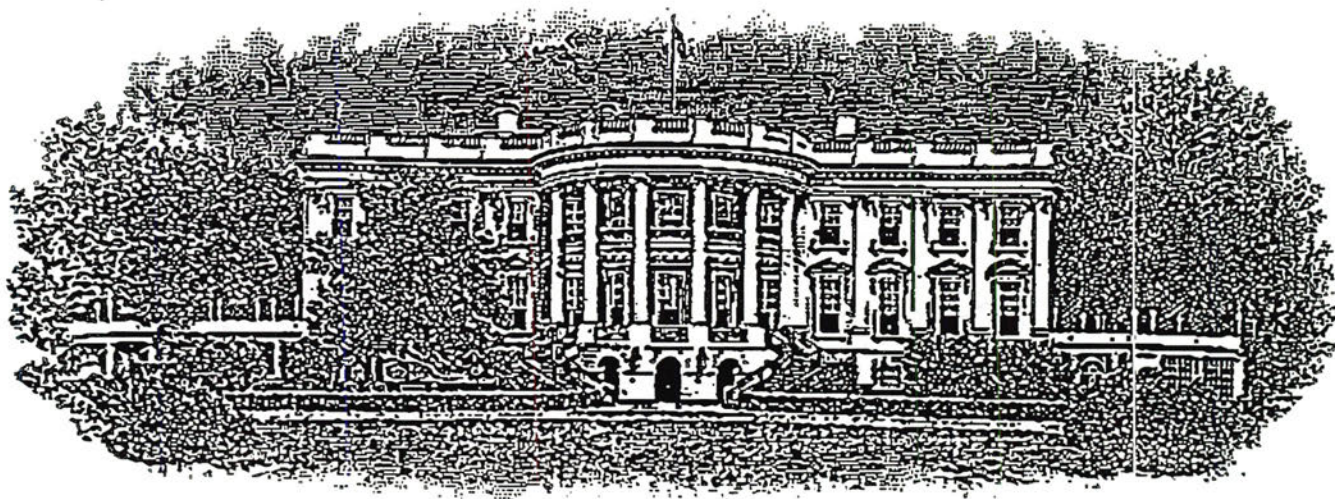

THE PRESIDENT'S SERVICE AWARD

The President's Service Awards were established in 1982 to honor outstanding individuals, families, groups, organizations, businesses and labor unions engaged in voluntary community service addressing unmet human service, educational, environmental and public safety needs. Now in its fifteenth year, the program has honored 287 outstanding groups and individuals since its inception.

The President's Service Award is co-sponsored by The Points of Light Foundation, a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization, and the Corporation for National Service which administers the President's national service program.

Nominations of outstanding volunteers and volunteer programs may be submitted by anyone. Nomination forms are available each fall. The deadline for submitting nominations is generally set in January. Approximately 20 awards are presented each year.

The Foundation receives 3,000 - 5,000 nominations each year which are carefully reviewed and then reduced to a group of approximately 50 finalists. Utilizing specific criteria and four categories (human needs, education, environment and public safety) detailed in the nomination form, an independent panel of distinguished final judges chooses a group of award winners which they recommend to the President for his final approval.

Each winner traditionally receives an engraved sterling silver medallion and a certificate signed by the President. Each of the finalists, called Citationists, are honored by the President with similar certificates for their excellent volunteer efforts. All nominees receive a card of appreciation from the President.

The award winners are traditionally presented with their awards by the President at a White House ceremony. This ceremony and other events celebrating the winners' commitment to community service take place during National Volunteer Week, April 13 - 19, 1997.

PRESIDENT CLINTON AND FORMER PRESIDENT BUSH ANNOUNCE THE PRESIDENTS' SUMMIT FOR AMERICA'S FUTURE

January 24, 1997

President Clinton and former President Bush will join together today to announce the "The Presidents' Summit for America's Future," a three-day summit to be held in April aimed at bringing America to a new level of commitment to volunteer service, especially targeting the nation's young people. As President Clinton said in his Inaugural address, government alone isn't the problem or the solution. President Clinton wants to make citizen service a part of every American's life. The Presidents' Summit will be a national summons to service -- one that has already produced concrete commitments from the private sector and service organizations to step up efforts to help young people.

President Clinton and former President Bush will serve as honorary Co-Chairs of the Summit, which will be held April 27 - 29 in Philadelphia. Former Presidents Ford, Carter and Reagan have all pledged their active support and President Ford has agreed to attend the Summit. Lady Bird Johnson and Nancy Reagan have also agreed to participate in the Summit.

Also today, President Clinton and former President Bush will announce that General Colin Powell will serve as General Chairman of the Summit. Henry Cisneros, former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, will serve as Vice Chairman. Communities from all 50 states will be invited to send delegations to the Summit. A list of those communities is attached.

Attending today's announcement in the East Room will be President Clinton; former President Bush; Vice President Gore; the First Lady; General Powell; former Secretary Cisneros; Harris Wofford, CEO, Corporation for National Service; Bob Goodwin, Points of Light Foundation; Mark Gearan, Director of the Peace Corps; and Ray Chambers, Amerlicor Foundation.

The Corporation for National Service and the Points of Light Foundation have worked together to organize the Summit and to build a partnership with many of the nation's leading nonprofit organizations and businesses. Funding for the Summit is being provided by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the Pew Charitable trusts, the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation.

Our country faces challenges that are vast and complex. Too many people have been left out of the mainstream and too many of our communities are fragmented. The impact of this is greatest on America's young people. Too many are growing up without the kind of adult role models and relationships needed for success. Far too many do not have adequate, safe places to learn and to grow, are not getting a healthy start or the kind of education that creates real opportunities. Too many are unaware that giving through community service can make a difference in the lives of others and can be an enriching experience.

But the promise of America rests in the commitment, creativity and energy of its people to respond to our shared problems and to envision a shared future. Every day, Americans are doing that work ---- helping one another, addressing serious social problems, building stronger communities. Somewhere in America, in some way, solutions are being found to the problems we face. That is why priority must be given to expanded citizen service and new commitments from our nation's institutions.

