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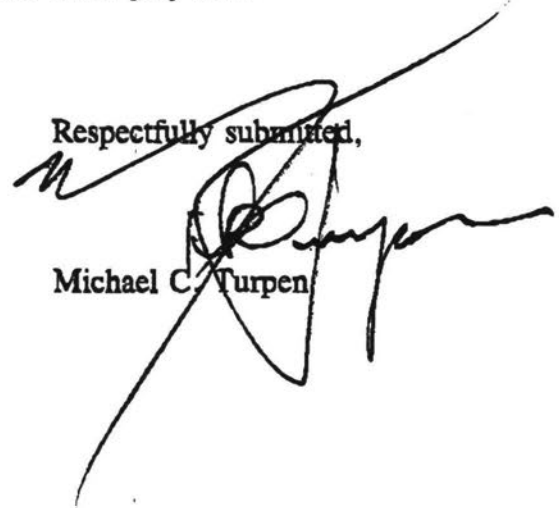

REPUBLICAN "HIT MAN?"

While Republicans have been proclaiming that last week's verdicts in the Little Rock trial were a vindication and boost for Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr, the questions about his investigation still remain. Indeed, Mr. Starr has caused additional and equally serious questions to be raised this week by handing the results of fingerprint analysis conducted for a grand jury over to a Congressional investigation that is fraught with partisan political agendas and actions.

While the results of the fingerprint analysis support everything that the White House has said, their release to the political circus in Washington and to the Beltway commentators casts a significant cloud over the integrity and independence of Mr. Starr's investigation and the grand jury's inquiry. A fundamental concept underlying the practice of convening grand juries is that their deliberations and the information they learn must be kept secret. Grand jurors must be free to weigh on their own, without outside influence, the significance of the information they are presented. If the public and media are given a chance to influence the jurors, the jury's inquiry might become defective. As a result, only under exceptional circumstances should prosecutors release information being considered by a grand jury.

Mr. Starr, however, has violated these principles. At this moment, Republicans are desperately and unsuccessfully trying to spin the results of the fingerprint analysis in their favor. Pundits inside and outside the Beltway are trying to tell the American public what the analysis' results mean. One group of people almost certainly subject to the barrage of punditry are the grand jurors in Washington, D.C. Unsequestered, they have no doubt already heard on television and read in the papers the significance of the information they are weighing. How can anyone now argue that the grand jury's deliberations are free from outside -- and worse, political -- influence?

Unfortunately, this was not the first case of Mr. Starr's poor judgment or the first indication that Mr. Starr's investigation is being influenced by a partisan agenda. Apart from the conflicts of interest between the investigation and his private practice, Mr. Starr's conduct throughout his inquiry has been suspect.

First, there has been a steady leak of information flowing out of the Independent Counsel's office to the press. Curiously, the only information leaked has had the appearance of being bad news for the White House. For example, the presence of Mrs. Clinton's fingerprints on the billing records was leaked to the press weeks ago. While this was no surprise given that Mrs. Clinton had earlier explained she might have handled the billing records during the 1992 campaign (probably to review the records to answer questions from the media), Republicans tried to use the leak to attack the First Lady. Why didn't Mr. Starr's office leak the fact that no fingerprints were found for any of the White House personnel and friends that have been accused by Republicans of conspiring to hide the billing records?

Second, during the 1995 Senate hearings, a Republican senator suddenly presented the brief case of Vincent Foster. This briefcase was supposed to have been in Mr. Starr's possession as a piece of grand jury evidence. Apparently, somebody in the Independent Counsel's office handed it over to Senate Republicans as a weapon for their mudslinging. One must ask why Mr. Starr has handed over items such as the briefcase and the fingerprint analysis but not items requested by Senate Democrats. For example, Mr. Starr has refused to release records of interviews with David Hale, during which Hale failed to mention any of his current unsupported allegations about President Clinton.

With all the questions that have been raised about his private practice and his continuing association with right-wing critics of the President, one might have thought that Mr. Starr's inquiry would have been conducted properly. When an "independent" investigation, however, begins looking more and more partisan, it is time to ask some additional questions, including "Is Kenneth Starr a Republican 'Hit Man' or just a student of Senator Joe McCarthy 'Guilt-by-accusation' tactics?" . . . or perhaps both.

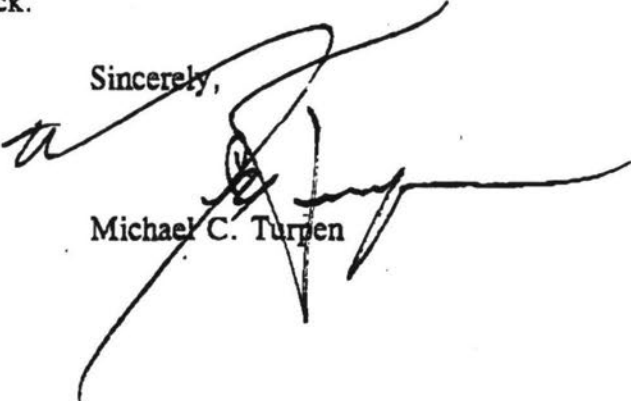

Time to take stand against tobacco lobby

"If you stop kids from smoking, in 20 years you're out of business. ... Our job was to hold the front." — Victor Crawford, tobacco lobbyist who died of lung and throat cancer in March.

