Dear Mr. Leader:

Thank you for your thoughtful letter on Somalia.

You can be sure that I am dedicated to the safety of our forces in Somalia, and that I will remain vigilant until the last U.S. soldier, sailor and marine is withdrawn. In keeping with this mandate, I have ordered that sufficient combat capability be introduced into Somalia to ensure the security of all our personnel there.

I believe you will find that the Report to Congress on Somalia which I recently sent to you addresses your concerns. It clearly addresses the mission of U.S. forces, our commitment to that mission, and the plan for finishing it the right way. The trips of Ambassador Oakley to Somalia and neighboring countries are the beginning of what I hope to be successful resumption of a political process to meet the challenges faced in Somalia.

Congressional support for our new policy in Somalia is essential in the coming months not only for our foreign policy, but for the effectiveness and safety of our people in Somalia. I look forward to working with you to assure success in this important mission.

Dear Mr. President:

We are gravely concerned by the worsening crisis in Somalia that ever more deeply involves the United States. Although Administration consultation with us has been minimal, we must provide you with our views. The escalating loss of American lives in an ill-defined cause must end. Americans deserve an explanation for what is becoming a national tragedy.

In response to a truly horrendous human rights tragedy, President Bush sent U.S. armed forces to Somalia to allow food to reach the starving. In so doing, he made a commitment to withdraw our forces when that mission was completed and return the operation to the United Nations. As has been acknowledged by your Administration, the Bush mission was accomplished, but our servicemen and women have not come home. Instead, large numbers of U.S. armed forces have been turned over to the U.N. and the mission has been changed to include the substantial task of nation-building in a hostile environment. Despite transformation of the mission, the overall size of the U.N. force was never adequate to accomplish it and does not even operate in much of the country.

We have been troubled by this changing mission for some time. On April 1, 1993, House Republicans adopted the enclosed Statement of Republican Policy calling on you "to bring our troops home." As you know, the resolution authorizing U.S. participation in the new U.N. mission that passed the House on May 25 was opposed nearly unanimously by Republicans and it stalled in the Senate shortly thereafter. As recently as September 15, House Republicans went on record in another Policy Statement expressing deep concern that at a time when our Pentagon budget was being cut by the Administration and Democrats in Congress by \$127 billion over five years, scarce military manpower and financial resources are being diverted to pursue illusory goals in Somalia.

The situation on the ground and in the air over Somalia has worsened considerably. In addition to the eleven servicemen previously killed in combat, in the last several days at least twelve American servicemen have lost their lives, and over seventy additional American casualties have been sustained. Reportedly eight U.S. servicemen are missing in action or have been captured by Somali warlord Mohamed Farah Aideed. But, in a Congressional briefing yesterday, your Administration proved convincingly that it had neither a defined goal nor a plan in Somalia.

Mr. President, this situation is in urgent need of resolution. You must state clearly that our nation holds Aideed's faction responsible for any American soldiers held prisoner and you must take whatever diplomatic or military steps are necessary to gain their release. Furthermore, we must urgently shift responsibility for this mission back to the U.N. In addition, African countries should take a more prominent role in resolving Somalia's conflict. Other countries in the general region should also play a significant role.

In our view, the Somalia policy your Administration has pursued is a failure. Therefore, we believe it imperative that you communicate to Congress and the American people your Administration's plan to secure the freedom of any American prisoners held in Somalia and your intention to expeditiously withdraw our forces in a safe and orderly manner. America's international standing must not be jeopardized by an indecisive and naive approach to foreign policy.

Dear Mr. President:

All Americans were shocked and saddened by the images that have emanated from Somalia this past week. The scenes of dead American soldiers being dragged through the Mogadishu streets by a Somali mob has led to universal outrage. The video of an American prisoner-of-war in Somalia has brought back the sad memories of other American POWs held for years in South East Asia.

The decision to withdraw our forces from Somalia is one that only you can make. Nevertheless, too often in the past the United States has withdrawn its forces from a conflict without first getting a full and accurate accounting of the military personnel left behind. I cannot stress strongly enough the view of myself and my constituents that before any of our forces are withdrawn from Somalia that the United States must first have secured the release of any American POWs and have obtained a full, fair and accurate accounting of our MIAs.

