SUBJECT: Requests for AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" Proposals

Background

Each year millions of pounds of food - in fields - go to waste. At the same time, hundreds of thousands of adults, and roughly twenty percent of the nation's children, do not have sufficient resources to acquire the food they need to survive and be healthy. Gleaning fields --gathering after the reapers--is one way we can rescue food that otherwise might be wasted and lost to the hungry. In addition, a network of food-rescue programs across the United States and Canada collect surplus prepared and perishable foods for distribution to the hungry.

Given that gleaning is one of Secretary Glickman's important priorities, and given that USDA's AmeriCorps pilot gleaning project is succeeding marvelously in recruiting farmers and other volunteers to help feed the hungry, USDA propose, to join with partner non-profit organizations, in sponsoring a "**Summer of Gleaning**" program from **June 1 through August 31, 1996** in up to ten selected States.

Because FSA is only one of the USDA agencies being offered the opportunity to apply for participation in the AmeriCorps **Summer of Gleaning** program, AmeriCorps funds have not been specifically earmarked to go exclusively to FSA-sponsored projects. Similar opportunities will be offered to Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) state offices, Food and Consumer Service (FCS) regional offices, State Cooperative Extension Offices, and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regional offices. Obviously, all of these other offices may not wish to apply individually; however, you may want to explore the possibility (and feasibility) of a collaborative project involving one or more of the agencies listed, either as co-applicants or as primary/secondary partners in your FSA project design.

Project Applications

Because projects will only be operated in ten States, FSA State offices must compete internally for participation in the program. Each FSA State office wishing to participate must develop a short, concise project proposal and a one-page budget proposal indicating how you would implement your AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" project and submit it **directly** to USDA's Office of National Service, through your Area Office, for ranking and selection purposes. Even though your project proposal must be detailed, it should be concise and **no longer than four (4) pages**. (We have enclosed a sample AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" project application and budget proposal for your use.) Project proposals are due **COB March 29, 1996**. If your project is accepted, you will be notified by **April 4, 1996**.

Project Scope and Size

While we anticipate that most FSA projects will focus on "gleaning of fields", we will also consider for acceptance carefully-structured proposals that include perishable food salvage and/or rescue activities involving urban restaurant/food institutions. This is an area where collaboration with HUD offices, or with representatives from the multi-agency Empowerment Zone/Enterprise Community (EZ/EC) program, may prove to be extremely beneficial in the development of a successful project proposal. Generally, project proposals for new FSA AmeriCorps sites will involve five or six AmeriCorps Members. However, project proposals will also be considered for acceptance from existing USDA AmeriCorps sites (not necessarily administered by FSA) who propose to add one or two Members to an existing team who would focus specifically on the gleaning project.

Developing Partnerships with Non-Profit Organizations and State/Local Government Agencies

The most important aspect in making your AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" project successful will be the partnerships you develop with local businesses, workers, and the non-profit community. We expect that each successful proposal will involve a firm partnership with a local social service, community service or youth service group. You should immediately begin the process of contacting representatives of the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H and FFA groups, community church councils (or their equivalents), senior citizens' groups, civic organizations, community action agencies, etc.; and your State and local WIC, Food Stamp, and Commodity Food Distribution Program Directors, who are also being notified about this "**Summer of Gleaning**" initiative to encouraged them to join with you to facilitate food distribution and help alleviate some of our nation's hunger problems through a creative gleaning project. Letters of commitment or agreement from primary or secondary partners should be included with your project proposal.

Project Design

FSA AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" projects:

- must be restricted to activities relating to, or in support of gleaning and food rescue efforts and finding ways to help feed those in need. AmeriCorps Members may not performed work that is routinely performed by FSA employees and cannot spend the bulk of their service time performing office or support work.

- must be a "volunteer generator" model to recruit many more non-compensated volunteers and farmers. At each site, you should encourage local non-profit organizations to help with training, farmer and volunteer recruitment and management, food distribution, etc. Our goal is for as many of the sites as possible to continue gleaning in future years even without an AmeriCorps project.
- must be designed, implemented, and evaluated with extensive broad-based local input, including active partnerships with local anti-hunger or youth service groups, as well as consultation with representatives from non-profit organizations, community groups, senior and youth groups, community based agencies with demonstrated record of experience in providing services, foundations, businesses, etc.
- should have concrete, measurable community service objectives that demonstrate accomplishments focused on results, not just process. Thus, project objectives should not focus on how many meetings will be held or how many applications will be processed, but rather on how many families or individuals will be helped, how many children will be fed or educated in nutrition and agricultural education, and how many pounds of food will be distributed.
- should also focus on K-12 nutrition and agricultural education for students of all ages -- children, elderly, low-income families who want to learn more about how to improve their diets, etc.