It figures. Tobacco kills about 420,000 Americans a year, and 1.3 million people quit each year.

The tobacco companies must replace them with some 1.7 million new smokers.

Seventy percent of new smokers are hooked before they reach the age — 18 — when they can legally buy cigarettes.

The magazine Mother Jones is an old-fashioned crusading journal that probably can be labeled liberal.

It has just printed a special issue on the cigarette giants' battle against regulation of tobacco as an addictive drug. This issue is neither liberal nor conservative.

I doubt if 10 readers of the Daily Herald see Mother Jones. If you're interested in how this fight is being waged, I urge you to get a copy of the magazine, either at your library or at one of the big bookstores.

The main target of tobacco is Dr. David Kessler, who was appointed Food and Drug Administration commissioner by President Bush and retained by President Clinton.

Kessler is determined to declare nicotine an addictive drug, subject to FDA regulation. It's the worst thing that could happen to the tobacco industry.

Tobacco giants are determined to get rid of Kessler. One of their successes is Democratic House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, who has secretly lobbied the White House to rein in Kessler.

Their main hope, though, lies with Bob Dole, who has promised publicly that if elected president he will fire Kessler.

The magazine says Dole "will likely place a moratorium on federal smoking regulations and defund scientists who are studying smoking or the carcinogenic effects of secondhand smoke."

Dole will advocate returning power to the states. Tobacco has anticipated that by buying up governors and legislators.

Dole has received hundreds of thousands of dollars from tobacco giants. His campaign and convention staffs are riddled with volunteers who are legal or public relations reps for the tobacco giants.

Elizabeth Dole earned tobacco's appreciation when she was secretary of transportation and refused to ban smoking on airplanes, ignoring recommendations of then Surgeon General C. Everett Koop and the National Academy of Sciences.

Tobacco also upped its donations to the Red Cross, now headed by Mrs. Dole, to \$265,530 in 1995. They don't miss a shot.

What does Mother Jones propose? Not a ban on adults smoking but control over the solicitation of children.

Editor Jeffery Klein states, "First, any politician who takes tobacco money should be ousted. All seekers of public office should be asked to sign the bipartisan Tobacco Cash Pledge (now being circulated in Congress by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids), promising they won't ever take tobacco contributions, direct or indirect."

If Dole wants to campaign as a Republican calling on individuals to take more personal responsibility for their actions, he should say to the country:

"I now realize my mistake in aiding the tobacco industry. From this day on, I'll take no more of their money. If elected, I vow to support Dr. Kessler in his quest to keep addictive nicotine away from our youth."

Can there be any more important domestic issue in the coming campaign than efforts to halt the mass poisoning of more than 400,000 Americans a year? Let's hear from the right AND the left.

I noticed that a few months ago you released a list of your favorite pastors. This reminded me that I had been intending for some time to write you about a pastor--a Baptist pastor of all things--who whom you need to meet. Buckner was born and reared in Dallas, Texas (his brother is a prominent attorney there). Buckner then goes on to say, "with William Jennings Bryan's permission, I'd like to paraphrase that speech--you will not place upon the brow of the oppressed a crown of thorns and you will not crucify children and widows upon a cross of gold. Yes, America, balance the budget. Debate how to do it. The Best way to do it. The most efficient way to do it. But God help us if we balance the budget on the backs of children. God have mercy on us." Knowing how busy you are, I have marked the enclosed tape at a logical part of the sermon building up to this quotation.

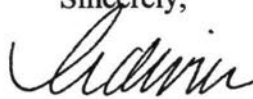
I admire the fact that from time to time you receive counsel and fellowship from religious leaders. I encourage you to get to know Buckner. He has counseled with other presidents including LBJ. You and I have known each other a long time and I'm telling you in no uncertain terms that you will be encouraged and blessed by this man. FYI -- a letter from Zumwalt to Sec. Dalton recommending that Admiral Boorda be awarded the combat "V"s posthumously. The letter was cc'd to the President, though I haven't sent it forward.

My own feeling is that this is a very dubious idea. Zumwalt's notion of what constitutes "combat" (being "in the combat area") is likely not shared by many in the military -- such as those whose "V"s came from being in real combat. The President did all that could have been asked or expected to honor Boorda and, in my judgment, doesn't need to get into this. Andy Sens tells me that Bob Bell at NSC agrees that this isn't a good idea.

My inclination is to send this to the President with a recommendation that he not respond or take any action. Do you have a view?

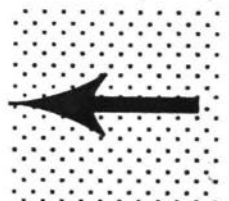

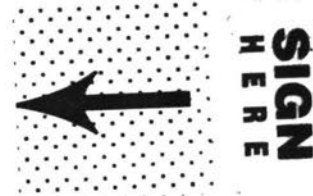

- The first article of the Olympic Charter, as written by Pierre de Coubertain one hundred years ago, was changed by the current International Olympic Committee and moved to the sixth position.

- Former International Olympic Committee President, Avery Brundage, was a champion of amateurism. His commitment to the importance of amateurism in the Olympic Games is exemplified in the action taken by the Olympic Committee to strip Jim Thorp of his Olympic medals, based on the receipt of a small amount of money for playing summer league baseball.

