# Hillary Clinton to meet KC youth

**Bartle Hall forum to generate ideas for ways to help children.**

First lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will meet with Kansas City children Friday to discuss their challenges, hopes and dreams during a community forum at Bartle Hall.

Hundreds of child advocates, clergy, teachers, teen-agers, parents and members of area non-profit agencies have been invited to the forum, which is titled "Youth Talk: A City Listens to Children."

Organizers are seeking practical advice about

what Kansas City can do to help children. Mayor Emanuel Cleaver, who invited the first lady, and the Heart of America United Way are co-sponsoring the 2 1/2-hour event.

"All aspects of the public and private sector need to respond to the challenges our young people face," Cleaver said Tuesday. "The first step is to hear what our young people have to say."

Clinton participated in a similar event three weeks ago in Denver. She and Colorado Gov. Roy Romer spent about 90 minutes talking to children ranging in age from 7 to 17 about their

concerns, worries and motivations. Afterward, child-welfare advocates spoke.

"It wasn't a discussion about what the government can do," said Jim Carpenter, Romer's press secretary. "It was a discussion about what's on kids' minds and what the community can do."

Al Sassone, president of the Heart of America United Way, thinks having the president's wife in town will focus extra attention on children's needs.

"Teen-agers sometimes have trouble getting and keeping the undivided attention of adults," Sassone said. "This time, with the first lady involved and the media watching, I don't think these kids will have any problem at all."

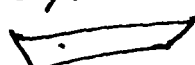

## YOUTH TALK: A CITY LISTENS TO CHILDREN

The purpose of the conference is to bring together children from Kansas City with adults from every sector of the Kansas City community -- government, business, media, education, health care providers, religion, civic leaders, etc. -- for a conversation on how Kansas City responds to the needs of its children: to highlight programs that are working and identify challenges to be met. This Conference builds on a similar convening in which Mrs. Clinton participated in Denver, CO, called "Colorado Listens to Kids." The two components of the day are a Conference and a Luncheon.

### Conference

The day begins with a two-and-a-half-hour Conference in the morning. The call time for the audience is 9:00; HRC time is 9:30am. When Mrs. Clinton arrives, she will meet briefly with two groups of people (in two separate rooms) involved in the Conference discussion: the children discussion participants and the adult respondents.

**Children:** The children, who were identified through the Mayor's Office and the United Way, are between the ages of 13-18 and will be on stage, surrounding Mrs. Clinton and Mayor Cleaver. They will be discussing what's it's like to be a children growing up in Kansas City, what programs are working for them, and what more needs to be done. These children have been active in community programs and will be ready to articulate their concerns. We are still working to reach and select these approx. 10 children.

**Adult Respondents:** During the Conference, the adults will be in the first two rows of the audience with hand-held mics, ready to discuss, from their own perspectives, how Kansas City is responding to the needs of children. These approx. 8 adults will represent the different sectors of the Kansas City community -- the religious sector, the business community, the health care provider community, the media, the child advocacy community, etc.

**Moderator:** The TBD Moderator, who will be stationed at a podium off to the side of the assembled children, will have role of welcoming the audience to the Conference, introducing the Mayor and HRC onto stage, and introducing the Mayor for his opening remarks. The Moderator will also have the role of introducing the two components of of the Conference -- the discussion with the children and the discussion with the adults. The Moderator will also be responsible for being very familiar with the two groups of participants to help engage them in the discussion or call on them when appropriate.

We foresee the format to be:

-Meet and Greet

- Children proceed to stage and are seated in some sort of semi-circle in comfortable, uniformly shaped chairs, and adult respondents proceed to seats in front row
- From a podium off to one side of the assembled children, Al Sassone, President of Heart of America United Way, welcomes everyone to the Conference, introduces Mayor Cleaver and HRC onto stage
- HRC and Mayor Cleaver proceed to stage and are seated
- Sassone intros TBD Moderator and proceeds to seat in front row
- TBD Moderator introduces the components of the day and intros Mayor
- Mayor makes remarks and intros HRC
- HRC makes remarks
- HRC and Mayor proceed to seats with children
- Moderator intros first component of discussion with children and names each child
- Mayor or HRC open discussion with children (approx. 1 hour)
- NOTE: The Mayor will have the primary moderator role, but TBD moderator near podium will be on call to help if necessary.
- Following discussion with children, TBD moderator opens the discussion with the audience and helps to call on adult respondents in the first row.
- Q&A/Open discussion period moderated by TBD (hand-held mics passed in audience when audience members are recognized)
- TBD Moderator announces last question and calls on Mayor and HRC to make closing remarks
- HRC and Mayor depart.

**Audience:** The audience will be composed of parents, child advocates, business people, health care providers, religious leaders.

