AmeriCorps* USA	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Consists of programs granted through state commissions and programs funded directly to national non-profit orgs. and federal agencies. • Goals of AmeriCorps*USA are: Getting Things Done; Strengthening Communities; Increasing Responsibility; and Expanding Opportunity. • Service has direct and demonstrable impact on communities in areas of education, public safety, human needs, and environment. • In exchange for service, AmeriCorps*USA members receive educational awards to help finance their college education, vocational training, or to repay their student loans.
AmeriCorps* VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • AmeriCorps*VISTA is a full-time, year-long program for people of all ages who commit themselves to increasing the capacity of community based organization to address the needs of low-income communities. VISTAs are assigned to 900 project sponsors located in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Sponsors may be private non-profit organizations or local public agencies. AmeriCorps*VISTA members receive an education award or post-service stipend payment in exchange for service.
AmeriCorps* NCCC (National Civilian Conservation Corps)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Corps members work in collaboration with community representatives to complete service learning projects in the areas of the environment, education, public safety, and human needs. Corps members, aged 18-24, are recruited from across the country and represent a cross-section of America. Corps Members, working in teams of 10-12, participate in innovative training programs that uniquely combine the best of military training techniques, Civilian Conservation Corps values and Service Learning models.
AmeriCorps* Leaders	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The AmeriCorps Leaders program will bring together a diverse group of national service graduates who will help develop high quality AmeriCorps programs and support the national service ethic.
Learn and Serve (K-12)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Major purpose is to fund school and community based service-learning programs for school-age youth via State Education Agencies (SEAs), local school districts, Indian tribes, U.S. territories, grantmaking entities, and State Commissions. These programs engage youth in service to their communities to enrich academic learning, promote personal growth, and help youth develop the skills needed for productive citizenship.
Learn and Serve (Higher Ed)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Funds programs based at colleges and universities that integrate community service with opportunities for critical reflection. In particular, many programs integrate service with academic study. Participants are diverse - not only traditional-age undergraduates, but also graduate and professional students, adult returning students, vocational students, and part-timers. Most programs address education and human needs. Eleven programs have AmeriCorps Members. Learn and Serve (Higher Ed) also funds statewide and national consortia that build capacity and strengthen infrastructure.
NSSC - SCP (National Senior Service Corp, Senior Companion Program)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Senior Companions provide non-medical personal support services to adults, primarily older adults, who are at risk of losing independent living at home or in the community because they are unable to perform routine activities of daily living. SCP is a cost effective model (\$3700 per participant per year for 20 hours per week service) which benefits income eligible participants over 60, frees agency caregivers from non-professional duties and extends care, and which helps reduce costly institutional care (\$35,000 per year).
NSSC - FGP (National Senior Service Corp, Foster Grandparent Program)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • FGP uses the skills and experiences of income-eligible adults 60 and over to strengthen families by providing person-to-person assistance to help address critical problems affecting children and youth including: abused and neglected children, boarder babies, children with AIDS, youth with substance abuse problems, teenage parents, and the learning disabled. The program works in partnership with local communities, and uses both Federal and local resources to meet locally-identified needs.
NSSC - RSVP (National Senior Service Corp, Retired Senior Volunteer Program)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • RSVP utilizes the vast talents of seniors willing to share their experiences, abilities, and skills in responding to a wide variety of needs prioritized by local communities. RSVP enables older persons to contribute to their communities through volunteer service, enhances the lives of volunteers and persons served, and provides communities with necessary and valuable services. Local projects determine priority community needs and recruit, place, and train volunteers to serve in community-based service agencies which supervise the volunteers.
HOPE VI	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • HOPE VI is a major urban revitalization demonstration program, built in partnership with HUD, to assist housing authorities and residents in the creation and implementation of viable community service plans. • Goals are: to create safe and decent public housing; to provide residents with the opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency; and to instill in residents the belief that with economic self-sufficiency comes an obligation to help rebuild one's community. • HOPE VI utilizes members from the AmeriCorps*VISTA Program, AmeriCorps*USA, Senior Companion Program, Foster Grandparent Program and Retired Senior Volunteer Program.

