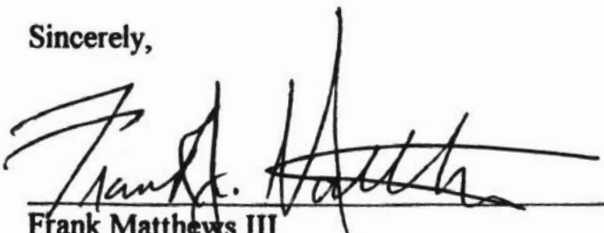
I stated that I wanted to send photos of these events to the President in the hopes that he would remember me and our previous conversations concerning reduction in youth gang activities.

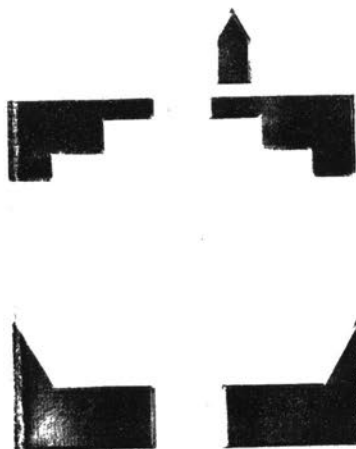

Dear Mr. President:

I thought long and hard about presuming on our friendship by contacting you about this issue. Because of it's importance and your concern and compassion for the health of communities, I am asking you to intercede on behalf of the Overland neighbors, the city of Denver, and - ultimately - others in this country who may one day face a similar situation.

Shattuck Chemical Company, (now owned by Solomon Brothers, Inc.) was a uranium and mineral processing plant from early 1920 until 1984. It was one of the first sites to be placed on the National Priorities List in 1983 and later included in the Superfund program. During the late 1980's, the site was studied in depth by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Virtually all the soil was found to be contaminated as well as all of the ground water on the site, and many areas downgradient. The contaminants include radium, thorium, molybdenum, arsenic, mercury, chromium, selenium, volatile compounds, etc.

During this period, the EPA and CDPHE met numerous times with the community and repeatedly stated the most protective remedy was off-site disposal. The proposed plan issued in March 1991 recommended excavation and off-site disposal, which was the remedy endorsed by the community and the City of Denver. After receiving a 117 page letter from Shattuck Chemical Company's attorney however, the EPA and CDH chose a cheaper, less protective remedy requested by the chemical company and issued the final Record of Decision (ROD) in January of 1992, calling instead for on-site stabilization and burial.

Although this remedy may be a promising new technique, it is unproven, substandard (1000 years is the required standard) and cannot realistically be undone, once implemented. Is it prudent and ethical to experiment in a highly populated urban area that lies 7.5 feet above ground water and 3000 feet from the South Platte River? Although stabilization has been undertaken at various sites across the country, it has never been tried with the amount and type of radioactive and mixed toxic wastes that characterize this site.

The real issue is that the EPA and Colorado Department of Health chose between two remedies. One would have removed all potential pathways of exposure, while the other would hopefully, reduce the exposures to acceptable limits. The difference in cost is approximately 2 million dollars. The difference in protection to human health and environment is enormous.

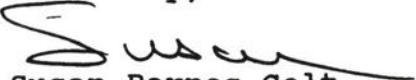
The City of Denver has fought this remedy since the ROD was issued. As recently as May 1996, the Denver City Council unanimously passed the enclosed resolution calling for off-site burial of the contaminated waste. Denver's zoning laws would have protected us from this dangerous material, but the United States Environmental Protection Agency sued Denver in Federal court to invalidate our laws.

The Overland Neighborhood is a working class, ethnically mixed area without the resources to sue the federal government. They, the Denver City Council, and the people of Denver are requesting that you intervene in our behalf. Our ancestors left us pyramids and stone circles like Stonehenge. Do we want our legacy to be a 65,000 cubic yard radioactive brick that will kill our descendants when they dig it up?

Please assist us in our attempt to have the EPA re-evaluate the remedy selected and truly protect our environment by removing this radioactive waste to a facility designed to isolate it for thousands of years.

