Subject: Pending Senator Graham Proposal for a White House Commission on Maritime Security

Background

1. Just after our initial informal memo of August 18th, Senator Graham wrote the Chief of Staff on August 21st with an update on his initiative. His letter (copy attached) also forwarded a draft executive order and a draft charter for a "White House Commission on Marine Transportation."

2. The Senator's letter tracks with what we had been hearing about his initiative having evolved owing to summer staff-level consultations with both the Coast Guard and the Maritime Administration. As you will recall, the original proposal was for a "White House Commission on Seaport Safety and Security" - and we now have a broader concept to consider.

State of Play

3. After conferring with the Chief of Staff's Office, our sense of the current state of play may be summarized as follows: (a) there is substantial support for the thrust of Senator Graham's initiative, although there are diverging views on the optimal scope of the review and its relationship to other ongoing and pending initiatives in the maritime arena; (b) the White House has made a commitment in principle to go forward with an initiative that would embrace the general concept if not all of the particulars proposed by Senator Graham; and (c) the tentative timeline would include a White House announcement within a month or so.

Next Steps

4. In view of the short timeline, key White House staffs should meet as soon as possible to, among other tasks:

a. confirm the apparent consensus that Senator Graham's initiative has substantial merit;

b. evaluate the proposed substantive scope of the review in the context of other ongoing or pending initiatives (e.g., Transportation's 21st century seaport infrastructure planning effort, draft PRD to develop recommendations for a "coordinated, disciplined, long-term federal oceans policy," Senate's "Oceans Act" [S.1213] that would create a commission to conduct a broad review of ocean policy, etc.);

c. discuss how, if at all, the proposed substantive scope for this review should be amended;

d. determine whether any organizational or procedural changes are called for;

e. consider what type of rollout would be appropriate; and

f. organize a follow-on interagency meeting as soon as possible.

5. With this in mind, NSC/NEC will host an EOP-only meeting this coming Wednesday (September 16) from 1000 to 1100 in the White House Situation Room. Please contact Ms. Carolyn Dollar, NSC/Transnational Threats, at 6-9361 to confirm your attendance. We would also appreciate any suggestions as to other EOP personnel who might want to participate.

Dear Mr. Bowles:

In June of this year, we discussed my May 8, 1998, meeting with the President, and my request that he appoint a White House Commission to examine the issues surrounding seaport safety and security in the United States. During my meeting with President, he offered me his support in forming such a commission, and indicated that he would ask you to further implement the proposal. When we spoke in June, I was pleased to hear that you had appointed Mr. Gene Sperling to lead the Administration's efforts to move my proposal for a White House Commission forward.

Since that time, I have discussed my proposal with Admiral Loy, Commandant, U.S. Coast Guard; he has agreed that the establishment of a White House Commission on Marine Transportation will focus needed attention on the critical issues facing our nation's seaports now and in the future. Further, my staff have worked closely with staff from both Mr. Sperling's office and the U.S. Coast Guard to further define the goals of this commission, and to align the mission of the commission with related efforts already underway within the Administration. I wish to thank you and the Administration for the progress we have made thus far.

It is now appropriate, however, for the Administration to take the next step in this process by issuing an Executive Order that would establish the White House Commission on Marine Transportation. As trade and the volume of ships at U.S. ports increase, the safety of the environment, pilots, dockworkers, and even cruise ship passengers will be at risk. In addition, the expansion of activity at seaports has increased the opportunities for a variety of illegal activities, including drug trafficking, cargo theft, auto theft, illegal immigration, and the diversion of cargo--such as food--to avoid safety inspections. I believe that we now have the unique opportunity to be proactive on these issues in order to ensure the safety and security of our seaports in the future. For your information and use, I have enclosed both a draft Executive Order and a draft organizational charter that would create this White House Commission.

I thank you for taking the time to assist me in this important effort. In the near future, I would like to speak with you regarding a time line for the formation and inaugural meeting of the White House Commission on Marine Transportation. If there is anything else that I can do to be of assistance in this matter, please do not hesitate to let me know. Thank you once again for your continued, outstanding service to the United States.

Executive Order ____ of ____, 1998

White House Commission on Marine Transportation

By the authority vested in me as President by the constitution and the laws of the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Establishment.

There is established the White House Commission on Marine Transportation ("Commission"). The Commission shall be composed of not more than 20 members, to be appointed by the President from the public and private sectors. The members of the Commission shall be chosen from among individuals with expertise, training, experience, and attainment in marine transportation matters, such as marine transportation safety, security, efficiency, and environmental protection. The President shall designate a Chair [co-Chairs] from among members of the Commission. In accordance with P.L. 105-~~33~~ Sec. ~~497~~, the Commission shall not be subject to the requirements of the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. App.)