Gentlemen:

In an otherwise thorough article on AmeriCorps in your January 18, 1995 edition there is an inaccurate assertion that AmeriCorps national service programs has per-participant costs ranging as high as \$70,000. No AmeriCorps program costs anything approaching that amount; in fact, AmeriCorps' average cost is less than \$20,000 per member, including the nearly \$5,000 educational scholarship (or student loan repayment) earned through a full year of service.

The article's reference to a \$70,000 cost was with respect to an AmeriCorps program which in fact costs the federal government 7% of that amount. Through the program, AmeriCorps members -- lawyers from among the City's best law firms -- will provide full-time, free legal assistance to those without the capacity to afford counsel. The AmeriCorps members will work for half of their normal salaries, which their law firms will pay, while letting the lawyers work for the public good, rather than for private clients. The federal government pays only \$4,911 per AmeriCorps member (the educational award and minimal program support) and no portion of even the reduced salaries.

The AmeriCorps*Philadelphia Bar Foundation program is an outstanding example of leveraging each tax dollar. To confuse contributions with "costs" not only misstates the facts about AmeriCorps, but misses the entire principle behind this effort -- communities getting things done in a highly cost-effective way.

As a businessman and long-time *Journal* reader, I also pay attention to the "benefit" side of the cost-benefit equation. Right now, more than 20,000 AmeriCorps members are benefiting communities all across our country. They are not federal employees, but critical resources for local non-profits, and national organizations like the YMCA, the National Council of Churches, Habitat for Humanity and the Red Cross. AmeriCorps members are walking the police beat in Brooklyn and closing crack houses in Kansas City; they are raising reading scores by three grade-levels for a rural county's second graders in Kentucky; and they are in the forefront of disaster relief, whether it is Houston's floods, Los Angeles' earthquake or Idaho's fires. In thousands of different ways, AmeriCorps is changing America for the better.

Two Liberal Losers

President Clinton's turbid State of the Union address was a metaphor for modern government—sprawling, metastasizing, undisciplined, approaching self-parody. It underscored the fact that his administration now is politically almost harmless, but is aesthetically excruciating.

The address was heavily larded—exactly the right word, that—with semi-conservative words about cutting taxes, spending and regulations. However, regarding two matters Clinton considers crucial—the AmeriCorps “national service” program and the minimum wage—the address was half-baked and half-hearted liberalism.

AmeriCorps, says Clinton, will revive American volunteerism. The approximately 80 million Americans who volunteer their time to religious and civic organizations may wonder who needs reviving and how much it matters whether AmeriCorps eventually produces 100,000 more volunteers. Today 2.9 million of America's 80 million volunteers are ages 18 to 25, the ages of AmeriCorps “volunteers.”

To Americans who use the English language to communicate thoughts rather than parody them, the use of the word “volunteer” in connection with AmeriCorps' recruits must seem like the latest redundant evidence that Washington is stark raving mad. To plain-speaking Americans, a volunteer is someone who contributes his or her unpaid labor. Clinton's “volunteers” will be paid a \$7,400 annual stipend, plus \$9,450 worth of college expenses over two years. And this is not all that Clinton's little puddle of government-manufactured “volunteers”—little relative to the 80 million true volunteers who need neither financial incentives from, nor organization by, government—will cost taxpayers.

In addition to the health and child-care entitlements for AmeriCorps members, and AmeriCorps' Washington bureaucracy, money is spent to locate “volunteers” to take AmeriCorps money. The Omaha World-Herald says that AmeriCorps gave Nebraska's state government a \$457,622 grant to recruit 23 AmeriCorps members. That \$19,896.60 per recruit calls into question the effectiveness of the \$1.7 million AmeriCorps paid a Washington PR firm for national advertising.

According to the New Citizenship Project, a conservative advocacy group, of AmeriCorps' first 20,000 “volunteers,” 1,200 are working for agencies of the federal government. The New Citizenship Project warns that AmeriCorps is ripe for politicization, citing a Washington Monthly report that a 1993 pilot project became an exercise in identity politics and political correctness, developing ethnic and homosexual caucuses. And the Los Angeles Times reported that a 1994 pilot project in San Francisco used its “volunteers” to protest “three-strikes-and-you're-out” crime legislation.

Clinton calls AmeriCorps the achievement “I would say I was most proud of.” No minimum wage increase will be rival for that title.

