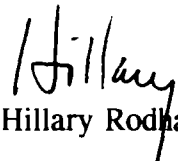

CHILDREN'S CONFERENCE: 'COLORADO LISTENS TO KIDS'

DATE: May 22, 1996
TIME: 9:15 am - 12:15 pm

I. PURPOSE

To hear from children and parents, and to honor children's advocates for their work in Colorado and hear about their work on behalf of children.

II. BACKGROUND

Your first step on arrival to the Golda Meir House on Auraria Campus is a photo with Shantelle Reib. You refer to Shantelle and her cousin Nora in *It Takes a Village* (excerpt attached). Shantelle will be attending with her mother Darcy Fletcher, and Susan Smith, mother of Nora. Next you will participate in a meet and greet with program participants and a brief photo with Auraria Foundation Board members and children from the Child Care Center.

Program

The conference begins with a performance by the Colorado Children's Choir (background attached). Following a welcome from Dean Wolf, Bertha Lynn will announce all conference participants. The Conference is broken up into three parts: remarks, open discussion with children and adult panelists, and audience participation (question and answer). Bertha Lynn will act as moderator for the whole program. Governor Romer will be prepared to answer questions regarding specific Colorado programs.

Panelists will be seated in a semi-circle, and will include approximately twelve youths ages 8-16, and eight adult experts from a variety of fields -- health care, business, parents, clergy, and education. The audience participation will be with parents and children's advocates. Approximately 350 service providers, children's advocates, religious leaders, including 150 parents, will be in the audience.

Following your brief closing remarks, Martin Vadas, accompanied by 8 children, will present you with a gift. (Martin Vadas is the gift's artist.)

The Children's Conference is being held on Auraria Campus, a commuter campus comprised of three separate institutions: University of Colorado at Denver, Community College of Denver, and Metropolitan State College of Denver. The Auraria Higher Education Center manages the facilities and non-academic functions. Total enrollment at all three colleges is over 32,000. The Conference itself will be held in St. Cajetan's Center, a converted Catholic church now used for entertainment as well as conferences and other forums. Since most students on campus work, Auraria runs a large Child Care Center for nearly 250 children.

Governor Romer and Children

Governor Romer is scheduled to appear on the "Today" show on Wednesday morning to talk about accepting an award from Working Mother magazine. For the past three years, the magazine has evaluated child care in all 50 states, looking for new programs, innovations and progress. Working Mother named the ten Best States for child care, and Colorado has made this list for the third year in a row. Ratings are based on specific criteria for quality, safety, availability and commitment. Additionally, Colorado received a score of "5" for its commitment to child care -- the only state to receive this rating.

Colorado programs for children

Below are just some of Colorado's programs for children and families.

School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs): Designed as a community approach for improving the health and academic readiness of Colorado children, this program receives some private and federal funding, but no state resources. SBHCs work with other prevention efforts, such as Family Resource Centers, drug-free schools and other community and school-based programs and provide comprehensive services at low cost. Services include: preventative exams and immunizations, health education for students and parents, basic reproductive health care and mental health services. Solid results have been reported nationally for students who use the centers.

Colorado Child Health Plan: The goal of the CCHP is to improve the health status of uninsured Colorado Children living in low-income families by making primary care affordable and accessible. The Colorado Forum joined efforts this year to support expansion of the Colorado Child Health Plan. The CCHP allows low-income working families that do not qualify for Medicaid to purchase insurance at \$25 a year for children under the age of 12. Under pressure from the Colorado Forum and other groups, the General Assembly's Joint Budget Committee reversed its initial opposition to the plan and voted to expand the CCHP, which receives funding from State as well as some federal money.

School-to-Career Partnership (School to Work) The vision for this program is an integrated, standards based educational system, tied to economic development, that ensures all of its young people are prepared to excel in the competitive global market place. In 1995, Colorado was awarded a five-year, \$24 million grant from the US Departments of Labor and Education. Funds are being sub-granted by the state of

Colorado to local community partnerships of business, industry, and education offering innovative solutions. Approximately 33 percent of Colorado school districts are participating in local School-to-Career Partnerships.

First Impressions: This early childhood initiative, established early in Gov. Romer's administration, was designed to focus attention on a child's first five years and stimulate activity at all levels, and create a solid infrastructure of support and assistance for parents and children. Programs include: One-stop family centers in at risk neighborhoods, the "Read to Me, Colorado" campaign to encourage parents to read to their children, and the Youth Crime Prevention and Intervention Fund that provides support to community based programs.