- Current International Olympic Committee President Juan Antonio Samaranch was a high-ranking official under Franco in Spain who worked his way up through the International Track & Field Federation and assisted the Soviet Union in hosting the 1980 Moscow Games. Samaranch unseated Monique Berlioz who had run the International Olympic Committee under Avery Brundage and was in line to become the International Olympic Committee President.

- Currently the Olympic Games is acknowledged to be big business. The inclusion of professional athletes and multi-millionaires has substantially changed the character, personality and impact of the Games. The effect of the Dream Team has been enormous.

- Corporate sponsors invest tens of millions of dollars associating their products with Olympians/the Olympic Games.

- Sponsors like Coca Cola have conducted focus groups with the public and discovered that there is a growing cynicism regarding the Olympic Games, Olympic sponsors and Olympic athletes. Olympic sponsors anecdotally report significantly increased difficulty in dealing with the International Olympic Committee and its lawyers since the advent of professional athletes' inclusion in the Games.

- Many Olympians are extremely disheartened about the direction the Olympic Games have taken. Until recently, networks and opportunities for Olympians from previous games to connect with one another have been relatively non-existent. Currently there are a number of vehicles emerging to allow Olympians to communicate with one another. Many Olympians are fully committed to the original purpose of the Olympic Games and have authored programs/projects. For example, Johan Olav Koss, Norwegian gold medalist is working with UNICEF so that any country experiencing civil conflict that declares an Olympic Truce during the Atlanta Games, UNICEF will inoculate the children of that country, provide school in a box and Johan will provide Olympians and sports equipment. Ginny Gilder (two-time Olympian & Silver Medalist), through her program *Washington Works* has created an award-winning welfare-to-work program for women.

- Very few Olympians are aware of what any of their colleagues are doing.

- Many Olympians feel the frustration of the direction of the Modern Games and would like to do something to fulfill the true purpose of the Games, but have not taken initiative and are unaware of what possibilities exist for action.

- There are corporations who are interested in supporting Olympians who are focusing their attention on educating youth to create a better and more peaceful world.

- Many organizations exist and programs are in place that would willingly collaborate and support the efforts of Olympians to take the best of what they have learned and make it available to youth. For example, the United Nations declared the International Day of Peace (see attachment). The International Day of Peace is officially observed and devoted "to commemorating and strengthening the ideals of peace both within and among all nations and people. . . especially through all means of education."

- Young people from over 60 countries have declared International Hear the Children Day and will bring the concerns and solutions of young people to be heard at the United Nations at the Opening Session on the International Day of Peace each year.

- The Global Cooperation For a Better World project has done work in 126 countries across the spectrum of society and have discerned that people the world over have a common vision of peace.

- We have the technological capability to inspire, educate, mobilize, support and connect young people who are working together to create a better and more peaceful world.

I. FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES

1 The aims of the Olympic Movement are:

- to promote the development of those physical and moral qualities which are the basis of sport,
- to educate young people through sport in a spirit of better understanding between each other and of friendship, thereby helping to build a better and more peaceful world,
- to spread the Olympic principles throughout the world, thereby creating international goodwill,
- to bring together the athletes of the world in the great four-yearly sport festival, the Olympic Games.

2 The Olympic Games consist of the Games of the Olympiad and the Olympic Winter Games.

In this Charter, the expression "Games" means the Games of the Olympiad, and the expression "Winter Games" means the Olympic Winter Games.

The expression "Olympiad" means a period of four successive years which follows the Games.

The first Olympiad of modern times was celebrated in Athens in 1896, and subsequent Olympiads and Games are numbered consecutively from that year, even though it has been impossible to hold the Games in every Olympiad.

3 The Olympic Games take place every four years. They unite Olympic competitors of all countries in fair and equal competition.¹

The International Olympic Committee (IOC) shall secure the widest possible audience for the Olympic Games.

No discrimination in them is allowed against any country or person on grounds of race, religion or politics.

4 The IOC governs the Olympic Movement and owns the rights over the Olympic Games. Its constitution and powers are set out in the present Rules and bye-laws.

Every person or organization that plays any part whatsoever in the Olympic Movement shall accept the supreme authority of the IOC and shall be bound by its Rules and submit to its jurisdiction.

The honour of holding the Olympic Games is entrusted to a city. The choice of any city shall lie solely with the IOC.²

Fundamental Principles



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- 1 Modern Olympism was conceived by Pierre de Coubertin, on whose initiative the International Athletic Congress of Paris was held in June 1894. The International Olympic Committee (IOC) constituted itself on the 23rd of June 1894.
- 2 Olympism is a philosophy of life, exalting and combining in a balanced whole the qualities of body, will and mind. Blending sport with culture and education, Olympism seeks to create a way of life based on the joy found in effort, the educational value of good example and respect for universal fundamental ethical principles.
- 3 The goal of Olympism is to place everywhere sport at the service of the harmonious development of man, with a view to encouraging the establishment of a peaceful society concerned with the preservation of human dignity.
- 4 The Olympic Movement, led by the IOC, stems from modern Olympism.