RESOLUTION



City and County of Denver

*Resolution No. 51, Series of 1996
Sponsored by the Entire Council*

A Resolution Urging Carol Browner, Director of the Environmental Protection Agency, Jack McGraw, Acting Regional Director of the Environmental Protection Agency, and Patti Shwayder, Executive Director of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, to Intervene with the Environmental Protection Agency on Denver's behalf by Directing the EPA to Order excavation and off-site burial of contaminated soils at the Shattuck Chemical Site in Denver.

Whereas, Shattuck Chemical Company, which occupies 5.9 acres at 1805 S. Bannock and is within one block of residences, was a major mineral processor in the region from the early 1900s to the time when it ceased operations in 1984; and

Whereas, Shattuck Chemical Company is now owned by Salomon, Inc., a Wall Street investment firm; and

Whereas, The site is contaminated and the primary contaminants on the property are radium, thorium, uranium, molybdenum, arsenic, selenium, and assorted organic compounds. Domestic wells and the ground water below the site are contaminated; and

Whereas, Radium 226 and its associated decay products have a half-life of approximately 1600 years; and

Whereas, From 1983 to 1989, the Environmental Protection Agency awarded a grant to Colorado Department of Health to conduct a Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Study to identify types, quantities, and the location of contaminants and to develop a way to address the elimination of 50,000 cubic yards of contaminated soils. In April 1991, the Colorado Department of Health issued the Proposed Plan for Shattuck Superfund Cleanup, preferring excavation and off-site burial. A 120 page criticism of the proposed plan was submitted by the law firm representing Shattuck; and

Whereas, In January 1992, the Federal Government issued a Record of Decision mandating onsite burial; and

Whereas, The Environmental Protection Agency has ordered that the contaminated waste be removed at every other similar site in the City and County of Denver; and

Whereas, At every other similar radium site across the country, EPA has chosen an excavation and off site disposal remedy; and

Whereas, In 1994, the City and County of Denver issued a Cease and Desist Order to Shattuck for violating City Zoning Ordinances by attempting to bury radioactive wastes within the city limits. Shattuck appealed to the Denver Zoning Board, which ruled in favor of the City. In 1994, the EPA sued the City and County of Denver to protect the "supremacy" of the Record of Decision. In February, 1996, Judge Wiley Daniel ruled in favor of the EPA. The City Attorney has filed an appeal; and

Whereas, Burying the contaminated soil becomes a threat not only to the health and safety of the immediate neighbors but to all citizens of Denver. The contaminants have already leached into the water table of the South Platte River. This results in a risk to the citizens of Denver as well as the people who depend on the South Platte River for their water supply; and

Whereas, A 6-acre dead zone in the middle of the city will hurt the economic development of the Overland Neighborhood (already seriously disadvantaged) and Denver at large; and

Whereas, This action will set a precedent allowing the burial of radioactive hazardous waste in cities throughout Colorado and the nation; and

Whereas, Permanent dedication of six acres in the middle of a city to use as a disposal site for radioactive waste is contrary to the expressed policies of the Environmental Protection Agency and the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment regarding redevelopment of Brownfields; and

Whereas, Denver should take the lead in protecting its citizenry.

Now, Therefore,

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City and County of Denver:

Section 1. That the Council appeals to Carol Browner, Director of the Environmental Protection Agency, Jack McGraw, Acting Regional Director of the Environmental Protection Agency, and Patti Shwayder, Executive Director of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, to Intervene with the Environmental Protection Agency on Denver's behalf, and in particular to Order excavation and off-site burial of the contaminated soil.

Section 2. That the Clerk of the City and County of Denver shall attest and affix the seal of the City and County of Denver to this resolution and that copies hereof be transmitted to Carol Browner, Jack McGraw, Patti Shwayder, and President William Clinton.

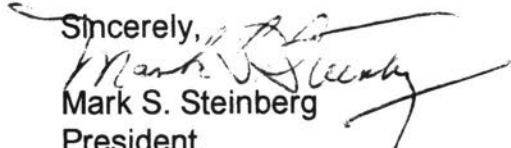

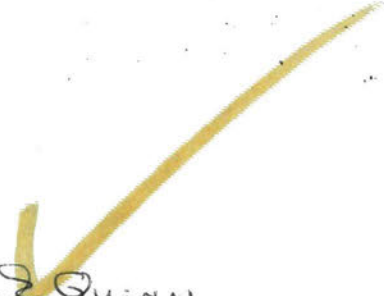

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

FROM: JACK QUINN

RE: EQUITABLE TOLLING UPDATE

This memorandum updates you on developments related to the Department of Treasury's proposal on the equitable tolling of statutes of limitations governing recovery of IRS refunds. When you approved the outlines of Treasury's proposal for prospective relief, you indicated that it should be expanded to cover cases currently in litigation. In consultation with Treasury and the Department of Justice, we have identified the following two approaches to achieving this objective, and we seek your guidance concerning which one to pursue.