FSA "**Summer of Gleaning**" AmeriCorps Team Members must:

- engage a mix of people to perform service in work crews, composed of five to six Members, at each operating site. The work crew may include 1) people who may or may not have completed high school; 2) college students; and, 3) college graduates, who will serve twelve (480 hours), receive the minimum stipend required by law, and an education award of \$1,000.
- possess specific skills that can be matched with individual community hunger needs which can be addressed by someone with that background.
- receive sufficient training, education, and supervision for each service project performed. Each Member will be expected to learn general skills in citizenship and community development. It is also expected that this training will teach Members to accept personal responsibility for improving their community, while rewarding them with increased opportunities for education and job training.

Budget and Staffing

While ongoing logistical, financial, and technical advice and assistance on your "**Summer of Gleaning**" AmeriCorps project will be provided by USDA's Office of National Service and FSA's AmeriCorps Program Coordinator, State FSA offices will be directly responsible for managing their gleaning projects including providing significant and continuing staff planning, oversight, and day-to-day supervision necessary for a successful AmeriCorps project.

USDA will provide funding to pay AmeriCorps Members stipend, training, travel, overhead costs, and the Corporation for National Service will pay the educational awards. FSA State offices will distribute the stipend, oversee necessary travel and training, and other administrative costs incurred by AmeriCorps Members, as well as provide the necessary office space and equipment which may be needed for the project. AmeriCorps funds can also be provided for those **Summer of Gleaning** projects that would enable the local partnering agency to hire a project manager or to provide technical assistance in a variety of ways: support staff for the project, training, etc.

Recruitment of "Summer of Gleaning" AmeriCorps Members

Many AmeriCorps Members may be college students. Selected AmeriCorps Members will not start until June, 1996. However, with college break in May or June, students should begin planning now in order to be available for summer placement. In order to attract the largest pool of quality applicants possible, recruiting materials will be sent to Universities in selected States from the national office. Ultimately, recruitment is a responsibility of each State office, but the Department and FSA Washington office will work with State offices to write and implement a recruitment plan that produces highly-qualified groups of diverse applicants.

State offices may consider recruiting and selecting one AmeriCorps Member to serve as **Team Leader** for the project. This individual should possess the managerial and leadership skills necessary to supervise and direct the day-to-day activities of a diverse work crew. Generally, a college student seeking community service credits would make excellent team leaders in these instances. Final selections of AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" Team Members will be made in early May. Materials for use in interviews and selection will be shared with FSA State offices shortly.

Launch Date for "Summer of Gleaning Program

AmeriCorps Members selected in May will be placed in FSA AmeriCorps projects between May 15 and June 15.

Help in Preparing Applications and Project Director Training

Because this process is new -- and because we have given you tight deadlines --we will provide you with significant assistance in preparing your **Project Proposals**. Area conference calls will be schedule during the week of **March 11** to answer questions and provide additional information. Individuals designated by the SED's to administer the gleaning project, will be required to attend a one-day training meeting on **April 10, 1996** in Washington, D.C.

2. **AMERICORPS PROJECT OBJECTIVE STATEMENT:** (1 page)

To provide fresh fruits and vegetables to 75 needy, hungry or elderly families through voluntary gleaning and food rescue efforts. Increase K-12 nutrition and agriculture education in _ townships of ____ County (ies).

a **What work will be done? What service will your members engage in?**

Members will work in partnership with non-profit organizations, local public aid, public housing and senior citizen groups, Boy/Girl Scouts, First Methodist Church, Ruritan Club, 4-H and FFA groups, etc., to identify 75 needy families in the target area. Members will also work with local government agencies, contracting companies, and local growers to schedule gleaning activities. At least ten volunteers per project will be recruited to assist the Members in gleaning and distributing harvested crops of fruits and vegetables to those in need.