- 5 Under the supreme authority of the IOC, the Olympic Movement encompasses organizations, athletes and other persons who agree to be guided by the Olympic Charter. The criterion for belonging to the Olympic Movement is recognition by the IOC.
- 6 The goal of the Olympic Movement is to contribute to building a peaceful and better world by educating youth through sport practised without discrimination of any kind and in the Olympic spirit, which requires mutual understanding with a spirit of friendship, solidarity and fair-play.
- 7 The activity of the Olympic Movement is permanent and universal. It reaches its peak with the bringing together of the athletes of the world at the great sport festival, the Olympic Games.
- 8 The Olympic Charter is the codification of the Fundamental Principles, Rules and Bye-laws adopted by the IOC. It governs the organization and operation of the Olympic Movement and stipulates the conditions for the celebration of the Olympic Games.

Background of the INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE (WORLD PEACE DAY)

At its 36th session, in 1981, the United Nations General Assembly, recalling that the promotion of peace, both at the international and the national levels, is among the main purposes of the United Nations, in conformity with its Charter, decided that it would be appropriate "to devote a specific time to concentrate the efforts of the United Nations and its Member States, as well as of the whole of mankind, to promoting the ideals of peace and to giving positive evidence of their commitment to peace in all viable ways."

The Assembly therefore declared, in a resolution adopted on 30 November 1981, that the third Tuesday in September, the opening day of its regular annual session, should be officially dedicated and observed as the International Day of Peace and should be devoted "to commemorating and strengthening the ideals of peace both within and among all nations and peoples." It invited all Member States, organs and organizations of the United Nations system, regional organizations, non-governmental organizations, peoples and individuals "to commemorate in an appropriate manner the International Day of Peace, especially through all means of education," and to cooperate with the United Nations in the observance of the Day.

The Assembly recalled that— as set forth in the Charter of UNESCO— "since wars begin in the minds of men, it is in the minds of men that the defense of peace must be constructed" and that "peace must therefore be founded, if it is not to fail, upon the intellectual and moral solidarity of mankind."

The Assembly's resolution was initiated by the representative of Costa Rica, who declared that the International Day of Peace "will serve as a reminder to all peoples that our Organization, with all its limitations, is a living instrument in the service of peace and should serve all of us here within the Organization as a constantly pealing bell reminding us that our permanent commitment, above all interests or differences of any kind, is to peace. May this peace day indeed be a day of peace."

The first International Day of Peace was observed at United Nations Headquarters in New York on 21 September 1982, the opening day of the 37th session of the General Assembly. At the start of the session, delegates stood for the traditional minute of silence in observance of the Day.

Marilyn King is an Olympic athlete, a member of the U.S. team in the 1972 and 1976 games competing in the Pentathlon. While preparing for the ill-fated 1980 Olympics, she suffered a back injury which resulted in her being bed-ridden for four months. She spent most of that time watching films of successful pentathletes, visualizing and feeling herself going through the same events. Despite her lack of physical preparation she placed second in the trials thanks, she feels, to her psychological state.

She is the founder of Beyond Sports, an organization which seeks to extend the application of imagery and related skills to a broader arena of individual and social concerns, including world peace. Long jump in Montreal

With few exceptions, Olympians are ordinary people — ordinary people who have accomplished extraordinary things. I should know. I am one of those ordinary Olympians who wanted to understand why I had been able to accomplish so much when I knew that my athletic skills were only slightly above average.

After six years of soul searching, researching and making presentations on the essence of superior performance, I decided to ask my colleagues why they had been successful. Olympic Outreach I and II were gatherings of Olympians spanning 50 years of Olympiads. We were Winter and Summer Olympians, team and individual sport athletes, men and women, gold medalists and also-rans. Regardless of our sport, nationality or final placing, we had all accomplished things that were "unimaginable" to most people. The purpose of our weekend gatherings was to determine what we had in common that allowed us to achieve at that level.

Our weekends in the mountains were the opportunity to brainstorm all the elements we could think of that were even remotely related to our ability to achieve at the Olympian level. When we refined our lists, the elements fell easily into four categories: *physical*, *mental*, *emotional* (or *spirit*), and *other*. The following is a brief summary of the essence of each category, some conclusions and some implications of these findings. What has evolved out of this work is a model for what it takes to go beyond your current abilities and achieve things that may seem "unimaginable" at this time.

Our largest category was the *mental* skills area. Researchers, psychologists and others interested in super-

ior performance have only recently begun to define mental skills. Athletes, however, have been employing these skills for many years, and some things are quite clear. For example, we know that in order to accomplish any lofty goal, you must have a crystal clear image of that goal and keep it uppermost in your mind. We know that by maintaining that image, the "how-to" steps necessary for the realization of the goal will begin to emerge spontaneously. Initially, none of these athletes knew exactly what it would take to become an Olympian, but with the goal in mind, the steps to achieving it became readily apparent. If you cannot imagine the goal, the "how-to" steps will never emerge and you'll never do it. Clearly, the first step to any achievement is to dare to imagine you *can* do it.

Mental rehearsal was another important skill. It is employed prior to any performance literally to mentally rehearse the precise details of that performance to help its execution. Much has been learned about the effects of mental rehearsal on the physiology of the body as well as its impact on performance. Soviet researchers have shown us that we seem unable to distinguish between the real and the vividly imagined, hence the value of mental rehearsal. This information is having significant impact in the field of medicine (psychoneuroimmunology) as well as in sports.