Option 1. The first, and narrower, method would be to make equitable tolling available for claims for which the statutory period has expired (as of the effective date of the legislation) -- but only if the taxpayer already filed for a refund within the time for pursuing administrative or judicial remedies has not expired. This would meet your objective of addressing pending claims. Treasury projects that this approach would cost \$521 million over five years (as compared to \$362 million for its basic, "prospective only" proposal, which would not cover all pending claims).

Treasury is concerned that this approach would reward taxpayers who have pursued claims that are patently non-meritorious under current law, while failing to benefit taxpayers who, in conformity with current law, refrained from filing what might have been time-barred but otherwise meritorious claims. (Presumably, however, non-meritorious claims will not prevail.) The Solicitor General has expressed concern about this approach on the ground that it would moot the cases now pending in the Supreme Court, thereby eliminating the possibility of the adoption of a uniform rule of law. Of course affording relief to these litigants is exactly what you seek to do. The Solicitor General's preference would be for something in the nature of a private bill enacted after the Supreme Court renders its opinion. This is, as you know, highly unlikely to happen.

Option 2. A second -- and far more generous -- way to give existing litigants the benefit of equitable tolling would be a broad rule that allows taxpayers to file for a refund within the three year statute of limitations plus any disability period, even if the statutory period already has expired. For example, a taxpayer who paid his tax and filed his return on

April 15, 1989 ordinarily could not seek a refund after April 15, 1992. If, however, he became incapacitated in 1991 and remained so until the effective date of the legislation, he would have the benefit of the new rule on equitable tolling under this option.

Treasury projects that this approach would lead to a revenue loss of \$1.1 billion over five years, largely because it would revive many otherwise expired claims, including potentially thousands of claims that are not currently the subject of administrative claims or litigation. (While the \$1.1 billion figure will be regarded by many as surprisingly large, Treasury defends it as the product of its usual revenue estimation techniques.)

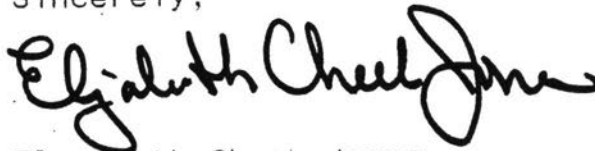

PRESIDENTIAL POLITICS

Bob Dole

Bob Dole delivered a speech today to the Catholic Press Association. In a preemptive strike, Vice President Gore said this morning: "Every time Senator Dole mentions family values, I have to ask 'whose family is he talking about, which families?'... If you listen closely enough you will realize that he opposes most of the things that families value."

At the Catholic Press Association, Dole promised a \$500 per person tax credit for people who give to anti-poverty charities and vowed to sign a late term abortion bill if elected President. Dole gave an ambiguous commitment to an anti-choice plank, saying "I am pro-life. I am opposed to abortion on demand. But I understand that reasonable and decent people can disagree on certain points." Dole also used the opportunity to attack the President on his veto of late-term abortion. Dole: "With his veto, President Clinton pushed the limits of decency too far." Wire stories reported very positively that the President "hit back" on Dole's charges.

Later, Dole refused to answer questions on choice and angrily responded to reporters on his campaign plane, "If war were declared tonight and I went on a talk show, the first question would be about abortion."

Discussing his 'charity tax credit', Dole said to the Catholic Press Association, "America does not lack community organizations or parishes or synagogues willing to help restore goodness to our country. The problem is, these organizations often lack the resources they need to do so." Dole's proposed tax credit would be available to those that give to charities that spend over 75 percent of their money on poverty relief.

Dole will be in Denver on Tuesday for a fundraising luncheon and political rally. This marks the first time Dole has been to Colorado since February. Dole is also scheduled to visit Los Angeles, San Diego, and Sacramento on May 28 and May 29.

