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CURRENT AND POTENTIAL AGENCY ROLES (10/27/93)

Below is a first draft of existing and potential agency roles in promoting the NII and its applications. This list is not intended to be exhaustive -- merely intended to demonstrate the broad impact of the NII on agency missions. Many agencies play a role in the High Performance Computing and Communications Initiative, which is helping to develop the technology for the NII.

RE: STRUCTURE OF THE INFORMATION INFRASTRUCTURE TASK FORCE
AND NEXT STEPS

The Administration is committed to formulating and implementing forward-looking telecommunications and information policies that will accelerate the development of a National Information Infrastructure (NII). The NII, consisting of high-speed telecommunications networks, computers, and data bases, will allow Americans to access the information they need, when and where they need it. To accomplish this goal, the White House, under the aegis of the National Economic Council (NEC) and the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP), has formed the Information Infrastructure Task Force (IITF), which will be chaired by the Secretary of Commerce.

For the last few months, our staff have been meeting with agency staff to lay the groundwork for the task force and to develop an agenda. This memo outlines the structure of the IITF and a tentative schedule for the next two months.

Mission of the IITF

As outlined in our May 24 memo, the IITF will be responsible for articulating and implementing the Administration's vision for the NII. It will consist primarily of sub-Cabinet officials from those agencies involved in telecommunications and information policy. Attached is a list of agencies that have expressed an interest in participating in the IITF along with the names and phone numbers of the principals and key staffers involved.

The task force will address a variety of issues, including regulatory policy, government information policy, and government policies which will promote applications of the NII in areas such as health, education and life-long learning, and electronic commerce.

The first task of the IITF will be to develop a vision document outlining the Administration's strategy for accelerating the development of the NII. This document will be similar to "Technology for America's Economic Growth", the February 22nd statement which

provides the framework for the Administration's technology policies. NTIA is taking the lead in developing this document, which will be circulated for review by the IITF members and their staff.

Structure of the IITF

The IITF itself will be chaired by the Secretary of Commerce. Much of the staff work for the task force will be done by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) and other agencies within the Department of Commerce.

We anticipate that the full IITF will only meet 3-6 times per year. Most of the work of the IITF will be done by the following three committees on telecommunications policy, information policy, and applications:

1. Telecommunications Policy Committee.

Chair: Larry Irving, Assistant Secretary for Communications and Information

Task: Develop Administration positions on key telecommunications policy issues such as competition in local exchange and cable television service, Modified Final Judgement, cable-telco cross-ownership, universal access and service, and relationship between federal and state regulators. The immediate task of this group will be to develop the Administration's position on S. 1086, the Telecommunications Infrastructure Act, introduced recently by Senators Danforth and Inouye. The first hearing on the bill is scheduled for July 15.

2. Information Policy Committee.

Chair: Sally Katzen, Administrator, OMB's Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs. This committee will have three working groups:

- a. **Working Group on Intellectual Property Rights** will develop proposals for protecting copyrights and other IPR in an electronic world. Chaired by the Patent and Trademark Office, Department of Commerce.
- b. **Working Group on Privacy** will develop proposals to protect individual privacy in the context of rapid increases in the collection, storage, and dissemination of personal data in electronic form.
- c. **Working Group on Federal Information** will focus on ways to promote dissemination of Federal data in electronic form. Chaired by OMB.

3. **Committee on Applications**

Chair: Arati Prabhakar, Director, NIST

Task: Coordinate Administration efforts to demonstrate and promote applications of information technology in electronic commerce, education, health care, government services, libraries, and other areas. This group will work closely with the Federal Coordinating Council on Science, Engineering and Technology (FCCSET) Subcommittee on High-Performance Computing and Communications and Information Technology, which coordinates federal programs for development of new applications technology, to determine how Administration policies can best promote the deployment of such technologies.

Advisory Mechanisms:

1. A high-level private sector advisory group will be established to provide advice to the IITF. It will consist of representatives of the many different stakeholders in the NII.
2. For advice on information technology issues, the IITF will often turn to agencies participating in the High Performance Computing and Communications Program, which is coordinated by OSTP. Some of the members of the coordinating committee for that program will also serve on the IITF and its working groups, ensuring close communication between the two groups.
3. A private sector advisory group is being established to provide technical input to the HPCC Program.

Timetable/Next steps

1. **July:** Each of the three committees will meet to agree on a workplan and to start to address the key issues they face. These meetings are scheduled for:

2. **July:** Drafts of the vision document will be circulated for review and comment.
3. **Early August:** A meeting of the full Information Infrastructure Task Force is planned. This meeting would held to review the vision document, the committee workplans, and develop an agenda for the remainder of 1993.