Bright Beginnings: (Representatives from Governor Romer's office suggested that you do not mention this program) A privately funded program, this public awareness/ public action campaign is designed with the goal of making Colorado the best state in the nation for a child to be born and grow up. The premise is that government alone cannot solve all problems families face --the community as a whole must take responsibility for helping parents raise healthy children. Gov. Romer consulted with business leaders, church organizations, the largest child advocacy group, and key legislators to develop an agenda and plan of action.

FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON
REMARKS FOR "COLORADO LISTENS TO KIDS"
DENVER, CO
MAY 22, 1996

Thank-you Governor Romer for your heartfelt remarks and for that very kind introduction. I also want to thank you for inviting me to join in this important conversation with and about our children and their families.

The President and I have known the Governor and his wife Bea for many years now -- ever since Bill and Roy served in the National Governor's Association together. And both of us have always been inspired by the Romers' longstanding commitment to improving the lives of children.

I am always happy to be back in Colorado -- a place where so many people are committed to making their communities and neighborhoods the very best places to raise children. It seems that you are already well on your way to achieving this vital goal. I want to congratulate this state for being named by *Working Mother* magazine as first in the nation in your commitment to child care and as one of the top ten states for child care.

Yet we have to acknowledge that Colorado, like every other state in this country, has never been immune to the challenges facing American children and their families: The crime in our streets and violence on the airwaves; the lure of tobacco, alcohol, and drugs; the burdens of poverty, illiteracy and poor health; and the pressure to acquire skills to compete in a global economy.

My husband often says that there's no problem in America that isn't being solved somewhere in this country. We can find many of these solutions here, in communities large and small all across this state. Parents, schools, churches, city councils and businesses have come together on behalf of our children to turn these solutions into reality. Last month, I had the opportunity to visit the Kempe Center here in Denver. I saw how doctors, parents and trained volunteers from the community could together break the cycle of child abuse in high-risk families. That is the lesson of these success stories: We must work together.

I know that Governor Romer and the state government have been working closely with business and non-governmental organizations to promote family-friendly initiatives -- from cheaper and better child care to mentorships for new parents to health care coverage for children all over Colorado. All of

these partnerships are crucial. I believe with all my heart that the best way we can help strengthen families is for each of us -- from each sector of our society -- to recognize our responsibilities to our children.

Parents have the primary responsibility for their children, but they cannot fulfill those obligations without help from the whole village. Each day children learn habits and values not just at home, but in classrooms, playgrounds, day care centers, and neighborhood streets; from grandparents, aunts, uncles and friends; and, like it or not, from TV shows, commercials and movies. Parents must rely on their employers for fair wages and the flexibility to perform the duties of childrearing. At some time or another parents need help from the government -- whether it's a police officer patrolling the neighborhood, a college loan, or assistance meeting the needs of a child living with disabilities.

Today, we know more about what children need to develop than ever before. But we still have too few organized ways of supporting parents in the most important work they do. We have not figured out how to replace the extended family, clan or village that looked out for children in earlier times. As a result, many parents don't get the information or the help they need to become the best possible mothers and fathers they can be.

We need to change this situation. I'm hoping that today's conversation will be just that: A conversation that will allow all of us -- politicians, business leaders, advocates, and the biggest experts themselves, parents and children -- to share ideas for meeting the challenges before us.

There have already been plenty of conferences that have analyzed what's wrong with our society. This is an opportunity to determine what is right for our children, what initiatives really work to help all of our children fulfill their God-given potential, and what can be done to replicate these positive efforts throughout the state and the country.

Please don't be shy today. What each of us says here is important, because when it comes to children, we all have experience -- and we can all claim a kind of expertise. We have all been children. We all love our children. We all have visions and aspirations for what they can become. We think of and talk about them constantly, during coffee breaks, PTA meetings, on front porches and phones, in letters and e-mail. No other subject takes so much of our time, nor touches our souls so deeply.

Children are not rugged individualists. They have no say in the political, business and economic decisions made by our nation. And yet they are our future. That is why we can and must be their voice. Thank-you.

HRC EVENT

I would like to welcome all of you here today to join me and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton for this event

We have called this program: "Colorado Listens To Kids" because that's what we want to do today. We have asked several youngsters to join us to have a meaningful conversation that will help us to look into the souls of childhood in the 90's.

As a father, grandfather and governor, I have embarked on a personal journey to 1) understand the changing landscape of childhood, and 2) to explore how we can better support their healthy development.

All of us, parents, government, business, faith communities, the media, senior citizens, etc. have a role to play in making sure that our children are safe, well-educated, healthy and protected.

Let me talk about Colorado for just a minute. For the most part, Colorado is a good place for children to grow. I think most parents would agree that this state is a good place to raise children.

And yet, when I talk to parents, children and community leaders; and when I watch t.v. and read the newspaper, what I feel is something different.

