Our reauthorization strategy involves working with the regular committee process, starting with the Senate. We will attempt to involve and win over key swing votes and conservative opinion leaders not on the Labor Committees.

Our approach is both substantive and political. To win on the substance means we will put forward high quality programs, work aggressively to see that programs leverage volunteers and do other things Congress cares about, go on the offense with good news, counter any attacks, and be creative and flexible in pursuit of middle-ground options. To win on the politics we will be scrupulously non-partisan, work to ensure that the upcoming election does not exploit AmeriCorps, and show that the programs have deep roots in the country, especially in key states and districts.

Our preparation involves researching key members of Congress and their districts, development of materials that illustrate the quality and importance of national service programs and that counter common attacks, and alerting key constituencies to the fact that reauthorization occurs this year. It also includes development of core principles for use in the reauthorization discussions, proposed amendments that will improve program quality, options papers discussing key issues, and documents synthesizing information presented at regional hearings and comments submitted as a result of the Federal Register notice.

Our tactics include using Harris, Eli and others to meet one-on-one with Senators and Congresspeople, a press strategy to raise the visibility and support for Corporation programs in national press and targeted areas, grassroots work in key districts, and outreach to groups and individuals who can assist in any of the above activities.

Statement of Principles:

Reauthorization of both DVSA and NCSA in form that continues:

- Support for full-time national service programs that meet unmet needs, strengthen communities, and encourage responsibility. Such support should provide a sufficient living allowances and benefits, including an education award, to attract diverse

members, aged 16 and older; allow for rapid and direct deployment of teams and individuals by the Corporation; and provide sufficient program support to local sponsors managing groups of members to allow for quality. Support should be provided on a competitive and formula basis through states, with funds set-aside at the federal level for competitively selected multi-state programs and national non-profits, a residential CCC-style program, and individual or small group assignments to grassroots and other organizations addressing the needs of low-income communities.

- Direct support, from the federal level, for senior service programs, including stipended programs and those that involve unstipended volunteers.

- Support for school, community, and campus-based service-learning programs.

- Support for efforts to engage more Americans of all ages and backgrounds in unstipended volunteer service.

All programs should be designed to ensure quality, and funds should be made available for training, technical assistance, recruitment, and demonstration efforts.

The administrative structure should preserve an independent Corporation with flexibility to determine the most effective federal structure to administer authorized programs. Support should be provided to states sufficient to ensure that programs can be administered in a quality fashion. Private sector support should be encouraged at all levels.

The last grouping, '94 Other, are organizations we sought out for the '94 grant cycle, but are planning only to mail to this time around. Please look over the list and add organizations that are missing, especially in the disabilities and seniors groups. Also look at the '94 Other organizations and pull out any that we should invite to a meeting.

Our first two meetings have been scheduled -- the National and Community Service Coalition (December 14) and youth (December 20). It would be helpful to have your additions or corrections by our reauthorization meeting on the 11th, especially regarding the youth meeting. But it will be a living list Thanks.

This is my attempt to get down a number of things we've discussed and review our assets. I am circulating it for review and comment with the hope that we can talk things through at a subsequent meeting. Please get back to me with your comments and criticisms.

1. The Corporation confronts reauthorization at a critical time in its history. We now believe that funding for the Corporation's third-year activities is assured, although the precise funding level remains in doubt. Reauthorization is our opportunity to (1) reemphasize those things that work; (2) fine tune those that need improvement; (3) drop those which we recognize simply don't work; and (4) set off in new directions.

The goal of this reauthorization should be to protect and preserve the most important elements of our vision of service. With a Congress that may well have its own ideas about reauthorization, our approach should resemble the football defense that "bends but doesn't break." That is, we may have to give ground to our opponents, but we want to prevent them from scoring on us. Thus, a priority of this reauthorization is clear recognition of our core principles. We should begin a discussion of those core principles promptly. Staff has reached tentative agreement on a number of noncontroversial issues and has identified several issues that require more discussion with Harris. These should also be reviewed soon, so that we come to agreement on what really matters to us.

We will follow a Senate first strategy -- just as we have all year -- and hope to work with Chairman Kassebaum's staff to create a bipartisan working group that will work to produce a bill by early March. While we want an early reauthorization, the longer the Congress remains in session and the longer it takes to conclude the FY '96 budget, the more likely reauthorization will be delayed. There is a distinct possibility that reauthorization will become entangled in the Presidential campaign and become more politicized than we would like. Shirley is already encouraging the White House to meet with us so that we can coordinate strategies.

