Site Y22B: *During this quarter six hydrants were installed. All six were placed in locations which were not served by pressurized water delivery systems. Fire department personnel seem grateful for the assistance, and all people who have hydrants installed on their property are eager to have the hydrants. Tom Y. Site Y22B: *On January 26, 1996, the Winnsboro cluster meeting, led by Kimberly Kitterlin, conducted a DARE training session for students of Jena Elementary School. Approximately 200 students from kindergarten through third grade were contacted. The AmeriCorps members involved were met with great enthusiasm. Tom Y. Morton, USDA/AmeriCorps Member, Trailblazer RC&D, Ruston, Louisiana*

Site Y22F: *I conducted two workshops for teachers in Livingston Parish for secondary science and agriculture teachers and middle school teachers. There were 15 secondary teachers present for their workshop and 32 middle school teachers for their workshop. I participated in an environmental education symposium that was held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, which attracted 250 science teachers, of the 250, I was able to explain the Farm*A*Syst program to 48 science teachers. Irvin J. Fekete, USDA/AmeriCorps Member, Denham Springs Field Office, Denham Springs, Louisiana*

Site X22A: *Approximately 5,000 plants have been planted on lifts along Bayou Lafourche. The general public is steadily approaching members with overall positive comments on the project. As new lift is dredged and placed, we will continue to plant the bayou sides. The expected result will be stabilize the embankment. Success will be assured if it helps stabilize the bank for two years or longer.....*

On February 26, 1996, we put 750 linear feet of fence post. We placed the post 4 feet underground and 5 feet apart. On February 27, 1996, we put up the sand fences and tied them to the posts. On February 28, 1996, we put up 3 additional sand fences for a total of 1,170 feet of sand fences. The sand fence was placed in areas where occasional wash over of the barrier island was occurring. It is hoped that with dune build up the island will not be washed over, protecting it from being cut into sections. Also, it protects valuable marsh habitat from vehicular traffic by closing off access.....

Christmas trees are recycled for use in preventing or slowing coastal erosion. They are placed in "cribs" and tied down with string to prevent float off. The cribs are 2"x4" or 4"x4" posts spaced about 5'-7' apart. The trees reduce the wave action of boats' wakes and the changes in tidal flow. At the Leeville site we utilized 1500 trees with about 348 hours of work. At the Fourchon site we used about 1,000 trees in 152 service hours. The parish had a "Tree Ceremony" with dignitaries from the

state, parish, and local officials present. It was covered by newspapers and the local television channel.....(Listed as new objective 9, site X22A)

Our team visited local high schools during this quarter to present information on coastal erosion and AmeriCorps. We answered students' questions about the environment and AmeriCorps, and we considered this effort very successful because the students were both curious and responsive. We have been invited to visit two other high schools in the area.....(Listed as new objective 10, site X22A)

Our team planted trees on high recovered spoil from the Mississippi River outlet. This was part of an effort to introduce an assortment of tree species to the area. In one day, we planted 1,980 trees between the Violet Canal and Mississippi River outlet in St. Bernard Parish.....(Listed as new objective 11, site X22A)

We continue with work at the plant materials center between large objective projects. We have spent time on clearing weedy tree species from lands as a demonstration swamp area. We clean out and maintain ponds at their water levels. Transplanting plants and cleaning growing containers and plant trays in the green house are all part of our regular duties. We have done a bio-mass determination container study and a potting medium study. We continue with propagation and planting as needed. Our team has assisted the staff members with burning of the fields. We have assisted a field office by assembling 1,305 cages for plant protection from nutria and other small animals. Our team assisted with Lafourche Community Clean-Up Days on March 23 and March 30.

Because of this effort, I am happy to say that I can now have private well water checked for bacteria on each Farm*A*Syst assessment made at no charge to the landowner. A lot of credit goes to the sanitarians that represent the Florida parishes, especially William C. Hathaway, Sanitarian Regional Director. Irvin J. Site X22A: *We were approached by the Lafourche Parish Coastal Zone Advisory Committee to do the Christmas tree project. They had collected about 1,800 trees from within Lafourche Parish and about 700 trees from the Shreveport/Bossier City area (a teacher and her class collected the trees and had a trucking company deliver them to us). Since Shreveport is in the northwest corner of Louisiana and Lafourche is in the far southeast corner, we thought it was a great effort. After using 500 hours to place and secure the trees, the parish organized a "Tree Ceremony" to create awareness and thank us for our work. Christmas Trees Put in Their Place

USDA-AmeriCorps members are working hard to do their part in helping to reduce coastal erosion with the helpful use of used Christmas trees. The trees will not only help prevent soil erosion, but will also create fish-nursery habitat.

