Vermilion participating in statewide hydrant program

BATON ROUGE — Louisiana's rural population and local government agencies have received good news about rural road maintenance and fire protection.

Jack McClanahan, Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has announced the approval of \$998,984 in oil overcharge funds for the implementation of a statewide dry hydrant project to be coordinated by Trailblazer, Inc. of Ruston. The project will demonstrate energy savings through improved rural fire protection and road maintenance with the installation of 2,000 dry hydrants throughout the state.

As primary contractor for the statewide dry hydrant project, Trailblazer brings three years of quality experience to the project for their successful pilot program in 1992. Approval of the current project resulted in the combined efforts of Trailblazer and DNR, and in cooperation with the Northwest Delta, Capital, Twin Valley, and Imperial Calcasieu RC&D councils, and parish police juries.

A dry hydrant is a non-pressurized pipe system permanently installed in existing lakes, ponds, and streams. Properly installed, dry hydrants can solve the problem of hauling water over long distances by providing natural, unprocessed water for use. The multiple benefits awarded by dry hydrants include energy savings to consumers and road maintenance departments, and improving rural fire protection and lowering fire insurance ratings.

Improved rural fire protection is achieved with the use of dry hydrants by providing water from existing sources (ponds, streams, lakes, creeks, or irrigation ditches). Fire department tanker trucks can tap these water supplies to fight rural fires, and reduce the amount of time a water tanker would spend traveling back and forth from the site of the fire to the originating water source. The reduction in the amount of time taken to supply water to rural fire fighting efforts can reduce insurance rates in those areas.

Water is also a key ingredient to maintaining gravel roads. Using water to compact new layers of dirt or gravel makes a smoother surface on which vehicles can travel and increases the mileage vehicles using the road can achieve. Having water available for extraction on site resulted in a 50 percent reduction of driving time for road maintenance trucks in the pilot project. With water trucks averaging approximately four miles per gallon in fuel efficiency, the use of dry hydrants reflects substantial savings in fuel costs.

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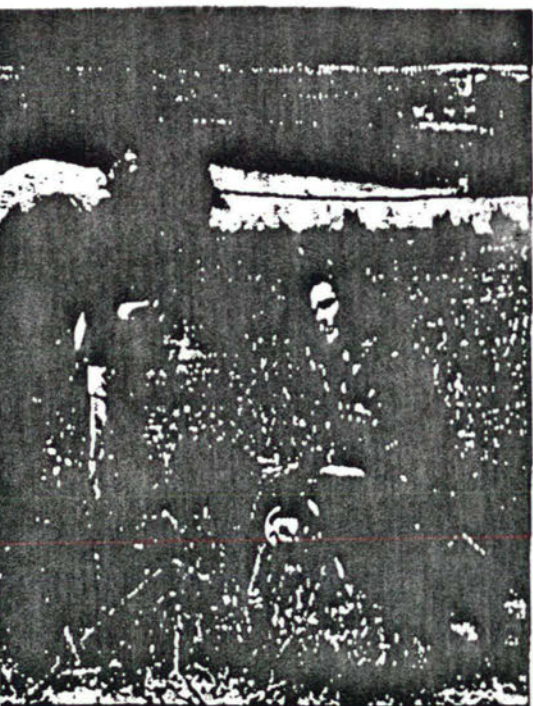

USDA Americorps: Getting things done for ru

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is a big supporter of the AmeriCorps program. President Clinton's national service initiative that allows diverse groups of people to perform critical services to meet human, environmental, public safety and educational needs. The Forest Service, Rural Economic and Community Development and Natural Resources Conservation Service are three USDA agencies supporting the AmeriCorps program in Louisiana.

AmeriCorps has been called the President's domestic version of the Peace Corps. There are 21 USDA AmeriCorps members with diverse education backgrounds giving a season of service to the people of rural Louisiana. These members are assisting with tourism development, community planning, rural fire protection, groundwater protection, timber bridge replacement, farm safety and USDA loan and grant programs.

Four USDA Forest Service (FS) AmeriCorps members are involved in various projects across Louisiana. Aminul Mahfuz is working in a 17-parish area to assist local communities to prepare grant proposals for future timber bridge funding and to provide the technical engineering assistance necessary to promote timber bridges as one solution to transportation problems in economically depressed areas. Judith Ned and Susan Mullins are helping northeast delta communities prepare grant

proposals and brochures to increase tourism in the delta region. They are also helping the local school boards with projects to increase ACT scores and establish tutoring programs to help students prepare for the GED exam. Alica Trissler is working with Winn Parish officials to prepare grant proposals for a Head-Start program and a program in folk art education. She is also assisting the Winnfield Forestry Museum in meeting the certification guidelines of the American Association of Museums.

Seven USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) AmeriCorps volunteers are working to increase rural fire protection and helping to develop individual groundwater protection action plans for landowners in various rural areas of the state.

To help in rural fire protection, four USDA NRCS AmeriCorps participants are assisting in the planning and installation of over 2,000 dry fire hydrants in Louisiana. The hydrants are structures located at ponds or reservoirs that provide a source of water for rural fire districts when no regular fire hydrants are available. USDA NRCS AmeriCorps members working to increase rural fire protection are Angela Norsworthy, Ruston; Tressa Lantz, Natchitoches; Dominic Beggan, Jennings; and Robin Torrence, Denham Spring.

