Dear Melanne,

I have delayed writing until the election decision is clear. But that seems to be interminable so I write now. I have been upset by the supercilious comments by some overseas commentators including here in Britain. I was glad that one of our top writers, Simon Jenkins in The Times, wrote, "No feature of America's constitutional agony is more degrading than the derisive taunts of British commentators."

I was wanting to write and congratulate the First Lady on her success in New York. Will you be continuing with her in her new position?

We are much enjoying starting a new life in North Devon. It is quite a cultural shock, having been in Oregon for 21 years. The enclosed rather inflated piece about us gives us a bit of a start here. I am just signing a contract for an English edition of "Forgiveness: Breaking the Chain of Hate."

What I hope to be able to get to work on during the next months is a book about my experience being evacuated to the United States during World War II. It will be very much a thank you to the family who took us in for five years – with whose descendants we are still in touch – and to the generosity of Americans in general.

I will be getting back to the U.S. occasionally for board meetings and hope to combine that with speaking events. For instance, I will do a book launching at the UN in New York at the beginning of December followed by speaking to the World Affairs Council in San Antonio on December 7, a most appropriate day for the subject, forgiveness. I have been grateful for what the Clintons have been doing in Vietnam.

Held in high regard

A man who wants to put things right

IT IS rare in this age of tabloid tattle and front page revelations that any journalist is respected — let alone admired.

But it comes as little surprise to the people who know him that local writer Michael Henderson is held in the highest regard by some of the world's leading figures.

His "fans" range from the religious leader His Holiness the Dalai Lama to Nobel Peace Prize laureate Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the late Mother Teresa. All three have given their backing and support to Michael's literary work.

The Dalai Lama wrote the foreword to Michael's book *All Her Paths Are Peace*, which highlights the lives of 16 women from across the world who have been pioneers in peace-making. Women like French resistance fighter Irene Laure, Mother Teresa's friend the Irish trade union leader Saidie Patterson, Renee Pan, a Cambodian who reached out to the Khmer Rouge who had killed her family, and Burmese educator Daw Nyein Tha — the woman for whom Mahatma Gandhi declared his innocent love.

The foreword by the Tibetan religious leader talks of the importance of women in the peace making process and the focus the book puts on certain individuals. He wrote from Dharmasala:

"I am sure that the example set by women as mentioned in this book will inspire and encourage others."

Michael and his wife Erica, who have just moved to Westward Ho!, have met the Dalai Lama on several occasions in various locations around the world. But Michael admits to being "very moved and delighted" when he agreed to give his personal support to the book.

"He's an amazing man, very boyish and bubbling with humour. He really loves a good chuckle."

He was also thrilled when Archbishop Tutu agreed to write a strong endorsement to Michael's latest book, *Forgiveness — Breaking the Chain of Hate*.

"I have been lucky enough to meet the archbishop several times. He's a very normal person and is very outgoing with people. But when I attempted to visit him in Cape Town he was on retreat. Later I sent him a copy of the manuscript. I didn't hear from him for a while and thought I must have missed him."

But to Michael's surprise and pleasure he did reply wholeheartedly backing the book. The archbishop wrote:

"A deeply moving and eloquent testimony to the power of forgiveness in the life of individuals, of communities, and between nations. It effects change — a powerful book."

In another review one leading theologian even went as far as to say: "I am a better human being for having read this book."

BUT Michael's life on the literary road started with a bumpy passage. At the age of only eight he was one of several thousands of youngsters who were evacuated to America during the Second World War. He and his younger brother Gerald made the long voyage to Boston in 1940 — returning only at the conclusion of the conflict. By then Michael was 13.

"Unlike many stories you hear I had a very happy five years in America. It

was much harder for my parents to let us go, I know that. They thought they were helping the war effort and that England was going to be invaded."

The memories of his homecoming are very moving.

"I was 13, my brother was 10 and when we were reunited with our parents neither my brother nor myself recognised my mother. We walked past her on the station platform. It was difficult and we were not as close as some families because there were big gaps in our lives together."

The experience of being a wartime evacuee to North America has inspired Michael to start researching the subject with a view to writing about it.

"No-one really knows how many children were sent off to the USA, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa during those war years."

Within five years of coming back to England Michael began his travels again — a journey that would take 50 years and span nearly every continent. In 1950 he took a job with MRA — the somewhat clumsily titled Moral Re-Armament based at a reconciliation centre in Switzerland.

Michael on the Dalai Lama:

'He's an amazing man... He really loves a good chuckle'

"MRA was named at the end of the war and I believe the title is to be changed to something more relevant to everyday life, but we don't know quite what that will be yet," he said smiling.

The organisation is multi-racial and multi-denominational and is a worldwide movement for change and reconciliation. Michael explains it more simply: "We're a fellowship of people who just want to put things right. We offer hope and encouragement."

The decision to join the movement was made for Michael — "It was what God wanted and I knew it was the right thing to do."

This desire to put things right, allied to a strong Christian faith, has seen him working and writing in 30 countries. With Erica at his side he has toured theatre productions with MRA spreading the message of cultural understanding and peace.

In 1979 Michael, his wife and their daughter Juliet moved to Oregon where work with MRA carried on. Michael also became a commentator for public radio stations in the state. But 20 years later the desire to come home was very strong and as Erica has family in North Devon this seemed the ideal place. In fact Erica's grandfather was the rector of Langtree for more than 30 years.

"Recently we were having lunch at St Mary's Church in Bideford when we found ourselves next to an 88-year-old woman who knew my wife's grandparents, her uncles, aunts and her father," said Michael.

The connection is strengthened with Michael's childhood memories of family holidays climbing on tanks at Woolacombe beach in 1939.