I hear a message that something vital to their communities and families is slipping away – and that we are becoming increasingly isolated and disconnected. There is almost a tangible sense that the rope that we are holding onto is thin and fraying.

I think it's hard to grow up today. It's hard for me even to imagine how different a person I might have been if I had had the choices, freedom and information available to children today when I was young.

***** Talk about growing up in Holly *****

I worry about the constant onslaught of data, messages, voices that bombard children each day. The Internet, CD players, cable television, radio, movies on video – I wonder what kids do with all this information.

I wonder, in this fast-paced world what it means for children whose lives are "over-programmed." What does it mean for children whose lives are so

carefully scheduled – hockey games, baseball leagues and music lessons, in organized groups, directed by adults. I worry that kids don't have the time to just sit down, relax and play a board game or talk with their parents.

It seems that parents and children are passing by each other with ever increasing speed.

A study done by Nickelodeon, a television network aimed at children, asked children to name the things they wanted more of in their lives. One response stood out: 76 percent said they wanted more time with their families.

Yet another study revealed that the average parent spends 30 seconds in meaningful conversation with his or her children.

Don't get me wrong, I'm not blaming parents. I think they're trying as hard as they can to do their best. But I think parents are living on deserted islands – with little or no extended family and other parents to talk to about "how to parent."

And finally, I am concerned about where we, as a society, place our priorities. Because, I'm afraid that I see a state that is more concerned about the Bronco stadium on the ballot than about making sure that our kids have health care insurance.

Let me tell you, that I'm excited about several things that we're doing in this state. I think they will make a difference to kids:

- 1) **Standards in K-12**
- 2) **Charter Schools**
- 3) **Early Childhood Education (the Colorado Preschool Program)**
- 4) **The Colorado Child Health Plan**
- 5) **School-based Health Centers**

We need to do everything possible to allow children to hang onto their childhoods as long as possible. I'm very excited today to hear what these children have to tell us about the quality of their lives and the issues that they must deal with on a daily basis.

Let me close by telling you a story about my friend John Murphy.

Program Summary

On Wednesday, May 22, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Governor Romer will speak to a group of about 250 parents, child advocates, service providers, and community leaders about what children and youth are experiencing in Colorado. The program, designed to energize the community regarding children's issues and give a realistic perspective on the lives of children and youth, will include the Colorado Children's Chorale, welcoming remarks from Mayor Webb, an introduction to be given by Governor Romer, comments from Mrs. Clinton, an interactive dialogue with a group of about 10 youth from a variety of backgrounds, and a panel of eight respondents. The following sectors will be represented on the respondents' panel: business, health care, education, parent, clergy, media, and advocacy.

The program will be a conversational style discussion between Mrs. Clinton, Governor Romer, and the children. After opening remarks, Mrs. Clinton and Governor Romer will address the children with questions about their concerns, issues, and what works for them. The panelists will serve as a back-up for more in-depth responses on their area of expertise. Following this discussion period, the floor will be opened for questions and conversation between Mrs. Clinton and the audience.

Mrs. Clinton will be available for this event on Wednesday, May 22, 1996, from 10 a.m.-12 noon.

The goal of this event is to energize the community regarding children's issues and give a realistic perspective on the lives of children and youth in Colorado.

manuel Baptist in Little Rock, have built family centers that include athletic facilities for exercise classes, basketball games, and jogging or walking. But community recreation centers, especially for teenagers, are nonexistent in many neighborhoods where kids need them most. I can't understand the political opposition to programs like "midnight" basketball and other recreational activities. Providing funds to inner-city neighborhoods to give young people positive outlets for their energies under adult supervision sounds great to me, as a way not only to prevent health problems but to prevent kids from getting into trouble.

KEEPING children healthy in body and mind is the family's and the village's first obligation. But we all know that no matter how conscientious a parent might be or how committed to preventive health a community might be, children will inevitably suffer from disease and injury. Then medical care is required.

A tale of our era: Three cousins lived in the same house with their parents and grandmother. One day in September 1993, two-year-old Shantelle began to run a high fever. Her parents took her to the emergency room of their local hospital, where she was diagnosed with spinal meningitis and admitted. Her father, a roofer, had insurance.

Two days after Shantelle went to the hospital, her three-year-old cousin Nora also developed a high fever. Her mother, who cleans apartments for a living, had no insurance. She took Nora to the Children's Hospital in their city, where they were told that a doctor would not

be able to examine her for at least four hours. Next, she went to the hospital where Shantelle was being treated. There, Nora was given a cursory exam, and her mother was instructed to take her home and give her an over-the-counter pain reliever for her symptoms. Later that day, Nora, who, like her cousin, had contracted spinal meningitis, went into convulsions and died. The day after she was buried, Shantelle was discharged from the hospital, recovered.

