INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA -- The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is recruiting for the AMERICORPS national service project that will begin in January in Indianapolis.

AMERICORPS is President Clinton's national service initiative that allows diverse groups of young people to earn college or vocational school scholarships while performing critical service to meet human, environmental, public safety and educational needs. Participants in the program will work for a year earning a stipend of \$12,000, and then receive an educational award worth \$4,725.

The 2 participants in the Indianapolis program will provide technical service to landowners to educate them in regard to impacts of decisions made in regards to landuse practices.

Any citizen that possesses at least two years of college or more is eligible to apply for the program. There is no maximum or minimum family income required to apply. Applications will be accepted until December 30, 1994.

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy urged all interested Americans to apply. Said Espy, "AMERICORPS is grounded in the mainstream values of community, responsibility, and opportunity. It is good for the participants, who benefit from their increased ability to attend college or vocational school --- good for communities, which benefit from their service --- and good for the country, which benefits from a renewed civic spirit."

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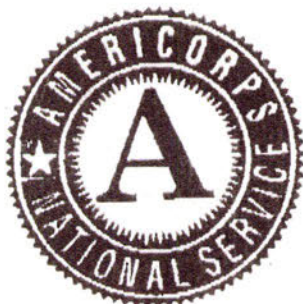

1. What work will be done? What service activities will your participants engage in?

Hiking and biking trails improved. Tent sites developed. Picnic table constructed and repaired, picnic shelters constructed and repaired.

10 units of governments, 10 communities, 5 counties with 102,323 people.

COMPONENTS OF OBJECTIVE STATEMENTS: Identifying socially disadvantaged households who do not have safe drinking water in the county, and working with organizations, local, state, federal agencies to provide safe extension of rural water for needy households.

1. What work will be done? What service activities will your participants engage in?

Members will identify limited resource and socially disadvantaged individuals who do not have safe household drinking water within Crittendon County, Arkansas. Members will work with local rural water districts, county governments, state legislature, and state governmental units for extension of lines to the needy households. Members will work with affected residents in preparing and submission of applications to FmHA for assistance in installation of needed plumbing facilities for applicant households. Members will identify available labor force to install plumbing fixtures as funds are secured.

2. What is the hoped for result of the work/activities described above?

Water lines extended to all needy residents. All limited resource and socially disadvantaged residents will have the necessary plumbing installed in their homes to allow for a better quality of life.

3. How will you measure the quality of your product or impact of your service?

By drastically reducing the infant mortality rate within the defined area by making high quality drinking water available to all limited resource and socially disadvantaged residents within the county.

4. By what standard will you gauge success?

By determining the percentage of house holds who are furnished a safe supply of drinking water. The target is 100% with a minimum target of 80%.

5. How many individuals will receive the benefit of the work your participants perform?

An estimated 24 households are without drinking water. This equates to an estimated 100 individuals.

Farks to get boost from AmeriCorps

■ A group of young adults from the National AmeriCorps Program will work for the Quincy Park District and other area agencies.

As many as seven young workers hired through President Clinton's AmeriCorps National Service Program could be working for the Quincy Park District as early as mid-October.

And at least two other local agencies, the American Red Cross and West Central Child Care Connection, will benefit from the program.

"This is a real opportunity for the Park District," said Mayor Stephen Carpentier. "We have an obligation to us as well as to the people, but we'd have to go that way."

The young people will be recruited through the National Civilian Community Corps, an AmeriCorps program. The workers can work 1,700 hours.

"That's almost a full year of employment with no cost to the district," he said.

AmeriCorps is a national service program designed to employ American citizens 18-24 years of age in jobs that address

educational, human services, public safety and environmental concerns. At least as 20,000 young people are expected to be serving by early 1995.

Corps members receive lodging, meals, uniforms, health care and child care in addition to an \$8,000 living allowance for 11 months of service. After completing the program, they will receive an education award of \$1,725, or a cash payment of \$1,362.

While with the Park District, the young people will work on maintenance, landscaping and basic environmental practices.

Because the federal government is doing the hiring, Carpentier couldn't guarantee the workers would come from the local area.

"But applications from local residents will be given priority," he said.

In about two weeks, an AmeriCorps participant will begin work with West Central Child

Communities, workers benefit from program's projects

PITTSFIELD, Ill. — Bill McCartney wants to get the AmeriCorps program up and running after investing weeks in preparations.

The workers — 15 serving Adams, Brown, Calhoun, Pike and Schuyler counties — begin their jobs Monday. A formal kickoff for the U.S. Department of Agriculture program will take place Friday morning in Quincy's Union Park.

The projects will range from economic development to cleanup. The program

promises to benefit communities across the region — and the workers who earn job skills and a scholarship.

McCartney screened 41 applicants. Many came from the five-county area, but some from as far away as Springfield and Edwardsville.

"What we looked at was what they wanted to do with their lives," McCartney said. He is the AmeriCorps coordinator and executive director of Two Rivers Resource Conservation and Development in Pittsfield.

"This is more than a job. We want to provide a living allowance and an opportunity to get on to school."

Anyone over 17 years of age including high school dropouts, high school graduates, college students, college graduates and professional school graduates is eligible for the nationwide program.

