USDA AMERICORPS PROJECTS BENEFITTING CAIRO, ILLINOIS

On Friday, August 30, President Clinton is scheduled to make a speech in front of the public library in Cairo, Illinois. He should be aware that USDA has sponsored two AmeriCorps projects that have significantly benefitted Cairo: a year-long literacy and youth activities project and summer food recovery project.

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In the year-long program, Ms. Lorraine Johnson served full-time as an AmeriCorps Member from October 1995 through August 23, 1996 for both Alexander County and the City of Cairo. Serving at the Regional Adult Education Center, she provided one-on-one reading instruction to between four to 25 adult students per academic quarter; **students tutored by this AmeriCorps Member improved their reading skills by up to four and a half years' grade levels.**

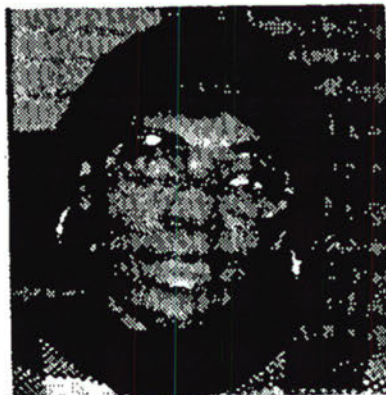

AmeriCorps Program Kicked Off In Cairo

An AmeriCorps Program, awarded as a result of a grant application submitted by the Enterprise Zone/Enterprise Community Application Committee, has resulted in a position being filled that involves half time tutoring in remedial reading and teaching parenting skills at the Regional Adult Education Center and the other half devoted to recruiting, training, coordinating and supervising youth in volunteer activities benefiting Cairo and other communities in Alexander County.



Lorraine Johnson

Lorraine Brown Johnson, 43 of Cairo, has filled the position since Oct. 16. Johnson may be known for her work with the Headstart program, which she was involved in for twenty years.

Johnson is a lifelong resident of Cairo; she is now married to Dexter Johnson, and has four children and grandchildren.

Johnson was hired for the position through the Illinois Department of Employment.

She will be working with adults in the Regional Adult Education Center, and with youth ages 12 through 20 years old in volunteer programs for Cairo and other areas.

Her mornings will be spent tutoring in reading and parenting skills, her afternoon and evening hours will be spent with youth activities.

The youth program involves young people who have agreed to work eight hours per month doing some type of community activity.

"Wherever we see a need for some help," said Johnson.

"We want the children to have a pride in their community," she said.

So far Johnson said she has had a good response to her recruiting efforts for young people.

"The children I am recruiting for the program are children I taught in Head Start," said Johnson.

Johnson said she also goes into the home of children who sign up for the program and explains the activities to parents.

Some of the volunteer work could be raking leaves at the library, to helping fill bags with sand for the luminary walk.

"I am enjoying what I am doing now," said Johnson.

The program is for any children in the community who would like to perform volunteer work for the area.

Ms. Lorraine Johnson was a fulltime an AmeriCorps Member for Alexander County/City of Cairo from October 1995 to August 23, 1996. Lorraine's time was divided between tutoring adults in basic literacy at the Regional Adult Education Center and helping youth plan and carry out projects to benefit the community.

Lorraine recruited and supervised local youth on a wide variety of community service projects including planting 60 trees in two city parks and helping the Alexander-Pulaski Chapter of the NAACP clean up Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard in Cairo. Youth collected food for a women's shelter, delivered food to 100 tenants in a public housing project at Christmas and helped set out over 4000 luminary candles for the Christmas Stroll, an annual community celebration enjoyed by over 700 community members.

Lorraine coordinated tutoring and story-telling projects whereby older youth worked with younger children. Older youth also supervised children in clean-ups and organized recreational events at a public housing complex. Other projects included recruiting and supervising youth in distributing seeds to community members from an America The Beautiful Fund grant. In her year's service, Lorraine recruited and supervised 167 youth volunteers who gave 780 hours of service to the community. Adults also volunteered to help with projects coordinated by Lorraine.

At the Regional Adult Education Center, Lorraine provided one-to-one tutoring to adults to help them increase their reading skills. Student's tutored by Lorraine gained up to four and a half year's grade level in reading. She tutored from 4 to 25 students per quarter.

For example, Lorraine tutored Suvera Lee, a 57 year-old woman working at about 4th grade level. One of 10 children of an Arkansas sharecropper, Suvera attended a segregated county school when she wasn't forced to work in the fields. Despite her poor education, Suvera worked to raise her 4 children, all of whom have attended some college.

Suvera came to the Regional Adult Education Center to learn to type so she could assist her church. She needed to read better to enter typing class. After one year of tutoring, Suvera scored 10.9 years in reading comprehension, 9.0 in grammar and 8.0 in math. Suvera enrolled in typing; she is now determined to get her GED. Lorraine's tutoring helped Suvera achieve her success.

Lorraine is using her AmeriCorps educational award to attend Southern Illinois University in Carbondale to complete her bachelor's degree.

Peace Corps' 35th Anniversary Celebration Will Be In Cairo

On Saturday, March 2, returned Peace Corps Volunteers will gather in Cairo to celebrate the 35th Anniversary of the founding of the Peace Corps.

The City of Cairo and the Peace Corps Fellows Program in Washington, D.C. are sponsoring the event.

The celebration in Cairo is one of the many events taking place around the country to commemorate President John F. Kennedy's March 1, 1961 signing of an executive order that created the Peace Corps.

Former Peace Corps Volunteers, James Kinder and Donna Raynolds of Cairo and Margaret Zuniga of Wickliffe, Ky., are on the local organizing committee.

Representatives from the Peace Corps Fellows Program in Washing-

ton, D.C. and the Peace Corps Recruiting Office in Chicago are expected to be on hand for the event.

Invitations have been sent to more than 115 returned Peace Corps Volunteers in southern Illinois, Kentucky and Missouri.

"At this point, we don't know how many people will attend," said Raynolds, "but we have already received reservations from as far away as St. Louis and Martinsville, Ind."

As part of the Anniversary Celebration, returned Peace Corps Volunteers are volunteering to help on local community improvement projects. They will help paint downtown buildings, clean up the Gem Theater, plant trees provided by the National Tree Trust and help the NAACP with a clean up along Mar-

tin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

Local organizations and individuals are invited to sign up to work alongside the out-of-town visitors. One Boy Scout Troop has already signed up to help plant trees.

AmeriCorps Youth Volunteer Coordinator Lorraine Johnson is helping to identify other youths and youth groups who would like to volunteer
