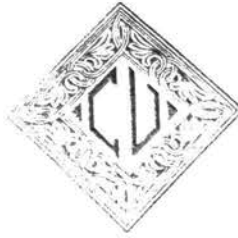

Dear Ms Currie:

I hope that you (or the Secretarial staff) will forgive this unsolicited letter which concerns the APEC gathering in New Zealand in mid-September, and, in particular, the possibility that the First Family will visit the South Island and its main city, Christchurch, after the APEC Meeting concludes in Auckland.

I visited The White House in 1995 after attending conferences in the United States and enjoyed that very much, being an aficionado of Presidential politics (having done research into the Alger Hiss-Whittaker Chambers-Nixon matter at the Nixon Library & Birthplace in Yorba Linda about a year after the Clintons attended the late President Nixon's funeral there). However my main reason for visiting the United States at that time was to take part in some symposia which coincided with the centenary of the birth of the noted mystery novelist, the late Dame Ngaio Marsh, a New Zealander who was being honoured by her fans in the USA. Dame Ngaio had long enjoyed popularity as a Golden Age crime novelist in your country and indeed her 32 novels are still in print there (the latest imprint being undertaken by St Martin's Press [New York] in the 'Dead Letter' series. The Marsh celebrations of 1995 coincided happily with the 50th Jubilee of The Mystery Writers of America (MWA), by whom Dame Ngaio had been honoured by the Grandmaster Award in 1978 (along with Dame Daphne du Maurier and your own Dorothy B. Hughes). Indeed I attended the MWA celebrations in New York in April 1995 both at the NYU campus (a day after Mrs Clinton had visited) and at the Bartos Forum room in the fabulous New York Public Library. In fact I stood at the cocktail party and listened as Walter Moseley read The President's statement of good wishes to the MWA on that memorable occasion.

It is because I have long known of The President's enjoyment of mystery and crime fiction and because of The First Lady's keen interest in the preservation of American heritage buildings that I venture to write to you now, in the hope that your office might peruse the enclosed material on Ngaio Marsh and draw the option of a short visit to Dame Ngaio's home and property to the attention of The President or The First Lady and/or to their officials. The team which came here recently (see enclosed clipping) did not check out this option which is a very safe one in terms of the provision of security coverage, and this is why I am writing directly to you. I believe that because this is a very new operation and has not been (as yet) widely marketed they did not think of it. I confess that a visit here by any member of the Clinton family will greatly help to put us on the map, as it were, but that is not my primary reason for writing to you. It is simply that one or more of the First Family might find this an interesting place to visit, being the only writers' home open to the public in the South Island of New Zealand. It has attracted to date a large number of North American, British and some European visitors. In addition I have very close links with the American Ngaio Marsh Society International (NMSI Inc), as a result of that 1995 visit. In fact only last April I presented a framed citation (Green Room Award) to the Mayor of Christchurch (Cr Garry Moore) at the House, and we hosted our Patron, Sir Michael Hardie Boys and his wife (Lady Mary), at the House in a secure, private visit prior to that. Sir Michael is The Governor-General (= Queen's representative) of New Zealand and he is certain to be the first dignitary to welcome the Clinton family to New Zealand.

...../

The visit of The Governor-General presented no security problems as the Ngaio Marsh House is located discreetly in the suburb of Cashmere up a private lane. Should the First Family (all or any thereof) show an interest in a brief visit to this site we could maintain a discreet silence if that were wanted. I fully appreciate the fact that this may well be a low-priority item on the visits agenda, but simply felt that it was worth placing before White House staff as a possible option. A normal tour of the House takes about an hour but we could tailor things so that the whole visit could fit within a 25 minute slot. The Ngaio Marsh House is geographically positioned at a good point en route to the Port Hills and a well-known scenic drive, which might well be on the planning agenda in any event.

As I have already mentioned, last April I presented a NMSI award to The Mayor and City Council at the House and so Mr Moore would be well placed to give White House staffers an assessment of the value of such a visit. The House has a high level of intactness about it (e.g. Marsh's criminological reference books and her personal library in toto, her original furnishings and fittings, original paintings from her hand and much memorabilia from her decades of involvement as a theatrical producer, largely of Shakespeare).