Area AmeriCorps

PITTSFIELD, Ill. — Two years ago, Chad Denison started school at Western Illinois University in Macomb.

Then he ran out of money, forcing him to enter the job market and put his education on hold.

A new federal program now will give Denison the chance to earn more job skills — and money for college.

Denison is one of 15 people hired for the national AmeriCorps program, sponsored locally by the Two Rivers Resource Conservation and Development Corp. in Pittsfield.

"I tell people it's President Clinton's national community service initiative, his answer to the Peace Corps," said Bill McCartney, Two Rivers executive director and AmeriCorps coordinator.

The people will be working within the confines of the United States to help communities improve environmental, public safety, health and human needs.

Nine people will work with the rural economic development program, while six others will focus on public lands and environment in the area served by Two Rivers. That includes Adams, Brown, Calhoun, Pike and Schuyler counties.

Each will earn a salary and a \$4,725 scholarship after 1,700 hours of service. The workers start Monday and will finish in August 1995.

Denison, 22, will work with the rural economic development team — and he'll be meeting people that could help him in the future.

"It's a good program to push me ahead to where I need to be," said Denison, who lives in Pittsfield. "The people we will be working with come from diverse backgrounds, all types of ages working side by side. It will be interesting to see if our ideas are different."

The team will work with economic development directors in the five counties and with small businesses to assess their needs.

"The end result hopefully, will be stuff the community can use to work with business and target other businesses to move in," McCartney said.

The team also will interview all Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contract holders about future plans for the land. "There will be a series of questions the team puts together with the end result being some alternatives people can go into rather than corn and soybeans," McCartney said.

If time permits, team members will work to create interest in using local resources to build timber bridges.

"It hasn't been any problem at all finding work for these folks," McCartney said. "We want to get something at least in every county."

James Totsch, who lives in Clayton, will work with the public land and environment team. That team will work with streambank stabilization, some flood cleanup work, build a wetland in Calhoun County and work with tree and shrub planting across the region.

"I know pretty much how to do the things we want to do, but the college after will help me out," he said. "I want to go to college for forestry or landscaping. I love working outside."

Totsch, 18, was working on a temporary basis at Siloam Springs State Park when he heard about the AmeriCorps program. "I hope it will be a good step for the future," he said.

"This will make them aware of careers and opportunities they maybe never saw before," McCartney said.

The workers will spend their first week in orientation and initial training. Sessions on first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation and teambuilding are planned along with visits to the work sites.

Through the program, team members will gain skills in community building and strategic planning, learn to work more effectively with local governments and get hands-on skills for future job searches.

'I Want to Serve'

15 workers from area sign up for AmeriCorps program

Workers, who will serve a five-county area, can earn an education voucher after 11 months.

Anyone wanting to know what the AmeriCorps program is about need only ask Susan Ruble.

"I want to serve, I want to help people. I want to leave people in our communities happier and better than I found them," the 25-year-old Griggsville resident said. "That's what this program is about, helping people while helping ourselves."

Ruble is one of 15 AmeriCorps workers sworn in at Moorman Park Friday. They'll be working in a five-county area under the auspices of Two Rivers Resource Conservation and Development Inc. of Pittsfield. The agency serves Adams, Pike, Brown, Schuyler and Calhoun counties.

"I wouldn't mind doing this again next year, if they offer it. But, if not, I'll go back to school," Ruble said. She is close to an

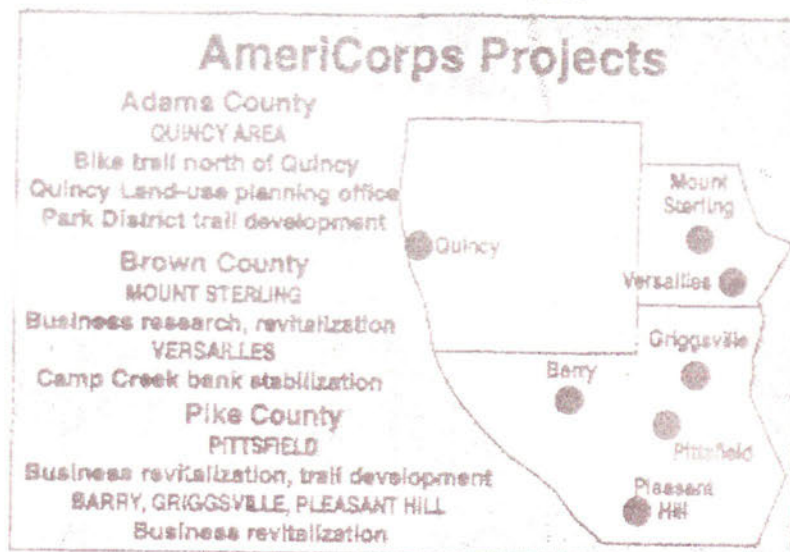
associate's degree in business and will use the education benefits offered by the program to get her bachelor's degree.

AmeriCorps members must be American citizens, age 17 or older. They receive lodging, meals, uniforms, health care and child care in addition to an \$8,000 living allowance for 11 months of service. After completing the program, they will receive an education award of \$4,725, or a cash payment of \$2,362.