2. The Corporation has already begun to enter into a dialogue with some of its stakeholders through regional meetings with AmeriCorps renewal grantees. We anticipate several months of meetings, convened under the auspices of Public Liaison with other

stakeholders, including the senior associations, VISTA sponsors, Learn and Serve experts, the Points of Light Foundation, representatives of the independent sector, foundations, corporations, and others. The point of these meetings is to solicit recommendations for how to strengthen the Corporation. In addition to these meetings, Public Liaison will schedule regular meetings with the Coalition for National and Community Service, which represents many grass roots groups, at which information about reauthorization can be exchanged.

Harris and Melinda will continue to be our liaisons with the Points of Light Foundation. (Groups like Friends of VISTA, Citizens for Service, and Points of Light should be encouraged to follow the example of the three Senior Associations and join the Coalition so their efforts can be coordinated with the rest of the field.)

Citizens for Service represents another asset which we need to employ effectively. In addition to reenforcing our efforts in key states, Citizens should actively recruit Washington based supporters who can be helpful. Both former Senator Durenberger and former Representative Dave McCurdy, for example, should be pursued and utilized to their maximum effect. Once we agree on our strategic plan, we should meet with Citizens.

The activities of the Board with regard to reauthorization need to be fleshed out, but certain roles are clear. Art Naparstek remains a useful link to Senator Mikulski and Representative Stokes. We should explore his relationship with Senator DeWine (R-OH). Les Lenkowsky is a logical choice to engage Senator Coats (R-IN) and other conservatives interested in civic renewal and Chris Gallagher should continue to work on Judd Gregg (R-NH). We will coordinate ideas for the Board with Deb.

3. At any given moment there is a majority of between 53 and perhaps 58 votes in the Senate for national service. Our goal should be to increase this to over 60 to try to insure that national service will not have to fight for its existence every year.

In tallying up our assets in the Senate, Harris is invaluable. He has the respect of former colleagues on both sides of the aisle and we should maximize his effectiveness as a spokesman for the Corporation through formal hearings and informal meetings hosted by people like Ted Kennedy, Sargent Shriver, board members, and service supporters like Ray Chambers.

Nancy Kassebaum is another asset. She appears committed to the Corporation's survival and to a successful (and bipartisan) reauthorization. If properly motivated she can help us to reach other moderately conservative Republican Senators. We should also be prepared to work closely with Pat Kells, the Executive Director of the Kansas State Commission, who clearly is close to the Senator and her staff.

We should reach out aggressively to the moderate Republicans who have supported national service: Chafee, Jeffords, Campbell, Snowe, Cohen, and Specter to encourage their participation in the reauthorization process.

We need to rebuild our bridges to Hatfield, Hutchison, and Stevens who have voted for service in the past but appear to have some misgivings.

At a minimum, our goal with Democrats should be to hold all of them except Byrd, Hollings, and Exon.

Ted Kennedy remains perhaps our greatest asset on the Democratic side. (However, there is currently no one on his staff who covers national service and this is a serious problem. We will inevitably have to devote resources to staffing Kennedy).

In addition to working closely with our supporters, we should also focus on other Senators and states, including Michigan (Spencer Abraham), Tennessee (Bill Frist and Fred Thompson), and Ohio (Mike DeWine).

4. We can anticipate rougher sledding in the House. The Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee Republicans have never been enthusiastic about national service. We should go to the House with momentum -- preferably a Senate bill or real progress toward such a bill. We will continue to rely on those Republicans who supported the National and Community Service Trust Act -- Gunderson, Shays, Lazio, etc. -- and target the 40 or so moderate Republicans who may need to show their moderation and independence in an election year. These targets include Mike Castle (DE), Michael Flanagan (IL), Jim Greenwood (PA), Sue Kelly (NY), etc. Ironically, there are five former Democrats who voted for national service -- Nathan Deal, Jimmy Hayes, Greg Laughlin, Mike Parker, and Billy Tauzin -- who may be helpful. (See attached list.)

