SUBJECT: Implementation of Addis Conference Agreements

ISSUE

U.N. headquarters representatives are jeopardizing timely implementation of agreements reached in Addis. Donors and Somalia are ready to proceed but are hindered by recent UN action. There is little or no interest in reworking agreements reached. The U.S. Government must approach the UN at the highest levels necessary to ensure that the UN does not create an obstacle to the Addis Conference process.

DISCUSSION

Agreements reached at the Addis Conference are a critical window of opportunity for the implementation of the Addis Conference process in Somalia, despite the lack of clear political solutions. Should the international community fail to act quickly on these agreements, donors will lose credibility with African regional institutions and states, regional representatives, and miss the opportunity to complete the political reconciliation process.

Immediately following the Addis Conference, work began on a detailed plan of action which operationalizes the agreed-upon strategy to provide humanitarian assistance to the safe and secure regional. This plan of action operationalizes the definition of security, regional and donor institutional responsibilities. The plan also outlines arrangements outlined in the Addis Conference to ensure their mandate from the donors for the UN system. The plan also outlines the UNOSOM system for humanitarian assistance and outlines the UNOSOM

mandate. In order to succeed, the plan of action depends on a strong consensus among donors and Somalis. The Addis conference resulted in such a consensus.

Over the last several days, it has become apparent that UN headquarters is not in agreement with the outcome of the Addis conference and that steps are being taken to derail, or at least redirect ongoing efforts to implement these agreements.

The UN has not agreed to the establishment of a humanitarian office under the UNOSOM umbrella. While we continue to support the role of UNOSOM in the near term, donors agree that UNOSOM is not an institution which can represent their long term interests and investments in Somalia. It is essential that such an office (in the form of the UN Development Office) be established immediately.

The UN abruptly replaced a key member of the secretariat with a temporary (albeit highly qualified) officer. The former UNOSOM/Humanitarian director has the benefit of recent experience in Somalia and the trust of the donor, NGO and Somali community and plays a pivotal role in the implementation of the plan of action. Continuity of staff is critical during this key phase.

RECOMMENDATION

That we approach the UN at the highest levels and make clear our view that:

1. The institutional arrangements agreed to in Addis must be implemented immediately. The UN must facilitate this process or the donors may be forced to act outside the UN umbrella.
2. Current UN Somalia staff must be maintained during this critical period. Continuity is essential. Specifically, UNOSOM/humanitarian Hugh Cholmondeley should remain actively engaged at the field level, at least through May 1994.

I also recommend that US/UN work to assure that the outcomes and practical follow up steps to the Addis conference are reflected accurately in the U.N. Secretary General's January 15 report to the Security Council.

Dear Representative Gilman:

Thank you for your thoughtful letters on Somalia.

I am committed to the safety of our forces in Somalia and, as described in my report to the Congress of October 13, 1993, have directed actions to protect our troops and logistics bases in Somalia. You can be sure that I will remain vigilant until the last member of our Armed Forces is withdrawn from Somalia.

My report to Congress clearly describes the mission of U.S. forces and the actions we are taking to carry out that mission. In addition, it explains our plans for withdrawing U.S. Armed Forces from Somalia by March 31, 1994, with the exception of a relatively small number of non-combat military personnel. Significantly, our plans are consistent with the Congress' approval of the use of U.S. Armed Forces in Somalia as enacted into law as part of the Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 1994.

As you know, throughout the year the Administration has worked closely with the Congress on U.S. policy in Somalia. Our consultations have included the matter of authority for the deployment of U.S. Armed Forces, and we have consistently stated that we welcomed Congressional support for our efforts in Somalia. A number of matters discussed during these consultations, including questions relating to the War Powers Resolution, are no longer at issue in view of the provision in the Defense Appropriations Act.

Congressional support is essential both for an effective policy in Somalia and to assure the safety of our people. I am committed to continued close cooperation with the Congress and to keeping Congress fully informed on developments and U.S. activities in Somalia. I look forward to working with you and other Members of Congress to ensure success in this important mission.

Dear Mr. President:

We are writing to express our grave concern over the direction of U.S. policy in Somalia. The casualties sustained by American forces over the weekend -- 12 dead, 78 wounded, an undetermined number missing -- are tragic, and we grieve for our servicemen and their families. We grieve also for the fact that neither they nor the American people understand why our forces continue to bleed and die in Somalia.

Mr. President, you now have an opportunity to overcome the lack of strategic vision that has characterized the U.N. operation in Somalia. Both the House and the Senate have approved legislation calling for you to report to Congress by October 15th on the goals and objectives of U.S. forces in Somalia and your plan for extracting them from that country. The legislation further urges you to seek and receive by November 15th congressional authorization in order for the deployment of United States forces to Somalia to continue.

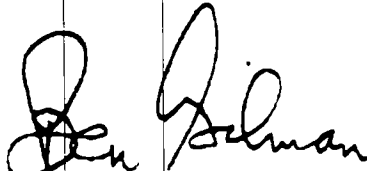
We urge you, Mr. President, not to wait until October 15th to submit a report explaining to the American people why our servicemen and women are fighting and dying in Somalia. You should instead report as quickly as possible on your policy in that country. We urge you to begin the report with an explanation of the national interest that our sacrifices in Somalia are serving. The report should go on to outline a realistic strategy for the prompt withdrawal of our forces. Finally, you should identify a terminal date for our military deployment, thereby establishing a timetable for getting our forces out and turning over responsibility for Somalia to United Nations forces from other countries.