b **What is the hoped for results of the activities described above?**

At least 75 needy families will improve their diets; and to develop a program that will be sustained, after the conclusion of the AmeriCorps **Summer of Gleaning** program, by non-profit organizations and other groups.

c **How will you measure the quality of the service provided?**

Families and others that receive the benefits, volunteers, non-profit organizations, community groups, farmers, local and State government agencies, and others that participate will be surveyed to determine the success of the project. In addition, project partners will be surveyed to determine their willingness to continue the project after the AmeriCorps **Summer of Gleaning** project is completed.

d **By what standards will success be gaged?**

Based on the feedback of those surveyed, the AmeriCorps "**Summer of Gleaning**" program will be deemed successful if 75 percent of those surveyed indicated a positive response regarding the quality and usefulness of the program.

- e. **How many individuals will receive the benefits of the service your Members perform?**

Assuming an average family size of four persons, at least 300 individuals will receive the benefits of the service performed. Also, contracting companies, farmers, volunteers, and local government agencies, community groups, non-profits organizations should all realize and identify the benefits of the service provided.

3 PRELIMINARY WORK PLAN AND MILESTONE SCHEDULE (2 pages)

Task 1

Members receive AmeriCorps orientation and other training from the FSA project directors. Training will concentrate on gleaning and distributing harvested crops, working with non-profit organizations, and recruiting and training volunteers.

Beginning date: Early June 1996

Completion Date: Mid-June 1996

Task 2

Members develop informational material about the gleaning project and meeting announcements for needy families targeted. Members prepare and mail introduction letters to appropriate offices and organizations requesting their help and/or support of the project. Members attend and help conduct informational meetings with public and private processors, consultants, non-profit groups and organizations to compile listings of needy families and individuals. Mailings will be prepared and distributed to producers, contractors, and farmer organization (e.g. Grange, Farm Union, Farm Bureau, etc.), to schedule appointments to discuss and promote the AmeriCorps **Summer of Gleaning** project. Members continually develop new contacts with needy families, follow up with processors and consultants, update informational materials, and attend fairs, shows, and conventions.

Beginning date: June 1996

Completion Date: July 1996

Task 3

After farmers have been recruited to participate in the program, the needy families who are to receive the gleaned produce have been identified, and the volunteers who will help harvest and distribute the fruits and vegetables have been organized, Members will oversee the logistical aspects of the project including establishing distribution points and making sure that they are adequately staffed; securing transportation for the harvested produce; and, arranging for containers in which food can be taken away from the distribution points as well as buckets and boxes to be used as the food is gleaned and transported.

Beginning date: July 1996

Completion Date: September 1996

Task 4

Members will develop an evaluation system, to track, collect, and report data on the measurable benefits associated with the project including the number of families/individuals served; the number of volunteers recruited to perform the work, the amount (in pounds and/or acreage) of food gleaned and distributed; the names and number of local community groups, and organizations providing support (donations, cash, in-kind services) to the gleaning project; and, a list of potential non-profit groups and organizations willing to continue the project after the **Summer of Gleaning** program is completed. Members will also provide a final report to the SED which includes the evaluation data and other observations on the successes and problems encountered with the AmeriCorps **Summer of Gleaning** project.

WHEREAS: This agreement is entered into between the Director of National Service, Office of Communications, United States Department of Agriculture, hereinafter referred to as the Sponsor, and Washington State University Cooperative Extension, an institution of higher education of the state of Washington, located at Pullman, Washington 99164-3140, hereinafter referred to as the University.

WHEREAS: The Sponsor desires the assistance of the University in the operation of a summer long AmeriCorps program, the Summer of Gleaning, under the sponsorship of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) in accordance with the USDA AmeriCorps Direct Renewal Application submitted to the Corporation for National and Community Service, May 1, 1995 as amended. The program shall be conducted in accordance with the description and budget provided in that application and as amended by this agreement. and

WHEREAS: The performance of such program is consistent, compatible and beneficial to the academic role and mission of the University as an institution of higher education and, in consideration of the mutual premises and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Upon execution of this document, an award to Washington State University in the amount of \$29,335 is made under the terms of the National and Community Service Act of 1990, as amended (U.S.C. 12501 et seq.), and accepted for the purposes described in the attached narrative and the project description, objectives, and tasks contained in attachment A, as a sub-agreement of the Corporation for National and Community Service and U.S. Department of Agriculture Interagency Cooperative Agreement No. 95ADFDC047 and its requirements are incorporated in this agreement in their entirety, except as noted in attachment B. The application for Federal financial assistance submitted by you is incorporated by reference and made a part of this agreement. This agreement is subject to the requirements set forth below.