Pat Buchanan

Buchanan is scheduled to visit Idaho on Memorial Day, one day before the state's primary and Presidential preference vote. Republicans will decide delegates to their national convention on Tuesday. Democrats held their Presidential caucuses in March. Buchanan will attend a Memorial Day service in Boise on Monday morning, followed by a rally in the Twin Falls City Park and an evening radio show in Idaho Falls.

Miscellaneous

The Commander in Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars issued a news release objecting to the use of Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Act in the President's appeal. Congressmen Stump and Dornan have scheduled an afternoon press conference to address the issue.

In case you missed it, the Wall Street Journal ran an article today headlined, "Despite Polls, History Favors Dole." The author, Robert Bartley, points out that the election is still six months away, the voting base from the 1994 elections is still present, and the Clinton Administration faces many legal challenges this summer.

PRESIDENTIAL POLITICS/STATE-BY-STATE Connecticut

The President's trip to the Coast Guard Academy received a large amount of positive press attention throughout the state. The news reported excited children and families meeting or seeing the President and report favorably on his foreign policy address.

Florida

More than 10,000 requests for tickets to the October 9 Presidential debate in St. Petersburg have been submitted. By the time all the construction is complete in the theater, there will only be 600 to 800 seats. Two thirds will go to the Clinton/Gore and Dole campaigns and the remaining third will go to the debate Commission and Secret Service. The press is reporting that few, if any, local residents will be able to get into the theater to watch the debate, with the exception of the 80 chosen to be on stage with the candidates.

Illinois

The Chicago Sun-Times is offering two free pages for major Presidential and Senate candidates. This is the Sun's response to the free media proposals the TV networks have agreed to.

Kentucky

Vice President Gore is visiting Frankfort today. He will attend an educational roundtable and make remarks to students at Frankfort High School. The students of the senior class attended the Clinton-Gore inauguration in 1992. Vice President Gore will then attend a fundraiser for the DNC at the Governor's mansion.

Minnesota

The Vice President was in Minneapolis, MN yesterday. While there, he visited the Abbott Northwest Hospital to tout Allina Health System's new program encouraging new fathers to be involved in the lives of their newborn children. On the trip, the Vice President also attended a DNC fundraiser, a political meet and greet, and a meeting with area technology leaders.

NON-PRESIDENTIAL REPORT/STATE-BY-STATE

Arkansas

A day after the Arkansas primaries, Attorney General Winston Bryant took to the streets. He began his runoff campaign at 6:45 am by waving a "Thank You" sign at a busy intersection in Little Rock during rush hour. State Senator Lu Hardin began his runoff campaign by working the phones. Both have agreed to debate, though Bryant did not specifically accept Hardin's challenge to three televised exchanges before the June 11 runoff.

Arizona

Former Vice President Dan Quayle (R) will be in Tucson today to do a signing for his new book, American Family Values. He is scheduled to make a public appearance at Luke Air Force Base in Phoenix and attend a state GOP fundraising dinner in Phoenix.

Colorado

Mrs. Clinton was well received yesterday at the American Association for Retired Persons (AARP), where she spoke before a crowd of 5,600 conference attendees. Mrs. Clinton also attended a children's conference with Governor Roy Romer (D) earlier in the day.

Florida

Florida's unemployment rate is the lowest in 8 years. The rate fell to 4.9% last month, according to the state's Department of Labor. That rate hasn't been seen since December 1988, and represents a key statistical threshold; economists say nearly anyone who wants a job can get one. They also say new businesses have fed off trade encouraged by the President.

Governor Lawton Chiles signed a bill into law yesterday that will forbid insurance companies and HMOs from limiting the hospital stay of a new mother. Seven states have already passed laws requiring that insurers cover at least 48 hours for normal births and 96 hours for C-sections.

The powerful sugar farmers are again backing a proposed Constitutional amendment they hope will kill a penny-per-pound tax on raw sugar to restore the Everglades. The amendment would require that changes to the Constitution involving taxes and fees -- including those on the same ballot -- be approved by two-thirds of the electorate, rather than the current simple majority. Senator Bob Graham (D) remains at odds with the Administration's policy. Referring to an OMB memo, Graham said this week, "The Administration has not proved to me that the harms [to the Everglades] paid for by the amount [of the tax] are unique to the sugar industry."