Shortly after Nora's funeral, her seven-year-old brother, Trace, also began to run a high fever. His mother took him to the hospital from which Nora had been sent home. Because her case was known, he was admitted and given free medical care. Trace, like Shantelle, recovered and is healthy. (22)

I could tell you many other stories that end in the same question: Is this the kind of health care system our children deserve? Hospitals do not turn away older Americans (at least not as of this writing), because their coverage is guaranteed by Medicare. Why can't we guarantee care for children?

Today there are more than ten million children, most with working parents, who do not have health insurance; that number has been rising by about a half million a year. The rate will accelerate even more if Congress's proposed cutbacks in Medicaid, which provides government insurance for poor children, are enacted. That would channel even more children into overworked emergency rooms, where clerical staffs will be forced to turn away even more little Noras.

When I look into the eyes of parents whose children's illnesses are not only taking an emotional toll but exacting a cruel financial cost because they could not afford

insurance, I think, There but for the grace of God go I and everyone I love. The number of Americans who will face these heartbreaks is growing.

Some families who can afford to pay for private insurance are unable to find coverage. In Cleveland, Ohio, I met a couple who have two daughters with cystic fibrosis and a healthy older son. The father, a self-employed professional, provided health insurance to his employees and their families. The family could afford private insurance for themselves and their son and would have bought it for their daughters but could find no one willing to sell them a policy because of the girls' conditions. They repeated to me the words of one insurance agent—words I will never forget as long as I live. "What you don't understand," the agent told them, "is that we don't insure burning houses."

I find this attitude deplorable. What kind of message does it send to hardworking people who love their children but cannot protect them? And if we are willing to write off these children, whose will be next? That is a question for all of us to ponder, because as research in genetics continues to advance, scientists will soon be able to tell us which of our genes predispose us to cancer or diabetes or many other serious diseases. Will those of us who carry such genes and the children we pass them on to eventually be denied insurance too?

When I met seven-year-old Ryan Moore of South Sioux City, Nebraska, I knew I had encountered a young person of heroic disposition. Ryan was born with a congenital syndrome that produces multiple birth defects. His father, Brian, was able to provide his family with good health insurance until Ryan was a year old, when the company Brian worked for went out of business.

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SUSPENSION OF DENVER HEAD START GRANTEE

Summary

On Friday, May 17, Olivia Golden, Commissioner of the Administration on Children, Youth, and Families, travelled to Denver to deliver a letter of suspension to the board of the Denver Head Start grantee, the Child Opportunity Program (COP), and to release the report of a comprehensive review on COP to the press. This year COP had served 2,525 Head Start children with a federal grant of \$9.1 million in a total of 65 different local centers. The suspension action means that, as of Friday, COP has been ordered to cease all operations that are supported by the Head Start grant and will not be authorized to expend any Head Start funds without specific written approval.

Background

This action continues the Administration's commitment to assuring that every child in Head Start receives quality services. Since October of 1993, our zero tolerance of poor quality programs has led to the termination or relinquishment of 40 grantees who were unable to shape up their programs to meet our performance standards. We also have worked successfully to remedy serious problems with another 100 grantees who have been permitted to stay in business.

The decision to suspend the current grant to COP to provide Head Start services in Denver and several adjacent communities was based on a review of the program in April that followed multiple allegations of mismanagement of the program. A team of federal and non-federal staff formed by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) found that COP had failed to fulfill its required responsibilities as a Head Start grantee, failed to comply with the terms and conditions of the grant award, and due to improper fiscal management and lack of appropriate Board or managerial oversight had created a serious risk of substantial loss of project funds and property. The report also documents a fundamental breakdown in COP's governance and management functions and many specific areas of non-compliance with Head Start performance standards. As part of the announcement, ACF has requested the IHSIS Office of Inspector General conduct a comprehensive fiscal audit.

Media and Political Interest

Many of the agency's governance, management, and fiscal problems had been widely-publicized in the local media. Specifically, Eddie Brandon, Chair of COP's Board for more than 25 years, was the subject of more than a dozen critical newspaper articles over several months. Governor Roy Romer and First Lady Bea Romer, active proponents of the Head Start program, both had been critical of COP and had charged the federal government of having ignored long-standing problems with the grantee. Congresswoman Pat Schroeder wrote to the Department in April expressing concern about the problems with the Denver program and supporting our investigation.

Reaction to Suspension

At the Friday meeting with the board members, Commissioner Golden presented the suspension letter and encouraged the board to relinquish the grant. The letter cited the severe problems and gave 14 areas to be corrected in 30 days. If the program fails to correct or meet the satisfaction of ACF, the grantee will be terminated. The board members were unable to reach an agreement among themselves on Friday and told ACF officials that they would get back to the agency. As of this writing, ACF had not received further communication from the board. Under statute, COP has the right to appeal the suspension.