Some of the concrete commitments from the private sector and service organizations which have already been made and will be announced today include:

- Columbia/HCA Healthcare corporation has committed to immunize one million children by the year 2000. Columbia, its employees and affiliated physicians, will be able to serve the immunization needs from more than 600 hospitals, surgery centers and home care locations.
- LensCrafters will provide one million needy people, especially children, with vision care by the year 2003.
- The 400 local Volunteer Centers affiliated with The Points of Light Foundation will connect one million young people with caring adults or with the opportunity to serve.
- Communities in Schools will expand its programs so that an additional 750,000 young people in need will be better able to successfully learn, stay in school and prepare for life.
- The Greek Orthodox Church in America has committed to assist one needy child per every ten families in the more than 550 Greek Orthodox churches nationwide.
- Big Brothers/Big Sisters has committed to doubling their mentoring relationships, reaching 200,000 matches through the year 2000. Service will become an integral part of the mentoring relationship.
- Shell Oil has made a corporate wide commitment to support the goals of the Summit at every level of the company through expanded employee volunteering, targeted corporate philanthropy, and promotional support. Before, during and after the Summit, this list will continue to expand.

CLINTON, BUSH ANNOUNCE PRESIDENTS' SUMMIT ON SERVICE

WASHINGTON, D.C. - President Bill Clinton and former President George Bush, joined by Vice President Al Gore, today announced "The Presidents' Summit for America's Future," aimed at bringing America to a new level of commitment to volunteer service, especially targeting the nation's young people.

President Clinton and the former Presidents will serve as honorary Co-Chairs of the Summit, which will be held April 27-29 in Philadelphia. Presidents Clinton, Bush and Ford will attend. President Carter and Lady Bird Johnson, while unable to attend have pledged their support. President Reagan will be represented by Nancy Reagan.

Gen. Colin Powell will serve as General Chairman. Henry Cisneros, former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, will serve as Vice Chairman.

In announcing the Summit, President Clinton said, "For all our differences, we have to identify the challenges we face in common as Americans and find ways to go after them in common."

"To prepare for the 21st Century, The Presidents' Summit for America's Future will launch an historic mobilization of people in every walk of life to meet those challenges, and shine a spotlight on what is working somewhere in America so that it can be adopted everywhere in America," the President added.

In today's East Room announcement, former President Bush said, "The Philadelphia summit is about getting more people off the sidelines. It is about citizens pulling together, leading by example, and lifting lives."

Some 50 commitments for specific future actions have already been received from voluntary, religious, and educational organizations, business, media, and local and state governments.

The Presidents' Summit for America's Future was conceived by the late Gov. George Romney of Michigan and initiated as a joint effort by two of America's leading organizations dedicated to service: The Points of Light Foundation and The Corporation for National Service.

General Powell said of the Summit: "I can't think of a better task for my generation. We received so much from our own parents. It is only appropriate that we give back in kind. Our young people are facing unprecedented challenges. They deserve the same kind of support from their country as we received, but it will take extra efforts from all of us to make this possible. With the help of millions of Americans, we can, as a nation, turn the tide for America's youth."

Summit partners point to growing evidence that young people today face serious threat to their futures – and even their lives; thus, the urgency leading to the April Summit. Studies show, for instance, that:

- A child is abused every 13 seconds in America, with almost 3 million reports of such abuse filed each year.
- 1 in 9 African-Americans between the age of 12-15 are victims of violent crime.
- The number of children under age six living in poverty has increased 50% since 1979.
- Cigarette and marijuana use is increasing again among high school students.
- Suicide rates for children between 5-14 doubled between 1970-1988.

The Summit is organized on the proposition that America's young people must have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

- An ongoing relationship with a caring adult or mentor;
- Safe places to learn and grow;
- A healthy start;
- A marketable skill through effective education;
- An opportunity to give back through community service.

The Summit itself will have three focal points. First, the Presidents and First Ladies will join in the historic call to commitment and to action. Second, local and national leaders from all sectors will announce their organizational commitments to action – mobilizing their people and their abilities for an unprecedented effort to turn the tide for America's youth by the turn of the century. Third, delegations from approximately 100 communities and all 50 states will work together to turn the message of the Summit into concrete plans for action.

In the weeks leading up to the Summit, a national partnership engaging dozens of leaders and organizations from all sectors will develop targets for specific increases in volunteer service and put in place the framework for an extensive follow-up campaign.

Some of the substantial commitments that already have been made include the following:

- Columbia/HCA Healthcare Corporation has committed to immunize one million children by the year 2000. Columbia, its employees and affiliated physicians, will be able to serve the immunization needs from more than 600 hospitals, surgery centers and home care locations.
- LensCrafters will provide one million needy people, especially children, with vision care by the year 2003.
- The 400 local Volunteer Centers affiliated with The Points of Light Foundation will connect one million young people with caring adults or with the opportunity to serve.

CLINTON, BUSH ANNOUNCE PRESIDENTS' SUMMIT ON SERVICE

WASHINGTON, D.C. – President Bill Clinton and former President George Bush, joined by Vice President Al Gore, today announced “The Presidents’ Summit for America’s Future,” aimed at bringing America to a new level of commitment to volunteer service, especially targeting the nation’s young people.

President Clinton and the former Presidents will serve as honorary Co-Chairs of the Summit, which will be held April 27-29 in Philadelphia. Presidents Clinton, Bush and Ford will attend. President Carter and Lady Bird Johnson, while unable to attend, have pledged their support. President Reagan will be represented by Nancy Reagan.

Gen. Colin Powell will serve as General Chairman. Henry Cisneros, former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, will serve as Vice Chairman.

In announcing the Summit, President Clinton said, “Much of the work of America cannot be done by government, much other work cannot be done by government alone. The solution must be the American people through voluntary service to others.”