Amongst the items presented is a sample page from the recent Scribner's reference work on Mystery Writers to which I contributed the Marsh entry. I have added some pages of background biographical detail which were written for that publication. I should also point out that a key feature of the 1995 Centenary celebrations was the publication in the United States of a book edited by Professor B.J. Rahn (Hunter College, CUNY) and entitled Ngaio Marsh: The Woman and Her Work, and only last year her biography, Ngaio Marsh: A Life, was published by The Poisoned Pen Press (Scottsdale, AZ). I am sure that I have by now amply demonstrated the fact that Ngaio Marsh, though she died in 1982, continues to exert some continued interest in the United States of America, and that as a consequence of this you will understand why I have made this direct overture to you.

I may be faxed (+64.3.364-2002) should you wish to have any more details about possible locational/logistical matters. Should you reply to this letter I wonder if you could possibly send me a copy of The President's two inaugural speeches. I say 'should you reply' because I am not expecting you to do so unless you or your staff see some possible merit in the proposal put forth in this letter. I should only add that I plan to post The President a copy of one of Dame Ngaio's novels (for possible reading on the flight out on Air Force One) under separate cover in the near future.

I wish to conclude by thanking you for reading this letter and considering this proposal and by wishing you ongoing fulfilment in your work for the rest of this Administration's term.

While you are on vacation, I am at work (but then again you are always working, I am afraid). We just returned from taking Mary to her freshman year in college at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. While we were in LA for three days, we saw scant little of Mary. She was quickly making friends and becoming, in the famous words of the Beach Boys, a "California girl." Actually the student body is about 90% from California, so Mary will be wise to acclimate. I am thrilled that she liked the campus, hit it off well with her roommate (there is no primal fear greater than wondering how your freshman roommate will be) and was ready to be independent. LMU was chosen, I suspect, because it is (a) a long way from parental overview in Chicago and (b) near USC, where Mary's boyfriend will be attending.

Cara's wedding was fabulous. But, as I told you Bill, I was comatose. Actually, it hit me all-of-a-sudden on the afternoon of the wedding. Walking Cara down the aisle was the hardest thing I have ever done. I couldn't look right or left for fear I would start weeping. First-hand observers later pronounced my visage as grim. All this with me being very happy for Cara and extremely fond of Jay (my new son-in-law). They are in the process of trying to move up the TV ladder from their current jobs in South Bend.

Your house hunting reminded me of the scary days when I looked for our first house on the North Shore (in 1973). I knew one thing - I had an absolute price limit of \$50,000. I remember being irked when the realtor took me to a Victorian house in Winnetka that was listed at \$65,000. I walked through the house and was impressed by the new hardwood floors and recent painting. The garage was at the rear of the property (50 feet from the house) on an alley. STEVE LITTLE, 43, of Little Rock died Sept. 6, 1999. A member of NFL Players Association, NFL Alumni Association, and Arkansas Razorback Letterman's Club, he was a former NFL Pro-Football player. His accomplishments included being a two time All American; three time All Southwest Conference; the 1st round draft pick of the St. Louis Cardinal football team; and the NCAA Record for the longest field goal in history - 67 yards.

Steve was predeceased by his mother, Gerry Little; and is survived by his father, Ron Little; his brother, Gene Little; and by a large number of friends and fans nationwide with whom he enjoyed visiting and reminiscing.

Memorial services will be 3 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 9, 1999, at the Chapel of Griffin Leggett Healey and Roth, 5800 West 12th, Little Rock, 661-9111. Little dies in sleep at 43 in Little Rock

Steve Little, whose 67-yard field goal for Arkansas in 1977 remains an NCAA record, died Monday at his Little Rock home. He was 43.

Little, who had been a quadriplegic since 1980 because of injuries suffered in a car wreck in St. Louis, died in his sleep according to his brother, Gene.

Gene Little, who has lived with his brother and cared for him the last 19 years, said the cause of death hadn't been determined.

"He's been through some tough years," Gene Little said. "Still, it's a shock."

Little came to Arkansas in 1974 from

Shawnee Mission High School in Overland Park, Kan., and became one of the greatest kickers in college football history, earning All-American honors in 1976-77.