Commissioner Golden spoke with a variety of key people in the Denver community to inform them of our actions and to brief them on the report. All expressed support and a willingness to help. Among those briefed were key staff in the Governor's and Mayor's offices; staff in Congresswoman Schroeder's District office; and the chair and selected members of the Parent Policy Council of COP.

The press coverage of the ACF actions was generally very positive. The report was praised for its depth and thoroughness. The actions were characterized as "came down hard." Reaction from the staff and parents was unanimously and enthusiastically supportive. "Yesterday's news was greeted with exuberance...They let loose with whoops and hollers." HHS was also complimented for the referral to the Inspector General, as many suspected possible criminal violations. The only criticism was that HHS should have acted sooner.

Transition

COP recently completed its program services for the vast majority of children for this year. However, approximately 160 children are participating in a child care component that is funded jointly by Head Start and other sources. The Clayton Foundation has agreed to serve as an interim grantee and will continue services to these children and families, safeguard federal funds and property, and provide continued employment for selected Head Start staff members until a permanent grantee is selected through a competitive process. (The interim arrangement could last up to 12 months, covering the summer and upcoming Head Start year which begins in the fall.) On Friday, Regional office staff met with the Clayton Foundation to plan for a smooth transition in services to children. On Monday, May 20, two experts identified by the national Head Start Bureau will be on the ground in Denver to assist in the transition, including Clennie Murphy, a former Associate Commissioner of the Head Start Bureau.

Federal officials came down hard yesterday on Denver's Head Start agency, demanding a change of leadership, suspending its \$ 10 million grant and blaming chairman Eddie Brandon for creating one of the most seriously damaged preschool programs in the nation.

An investigative team uncovered rampant financial mismanagement, including fraudulent statements to the government and widespread misuse of Head Start money, according to the team's 43-page report. The 30 investigators spent a week in Denver last month after mismanagement was revealed in The Denver Post.

The team's report said the program operates in a "habitual crisis mode," with the clerical staff and 500 teachers toiling in an atmosphere of "suspicion, anxiety and fear."

Brandon and his fellow board members must resign by June 7 or Brandon's agency loses the Head Start grant. Federal officials also demanded the resignations of financial officer Robert Ward and chief accountant Richard Chavez.

Following their practice of the past three months, Brandon and other Head Start officials refused to comment. Reporters who tried to enter Head Start headquarters - a public building - were turned away yesterday by a security guard.

The suspension of the grant is contingent on 14 demands that must be met within 30 days. Among them: The federal government must be repaid for "loans" made with Head Start money for other purposes. Officials did not disclose a dollar amount for the loans, or their alleged purpose.

If the demands are not met in 30 days, the grant will be terminated, and a new agency will be awarded the Head Start grant.

In harsh language, the report details Brandon's repeated violations of government rules. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services also ordered a financial audit by the Office of Inspector General, setting the stage for a possible criminal investigation.

A copy of the report was delivered yesterday to U.S. Attorney Henry Solano,

federal officials said. Solano did not return phone calls seeking comment. A federal official in Washington said the inspector general's staff works closely with the FBI, U.S. attorneys and other law enforcement agencies.

"I believe this is an extremely serious situation," said Olivia Golden, the commissioner for Head Start based in Washington who conducted a press conference in Denver yesterday. In the past, Golden had not personally visited a city to deliver a Head Start report, she said, illustrating the depth of the program's mismanagement.

Of the 40 Head Start programs terminated across the country in the past three years, Denver's was the most serious case she had seen, Golden said.

However, she praised the staff and teachers who serve the program's 2,500 needy children. Likewise, yesterday's report lauded what was described as an overworked and underpaid staff.

"The major strength of the Head Start program is the dedication of the staff, especially the teaching staff," the report said. "With limited resources filtering down to the classrooms, the services provided are commendable."

For the time being, Head Start will be managed by the Clayton Foundation, which runs an Early Head Start program in east Denver. Services to children enrolled in summer programs won't be disrupted. Regular Head Start classes should resume on schedule in late summer. The current school year ended prematurely last week - nearly three weeks early - because the program had run out of money.

Since 1979, all Head Start programs in Denver have been administered by the Child Opportunity Program, a nonprofit agency run by Brandon for the past 28 years. Besides Head Start, Child Opportunity runs a profit-making day-care operation that is improperly financed with Head Start money and equipment, the report said.