Authority: This agreement is entered into in pursuant to the authority of the National and Community Service Act of 1990 as amended (42 U.S.C. 12501 et seq.).

Performance Period: April 15, 1995 through September 30, 1996

Therefore, for and in consideration of all promises and mutual covenants herein contained, and for other good and valuable considerations, the parties hereby mutually agree as follows:

WASHINGTON STATE UNIVERSITY, COOPERATIVE EXTENSION RESPONSIBILITIES

A. GENERAL

This is an award of Federal financial assistance and as such is subject to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-110, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and other Agreements with institutions of Higher Education, Hospitals and Nonprofit Organizations, OMB Circular A-122, and Cost principles for Nonprofit Organizations, as implemented by the attached United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Uniform Federal Assistance Regulations, 7 CFR 3015, and the OMB Circular A-133, Audits of Institutions of Higher Education and Other Nonprofit Organizations, as implemented in the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Uniform Federal Assistance Regulations, 7 CFR 3051.

B. SPECIFIC:

University agrees to perform for the Sponsor the tasks as identified in attachment A, "Gleaning Across the Cascades, A Summer of Gleaning Proposal in Submission to Donna Hines, FCS AmeriCorps Program Coordinator," described in Attachment A hereto.

Enter into and arrange for all subawards to the partners in the Summer of Gleaning project identified in attachment A.

Support the implementation of the project identified in attachment A.

USDA OFFICE OF COMMUNICATIONS (DIRECTOR OF NATIONAL SERVICE) RESPONSIBILITIES

1. The USDA Director of National Service will provide the services of a USDA representative to maintain liaison with the Cooperator.

2. Advance or reimburse the Cooperator for allowable, allocable, and reasonable costs as specified in the SF 424 and SF 424a Request for Federal Assistance and the budget sheet which accompanied attachment A, "Gleaning Across the Cascades, A Summer of Gleaning Proposal in Submission to Donna Hines, FCS AmeriCorps Program Coordinator." Tuition remission and indirect costs are not allowable.

C. IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED THAT:

ARTICLE I - GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. The recipient agrees to abide by all Corporation for National Service and U.S. Department of Agriculture laws and regulations specifically but not limited to:
 - a. Not limiting program participation to persons under the age of 25;
 - b. Submitting all budget and payment forms in accordance with the schedule in attachment C; and,
 - c. Ensuring that the recipient clearly identifies their program as an AmeriCorps program at all times and that the AmeriCorps logo is no smaller than the recipients logo on all stationary, uniforms, signs, etc.
2. Additional reports as required by the prime Cooperative Agreement No. 95ADFDC047 shall be forwarded to USDA Director of National Service, which includes a final performance report to be submitted either with your final payment request, or no later than 90 days after expiration of the Cooperative Agreement.
3. If any program income is generated as a result of this Cooperative Agreement, the income shall be applied using the deductive alternative as described in 7 CFR 3015.41.
4. Cooperative agreement support shall be acknowledged in publications and audiovisuals in accordance with 7 CFR 3015, Subpart U, 3015.200
5. The USDA Director of National Service is the only person authorized to sign forms certifying that an AmeriCorps member in a USDA AmeriCorps program is eligible for release from the program for compelling personal reasons and therefore eligible for a pro-rated education award.
6. All member enrollment forms and operating site forms are to forwarded to the USDA Director of National Service who will forward them to the Corporation for National Service.
7. Any modifications to the budgets submitted to the USDA Director of National Service for

purposes of obtaining this award, such as increasing one line item while decreasing another, must be approved in writing by the USDA Director of National Service.

8. Purchase of property or equipment over \$5,000 must be approved in advance by the Department of Agriculture and the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS).

9. The USDA Director of National Service retains the authority to approve the enrollment or suspension/termination of any member. The recipient agrees to forward all potential recruits to the Director for approval BEFORE actually enrolling them in the program.