"This is not a jobs program, this is an education program," said AmeriCorps representative Rod Atteberry. "We now have more than 23,000 members across the country, with 65 in Illinois: 20 in Chicago, 30 in East St. Louis and 15 here in the Quincy area."

Quincy Mayor Chuck Scholz told the new AmeriCorps members that they have an "opportunity to enhance the lives of people in this area. The benefits of your work will extend far beyond the life of this program," he said.

William McCartney, Two Rivers coordinator for the AmeriCorps program, said six of



members have been assigned to a Rural Development Team and nine members are on the Environmental Corps Team. Four members of the environmental team will be assigned to the Quincy Park District.

"These people are going to be providing a valuable service to several communities in the five-county area. They're going to be doing things that maybe local committees and organizations wouldn't have gotten done otherwise," McCartney said.

The Rural Development Team has three goals: Help small communities develop strategies to retain and revitalize local businesses, identify and promote a county's uses for land being re-

leased from the Conservation Reserve Program, and develop the interest of local township and county officials in constructing timber bridges using local materials.

The Environmental Corps Team will work to improve parks, public lands and recreation areas. Among their many goals is the construction of hiking trails and park facilities, and replacing grass, shrubs and trees damaged in the 1993 flood.

Ruble said it is vital team members get to know and trust one another. "Thursday we went through some exercises designed to develop that trust, things like falling backward and trusting a

team member to catch you, or letting team members pick you up on their shoulders and trusting them not to drop you," she said.

In response to question #1 - Twin Valley on how many living snowfences will be built in the first year?

First, living snowfences are NOT built, but are shrubs/trees and they are planted. The exact number actually planted will depend on several factors: weather, consent by landowners and if the AmeriCorps members can pull together the necessary partnership (SWCD, MnDOT, County and Landowner). A realistic goal could be 10 miles of living snowfence planted in year #1 in the 3 county area.

Question #2 - Twin Valley - public affairs work?

The development of brochures, fact sheets, and ad slicks is part of the information campaign that the A.R.T. Advisory Committee wanted AmeriCorps members to carry out. Material is reviewed by Advisory Committee prior to distribution. The intent of the campaign is to inform the public in the region about the trail, so it will attract users. Specific result expected is an increase in tourism, which will benefit the local economy in communities along the trail system.

Question #4 - Twin Valley - amount of money of grant proposal? Will members spend the whole year writing grants?

Grant proposals being investigated are for wooden bridges for recreational vehicles/horses/people for the A.R.T. The amount has not been finalized; but is estimated to be more than \$10,000. The second part of this question does not even deserve an answer; however, I will respond. The answer is no.

Growing up in Niles, Mich., Athanas spent much of her childhood rambling through woods with her grandfather. Once

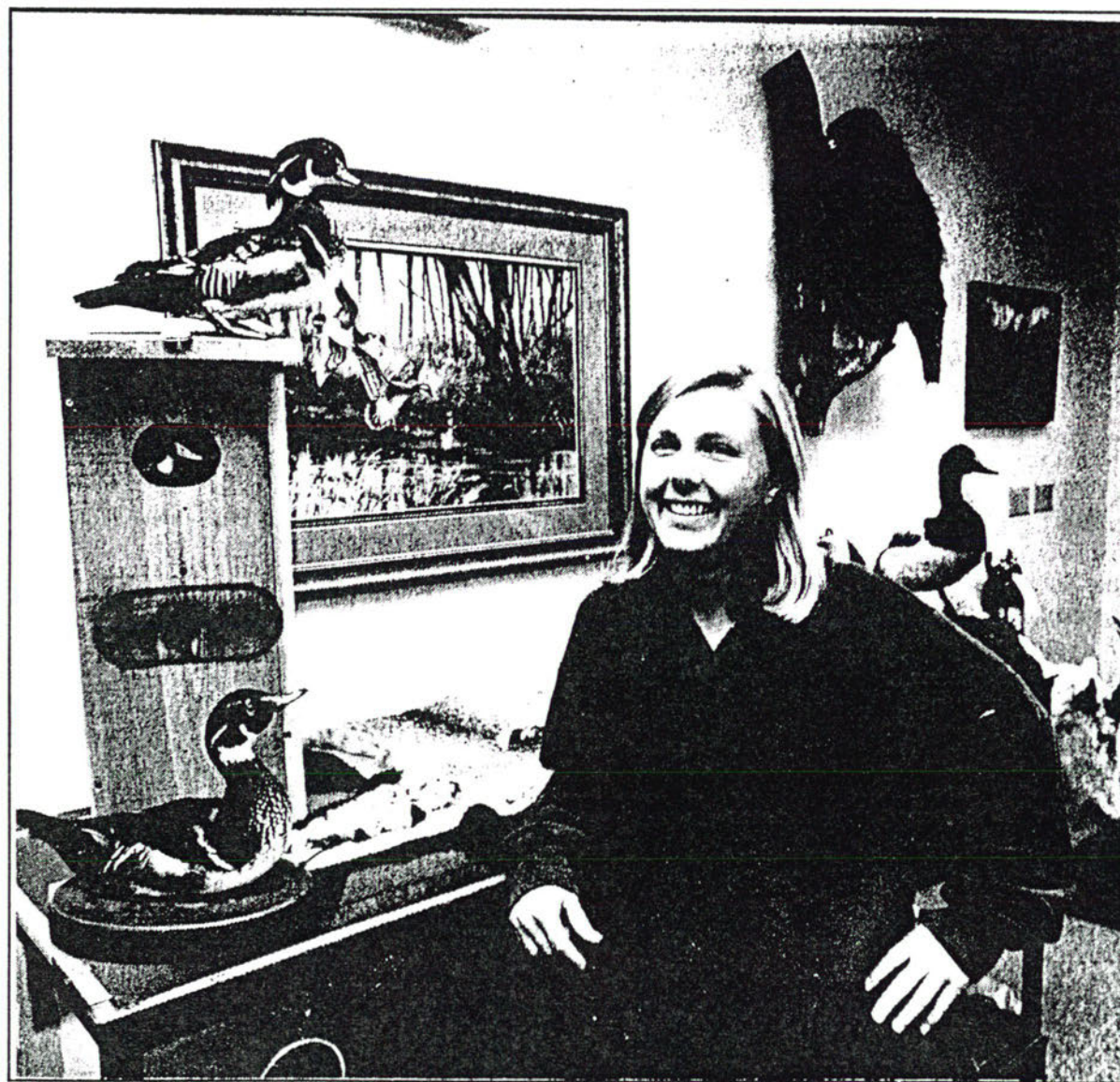
enrolled in at the University of Michigan, however, she put aside her interest in nature to pursue "a money career." She earned an English and economics degree.