House Democrats voted with virtual unanimity in support of national service in 1993. In a classic example of the power of the idea of service, every Democratic member of the Black Caucus and every member of the Coalition of conservative Democrats voted for the bill. We should work hard to reproduce 1993's strong support through use of designated "whips" like John Lewis (Black Caucus); Tim Roemer (Mainstream Democrats); Pete Peterson (Coalition); as well as Gene Green, Tom Sawyer, Major Owens from the Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee; and Sam Farr and Mike Ward, former Peace Corps volunteers who are committed to service.

We will work closely with House supporters, briefing them on a regular basis to heighten their involvement. We will also cultivate new relationships in the offices of targeted Members and with staff who are new to the issue of national service.

5. We should assume that Harris' travel will emphasize these key states, also.

6. Reauthorization is almost by definition nuanced; not black and white. This may make a press strategy more difficult to articulate and implement. Nevertheless, it does seem that some elements of a press strategy are to emphasize the results of the Gallup Poll showing broad and deep commitment to service on the part of most Americans, promote the increasingly nonpartisan nature of service, convince the press that the issue of AmeriCorps' survival has been determined once and for all, and to focus the attention of pundits on the role of government-sponsored service in civic renewal. Press will also target key states.

7. The National and Community Service Trust Act represents a partnership between the Administration, the Congress, and the Nation's Governors. To drive this point home, we need to continue to work through the NGA to get gubernatorial participation and support. We should also reach out directly to such supportive Governors as Weld, Merrill, Racicot, Engler, Hunt, and Dean for their more active involvement.

8. In 1993, we had to work hard to secure the support of the U.S. Conference of Mayors. Subsequently, we have strengthened relationships with individual Mayors like Murphy (Pittsburgh), Daley (Chicago), Perron (Elkhart, IN), among others. We should continue to closely involve local elected officials in reauthorization. Jim Scheibel will be particularly helpful in this regard.

In conclusion, I think it is safe to say that we come to the table with significant assets and opportunities. Our challenge is to get our act together soon so that we can be proactive instead of simply reacting to the initiatives of others.

RE: Grantmakers Forum for National Service Plans

The Grantmakers Forum is moving forward to pull together a work plan for the next six months. At the Forum in November, the group agreed on two goals: 1.) to develop a work plan to focus on advancing and community service agenda and informing the current national debate in a way that is appropriate for philanthropy; and 2.) to develop an ongoing structure for the Forum. They have agreed that since reauthorization is upon us, they should focus on the first goal and deal with the second one at a later time.

The Forum has organized the work plan around three main policy issue areas:

1. The first area is for the Forum to help research and inform the debate around the two issues that appear central to the national debate:
 - Why a government role in national service? How does this help build the field?
 - What about costs? How can we justify the cost of fulltime stipended service when volunteerism can do so much?
2. The second relates more to the philanthropic perspective--both traditionally and in the context of value added to the current national service initiative:
 - What is the role of philanthropy in community and national service? How has this played itself out as a private partner in the federal initiatives of 1990 and 1993?
3. The third reflects the experience and view of philanthropy in the implementation of the national service legislation of 1990 and 1993:
 - What do private funders want to say in general about the national role and more specifically about mid-course corrections?

That said, they have drafted a very broad plan containing several activities that would enable the foundation community to have a voice in the reauthorization process. The three major areas of focus for the next three months are as follows: (excerpted from a document produced by Nancy Peterson for the Forum.)

1. **Develop a short term strategic communications plan.** The purpose of this plan is to guide the work of the next two items on the work plan. The group agreed that the field, and particularly philanthropy has not been proactive about voicing support for national service and has not been an active participant in the national debate. The plan will focus on defining the message, defining who the target audiences are and the means by which the message will be communicated.

2. **Conduct critical immediate research and produce a document.** This piece of their agenda will focus on the following three issues:

- National Service--A Federal Role and What it costs.** Why should the federal government have a role in national and community service? How has it played out under the National and Community Service Act of 1990 and the subsequent National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993?

What does national service cost and what is its value in relationship to those costs. What is the difference and what are the links between volunteerism and stipended service programs. What are the costs and benefits?

- The role of philanthropy in community and national service.** What is philanthropy's traditional role and interest? How has philanthropy supported program development and implementation prior to and in the context of the national service acts of 1990 and 1993?

- Implications for re-invention of national service from a philanthropic perspective.** From the perspective of philanthropy, what are the mid-course corrections in national legislation that would build the field as well as preserve and enhance the public/private partnership? What has worked? What needs to be refined?

