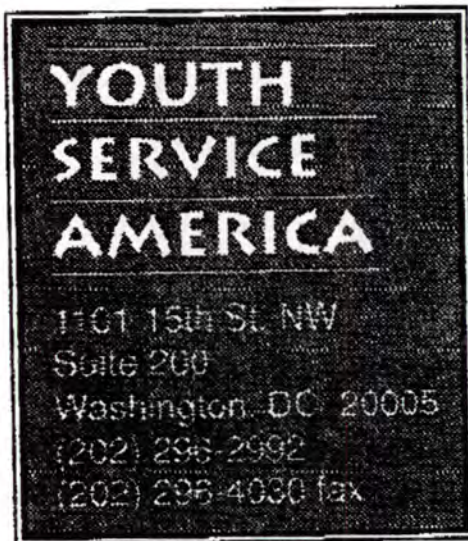

8 July 1993 Eli Segal Visit to Kansas City.

1. *Purpose.* The overall purpose of the visits is to (1) give Eli Segal a sense of the breadth of community service opportunities available in Greater Kansas City and the impact that President Clinton's National Service Initiative will have on these activities; (2) to give Kansas City service providers the opportunity to present their work to Segal; (3) to make the Greater Kansas City area more aware both of the National Service Initiative and opportunities already present in the area; and (4) to further confirm Consensus' role as convener of diverse interests working to improve the Kansas City area.

2. *Proposed Sites (As of 8 June 1993).*

1. Urban Youth Corps at the Full Employment Council (Kansas City, MO) Similar to the Donnelly College program: provides opportunity for both service and meeting GED requirements with a small stipend.
2. Volunteer Youth Corps of America (Overland Park, KS) VYCA is already receiving federal funds for their activities through the National Volunteer Service Commission.
3. Local Chapter of the Youth Volunteer Corps of America (Kansas City, MO) Located at the YMCA of Greater Kansas City. Works with fourteen to seventeen year olds in five projects in the Kansas City area. Each of the projects lasts four weeks.
4. YouthNet. (Kansas City, MO) Trained Outreach Workers work with at-risk youth in a variety of activities and counseling programs. The current program involves over nine thousand youth in cultural arts and sports activities. There are seventeen YouthNet Agencies associated on a program council. The group is year-round and works within schools, families, and inner-city neighborhood gathering places.

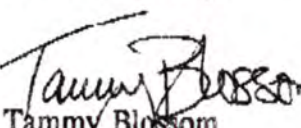

1. *The Dorothy Davis Award.* Awarded annually to a person... This year's winner is Rita Hotchkiss, founder of "Rita's Kids." The organization provides basic needs for abused or abandoned children.
 2. *The Consensus Achievers Awards.* There are four recipients this year:
 - *Harmony in Grandview.* Harmony has identified three goals for improvement within the school system: a multi-cultural curriculum, a multi-cultural staff, and a heightened awareness of community.

Segal Visit, continued.

1. Specifics vary considerably depending on the Mr. Segal's specific schedule.
2. *Transportation.*
 - After all the sites are chosen, Consensus staff will work through the complete schedule as a "dress rehearsal" in order to be able to correctly gauge the time of the presentations and the approximate time between sites. A detailed schedule should be complete two weeks before Segal arrives.
 - Travelling group. Beyond *Nick Lowery*, the number of staff travelling with Mr. Segal is uncertain. His office indicated that he might be travelling alone from Washington. Two Consensus staff members will accompany Segal throughout the day along with three/four Board members and Representative *Karen McCarthy*.
2. *Media Coverage.* Consensus will coordinate media coverage with the local print, radio, and television news outlets. An attempt will be made to match local media sources with local sites, thereby distributing coverage throughout the metropolitan area. Because of deadlines, Segal's site visitation is more likely to receive coverage than is his speech. The visitations, then, will be the principal opportunity for Kansas City media to observe and talk to Segal. Staff members are checking on the interest of C-SPAN in covering the visits, the lunch, or the dinner.

Site Visits.

8 July 1993 Eli Segal Visit to Kansas City.

1. *Purpose.* The overall purpose of the visits is to (1) give Eli Segal a sense of the breadth of community service opportunities available in Greater Kansas City and the impact that President Clinton's National Service Initiative will have on these activities; (2) to give Kansas City service providers the opportunity to present their work to Segal; (3) to make the Greater Kansas City area more aware both of the National Service Initiative and opportunities already present in the area; and (4) to further confirm Consensus' role as convener of diverse interests working to improve the Kansas City area.

2. *Proposed Sites (As of 8 June 1993).*

1. Urban Youth Corps at the Full Employment Council (Kansas City, MO) Similar to the Donnelly College program: provides opportunity for both service and meeting GED requirements with a small stipend.
2. Volunteer Youth Corps of America (Overland Park, KS) VYCA is already receiving federal funds for their activities through the National Volunteer Service Commission.
3. Local Chapter of the Youth Volunteer Corps of America (Kansas City, MO) Located at the YMCA of Greater Kansas City. Works with fourteen to seventeen year olds in five projects in the Kansas City area. Each of the projects lasts four weeks.
4. YouthNet. (Kansas City, MO) Trained Outreach Workers work with at-risk youth in a variety of activities and counseling programs. The current program involves over nine thousand youth in cultural arts and sports activities. There are seventeen YouthNet Agencies associated on a program council. The group is year-round and works within schools, families, and inner-city neighborhood gathering places.