**Backdrop:** Hallmark is having its artists work on a backdrop of a mural of a "village" -- Roshann has explained to Hallmark and Hallmark artists know to discuss and be guided by Patrick Halley when he arrives.

### Luncheon

The purpose of the luncheon is to engage a broader group of the Kansas City community in the issues of the children's conference. It will be sponsored by the Women's Public Service Network and the Chamber of Commerce of Greater Kansas City. Roshann has been our main contact for the lunch (she's an active member of the Women's Public Service Network) -- she intends the call time to be 11:30 am with a close-circuit TV for viewing the ongoing Conference and an invitation to view the entirety of the Conference by close circuit. She is working to have the luncheon guests at dessert by the time program would begin at approx. 12:15pm.

- HRC proceeds to the luncheon and is greeted by:
  - Adele Hall, Chair, Women's Public Service Network

- Pete Levy, President, Chamber of Commerce
- HRC, Hall, and Levy proceed to podium
- Levy welcomes and introduces Adele Hall
- Hall makes brief remarks and intros HRC
- HRC makes remarks
- Q&A period
- Adele Hall closes luncheon

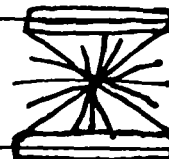

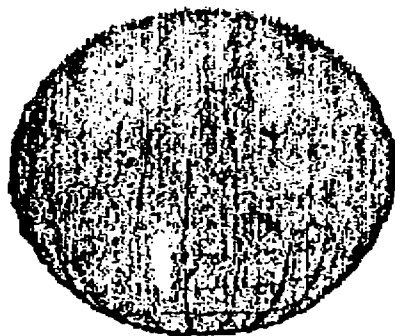

### Background Information

In approximately 1988, the pastor of my church became involved with Associated Youth Services, Kansas City, Kansas, as a foster parent. At this time, there was (and still is) a strong push to recruit and license homes for the foster care program. I had been interested in being a foster parent or a volunteer working with children for some time. Becoming a foster parent required hours of interviewing with the agency, a mountain of paperwork to be completed and several background and security checks. After successfully passing all of these steps, a foster parent had to complete at least twelve hours of specialized training related to foster care and family dynamics before a child could be placed in the home. Currently, I am still required to complete forty hours of training annually to maintain my foster parent license.

One of the programs from which I receive placements is for short-term temporary placement. The program is for foster care for teenage girls from 13 to 18 who are at a secure facility in Beloit, Kansas. The girls at this facility have been adjudicated through the system as juvenile offenders, most more than once. Many have a history of auto theft, petty larceny, chronic runaways, truancy, drug and alcohol abuse, etc. Almost all of them have a history of some type of abuse, either physical or sexual abuse. It is extremely hard to find foster homes that are willing to provide placement for this particular population. The girls are placed in my home for a short time, usually 6 months. During this time, they are to be reacquainted to what is acceptable behavior and to increase the chances of them being able to function positively in society again. Foster placement is a much less restrictive measure than the secure locked facility from which they are released. The focus is for them to be able to successfully make the transition from the locked facility to family life. The role I fill is to provide guidance in the areas needed for many to change their behavior so that it is in conformity with what is considered acceptable norms of society.

I can not begin to count the number of times that I had to respond to the question of "why would you want to take those kinds of kids into your home?" To me the answer always seemed very clear--these are the children who needed my help. If I did not try to make a difference in the lives of these girls, who are obviously at a critical turning point, was there anyone else out there willing to help them. I chose to attempt to make a difference in the lives of the girls that are placed in my home.

During their placement in my foster home, the girls are required to attend school, attend classes to work toward their GED, work during the summer months, attend church, and become involved in some type of community activity. Constant encouragement is provided for them to set realistic goals and strive to complete them. Education is stressed as a key to their future well-being. Mistakes made at a young age, do not have to turn into mistakes for the rest of their lives.

The other program for which I provide foster care is for children in need of care. One placement had been in ten different placements, by the time she was placed in my home. She was eleven years old and had been in the foster care system about four years. When she came to me she was, also, failing all of her classes at school. One difference in her life was that by the time she left my home, she was on the honor roll at school. I was in law school at the time, and while I concentrated on my studies, she concentrated on her schoolwork. My current foster placement is eight years old and both parental ties have been severed. The goal is to find an adoptive home for her. The difference that

is being made in her life is in changing her opinion that she doesn't have a home and that there is nobody that loves her. To accomplish this requires gaining her trust, supplying her basic needs and taking care of her safety issues. The amazing part is that I have had 16 and 17 year old foster daughters who echo the same opinions and thoughts as this eight year old.

One thing is for sure, today children are being placed into foster care at an earlier age than when I became a foster parent years ago. Some of these children have experienced a violent and turbulent background at an early age. Foster care is not a replacement for a stable home environment, but in my foster home, I provide, in the time frame is allotted, the elements needed to make it possible for them to pursue a productive and a very different lifestyle than what they had been exposed too.

