Volunteers are assigned after a process of recruiting, screening, training, and matching. Volunteers must be 21 or older to participate.

COVENANT HOUSE

Covenant House is a short-term crisis center for homeless and runaway youth located near the corner of Montrose and Westheimer. Volunteer opportunities include serving as a teacher or an assistant in the Older Youths General Education Program, screening youths that come in off the streets 24 hours a day, riding in outreach vans that go into the community to distribute food, serving as a life skills instructor (teaching workshops in money management, meal preparation, and job interview techniques) or contributing in a variety of other ways. Volunteers must apply and go through a screening process. All volunteers must be at least 21 to participate.

PROJECT APPLE

Project APPLE (Advocates from the Private Sector for Public Schools Literacy Education) is a collaborative effort between HISD, the Neuhaus Education Center and the Junior League of Houston, Inc. to train one 2nd grade and one 3rd grade teacher from each HISD elementary school in multisensory training strategies. Rice adopts a school for Project APPLE to provide volunteer substitutes so the teachers can be released from the classroom for training. The training the teacher receive is invaluable and will help pave the way for a more literate community of children. HISD estimates that the program will have an impact on over 30,000 children. Training sessions for substitutes will be held from 9-11:30 am and 6-8:30 pm on the dates below. If you are interested in substituting, you should attend one of the training sessions below:

Fall: Wednesday, September 30 or Thursday, October 8

Spring: Tuesday, January 12 or Wednesday, January 20

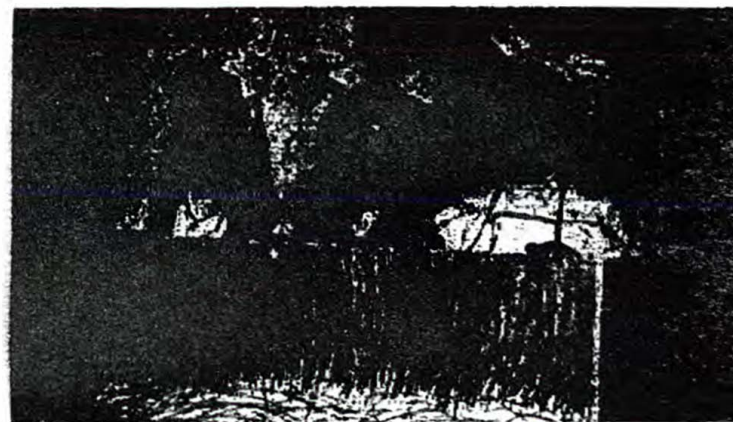
Volunteer substitutes will be needed in the classrooms from approximately 7:30 am to 3:30 pm on the following dates:

Outreach Day

Outreach Day is RSVP's biggest event of the school year. Once a semester, volunteers work on community service projects throughout Houston. Day-long activities inform volunteers about the needs of the community, recruit them for long-term service, and strengthen the relationship between Rice and local service agencies. Since 1987, volunteers have repaired and painted fourteen homes, sorted and boxed food, helped refurbish a shelter for children with AIDS, served meals in soup kitchens, and built a playground at a Houston park. In September 1992, more than 500 Rice volunteers joined forces with thirty local service organizations.

In 1991, RSVP held its first National Outreach Day, with alumni participants in 10 cities. Now each spring, Rice graduates across the nation join our Houston effort to take service beyond the hedges.



What is RSVP?

The Rice Student Volunteer Program (RSVP) was established in the fall of 1985 by a handful of students who wanted to create a liaison between Rice University and the Houston community. Since then it has developed into an umbrella organization in contact with numerous volunteer groups and social service agencies throughout Houston. Among other things, students volunteer at crisis shelters, teach adults to read and write, strive to conserve and maintain natural resources, and befriend youths and the elderly.

Mission Statement

By heightening student awareness, increasing community involvement, and raising social consciousness, we commit ourselves to understanding and meeting the needs of the community through direct, thoughtful action.

What Does RSVP Do?

RSVP coordinates or has affiliation with over forty service programs or organizations in Houston, and works to involve the Rice community in these efforts. Susan, the following is an update on what Baylor is doing. Only key changes are in "center" rather than "Institute" and in time line: from "has done" to "is in process of..." Baylor hasn't yet received funding they applied for, but decisions are imminent and look promising. They are building off a pilot "set" of five service learning courses currently being offered on a range of community issues. Their strongest community partner is the East Waco Independent School District. The Center's future appears promising. They are modelling themselves to some extent after the Whitman Center at Rutgers.

Thanks to Baylor University president Herbert H. Reynolds and a team of dedicated faculty and community members, Baylor is in the process of establishing a new Center for citizenship and Service. Building on a successful pilot program, the Center will combine the study of citizenship and democracy with service to the community of East Waco, Texas. College students, for example, will volunteer in the Waco public schools as mentors and tutors, while participating in classes where they talk about how the schools operate, the public policies that affect the health of the community and the effects of the economy on children.

The Center will be sponsored in part by grants from the corporations and foundations of Waco. The University and the local community understand that their futures are linked together and they are discovering new ways to collaborate, sharing resources and expertise, dreams and hard work all aimed at keeping their community vibrant into the next century.

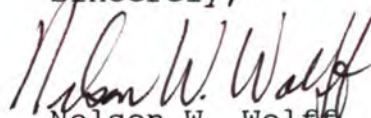
Dear Mr. Segal:

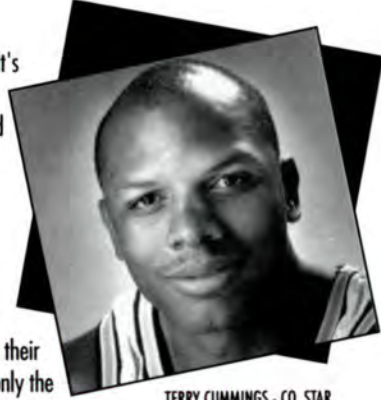