Section 2. Functions.

The Commission shall:

- (a) review, among other things, on-going federal, state, local interagency and public-private sector partnership efforts to study and improve the United States Marine Transportation System, including waterways, ports, and their intermodal connections, to meet current and future needs;
- (b) recommend to the President strategies to ensure a safe and secure marine transportation system that improves our nation's global competitiveness and national security;
- (c) produce a final report which shall include recommendations for such administrative, judicial and legislative actions as the Commission deems advisable in order to advance the national interests of the United States, including global economic competitiveness and national security in the marine transportation arena. The Commission shall adopt its final report through a majority vote of its full membership, and shall report to the President no later than ____, 1999, or six months from the date of its first meeting, whichever is later. Chair may, from time to time, invite experts to submit information to the Commission; hold hearings on relevant issues; and form committees and teams to assist the Commission in accomplishing its objectives and duties, which may include individuals other than members of the Commission.

Sec. 3. Administration.

(a) The Commission may:

- (1) consult with experts and request them to submit information to the Commission;
- (2) conduct hearings on relevant issues;
- (3) form committees and work groups as necessary to assist the Commission in accomplishing its objectives and duties. Committees, work groups, and experts may include individuals other than members of the Commission.

(b) Members of the Commission shall serve without compensation for their work on the Commission. While engaged in the work of the Commission, members appointed from the private sector may be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by law for persons serving intermittently in Government service (5 U.S.C. 5701-5707).

(c) To the extent permitted by law, and subject to the availability of appropriations, the Department of Transportation shall provide the Commission with funding, administrative services, facilities, staff, and other support services necessary for the performance of the functions of the Commission.

(d) The heads of executive departments and agencies shall, to the extent permitted by law, provide the Commission such information with respect to marine transportation matters as the Chair may request.

Sec. 4. Termination.

The Commission shall terminate 60 days after submission of its final report, unless extended by the President.

THE WHITE HOUSE COMMISSION ON MARINE TRANSPORTATION

I. Establishment

This charter establishes the White House Commission on Marine Transportation (Commission), as directed by the President on [x, 1998].

II. Objectives, Scope of Activities and Description of Duties

- A. The nation's Marine Transportation System includes waterways, ports and their intermodal connections. The system has many users, often with competing interests. No single federal, state or local agency has total responsibility for the system. However, all users and service providers agree that the nation's interests are best served if the Marine Transportation System is safe, secure, efficient, and environmentally sound.
- B. The Commission shall function solely as an advisory body. Its duties shall include a comprehensive review of on-going federal, state, local, interagency and public-private sector partnership efforts to study and improve the nation's Marine Transportation System to meet current and future needs. The Commission shall produce a report which includes recommendations for such administrative, judicial and legislative actions as the Commission deems advisable to advance the United States' national interests including global economic competitiveness and national security in the marine transportation arena.
- C. In accordance with P.L. 105- , the Commission is not subject to the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. App.)
- D. The Commission shall have the following powers:
 1. For purposes of carrying out its duties, the Commission may hold such hearings and sit and act at such times and places the Commission may deem advisable.
 2. The Commission may form committees and teams to assist it in accomplishing its objectives and duties. These committees and teams may include individuals other than members of the Commission.

III. Commission Membership

The Commission shall consist of not more than twenty individuals, who shall be appointed by the President and whose terms of office shall be for the term of the Commission:

- A. [...] shall serve as the Chair [co-Chairs] of the Commission

B. All other members shall be appointed by the President to assure that the membership of the Commission is fairly balanced in terms of the points of view represented and the functions to be performed by the Commission. Individuals shall be selected from among those persons who have experience or expertise in marine transportation.

C. Private sector members of the Commission shall be appointed to serve as representatives of various sectors, including the intelligence, technology, and seaport communities, and, thus, are not subject to the conflict of interest restrictions of 18 U.S.C. §§202-09.

D. A vacancy in the Commission shall not affect its powers.

IV. Duration

The Commission shall exist for a period of six months, unless extended by the President.

V. Official to Whom the Commission Reports

The Commission will report (through its Chair) to the President of the United States.

VI. Agency Responsible for Providing Support for the Commission

The Department of Transportation shall provide the Commission with funding, administrative services, facilities, staff and other support services necessary for the performance of the functions of the Commission. Each department, agency, or instrumentality of the executive branch of the Federal Government (including independent agencies) shall, upon the request of the Chair, furnish the Commission such information and support, without reimbursement, as the Commission deems necessary to carry out its functions.