The projects began on January 29, 1996, in Leesville, Louisiana, and involve a lot of effort and balance. The trees had to be loaded onto trucks from the various drop off sites and driven to the placement site. Then, the trees were pulled across mud and water by members walking in three-foot-wide cribs. That's where balance comes in! After four days of work, our team had placed approximately 1,500 trees.

On February 6, 1996, we started a new tree project in Fourchon. This project was a little easier because we used a boat to carry the trees to the cribs. It took two days to place approximately 1,000 trees. Local news-station CCTV-5 and the Daily Comet newspaper covered the event. This project was a cooperative effort by the Department of Natural Resources, Solid Waste Management, Coastal Zone Management, and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service. **This is a prime example of "Getting Things Done."**

Team-Work Accomplishes More!! The USDA-NRCS Louisiana Coastal Wetlands Environmental team has learned quickly that with team-work a lot more can be accomplished. During November, December, and January, the group propagated a total of 20,000 plants to be used for sand stabilization and soil erosion prevention projects on Timbalier Island and Fourchon Beach. Keep up the good work!!

Feeling Caged--The team also assisted in the construction of 1,305 wire plant cages. The cages are constructed to fit over plants to keep the nutria and other animals from devouring the vegetation. The Boutte Field Office asked for assistance, and our team was more than willing to comply.

Boating and Water Safety was February's safety topic. The rules of safe boating, along with water safety, were explained in detail to the team. With warmer temperatures around the corner, boating trips will be more frequent. Safety rules and regulations for these topics are necessary and must be followed to ensure that the lives of team members will not be at risk. Life preservers must be worn at all times when aboard the boats. Another safety topic discussed was sun safety. We watched a video on how to work safely in the sun and how to reduce the risk of skin cancer. This was very helpful since 99% of our work is outdoors.

Secret Valentine Pal--Love was in the air February 14, 1996. Cupid struck our team with a big arrow. One of the members suggested that everyone pull names and make valentine cards, in secret, for the name pulled. It was not revealed until Valentine's Day who had who's

name. The card exchange along with some candy and cake brought the valentine spirit back to life. We had a ball!

On February 26, 27, and 28, the Environmental Team and members of the Plant Materials Center staff went to Port Fourchon Beach to construct sand fences. The fences trap the sand as the wind blows through it, thus creating a dune. The dune helps to prevent washover from the Gulf which, in time could break up the island. The team set up over 1,000 feet of sand fence.

The fences are constructed of 4"x 4"x 8' treated posts spaced five feet apart and buried four feet in the sand. After the posts are put in place, the fencing is rolled out and spread along the wall of posts. Then, the fencing is stretched and nailed to keep it straight and tight. Wire is then placed over the nailed slats and tied around the post to reinforce the durability of the fencing. The fences are important to the stability and future of this beach. We are very proud to have been involved.

FARM*A*SYST

Protecting Louisiana's Ground Water

Farm*A*Syst (Farmstead Assessment System) is a new self-assessment program to help protect the quality of the water you drink. It will provide you with accurate first hand information about how your structures and activities, such as pesticide and fertilizer storage or the condition of your water well, might be affecting your drinking water.

Some of the information will be reassuring, and some of it may encourage you to consider changing some of your practices. Either way, you will have the information you need to do the best possible job of protecting the groundwater you depend on for your family's drinking water.

Farm*A*Syst is a pro-active confidential self-assessment, designed to inform you, the well owner, of any potential risks to your ground water. The Farm*A*Syst program is a joint effort of the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, Farm Bureau, The Natural Resources Conservation Service and AmeriCorps.

AmeriCorps is President Clinton's national service program, passed with bi-partisan support from Congress, that engages 20,000 Americans of Diverse backgrounds in performing service that meets critical community needs in return for an educational award, which may be used to pay for college, job training, or graduate school, or to pay back student loans. The majority of AmeriCorps Members are working in partnerships with states, local governments and non-profit organizations.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is running three types of AmeriCorps teams in 38 states, composed of approximately 1,200 members: an Anti-Hunger Team, a Public Lands and Environment Team, and a Rural Development Team. My position has been directly responsible for volunteers applying 333 hours of volunteer services to the dry fire hydrant program, at a worth of \$40,395.68. This effort includes planning and coordination meetings, storage of dry hydrant components in a secure setting, meetings with public officials involved in the program, and of course, several dry hydrant installations. Installations include the manpower necessary to install the hydrant, the use of heavy equipment for excavation, donated materials such as rope, shovels, generators, power tools and the like, and such specialized services as site surveys, site locations, and dry hydrant testing.