The condition of those U.S. troops currently held captive or missing-in-action in Somalia is of the utmost importance to every American. Yet, I was deeply disturbed by reports indicating that U.S. and U.N. officials have pointedly declined to assert the rights of our POWs war under the Geneva Convention Relative to the Treatment of Prisoners of War of August 12, 1949. Apparently, the State Department is more concerned about conferring upon General Aideed the status of a "lawful combatant" than it is about the safety of those Americans held captive by Somali militiamen.

To refuse to assert the rights of POWs under the Geneva Convention undermines the rights of American troops in Somalia. It sends the signal to our men and women in uniform who may be called upon to serve in future peacekeeping operations that their safety will also be secondary in the minds of those who fashion U.S. foreign policy. This initial refusal presented the United States yesterday with the bizarre situation of having an associate of Gen. Aideed being the first to recognize the status and full rights of prisoners of war in Somalia under the Geneva Convention, conferring upon them specific legal protections not even demanded by the U.S. government.

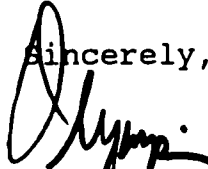

SUBJECT: U.S. Public Attitudes on Involvement in Somalia

The Program on International Policy Attitudes at the University of Maryland just released its study on US public attitudes on US involvement in Somalia. The review utilized seven independent polls conducted in the week immediately following the reports of the troop fatalities in Somalia and an internal poll conducted two weeks hence. There were some surprising results. The study suggests:

-- While the images of dead American soldiers in Mogadishu made the US public more eager to withdraw US troops from Somalia, the public has not reacted by wanting to withdraw US troops immediately. Only a minority of Americans wants to withdraw immediately.

-- Much of the sentiment in favor of withdrawal may be due to a majority perception that most Somalis want US troops to withdraw. A modest majority of Americans say that if most Somalis want the US to stay, it should stay.

-- A majority of Americans assumes that the public as a whole is more eager to withdraw in the face of troop fatalities than they are themselves. This suggests that the public is overestimating its own reactions.

-- Isolationist sentiments are not a rising tide in the American public. Indeed, they remain quite weak. An overwhelming majority rejects isolationist thinking and favors US involvement in multilateral efforts to maintain peace and protect human rights.

-- When Americans evaluate US involvement in Somalia they evidence a conflict between their globalist values and a desire to limit US involvements in a world they perceive as making unlimited demands.

-- Your decision to increase US troops and withdraw within six months may be forming a political consensus, perhaps because it represents a middle ground between globalist values and the desire to limit US commitments.

Dear Mr. President:

All Americans were shocked and saddened by the images that have emanated from Somalia this past week. The scenes of dead American soldiers being dragged through the Mogadishu streets by a Somali mob has led to universal outrage. The video of an American prisoner-of-war in Somalia has brought back the sad memories of other American POWs held for years in South East Asia.

The decision to withdraw our forces from Somalia is one that only you can make. Nevertheless, too often in the past the United States has withdrawn its forces from a conflict without first getting a full and accurate accounting of the military personnel left behind. I cannot stress strongly enough the view of myself and my constituents that before any of our forces are withdrawn from Somalia that the United States must first have secured the release of any American POWs and have obtained a full, fair and accurate accounting of our MIAs.

The condition of those U.S. troops currently held captive or missing-in-action in Somalia is of the utmost importance to every American. Yet, I was deeply disturbed by reports indicating that U.S. and U.N. officials have pointedly declined to assert the rights of our POWs war under the Geneva Convention Relative to the Treatment of Prisoners of War of August 12, 1949. Apparently, the State Department is more concerned about conferring upon General Aideed the status of a "lawful combatant" than it is about the safety of those Americans held captive by Somali militiamen.

To refuse to assert the rights of POWs under the Geneva Convention undermines the rights of American troops in Somalia. It sends the signal to our men and women in uniform who may be called upon to serve in future peacekeeping operations that their safety will also be secondary in the minds of those who fashion U.S. foreign policy. This initial refusal presented the United States yesterday with the bizarre situation of having an associate of Gen. Aideed being the first to recognize the status and full rights of prisoners of war in Somalia under the Geneva Convention, conferring upon them specific legal protections not even demanded by the U.S. government.

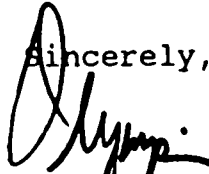