In today’s East Room announcement, former President Bush said, “The Philadelphia summit is about getting more people off the sidelines. It is about citizens pulling together, leading by example, and lifting lives.”

Some 50 commitments for specific future actions have already been received from voluntary, religious, and educational organizations, business, media, and local and state governments.

The Presidents’ Summit for America’s Future was conceived by the late Gov. George Romney of Michigan and initiated as a joint effort by two of America’s leading organizations dedicated to service: The Points of Light Foundation and The Corporation for National Service.

General Powell said of the Summit: "I can't think of a better task for my generation. We received so much from our own parents. It is only appropriate that we give back in kind. Our young people are facing unprecedented challenges. They deserve the same kind of support from their country as we received, but it will take extra effort from all of us to make this possible. With the help of millions of Americans, we can, as a nation, turn the tide for America's youth."

Summit partners point to growing evidence that young people today face serious threats to their futures – and even their lives; thus, the urgency leading to the April Summit. Studies show, for instance, that:

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- 1 in 9 African-Americans between the age of 12-15 are victims of violent crime.
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- Suicide rates for children between 5-14 doubled between 1970-1988.

The Summit is organized on the proposition that America's young people must have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

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- A healthy start;

KEY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

When and where will The Presidents' Summit for America's Future be held?

The Summit will take place in Philadelphia, from Sunday, April 27, through Tuesday, April 29. The opening and closing ceremonies will be held at Independence Hall with most of the working sessions to be conducted at Philadelphia's Convention Center.

What are the goals of the Summit?

The Summit's goal is to mobilize millions of citizens and thousands of organizations from all sectors in order to ensure that all of our youth have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

- An ongoing relationship with a caring adult or mentor;
- Safe places to learn and grow;
- A healthy start;
- A marketable skill through effective education;
- An opportunity to give back through community service.

Through specific, measurable commitments toward these goals from individual organizations from every sector in America, and through community initiatives, the aim is to turn the tide for America's youth.

The Summit's goal is to make effective citizen service an integral part of the American way of life.

Who is involved in the Summit?

President Clinton and the former Presidents will serve as honorary co-chairmen of the Summit. General Colin Powell will serve as General Chairman of the Summit. Former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Henry Cisneros will serve as Vice Chairman. The Summit is being organized at the initiative of the Corporation for National Service and the Points of Light Foundation. Former Senator Harris Wofford heads the former, and Robert Goodwin, who headed President Bush's initiative to aid Black Colleges, directs the latter. Stuart Shapiro, M.D., the former Health Commissioner of Philadelphia, is the Chief Executive Officer of the Summit organizing team. Many national non-profit organizations are already collaborating as partners in the Summit.

What is happening at the Summit?

First, the Presidents and First Ladies will join in the historic call to commitment and to action. Second, local and national leaders from all sectors will announce their organizational commitments to action – mobilizing their people and their abilities for an unprecedented effort to turn the tide for America's youth by the turn of the century. Third, delegations from approximately 100 communities and all 50 states will work together to turn the message of the Summit into concrete plans for action. The delegations will return home and plan their own local Summits that will stimulate further steps to meet the major goals.

How is the Summit being funded?

Funding for the Summit is being provided by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the Pew Charitable Trusts, the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation.

What are Summit commitments?

Organizations and institutions from the private, nonprofit and public sectors commit to achieving specific goals and taking specific steps to meet those goals. For instance, in some cases, they might pledge increased resources or more volunteers. Some of the first commitments being announced today include:

- Columbia/HCA Healthcare Corporation has committed to immunize one million children by the year 2000. Columbia, its employees and affiliated physicians, will be able to serve the immunization needs from more than 600 hospitals, surgery centers and home care locations.
- LensCrafters will provide one million needy people, especially children, with vision care by the year 2003.
- The 400 local Volunteer Centers affiliated with The Points of Light Foundation will connect one million young people with caring adults or with the opportunity to serve.
- Communities in Schools will expand its programs so that an additional 750,000 young people in need will be better able to successfully learn, stay in school and prepare for life.
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- Big Brothers/Big Sisters has committed to doubling their mentoring relationships, reaching 200,000 matches through the year 2000. Service will become an integral part of the mentoring relationship.

SUMMIT COMMITMENTS

Every child in America should have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives: an ongoing relationship with a caring adult or mentor; safe places to learn and grow; a healthy start; a marketable skill through effective education; and an opportunity to give back through community service.

Commitments are being made to provide these fundamental resources to our nation's youth in each of the above categories. Some of these are:

I. An ongoing relationship with a caring adult or mentor.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters

Has committed to doubling their mentoring relationships, reaching 200,000 matches through the year 2000. Service will become an integral part of the mentoring relationship and a key activity for current and future "Bigs and Littles."

One to One/National Mentoring Partnership, Inc.

Will help the nation forge 2,000,000 new mentoring relationships over the next five years and will support national and local leaders who have already made mentoring a priority and mobilize others to do the same. It plans to educate Americans and their organizations about responsible mentoring and what they can do to make it available to every child in this country. It will serve as a resource to mentoring initiatives nationwide, and will teach children how to find caring and trustworthy adults to mentor them and adults how to connect with opportunities to mentor children; e.g. Twin cities – 100,000 mentoring relationships, Greater Kansas City YouthFriends – 1,000 caring adult relationships.

NFL Players Association

Is launching a pro-athlete mentoring program for Native American teens in partnership with the Johns Hopkins Center for Indian Health. Over the next 3 years, it will recruit retired and active NFL players to serve as mentors for Indian youth, launch a reservation-based peer leadership and healthy lifestyles curriculum, as well as in-school motivational sessions with NFL players, and an annual summer camp.

Three Television Networks

Have committed to the goals of the summit. ABC's campaign, *Children First*, is a multi-million dollar investment in programming and PSA's that will help recruit thousands of churches and synagogues as sponsors of mentoring projects for young people. HBO and CBS will provide programming and broadcast PSA's to promote the growth of the mentoring movement. The Harvard School of Public Health is spearheading these commitments, and is also committed to mobilizing the Hollywood creative community.