The document produced will summarize responses to these three issue areas and will serve as the basis for the convening that will take place.

3. **Convene key decisionmakers with prominent leaders and national service participants.** The Forum would like to sponsor a meeting to bring together--in a neutral and objective setting--key decisionmakers, funders, heavy hitters and Members to discuss mid-course corrections to national service policy and practice.

Statement of Principles

The Forum also drafted a set of principles to describe its perspective. (it's very much a draft--they have not yet gotten to "wordsmithing.")

1. National and community service is people working together to improve their communities in cost effective ways.
2. Participation in national and community service develops in children and youth a lifelong sense of responsibility to community.
3. Community volunteerism and national service are deeply rooted American traditions that improve our lives, build our communities and strengthen our democracy by getting people involved.
4. Community service as a national movement is a proven example of partnering among all parts of the community--individuals, churches, schools, nonprofits, businesses, and government--to meet pressing community needs. (It works best when it is community led and government assisted.)
5. It is essential that national and community service be a model of shared responsibility--those served also lead.

Next Steps

The Forum has decided to hire Jill Blair, a consultant who used to work for Stan Litow to serve as the project manager. Jill appears to be widely known and highly regarded in the foundation world. When appropriate, a communications professional will be engaged to direct the message development and strategy portion of the work plan. They are aware of the tight time constraints and are aiming to have the document produced and the meeting held by the beginning of March. IBM, Irvine, and others, have contributed financial resources to cover costs associated with the project. I have promised them that I will get them a list of our supporters, non supporters and those in between in Congress before the next call, which is scheduled for early January. They are also interested in working with key "stakeholders" of all political persuasions and would like some guidance from us on who we think might be important to include.

I know that a reauthorization strategy is being developed, and would be happy to sit with you to discuss how this workplan and set of activities may need to be adjusted in the context of that plan. They want to hear from us what is helpful. I have encouraged them to submit letters in response to the federal register piece, but I am not at all confident that will happen. I will keep you updated, but it would probably be helpful to meet on this soon.

This is my attempt to get down a number of things we've discussed and review our assets. I am circulating it for review and comment with the hope that we can talk things through at a subsequent meeting. Please get back to me with your comments and criticisms.

1. The Corporation confronts reauthorization at a critical time in its history. We now believe that funding for the Corporation's third-year activities is assured, although the precise funding level remains in doubt. Reauthorization is our opportunity to (1) reemphasize those things that work; (2) fine tune those that need improvement; (3) drop those which we recognize simply don't work; and (4) set off in new directions.

The goal of this reauthorization should be to protect and preserve the most important elements of our vision of service. With a Congress that may well have its own ideas about reauthorization, our approach should resemble the football defense that "bends but doesn't break." That is, we may have to give ground to our opponents, but we want to prevent them from scoring on us. Thus, a priority of this reauthorization is clear recognition of our core principles. We should begin a discussion of those core principles promptly. Staff has reached tentative agreement on a number of noncontroversial issues and has identified several issues that require more discussion with Harris. These should also be reviewed soon, so that we come to agreement on what really matters to us.

We will follow a Senate first strategy -- just as we have all year -- and hope to work with Chairman Kassebaum's staff to create a bipartisan working group that will work to produce a bill by early March. While we want an early reauthorization, the longer the Congress remains in session and the longer it takes to conclude the FY '96 budget, the more likely reauthorization will be delayed. There is a distinct possibility that reauthorization will become entangled in the Presidential campaign and become more politicized than we would like. Shirley is already encouraging the White House to meet with us so that we can coordinate strategies.

2. The Corporation has already begun to enter into a dialogue with some of its stakeholders through regional meetings with AmeriCorps renewal grantees. We anticipate several months of meetings, convened under the auspices of Public Liaison with other

stakeholders, including the senior associations, VISTA sponsors, Learn and Serve experts, the Points of Light Foundation, representatives of the independent sector, foundations, corporations, and others. The point of these meetings is to solicit recommendations for how to strengthen the Corporation. In addition to these meetings, Public Liaison will schedule regular meetings with the Coalition for National and Community Service, which represents many grass roots groups, at which information about reauthorization can be exchanged.