With NRCS AmeriCorps members assistance, many rural families

have an opportunity to develop voluntary groundwater protection action plans through the Farm *A* Syst program, a program designed to help rural landowners protect their drinking water supplies. NRCS AmeriCorps members conduct assessment surveys, create an awareness of farmstead activities, promote an understanding of groundwater protection, identify sources of technical and financial assistance and aid in developing personal voluntary action plans. USDA NRCS AmeriCorps members working on this project are Carl Collins, Tallulah; Sobrena Lewis, Natchitoches; and Christie LeBleu, Crowley.

Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) AmeriCorps members are actively involved in a variety of outreach efforts designed to improve the overall quality of life for rural residents. RECD AmeriCorps members have taken a very active role in promoting the availability of various RECD loan and grant programs for both agricultural and residential interests. Members have also been very active in efforts related to recent Empowerment Zones/Enterprise Communities (EZ/EC) designations.

They have also been involved in promoting the Business and Industry (B & I) programs with lenders in their respective areas. RECD AmeriCorps members will be taking a role in promoting "Farm Safety 4

Just Kids" and "AgrAbility" projects designed to assist rural America. USDA RECD AmeriCorps members are Bobbie Ignat, Ferriday; Marcus Spencer, Tallulah; Marjorie Bethea, Bastrop; Lee Wooldridge, Winnsboro; Zelma Powell, Lake Providence; Wydette Williams, Lake Providence; Henry Rosenthal, Alexandria; Naomi Boley, Rayville; Sandi Eley, Winnsboro; and Kimberly Kinterling, Jonesville.

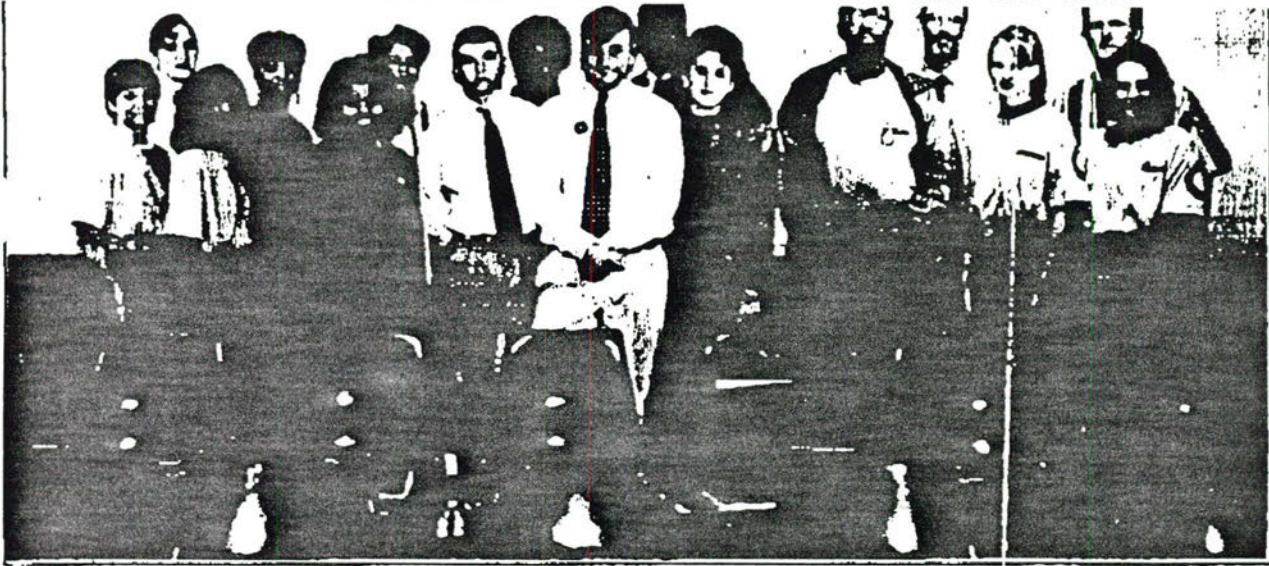

AmeriCorps, the national service organization signed into law by President Bill Clinton, has been termed a success since Winnsboro adopted it in the fall.

AmeriCorps has been called the president's domestic version of the Peace Corps. Sponsored by government agencies, it allows groups of people to perform critical services to meet environmental, human, public safety and educational needs.

"I like the benefits of AmeriCorps," Mullins said. "It pays child care while I'm working and I know the education and money are there if I ever decide to go back to school."

Donna Remedies, the Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) coordinator, is the AmeriCorps supervisor over Ned and Mullins.

"I don't feel I could have accomplished as much in the community since I've been here without the girls' help," Remedies said. "All the members under FS are college graduates. They could be making a lot more money but they chose to help here. We get a lot done."

Joel Berg, the director of National Services for the Department of Agriculture, visited Winnsboro on March 30 to speak to AmeriCorps members in the area. He oversees 1,200 AmeriCorps members serving in USDA anti-hunger, environmental and rural development projects in 33 states.

"AmeriCorps is about four

things: getting things done, community, opportunity and responsibility," Berg said.

"It creates more jobs, a cleaner environment and safer community. You'll soon see how critical it is to your community."

The AmeriCorps also participated in Saturday's Catfish Festival, where they manned a children's booth.

Sandy Eley, a local AmeriCorps member who's also with the Macon Ridge Economic Development Foundation, coordinated the booth, which included face painting, cartoon characters and information about farm safety, mental health, conservation awareness and fire safety.

The booth also featured identification cards for the children, which will be registered with the police station.