Yesterday's news was greeted with exuberance at Head Start headquarters at 2500 Curtis St. Employees gathered at copying machines awaiting their own copies of the report. They let loose with whoops and hollers as they read the contents.

"Then we ordered a mass delivery of pizza," said one employee, still fearful of Brandon's order prohibiting employees from speaking publicly.

Investigators conducted interviews with 304 people last month. "Virtually every person interviewed complained about the role of the board chairman (Brandon) in the operation of the agency," the report said.

Unexplained at yesterday's news conference was how the situation grew so severe, and how Brandon was able to operate with impunity for so long. The report states that problems had festered for more than five years, even though strict guidelines are supposed to be enforced by regional federal officials.

Many Head Start employees said they were ignored when they sought help from local federal officials. Action came only after newspaper reports in the past three months, employees said.

Golden, the Head Start commissioner, repeatedly sidestepped questions about

the regional Health and Human Services office.

"We have taken the appropriate action," she said. Golden would not say what steps, if any, would be taken to ensure that the situation is not repeated. Likewise, she would not say if changes would be ordered at the Denver HHS office.

However, Golden has dispatched a top aide, associate commissioner Clennie Murphy of Washington, to Denver to oversee the Head Start program during the next several weeks. Golden also visited yesterday with the staffs of Gov. Roy Romer and Denver Mayor Wellington Webb, seeking their help in guiding Head Start and restoring its damaged reputation.

Frank Fajardo, the regional HHS official responsible for Denver's Head Start, said he had followed a "corporate approach" to running the program.

"We have done the normal oversight and have asked for the normal corrective actions," Fajardo said. Before he could finish, Fajardo was hustled away by his press secretary.

About a dozen Head Start parents attended yesterday's announcement. Among them, Jackie Montoya said she was pleased with the outcome and enthused about the future.

Sister Rosemary Keegan, a Head Start founder in Denver and longtime critic of Brandon, was also upbeat.

"It's about time," Keegan said. "We've only been working on this thing for about four years. We finally got it accomplished."

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Among the findings in yesterday's federal report on the Denver Head Start program:

Board chairman Eddie Brandon's agency over-reported by \$ 608,904 the amount of matching funds it raised last year. The effect of not meeting the matching-funds requirement for maintaining the Head Start grant means a shortage of program services, equipment and supplies - felt most critically in the classrooms serving 2,500 needy youngsters.

In 1994, Brandon's agency over-reported the matching-funds requirement by \$ 147,160.

Financial officer Robert Ward was employed by the Head Start agency, and also by a nonprofit agency that rented buildings to Head Start. Ward's conflict of interest violates federal regulations.

The nonprofit employing Ward is called Ideal Properties Inc. In 1992, the Head Start agency sold a building in west Denver to Ideal Properties for \$ 10. Immediately, Ideal Properties began charging Head Start \$ 1,000 monthly rent - for a building that the Head Start agency had previously owned. In 1995, Ideal Properties sold the building back to the Head Start agency - for \$ 10.

A federal investigation into Denver's Head Start program has concluded, and results will be announced at a press conference this morning at the downtown federal building.

Olivia Golden, the commissioner for Head Start in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, will arrive today from Washington to announce results and address the media.

Golden also will meet with the board of directors for the Child Opportunity Program, the agency that has administered Head Start in Denver for the past two decades.

Denver's 65 Head Start centers closed prematurely on May 9 after running out of money.

The closure deprived 2,500 youngsters of preschool programs for the rest of May.

The investigation was prompted by a series of stories in The Denver Post over the past three months. The stories detailed management problems, wasteful spending, cronyism and questionable contracts signed by agency chairman Eddie Brandon.

Nineteen former members of Brandon's board of directors recently called for his resignation, terming his leadership "an embarrassment."

Head Start, founded under President Lyndon Johnson in 1965, provides preschool, medical and social services for low-income families.

One of the directors of Ideal Properties is Elvin Caldwell, former Denver councilman and manager of safety who resigned his post in the wake of a police bingo scandal in 1983. In the early 1980s, Caldwell had been accused of taking bribes while he was a councilman, but he never was prosecuted.

Raymond Trujillo, vice-chairman of the Head Start agency, received a major painting contract for the Head Start headquarters building. Trujillo charged Head Start more than the bid, although yesterday's report did not contain the figure. The painting-contract issue was first reported in The Denver Post. Hundreds of thousands of dollars missing; investigators order replacement of board

Federal investigators Friday suspended Denver's Head Start program, ordered that all board members be replaced and named the Clayton Foundation as interim overseer of the preschool program.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars are unaccounted for and must be repaid, said Olivia Golden, who oversees Head Start for the Department of Health and Human Services in Washington, D.C.

"The agency cannot be trusted to manage its financial affairs," she said. "This is an extremely serious situation."