VII. Estimated Annual Operating Costs

The annual operating costs for the Commission are estimated to be approximately [\$X] and [X] person-years.

VIII. Estimated Number and Frequency of Meetings

The Commission (and any committees and teams serving the Commission) shall meet at such times as the Chair, the Designated Federal Official, or their designee may direct. The total number of meetings during the six months of operation will be approximately ten.

The attached decision memorandum to the President recommends that he exercise his authority under Section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act (FAA) by drawing down up to \$75 million of articles, services and military education and training from the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, Transportation and the Treasury to assist other nations in their counter-narcotics efforts.

Pursuant to the Secretary of State's recommendation, the drawdowns would provide counter-narcotics assistance for: Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago; and for Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

The Secretary of State coordinated and forwarded this proposal, which is supported by the Secretaries of the Departments of Defense, Transportation and the Treasury, the Attorney General, and the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

This memorandum is urgent in that notification of these intended drawdowns should be transmitted as soon as possible and must reach Congress no later than September 15, 1998 to ensure that FY98 authority does not expire prior to completion of the required 15-day notification period.

SUBJECT: FY-98 FAA Section 506 Counter-Narcotics Drawdown

Purpose

To recommend that you authorize the State Department to notify Congress of your intent to exercise your authority under Section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act (FAA) by drawing down up to \$75 million of articles, services and military education and training from the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, Transportation, and the Treasury to assist other nations in their counter-narcotics efforts.

The Secretary of State coordinated and forwarded this drawdown proposal, which is supported by the Secretaries of the Departments of Defense, Transportation and the Treasury, and the Attorney General. See Tab A.

Background

The Governments of Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, and Trinidad and Tobago, as well as Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines (hereinafter, the Eastern Caribbean countries), are in critical need of counter-narcotics assistance beyond that which we can provide through International Narcotics Control funding. We recommend that such assistance be provided using your FAA drawdown authority.

The Administration continues to be the subject of criticism from various quarters for not doing enough to combat drug production and trafficking, even though Congress has consistently underfunded your requests for international counter-narcotics

programs. Much of the criticism has focused on the level of support for Colombian counter-narcotics forces. This proposed Section 506 drawdown would provide substantial assistance to Colombia as well as other counter-narcotics allies in this hemisphere.

To exercise your Section 506 drawdown authority, you must first provide a 15-day notification to Congress of your intent to do so. Following the notification period, unless the congressional reaction indicates a different course, the Department of State will transmit a second memorandum recommending that you determine that the drawdowns are "in the national interest of the United States," after which the drawdowns would proceed.

We have preconsulted with the staffs of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, House International Relations Committee, and Senate and House Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittees on this proposed package. We encountered no immediate opposition. Some on the Hill may have concerns over the human rights records of the Colombian Army -- and will seek assurances that this counter-narcotics assistance will not be used to support directly the Colombian Government's counter-insurgency campaign. We believe that the answer to these legitimate concerns is found in the thorough and rigorous provisions of our bilateral end-use monitoring agreement of August 1997. Moreover, as a matter of policy and consistent with past practice, we will seek to ensure that the assistance furnished under this drawdown is not provided to any unit of any foreign country's security forces if that unit is credibly alleged to have committed gross violations of human rights unless the government of such country is taking effective measures to bring the responsible members of that unit to justice.

Proposed Drawdowns

Under this proposal, you would direct a drawdown of up to \$70.0 million in articles, services, and military education and training from the Department of Defense to support our counternarcotics strategy within the Western Hemisphere. We estimate that approximately \$38.1 million would be used to bolster the counter-narcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police (CNP) and Colombian military elements which directly support the counter-narcotics effort; approximately \$12.0 million would support police and military elements in Bolivia; approximately \$5.3 million would go to support the Peruvian National Police and elements of the Peruvian military;

approximately \$1.8 million would support police and military elements in Ecuador (no lethal materials would be delivered to either Ecuadorian or Peruvian military forces prior to signature of a border dispute settlement between the two countries); approximately \$2.0 million would go to support the Brazilian Federal Police; approximately \$1.1 million would support police and military elements in Mexico; approximately \$0.6 million would support police elements in Guatemala; approximately \$1.9 million would support police and military elements in Honduras; approximately \$0.9 million would support police and military elements in Jamaica; approximately \$0.5 million would support police and military elements in the Dominican Republic; and approximately \$0.8 million would support the security forces of the Eastern Caribbean countries which are members of the Regional Security System (RSS). Finally, approximately \$5 million of this authority would be expended from Defense operational funds for packing, crating, handling, transportation, and related support for this package.

