Somali Peaceford

OMER ARTEH GHALIB sits cross-legged on the cushioned floor of the *maglis* (guest receiving room) in a Riyadh villa, sipping *gahuwa turquia* (Turkish coffee), quietly speaking fluent Arabic with a visitor. He is, clearly, completely at home in his surroundings. A month later, Arteh, prime minister of the provisional government of the Somali Republic, is sitting on a sofa in a drawing room in Washington, sipping instant Folger's, quietly speaking idiomatically fluent English with the same visitor. He is equally comfortable, and equally determined that he be understood—and accepted—on his terms: leader of the Isaaq, the dominant northern Somali tribe; head of government of the extremely fragile provisional national government; at once peace-seeker and damper of those who would further damage his brutally destroyed land.

The prime minister has spent the last seven months outside Somalia with four senior members of his cabinet, quietly stating the case for peaceful confederation of his tortured peoples; firmly identifying the difference between most of the tribal elders and the relatively few "warlords."

"Why can't your colleagues take the time to learn that there really are very few leaders who are wedded to war in our country? It seems to be the same 'instant expert' issue that causes them to so thoroughly misunderstand our tribal culture. (Incidentally, we have *tribes* in Africa, not some derivation of Scottish 'clans,' as the press seems determined to call them.)"

"Our president, Ali Mahdi, for instance, has always been as dedicated to a peaceful resolution of our troubles as he is today. On the other hand, the so-called General Farah Aidid has always been a cut-throat. None of us ever trusted him, not even Siad Barre when Aidid was chief of his presidential guard."

"Can we forget so soon that, while I was writing Boutros Boutros-Ghali

urging a peacekeeping role, Aidid's troops were forcibly taking control of the warehouses where most of the humanitarian relief supplies were stored? For him, the worst thing possible was for UN forces, not to mention inquiring journalists, to be on the scene in Mogadisho."

Omer Arteh is unfazed when questioned why he was not in Mogadisho during the critical weeks before and during the arrival of UN forces.

"Ali Mahdi and I are in daily contact; he and our other leaders are handling the domestic political issues very capably. My primary job, for now, is to achieve some reasonable international understanding of the Somali political situation, at the same time as I try to keep the northern and southern portions of the country together."

"The issue of maintaining the Somali Republic is very delicate. We are having a meeting of the elders of the northern tribes in Borama, on the 25th of January, where we will review all our political options." The northern tribes account for 55 percent of Somalia's ten million citizens; of these, the Isaaq, of which Arteh is leader, is far and away the largest.

"In the north, we are frankly very frustrated. Many of our people, as you know, wanted total and immediate independence. I hope to convince them to continue to give a chance to the Somali Republic."

"We pray that in any case there will be no more war. We have always wanted peace and free association of the peoples of our land; it is only a very few who have tried to take power by force."

"You know, Farah Aidid is really a very special case. He attended the meetings in Mogadisho in April, when we did the impossible: the leaders of six armed movements came together and agreed to cease hostilities. When the council of one hundred elders selected the provisional government, Aidid was one of six signatories to the declaration that announced the government's formation and our initial decree, including a commitment to democracy, to the free market, and to the West."

"Nevertheless, within one week he

came to me and pressed me to force Ali Mahdi to resign as president, and to support him for the job! Then, only a few days after I left on my foreign mission, Aidid's troops launched attacks against his own tribe's people, who were Ali Mahdi's main support, and in the process utterly devastated Mogadisho."

Arteh is no stranger to coping in difficult circumstances. He recalls Siad Barre's sudden change of direction (he was serving Barre as foreign minister at the time). "In the early days, we all supported Barre; he seemed compassionate, committed to the peaceful, free-market development of our land. Slowly, however, his personality changed, until, on a quickly arranged visit to Moscow in 1976, he said to me that it was clear that the Soviets had the solution to society's ills."

"He took me completely by surprise. He had been totally snubbed by Brezhnev during our visit. I said to Barre, 'The man has humiliated you and our nation, and what's more, the Soviet Union does not work. When we were in New York, you could not believe the wealth and comfort of everyone; here, I cannot believe the poverty and disillusionment on the faces of everyone I see!'"

"Back in Mogadisho, without telling any of his cabinet, he announced over the radio that Somalia was thenceforth to be a socialist state. Within a week I was removed as foreign minister and given the expedient position of minister of higher education. Ultimately, he broke no opposition whatever, and had me thrown in jail for six long years"—a prisoner in solitary confinement.

The calling card of the provisional prime minister of the Somali Republic has no address. Under the name and title, at the bottom, the word "Telephone" is printed, followed by a space for the number, wherever he may be. "I am determined," Omer Arteh notes, half wryly, half wistfully, "to be able to print a card with full and permanent contact particulars, very soon. I do hope the city location will be Mogadisho, but if not, it will be Bargaana, our northern regional capital." —IAN ALEXANDER

Reinforcement and Realignment in Somalia

The two Marine Expeditionary Units that the President ordered to Somalia have arrived off its coast. They include 3600 Marines, helicopters, and armored vehicles. Also included in each group is a Special Operations capability.

With this force present, the President has approved the recommendation of the Secretary of Defense that U.S. Army Special Operations Command elements (Rangers) be returned to the United States within the next few days.

This rotation of forces is part of the overall reinforcement that the President ordered to insure that U.S. forces in Somalia are fully protected. The reinforcement has also included the introduction of over 2500 U.S. Army personnel and their armored vehicles, and the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln.

Subject: Contracting of Logistics functions in Somalia

1. Purpose. To update the DJS on the status of UN and USG contracting in Somalia.

2. Key Points

- UN Contracting:

- As stated in a 12 March 93 SYG request to the US/UN, the logistics capability provided by the US military was requested to remain in place until other member nations or UN civilian contractors could replace the US logistics force structure. USG and UN high level demarches failed to produce logistics commitments from other member states to replace this force structure.