Tucson, Arizona

Will connect every youth in need to an adult who can serve as a positive role model, giving youth hope, pushing them to be independent, and expecting them to succeed. Led by the Volunteer Center of Tucson, partners include city, county, police department, higher education, businesses, non-profits, and neighborhood associations. The goal is to serve 2,000 additional youth by the year 2000 and to engage 3,000 adults in mentoring programs.

Jewish Social Justice Center

Will mobilize 100,000 volunteer tutors and aids in eight target cities.

National Council of Volunteer Centers

Committed Volunteer Centers that are members of The Points of Light Foundation will develop 400 new collaborations on new or expanded youth initiatives connecting one million young people with caring adults and/or with the opportunity to serve.

National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education

Fully supporting the Summit goals, N.A.F.E.O. is pledging that 50% of the student enrollment (approximately 140,000 students) of the 117 historically and predominantly Black Colleges and Universities across the country will engage in Volunteer Community Service Projects in local communities with an emphasis on tutoring and mentoring.

8th Grade Class of Julian D. Coleman Academy of International Studies, Indianapolis, Indiana

Have committed to tutoring younger students in the John Hope Elementary School in academic subjects in order to prepare them for a successful transition into middle school. Tutoring will occur twice monthly, focusing on mathematics, language and arts.

Texas State Comptrollers Office/Family Pathfinders Division

Committed to matching 1,000 families on public assistance with teams of volunteers who will assist the families to become independent from welfare by the year 1999. This will be accomplished by working in partnership with Volunteer Centers, interfaith coalitions, religious judicatory organizations and civic clubs in the major metropolitan areas and with individual congregations and clubs in the small towns and rural areas.

The Pillsbury Company

II. Safe places to learn and grow.

III. A healthy start.

Will provide one million needy people, especially children, with free vision care by the year 2003.

Columbia/HCA Healthcare Corporation

Has committed to immunize one million children by the year 2000. Columbia, its employees and affiliated physicians, will be able to serve the immunization needs from the more than 600 hospitals, surgery centers, and home care locations.

IV. A marketable skill through effective education.

Junior Achievement

Will lead an effort to introduce an additional 2 million young people to economic opportunity through education, including the connection for many of them with summer jobs and internships by the year 2000.

AT&T

Has committed \$150 million to connect the country's 110,000 public and private elementary and secondary schools on the Information Superhighway by the year 2000. This commitment represents AT&T's single largest commitment to education and will make available some of its newest services and extensive education support to every school in the United States.

V. An opportunity to give back through community service.

United States Army

The Army commits to taking the lead in encouraging a joint effort among the military services to expand opportunities for active duty, reserve and retired military personnel to volunteer their time as mentors and tutors in schools in their local communities.

Major United Way Agencies

Nineteen of the nation's largest nonprofit agencies who are all key participants in the United Way system, are Summit partners, along with United Way of America. A collaboration among United Ways, local designees of the Points of Light Foundation and the Corporation for National Service will be responsible for assembling local delegations. Among the organizations that will contribute to the selection process will be members of Leadership 18 including: Girl Scouts of USA, American Red Cross, Big Brothers and Big Sisters of America, Boy Scouts of America, Campfire Boys and Girls, Boys and Girls Clubs of America, Catholic Charities USA, Child Welfare League of America, Council of Jewish Federations, Family Service America, Girls Incorporated, Goodwill Industries, International, National Mental Health Association, National Urban League, Salvation Army, YMCA of the USA, YWCA of the USA, United Neighborhood Centers of America, and the Visiting Nurses Association.

Steering Committee of College Presidents

Through the leadership of the President of San Francisco State University, 21 university presidents have committed 50% or more of their increase in work-study funds to community service initiatives and other university resources to support the America Reads Challenge. Members of the steering committee have also committed to each recruit five other university presidents.

VI. Many organizations and corporations have committed to focus on all five goals or fundamental resources. Far reaching commitments include:

The IBM Company

Partnering with United Way of America and AmeriCorps*VISTA, IBM will launch a Technology Corps in at least ten US cities to help not-for-profit organizations use up-to-date technology and provide higher quality services to people in need. AmeriCorps*VISTA members will provide free technology planning, staff training, and donations of equipment and software serving 2,000 not-for-profit organizations. By the year 2,000, agencies served will include day care centers, community centers, and senior citizen centers.

Local alumni leaders across the country will coordinate with local service providers to provide volunteer people power. The service leadership opportunities will focus on the five summit goals, with preference given to programs supporting ongoing relationships with young people.

On Monday morning, April 28, the President of the United States and former Presidents will stand together on the steps of Independence Hall in Philadelphia. Together, as Honorary Co-Chairs of The Presidents' Summit for America's Future, they will issue a call to action through service.

General Colin Powell, the former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, will serve as General Chairman of the Summit and the campaign that will follow. Henry Cisneros, former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, will serve as Vice Chairman.

The promise of America rests in the commitment, creativity and energy of its people to respond to our shared problems and to envision a shared future. Every day, Americans are doing that work – helping one another, addressing serious social problems, building stronger communities. Somewhere in America, in some way, solutions are being found to the problems we face.

But, unfortunately, our problems are vast and complex. There is a growing sense of disconnection. Too many of our people have been left out of the mainstream, and too many of our communities are fragmented along racial, ethnic, religious or economic lines. We find ourselves feeling that what divides us from one another is more powerful than the glue that holds us together in communities and as a nation.

The impact of this is greatest on America's young people. In small towns as well as big cities, far too many young people are growing up without the kind of adult role models and relationships needed for success. Far too many do not have adequate safe places to learn and grow, are not getting a healthy start, or the kind of education that creates real opportunities. And too many are unaware that giving through community service can make a difference in the lives of others and can be an enriching experience.

That is why priority must be given to expanded and more effective citizen service and new commitments from our nation's most important institutions. We must ensure that all of our youth have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

- an ongoing relationship with a caring adult or mentor;
- safe places to learn and grow;
- a healthy start;
- a marketable skill through effective education;
- an opportunity to give back through community service.

