IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN ALABAMA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Alabama

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Alabama's over 630,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$3,775 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$7,550 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Alabama by \$8 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 544,000 recipients. Alabama would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 102,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Alabama

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 3,525 children in Alabama in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 23,200 students in Alabama.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Alabama funding for as many as 298 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 128 out of 130 school districts in Alabama use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 63,700 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 9,100 graduate students in Alabama. Denies Pell Grants to 7,400 students in Alabama in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 692 young people in Alabama the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 9,518 Alabama youths in 1996 and 66,626 Alabama youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Alabama

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 365,109 working families in Alabama by an average of \$256 in 1996. For 197,083 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$332.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$14.6 million and denies training opportunities to 6,159 dislocated workers in Alabama in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN ALASKA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Alaska

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Alaska's over 32,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$1,350 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$2,700 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Alaska by \$595 million.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 69,000 recipients. Alaska would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 22,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Alaska

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 294 children in Alaska in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 1,300 students in Alaska.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Alaska funding for as many as 81 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 52 out of 56 school districts in Alaska use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 3,900 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 600 graduate students in Alaska. Denies Pell Grants to 500 students in Alaska in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 364 young people in Alaska the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 1,471 Alaska youths in 1996 and 10,297 Alaska youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Alaska

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 18,350 working families in Alaska by an average of \$203 in 1996. For 9,905 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$246.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$3.0 million and denies training opportunities to 1,290 dislocated workers in Alaska in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN ARIZONA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Arizona

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Arizona's over 577,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$2,775 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$5,550 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Arizona by \$7 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 510,000 recipients. Arizona would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 110,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Arizona

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 2,400 children in Arizona in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 17,300 students in Arizona.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Arizona funding for as many as 264 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 198 out of 222 school districts in Arizona use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 91,600 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 13,100 graduate students in Arizona. Denies Pell Grants to 6,600 students in Arizona in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 696 young people in Arizona the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 7,411 Arizona youths in 1996 and 51,877 Arizona youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Arizona

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 253,967 working families in Arizona by an average of \$242 in 1996. For 137,089 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$310.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$10.9 million and denies training opportunities to 4,594 dislocated workers in Arizona in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN ARKANSAS

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Arkansas

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Arkansas's over 416,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$1,875 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$3,750 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Arkansas by \$5 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 340,000 recipients. Arkansas would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 122,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Arkansas

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 2,201 children in Arkansas in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 15,000 students in Arkansas.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Arkansas funding for as many as 181 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 318 out of 319 school districts in Arkansas use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 38,400 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 5,500 graduate students in Arkansas. Denies Pell Grants to 3,600 students in Arkansas in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 368 young people in Arkansas the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 4,892 Arkansas youths in 1996 and 34,244 Arkansas youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Arkansas

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 192,736 working families in Arkansas by an average of \$244 in 1996. For 104,037 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$313.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$6.0 million and denies training opportunities to 2,521 dislocated workers in Arkansas in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN CALIFORNIA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in California

- **Increases Medicare Premiums:** Each of California's over 3.6 million Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$4,100 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$8,200 more.
- **Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding:** Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to California by \$54 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 5.0 million recipients. California would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 1.2 million recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in California

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 17,233 children in California in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 236,100 students in California.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies California funding for as many as 2,061 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 1,049 out of 1,064 school districts in California use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 430,800 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 61,500 graduate students in California. Denies Pell Grants to 34,500 students in California in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 5,883 young people in California the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 93,584 California youths in 1996 and 655,088 California youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in California

• **Increases Taxes For Working Families:** Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 2,045,255 working families in California by an average of \$245 in 1996. For 1,104,012 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$315.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$194.5 million and denies training opportunities to 81,631 dislocated workers in California in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN COLORADO

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Colorado

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Colorado's over 409,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$3,000 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$6,000 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Colorado by \$5 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 289,000 recipients. Colorado would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 97,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Colorado

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 1,972 children in Colorado in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 6,900 students in Colorado.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Colorado funding for as many as 205 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 176 out of 176 school districts in Colorado use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 90,500 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 12,900 graduate students in Colorado. Denies Pell Grants to 5,100 students in Colorado in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 1,112 young people in Colorado the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 5,092 Colorado youths in 1996 and 35,644 Colorado youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Colorado

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 165,022 working families in Colorado by an average of \$233 in 1996. For 89,077 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$294.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$7.9 million and denies training opportunities to 3,356 dislocated workers in Colorado in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN CONNECTICUT

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Connecticut

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Connecticut's over 497,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$3,250 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$6,500 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Connecticut by \$5 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 354,000 recipients. Connecticut would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 74,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Connecticut

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 1,374 children in Connecticut in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 9,200 students in Connecticut.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Connecticut funding for as many as 165 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 170 out of 175 school districts in Connecticut use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 49,300 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 7,000 graduate students in Connecticut. Denies Pell Grants to 2,200 students in Connecticut in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 691 young people in Connecticut the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 5,174 Connecticut youths in 1996 and 36,218 Connecticut youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Connecticut