Harris and Melinda will continue to be our liaisons with the Points of Light Foundation. (Groups like Friends of VISTA, Citizens for Service, and Points of Light should be encouraged to follow the example of the three Senior Associations and join the Coalition so their efforts can be coordinated with the rest of the field.)

Citizens for Service represents another asset which we need to employ effectively. In addition to reenforcing our efforts in key states, Citizens should actively recruit Washington based supporters who can be helpful. Both former Senator Durenberger and former Representative Dave McCurdy, for example, should be pursued and utilized to their maximum effect. Once we agree on our strategic plan, we should meet with Citizens.

The activities of the Board with regard to reauthorization need to be fleshed out, but certain roles are clear. Art Naparstek remains a useful link to Senator Mikulski and Representative Stokes. We should explore his relationship with Senator DeWine (R-OH). Les Lenkowsky is a logical choice to engage Senator Coats (R-IN) and other conservatives interested in civic renewal and Chris Gallagher should continue to work on Judd Gregg (R-NH). We will coordinate ideas for the Board with Deb.

3. At any given moment there is a majority of between 53 and perhaps 58 votes in the Senate for national service. Our goal should be to increase this to over 60 to try to insure that national service will not have to fight for its existence every year.

In tallying up our assets in the Senate, Harris is invaluable. He has the respect of former colleagues on both sides of the aisle and we should maximize his effectiveness as a spokesman for the Corporation through formal hearings and informal meetings hosted by people like Ted Kennedy, Sargent Shriver, board members, and service supporters like Ray Chambers.

Nancy Kassebaum is another asset. She appears committed to the Corporation's survival and to a successful (and bipartisan) reauthorization. If properly motivated she can help us to reach other moderately conservative Republican Senators. We should also be prepared to work closely with Pat Kells, the Executive Director of the Kansas State Commission, who clearly is close to the Senator and her staff.

We should reach out aggressively to the moderate Republicans who have supported national service: Chafee, Jeffords, Campbell, Snowe, Cohen, and Specter to encourage their participation in the reauthorization process.

We need to rebuild our bridges to Hatfield, Hutchison, and Stevens who have voted for service in the past but appear to have some misgivings.

At a minimum, our goal with Democrats should be to hold all of them except Byrd, Hollings, and Exon.

Ted Kennedy remains perhaps our greatest asset on the Democratic side. (However, there is currently no one on his staff who covers national service and this is a serious problem. We will inevitably have to devote resources to staffing Kennedy).

In addition to working closely with our supporters, we should also focus on other Senators and states, including Michigan (Spencer Abraham), Tennessee (Bill Frist and Fred Thompson), and Ohio (Mike DeWine).

4. We can anticipate rougher sledding in the House. The Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee Republicans have never been enthusiastic about national service. We should go to the House with momentum -- preferably a Senate bill or real progress toward such a bill. We will continue to rely on those Republicans who supported the National and Community Service Trust Act -- Gunderson, Shays, Lazio, etc. -- and target the 40 or so moderate Republicans who may need to show their moderation and independence in an election year. These targets include Mike Castle (DE), Michael Flanagan (IL), Jim Greenwood (PA), Sue Kelly (NY), etc. Ironically, there are five former Democrats who voted for national service -- Nathan Deal, Jimmy Hayes, Greg Laughlin, Mike Parker, and Billy Tauzin -- who may be helpful. (See attached list.)

House Democrats voted with virtual unanimity in support of national service in 1993. In a classic example of the power of the idea of service, every Democratic member of the Black Caucus and every member of the Coalition of conservative Democrats voted for the bill. We should work hard to reproduce 1993's strong support through use of designated "whips" like John Lewis (Black Caucus); Tim Roemer (Mainstream Democrats); Pete Peterson (Coalition); as well as Gene Green, Tom Sawyer, Major Owens from the Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee; and Sam Farr and Mike Ward, former Peace Corps volunteers who are committed to service.

We will work closely with House supporters, briefing them on a regular basis to heighten their involvement. We will also cultivate new relationships in the offices of targeted Members and with staff who are new to the issue of national service.

5. We should assume that Harris' travel will emphasize these key states, also.

6. Reauthorization is almost by definition nuanced; not black and white. This may make a press strategy more difficult to articulate and implement. Nevertheless, it does seem that some elements of a press strategy are to emphasize the results of the Gallup Poll showing broad and deep commitment to service on the part of most Americans, promote the increasingly nonpartisan nature of service, convince the press that the issue of AmeriCorps' survival has been determined once and for all, and to focus the attention of pundits on the role of government-sponsored service in civic renewal. Press will also target key states.