"Steve was very courageous, living the last 19 years in very, very difficult circumstances," said Arkansas Athletic Director Frank Broyles, who coached the Razorbacks from 1958-76. "He was a great

Razorback and will be greatly missed."

Arkansas Coach Houston Nutt was Little's teammate in 1976-77.

"This is a bad day for the Razorbacks," Nutt said when he learned of Little's death. "Our hearts and prayers go out to Steve's family."

Little's 280 points from 1974-77 remain a school record. He hit 53 of 89 field goal attempts and 121 of 131 extra-point attempts.

"Any time we crossed the 50-yard line, you were in Steve Little's range," said Henderson State Athletic Director Ken Turner, who coached Arkansas kickers from 1973-1988. "He had an unbelievable leg."

On Oct. 15, 1977, Little hit a 67-yard field goal in Arkansas' 13-9 loss to Texas to tie the NCAA

record that Longhorns place-kicker Russell Erxleben had set two weeks earlier against Rice. In 1978, Wichita State's Joe Williams kicked a 67-yard field goal against Southern Illinois.

All that success brought about NCAA rules that reduced the role of the place-kicker. Missed field goals now return to the line of scrimmage instead of the 20-yard because of a 1978 rule change, and kicking tees were scaled down before being eliminated altogether following the 1988 season.

In 1994, Little was voted by fans to Arkansas' all-century team.

"He's the best kicker I ever coached," Broyles said. "He had such leg strength and quickness and explosiveness that when he hit the ball, it was just a blur going straight up."

Little also punted his junior and seniors seasons, averaging 44.4 yards on 111 attempts, and Broyles said Little was a good enough athlete he could have played defensive back.

"But he was so valuable as a place-kicker," Broyles said. "We didn't want to risk him getting injured."

But being a kicker didn't stop Little from being a football player, as Turner recalled.

"He'd always try to get in on the tackle when he kicked off," Turner said. "He was just a great athlete who could do almost anything."

Little also was an all-state quarterback in high school and Nutt, who played quarterback for Little Rock Central and Arkansas and Oklahoma State, recalled that Little used to sometimes throw with the quarterbacks.

"He had a great arm," Nutt said. "I think he could have played quarterback if that's what he had wanted to do."

"As a kicker, I can remember seeing him hit 35 or 40 field goals in a row in practice. It was almost boring for him."

Turner said the last time he saw Little was last October at a reunion of Arkansas' 1977 team that beat Oklahoma 31-6 in the Orange Bowl.

"Steve was really upbeat that night and had a good time seeing everybody, and seemed to be doing pretty well," Turner said. "That makes it a real shock to hear about this, but with his situation, I guess you don't ever know."

Little was a first-round NFL draft pick by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1978 and hit 13 of 27 field goal attempts and 41 of 51 extra-point attempts before being released Oct. 16, 1980.

On the night Little was cut by the Cardinals, he wrecked his car and was left paralyzed.

Last April, Little was hospitalized in Little Rock suffering from a bladder infection, but he recovered and was able to return home.

"He seemed to be doing all right," Gene Little said. "That's why this is such a shock."

Gene Little said his brother had continued to be a sports fan after the accident.

"He was always watching sports on television," Gene Little said. "It was the highlight of his day. It pretty much was sports, sports, sports. He kept up with everything."

In addition to his brother, Little is survived by his father, Ron Little of Little Rock.

Funeral arrangements are to be announced by Griffin Leggett Healey and Roth Funeral Home of Little Rock.

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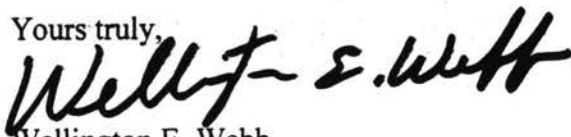

Hispanics lobby fir 1st federal judge

July 24 - A group of Hispanic leaders and activists is pushing to get state Deputy Attorney General Christine Arguello appointed as the first Hispanic judge to the U.S. District Court in the District of Colorado.

The group met with U.S. Rep. Diana DeGette Friday morning in Denver to encourage her support Arguello's cause.

"Obviously our goal is to get the vacancy filled," said Denver Clerk and Recorder Rosemary Rodriguez. "But we'd love to see the first Hispanic appointed."

The nomination has become a political football because of a convoluted nominating process.