While mental skills play an interesting and important role in superior performance, it is the *emotions or spirit* that give Olympians and other peak performers the energy to do what it takes to succeed. Most people feel they lack the will power and discipline that it takes to succeed at a high level in any field; they see those as attributes belonging to "others." It is important to understand that what looks like will power and discipline from the outside is really passion on the inside. These athletes are people who were passionate about their pursuits. It was that gut level, emotional involvement that gave them that enviable energy and drive. They knew exactly what they wanted and were determined to get it. Being passionate about something unlocks all the energy and creativity necessary to achieve the goal.

The third category is the *physical*. The surprise in this area was that it was the shortest list. It became apparent that while the physical was important, it was not superior physical skills that were a major factor. Far more important were the mental and emotional categories. Many Olympians acknowledged that there were significant numbers of athletes with superior physical attributes who never made an Olympic team. The key in this category was the physical act of doing something every day in the service of the goal — there were struc-

tures for quality feedback and support.

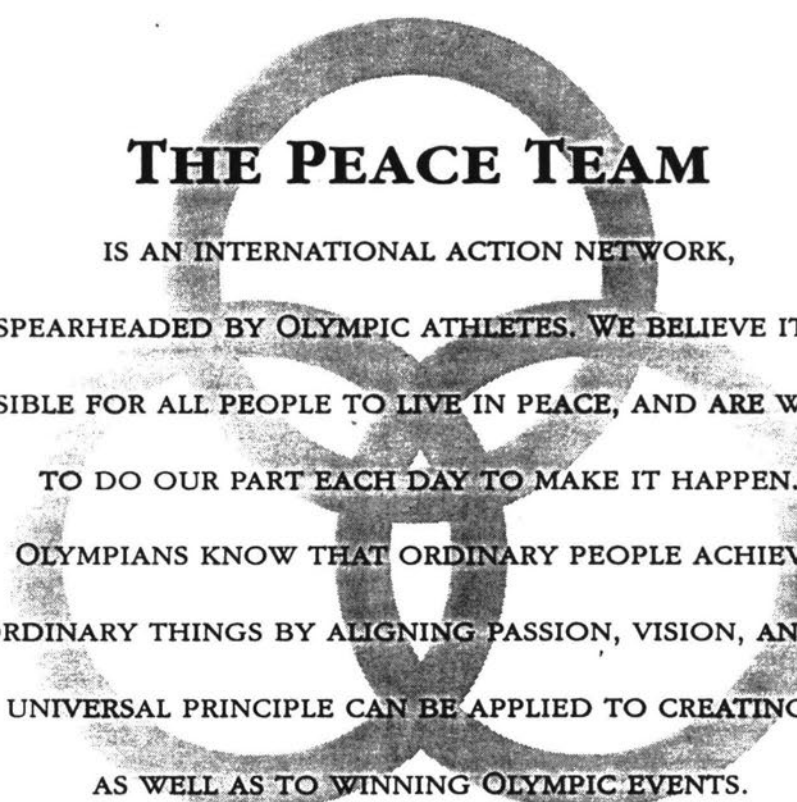
In the *other* category were items that did not fit anywhere else. Of these, what stands out in my mind is parental support. One Olympian summed it up best when she stated, "What I got from my parents was the notion that I could achieve anything I set my mind to." As I looked around the room, all heads were nodding in agreement. I believe the single most important thing parents can give their children is the belief that all things are possible to the passionate and persistent.

The Olympians who gathered in the mountains of Northern California to complete this work were unanimous in their conclusions. The major lesson is that the skills common to these high performers are not special gifts or talents, but instead innate abilities that can be awakened in each and every human being.

Passion is the energy source of peak performers and each of us has the ability to look deep inside to identify what we value most. With one person who believes in us, we are all capable of creating a crystal clear image of the goal, knowing that the "how-to" image will emerge. Armed with our passion and our vision, we can search out or create the kind of daily support that will allow us to do what must be done to make our dream come true. While other elements like dealing with risk, fear and failure come into play, it is the essential alignment of body (physical), mind (mental) and spirit (emotional) that form the foundation of superior performances. □

Only one of these elements is missing, relative to achieving peace in our lifetime. PASSION already exists; people everywhere want to live in peace. ACTION is a step people would willingly take if they knew what to do and believed it could make a difference. The missing element is VISION. Very few people have a clear image of what it looks like to live in peace – personally, in their communities, or globally. Without the vision, it is impossible to create an effective strategy to achieve the goal.

U.S. Olympic pentathlete, Marilyn King and Soviet gold medalist, Elena Petushkova agreed that this universal principle is the key to superior achievement in all fields. King and Petushkova dared to imagine this principle working globally to bring about world peace. Soon Robert Muller, former Assistant Secretary General of the United Nations, and futurist Willis Harman, President of the Institute of Noetic Sciences, joined them.

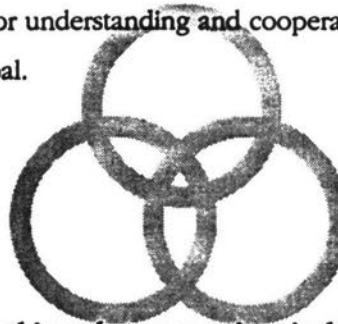
Willis Harman has stated: "The negative affirmation that peace is not possible is the greatest impediment to achieving it." Developing and disseminating a universal image of a peaceful planet and a global citizen, is a key to our mission. We will make these and other peacemaking tools available through educational, community, and professional organizations to spread the word that peace is possible, and support people in doing their part each day.

