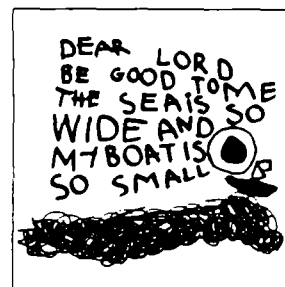

Transforming certain key means-tested "entitlement" programs (food stamps, school lunches and other child nutrition programs, Medicaid, AFDC, and Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, among others) into block grants would do incalculable damage to America's children and families, states' finances, and the nation's future.

These entitlement programs exist to make sure that eligible children are served; that emergencies can be responded to flexibly; and that the nation fulfills its commitment to children and families facing hard times. They are ill-suited to treatment as block grants:

- 1) **If safety net programs are funded as block grants, children and states will suffer when recessions or emergencies create increased demand for services or assistance.** States will have to choose whether to turn away tens of thousands of needy applicants, many of them children, or to dramatically reduce benefits for everyone, or to pay billions of dollars for the rapid growth of the program out of their own declining revenues. Recessions could be prolonged and deepened in individual states.
- 2) **The block grant proposals would dismantle programs that have proven records of success in helping reduce hunger, malnutrition, infant mortality and ill health among children and that were made into federal guarantees because children suffered when the federal government provided funds but no leadership or standards.**
- 3) **Without assurance that all who meet the standards in the law will obtain the benefits of the program, there will be long waiting lists for equally needy families when funds run out.** Even successful and popular programs like Head Start and WIC, while not entitlements, are typically so squeezed for funds that they only serve one half or fewer of eligible children and have long waiting lists.
- 4) **History shows that block grants tend to shrink over time, since Congressional interest in them wanes.** From 1982 to 1995, for example, the Community Services, Title XX Social Services, Preventive Health, and Chapter II Education block grants shrank 49%, 28%, 7%, and 53%, respectively, in inflation-adjusted dollars.
- 5) **While states need more discretion in a variety of areas and programs, certain basic needs of children should be met in every state and every community.** Children in this nation should not be penalized based on where they live.
- 6) **While most states will act responsibly, not all will at all times.** Some states, for example, in the past have denied aid on the basis of race or national origin; others have denied aid in recent times to working poor families or two-parent families or have erected huge barriers to child support enforcement services for children born out of wedlock.
- 7) **Investments in children often have payoffs that, because they are long-term, help the nation more than they help individual states, and therefore are harder to get states to make.**

Why Safety Net Entitlements Must Not Be Converted Into Block Grants

A number of proposals are being circulated that would transform key means-tested "entitlement" programs (food stamps, school lunches and other child nutrition programs, Medicaid, AFDC, and Foster Care and Adoption Assistance, among others) into block grants. **Such a transformation of these key safety net programs would do incalculable damage to America's children and families, states' finances, and the nation's future.**

These programs exist to make sure that eligible needy children are served; that emergencies can be responded to flexibly; and that the nation fulfills its commitment to children and families facing hard times. They are ill-suited to treatment as block grants.

Some of the proposals to consolidate groups of federal discretionary spending programs, if carefully crafted, could improve services for Americans and make government more efficient. **But block grants must not be used as a means to unravel the safety net for a number of fundamental reasons:**

1) **If safety net programs are funded as block grants, children and states will suffer when recessions or emergencies create increased demand for services or assistance.** The structure of the existing programs allows elasticity. The needs-based programs grow when need grows, as in recessions or after natural disasters like floods and earthquakes. Program participation then declines when need abates. If such programs are converted into block grants with capped funds, this stabilizing effect will be abandoned and states will have impossible choices during recessions and other emergencies: they will have to choose whether to turn away tens of thousands of needy applicants, many of them children, or to dramatically reduce benefits for everyone, or to pay for the rapid growth of the program out of their own declining revenues. Recessions could be prolonged and deepened in individual states, and therefore in the nation as a whole. Federal allocations would be misdirected -- states hard hit by recession would get no more funds while states with vibrant economies would get no less. Creating a block grant does not do away with the needs of children and families; it just leaves states with impossible choices in hard times.