## Meet Cover Director Dwayne A. Crompton KCMC Child Development Corporation, Kansas City, Missouri



"As an early education and care community, we are going to have to come together as one to ensure that quality early education is available to all," says Dwayne A. Crompton, executive director of KCMC Child Development Corporation, in Kansas City, Missouri.

A not-for-profit agency, KCMC (an acronym for Karing for Children is our Main Concern) Child Development Corporation has been providing innovative answers to that question for 25 years since its founding in 1970 under the old Model Cities program.

Dwayne, a former sixth grade teacher, came to KCMC 18 years ago when Kansas City Model Cities Program was looking for someone to start up a child care program for inner-city families. The Kansas City School District loaned Dwayne to the poverty agency. After Dwayne had completed the job and returned to the

school district, the Model Cities child care director resigned and the program offered Dwayne the job.

Dwayne readily accepted. He had decided early on that the preschool years offered the best opportunity to have the greatest impact on children. Dwayne had switched several years earlier to the preschool classroom and, after two years of working with preschoolers and their parents, he was hooked. "I could see the difference," Dwayne recalls. "I felt that if we could engage parents as active partners early on, then they would continue in that role."

KCMC grew rapidly during its first five years, opening child care centers and enrolling family child care homes in the Child and Adult Care Food Program throughout the inner city. That growth came to a standstill in 1975 when Model Cities was discontinued and KCMC was forced to cut back services.

Responding to the changing political winds, KCMC broadened its mission to embrace all of Kansas City and outlying communities. KCMC became a multi-faceted child development agency, administering Head Start, the Child and Adult Care Food Program, and operating two comprehensive child development centers. Advocacy also became a hallmark of the agency.

KCMC won the federal contract to administer the Kansas City Head Start Project in 1979 when the program was jeopardized by the dismantling of the grantee agency. Under KCMC, Kansas City Head Start grew into a national model of excellence.

Kansas City's Head Start, which includes programs operated by the Kansas City and Independence, Missouri, school districts, serves 1,786 three and four year olds and their families in the center program and 72 families in the home-based program. Kansas City's Head Start is recognized as a national model of excellence.

Dwayne believes that improving access to quality early care and education and ending welfare dependency are concerns of the '90s. "Head Start can help," he says, "but Head Start has to broaden its scope — its constituency — to embrace the community at large like it has never done before so it doesn't appear to be an isolated service."

Under KCMC, Kansas City Head Start said "no" to isolation. The program has been highly visible in the community. It has also been a leader in reaching out to form partnerships to expand quality child care to needy families and children.

The results have been a bonanza of innovative Head Start partnerships with the private sector and other governmental agencies in Kansas City.

In 1990, building on Head Start's half-day format, KCMC launched the New Start Child Care Partnership Initiative which provides full-day, year-round child care and family development services to Head Start eligible preschoolers and their families. Because economic self-reliance is the goal of New Start, parents must be enrolled in school, college, or job training to participate.

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New Start blends public and private funding streams to expand services to needy families. "It shouldn't matter how a family receives funding," Dwayne explains. "What should matter is that the child and family are getting what they need to enhance their lives and become productive."

A key component of New Start is the family advocate who strives to ensure a positive child rearing environment in the home by working to strengthen the ability of the parent or guardian to function as the head of household.

In 1993, encouraged by the success of New Start, KCMC launched Full Start, a Head Start Community Partnership Program that now operates at three centers. Full Start, a collaborative child care funding arrangement, allows neighborhood child care centers to leverage Head

Start dollars to provide the full range of Head Start services that previously were available only to children enrolled in Head Start centers.

Full Start services include a full-time family advocate; technical assistance and training by KCMC's education, health, and social service specialists; medical and dental health services; parental involvement; and education and training programs.

"Because of our New Start and Full Start partnerships, we can offer something more than just custodial care for children whose parents are trying to get off welfare," Dwayne explains. "Everyone knows you must have child care available if mothers are going to work or go to school, but we must also offer programs that help children grow and develop."

New Start and Full Start were developed by KCMC's Planning and Development/Technical Assistance Division. This division offers child care consulting services to businesses, educational institutions, school districts, and governmental agencies.

Many companies now look to KCMC for help in meeting the child care needs of their employees. Clients have included Hallmark Cards, Inc.; Penn Valley Community College; Allied MBE Companies, Inc.; City of Kansas City, Missouri; Lee's Summit School District; and Swope Parkway Health Center.

Despite its reputation for excellence in center-based child care, KCMC has also built a strong record in home child care. In 1974, KCMC established Kansas City's first Child and Adult Care Food Program and

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became a leader in the movement to improve and professionalize home child care.