You would also direct a drawdown of up to \$0.2 million in articles and services from the Department of Justice (specifically, the Drug Enforcement Administration) to support counter-narcotics efforts in the Caribbean. We estimate that approximately \$0.1 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries and up to \$0.1 million would support Jamaica.

You would also direct a drawdown of approximately \$3.0 million in articles and services from the Department of State (specifically, the Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs) to support counter-narcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police.

You would also direct a drawdown of up to \$1.0 million in articles and services from the Department of Transportation (specifically, the Coast Guard) to support counter-narcotics efforts in Trinidad and Tobago.

Finally, you would direct a drawdown of up to \$0.8 million in articles and services from the Department of the Treasury (specifically, the Customs Service) to support counter-narcotics efforts in the Caribbean and Central America. We estimate that approximately \$0.6 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries, approximately \$0.05 million would support the Dominican Republic, and approximately \$0.15 million would support Honduras.

RECOMMENDATION

That you authorize the Department of State to notify Congress of your intent to direct, under FAA Section 506(a)(2), drawdowns of articles, services, and military education and training from the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, Transportation and the Treasury for other nations cooperating with us in counter-narcotics efforts; the drawdowns in the amount of up to \$75 million would occur before September 30, 1998 under fiscal year 1998 authority, with notification to be transmitted to Congress no later than September 15, 1998.

The President is asked to direct the Departments of State, Defense (DoD), Treasury, Justice (DoJ), and Transportation (DoT) to take the necessary steps under section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (FAA), to draw down up to \$75 million in articles, services, and military education and training for counternarcotics assistance for Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago; and for Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines (hereinafter, "the Eastern Caribbean countries.") We ask that this request be treated on an urgent basis so that we can complete the required 15-day notification as soon as possible.

Under section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (FAA), the President may direct a drawdown of articles and services from any USG agency, and military education and training from DoD for counternarcotics, disaster relief, or refugee assistance upon making a determination that it is in the "national interest of the United States" to do so.

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Under this proposal, the President would direct a drawdown of up to \$70.0 million in articles, services, and military education and training from the Department of Defense to support our counternarcotics strategy within the Western Hemisphere. Of this, we estimate that approximately \$38.1 million would be used to bolster the counternarcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police (CNP) and Colombian military elements which directly support the CN effort; approximately \$12.0 million would support police and military elements in Bolivia; approximately \$5.3 million would go to support the Peruvian National Police and elements of the Peruvian military; approximately \$1.8 million would support police and military elements in Ecuador (no lethal materials would be delivered to either Ecuadorian or Peruvian military forces prior to signature of a border dispute settlement between the two countries); approximately \$2.0 million would go to support the Brazilian Federal Police; approximately \$1.1 million would support police and military elements in Mexico; approximately \$0.6 million would support police elements in Guatemala; approximately \$1.9 million would support police and military elements in Honduras; approximately \$0.9 million would support police and military elements in Jamaica; approximately \$0.5 million would support police and military elements in the Dominican Republic; and approximately \$0.8 million would support the security forces of the Eastern Caribbean countries which are members of the Regional Security System (RSS). Finally, approximately \$5 million of this authority would be expended from DoD operational funds for packing, crating, handling, transportation, and related support for this package.

The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$1.0 million in articles and services from the Department of Transportation (USCG) to support counternarcotics efforts in Trinidad and Tobago.

The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$0.8 million in articles and services from the Department of the Treasury (USCS) to support counternarcotics efforts in the Caribbean and Central America. Of this, we would estimate that approximately \$0.6 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries, approximately \$0.05M would support the Dominican Republic, and approximately \$0.15M would support Honduras.

The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$0.2 million in articles and services from the Department of Justice (DEA) to support counternarcotics efforts in the Caribbean. Of this, we would estimate that approximately \$0.1 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries, and up to \$0.1M would support Jamaica.

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Finally, the President would direct a drawdown of up to \$3.0 million in articles and services from the Department of State to support counternarcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police.

The Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), the NSC staff, the Secretaries of Defense, Transportation, and the Treasury, and the Attorney General concur with this proposal.

Further information on the elements of CN support for each country included in this proposal is set forth in the Memorandum of Justification (attached). Depending on the situation in receiving countries, selected end items provided will be accompanied by a package of available spare parts, equipment reception assistance, and user and maintenance training as appropriate, and as availability from agency stocks dictate.

We anticipate that delivery of articles, services, and related training provided under this drawdown would be accomplished during FY 1999.