Certainly, all Americans can agree that we are all capable of doing more to achieve these goals.

The Presidents' Summit for America's Future will be both a celebration of our nation's heritage of volunteer citizen service and a call to action. It will be a call to commitment – for Americans to pledge to serve; for each of us to put our individual gifts to work for the common good; for us to renew the sense of civic responsibility that has served us well throughout our history as a nation.

The Summit will be the beginning of a new effort. In the weeks ahead, a national partnership will engage leaders from business, labor, the media, religious and educational institutions, and the voluntary sector. They will develop specific numerical targets in making available the five fundamental resources for our children against which we can measure our progress, through the year 2000. Third, delegations from approximately 100 communities and all 50 states will work together to turn the message of the Summit into concrete plans for action.

The Points of Light Foundation and the Corporation for National Service have taken the lead in building a working partnership with many of the nation's leading nonprofit organizations and businesses. Funding is being provided by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the Pew Charitable Trusts, the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation.

The spirit of the Summit transcends the individual concerns of its sponsoring organizations. Americans need not be separated by their differences. Through service, we can build strong connections with one another. And together, we can fulfill the American promise for all of our people.

Why Service Matters

There are problems government can't solve, so it's up to the rest of us—before it's too late. BY COLIN POWELL

NOT LONG AGO, I VISITED a Boys and Girls Club in a poor area in Florida. I was talking to a group of kids sitting on the floor around me about my own childhood. My family wasn't rich; in fact, we lived in a tenement in the Bronx. But, I told the group, my parents had created an enveloping family environment that gave sustenance, structure and discipline to our lives. We were taught to believe in ourselves. As I spoke, a 9-year-old boy raised his hand. "General," he asked, "do you think if you didn't have two parents you would have made it?"

That kid cut me right to the quick. He was saying, "This isn't my world you're talking about. Can I still make it?" My answer was: "Yes, you can." That boy may not have had what I had growing up, but, I said, "there are people here who care for you, who will mentor you, who will watch over you and teach you right from wrong."

As I began traveling around the country in retirement, my own interests turned inward,

from national security and cold war to what is going on here at home. I have seen social, cultural and racial divides that are deeply troubling. These are problems government can't solve, so it's up to us to get on with it. Last Friday we started: I had the unusual privilege of standing in the White House beside two of the presidents I had served—Bill Clinton and George Bush. One

had defeated the other at the polls, but old rivalries are giving way to a common purpose. We were together to announce the Presidents' Summit for America's Future, which will be held in Philadelphia on April 27–29. Presidents Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter and First Ladies Hillary Clinton, Lady Bird Johnson and Nancy Reagan will be present to welcome the delegations

from every state and hundreds of volunteer groups. The goal is not just to celebrate "service" but to encourage corporations and nonprofits to further mentoring, skill training, child health care, service to community and safe places for children.

It won't be easy. In my travels, I have met many youngsters. Too many of them are in despair. I saw for myself during 35 years in the military what happens when you take young people, provide a nurturing, structured environment and give them leaders to look up to. I've since wondered what would happen if only we could make that model available to every kid.

I find that so many people are anxious to do more, if only we can help them channel their time, energy and treasure. There's no reason every company in the country can't take one kid, 10 kids or 100 kids and teach them about the workplace. There's also a place for local government. Look at California, where Gov. Pete Wilson has created a program to recruit 250,000 mentors for at-risk youngsters by 2000. Each of us who has been blessed must reach down or reach back and lift up somebody in need.

Governor Engler, at the National Governors' Association Winter Meeting, described the Summit as an "unprecedented opportunity" that will call on all Americans to reach a new level of commitment for our nation's children and youth.

Governor Carper also encouraged all governors to attend the Summit. The Summit itself will have three focal points. First, the Presidents and First Ladies will join in the historic call to commitment and to action. Second, local, state and national leaders from all sectors will announce their organizational commitments to action - mobilizing their

people and their abilities for an unprecedented effort to turn the tide for America's youth and offering Governors an opportunity to highlight their states' records in service. Third, delegations from approximately 100 communities and all 50 states will work together to turn the message of the Summit into concrete plans for action. A copy of one of the letters inviting community participation in the Summit and a list of the initial communities being invited are attached.

I invite you to attend The Presidents' Summit. In Philadelphia, Governors will have the opportunity to announce commitments already made as well as future commitments that will help all young people have access to the five fundamental resources that they need. Governors will also be given the opportunity to visit with the Presidents and First Ladies, corporate chief executive officers and other leaders attending the Summit to share information about innovative programs and initiatives from your state.

I also ask that you assemble and lead a five person delegation of your choice to the Summit. We would encourage you to select individuals who are in positions to promote access to the five fundamental resources for children and youth that are the focus of the Summit. Further, I encourage you to consider that at least one of the members of your delegation be drawn from your state commission on national and community service – presumably the state commission chair or executive director. I understand that your state commission is now developing its own unified state plan for service. Other members of your delegation might include representatives of state agencies relating to children and youth, communities of faith, state legislators, state volunteer organizations, higher education institutions, and labor and business leaders. These state-wide delegations will be in the position to support future actions that will occur after April that will encourage this effort statewide and in communities that do not come to Philadelphia.

Within the next week a team from the Summit will be contacting your chief of staff to discuss your participation in the Summit and the partnership to follow. If a member of your staff has questions, please ask them to contact Marci Levin at 202-606-5000, extension 274.

Your leadership and support is essential to the success of this national effort. I look forward to seeing you at the Summit and to our common effort to make America a better place for all of our children and youth.

Characteristics and Make up of Community Delegations

Community delegations should be made up of up to 10 people who:

- have achieved success in effective citizen service;
- are committed to the idea that each person regardless of status in community, age, gender, race, religious or institutional affiliation or background has a place at the table and something to contribute to the community;
- are experienced in creating opportunities for others to contribute to solutions, not just do it themselves;
- know their community and the key players;
- are able to leave their institutional “hat” at the door;
- are not harnessed by the “business as usual” way of operating;
- have a record of “getting things done”; and
- above all, are trusted by others in their community.