In 1985, KCMC's Child and Adult Care Food Program presented the city's first Family Child Care Conference. About 60 family child care providers attended the first conference. Last year, more than 400 providers, child care workers, and other child care professionals attended.

In the 18 years that Dwayne has been executive director, KCMC has grown from a fledgling anti-poverty child care program to a nationally recognized leader in its field. Last November, the Children's Defense Fund saluted KCMC as one of the most successful agencies of its type in the country. Six other agencies were also honored.

Last year, KCMC celebrated three important anniversaries: the 25th anniversary of its founding, the 30th anniversary of Head Start, and the 10th anniversary of the Family Child Care Conference. But it was not a year dedicated to reveling in the past.

Last October, KCMC, with an eye on the future, began construction on a \$3.7 million, state-of-the-art child and family center. The 27,000 square foot facility will be large enough to provide child care for 200 children — infants up to age 12.

The center will provide holistic child care services to low- and moderate-income families headed by parents who are employed, in school, or enrolled in job training. "Building economically self-reliant families is the goal of our new child and family center," Dwayne says.

The new facility is also a symbol of the strong community support KCMC enjoys in Kansas City. \$1.2 million of the building's cost came from federal and city government. The remainder, over \$2.5 million, was raised in the private sector — businesses, foundations, and individuals.

Rallying the community to build the new KCMC facility is all part of Dwayne's vision. "I want to make sure that this organization becomes so ingrained in the life of the community that the community recognizes its importance and won't ever let it die. Although we are a non-profit agency, we have an entrepreneurial spirit," Dwayne continues. "I want the community to think about how it does business and to recognize that child care is everyone's concern."

Good morning, Skila! Called to find you're *chez Maison* but not in your office, so I left you a message re Hillary Rodham Clinton's visit to Kansas city on Friday. To recap, in case you find this fax about a possibility for the Friday event useful:

The National Alliance for Non-violent Programming (NANP) was created solely to challenge and counter the incidence and effects of all forms of violent media in broad-based community coalitions. The approach is media literacy education, a community education strategy. Community activities include:

- media literacy materials incorporated into existing youth and youth violence prevention programs
- "near peer" training as teens teach middle schoolers to understand and act on the serious consequences of passively absorbing all forms of violent media
- a community resource center established in partnership with the public library or local university or community college
- a speakers bureau for parents, schools and community organizations
- a media task force
- a community jury to evaluate and recommend children's videos and television programming.

Con'l.

Many of these activities are now underway in NANP's Kansas City pilot, the Kansas City Alliance for Non-violent Programming. Mayor Cleaver has articulated a keen interest in this issue and in fact addressed a city-wide conference which launched the initiative March 11, 1995. Now, more than 50 organizations work together. These include medical, faith community, school, university, media, business, civic, parenting, violence prevention, and youth-serving organizations. The coalition is now delivering a media literacy education program for use by youth-serving organizations throughout the community. The program is based in part on the video-based media literacy series from the Center for Media Literacy in Los Angeles. In the Kansas City project, high school-age teens are trained to facilitate the program with younger adolescents in after-school settings.

This spring the trained teen facilitators delivered the media violence program of eight sequenced lessons to 72 middle grades students in three after-school sites. All teen facilitators have asked to participate again this summer. Boys & Girls Clubs requested 18 more programs (eight lessons each) over the summer and fall, explaining that this is one of the best after-school programs they have experienced. The first assessment indicates that participants learned that electronic media have a greater effect upon them than they had previously thought. Among the findings: After the program only 6.9% of the participants felt that violence solves problems.

LeAnn Smith, director of the program, is energetic, articulate, appealing. For the Friday event, LeAnn could bring a middle grades student to talk about the impact of media violence and how it's being addressed in the Kansas City program. The Stand for Children rally today in Washington may offer answers about youth issues, but Kansas City has a question of its own.

You've seen it on billboards this week if you've traveled on Interstates 35 and 70:

"What is Kansas City's 1 question?"

The answer won't be added to the billboards until June 6, but the Partnership for Children has spilled the beans.

Kansas City's No. 1 question is "Is it good for the children?"

The partnership, an initiative of the Heart of America United Way and the Greater Kansas City Community Foundation, is posing the question to groups whose programs and activities may affect children.

"We need to ask because children don't have the political or financial power to fend for themselves," said James Caccamo, the partnership's executive director.

Say the president of a company is considering switching his work schedule to a swing-shift rotation, where people would work a few weeks on days, then move to second shift, then to nights.

The partnership wants that company president to consider the effect the change would have on employees' children.

The children's strategy is one long associated with American Indian cultures, Caccamo said.

Around campfires, any time the tribal elders would discuss a move or change in custom, they would consider what effect the proposal would have on children.

"We want to get the community to start thinking in that same way," Caccamo said