Section 506(a)(2) Drawdown

Under section 506(a)(2) of the FAA, the President may direct a drawdown of articles and services from the inventory and resources of any USG agency, and military education and training from DoD for counternarcotics, disaster relief, or refugee assistance upon making a determination that it is in the "national interest of the United States" to do so.

No assistance will actually be delivered under the drawdown unless the particular recipient government has provided appropriate end-use, retransfer, and security assurances in accordance with section 505 of the FAA, including agreement that equipment provided under this drawdown will be used for counternarcotics purposes.

Section 506(a)(2)(B) provides that an aggregate value of not more than \$150 million in any fiscal year of articles, services and military education and training may be provided under section 506(a)(2). Section 506(a)(2)(B) provides further that not more than \$75 million may be provided from the inventory and resources of the Department of Defense; not more than \$75 million may be provided for international narcotics control assistance purposes; and not more than \$15 million may be provided for POW/MIA activities. A total of \$75 million of authority for a drawdown under section 506(a)(2) remains available to be used for counternarcotics purposes in FY 98;

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and, no more than \$75 million remains available for drawdown from the Department of Defense for any purpose authorized under section 506(a)(2).

We do not believe that this proposed use of the section 506(a)(2) drawdown authority would adversely affect U.S. refugee and disaster assistance programs, as we are close to the end of the fiscal year. In any event, some \$5.0 million in authority from DoD would remain available for use for these purposes under section 506(a)(2).

Section 570 of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 1998 (P.L. 105-118) bars the provision of funds appropriated under that act to units of foreign countries' security forces if these units are credibly alleged to have committed gross violations of human rights. The restrictions in section 570 do not, as a legal matter, apply to this drawdown, because no articles or services purchased with funds appropriated under that act are provided as part of the drawdown. Nevertheless, as a matter of policy and for the sake of consistency, the administration does not intend for articles, services, or military training furnished under this drawdown to be provided to units that would not be eligible under the provisions of section 570.

Transfer of Title Pursuant to Section 484

Section 484(a)(1) of the FAA provides that aircraft "made available to a foreign country primarily for narcotics-related purposes . . . shall be provided only on a lease or loan basis." Section 484(a)(2) provides that subsection (1) shall not apply to the extent that retention of title would be "contrary to the national interest of the United States," and if appropriate Congressional committees are notified.

In this case, we have decided to pass aircraft title to the Government of Colombia for the three Bell 212 helicopters (to be used by the CNP to provide increased lift capability at higher altitudes), as well as to the two C-26 aircraft we intend to provide to the CNP. The additional lift capability at altitude provided by the twin engine helicopters will enable the CNP to more effectively attack opium poppy eradication. Destruction of the opium poppy crop has been identified as a key U.S. national security objective. The CNP is uniquely suited to carry out this mission. Granting title to the CNP for these aircraft enables them to exercise greater operational flexibility in a dangerous and demanding operating environment than they would have if operating borrowed aircraft. Similarly, passing title to the C-26 support craft--as we did

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for the C-26s we provided the CNP previously--will encourage them to use these aircraft in the most flexible and aggressive manner. Further, failure to pass aircraft title as we have done in the past would undermine the long-standing relationship of trust and confidence we enjoy with the Colombian National Police. It would therefore be contrary to U.S. national interests to retain title to these aircraft.

The President's authority to decide that U.S. retention of aircraft title would be "contrary to the national interest" was delegated to the Secretary of State by section 1-201(a)(26) of Executive Order No. 12163. This decision is subject to the 15-day prior notification procedures to Congress.

Under section 506(b)(1) of the FAA and section 515 of the FY 98 Foreign Operations Appropriations Act, we must provide notification to Congress of a drawdown for counternarcotics

purposes to the Senate Foreign Relations and the House International Relations Committees, and the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, at least 15 days in advance of the drawdown. In addition, section 652 of the FAA requires the President to notify (and provide justification to) the Speaker of the House and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee before exercising his authority under section 506(a). Notification regarding transfer of aircraft title would be included with these notifications.

CONGRESSIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

We have preconsulted with the staffs of the SFRC, HIRC, and Senate and House Foreign Operations Appropriations sub-committees on this proposed package and have encountered no immediate opposition. Some on the Hill may have concerns over the Human Rights records of the Colombian Army--and will seek assurances that this assistance will not be used to support directly the Colombian Government's counter-insurgency campaign. We believe that the answer to these legitimate concerns are found in the thorough and rigorous provisions of the USG/GOC end use monitoring agreement of August 1997. Colombia's certification status under section 490 of the FAA provided a contentious point in our FY-97 506(a)(2) effort. This year, however, the President made a "vital national interest" certification for Colombia in Presidential Determination number 98-15, issued on February 26, 1998.