10. The recipient must abide by all matching requirements. In particular, recipients are reminded of the requirement for them to provide a match of at least 15% of the members' basic living allowance in CASH and that the cash match can NOT be made with Federal money.

11. In order to avoid confusion with the benefits available for USDA AmeriCorps members in full time programs, it should be noted that with respect to benefits, members in the USDA Summer of Gleaning program are NOT eligible for either health care or child care.

12. The recipient is responsible for providing liability and workers compensation coverage for each member as well as any disability insurance that may be required in the state in which the service is being performed.

13. At no time shall the recipient suspend or terminate the operation of the USDA AmeriCorps Summer of Gleaning project without prior notification and approval from the USDA Director of National Service. At no time shall the recipient reduce or increase the number of AmeriCorps members working on the program without the prior written consent of the USDA Director of National Service. The recipient must notify the USDA Director of National Service in writing if at any point the number of members actually serving in the project falls below 20% of the number approved for the project. The recipient must include a description of the reasons for the shortfall and the steps being proposed to address the situation but will not take action until receiving written approval from the Director.

14. Volunteers recruited by AmeriCorps members in this program are to fill out the volunteer form herein provided as Attachment C. The volunteer agreement form must be executed by a USDA employee.

15. In accordance with the USDA AmeriCorps Summer of Gleaning Member agreement, regular members will serve 512 hours of which 16 hours is for Federal Holidays and 16 hours is for personal leave. Team Leaders will serve 552 hours of which 16 hours is for Federal Holidays and 16 hours is for personal leave. Upon successful completion of these hours of service the member will receive from the Corporation for National Service a \$1,000 education award to be used as described in the member agreement and Corporation documentation.

ARTICLE II - Contract Period

This agreement shall become effective June 1, 1996, and shall be completed on September 30, 1996 unless subsequent time extension, supplement, addition, continuation or renewal is mutually agreed upon in writing between the parties. However, based on USDA notification of intent to award dated May 15, 1996, the University is authorized to incur costs beginning April 15, 1996 so long as those costs were identified in the proposal contained in Attachment A.

ARTICLE III - Key Personnel

Washington State Cooperative Extension Liaison:

The project director will be Dr. Steve Garrett who may select and supervise other project staff as needed. No other person will be substituted for the project director except with Sponsor's approval. Sponsor may exercise Termination provision of this Agreement if a satisfactory substitute is not identified.

ARTICLE IV - Control of Summer of Gleaning Program

Control of this Summer of Gleaning project will rest entirely with University. However, it is agreed that University, through its project Director, will maintain continuing communication with a designated liaison for the Sponsor. The frequency and nature of these communications will be mutually defined by University's project Director and Sponsor's liaison person. It is also agreed the program will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Corporation for National and Community Service and U.S. Department of Agriculture Interagency Cooperative Agreement No. 95ADFDC047 and its requirements are incorporated in this agreement in their entirety, except as noted in attachment B.

ARTICLE V - Estimated Cost and Expenditure Limitation

Sponsor agrees to reimburse the University for services performed under this agreement in the amount of \$29,335.00 in accordance with the following payment schedule. Attachment A sets forth the proposed allocation plan. Deviations from this budget plan may be made to and from any expenditure object within the University system as long as such deviation is reasonable and necessary in the pursuit of the project contained herein and described at Attachment A. Furthermore, total amount identified above may not be exceeded without prior written amendment to this agreement.

Payment Schedule: Because of startup costs associated with the project, the unavailability of an electronic payment system and the requirement to make sub-awards to partners in the USDA Summer of Gleaning Program, the total amount of the project cost will be forwarded to the University upon execution of this agreement. A standard Form (SF) 269(a), Financial Status Report, which is the first and final SF-269 shall be submitted either with your final payment request, or no later than 90 days after expiration of the Agreement. Checks should be made payable to Washington State University and sent to: Controller's Office, Attn.: Sponsored Projects Finance Office Washington State University, Pullman, WA 99164-1025.

Cost-reimbursable payments and advance payments are approved under this cooperative agreement. Requests for payment shall be submitted on Standard Form 270's Request for Advance or Reimbursement.