If the enormity of our task inspires skeptics' heads to shake, the story of how the World Health Organization (WHO) eradicated smallpox provides a compelling example of what can be accomplished when a committed team aligns passion, vision, and action. Smallpox was the most dreaded disease on earth, known as the invisible fire. Throughout history the disease killed hundreds of millions, and scarred millions more. In 1967, WHO began a worldwide program with the vision of eliminating smallpox within a decade.

The smallpox team, consisting of physicians, nurses, scientists and other WHO personnel, joined over 200,000 health care workers in the 30 countries still plagued by the disease. In 10 years and 10 months, after coping with floods, strikes, droughts, famine, thieves, three wars, and two revolutions, they attained their goal. Dr. Larry Brilliant, a member of the team, talks of their accomplishment as a "worldwide activity that harnessed the fundamental goodness of humanity and enabled us to look in the same direction in the spirit of cooperation." The program has become a model for understanding and cooperation among nations, and serves as inspiration for our goal.

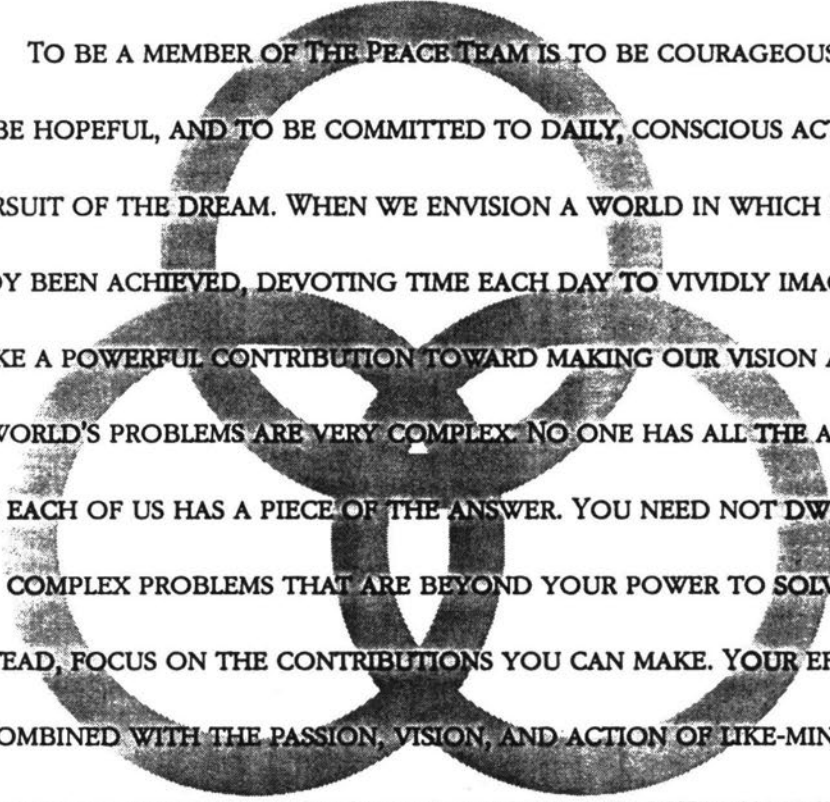

Gold, silver, and bronze medals go to individuals, and "Most Peaceful Nation" status will be given to the country providing outstanding leadership in the pursuit of peace.

Executive Summary

Background

Atlanta, 1996 - the 100th anniversary of the modern Olympics held in Olympia, Greece. Those games in Olympia, modeled after the ancient Olympics, were created to celebrate the highest development and achievements of the whole person through mind, body and spirit as expressed through athletics and the arts. The celebration of one's ability to think, conceive a vision, and realize that vision through passionate and disciplined action.

Olympians from games past, educators, business and community leaders around the world all fear that such original thinking is lost, never communicated or taught to today's children and youth. Adults in communities all over the world are looking for the tools, vehicles and inspiration to teach children and youth the skills they need to reach their highest potential and lead society into the future.

To address these critical concerns, Visions of a Better World Foundation (a non-profit, tax exempt organization), N.A.K. Production Associates (an award winning television production company) and The Peace Team (founded by Marilyn King, two time Olympian and originator of "Olympian Thinking" concepts) propose to produce a television special to be broadcast in thousands of communities in the United States and around the world in celebration of the Olympian Spirit. The program will bring to schools, colleges, businesses, and communities the concepts and practices of "Olympian Thinking," the alignment of passion, vision, and action (body, mind and spirit). In so doing, it will reflect the spirit of the first article of the Olympic Charter, *"the purpose of the Olympic Games is to educate youth through sport to create a better and more peaceful world."* The program will present model concepts from all walks of life depicting ordinary people making extraordinary achievements in their schools, communities, and businesses - achievements that are contributing to a "better and more peaceful world."