In addition, community delegations should be selected with the following things in mind:

- The team should look like the community it represents recognizing diversity of age, race, economic background and physical ability, and include young people under age 25.
- The mayor must be invited to serve on the team or designate a representative.
- At least two of the individuals should be doing work in the community that addresses the overarching goal of achieving better conditions for children and youth and creating opportunities for other citizens to be involved in this work.
- The balance of the team should include some of the following perspectives that would be most beneficial in increasing the volume and effectiveness of citizen engagement in their communities: communities of faith, educators (elementary, secondary and higher education), businesses (large and small) and labor, neighborhood leaders (such as homeowner associations or neighborhood councils), social service delivery agencies, philanthropic groups (community, private or corporate foundations), media, and professional public sector managers.
- All team members should either be in positions to advance citizen action or already be doing so, either through work at the neighborhood or grassroots level or from a position of institutional power or administrative authority in the community.

Key Questions And Answers

When and where will the Presidents' Summit for America's Future be held?

The Summit will take place in Philadelphia, from Sunday, April 27, through Tuesday, April 29. The opening and closing ceremonies will be held at Independence Hall with most of the working sessions to be conducted at Philadelphia's Convention Center.

What are the goals of the Summit?

The Summit's goal is to mobilize millions of citizens and thousands of organizations from all sectors in order to ensure that all of our youth have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

- An ongoing relationship with a caring adult -- a mentor, tutor, coach;
- Safe places and structured activities during non-school hours to learn and grow;
- A healthy start;
- A marketable skill through effective education;
- An opportunity to give back through community service.

Through specific, measurable commitments toward these goals from organizations from every sector in America, and through community initiatives, the aim is to work together to turn the tide for America's youth.

The Summit's goal is to make effective citizen service an integral part of the American way of life.

Who is involved in the Summit?

President Clinton and former President Bush are honorary co-chairmen of the Summit. General Colin Powell is General Chairman of the Summit. Former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Henry Cisneros is Vice Chairman. Former Presidents Ford, Carter and Reagan have all pledged their active support and President Ford has agreed to attend the Summit, as has Nancy Reagan, representing President Reagan. The Summit is being organized at the initiative of the Corporation for National Service and the Points of Light Foundation.

What will happen at the Summit?

The Presidents and First Ladies will join in a historic call to commitment and to action. Leaders from all sectors will announce their organizational commitments to action – mobilizing their members and their abilities for an unprecedented effort to turn the tide for America's youth by the turn of the century. Delegations from approximately 100 communities and from all 50 states will work together to develop concrete plans for action. The community delegations will return home and plan their own local Summits that will stimulate further steps to meet the major goals.

Will Governors have a role at the Summit?

Every attending Governor will play a prominent role at the Summit. Each Governor is being invited to select – and head – a five-person state-wide delegation. While the agenda is still in its planning stages, Governors will have prominent roles along with the Presidents, First Ladies, mayors, and leaders of corporations, national organizations and foundations.

Why should a Governor attend?

The Summit will offer Governors an opportunity to highlight their states' record in citizen service, especially programs and plans targeting the nation's youth. The Summit will, as President Clinton remarked at the January 24, 1997 Press Announcement, "...shine a spotlight on what is working somewhere in America so that it can be adopted everywhere in America." Each Governor will play a leadership role at the Summit, and in the efforts to follow.

Is this a one-time event?

This is the launch of a multi-year effort. Those attending will be called upon to go back to their homes and communities and hold a Summit of their own. Governors may decide to hold a state-wide Summit. At the White House, President Bush said, "The Philadelphia summit is about getting more people off the sidelines. It is about citizens pulling together, leading by example, and lifting lives."

General Powell noted that in the years ahead we will build on what begins at the Summit so that as the turn of the century comes our work will have "...taken on concrete forms and we will see positive results from our efforts."

Dear Designees:

At the White House on Friday, January 24th, President Clinton and former President Bush jointly announced plans for a nationwide mobilization - a campaign through the year 2000 and beyond - for a new level of commitment to volunteer service focused primarily on the challenges facing our nation's children and youth. The effort will be formally launched with a Summit to be held in Philadelphia April 27th through April 29th.

I have agreed to be Chairman of the Summit and, more importantly, the multi-year effort that will come after the Summit. We will build on this in the years ahead so that when the turn of the century comes our work will have taken concrete form and we will see positive results. Henry Cisneros, the former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, will be Vice Chairman. I am writing to invite you to join this work and to play a key role in your community in preparing for the Philadelphia Summit.

The Start-up Summit

The Summit is organized on the proposition that America's young people must have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives:

- An ongoing relationship with a caring adult -- a mentor, tutor, coach;
- Safe places and structured activities during non-school hours to learn and grow;
- A healthy start;
- A marketable skill through effective education; and
- An opportunity to give back through community service.

While these conditions exist for many children and young people, in millions of lives they do not. All of us can and must do more to change that.

A large number of national corporations and other organizations, for example, are being invited to make new or expanded commitments to mobilize their people and abilities where they operate. Sample commitments were made public at the White House announcement of the Summit and are described in the enclosed material. Many additional national commitments will be announced at the Summit itself, and many more will be sought and secured following the Philadelphia event.

However, most achievements, just like most of the work to be done, will be the result of commitments made and acted upon in local communities. The only way to achieve the scale of change that will turn the tide across America is for individual community strategies to be defined and driven locally in *every* community in America. These objectives for children and young people will be primarily pursued by building on communities' own strengths. I ask you to help start that process.

The Request

I ask you to participate in convening individuals in your community who can move most effectively to achieve those five resources that we seek for all children and youth in every community. For each resource area, people should be brought together to decide what concrete steps ought to be taken. What kinds of commitments are needed in terms of the level and number in order to turn the tide for the children and youth in the community? Who is in the best position to organize these commitments? What groups need to work together? What kinds of specific targets should be set for the community for each of these resources? How can we track our progress? What are some of our "best practices" that can be shared and what do we want to learn from others?