ARTICLE VI - Reporting Requirements

University will provide reports on the progress of the program as outlined or required in the Scope of Work. Specifically, in addition to the standard Form (SF) 269(a), Financial Status Report, the sub-grantee will submit a mid-term report to the USDA Director of National Service during the seventh week of service. The format of this report will be provided to the sub-grantee later but it will include as a minimum the names of the members who have served for the particular quarter and the number of hours of service they have performed. It will also include

the names of any members who have been terminated, the reason they terminated and the hours they served in the program. It will also include the objectives originally listed as being performed by the project and the progress made in meeting those objectives.

ARTICLE VII - Publication and Confidentiality

The University, as a state institution of higher education, engages in research that is compatible, consistent and beneficial to its academic role and mission, and therefore significant results of research activities must be reasonably available for publication. The University agrees that publications developed through industrial support will be submitted to the Sponsor for a 30-day review period prior to release by the University. The University agrees to keep confidential any sponsor proprietary information supplied by Sponsor during the course of research performed by the University, and such information will not be included in any published material without prior approval by Sponsor. Any materials produced describing the project will clearly indicate that the 1996 Gleaning Across the Cascades is a USDA AmeriCorps program sponsored by the USDA and the Corporation for National Service.

ARTICLE VIII - Equipment

Special equipment purchases under the terms of this agreement become the property of the University unless otherwise specified herein.

ARTICLE IX - Indemnification

Each party hereto agrees to be responsible and assume liability for its own wrongful or negligent acts or omissions, or those of its officers, agents or employees to the full extent required by law, and agrees to hold the other party harmless from any such liability. The University does not warrant or assume liability for the interpretation or use of project data or results. University is an institution of higher education of the state of Washington.

ARTICLE X - Compliance with Laws

University agrees that it will comply with all applicable U. S. Federal, State and local laws, codes, regulations, rules and orders. The terms and conditions contained herein apply only to this cooperative agreement, hereinafter referred to as the award, awarded by the Director of National Service, Office of Communications, United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The statutory authority for this award is the National and Community Service Act of 1990, as amended (U.S.C. 12501 et seq.)

ARTICLE XI - Anti-Kickback

The Anti-Kickback Act of 1986 was passed to deter contractors from making payments for the purpose of improperly obtaining or rewarding favorable treatment in connection with a prime contract or a subcontract relating to a prime contract. By acceptance of this contract, the contractor agrees to comply with the following regulations. FAR 3.502 and FAR 52.203-7.

Consistent with University policy, its rights in such inventions may be assigned to the Washington State University Cooperative Extension or other agency for negotiation of an appropriate License Agreement.

ARTICLE XIV - Publication by Sponsor

Sponsor will not include the name of Washington State University in any advertising, sales promotion or other publicity matter without the prior written approval of the president of the University or his designee.

ARTICLE XV - Termination

This contract may be terminated by either of the parties hereto upon written notice delivered to the other party at least thirty (30) days prior to intended date of termination. By such termination, neither party may nullify obligations already incurred for performance or failure to perform prior to the date of termination.

L. Plan to involve six existing AmeriCorps members and hope to get five or six additional more.

M. Potential Partners: The Empowerment Zone would be our lead partner. Bonnie Gonzales, Executive Director for the zone has offered her support in any way possible. Zilpa Alvarado, the AmeriCorps member in the zone will be the lead member in this effort. If we are given six new AmeriCorps members, one of them will act as a crew chief working under Zilpa's direction. However, two members may work out of the Laredo and other RECD offices along the Rio Grande Valley.

I have contacted Ruben Saldana from Texas A&M Extension. Texas A&M has twenty members working in the valley. He was quite interested in this project but had to get formal commitment by contacting his project manager which he is doing. He has also e-mailed his members to see how they could help

There are at least two other AmeriCorps programs that could possibly be partners. There are the fifty members with the Teach America program and six members with the College Bound program. Ruban Saldana was meeting with them today about the One For All day in the valley and told me he would get their ideas and see if they were interested in helping.

However, secondary partners include Boys and Girls Clubs, American Red Cross, Catholic Social Services, Community Service Groups, People Helping People, Church Groups, Salvation Army Local, Local Farmers, FFA Groups, WIC, Local Food Banks, Social Services, Senior Centers, Restaurant and Grocery Chains, Community Action Agency, Councils of Government and any other local community service group.