In 1992 candidate Clinton endorsed increasing the minimum wage. During 1993 and 1994, when he had a congressional majority that would have done it, he did not ask for it, primarily because some sensible Democrats told him it was a dumb idea. Al From, head of the centrist Democratic Leadership Council, which once advertised Clinton as a New Democrat, says of the minimum wage proposal: “It's anachronistic, it's a loser, it's got no bite with the middle class. And it screams old Democrat.”

Now that there is a Congress that Clinton knows will not enact an increase, he calls it urgent. However, during Tuesday night's oration, when he was pitilessly detailed about almost everything, he remained reticent about how much the minimum wage should be increased. Leaving aside the unwisdom of government telling employers what to pay employees, it is generally true that when you increase the cost of something, people buy less of it. There is evidence that is true of labor at the low end of the wage scale.

The first federal minimum wage—25 cents an hour—was enacted in 1938. Since then, the longest time between increases was from 1981 to 1990. During that span, teenage unemployment (teenagers are a third of all minimum wage earners) fell from 23.2 percent to 15.5 percent, and black teenage unemployment fell from 48 percent to 31 percent. Then the forces of compassion struck, raising the minimum wage twice, in 1990 and 1991. In 1992 teenage unemployment was up to 20 percent.

Now, it is problematic establishing causation for any phenomenon as complex and varied as joblessness. And some studies, including one by associates of the current secretary of labor, purport to show that the minimum wage can be increased somewhat without increasing unemployment. However, the question is academic because a former academic—Rep. Dick Armey, the ex-professor of economics who now is majority leader—says he will oppose an increase “with every fiber of my being,” and he will have much company.

But this is of more than academic interest: The minimum wage is now \$4.25 an hour. Clinton is said to be thinking about seeking \$5 an hour. The New Citizenship Project calculates that AmeriCorps “volunteers”

Mr. Will's January 29, 1995 column ("*Two Liberal Losers*") contained factual errors and misinterpretations. Eli Segal has written to Mr. Will, correcting his assertions and inviting him to join Eli in visiting AmeriCorps programs. This memorandum sets the record straight and includes the items Eli brought to Mr. Will's attention.

- Mr. Will repeated an old and inaccurate claim that the San Francisco Summer of Safety program organized a rally against the Clinton Crime Bill. We've looked into it and have written assurance from the program and the City agency that supervised it that no one from the program organized, encouraged or was known to have attended such a rally. Furthermore, the program certified what the law and our regulations make crystal clear: advocacy and political activities aren't part of AmeriCorps and will lead to a cut-off in funding if they occur. And more important -- the program worked. We have received letters from the City's Mayor (a former police chief) and its current Police Chief, indicating that the effort helped reduce gang tensions and make the City safer.
- Mr. Will repeated another old and inaccurate assertion that Nebraska spent an excessive amount to recruit 23 AmeriCorps Members. In fact, the state spent less than \$1,000 in recruiting. Mr. Will lumped together the full grant amount made to a Nebraska program (including living allowance, program support and all other items -- which at \$13,853 per AmeriCorps Member amounts to nearly exactly the national average), together with the legislatively-mandated administrative start-up support for the State Commission (responsible for more than AmeriCorps) and mislabelled the aggregate "recruiting".

Then there are Mr. Will's arguments which, although not demonstrably false, are clearly misleading:

- He cited the maximum education award of \$9450 -- but that's for two full years of service, and that's the exception, not the rule.
- He referred to a "Washington bureaucracy". The entire federal portion of AmeriCorps' operations, including clearly non-overhead operations such as evaluations and training, constitutes 5.1% of FY'95 funding. We have merged and downsized existing federal agencies, and devolved the bulk of decision-making and responsibility to the states. (Incidentally, AmeriCorps is a funded, non-mandate: no state, non-profit organization or individual must participate and those states which elect to compete for AmeriCorps Members are provided with the administrative funds to fulfill their responsibilities.)