2) **The block grant proposals would dismantle programs that have proven records of success in helping children and that were made into federal guarantees because children suffered when the federal government provided funds but no leadership.** The Food Stamp program, which has reduced hunger and malnutrition for millions of children, is one example of why federal leadership is essential. In the late 1960s, doctors working with HEW's "Ten State Nutrition Survey" found that low income children in some parts of the country were suffering from nutritional deficiency diseases at rates comparable to children in underdeveloped countries. At that time, states were left to set their own income eligibility and benefit levels for food stamps, even though the program was 100% federally funded. Many states set very low limits, and some of the poorest counties in the nation declined to operate a program at all. The findings about child hunger shocked the nation, and led President Nixon to institute national food stamp standards. When doctors returned ten years later to the areas they had studied, they found hunger and malnutrition had been reduced dramatically, with the Food Stamp program a major reason for this progress. A block grant that abdicates federal leadership ignores these important lessons. And, if states failed to meet the need when the federal government footed the entire bill, the pressure to slash benefits for children would be even worse under a block grant that reduced federal funding and left states to pick up the slack.

3) **Without assurance that all who meet the standards in the law will obtain the benefits offered, there will be long waiting lists for equally needy families when funds run out.** The safety net programs promise that children can get subsistence benefits so long as they meet stringent legislatively-defined tests. Block grant proposals would do away with this commitment, giving states little choice but to turn children away without help when fixed funds run out, even though the children meet all the stringent standards for help and would have been helped the week or month before. Waiting lists are standard for low-income children's programs that are not entitlements. Even successful and popular programs like Head Start and WIC are typically so squeezed for funds that they only serve one half or fewer of the eligible children. The specter of long waiting lists for help with food, shelter or health care is not mere speculation; indeed, one central provision of the AFDC and Medicaid laws -- that aid shall be furnished "with reasonable promptness to all eligible individuals" -- was enacted precisely because many states used to have such waiting lists for subsistence benefits. Especially in programs for the nation's neediest children, people who meet program rules should not be denied help because they applied too late in the year after money ran out, or live in the wrong state or county, or face some other arbitrary barrier unrelated to their need or the program's purposes.

4) **History shows that federal block grants tend to shrink over time.** Whether because their purposes become diluted, or because it is hard to sustain federal funds for a program in which states make all the decisions, block grants tend to shrink. From 1982 to 1995, for example, the Community Services, Title XX Social Services, Preventive Health, and Chapter II Education block grants shrank 49%, 28%, 7% and 53%, respectively, in inflation-adjusted dollars. Similar shrinkage in the decade ahead in safety net entitlement programs would mean millions of children without food,

clothing, shelter and health care, or tens of billions of dollars of costs shifted to the states, or both.

5) While states need more discretion in a variety of areas and programs, certain basic needs of children should be met in every state and every community. Children in this nation should not be penalized based on where they live. We are one nation with a common commitment to humane treatment of each other. Just as we have made and kept national promises to provide basic help to the elderly and veterans, we should keep our national promise to children. Whether a child's most basic subsistence or health needs are met must not depend on the state of her residence or the month of her destitution. Making sure that children are healthy and not hungry and not abused or neglected must be as much a national priority in Mississippi as in Minnesota, in New Mexico as in New York. When the federal government is providing one half or more of the funds, moreover, there is additional reason that states should be held accountable to these national commitments.

6) While most states will act responsibly, not all will at all times. Before federal standards were applied, state and local governments often denied aid to poor families because they were black or had Eastern European origins. While such denials would be far less common today, other forms of arbitrary decision-making persist, denying aid to penniless families and leaving children hungry, homeless, and without health care. When states had the option to extend Medicaid to children in working poor families as well as in welfare families, only about one third did so. And even though all evidence shows that denying AFDC to two-parent families fosters family dissolution (as well as leaving the children with no safety net benefits), half of the states had no two-parent AFDC program before Congress acted in 1988 to require it. Another example is child support enforcement: until federal standards took effect, many states did not allow children born out of wedlock to pursue support from their fathers, or put other major roadblocks in the way of child support enforcement.

7) Investments in children often have payoffs that, because they are long-term, help the nation more than they help individual states, and therefore are harder to get states to make. There are important pay-offs from preventive health care, sound nutrition, and services that strengthen families and protect children. But in fiscal terms, some of the savings are reaped 5, 10 and 20 years after the initial investment. States know that huge numbers of families move out of their jurisdictions over such a 5, 10 or 20 year period, reducing significantly the return to the states of their investment. It is the nation that gains the most from and must make the commitment to the investment. It is also the nation that loses the most if these investments are not made at adequate levels and to all children in need.