Some of secondary agencies have been contacted but we have been unable to have letters of commitment prepared for this proposal. Member have been calling around to these groups and they are receptive. A key entity which appears to surface are existing food banks who have the mechanisms to not only distribute food but to leverage what food we can provide in trading more needed kinds of food from other sources.

AmeriCorps Objective Statement:

To provide a combination of fresh food, vegetables and staples to at least 100 colonia families along the Rio Grande Valley. By providing this food, the nutrition of all residents will improve.

a. What Work will be done? What service will you members engage in?

Since we have members that work along the entire Rio Grande Valley border areas, we would like to design a system that would benefit as many people as possible along this area. By expanding the geographic area beyond the empowerment zone, it would enable us to have more of a variety of crops to offer. It appears that the crops that are grown in the valley at this time are mellons, cucumbers, carrots, squash, and onions.

Members are already working on identifying sources of food, target recipients of this foods and distribution systems that already exist.

We would like to approach this opportunity two ways. One would be to have members identify certain colonias where food can be brought to the community centers in the colonias for distribution. Most colonias have some type of community center. The second approach would be a larger and more indirect approach and that would involve using food banks or community action groups that already provide food to residents.

If we do receive six additional AmeriCorps members for this time, we should be able to accomplish this two pronged goal.

b. What is hoped for results of the activities described above?

That all colonia residents served will have an improved diet during this time. That perhaps some leaders in the colonias will continue this effort after the gleaning program is over.

c. How will you measure the quality of the service provided?

AmeriCorps members will select colonia community centers that are capable and willing to participate in the program. Members will survey residents on an on going basis during this process and ask them for input, suggestions as to how to do things better.

In the second approach to the gleaning effort, members will query the partners with whom they work during this time and get their input and suggestions to ensure good customer service is given to colonia residents.

d. By what standards will success be gauged?

If 75% of the colonia residents and the partners involved give positive feedback, then the project can be considered successful. If even 25% continue the gleaning effort after the time period, then the summer work should be considered successful. If half of the remaining AmeriCorps members continue to make a positive contribution to the gleaning effort after the summer, then a positive contribution to the community would be made.

e. How many individuals will receive the benefits of the service your members perform?

If a typical family is four, then at least 400 persons would benefit from distribution to the colonia residents. Depending on how much food is received, thousands could benefit from existing food banks and kitchens.

3. Preliminary Work Plan and Milestone Schedule:

Task 1

Members receive AmeriCorps orientation and other training from RECD project managers and AmeriCorps members who will be involved in the project. Besides administrative training, members will be given training of gleaning and distribution. Other AmeriCorps members from the valley will join in a working group to familiarize new members with the valley and the residents. Members will be introduced to key partners in this effort. Someone who works in gleaning will be the trainer for this area.

Press releases and calls should be made to local media as well as some of the surrounding major markets announcing the start of this program.

Beginning date: Early June 1996

Completion date: Mid-June 1996

Task 2

Members solidify their partners and outline responsibilities and see exactly how many members will be working on this project and develop a plan that includes calling, visiting and writing letters to:

Follow up on outreach to community centers in colonias and to food banks or kitchens. Members follow up on initial contact with farmers, colonia residents and colonia resident leadership. Duties are divided up among members and a list of possible food sources or places will be identified and called. At the same time, distribution centers will be identified. After contact and a commitment is made, member will send a letter confirming details of the agreement and partnership.

Members need to outreach to those colonias that are identified to receive food. Members need to talk to residents, get their input. Ask them what they want and need. This is where a partner who has contact with other food sources to swap comes into focus.

Beginning date: Mid-June 1996

Completion date: Beginning July 1996

Task 3

Members develop a plan that addresses the logistics of getting and distributing the food. Take an inventory vehicles needs and set up a time schedule. Ensure it is communicated to all parties involved. Assign duties and responsibilities for collection and distribution of food. Develop a back up plan in case something unforeseen happens. Invite media to write a story on the program, the members, the partners, the residents, anything that might make a positive story.

Beginning date: July 1996

Completion date: End of August 1996

Task 4

In the planning session in early June, set up a working group to develop a system of tracking events as they happen. Review the data collected and interview as many partners and residents as can be. Write an evaluation of this effort highlighting successes and challenges to be shared with the local, state and national office personnel.
