongly encourage you and/or members of your staff to visit the center and see the work that they are doing. I am available to help facilitate in any manner.

Thank you for coming to Africa and for your good will and genuine concern for its people. Hopefully, your visit will help bring constructive world attention to some of the pressing problems of this continent, and a better relationship with America.

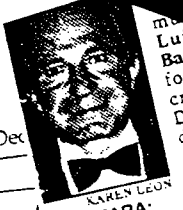

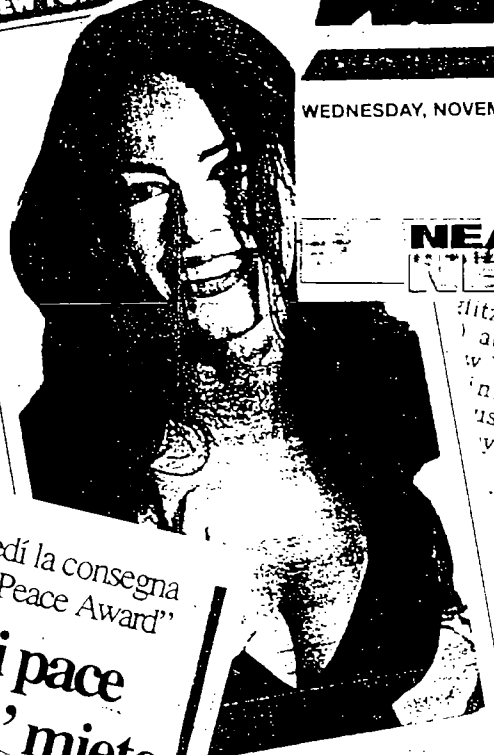
