Re: National Service For Law Students

Dear Mr. Segal:

Yesterday my law school Clinic students and I were discussing their future. Half of them lamented their inability upon graduation to afford to practice the public interest law which they enjoy (and have prepared themselves to do well) because of debt loads of well over \$50,000.00. The average student graduating, according to the Registrar, is \$47,000.00 in debt; apparently students interested in public interest need to borrow more (presumably because of low-paying summer jobs and the importance of unpaid clinical work in preparing for and obtaining public interest jobs). I vowed to my class to write to you to beseech you to include law school in any formulation of the Clinton program.

Interestingly enough, after class, the Clinical Legal Education Association newsletter arrived and I noted that CLEA (and others) had written you asking for the same thing.

Please add this voice to the cry for including the cost of law school in a national service plan. My students would much rather work representing neglected children, the homeless, abused women, and other disadvantaged people for \$12,000.00 or so per year for three years and have no loans to pay off than be forced into a career serving private and proprierted interests in order to try to make student loan payments of \$700 per month (\$9,400.00 per year) and still "eat rice and beans" for most meals.

Good luck in your worthy efforts to merge affordable education with public service. You would do both law students and the disadvantaged a great favor by including law schools in the program.

Dear Supporter of Volunteers:

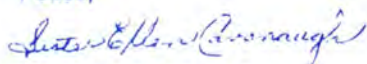

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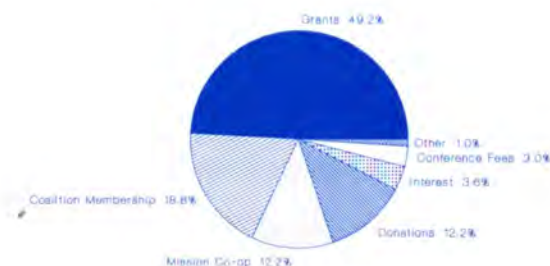

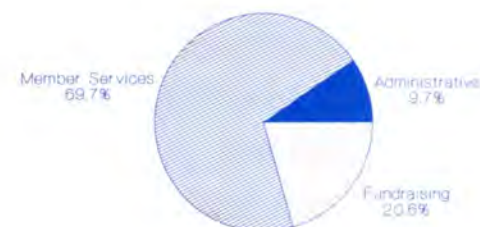

FROM THE OFFICE OF WORLD YOUTH DAY '93

What a strange combination of two worlds—here I am writing about World Youth Day for International Liaison! Sister Ellen has put me "on loan" to Sr. Mary Ann Walsh, director of communications for World Youth Day, for the months of January through March. It has been a great experience so far!

I am working directly with Sr. Mary Ann and her assistant Trish Gessner. The work I am doing is similar to the work I do at IL—generally administrative office work, but I have done a few unique things too. For example, probably the most interesting thing I have done was a story about the rise of volunteerism which is being sent out as a "backgrounder" to media across the country. (Backgrounders are pieces which give media all the information they need to write stories on topics related to an event. For example, other backgrounders for WYD include the history of the Archdiocese of Denver and a biography on Pope John Paul II, to name just two others.)

A copy of the story is enclosed with this issue and as you'll see, IL is featured throughout the story so we are hopefully getting a lot of exposure! This is a great way for us to get our (and your!) name out. For this story I took the results of the volunteer statistics survey (which all of you so kindly completed postcards for!) and compared 1992 numbers with numbers from past years. I also surveyed 109 volunteers from several programs asking them their motivations for doing a year of service, their families' and friends' reactions and background information such as religious affiliation, type of schooling and political leanings.

I would like to thank the directors and volunteers from the five programs who participated: Jesuit Volunteer Corps South, New Orleans Volunteers, Red Cloud Volunteers, VESS and Vincentian Service Corps. Without you this story would not have been possible! A special thanks goes to Cathy Trimble and Colleen Pritchard from VESS for allowing me to interview a couple of their volunteers for the story. The VESS volunteers' firsthand insights gave the story a special touch.

We have enclosed some information on World Youth Day. The international celebration is being held in Denver Aug. 11-15, 1993. It promises to be an incredible experience, and I would encourage all of you to let your volunteers know about it. (This could be the perfect post-service vacation!) And don't let the word "youth" fool you. In Europe, the word "youth" is equivalent to "young adult" and likewise WYD is targeting people aged 13-39. For certain discussions the participants will be broken down into groups of high school, college and young adults.

Besides the chance for discussion and sharing of ideas, there's the opportunity to see the Pope (along with 500,000 other people), meet young adults from around the world, visit Denver and generally share in a once-in-a-lifetime event.

WELCOME PRESIDENT CLINTON "THIS IS OUR TIME...LET US EMBRACE IT"

While the words of the inaugural address ring in our ears we should write:

**PRESIDENT BILL CLINTON
THE WHITE HOUSE
WASHINGTON DC 20500**

thanking him for his challenge to service. Tell the President about your program sharing with him that you are carrying out his mandate to service. Remind the President that any incentive to service being offered by his administration, for example, vouchers, stipends, loan deferment/cancellation, etc. should also be made available to volunteers with tax exempt organizations affiliated with religious institutions as long as their service honors the Church-State limitations found in the Higher Education Act and the National Community Service Act.

Share with the President that this is already in place through the Higher Education Act of 1980 which included a provision on deferment for our groups. Two years ago in the National and Community Service Act we were once again included. This is an established concept but one which must be kept in effect. The same applies to any grants to an organization that sponsors volunteers. Indicate that you are a member of ILLVIM and that we have been in contact with him.