7. The National and Community Service Trust Act represents a partnership between the Administration, the Congress, and the Nation's Governors. To drive this point home, we need to continue to work through the NGA to get gubernatorial participation and support. We should also reach out directly to such supportive Governors as Weld, Merrill, Racicot, Engler, Hunt, and Dean for their more active involvement.

8. In 1993, we had to work hard to secure the support of the U.S. Conference of Mayors. Subsequently, we have strengthened relationships with individual Mayors like Murphy (Pittsburgh), Daley (Chicago), Perron (Elkhart, IN), among others. We should continue to closely involve local elected officials in reauthorization. Jim Scheibel will be particularly helpful in this regard.

In conclusion, I think it is safe to say that we come to the table with significant assets and opportunities. Our challenge is to get our act together soon so that we can be proactive instead of simply reacting to the initiatives of others.

Based on Gene's memos and conversations with others, I outline below what I believe to be the six organizing principles for reauthorization:

1. Ours is a Senate based strategy. While we won't ignore the House--in fact, we need to put into place a bipartisan leadership core and hold onto conservative Dems and firm up / pick off moderate Reps--the Gingrich Goodling opposition dictates a Senate win first.
2. We should try to get a bill through the Senate as early as possible in 1996. This will be a daunting task because the Republican presidential nomination will probably be determined by April 1.
3. We need to calibrate presidential involvement with great care. The essential objective is light on public splash, but constant re-enforcement of substantive commitment.
4. Vigorous defense of the product. We need to pound away at the "cost" issue (and other existing and potential vulnerabilities). We need to release studies and tell stories which re-enforce the benefits of AmeriCorps. We need to increase the public awareness of national service's human force.
5. Try to design a joint Kassenbaum-Corporation piece of legislation including:
 - A. A living allowance and education award;
 - B. Open to all Americans;
 - C. delivery through national nonprofits, as well as state commissions;
 - D. streamline delivery system, including merger of foundations between state offices and commissions;
 - E. merged entity plays major role in other corporation products;
 - F. greater financial burdens on non-governmental sources;
 - G. team and individual placement;
 - H. full time and part time; and
 - I. pre, during, and post college opportunities.
6. Focus grass roots efforts on Gene's "Republican targets" and "Republicans who voted for the authorizing legislation but not Mikulski." Don't overlook 6 Republican supporters of Mikulski. Harris's travels; editorials; Citizens for Service's activities; our public relations; Republican mayors, governors, CEOs; and charities all directed at this audience.
7. Work hard on customer service--not only for its own sake but to avoid embarrassment from service world. Focus every day on the structure and rhetoric of both bipartisanship and quality decentralization.

Introduction

This paper is submitted in the spirit of strong support for and desire to improve the National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993. The final version is informed by responses to two surveys from State Commission Executive Directors.

I. Common Themes and Major Changes in the Delivery System

New Organizational System: Give States More Flexibility in Exchange for Accountability, but Retain the Current Nonpartisan Commission Structure

State directors support the idea of greater authority and flexibility for states. The Act should:

- Retain the current nonpartisan (bipartisan) Commission.
- Build State capacity to operate effective, efficient and innovative programs by guaranteeing increased flexibility and authority in exchange for accountability.
- Offer all State Commissions greater flexibility and authority to select and administer all AmeriCorps programs operating in the state in exchange for high-quality accountability standards for program results and management.
- Stipulate that States must design a well-coordinated, comprehensive delivery system that is driven by the State Plan. The Plan is developed by the Commission (or alternative entity) with input from citizens and all streams of CNS programs.
- Stipulate that all CNS programs must operate within the framework of the State Plan.
- Designate two Commission seats for representation from CNS program participants (in addition to the Corporation field office representative).
- Stipulate that the Corporation develop and implement a plan to treat different states differently -- offer varying degrees of flexibility, depending upon the state's readiness and capacity to meet high standards for program administration and coordination.
- Stipulate that from 60%-to-80% of the national T/TA funds be moved directly to the State Commission to support T/TA needs as described in the State Plan.

II. New Roles for the Corporation and Commissions

The roles of the Corporation and the Commissions will change. The legislation should more clearly define the roles of the Corporation and the Commission. This should include the items listed below.