Nationwide, 40 Head Start programs have had their licenses suspended. But Denver's was the first case so serious that Golden felt it necessary to deliver the news in person, she said at HHS regional headquarters in Denver.

The hammer fell heaviest on Eddie Brandon, the longtime board chairman of Denver's Head Start.

A report by a 31-person federal task force that interviewed 305 people in April painted Brandon, 70, as a virtual tyrant who unilaterally decided who would be hired and fired, who would win contracts, and determined how the money was spent. Brandon was chief finance officer and executive director, far exceeding the limits of his power as board chairman, the report said.

"One individual has been permitted to dominate the governing board," said the report. "The chairman was involved inappropriately in personnel actions, grievances and contract awards."

Brandon's meddling and abuse of power caused fund-raising and volunteerism to dry up, and led to the resignations of Head Start's top executives, the report said.

Golden said Head Start's umbrella organization, Child Opportunity Program, has 30 days to replace the board, remove the top fiscal officer and chief accountant, and take several other actions.

If not, Child Opportunity Program's grant to run the program will be terminated and the search for a new permanent non-profit group to run Denver Head Start will begin.

In the interim, the program will be run by the Clayton Foundation, a non-profit group that operates Clayton Charter School in northeast Denver.

Adele Phelan, president of the Clayton Foundation, said her group won't apply to be the permanent oversight agency, but found it hard to say 'no' when asked to fill in. 'We obviously want to do the best job we can for the children of the city,' she said.

Golden also ordered Health and Human Services' inspector general to investigate fiscal improprieties. Findings of fraud could be turned over to the U.S. Attorney for criminal charges.

Parents and former staffers applauded the federal report, urging Brandon and the rest of the board to resign quickly. Most said Child Opportunity Program has enough strength in its volunteers, parents and teachers to continue to run Head Start if it gets the help of a new board.

Parent Jackie Montoya wants a new board to better reflect the ethnic breakdown of the families - half of whom are Hispanic. 'As long as we don't have the same board members and chairman, we'll be OK. We'll be better than OK, we'll be great.'

'I'm ecstatic,' said Bill Evans, former finance officer with Head Start. Fund-raising is essential, because 20% of the annual budget must come from local sources. 'If we can seat a competent board, money will start coming in again.' 'It's amazing the feds allowed this very obvious and enduring of fiscal mismanagement to continue for such a long time,' said John Garcia, former regional director of the federal Office of Child Development.

Brandon could not be reached for comment. Board members plan to meet at 5:30 p.m. Monday at 2500 Curtis St.

Years of pent-up frustration with the management of Denver Head Start erupted in March when the board laid off 32 employees, giving them just two days notice.

In fiscal year 1994, Child Opportunity Program misappropriated \$ 397,000 from the Head Start account, said the report. That's money that should be directed toward preschool classrooms and services for low-income families. Among other findings:

* Bids on contracts weren't always solicited, often were done with a couple of informal phone calls and often weren't awarded to the lowest bidder. The report cited several examples of 'less-than-arms-length' awarding of contracts to which the fiscal officer had ties. * Fire safety inspections are long overdue at most of the 65 classroom sites, a problem that must be addressed immediately. \$ \$ INFOBOX\$ \$% \$ Program will reopen in August\$ \$%\$

Denver Head Start is a federal preschool program serving 2,525 low-income children, ages 3 to 5. It closed for the school year on May 9, more than two weeks earlier than usual. Federal officials said the program will reopen in August, regardless of which group oversees it. For information: 692-3060.

TALKING POINTS ON SUPREME COURT COLORADO DECISION

What did the Court hold?

The Court invalidated a Colorado state constitutional amendment that rescinded and prohibited any state and local laws offering protection from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. The opinion of the Court -- written by Justice Kennedy and joined by Justices Stevens, O'Connor, Souter, Ginsberg and Breyer -- held that the Colorado provision violated the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment.

What is the President's reaction to the decision?

The President believes the decision was appropriate. The Colorado law denied a group of citizens the right to participate effectively in the political process, and the President believes that it is bad public policy to deny rights categorically to any group of Americans. It is also inconsistent with the common values and principles that make our nation strong.

How does this decision affect the government's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy for gays in the military?

We have been advised by the Department of Justice that the Court's decision should have no impact on litigation relating to that policy. In such litigation, the government has argued, and courts have held, that the existing policy bears a rational relationship to legitimate government interests, such as creating and maintaining unit cohesion in the armed forces. The Department believes that nothing in the Court's decision changes that.

What are the implications of the Court's decision with respect to the Defense of Marriage Act -- the gay marriage bill -- that has been introduced in Congress?