Recognizing the decision by the Principal's Committee on July 7, 1998 to proceed with a drawdown, we are prepared to move forward immediately with this assistance package.

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Accordingly, we recommend that the President determine that the provision of the aid describe herein is in the national interest of the United States and authorize the Department of State to provide the proposed notifications and justifications to the Congress. DoD, DoJ, DoT, and Treasury would advise their key committees as a courtesy. Once the 15-day notification period has run, unless congressional reaction indicates a contrary course, we will forward a separate memorandum to the NSC recommending that the President exercise his section 506(a)(2) authority and provide a draft determination for this purpose. We note that, in order for the President to exercise his authority as proposed in fiscal year 1998, the President should authorize us to proceed in a timely manner to submit congressional notifications.

MEMORANDUM OF JUSTIFICATION
FOR USE OF SECTION 506(a)(2) AUTHORITY
TO DRAW DOWN ARTICLES, SERVICES, AND MILITARY
EDUCATION AND TRAINING

There is a continuing need to aid foreign governments in their efforts to eradicate illegal drug crops produced in their countries and to interdict drugs en route through their countries -- thus reducing the flow of drugs into the United States. Specifically, the Governments of Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago, and the Eastern Caribbean countries are in critical need of counternarcotics (CN) assistance beyond that which we can provide through International Narcotics Control (INC) funding. We propose that such assistance be provided under the authority of section 506(a)(2) of the FAA.

Under this proposal, the President would direct a drawdown of up to \$70.0 million in articles, services, and military education and training from the Department of Defense to support our counternarcotics strategy within the Western Hemisphere. Of this, we estimate that approximately \$38.1 million would be used to bolster the counternarcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police (CNP) and Colombian military elements which directly support the CN effort; approximately \$12.0 million would support police and military elements in Bolivia; approximately \$5.3 million would go to support the Peruvian National Police and elements of the Peruvian military; approximately \$1.8 million would support police and military elements in Ecuador (no lethal materials would be delivered to either Ecuadorian or Peruvian military forces prior to signature of a border dispute settlement between the two countries); approximately \$2.0 million would go to support the Brazilian Federal Police; approximately \$1.1 million would support police and military elements in Mexico; approximately \$0.6 million would support police elements in Guatemala; approximately \$1.9 million would support police and military elements in Honduras; approximately \$0.9 million would support police and military elements in Jamaica; approximately \$0.5 million would support police and military elements in the Dominican Republic; and approximately \$0.8 million would support the security forces of the Eastern Caribbean countries which are members of the Regional Security System (RSS). Finally, approximately \$5 million of this authority would be expended from DoD O&M for packing, crating, handling, transportation, and related support for this package.

The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$1.0 million in articles and services from the Department of Transportation (USCG) to support counternarcotics efforts in Trinidad and Tobago.

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The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$0.8 million in articles and services from the Department of the Treasury (USCS) to support counternarcotics efforts in the Caribbean and Central America. Of this, we would estimate that approximately \$0.6 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries, approximately \$0.05M would support the Dominican Republic, and approximately \$0.15M would support Honduras.

The President would also direct a drawdown of up to \$0.2 million in articles and services from the Department of Justice (DEA) to support counternarcotics efforts in the Caribbean. Of this, we would estimate that approximately \$0.1 million would support the Eastern Caribbean countries, and up to \$0.1M would support Jamaica.

Finally, the President would direct a drawdown of approximately \$3.0 million in articles and services from the Department of State to support counternarcotics efforts of the Colombian National Police.

Depending on the situation in receiving countries, selected end items provided will be accompanied by a package of available spare parts, equipment reception assistance, and user and maintenance training as appropriate, and as availability from agency stocks dictate.

Some 83 percent of the cocaine and much of the heroin which arrives in the United States is processed in or transits through Colombia. Colombian traffickers continue to process most of the world's cocaine hydrochloride (HCl) and dominate wholesale cocaine markets, but their control is becoming fragmented and decentralized, creating a more diverse set of smaller trafficking groups. The August 1998 inauguration of a new Colombian president gives us a unique opportunity to influence CN activities in this key source country. The approximately \$41.1 million proposed for Colombia would support the CNP and heightened Colombian military support of the CNP in their common struggle against the cultivation of illegal drug crops and interdiction of the movement of drug products into and out of Colombia toward the United States. Support for the CNP will facilitate its law enforcement, interdiction, and eradication programs. We anticipate providing the CNP with three Bell 212 helicopters, two C-26 transport/surveillance aircraft, UH-1H spares, aircraft GPS, field aviation support equipment and base defensive supplies, communications equipment, individual field, flight, and protective gear, field rations, aircraft tugs, training, weapons, ammunition, and explosives. For the Colombian military, we anticipate providing aircraft spares, trucks, weapons, communications equipment, field base defensive supplies, ammunition, individual field, flight, and protective gear, field rations, and training.