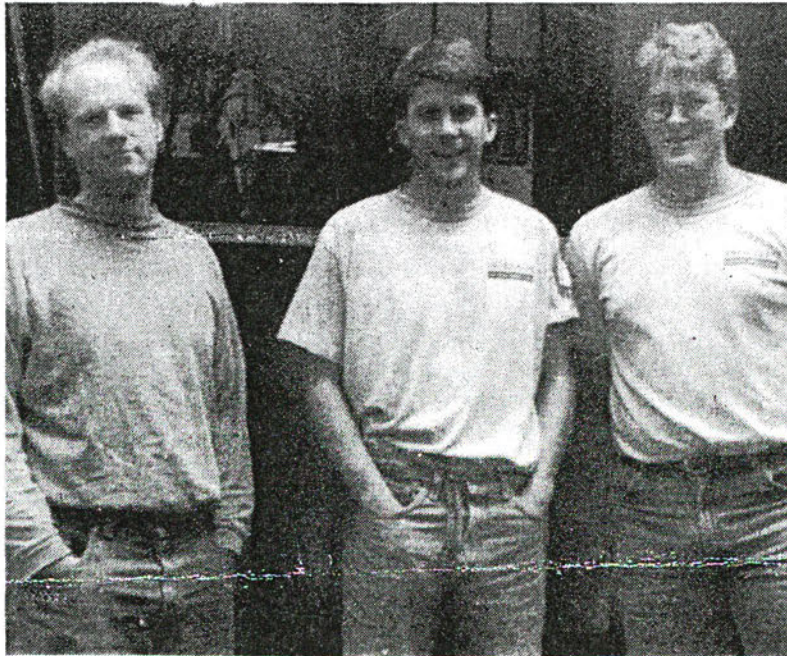

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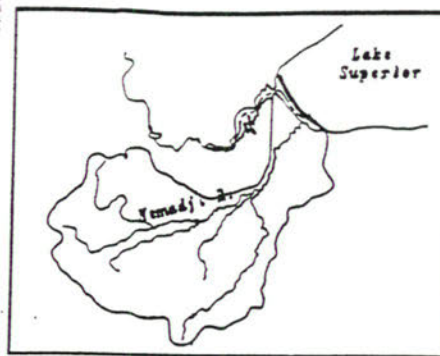

Nemadji River Basin Project



Project Goal

The Nemadji River Basin project, funded by the Soil Conservation Service and the U.S. Forest Service, will formulate alternatives to treat problems identified in the watershed. It will pull together many people and agencies to form a consortium which will *voluntarily adopt* a remedial action plan to restore beneficial uses to the Nemadji River Basin.

Updated Time Frame

The two-year project began in January 1994. A planning committee made up of project sponsors, citizens and business people has met monthly, become acquainted with the issues surrounding the project and developed a finalized set of objectives. Three public meetings soliciting comments and discussing issues have been held. Technical committees are analyzing and collecting data which will lead to recommendations by the summer of 1995. By September, the planning committee will choose from a set of alternatives and recommend a course of action.

Working Objectives

- 1) Collect, inventory and analyze data in order to develop a remedial action plan and best management practices.
- 2) Inform and educate citizens regarding the causes, problems and potential solutions associated with runoff, flooding, erosion and sedimentation.
- 3) Finalize and implement a public participation plan that involves a diversity of people affected by basin problems and the recommended solutions.
- 4) Improve cooperation between resource management agencies at the watershed level.

The Nemadji Basin Project is one of six SCS programs in MN receiving AmeriCorps members. Three AmeriCorps members began work on the Nemadji Project in October, 1994.

Answers to Common Questions and Concerns

"Aren't the problems associated with the Nemadji River due to natural causes over which we have no control?"