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- He characterized our contract with the Ogilvy firm as "advertising" and doubted its efficacy. In fact, Ogilvy does far more than advertise: our toll-free information line handled more than 200,000 inquiries from interested Americans last year. As a point of comparison, the advertising and recruiting budget for the Department of Defense is \$1.8 billion (1000 times greater, to recruit 20 times more members than AmeriCorps).
- He claimed that applying the term "volunteer" to compensated service like AmeriCorps does violence to plain English. We use the term "Member" -- not "volunteer". AmeriCorps Members provide focused and trained service, usually full time.
- He belittled the potential of 100,000 AmeriCorps Members in a sea of millions of uncompensated volunteers. Ironically, Mr. Will has written eloquently about the ability of a small number of Americans, drawn together by commitment and vision, to make an enormous difference. And let's see what AmeriCorps Members have already accomplished:

-- In the 1993 Summer of Service, 87 participants in Texas put together the state's first full-scale immunization outreach campaign. In 8 weeks, 104,000 children were protected from preventable diseases that each year have taken the lives of Texas babies.

-- In the 1994 Summer of Safety, the NYPD reports that recreation areas and public pools policed by the Cadet Corps were free of assaults for the first time in memory. At the same time, the program in Kansas City shut down 12 crack houses and reclaimed a neighborhood's only park from gangs. That's why Kansas City's Police Chief Steven Bishop says "the partnership of national service and community policing is a winner in Kansas City."

-- In one natural disaster after another, whether it was the floods in the Mississippi River valley, or in Houston, or in California; or the forest fires of Idaho or the earthquake in Los Angeles, AmeriCorps Members were there. FEMA's Richard Krimm has written, "They have helped literally thousands of victims pick up the pieces of their lives." And they're still there, long after the waves of initial volunteers have had to return to their own jobs.

-- And AmeriCorps is getting things done outside the city limits as well. In rural Simpson County, Kentucky, AmeriCorps Members are tutoring half of the County's second graders. After only four months, they are well on their way to raising reading scores from two grades behind official standards to one grade above.

This brings us to Mr. Will's central argument that the existing volunteer ethic does not need the resources that AmeriCorps represents. His is a view rejected by the Independent Sector, which has stated that the nation's social challenges exceed their capacity, and by the action of many of the nation's premier charities, which compete to join AmeriCorps. From the YMCA to the Multiple Sclerosis Society, from the Red Cross to Habitat for Humanity, America's most respected non-profits have recognized that the focused efforts of full time, trained and committed AmeriCorps Members help them accomplish more -- and let them deploy part-time, sporadic volunteers more effectively.

Habitat for Humanity provides a perfect case in point. AmeriCorps Members have been trained by the program in all facets of home construction and now train and supervise the temporary (and uncompensated) volunteer talent that they attract -- from college students on Spring Break to professionals on the weekends and retirees in the afternoons. As a consequence, the AmeriCorps team will build 90 homes for working families in Homestead, Florida this year. That's why Habitat's Jerry Bass says "we could not do the job without them."

These are important achievements, and they are not unique AmeriCorps stories. We do not maintain that AmeriCorps will end hunger or illiteracy or pollution or crime. But AmeriCorps members are making a real difference, every day. Our challenge is to match the enormous good that the Peace Corps has accomplished in its 34 years and the equally dramatic achievements of the CCC 60 years ago. We are working hard to be just as effective.

Intelligent criticism can make AmeriCorps better. We need to invite critics and others to come see AmeriCorps in action. The AmeriCorps National Service Network consists of 350 programs all over the nation. So, when people ask about -- or criticize -- AmeriCorps and the work of its Members, give them the facts and ask them to call our offices. We'll arrange for them to see a program near them. This isn't about debating points or political jousting. It's about getting things done for the country we all love.

AmeriCorps*NCCC is part of a network of AmeriCorps programs operated by the Corporation for National Service

AmeriCorps* National Civilian Community Corps' mission is to promote civic pride and responsibility through community service. Corps Members work in collaboration with community representatives to complete service learning projects in the areas of the environment, education, public safety, and unmet human needs. ENVIRONMENT

CHESAPEAKE BAY ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS

Northeast Region Campus: Aberdeen, MD

Corps Members are involved in five major projects that emphasize restoration and stewardship of the Chesapeake Bay. This collaborative effort of federal and state agencies on Ecosystem Management in the Chesapeake Bay involves 28 federal and state agencies. Corps Members are involved in shoreline and beach restoration, erosion control and fish migration and spawning efforts.

