To President Bill Clinton

I want to commend you for your "Lands Legacy Initiative" and related efforts to attain wilderness protection for National Parks. As you know, I view passage of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) as one of the most important and enduring achievements of my presidency.

Your new initiative holds similar promise. I understand that in addition to those lands proposed for wilderness designation in your State of the Union Address, you are evaluating a broader list of areas suitable for wilderness proposals, including the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Legislation being advanced by Representative Bruce Vento and Senator William Roth would add the 1.5 million-acre Arctic Refuge coastal plain to the National Wilderness Preservation System. During the last session of Congress, these measures garnered more co-sponsors than at any time since passage of ANILCA.

I urge you to endorse these initiatives and add permanent protection of the Arctic Refuge coastal plain to your broader wilderness agenda. Your veto of the 1995 federal budget bill already signaled your commitment to this incomparable landscape. But as you well know, the Arctic Refuge coastal plain will remain imperiled until it is permanently protected.

Just as your creation of the Grand Staircase Escalante National Monument permanently protected some of Utah's red rock wilderness, so too can you ensure that our last vestige of pristine Arctic coastline is forever off-limits to oil exploration and development. The Arctic Refuge is one place that should not be left vulnerable to a changing of the political guard.

Thank you for your continued stewardship of our natural treasures.

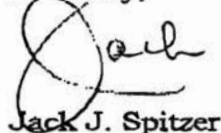
This was brought to your attention some time ago, but at this point of that letter of congratulations from the President has not yet been received.

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

FROM: Charles F.C. Ruff

SUBJECT: Further on Helms v. Picard

This is to follow up on our April 1 memorandum to you on this case, in which the Fifth Circuit held unconstitutional, as applied, a provision of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act that permits local educational agencies to lend computers and other instructional materials to private sectarian schools. We have continued our efforts to resolve the disagreement between the Solicitor General and the Secretary of Education as to whether we should seek Supreme Court review of that decision. In addition, the Secretary and the Solicitor General met with the private school groups to discuss the best strategy for approaching the Supreme Court. I am pleased to report that the Solicitor General and the Secretary have reached agreement on the following course of action, which we believe is consistent with the views you expressed in response to our earlier memo, and which the Secretary believes is consistent with the commitments he has made to the private school community.

In light of the fact that some of the state and local defendants in the case will be filing a petition for certiorari, and in light of the Solicitor General's continuing concerns about the record in this case, he will not file a separate petition for certiorari on behalf of the Secretary. He will, however, file a responsive brief supporting the petition. The Solicitor General has prepared a rough draft of his brief, which both we and the Secretary are very satisfied with. The draft brief argues that programs to provide computers and other instructional materials to all students, including those in sectarian schools, are vitally important and should be permitted, so long as adequate safeguards are in place to provide reasonable assurance that they will be used for secular, not religious, purposes, and so long as the public aid is supplementary to the religious school's program. The brief recognizes that this will require the Supreme Court to re-examine and partially overrule some of its precedents -- which now forbid such aid unless it is incapable of diversion to religious purposes -- and argues that the time has come to do so. It urges the Court to grant certiorari and issue a decision that announces the new "adequate safeguards" test and remands the case to the Fifth Circuit for reconsideration, applying that new test. The remand will have the virtue of permitting the Fifth Circuit to decide the case with the benefit of the Department of Education's Guidelines, which were issued after the original decision. This improves the chances that the Fifth Circuit and the Supreme Court will find that the "adequate safeguards" test has been satisfied in this case.