While the soil in this watershed is prone to erosion, it is believed that people have made land-use changes accelerating the naturally high erosion rates. Although not necessarily bad or preventable; roads, ditches, homestead development, clearing for agriculture and timber harvesting all have an impact on the hydrology and erosion in the watershed.

"This research was done before in the Red Clay Project and no solutions were found, why are we spending more money on a problem we can't fix?"

The Red Clay Research and Demonstration Project looked at the properties of the Red Clay soil and the effects of vegetation on slopes, and tested different stabilization projects. A great deal was learned from this project, however the effects of hydrological changes on the processes of erosion was not examined. This project made some preliminary recommendations which are being evaluated and will most likely be part of the remedial action plan.

The Red Clay Project should be viewed as a springboard for new ideas and treatments. The current project will look at the watershed as a whole entity and attempt to develop long term solutions for reducing the volume of sediment transported. It is important to note that the money being spent on the Nemadji River Basin Project would be spent on a similar project in another area if the previous research had not demonstrated a need to develop a remedial action plan.

"How will you measure success?"

The success of the project will be measured by the degree to which the remedial actions and BMPs are accepted and carried out. The cooperation, knowledge and acceptance of the project and the alternatives by landowners, citizens and agencies will demonstrate the success of the project. Success in the terms of reduced sediment will not be measured or achieved by any "quick-fix" solutions.

"What type of funding will be available for carrying out the plans?"

This project will research and develop technically feasible and politically sound remedial action measures. It is felt that the existence of a well researched plan greatly improves the chances of receiving funding from outside sources. The remedial action plan will include potential sources for future options.

AmeriCorps Progress Update #2

Twin Valley MN, November 29, 1994. . . . USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), formerly Soil Conservation Service (SCS), AmeriCorps members, announced today information about their recent progress.

How Big-Time Bucks Are Killing Small-Time Football

It doesn't seem to work in this country: very little starts or ends here. It's one of the last places to get new movies and one of the last places to abolish slavery. So it's rather strange that the University of Alabama, Birmingham, just may be setting the newest college football trend. The UAB grid program in existence for only five years, has opted to leave Division I-AA next season in order to play I-A. And while the "We'd like to eventually see our program with the best in the nation" statement has been officially uttered by school officials, there's more to it than that.

It's the same thing that caused Northeast Louisiana to leave I-AA, it's the same thing that's causing Central Florida to leave I-AA. It's the same thing that caused Villanova Coach Andy Talley to express his intent to move up, and also what caused UConn to hire new coach Skip (Son of Lou) Holt.

Word has it that it will soon hit schools like Montana, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Northern Iowa and Youngstown State.

It is (gasp!) money. It is (no gasp) not in I-AA football.

"Football is a costly sport," says Chuck Boone, commissioner of the I-AA Yankee Conference. "And in I-AA there really isn't any money to be made."

Hence, the problem. Although the NCAA would not release specific information, last year fewer than 10 percent of I-AA football programs showed a profit. The dilemma lies in an array of areas, from no television contracts to small stadiums to the simple fact that most students at Marshall or Delaware would rather sit back in a dorm room with Bud in hand and watch Notre Dame/Miami than head out to the cold for a Thundering Herd/Blue Hen matchup.

Sadly, not much can be done. I-AA loudly boasts of its achievements — NFLers John Taylor, Roosevelt Potts and Stan Humphries being among its products — and for medium-sized schools, it's a perfect competitive level. But more and more programs are recognizing that beating Boston University in double overtime rarely even makes the news. Losing to Auburn 55-3 headlines it.

It's hard to make I-AA an attractive package to television, says Boone, who still believes the division can survive. The public demands what's on TV. And it doesn't demand I-AA.

Living in Poverty for the Cause

Let's face it. You're not going to get rich joining the ranks of the president's new domestic Peace Corps — dubbed **AmeriCorps**. You see, this is not the same program Bill Clinton told you about when he wanted your vote. This is the Congress-messed-with-me version, and what that means is you "volunteer" to make minimum wage for nine months to a year and when it's over, they'll give you enough money to maybe cover a semester at one of the cheaper public universities in the country.

Still interested? It seems thousands of students are.

The \$300-million program will put 20,000 people to work this year doing all kinds of community service, from walking the elderly safely home through their high-crime neighborhoods to finding housing for the homeless. For their work, members of the corps get an \$8,000 living allowance (roughly \$4.25 an hour), plus health and child care benefits. For each year they complete of the two-year program, the government will write a check for \$4,275 to the school of their choice. Not a great deal, but then Laura Sullivan, a 25-year-old graduate of Georgetown University, says the money is not the point. "Everyone in this program is committed to service, committed to making a difference," says Sullivan, who works with AmeriCorps for a Maryland-based program that trains low-income women to start their own businesses.

Oh, of course.

Sullivan was attracted to AmeriCorps for the same reason a lot of post-graduates are. For her, the program could serve as a great segue — almost like an internship — into a career of non-profit or community service work. But even Sullivan admits she had to save up money to participate. She's barely living above the poverty line on her AmeriCorps living allowance. Originally, AmeriCorps was intended to be a ticket to college if you couldn't buy one. The concept sold to the liberal arts majors who couldn't find a job and to the troops of do-gooders who wanted to make a difference but still needed to pay the rent.

