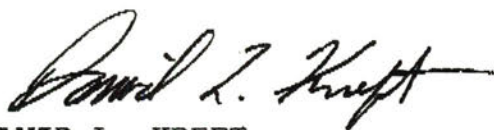

- Rehabilitating and refurbishing affordable housing;
- Providing services for the elderly; and
- Developing late night programs for youth implementation of the first AmeriCorps project on the Colville Indian Reservation which is one of the largest in the country.

This is a multi-site national service program, which incorporates a team-based concept in partnership with fourteen local sponsor agencies across the state. The structure of the program builds on existing partnerships while developing new and expanded capacity of implementing new service projects. Another key element in the Washington Americorps program will be the integration of two state-funded citizen service efforts (Washington Service Corps and Washington Serves) into a collaborative statewide service strategy.

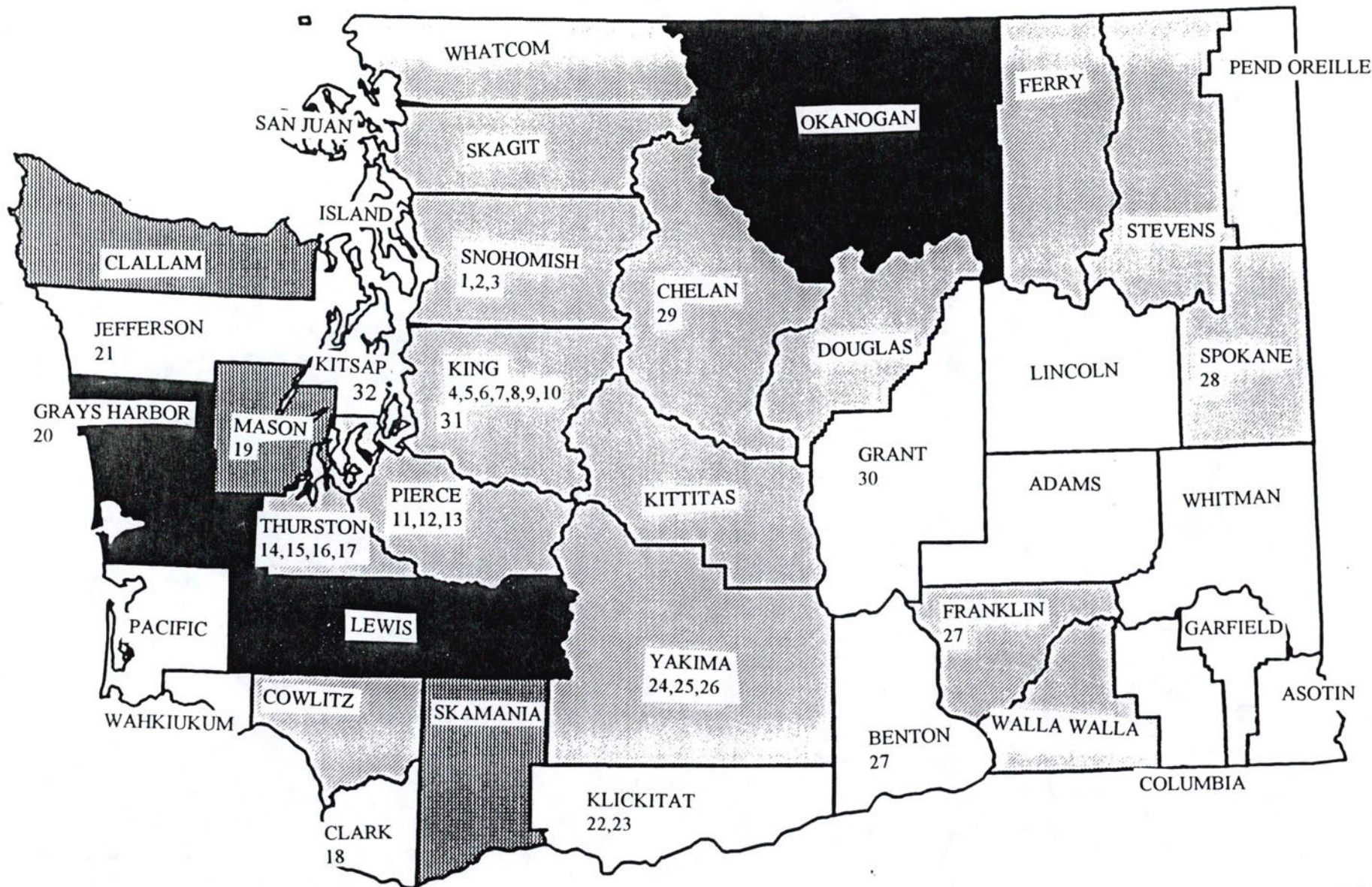