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 79,861 working families in Connecticut by an average of \$217 in 1996. For 43,108 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$269.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$11.2 million and denies training opportunities to 4,711 dislocated workers in Connecticut in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN DELAWARE

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Delaware

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Delaware's over 98,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$3,350 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$6,700 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Delaware by \$1 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 75,000 recipients. Delaware would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 21,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Delaware

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 354 children in Delaware in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 1,500 students in Delaware.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Delaware funding for as many as 64 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 19 out of 19 school districts in Delaware use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 10,000 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 1,400 graduate students in Delaware. Denies Pell Grants to 600 students in Delaware in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 173 young people in Delaware the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 1,356 Delaware youths in 1996 and 9,492 Delaware youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Delaware

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 35,468 working families in Delaware by an average of \$237 in 1996. For 19,146 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$302.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$1.7 million and denies training opportunities to 748 dislocated workers in Delaware in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in District of Columbia

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to District of Columbia by \$5 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 127,000 recipients. District of Columbia would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 20,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in District of Columbia

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 690 children in District of Columbia in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 2,500 students in District of Columbia.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies District of Columbia funding for as many as 70 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 1 school district in District of Columbia use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 37,200 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 5,300 graduate students in District of Columbia. Denies Pell Grants to 900 students in District of Columbia in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 223 young people in District of Columbia the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 2,029 District of Columbia youths in 1996 and 14,203 District of Columbia youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in District of Columbia

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 48,005 working families in District of Columbia by an average of \$241 in 1996. For 25,913 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$309.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$3.7 million and denies training opportunities to 1,560 dislocated workers in District of Columbia in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN FLORIDA

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Florida

Increases Medicare Premiums: Each of Florida's over 2.6 million Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$4,400 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$8,800 more.

Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding: Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Florida by \$38 billion.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 1.7 million recipients. Florida would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 706,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Florida

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 6,654 children in Florida in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 35,500 students in Florida.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Florida funding for as many as 770 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 72 out of 72 school districts in Florida use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 184,500 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 26,400 graduate students in Florida. Denies Pell Grants to 16,200 students in Florida in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 1,960 young people in Florida the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 26,608 Florida youths in 1996 and 186,256 Florida youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Florida

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 863,418 working families in Florida by an average of \$244 in 1996. For 466,066 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$314.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$51.3 million and denies training opportunities to 21,542 dislocated workers in Florida in 1996.

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 178,656 working families in Wisconsin by an average of \$227 in 1996. For 96,437 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$286.

Denies Job Training: Cuts funding by \$7.9 million and denies training opportunities to 3,333 dislocated workers in Wisconsin in 1996.

IMPACT OF REPUBLICAN BUDGET CUTS ON OLDER AMERICANS, STUDENTS, AND WORKING FAMILIES IN WYOMING

Impact on Older and Disabled Americans in Wyoming

- **Increases Medicare Premiums:** Each of Wyoming's over 59,000 Medicare beneficiaries would pay at least \$800 more in premiums and copayments over the 7 years; couples would pay at least \$1,600 more.
- **Reduces Medicare and Medicaid Funding:** Over the seven-year period, the combined Medicare and Medicaid cuts would reduce Federal health care dollars to Wyoming by \$424 million.

Cuts Coverage for Elderly, Children, and Disabled: Loss in Medicaid funding to the state would have a devastating impact on the state's current 51,000 recipients. Wyoming would be forced to eliminate coverage for as many as 15,000 recipients in 2002, many of whom may be elderly, nursing home residents, or home care recipients.

Impact on Students in Wyoming

Cuts Head Start: Denies Head Start to 180,000 children nationwide and 321 children in Wyoming in 2002 compared to 1995.

Cuts Funding for Basic and Advanced Skills: Cuts funding by \$1.1 billion in 1996, denying this crucial assistance to 1.1 million students nationwide and 900 students in Wyoming.

Halts Progress on GOALS 2000: Eliminates Goals 2000 and denies Wyoming funding for as many as 64 schools.

Eliminates Safe and Drug Free Schools: Republicans want to gut the program, which 49 out of 49 school districts in Wyoming use to keep crime, violence, and drugs away from students and out of schools.

Denies Access to College: Raises costs for student loans by \$10 billion over 7 years. This could raise the cost of college education by as much as \$2,111 for 11,800 college students and as much as \$9,424 for 1,700 graduate students in Wyoming. Denies Pell Grants to 800 students in Wyoming in 1996 alone, possibly forcing them to drop out of college.

Ends National Service: Eliminates AmeriCorps and denies 146 young people in Wyoming the chance to serve in 1996.

Slashes Summer Jobs: Eliminates summer jobs, denying meaningful employment to 1,356 Wyoming youths in 1996 and 9,492 Wyoming youths over 7 years. Also drastically cuts the President's school-to-work initiative.

Impact on Working Families in Wyoming

Increases Taxes For Working Families: Cuts the EITC program, increasing taxes for 22,938 working families in Wyoming by an average of \$229 in 1996. For 12,382 families with two or more children, the average tax increase in 1996 would be \$288