THE PRESIDENT HAS SEEN

5-24-96

The bill that realigns six of the state's congressional districts was signed into law Tuesday, but the day candidates can qualify to seek the office remains in doubt due to a federal court ruling. Potential candidates for Congress are left waiting and wondering.

EMILY's List endorsed former Tampa Mayor Sandy Freedman (D) in the crowded Democratic primary to replace retiring Congressman Sam Gibbons (D). Ellen Malcolm said Freedman "has built a strong record and a broad base of support from her service as mayor. She is an effective campaigner and a strong fund-raiser. Freedman is already the clear front-runner [in the primary]." Freedman will face three other Democrats in the September 3 primary.

Georgia

In a state where many candidates have been switching from the Democratic Party to the GOP, Virginia Gunn, who four years ago was elected to the Glynn County Commission as a Republican, is turning her back on the Republican Party and running for reelection as a Democrat. Gunn never felt welcome in the GOP in Glynn County and consequently she has decided to "work hard for another party."

Illinois

Illinois Commerce Commission Chairman Dan Miller, an appointee of Governor Jim Edgar (R), has stumbled into trouble over some comments he made on the radio about Bob and Elizabeth Dole. Miller was asked whether he thought the same-sex marriage issue would figure prominently in the campaign and whether it would help Dole. Miller said he didn't think so. His reasoning was that many oppose same-sex marriages because they are unions in which the partners cannot have children and "if you look at Elizabeth Dole and Bob Dole, they are married and they don't have children either. ... Now if one or the other is impotent, then they can't have children, then they should never have been allowed to be married under the ... [rules of] the people who are so appalled at same sex marriage." Governor Edgar said it was "not really something that was appropriate to talk about" but said he would not ask him to resign. However, his term in the office expires in January, 1997 and he will have to face reconfirmation by the state Senate. State Senate President Pate Philip (R) said, "he is not going to be confirmed." Miller now says his comments were taken out of context and had been intended to say good things about marriage and Dole. He said: "My point was this: Who would deny that Bob and Elizabeth Dole have got a solid marriage?"

Maine

Former Portland Mayor Tom Allen (D) and state Senator Dale McCormick (D), Democratic candidates for the 1st CD seat, have been at odds recently over health care. McCormick has made health care the centerpiece of her campaign, while Allen is focusing on education and jobs. A recent poll commissioned by the McCormick campaign finds both candidates in a dead heat, both receiving 41%. If these numbers are accurate, McCormick, who is openly gay, could have an edge because of her strong grassroots efforts and the energy of her base supporters.

Minnesota

Governor Arne Carlson's (R) letter to you threatening to implement welfare residency requirements in Minnesota, even if the federal government does not grant it a waiver to do so, has hit the press. Minnesota submitted a waiver application for its program in March. The state wants to pay newly arrived welfare recipients at a lower rate for the first year of their residence in Minnesota. Carlson wrote that "if we are not granted this waiver, I will consider the possibility of implementing those reforms without your approval. I would like to avoid that contingency but we have few other options."

At a recent fundraiser, Senator Paul Wellstone (D) told a very liberal crowd that he did not plan to launch a major fight against pending same-sex marriage legislation, saying there is no way to win such a battle.

New York

Governor Pataki's welfare reform plans have come under heavy criticism, especially from women's organizations. Pataki's welfare plans will be most detrimental to battered women. The National Organization of Women's Legal Defense and Education Fund says the plan "rushes to impose arbitrary time limits and to emphasize job placement before training and education, and (ignores) the reality of violence in poor women's lives." Pataki's plan does not provide incentives for these women, although the Governor claims that welfare denies the poor their respectability and their ability to achieve prosperity.

Rhode Island

Ambassador Joe Paolino (Malta) said yesterday that he will not run for the open 1st Congressional District seat. Democrats who are running for the seat are Lt. Governor Bob Weygund, Warwick City Council President Linda Sullivan, former state Senator Joe McGair, former West Warwick Mayor Kathy O'Hare, and former state Senator Gordon Mulligan. Weygund is favored to win the September 10 primary. Rick Wild, a physician, is the only Republican running for the seat which should remain in Democratic hands.