"Passing the Torch: A Celebration of Olympian Thinking, Vision and Action" will give children and youth an opportunity to:

- learn from Olympian athletes the "thinking skills" they used to achieve their potential
- learn and model from Olympians how they transferred "Olympian Thinking" into community work to achieve a better and more peaceful world
- share with others worldwide, local and global, initiatives that are committed to peaceful and long-term change
- take action and begin projects in their own communities
- contribute to and refine the common global vision of the world
- learn how each individual can make a difference to create change in their lives and community

Program

The satellite program will be a two hour broadcast featuring:

- pre-recorded stories from communities sharing how they've created initiatives that lead to a better, more peaceful world
- "live" international discussions with leading educators, business and community leaders (Dr. James Comer, Dr. Peter Senge, Vice President Al Gore*, King Constantine of Greece**, etc.)
- pre-recorded and "live" segments with Olympians who have used their own "Olympian Thinking" to begin projects to achieve a peaceful world
- children and youth stories of how they have started using "Olympian Thinking" to make a difference in their own schools and communities
- performance segments that will reinforce the messages and demonstrate how the arts play an important role in creating visions for a better world

The program will be hosted and narrated by an ensemble array of Olympians, entertainers, business and community leaders.

Goals and Objectives

The broadcast will include models and key elements known to be essential for individuals or teams of people desiring to excel in any effort. These include:

- the articulation of a common vision of the goal
- a clear sense of where we are relative to the goal
- how individuals can make their best contribution, as part of a team, to that goal

"Passing the Torch" will leave viewers with a high level of hope that the world *is moving towards creating learning communities with goals of betterment and peace*. Audiences will be compelled to act in their own communities to begin efforts and articulate a vision of their own. By showing stories about successes around the world, a clear sense of where we are now and what our progress has been as a global community will be depicted.

Plausible plans and activities initiated in communities will be featured as models so that the message is clear -- anyone in any community can begin to create change that contributes to the realization of a better world. Dear President Clinton,

I wanted to write and tell you how very touched I was by your inspiring talk at the memorial service for Admiral Mike Boorda. I loved Mike Boorda and he meant a great deal to me. Your remarks expressed exactly my feelings for him. I am a Captain in the Navy Reserve and had gotten to know Mike very well in the special billet I am involved in. His loss has been devastating to me. I hope to be able to come to Washington and pay my respects to Bettie in the next few weeks.

I am also writing to follow up on a letter sent to you by Bob Hope regarding an event that I am hoping to do at the White House. I have been a sports TV producer since the 1960's; I produced a celebrity tennis event for the Kennedys, which was a great success. The Reagan Administration asked me to do a charity event at the White House which we did for four years. I was closely involved in all phases of these events as executive producer. My longest-running event which I began with the late Princess Grace in 1974, is the Monte Carlo Sports Festival. I have attached my personal reference list for your information.

What we are proposing is a one day pro/celebrity tennis event at the White House to be attended by some current tennis stars, major athletes, television and film stars, and some members of your current administration. We would want you and Mrs. Clinton to come out and watch the matches and then follow this with an informal reception and buffet in the White House, with a receiving line. Your total time spent would be approximately two and a half hours.

I am enclosing letters that I have received from Gregory Peck, Rob Reiner, Neil and Diane Simon and am also enclosing a copy of the letter that Bob Hope sent to you. He and Dolores have agreed

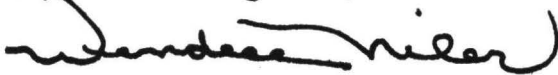
to serve on the committee also. I have asked my friend, Phyllis George, to be on our committee. I know Phyllis is a good friend of yours and she has been very helpful in advising me. She has been a good friend over many years. Gary Smith, someone I have great respect for, has also offered to serve on the committee and lend his support wherever needed.

I know that your mother died of breast cancer as did my own mother, Ann Niles. Following Virginia Kelley's brave struggle with this dreadful disease, I started thinking of a way to raise a large sum of money to honor this courageous woman and in a small way all women who have suffered with this disease. We could designate a charity in Virginia Kelley's memory to receive the money raised. I have been very supportive of any group which fights this disease. Perhaps there is already a charity in place which would receive the money. As far as charity donations, we would get an underwriter for all expenses of the event from one of the companies that I have worked with for many years, such as Reebok, Nike, Anheuser-Busch, or H.J.Heinz Co. We would then ask approximately ten major companies to give a substantial donation and in turn, be able to bring some of their executives to the event. Because any expenses will be taken care of by the underwriter, all money raised will go directly to the charity, and I would plan to raise between \$750,000 to \$1 million.

I would like to request a brief meeting with you to discuss this project and to set a date, possibly September, 1996, that works within your schedules. I would like to do this right after the U.S. Open Tennis Championships so that our good friend, Monica Seles, and other good players could be available to attend. If you feel this is too soon, then I would like to get this on calendar for after the election as I am confident you will be re-elected. This can be a very exciting event, one that will bring very positive publicity and at the same time, raise a great deal of money for a charity that we all care deeply about.

Thank you so much for considering this event.

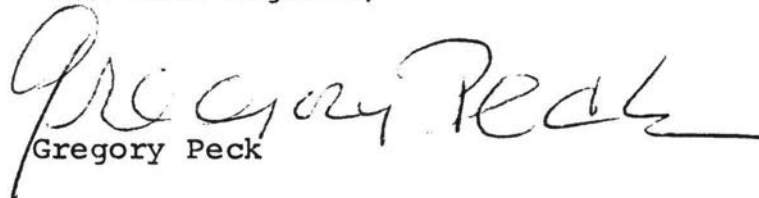

Palm Springs is oasis to the stars

Dateline Palm Springs... "I first came here in the early 1940s." That's Frank Sinatra, at his lovely Rancho Mirage, Calif., home (on Frank Sinatra Drive, by the way). He was telling me of the first time he saw Palm Springs: "We were in L.A. with the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and we had a day off. A couple of guys in the band and I decided to take a drive. As soon as we hit the Palm Springs area and drove around, I told the boys that someday, somehow, I was going to live here. I've been here 34 years now and every time I'm away I miss it more."