SAN DIEGO CULTURAL RESOURCES

Western Region Campus: San Diego, CA

AmeriCorps*NCCC members are uncovering California's long neglected first European settlement and discovering evidence that revises historians' visions of the San Diego Presidio. Twenty AmeriCorps*NCCC members are excavating, surveying, mapping, classifying, segregating, preserving artifacts, and assisting with the development of school activities. Corps Members work with area school children to increase awareness of early Hispanic-American history.

CALIFORNIA STATE PARKS A.D.A. SURVEY

Western Region Campus: San Diego, CA

AmeriCorps*NCCC and California State Parks Department are working to expand the Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility effort. Teams take measurements, test equipment and complete survey forms. Following the survey, Corps Members will construct ADA certified trails, boardwalks and ramps for building access.

Central Region Campus: Denver, CO

Corps Members partner with low-to-moderate income residents to turn empty lots into community gardens.



EDUCATION

SAN DIEGO URBAN LEAGUE

Western Region Campus: San Diego, CA

AmeriCorps*NCCC members are assisting the San Diego Urban League staff in three program areas -- job development, peer education and pregnancy prevention. Corps Members teach immigrants, refugees and people labeled "hard to employ" job-seeking and job-keeping skills, address "world of work" values and promote the Urban League motto, "It Pays to Work!"

- Corps Members teach adolescents about unintended pregnancies and assist in developing positive attitudes and making positive life choices.

HARFORD COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Northeast Region Campus: Harford County, MD

AmeriCorps*NCCC members are working within seven Harford County Public Schools to create a mentoring program and crisis prevention center. They assist all students, including at-risk and special needs students with their social and academic development. Corps Members are working with students to increase the level of participation in the schools' community service programs and to motivate at-risk students to stay in school. Corps Members provide tutorial assistance to help students increase their high school state proficiency test scores.

FORT JOHNSON MIDDLE SCHOOL

Southern Region Campus: Charleston, SC

Corps Members collaborate with Fort Johnson Middle School alumni, staff, parents and students to refurbish the school's facilities by doing minor carpentry. Corps Members are refinishing the gym floor, painting lockers and insulating the cafeteria. This project will promote parent and community participation and encourage their long term involvement in recreational activities at the center.



HUMAN NEEDS

SAN DIEGO COUNTY IMMUNIZATION PROJECT

Western Region Campus San Diego, CA

Two AmeriCorps*NCCC teams are assisting in the development and implementation of a comprehensive city-wide immunization outreach campaign. The goal is to raise the percentage of fully immunized children in the area to 90 percent by 1995. Corps members gain hands on experience with complex community health outreach programs, health education and human welfare needs, while learning to plan, implement and evaluate urban community-based projects.

PERRY POINT VETERANS' AFFAIRS HOSPITAL

Northeast Region Campus Aberdeen, MD

Five AmeriCorps*NCCC teams are participating in ongoing work directed toward improving the quality of life for patients at the Perry Point VA hospital. The work includes designing and implementing new recreational programs including wheelchair golf, fishing excursions and waist-high gardens. Approximately 130 AmeriCorps*NCCC team members will partner with the citizens of South Phoenix Village to revitalize a 12 block area in the neighborhood. Corps Members will travel to Phoenix, AZ to commemorate the service legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The "Dream Street" project consists of refurbishing 14 homes in a severely economically depressed area.

WEST GEORGIA MEDICAL CENTER

Southeast Region Campus LaGrange, GA

AmeriCorps*NCCC members are assisting the elderly in maintaining a healthier lifestyle at home rather than being institutionalized. Corps Members assist the elderly by escorting them to doctor's offices or meal sites, helping with daily living chores, building ramps for wheelchair bound patients and doing patient observations.

The services performed will enhance the stability and appearance of the historic building, providing an accessible and affordable facility for community-based arts, conferences and activities. The restoration of the center, which is located in a high crime area in the city of Denver, symbolizes the revival and stabilizing of the neighborhood and adds to the aesthetic and financial strength of the community. Corps Members receive training in historical conservation techniques, wood and stained glass restoration.

U.S. Forest Service Campground Conversion

The U. S. Forest Service is converting ten campgrounds on the South Platte Ranger District from non-fee to a fee collection system. Also, there is a need for fence construction to ensure the protection of identified campgrounds and resources for cattle grass grazing.