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Bolivia trails Peru and Colombia in the total amount of coca under cultivation, but produces coca plants with a higher percentage of cocaine alkaloid than Colombia, and produces more refined HCl than Peru. The Bolivian president has pledged to eliminate illegal coca production during his five year term, and the GOB has undertaken an intensive coca eradication campaign in the heart of the illegal coca growing region. Our proposed approximately \$12.0 million of assistance would provide the Bolivian Police and the military elements which support them with aviation and ground training, field gear and uniforms, field rations, communications and technical equipment, aircraft spares, weapons, ammunition, and explosives.

Coca cultivation in Peru declined dramatically in 1997, from 115,300 hectares in 1995 down to less than 69,000 hectares in 1997. This success resulted from the combined effects of the Peruvian Air Force's "airbridge denial" interdiction program and the increasingly more effective narcotics law enforcement by the Peruvian National Police. However, cocaine base is reported to be moving on Peruvian rivers, and Peruvian cocaine base has been detected moving across the Andes--where some of it was processed into HCl for subsequent shipment from Peruvian ports and airports. We intend to provide some \$5.3 million of assistance to furnish the Peruvian National Police, Air Force, and Coast Guard with training, field aviation support equipment, airfield support vehicles, field maintenance shelters, individual field and protective gear, field rations, water purification kits, ammunition, explosives, and weapons. (No lethal materials would be delivered to either Ecuadorian or Peruvian military forces prior to signature of a border dispute settlement between the two countries.)

Ecuador continues to be a major transit country for HCl, primarily from Colombia, destined for the United States and Europe. Also, Colombian and Mexican traffickers are using ports in Ecuador to onload Mexican-bound cocaine. We anticipate furnishing approximately \$1.8 million of assistance to the Ecuadorian Police and Army to provide them with field and protective gear, binoculars, vehicles, field rations, weapons and ammunition.

Brazil continues to be a major transit country for illicit drugs shipped to the US and Europe. Brazil's vast river system provides traffickers with a large selection of air, river, and road routes--as well as ports. The GOB's newly created Federal Police coast guard units are eager to cooperate with us--but lack even the most basic of CN equipment. This small but important package of approximately \$2 million would provide the BFP with river and harbor patrol craft, field gear and rations, and radios.

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An estimated one third of the cocaine which arrives in the US is passes through the Caribbean. The Eastern Caribbean's Regional Support System (RSS), is comprised of the island nations of Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines. Strengthening Eastern Caribbean capabilities is important for our regional maritime strategy, and this requires capable, well-equipped partners with whom we can conduct combined operations. In recognition of its developing importance in conducting CN operations in this region, the RSS countries in 1996 signed a treaty that, once ratified by the signatories, will make counternarcotics the RSS's primary objective. We anticipate furnishing approximately \$1.5 million of assistance to provide member countries of the RSS with field rations, field gear, and small arms for their police, as well as training by the DEA--to be conducted in Antigua.

Jamaica is a producer of marijuana and is an increasingly significant cocaine transshipment country. We anticipate that our approximately \$1.0 million of assistance would provide the Jamaican security forces with survey and design services, field gear, and weapons--as well as with training by the DEA and DoD transportaion of other USG-provided CN equipment.

Trinidad and Tobago is an increasingly significant transit country for cocaine and heroin. Trinidad and Tobago continued to improve its counternarcotics capabilities in 1997. For the T&T security forces we anticipate providing approximately \$1.0 million in USCG support for 82' Coastal Patrol boats (training, maintenance, and spares).

The Dominican Republic remains a significant transshipment point for drugs destined for the United States. We anticipate that our proposed approximately \$0.5 million of assistance would provide the Dominican security forces with field vehicles, field equipment and rations, and border and airport control training by the U.S. Customs Service.

Mexico also faces a broad array of drug-related challenges. Between 50 and 60 percent of the cocaine which arrives in the US is estimated to have passed through Mexico--much of it by air. We anticipate that our proposed approximately \$1.1 million of assistance would provide the Mexican Police NVG pilot training, Instructor Pilot training, and CN training at the School of the Americas, as well as with helicopter maintenance equipment for Mexico's defense forces.