In an effort to share the answers to these questions among communities and to provide every community with ideas for approaching the organizing challenge, teams from approximately 100 communities and all 50 states are being invited to the Philadelphia Summit in April. The initial list is enclosed. Your community is invited to participate in the Summit as one of these communities. Therefore, you are also being asked to accept responsibility for assembling a team of up to ten people to come to Philadelphia. Most of the delegates should be chosen from those who have convened to achieve the five resources. An outline of the suggested characteristics and make up of the community delegation is attached.

The two initiating organizations of the Summit, The Points of Light Foundation and the Corporation for National Service, have agreed to join with The United Way in the convening of interested parties from the public, private and non-profit sectors for the purpose of assembling a delegation. If you each accept the request to be the designee representing one of the three organizations, I ask that you three arrange to meet as soon as possible to determine how you will proceed as a team with these tasks and then do so. I am writing separately to the Mayor, inviting his/her participation in the Summit and requesting that he/she work with you as you carry out your responsibility. The Mayor will also be receiving a copy of this letter.

In the weeks ahead leading up to the Summit, a national partnership will engage leaders from business, labor, the media, religious and educational institutions, and the voluntary sector. They will develop specific numerical targets in making available the five fundamental resources for our children against which we can measure our progress through the year 2000. This partnership will also develop a range of strategies for assisting communities as they plan their follow-up strategies. Your community's own thinking will help inform this process.

Acting More Strategically

The challenge to every local community is to map out and act upon the distinctive combinations of local assets that will help it achieve the goals that it seeks. Therefore, our hope is that many of those who step forward will be, *working together*, in a position to act strategically because they *combine* the elements often necessary to move a community in new directions: neighborhood or grass-roots people, institutional power and administrative authority within the community. Therefore, my hope is that the people who step forward to become further engaged will want to work together to significantly advance citizen action and develop focused commitments to ensure that every young American has access to the five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives.

The campaign organizing process and the Summit itself will affirm the work already being done by individuals and organizations and help stimulate new efforts for others. Within some communities it will enhance what individuals are already thinking and what they are already doing. For others, it will be the jump-start they need. For all participants, it will be a way of building on the current wave of community and neighborhood-based innovation in America.

But we must also look differently at one another and at our organizations. Any inventory of the true resources and the potential activities of a community will reveal surprising strengths. In the end, it may be the contribution of those who are most often overlooked that provides the difference between accomplishing any of these goals and accomplishing none.

Communities that commit to the campaign will benefit by learning about "best practice communities" and "best practice programs", particularly those that mobilize more citizens and engage them in efforts that have proven effective in helping young people. By joining in this concerted effort, we expect that local organizers will gain access to valuable tools for helping children and young people. In addition, participating communities may gain access to resources made available by national organizations, foundations, corporations and others - tangible commitments to support a vigorous process for engaging citizens in targeted ways for youth. As one way of pursuing these different approaches, each community at the Summit will be asked to convene its own local Summit when the team returns home.

Next Steps

Please discuss among yourselves the request that you convene others, and let us know that you are beginning the process of assembling the Summit team and organizing for the longer term. I hope that you will accept the responsibility. I would appreciate one of you calling Rhonda Taylor at 202-606-5000, extension 282, as soon as possible to advise us of your decision and to designate among yourselves the contact person for us to communicate with between now and the Summit. We would ask that you select the entire team by March 1st so that they might receive a formal invitation. Some scholarship funds are available for team members who would otherwise

not be able to attend the Summit. We will send you additional information next week. To discuss any questions that you may have, please also call Rhonda Taylor.

Five Fundamental Resources for Children and Youth

An Ongoing Relationship with a Caring Adult

It is more important than ever for young people to have the sustaining presence of caring adults in their lives. While there are currently hundreds of thousands of mentoring and tutoring relationships, it is estimated that more than 10 million young people would benefit from the intervention of a caring adult. Our goal is to create the additional tutoring and mentoring relationships necessary for a positive impact on the lives of these young people.

Safe Places to Learn and Grow

Young people cannot flourish, develop and properly mature into productive citizens in a climate of fear and chaos. Our goal is to increase safe places and structured activities during non-school hours so that young people can study, play and receive the necessary guidance to reach their full potential in life.

Marketable Skills through Effective Education

Many young people attend school with little or no concept of how their studies will prepare them for a job or economic opportunity. Our goal is to forge new partnerships among businesses, schools and citizen volunteers to provide more young people with mentors, summer jobs, internships, and the essential skills of reading and mathematics.

A Healthy Start

Adequate health care and healthy behaviors are essential to every child's development and well-being. Our goal is to find new ways, in cooperation with government, health care providers and business, to assure that this is achieved.

An Opportunity to Give Back

Often young people are not encouraged, or given the opportunity, to help others. Our goal is to provide young people with the opportunity to serve, so that they become part of the solution and experience first-hand the benefit of being active citizens.

The Points of Light Foundation

Founded in May 1990, The Points of Light Foundation's mission is to engage more people more effectively in volunteer service to help solve serious social problems. The Foundation seeks to help Americans connect with one another through service as a new way to combat the sense of disconnection that is fragmenting our communities. The Foundation is working with 30 other national organizations through Connect America to get 10 million Americans to "commit to connect" through service in the next five years.

The Foundation is the national champion and resource organization for its 400+ member Volunteer Centers and for businesses committed to engaging their workers in volunteer service. It manages Make A Difference Day, National Volunteer Week, the President's Service Awards, the Awards for Excellence for business and the National Community Service Conference. Its Youth Ambassadors mobilize other young people to become community problem solvers. The Points of Light Institute offers products, membership services and training for thousands of local volunteer leaders worldwide.