In reality, it was a guy like Dixon Negron of Chicago whom Clinton really may have had in mind when he initially proposed the service plan. Negron never dreamed of going to college, let alone finishing high school. For the past year, haunted by the life he saw unfolding for his young nieces and nephews living in one of the worst Chicago neighborhoods, Negron worked for a community organization called Public Allies.

He made a "comfortable living" there, but when Public Allies was picked for funding in the AmeriCorps program, Negron got in on all the AmeriCorps benefits. "I'm not living from paycheck to paycheck anymore," he says. "Now I can think about going back to school." Let's hope he makes it.

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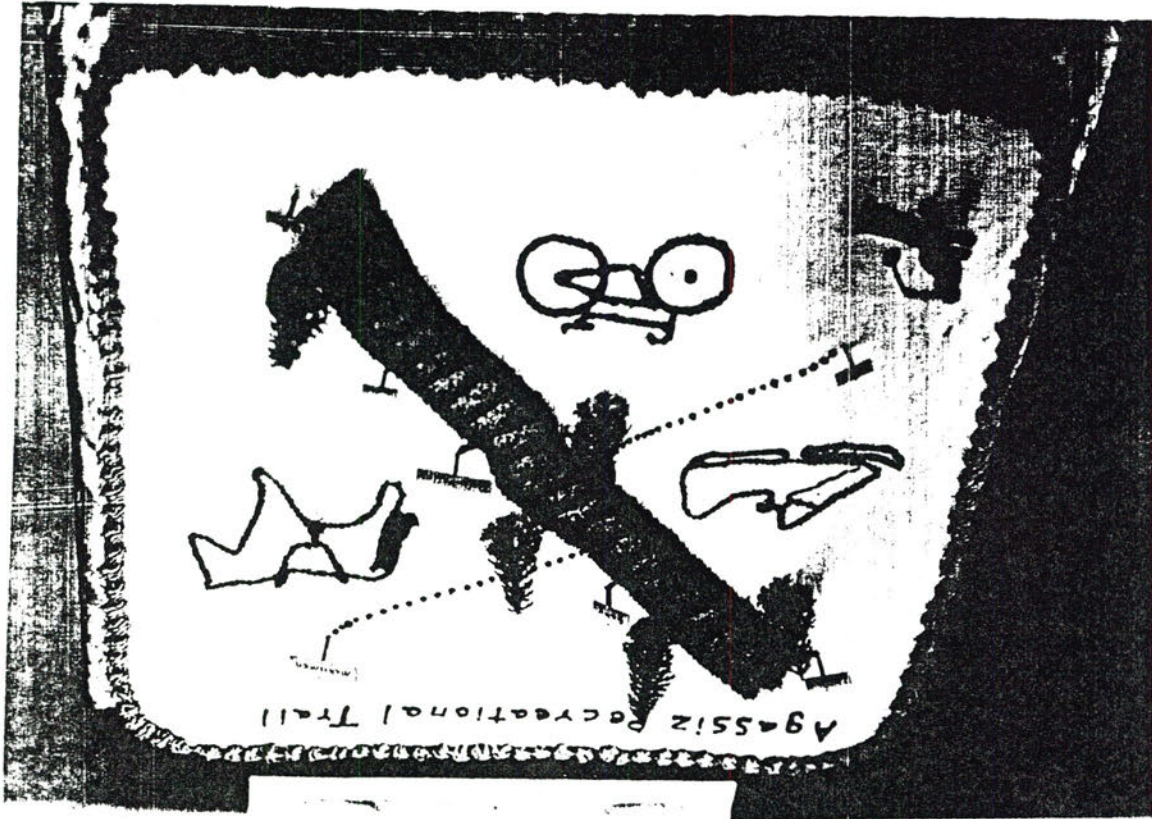

The local Soil and Water Conservation District has some new faces working their office now. The five are USDA Americorps enlistees who will be there for 1,700 working hours.