Guatemala is a major transit country for cocaine from South America to Mexico and onward to the United States. The Department of Anti-Narcotics Operations (DOAN), a specially trained and equipped civilian police command, continues to carry out narcotics investigations, interdiction operations,

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and opium poppy and marijuana eradication campaigns. We anticipate that our proposed approximately \$0.6 million of assistance would provide the Guatemalan Police with field gear and rations, weapons, and ammunition.

Honduras is a transit country for drugs moving into the U.S. In 1997, the Government of Honduras (GOH) created a task force to combat illegal transits through the Bay Islands. We anticipate that our proposed approximately \$2.0 million of assistance would provide the Honduran Police and security forces with patrol boats and field vehicles--as well as with detection dogs, and associated training and supplies (provided by the U.S. Customs Service).

Section 506(a)(2) Drawdown

No assistance will actually be delivered under the drawdown unless the particular recipient government has provided appropriate end-use, retransfer, and security assurances in accordance with section 505 of the FAA, including agreement that equipment provided under this drawdown will be used for counternarcotics purposes.

Transfer of Title Pursuant to Section 484

Section 484(a)(1) of the FAA provides that aircraft "made available to a foreign country primarily for narcotics-related purposes . . . shall be provided only on a lease or loan basis." The President has determined that the provision of the aid described herein is in the national interest of the United States. The drawdown will be directed during fiscal year 1998, with the result that it would count against the ceilings for fiscal year 1998, though it is anticipated that deliveries would be completed thereafter.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended ("the Act"), 22 U.S.C. 2318(a)(2), I hereby determine that it is in the national interest of the United States to draw down articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of Defense, military education and training from the Department of Defense, and articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Departments of Transportation, Justice, State, and Treasury for the purpose of providing international narcotics assistance to Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago; and for Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines (hereinafter, "the Eastern Caribbean countries").

Therefore, I direct the drawdown of up to \$75 million of articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Departments of Defense, Transportation, Justice, State, and Treasury, and military education and training from the Department of Defense for the Governments of Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago, and the Eastern Caribbean countries for the purposes and under the authorities of chapter 8 of part I of the Act.

You are authorized and directed to report this determination to the Congress immediately and to arrange for its publication in the Federal Register.

I wish to inform you that the President intends to exercise his authority for FY 1998 under section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (FAA), to direct a drawdown of up to \$70,000,000 of articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of Defense, and military education and training from the Department of Defense, up to \$1,000,000 in articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of Transportation, up to \$800,000 in articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of the Treasury, up to \$200,000 in articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of Justice, and up to \$3,000,000 in articles and services from the inventory and resources of the Department of State for the purposes and under the authorities of chapter 8 of part I of the FAA.

The President's proposal would provide much-needed counternarcotics assistance for Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago, Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines .

Finally, I wish to notify you, pursuant to section 484(a)(2) of the FAA, that the Secretary has decided application of section 484(a)(1) of the FAA with respect to aircraft to be transferred to the Government of Colombia under this proposal would be contrary to the national interest of the United States.

The President has authorized the Department of State to notify Congress of his intent to direct, under Section 506(a)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act, drawdowns of articles, services and military education and training from the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, Transportation and the Treasury for counter-narcotics assistance to other nations.

The drawdowns are intended to occur before September 30, 1998, using up to \$75 million of the remaining fiscal year 1998 authority. The drawdowns will support the counter-narcotics efforts of: Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Dominican Republic, Trinidad and Tobago; and for Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

The notification of these intended drawdowns should be transmitted as soon as possible and must reach Congress no later than September 15, 1998 to ensure that fiscal year 1998 authority does not expire prior to completion of the required 15-day notification period.

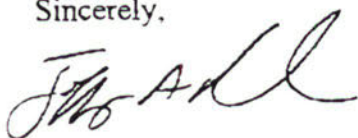
Dear Mr. Simon:

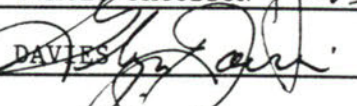

Request you drop in at the ceremony and reception for General Robert Marsh and the President's Commission on Critical Infrastructure Protection (PCCIP) Advisory and Steering Committees in the Indian Treaty Room between 1300 and 1315 on Wednesday, 16 September. The invitation is contained in Tab 1. The reception runs from 1300 to 1400, the ceremony would start when you arrive, and would require a few words from you about the success of the PCCIP. We would provide you with brief remarks.

This is an excellent opportunity to thank General Marsh and his Committees for their superb efforts. As with the critical infrastructure offsite, your brief presence at this meeting will send the right signal about the administration's commitment to critical infrastructure protection.