As you know, Congress has never authorized the deployment of U.S. forces to Somalia. A letter asking why that deployment does not violate the War Powers Resolution has gone unanswered since July. We urge you to seize the occasion of your report to finally obtain congressional endorsement of your plan to extract U.S. forces from Somalia.

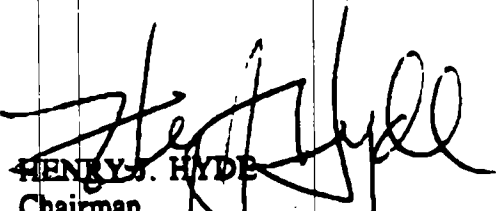

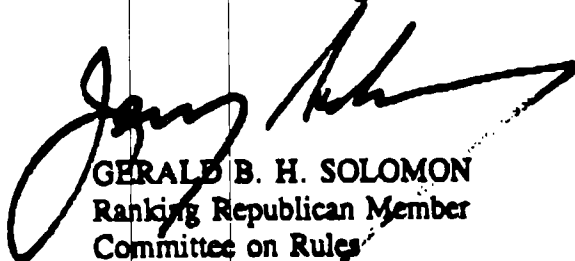

Dear Mr. President:

I welcomed the opportunity this week to meet with you, along with the Congressional leadership, to discuss the crisis in Somalia. It was reassuring to hear that we are laying out a plan that stresses the importance of securing the release of U.S. prisoners and removing our troops in an expeditious manner.

Mr. President, as you will recall, at our meeting I raised with you my conviction that the hostilities in Somalia clearly requires a request for authorization for military action in Somalia under the War Powers Act. I refer you to my letter of July 30, 1993 (a copy of which is enclosed) to Secretary of State Christopher, which remains unanswered.

The arguments set forth in that letter justifying the application of the War Powers Act are even more compelling today, given the hostilities involving casualties that have been sustained by American forces in Somalia since this past weekend.

Permit me to remind you that when the Congress considered authorizing the Persian Gulf War, implementation of the War Powers Act provided a very useful debate by Congress which coalesced support for our efforts both in the Congress and among the American people.

Accordingly, Mr. President, to gather the requisite support for our Nation's policy in Somalia, I urge you to send to the Congress a request for authorization under the War Powers Act.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

I am writing in response to Assistant Secretary Sherman's letter to me of July 21, 1993, answering some questions I had posed to you on June 15 about the application of the War Powers Resolution to Somalia.

I understand from her letter that the Administration's legal rationale for concluding that section 5(b) of the War Powers Resolution does not apply to the U.S. military presence in Somalia is that the combat since June 5 has consisted of "intermittent military engagements" rather than "sustained military action." Irrespective of whether these intermittent military engagements constitute "hostilities" within the meaning of the War Powers Resolution, her letter seems to suggest, they have not lasted more than 60 days and therefore are outside the scope of section 5(b).

I note, however, that the provisions of section 5(b) are triggered not only when U.S. Armed Forces are deployed into "hostilities" for 60 days, but also when they are deployed into "situations where imminent involvement in hostilities is clearly indicated by the circumstances" for 60 days. Thus, the fact that actual military engagements may be "intermittent" is not determinative under section 5(b) if, during the intervals between the engagements, it remains the case that "imminent involvement in hostilities is clearly indicated by the circumstances."

In this connection, I asked Assistant Secretary George Moose at a hearing of our Subcommittee on Africa on July 29 whether in his opinion the U.S. forces in Somalia are likely to be involved in fighting in the near future. He responded that it is likely that they will be involved in fighting. I fail to understand how Somalia could not be a situation "where imminent involvement in hostilities is clearly indicated by the circumstances" if, in the judgment of the State Department's senior Africa official, the U.S. forces there are likely to be involved in fighting in the near future.

Do you disagree with Assistant Secretary Moose's assessment that, at least on July 29, U.S. forces in Somalia were likely to be involved in fighting in the near future? Has there been any point between June 5 and the date of your response when U.S. forces in Somalia were not likely to be engaged in fighting in the near future? If you cannot specify dates on which the 60-day clock of section 5(b) was interrupted, please explain why section 5(b) does not require that U.S. forces be withdrawn from Somalia by August

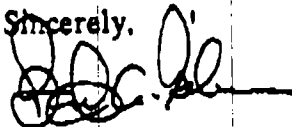

Assistant Secretary Sherman's letter made some additional points about the War Powers Resolution, but I did not understand them to be relevant to the legal analysis. For instance, she observed that our actions in Somalia have been in support of the United Nations humanitarian mandate and have not been directed at the forces of a sovereign state, but rather at bandits or warlords. I am not aware of any exceptions to the War Powers Resolution for actions at the behest of the United Nations, or for involvement in hostilities against bandits, warlords, or other forces not controlled by a sovereign state. Please correct me if I am in error.

Likewise, Assistant Secretary Sherman referred to the resolutions passed by the House and the Senate that would have provided statutory authority under the War Powers Resolution for the Administration to continue the deployment of U.S. forces to Somalia. Neither resolution, of course, has been approved by both houses of Congress and signed into law by the President. Accordingly, I do not understand the Administration to claim that it has "specific statutory authorization" within the meaning of section 8(a)(1) of the War Powers Resolution on the basis of these resolutions. Again, I invite you to correct me if I have misunderstood Secretary Sherman's letter.

I look forward to your response to my questions.