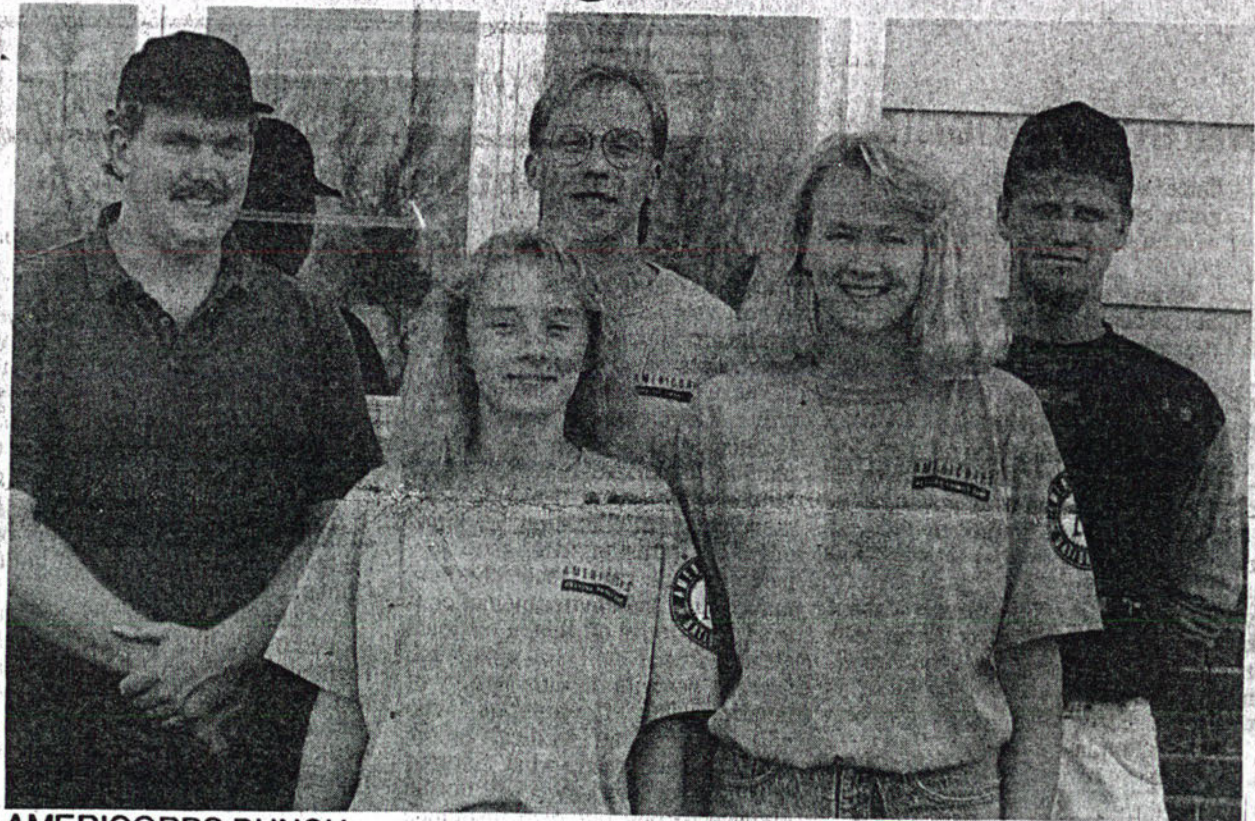

AmeriCorps members begin service with USDA Soil Conservation Service

There are now five AmeriCorps participants stationed in the SCS field office in Twin Valley, according to Chuck Turax, SCS district conservationist, and Curt Borchert, Norman County SWCD district manager. Students stationed in Twin Valley include Kathie Musch of Fargo, Kelly Engen of Gary, Jeff York of Fargo, Aaron Neubert of Bejou and Holly Sirjord of Twin Valley. They are among 20 AmeriCorps members selected to work with the USDA SCS in Minnesota between now and through August 1995.

There will also be five AmeriCorps members based in McIntosh, Warren, Crookston, Thief River Falls and Red Lake who will be taking direction from the Twin Valley office.

All the AmeriCorps members are either college graduates or working towards their college degree.

The Twin Valley AmeriCorps members will be working on two projects. One is to promote community understanding of conservation practices. Some of their activities in this area will include meeting with groups and individuals to discuss conservation practices like wetlands protection and planting trees for windbreaks. They will also work on tree planting sites for \$97,000 of federal funds available for planting trees next to highways systems.

The group will also promote economic development in northwest Minnesota through the establishment of a region-wide trail system. This will involve promoting the new ART Trail, doing mapping, and working with area businesses to utilize the trail system for economic development.

The AmeriCorps members began their service during a USDA SCS AmeriCorps Orientation Program, October 3-7, in St. Paul.

SCS AmeriCorps members will be highly visible. They'll wear either a cap, t-shirt, sweatshirt, or a pin which shows the AmeriCorps logo, "We Get Things Done."

Gary Nordstrom, SCS state conservationist, said, "AmeriCorps is an exciting opportunity to help us get things done with people in the community. A lot of people competed for the 20 AmeriCorps positions. We will demand quality work from them, just as if they were SCS federal employees, and I do expect them to be visible to the people in the community."

AmeriCorps represents President Clinton's fulfillment of a campaign pledge to create a national service program-- a domestic Peace Corps of 20,000 AmeriCorps members.

West Polk SCS to help launch AmeriCorps

The West Polk Soil Conservation Service (SCS) office will help the AmeriCorps program take root in Minnesota.

AmeriCorps is President Bill Clinton's new national initiative to establish a "domestic Peace Corps," says SCS District Conservationist Randy Huelskamp, of Crookston.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's SCS in Minnesota, in cooperation with Minnesota's 91 Soil and Water Conservation Districts will launch the AmeriCorps program in Minnesota in September, according to SCS State Conservationist Gary Nordstrom.

Ten AmeriCorps rural development positions will be headquartered out of the SCS Field Office and the Norman County Soil and Water Conservation District Office in Twin Valley. They will cover the counties in northwestern Minnesota, ranging from Norman County to the Canadian border.