"It is only natural that we would choose this part of the world to land up in."

Both Michael and Erica are looking forward to starting up a new life here in North Devon. Michael will carry on working. But they have something more important to do first.

"We're looking for a local church to go to," he said. "We're very grounded in our faith and we've been so fortunate that travel has done this for us — and we have respect for all other religions."

"But we always knew we'd come back here."

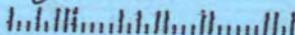

Body Odyssey Exhibition

Body Odyssey is a 4,000 square foot multi-sensory environment that sets children and families on an adventurous ride through the body's inner workings. Families begin their exploration by walking up a giant tongue ramp and into the mouth of a child. From there they explore the digestive and respiratory systems by actually going inside dramatic environments that simulate the lungs and digestive organs at work. Children and parents can launch their own expedition under the surface of the skin to learn about the body's protective covering and they can dive into a blood tunnel which simulates the body's circulatory system. These learning environments will immerse children in a three dimensional world full of sounds, images, textures and challenging activities which will give kids and families the tools and information they need to make healthy choices throughout their lives.

The Goals

The primary aim of the *Body Odyssey* exhibition is to help children understand the daily processes of their bodies, demystifying stomach gurgles, runny noses and scabs, and making kids feel more comfortable about their bodies. Another primary goal of the exhibition is to demonstrate the important ways in which parents, caregivers and children can take control over some aspects of their own health. The exhibition's three main goals are to:

- help children and families understand that they are the "landlords" of their bodies and that the choices they make impact their health
- instill in children and families a sense of awe and admiration for their bodies, particularly with regard to the their bodies' interrelated organs and systems
- help children and families learn about how the body works by providing them with a creative, playful, humorous learning environment.

New York's children and families will discover the magnificence of their own bodies when they depart on an exploratory, hands-on voyage into the dynamic inner workings of the **immune system**, the **skin**, the **digestive system** and the **respiratory system**. CMOM has selected these areas to address important issues facing children's health today. The exhibition will focus on the respiratory system because asthma is the number one health problem for public school children, the digestive system in order to address issues related to nutrition, and the skin to focus on issues of cleanliness and safety, and the immune system, in part, to raise awareness about immunizations. The exhibition will use familiar situations, such as a scraped knee on the playground or a day home sick with a cold, in order to illuminate and dramatize the body's complex biological processes. The exhibition will, for example, take a child underneath the skin's surface so that he or she can discover, through dramatic role playing, cause and effect games, puzzles and matching exercises, how the skin heals a cut or scrape. This approach will help visitors understand the connection between what they can see (i.e., a knee scrape) and what they cannot see (i.e., the skin's layers and the immune system working together to prevent infection and to heal the wound.) In the process, CMOM visitors will learn that their bodies are constantly performing amazing feats to keep them healthy and happy.

BODY ODYSSEY:

THE CHILDREN'S MUSEUM OF MANHATTAN CREATES A FANTASTIC BODY VOYAGE WHERE KIDS LEAD THE WAY

New York, NY- Where do burps come from? What makes a cut stop bleeding? Where does shed skin go? What's life like inside an asthmatic lung? These and hundreds of other questions about health and wellness will be the focus of *Body Odyssey*, a new interactive exhibition at the Children's Museum of Manhattan (CMOM).

Opening February 11, 1999, in CMOM's newly added wing, the 4,000 square foot exhibit is sponsored by Merck & Co., Inc. *Body Odyssey* will offer millions of American families the opportunity to explore the scientific and—to a kid's delight—sometimes unsavory aspects of the human body. The goal of the exhibition and its associated programming is to instill in children and families a sense of awe and admiration for their bodies. Interactives allow kids to understand how the choices they make affect their hard-working bodies.

The exhibition, while creatively exploring scientific processes that occur within the entire human body, will specifically focus on key areas: the skin, the digestive and respiratory system and the blood transport system. *Body Odyssey* and related educational programs will be designed for families with children ages 5 to 11, with activities for younger children. Curators of *Body Odyssey* expect audiences to become better caretakers of their own bodies through an increased understanding of what keeps them healthy.

"As far as the kids are concerned, they will experience how gross and awesome the body can be," says CMOM Executive Director, Andrew Ackerman. "Just don't tell them they will be learning, too."

Body Odyssey's unconventional approach to learning about health, will incorporate several multi-media art-forms to create the exhibit's many activity stations. Included is a blood tunnel where visitors will experience the simulation of the blood's flow as they walk through large, fabricated blood tubes, created with light for the effect of motion. Kids will climb up a giant tongue and work their way through the digestive system—shooting stomach acid and helping food churn through miles of intestines.

Body Odyssey will contain several interactive, educational computer games built directly into the exhibit. Through the aid of high-tech exhibitry, kids will fight body invaders and direct their immune protectors. For parents, the exhibition will be an up-to-date resource and information center, offering the latest scientific research about family health, fitness, nutrition and emotional well-being.

Body Odyssey has been generously funded by Merck & Co., Inc, a world pioneer in medical research and education. "The Children's Museum of Manhattan is an ideal classroom for learning about important health issues," says Raymond V. Gilmartin, Chairman, President and CEO of Merck & Co., Inc. "Information is power and the more children and families understand about their bodies, the more empowered they will be to stay healthy."

A traveling version of ***Body Odyssey*** begins a national four year tour in May 2000. Possible sites include the Exploratorium in San Francisco and the Chicago Children's Museum. Regular educational programs will feature experts in health, nutrition and child development. ***Body Odyssey*** is part of the CMOM's mission to address issues that are vital to a child's life.