DeGette, former Gov. Roy Romer and former Rep. David Skaggs, all Democrats, submitted several names to the White House as nominees to fill the seat of Judge Zita L. Weinshienk, who has assumed senior status. Among them was U.S. Magistrate Patricia Coan.

President Clinton announced last month he would nominate Coan to the bench.

But Sen. Wayne Allard, R-Colo., said he would exercise his privilege as the homestate senator and veto Coan's nomination, saying, "We can do much better." The nomination must be approved by the Republican-controlled Senate, with the home-state senators afforded the right to veto any nominee. Allard then appointed a search committee, which came up with five names, including Arguello. Arguello, 43, is a native of Thatcher, near Buena Vista, and a graduate of CU-Boulder and Harvard Law School. She is a former partner of Denver law firm Holland & Hart.

Also named to the list of nominees was Rebecca Koppes-Conway, the wife of Allard's press secretary. Koppes-Conway is considered the front-runner on the list, according to numerous people contacted.

On Friday, Hispanic leaders met with DeGette to pitch Arguello. At the meeting were Rodriguez, Denver City Councilwomen Ramona Martinez and Debbie Ortega, Auditor Don Mares and state representatives Fran Coleman and Frana Mace.

"Rep. DeGette told us she wouldn't abandon the process she had set up with Romer and Skaggs, that she was continuing to support Judge Coan's nomination," said Rodriguez. "But she made a big concession on her part by telling us she wouldn't object if we went directly to the

White House with our request that President Clinton appoint Christine Arguello."

Former state legislator Paul Sandoval also said the meeting was upbeat.

"She (DeGette) listens real well. She's sympathetic to our cause, I think. We want to ask the White House to reconsider its position (on Coan) and look at Arguello, since it could be a win-win situation," said Sandoval, referring to the fact that Allard submitted Arguello's name.

Lisa Cohen, DeGette's chief of staff, called it a very constructive meeting.

"It's a good start," she said. "Everyone shares the same goals of putting a qualified judge on the bench. Diana's position has always been that she supports the president, and he has nominated Pat Coan. The group told us they would try to speak to both Senator Allard and President Clinton. Diana said it was fine, but she made it clear that she supports the president," said Cohen.

Rodriguez said her group was unclear about the next step but that they would meet in a week or two to discuss going first to Allard and then to the White House.

The judgeship has been open for 15 months.

It was great to see you during your visit to Kansas City. Your speech to the VFW was well received.

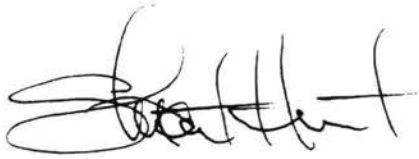

But then, your ability to communicate and the reception that you received afterward, proved other wards. During your speech, we heard an older couple sitting behind say, "right, right, he's right".

After your speech we were amazed at the crush of veterans and their wives who pressed against the restraining fence, six and seven rows deep, trying to shake your hand or get a photograph. As you know, these are members of an American generation that have made a significant sacrifice for our way of life. Their adoration cannot be had cheaply. To see them, feel their emotion for you, was an incredible experience for us and a true indication of the distorted reality that is mostly played out in the press. As you have often said, "The American people normally get it right".

I will especially remember an older veteran, standing on a chair, two rows behind us, who was staining with his left hand to reach you for a handshake. His left hand was missing three fingers. You saw him, stopped, reached out, straining yourself to reach his hand. Those around us, realized what was happening and parted enough, so that you two could shake.

Only a few people saw this. No one reported it. It seemed to me a private moment. Yet, it reminds me of all your small, private, unreported accomplishments. The willingness to reach out and touch, just one person.

U.S. role changing, VFW is told

Thanking the Veterans of Foreign Wars for making this an "American century," President Clinton said Monday the next 100 years could hold fewer sacrifices if the world embraces key measures for peace now.

He called on the veterans — noting that the VFW backed his military intervention in Kosovo — to join his push for money to reduce old Soviet nuclear stores, for implementing Middle East peace accords and for promoting conflict resolution in Africa.

"Underfunding our arsenal of peace is as risky as underfunding our arsenal of war," Clinton told the 100th annual convention of the VFW in Kansas City. "For if we continue to underfund diplomacy, we will end up overusing our