One AmeriCorps participant will be headquartered at the SCS office in Crookston. "Locally, we're looking for someone to help

inform rural and urban residents about the values and opportunities associated with soil and water conservation resources,"

Huelskamp says. "Among other things, the AmeriCorps worker will be promoting the use of soil surveys, living snowfences, planting of various grass and tree species, and other conservation practices. There may be some door-to-door visiting, but most of the work will involve drafting news articles and newsletters and developing brochures."

Applicants for AmeriCorps positions must be at least 17 years old. They must have some academic college work and be skilled in using computers, a telephone and filling. They must be able to meet, organize and work with individuals and groups, Huelskamp says. They must be able to develop and present educational materials and have skills work working with the media.

"We'd like to have them have some kind of background and education in agriculture, conservation programs, some

public relations knowledge," Huelskamp says. "It would be ideal for college students or recent college graduates."

AmeriCorps participants, Huelskamp says, will be considered federal employees with full benefits and insurance. Stipends will range from \$7,600 to \$12,000, depending on qualifications, for working 1,700 hours over 10 to 12 months (roughly full-time). They will also receive, if necessary, reimbursement for child care.

Upon completion of the 1,700 hours, an education voucher of \$4,725 will be awarded the AmeriCorps participant. The voucher may be used to repay student loans or to pay college tuition for two-year, four-year or graduate programs.

"We're taking AmeriCorps applications right now," Huelskamp says. "Applications must be in the St. Paul office by August 19 and the jobs should start in mid-September."

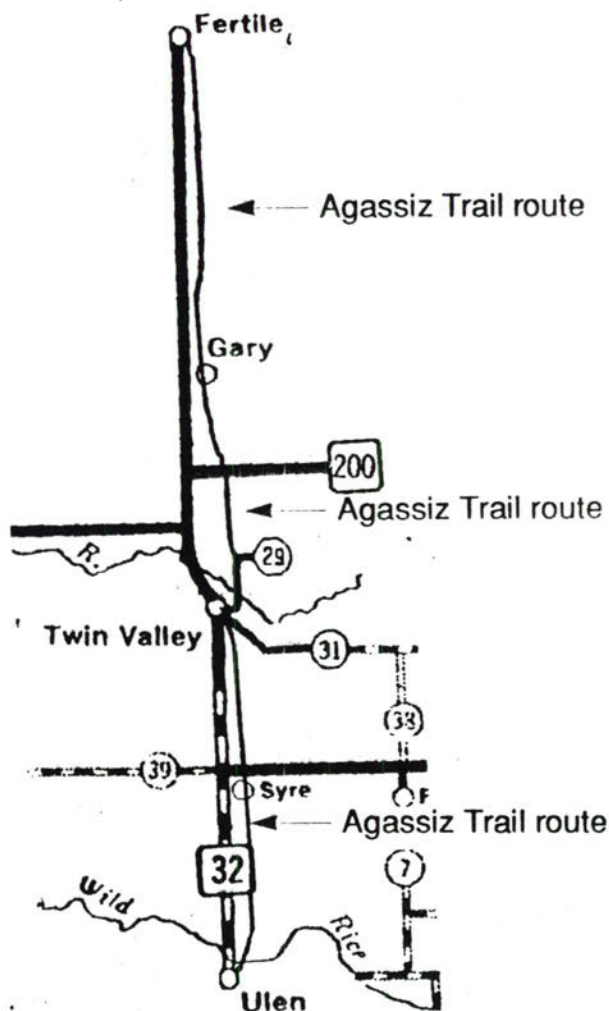

Ground breaking for Agassiz Trail scheduled for October 18

Ground breaking for the new Agassiz Trail Project between Ulen and Fertile will be held in Twin Valley on Tuesday, October 18. The ground breaking ceremony will be at 1:00 p.m., across from the Standard Station in Twin Valley. Cake and coffee will be served following the ceremony at the Twin Valley Community Center, plus project officials will be on hand to answer questions about the \$650,000 project.

The primary focus of the project is the development of a non-motorized summer and motorized winter trail, primarily on the old railroad grade between Ulen and Fertile. The project also includes a paved walking track in Ada, and a walking track in Ulen. The project is being funded by a grant from the Legislative Commission of Minnesota Resources (LCMR).

Construction on the main trail actually got under way on October 6. Project administrator, Curt Borchert, reports that the contractors on the project are Wayne Nelson and Butch Gordon. Borchert said work this fall will include removing rock from the old railroad grade, scarification, and laying down gravel for the new trail.

Curt said he anticipates the paved trails in Ada and Ulen will be done next spring. The current budget for the Ada portion of the trail, to circle the elementary school and much of the fairgrounds, is \$47,927 for 4,900 feet of paving. The paving budget for the Ulen walking trail is \$32,224. The original plans also called for the development of a park area in Ulen and Ada, however, Borchert said budget restraints will necessitate seeking other funding sources for this portion of the project.

The property for the main trail was purchased from Burlington Northern Railroad for a total negotiated price of \$90,000 for 456 total acres between Ulen and Fertile.

A breakdown of construction costs on each portion of the trail includes: \$65,401 between Ulen and Syre, \$111,912 between Syre and Twin Valley (including seven pipe structures); \$95,222 between Twin Valley and Gary (including two pipe structures); and \$122,196 between Gary and Fertile (including three pipe structures).

All components of the project must be completed by July 1 of 1995.