- Discussions have been held and are continuing between US and UN personnel regarding the contracting of these US military logistics functions. To date, two contracts (food and fuel) have been discussed, however, neither is close to implementation. The food contract has recently undergone UN legal review and will require substantial revision as a result. The UN is hesitant to further pursue the fuel contract and any new contracts for the following reasons:

- The UN is financially constrained at the present time and contracting is an expensive option.

- The security situation has made contracting cost prohibitive.

- The UN is hesitant to contract and thereby release US logistics structure until the UN resolution for the whole country has been achieved. In fact, prior to the President's withdrawal announcement, the UN was poised to ask for additional US logistics structure to help fulfill the mandate.

- Inability of the UN to pay a civilian contractor will result in the contractor ceasing to perform the logistics function. Inability of the UN to pay the USG will not necessarily cause the logistics function to cease.

- The UN HQ and in-country staffs are undermanned to accommodate the volume of workload for the contracting effort.

- Finally, continued US involvement with military force structure enhances the chance of continued participation of other national contingents in UNOSOM.

- In order to assist the UN with logistics and contract planning in general, the USG has provided nine subject matter experts to UN HQ for a period of 60-75 days to facilitate this process for the future.

- USG Contracting:

- J4 was tasked to develop the following option: USG expands the existing LOGCAP contract with Brown & Root to assume some or all US logistics functions. This contract expansion would be tailored to assume those logistics functions not covered by existing UN contracts or logistics capabilities that may be provided by other UNOSOM contributing countries. This option should allow US logistics personnel strength to reduce to approximately 1400 NLT 31 December 93 and to 0 NLT 31 March 94.

- Based on informal discussions with Brown & Root, they can assume the responsibility for all logistics functions within approximately 6 weeks of authorization. Estimated costs are approximately \$20-25 million for start up costs and approximately \$12-15 million for monthly operation costs. Total estimated cost for a 13 month contract (Nov 93 to Dec 94) is approximately \$220 million. In order to meet the established timeframes, the drop dead date for turning on the contractor is NLT 15 November 93.

- Several problems are associated with this option:

- USG Equipment: In order to meet the Presidential drawdown timeframes, the USG will be required to leave most of its present logistics equipment in Somalia for use by the contractor. The actual type/quantity of equipment must be worked out between the contractor and the USG. This equipment would be provided to the contractor as Government Furnished Equipment (GFE) and at the conclusion of the contract, the equipment would be returned to the USG.

- Contractor Security: Brown & Root does not provide its own security. The present contract that expires 6 Dec 93, requires that the USG provide this security. Additionally, the present contract is being modified to read "The Government will provide necessary security for Contractor personnel throughout the Theater of Operations (TO). This includes security at the contractor's work sites and living/messing areas, movement throughout the TO and ingress and egress to the TO as deemed appropriate by the in theater Contracting Officer's Representative." With a political reconciliation and cessation of violence, an off shore QRF may be able to provide this security. With the resumption of violence now or after 31 Mar 94 (US withdrawal), the contract would require security by possibly US forces or other competent, well equipped and well trained forces.

•• Terms of Reference (TOR): A TOR was signed on 29 April 93 between General Hoar and LTG Bir, UNOSOM Force Commander. Chapter 20 of title 10, United States Code is amended by adding the following new section 404.

Section 404. Funds for contracting support to United Nations Operations in Somalia.

For the expenses of arrangements with U.S. commercial contractors to provide logistical support, supplies, services and equipment to United Nations Forces conducting operations in Somalia, for transfer to appropriations available to the Department of Defense for operations and maintenance; \$220,000,000: Provided that the funds appropriated by this paragraph shall be available for obligation for the same time period as the appropriation to which transferred: Provided further, that the transfer authority provided in this paragraph is in addition to any transfer authority contained elsewhere in this Act.

_____. _____, to remain available until expended, is appropriated to the "Somalia Contingency Fund" which is hereby established on the books of the Treasury: Provided, That amounts in the Fund may be transferred to appropriations of the Department of Defense for expenses of the Department of Defense incurred for incremental costs in connection with carrying out operations in Somalia and for implementation of the United States' strategy for withdrawal of the United States armed forces participation in such operations. Such transfer authority is in addition to other transfer authority provided in this Act: Provided further, That reimbursements from the United Nations or any other source for United States armed forces expenses incurred during fiscal year 1994 in connection with military operations in Somalia shall be deposited to the Fund and shall be available for transfer from the Fund to the extent provided in appropriations and authorization Acts.

For the expenses of arrangements with U.S. commercial contractors to provide logistical support, supplies, services and equipment to United Nations Forces conducting operations in Somalia, for transfer to appropriations available to the Department of Defense for operations and maintenance; \$220,000,000: Provided that the funds appropriated by this paragraph shall be available for obligation for the same time period as the appropriation to which transferred: Provided further, that the transfer authority provided in this paragraph is in addition to any transfer authority contained elsewhere in this Act.

_____. _____, to remain available until expended, is appropriated to the "Somalia Contingency Fund" which is hereby established on the books of the Treasury: Provided, That amounts in the Fund may be transferred to appropriations of the Department of Defense for expenses of the Department of Defense incurred for incremental costs in connection with carrying out operations in Somalia and for implementation of the United States' strategy for withdrawal of the United States armed forces participation in such operations. Such transfer authority is in addition to other transfer authority provided in this Act: Provided further, That reimbursements from the United Nations or any other source for United States armed forces expenses incurred during fiscal year 1994 in connection with military operations in Somalia shall be deposited to the Fund and shall be available for transfer from the Fund to the extent provided in appropriations and authorization Acts.