Corporation for National Service

National service is a movement that provides opportunities for Americans of all ages and backgrounds to help solve community problems through service. Created in 1993 by Congress, the President, and community groups nationwide, the Corporation for National Service is a public-private partnership that oversees three national service initiatives:

AmeriCorps engages 25,000 citizens in a year of full-time, results-driven service sponsored by local and national nonprofits, AmeriCorps*VISTA, and AmeriCorps* NCCC. In return, AmeriCorps members earn education awards to help pay for college or pay back student loans. AmeriCorps members help communities meet critical challenges in the areas of education, public safety, human needs, and the environment.

National Senior Service Corps engages a half million Americans age 55 and older in results-driven service as Foster Grandparents, Senior Companions, and RSVP volunteers. The Senior Corps taps the vast wealth of experience, skills, and talents of older citizens to meet community challenges.

Learn & Serve America engages over one-million students from kindergarten through college in community projects that integrate service and learning. Learn & Serve America builds on the grassroots service-learning movement by promoting service as a learning opportunity and providing models and resources to schools, universities, and community groups. Students use academic skills to solve real-world problems, and learn the value of service, citizenship, and responsibility.

COMMUNITY "TEAMS" PARTICIPATING IN THE SUMMIT

The partnership that will emerge from the Summit needs to be with *every* community in America. To start this process, "teams" of ten to twelve citizens from each of approximately 100 communities from all 50 states are being invited to participate in the Philadelphia event.

The local teams will share "best practices" and begin to develop concrete action plans to achieve broader citizen engagement and additional local commitments to turn the tide for America's youth. As part of their work, these local teams will take the first steps in planning their own local and regional Summits to be held soon after they return home. It is anticipated that the Summit will also result in suggestions on ways that communities can better communicate with each other allowing "communities of interests and action" focused on the Summit goals to grow and deepen locally throughout the country.

Communities invited to attend the Summit will include the 50 largest cities; the largest city in those states that do not contain one of those fifty; plus a group of smaller or rural communities recommended by the Summit funders. A limited number of additional communities that have exemplary programs or special circumstances may be added.

Local designees of the Points of Light Foundation and the Corporation for National Service, in partnership with local United Ways, will be responsible for assembling a delegation with the characteristics described in the attached paper. In this process, they will consult widely with others throughout their community.

Because of space constraints in Philadelphia, a limited number of individuals will be able to attend the Summit from any one community. However, all of those who are part of the convening process in the local community should be included in the efforts that grow out of the Summit.

Acting More Strategically

The challenge to every local community is to map out and act upon the distinctive combinations of local assets that will help it achieve the goals that it seeks. Therefore, our hope is that the team will consist of individuals who, *working together*, can significantly advance citizen action or are already doing so because they combine the neighborhood or grass-roots people, institutional power and the administrative authority of the community.

Our plan is to bring a new and increased focus to the role of citizen service, particularly as it can help ensure that all of our youth have access to five fundamental resources that can help them lead healthy, fulfilling and productive lives: an ongoing relationship with a caring adult, safe places to learn and grow, a healthy start, a marketable skill through effective education, and an opportunity to give back through community service.

The Summit will affirm the work already being done by individuals and organizations and help stimulate new efforts for others. Within some community teams, the Summit will enhance what individuals are already thinking and what they are already doing. For others, it will be the jump-start they need. For all participants, it will be a way of building on the current wave of community and neighborhood-based innovation in America. The Summit process will assist communities and organizations in thinking and acting more strategically about achieving those goals.

But we must also look differently at one another and at our organizations. Any inventory of the true resources and the potential activities of a community will reveal surprising strengths. In the end, it may be the contribution of those who are most often overlooked that provides the difference between accomplishing any of these goals and accomplishing none.

Our Most Valuable Resource -- Ordinary Citizens

Whatever the goal, whatever the strategy, communities are discovering not only that new resources must be generated and that all groups must collaborate more effectively, but that the single most important available resource – ordinary citizens with talents that can make a difference – often is not being tapped to its full potential. Indeed, study after study makes clear that the average American is prepared to do more, if only someone would ask and would engage them effectively.

Communities that commit to the campaign will benefit by learning about “best practice communities” and “best practice programs” particularly those that mobilize more citizens and engage them in efforts that have proven effective in helping young people. By joining in this concerted effort, we expect that local organizers will gain access to valuable tools for helping our young people. The Summit should provide strategic organizing tools essential for creating and sustaining action. In addition, participating communities may gain access to resources made available by national organizations, foundations, corporations and others – tangible commitments to support a vigorous process for engaging citizens.

ATTACHMENT

Characteristics and Make-Up of Community Delegations

Community delegations should be made up of approximately 10 to 12 people who:

- Have achieved success in effective citizen service.
- Are committed to the idea that each person regardless of status in community, age, gender, race, religious or institutional affiliation or background has a place at the table and something to contribute to the community.
- Are experienced in creating opportunities for others to contribute to solutions, not just do it themselves.
- Know their community and the key players.
- Are able to leave their institutional “hats” at the door.
- Are not harnessed by the “business as usual” way of operating.
- Have a record of “getting things done.”
- Above all, are trusted by others in their community.

In addition, community delegations should be selected with the following things in mind:

- The team should look like the community it represents, recognizing the diversity in the age, race, economic backgrounds and physical ability of its members. It should also include people under age 25.
- The mayor must be invited to serve on the team or to designate a special representative.
- At least two of the individuals should be doing work in the community that addresses the overarching goal of achieving better conditions for children and youth and creating opportunities for other citizens to be involved in this work.

- The balance of the team should represent interests that can increase the volume and effectiveness of citizen engagement. The team will be enhanced by including members of religious groups, educators (elementary, secondary and higher education), business and labor (a large employer and small business), neighborhood leaders (such as homeowner associations or neighborhood councils), social service delivery agencies, philanthropic groups (community, private or corporate foundations), media, and professional public sector managers.
- All team members should either be in positions to advance citizen action or already be doing so, either through work at the neighborhood or grassroots level or from a position of institutional power or administrative authority in the community.
