We have always been committed to the important value of giving service to others and have incorporated into all of our programs, opportunities to give as well as gain from the experience.

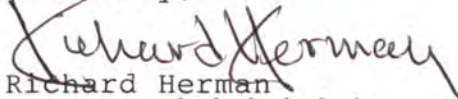
It would be truly wonderful to establish summer service programs in each state and provide kids with a chance to be useful to society and have lots of fun in the process.

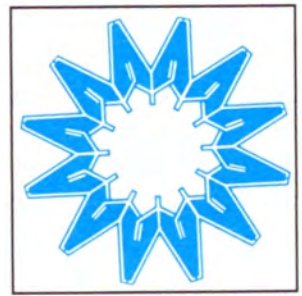

Budapest to the Baltic

Journalism in Action

Prague, Budapest, Transylvania, the Velvet Revolution, the Solidary Movement... More than ever before, journalists, artists, writers and photographers are being drawn to the exotic cultures and landscapes of Eastern Europe. Discovering inspiration in countries long-sealed behind the infamous Iron Curtain, many writers and photo-journalists find the American public is hungry for stories and information about these emerging democracies.

New and innovative, Budapest to the Baltic: An Experiment in Journalism has been created to give high school age students invaluable hands-on experience in one of the most exciting professions. Serving as a correspondent for their own hometown newspaper, students will travel through six countries learning techniques in writing, photography, radio journalism, and interviewing. Through Interlocken's extended family of contacts, students will meet Eastern Europeans their own age as well as teachers, journalists, artists, environmentalists and others.

The program is being led by two veteran journalist-leaders who will help students learn how to gain inspiration from their surroundings. Dean Olsher, Interlocken staff alum '86, is a creative radio journalist for National Public Radio in Washington. At NPR, Dean is a feature reporter and producer for the award-winning nightly news magazine, All Things Considered. Dean speaks German and French, is studying Czech, and plans to file reports en route. Jane Tyska is a writer and photographer who has trekked many miles through Poland, Hungary, Romania and other counties with her camera and reporter's notebook. Both Dean and Jane have ancestry from this part of the world, and are especially excited about traveling once again to the land of their forebears.

Interlocken is looking for students interested in writing, journalism, photography, illustration, politics, economics, foreign affairs or exploration. Students who apply should be ready to trek through towns and villages where foreigners are rarely seen, and be eager to talk with local people to learn the personal stories behind the news headlines. ♦