The Corporation should:

- Develop baseline standards for program quality and community involvement.

- Develop standards of high quality for state commissions and commission offices that are based on their signed contracts with the corporation, and offer technical assistance to bring all commissions to a threshold of excellence.
- Manage a national evaluation of NACSTA programs.
- Organize a national media campaign to strengthen the service ethic, highlight the results of good service programs, and clarify the roles of different kinds of community service (volunteerism through service-learning through full-time, stipended service).
- Assemble program data submitted from the states and prepare reports for state and national distribution.
- Develop support for service partnerships and programs from businesses, foundations, and large service organizations.
- Use incentives rather than mandates to move Commissions toward special quality practices: for example, using different program streams creatively in a comprehensive community partnership; or raising a significantly large cash match; or operating high quality AmeriCorps programs at a below-average per member cost.
- Change the role of the corporation program officer (part of a line of authority and control from the Corporation) to that of program resource specialist (with an emphasis on providing assistance).

The Commissions should have full authority and responsibility to:

- Select and administer programs; in particular, final authority for selection and administration of all formula-funded programs.
- Determine specific policies relating to the grant process, program implementation and management within broad, general federal guidelines and standards.
- Assume full responsibility for program training, technical assistance, and monitoring, and manage the technical assistance funds that are awarded directly to the State Commissions.
- Be creative in demonstrating the power of service as a tool for solving a wide range of persistent, pressing problems.

Issues That Require More Discussion

- There are four urgent issues that require additional discussion to determine how the new system should work:

Placing national direct grantees (or national direct funds) under the State Commissions clarifying the relation between AmeriCorps VISTA and AmeriCorps USA as program models; also, the relation and governance of Corporation field offices and the Commissions;

Eliminating the category of competitive grants for AmeriCorps USA and adding those funds to the formula pot; and clarifying the fee-for-service issue.

III. Specific Federal Law Changes We Recommend

The Executive Directors recommend that the Act should:

- Exempt AmeriCorps programs and Members from unemployment insurance taxes and benefits.
- Clarify the differences among Members, employees, and volunteers in all relevant federal legislation to ensure consistency in applicability of labor, insurance and other relevant laws to all ameriCorps Members nationwide.
- Make the ADA "Access AmeriCorps" funds available to all ameriCorps programs (formula programs are currently excluded) exempt Member education awards from federal income tax.
- Combine all CNS programs (streams) into one comprehensive, coordinated program bill.
- Clarify the responsibilities of the Commission for national direct grantees and provide funds to Commissions for all required responsibilities.
- Amend relevant Federal laws to provide participation of welfare recipients and persons on SSI in AmeriCorps programs; eliminate disincentives that may currently exist in Federal statute.
- Require Commissions to describe the system for assuring close coordination between the Commission and all CNS programs in their State Plan.
- Require CNS programs for which the Commission does not have direct administering authority to comply with the approved coordination system described in the State Plan.
- Require that data collected by the Corporation from Commissions be reported back to Commissions.

New "Stipended Server" System

There was overwhelming agreement that a number of issues should be resolved not at the state level, but in clear language at the federal level. In general, the directors seek consistency across federal statute in recognizing that AmeriCorps Members are neither volunteers nor employees. This means that labor, tax, and unemployment insurance laws should be changed to recognize this new category -- what we call the "stipended server". The language should supersede all state law. The national level technical issues are summarized in the survey results section.

A second "stipended server" issue that emerges is to what extent our AmeriCorps "stipended servers" are characterized by responding to a service plan developed by a collaboration of community (public and private) organizations, as opposed to working (providing services) for a sponsor. This has been administratively handled by the Corporation in a way that seems acceptable and comprehensible to most program directors; that is, that AmeriCorps members respond to projects that emanate from the objectives of the collaboration's AmeriCorps proposal. This means that Members are accountable not to one sponsoring entity, but to the collaboration's governing council and the terms of its funded proposal. The collaboration, however, may set goals and objectives that are clearly within the work domain of one single entity such as the Forest Service or State Department of Fish and Game. In that case, the funding source may be a single entity, but it does not dictate policy or "serving" conditions: those still are under the purview of the funded AmeriCorps proposal/contract. Some explanation -- such as this one -- that clarifies "fee-for-service" limitations must be in the Act.