We have been advised today by the Department of Justice that the Court's decision does not affect the Department's conclusion that the proposed legislation would survive a constitutional challenge. As I have stated before, the President is opposed to gay marriage.

But didn't the court suggest that a classification -- like a classification of gay marriages envisioned by the Defense of Marriage bill -- is invalid?

No. The Court did not address a bill like the Defense of Marriage Act in its decision. I, of course, can't predict how all of these issues will be decided in the future. But I have been advised that it is still the best judgment of the Justice Department that the Defense of Marriage Act would be upheld if challenged in court.

TALKING POINTS ON SAME-SEX MARRIAGE

Why does the President oppose same sex marriage?

The President believes that marriage is an institution for the union of a man and a woman. This has been his longstanding position, and it is not being reviewed or reconsidered.

The President also believes that issues relating to gays and lesbians should not be used to tear our communities apart. Even on the most difficult social issues we face, we must work together to find common ground. Every American deserves no less.

What is the President's position on the proposed legislation -- the "Defense of Marriage Act" -- on same-sex marriage pending in Congress?

The President is opposed to same sex marriage. The proposed legislation in Congress has not yet been approved, and we don't know if it will be or in what form. But any legislation presented to the President will be reviewed in light of his opposition to same sex marriage.

Will the President's position on the proposed Congressional legislation be affected by yesterday's Supreme Court decision in the Colorado case?

The White House has been advised by the Department of Justice that the Supreme Court's decision does not affect the Department's previously-announced conclusion that the proposed legislation would survive a constitutional challenge. The President is opposed to gay marriage, and any legislation presented to him will be reviewed in light of that position.

But didn't the Supreme Court suggest that a classification -- like a classification of gay marriages envisioned in the proposed Congressional legislation -- is invalid?

The White House has been advised that it is still the best judgment of the Justice Department that the Defense of Marriage Act would be upheld if challenged in court.

Are there steps, such as changing the tax code or immigration laws, or creating domestic partnership benefits for federal workers, that you believe the federal government should take to help gay couples?

The President is aware that many communities and institutions are considering whether certain basic benefits can be provided outside the context of traditional marriage. The challenge in addressing these issues is to remain sensitive to the traditional values of our communities while preserving the fundamental right to live free from unjustified discrimination. In our country's history we have, for good reason, looked first to state and local governments, as well as the private sector, to consider issues like these involving community values and matters of conscience. The President believes that these issues continue to be best resolved at this level of civil discourse.

An increasing number of gays and lesbians are having children, either biologically or through adoption. Is there anything the federal government should do to encourage or discourage gay child rearing?

The most important thing is that children find themselves in loving, healthy and safe environments. State and local officials need to ensure that the best interests of the child are being served. That interest, not the interests of others, is paramount.

WHAT: Colorado's Covenant with Children calls upon faith communities across the state to recall, embrace, and emulate God's loving care for children. Through the Covenant with Children people of faith denounce the great injustice happening to children. We steadfastly commit to mobilize our communities to meet the physical, moral and spiritual needs of children and their families. Colorado's Covenant with Children envisions a state in which every child is held in the loving hands of community.

WHO: The Covenant is a four-year initiative of the Colorado Council of Churches created to improve the plight of children by the year 2000.

WHY: Leaders of Colorado's faith communities have issued this call in response to the unprecedented crisis facing our children. We believe all children deserve to:

- be raised in stable, nurturing families;
- have sufficient food to help grow into strong, healthy adults;
- have health care to assure healthy bodies;
- receive spiritual and moral guidance;
- receive an education that instills a love of learning and hope for the future, and;
- live lives free of violence.

HOW: The Covenant envisions a state that creates: *a spiritual community* in which people aspire to teach their children a common set of virtues based on respect for themselves and others; *a moral community* in which no child goes hungry, no child is homeless, and no child experiences the degradation of violence or neglect; and *a supportive community* which nurtures a lifelong capacity for learning and in which families and children rejoice in the hospitality of others.

Over a four-year period the Covenant will provide forums for congregations to come together to provide children's services to their communities. Local congregations will have assistance in identifying children's needs and gathering resources to address them. The issues include child care; parenting support/education; child advocacy; access to health care; education; violence prevention/intervention; community service; housing; coalition building; teaching respect and tolerance of cultural and religious traditions; and much more.

WHEN: Colorado's Covenant with Children will kickoff with two events in 1996. The July 12 event will include field trips to church based children's programs and a dinner featuring a national speaker. The September event will include a weekend of meetings, national and local speakers, and a large interfaith worship service. The goal of this weekend is to prepare leadership from each congregation to begin work on their four-year community based children's programs.

WHERE: The majority of events for both weekends will take place in Denver, Colorado.