Project Site Y22E: Engineering personnel assigned at the beginning of the dry fire hydrant project to assist with surveying potential sites were detailed to the Emergency Watershed Project in New Orleans, Louisiana. This site has been without engineering assistance since June 1995. This problem is currently being resolved as the engineers have completed their work in the New Orleans area and are again working on the dry hydrant program.

Project Site Y22F and Y22C: Confidentiality continues to be a problem with landowners agreeing to allow AmeriCorps members to conduct Farm*A*Syst groundwater assessments. Landowners are afraid if problems are identified, government agencies will become involved and perhaps force landowners to pay fines and implement costly clean-ups. There is no easy solution to this problem.

Several clusters have conducted training during these meetings, and the Natchitoches cluster collected canned goods during the Christmas holidays to give to an elderly person who was in need of food.

All USDA AmeriCorps members in Louisiana participated in a teleconference with Joel Berg, USDA Director of National Service. USDA AmeriCorps members and supervisors in Oklahoma also participated in this teleconference, and the two states were able to compare projects.

Project Site Y22H: The team leader for the Louisiana Coastal Wetlands Environmental Corps left national service. Currently, the team is operating with 10 team members---no leader. During the second quarter one team member will be promoted to the team leader position.

Ella Watkins, of Bastrop, (P22F), is continuing to help low income families fill out applications for housing assistance.

Carl Collins, of Tallulah, (P22D), helps the Council on Aging with their Meals on Wheels program. He finds it very rewarding to help the elderly.

Linda Rigsby, of Many, (R22F), has organized the Youth Council and other volunteers to help with the Mayor's "Clean Up Many" campaign. She encouraged "families and communities working together" as her slogan for the kick-off of this campaign. She has also begun recruiting volunteers to form the "1997 Project Graduation" committee which will organize and facilitate the all-night drug and alcohol free party for 1997 graduates of Many High School.

Theresa Smith, of Cullen, (R22H), continues to encourage area residents to clean up vacant lots in the community. She finds organizing neighborhood groups to work together to clean up streets is most effective.

16. Community Building Objectives Narrative:

Sheila Lyons, (R22D), says working with 502 and 504 loan and grant applications gives her the opportunity to help community members improve their standard of living. When helping with inspections, she is able to inform homeowners of ways to make their homes safer.

Ella Watkins, (P22F), also finds working with loan and grant applications rewarding. She enjoys helping low income families and the elderly find ways to improve their quality of life.

Carl Collins, (P22D), volunteered to help chaperone a trip for high school students to visit Galliano, Louisiana.

Linda Rigsby, (R22F), has formed a new group (the Sabine Quilters Guild) made up of volunteers of all ages, from 16 to 65, who are interested in learning to quilt, sew and serve the community.

Theresa Smith, (R22H), states she is pleased to find the citizens in her community have become better neighbors by working together to keep their streets and yards clean.

Sheila Lyons, (R22D), has learned to work with many people of diverse backgrounds and has had the opportunity to learn much about different aspects of business by working with the OJT program.

Mary Huff, (P22H), has met a wide variety of people and feels she has made many new friends through her AmeriCorps work.

Ella Watkins, (P22F), feels she has benefitted from her AmeriCorps experience on a personal as well as a professional level.

Carl Collins, (P22D), has realized the value of education and will be using his educational award to pursue a Master's Degree in Agri-Science.

Linda Rigsby, (R22F), has had the opportunity to attend many conferences, workshops and seminars where she has increased her knowledge on a wide range of subjects, from Child Abuse awareness to computer skills. She feels these experiences, as well as the opportunity to work with many new people, has been very rewarding.

Theresa Smith, (R22H), has come to care a lot for her town and community. She has learned the difficulties of getting others to care for the own environment.

Linda Rigsby, (R22F), says her favorite accomplishment this quarter was the recruitment of a new volunteer. Yvonne Hawkins, who is the parent of a Youth Council member, has joined the efforts to help produce the Community Resource Directory. She has spent many hours researching information, contacting local agencies and organizations and inputting the data into the computer. She also has been of great assistance around the office by answering the phone and managing the office when the staff has to be out.

She is also very proud of the community efforts to build a security fence and playground equipment for the Taylor House: Sabine Shelter for Victims of Domestic Violence. This project has been awarded a mini-grant from the AmeriCorps program to help fund the materials, and the Many Lions Club and Boy Scouts will help with direction and labor for the project.

Theresa Smith, (R22H), has had great success with a beautification project. The awarding of an AmeriCorps mini-grant will help add wooden benches and attractive metal trash cans with wooden frames around the park area. This will not only beautify the park, but influence the citizens to stop littering.