One (1) project site will be in Maine's premier wilderness park, Baxter State Park and the second project site will be in Western Main, a Maine Bureau of Public Lands Management Unit, relocating a feeder trail to the Appalachian Trail which also leads to a Maine Forest Service

Corpsmembers will construct rockstairs, waterbars and treadway and install other erosion control devices to accomplish the projects. This will improve outdoor recreation opportunities for over 10,000 Maine citizens and visitors.

Harford County Weatherization

This project will provide energy and water conservation measures (and smoke detectors if needed), at no cost to the customer. The areas selected will be in Aberdeen and Havre de Grace, which contain the highest percentage of low-income households. The customer will be educated by the corps members in methods to conserve energy.

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The target areas contain approximately two thousand (2,000) households of which we expect to complete 25% or five hundred (500) units. The initial contact with the customer will be made by informational doorknob hangers installed by the Corps Members the week preceding the actual work.

The staff of Harford County Weatherization will train NCCC members in the installation of materials. This training will include installing compact fluorescent lamps, hot water tank wrap, pipe wrap, adjusting hot water temperature, installing low-flow showerheads and faucet aerators and toilet water tank displacement bags. We expect to have two (2) Corps Members in each home for approximately one (1) hour to do the work and educate the customer on ways to conserve energy. The educational aspect will be taught to Corps Members by BGE Customer Service staff.

The results of this project will be lower utility bills for the customer, thereby freeing up money for other necessities of life. Also, by conserving water and energy, the entire community benefits from reduced pollution from waste water treatment plants and power generating plants. This will also provide an opportunity to introduce the NCCC to the community around their campus in a most positive manner.

Harford Glen -Environmental Residential & Outdoor Education

Transportation Survey Project - Town of Bel Air

The project is intended to collect base data needed to develop transportation improvements in and around the Town of Bel Air. Data collection will include tracking of existing traffic by type, volume and destination. Corps Members will be involved in wide variety of field data collection, including: accurately noting counts, vehicle type, & etc.; collecting survey responses from transit patrons; collecting data from existing "Park and Ride" sites; and videotaping specific intersections. Project involves stream surveying using Global Positioning Systems (GPS) and GIS to provide information regarding the hydrologic stability and potential for restoration for a large number of stream miles and stream restoration projects throughout the Chesapeake Bay watershed; also, urban stream restoration projects in Prince William County, Virginia, and other sites in Northern Virginia and rural stream restoration projects in Western Maryland, and other possible locations.

USDA - National Visitors Center

The building and grounds of the Log Lodge at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center present to the NCCC an opportunity to continue a tradition begun when the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) completed the building in 1937. The historic Beltsville Log Lodge represents the building of an important and memorable era. It was built as a recreation center for the CCC camps of the region. The men of the Beltsville camp completed many other conservation projects including hard-surfacing Powder Mill Road through the Center. Today, the Log Lodge is a national outreach facility of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service. Teachers, professionals from science and agriculture, and foreign guests arrive daily at the ARS National Visitor Center. New projects that would be of interest to the NCCC include re-mulching and maintenance of the Nature Trail with either shredded hardwood mulch or gravel. It could be started immediately and would require minimum

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tools.

Part of the trail is a damaged foot bridge and viewing area across one end of the pond behind the Visitor Center. The bridge could be reconstructed of pressure-treated lumber and placed on plastic drums. Sketches could be approved by the Beltsville Engineering Branch. A materials list would be needed. The list will be distributed to potential donors by the non-profit Friends of Agricultural Research at Beltsville (FARB) before proceeding.

Another project is the construction of two (2) small non-permanent gazebos, one on either side of the pond along the foot path. These also would be made with pressure treated lumber. Again, working sketches and a materials list would be needed prior to starting.

If these projects are successful, two (2) more complex projects could be considered: the construction of a picnic pavilion next to the National Visitor Center and an outdoor classroom at one end of the pond. If these two projects are eventually drawn as permanent structures, they would require special permits and study before they could be constructed on federal property.

The number of Corps Member teams will depend on how many projects can start at one time.

Employees, students and other visitors will use the additions, which could greatly enhance the enjoyment of the existing facility, and give visitors a greater chance to enjoy the environment around the Beltsville Center.

The cooperation between NCCC and BARC and the need for donated materials will be handled exclusively by appropriate non-profit groups, such as FARB, and not by federal employees.