I was in the area to address the Desert Forum and to moderate a discussion about child sexual abuse with former Sen. Paula Hawkins, D-Fla., for the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center. Mrs. Blue Eyes has an extraordinary structure here that treats victims, families of victims and abusers as well. It could serve as a model for something that should be everywhere in the USA.

After the 1½-hour forum, we went over to Frank's incredible home for cocktails before heading for Marvin Davis' digs just around the block. Some of the Sinatras' house guests for the Easter weekend included the Roger Moores, the Gregory Pecks, the Jim Robinsons, the George Slaughters and the Tony Pecks (she's Cheryl Tiegs). Frank looked in fine shape after that recent fainting spell in Richmond, Va. "I'm off again to Texas and then New York and then New England," he told me, "and I still look forward to getting on a stage and entertaining people."

As we walked around Davis' semi-mansion, Sinatra said, "Hey, Larry, doesn't this remind you of the way we grew up in Hoboken and in Brooklyn? The wide open spaces, the golf course, the priceless paintings, just like the old days." By the way, the music playing throughout the Sinatra house was what you just might expect — Nat King Cole.

At the Desert Forum, Gerald and Betty Ford were in attendance. The former president is now 81 but doesn't look it and is a very active member of the community here. (Yes, there's a Gerald Ford Drive, too, but he doesn't live on his own street.) Betty remains very involved, going to her Betty Ford Center "at least three times a week."

I also spoke with Nancy Reagan, who tells me she's "feeling wonderful." Nancy says Ron is "doing fine." He's cut down on his speaking schedule quite a bit. She says the Reagan Library is one of the proudest things in her life, and "I'm glad so many people are coming to see it." I also managed to squeeze in some pool time, a lot of reading and non-turbulent flights. That makes everything a plus.

Post notes... Frank Wells, the Disney executive killed in a helicopter accident, was one of the grandest people I've met. He

was a soft-spoken, brilliant guy who loved his fun and had a sense of proportion as well... So, too, the passing of Wendall Niles, one of the great microphone voices in radio history. He worked with the top shows, including (George) Burns and Allen, Bob Hope, Milton Berle, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy. Berle called him "one of the greatest radio talents of all time." True pioneers left us last week.

The army has chemical weapons stored in a highly populated area of Kentucky near Lexington. For over 15 years, the Army has insisted on destroying these weapons by incineration but has been unable to convince our people or state regulators that incineration is the safest method. The Army will not

get permission from Kentucky
to incinerate until these
questions have been answered!!
The Army has lost credibility
because they have failed to provide
satisfactory answers for 15 years.

This is Senator Ford's attempt
to bring in a neutral third party,
the Department of Energy, to provide
answers. This is the right thing to do

**The Statement of Senator Wendell Ford
on His Amendment for the Demilitarization
of Assembled Chemical Munitions**

Mr. President, I send an amendment to the desk and ask for its immediate consideration.

This is an issue that hits home for me. We have a facility in Richmond, Kentucky known as the Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot. This facility houses the most dangerous chemical agents known to mankind such as GB, VX, and mustard agents in various projectiles and rockets. Given the extremely hazardous nature of these agents, my primary concern must be for the health and safety of Kentuckians.

And I'm not alone. Acting out of the same concerns, the state of Kentucky has put into place rigorous regulations governing the permit process for operating an incinerator to destroy chemical weapons. To date, the Army has failed to get a permit from the Kentucky State EPA because the Army has failed in its application to meet several basic tests, including providing sufficient evidence that:

- o neither humans nor the environment will be harmed by emissions from the incinerator;
- o burning the chemical weapons would be safer than any possible alternative technologies;
- o should the incinerator malfunction, enough of the nerve gas would be destroyed instead of released; and,
- o during a worst-case scenario accident, there are adequate plans in place for evacuating the public.

In 1981, the Army chose the baseline incineration process as the best and safest method for destroying chemical weapons. Yet just this month, 15 years later, the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee held a hearing on whether incineration adequately protects the health and safety of the public and the workers.

I fail to understand how the army can continue along this path when legitimate questions are still being raised and are still not being adequately answered. We're now finding that many of the alternatives previously reviewed and rejected for the destruction of chemical weapons have been developed to the point where they may not only be considered viable options, but may be better choices than incineration.

Unfortunately, the Army's actions have the appearance of moving forward simply for the sake of sticking to the original plan. I understand the Army's concern over already investing billions of dollars in the incineration process. But we are dealing with the health and safety of our citizens. And when it comes to issues of

health and safety, I believe the citizens of Kentucky deserve the best.

To ensure this happens, I'm offering an Amendment to the FY 1997 Defense Authorization bill, requiring the Department of Defense to transfer funds to the Department of Energy to conduct a two-year pilot program. Under that pilot program, DOE would determine if there is a feasible alternative to incineration for disposing of the whole chemical munition. The amendment requires the Secretary of Defense and Energy report to Congress six months after the program has been completed on whether this method is as safe and as cost-efficient as baseline incineration. Based on this report we can determine whether baseline incineration or an alternative program is the best way to demilitarize the assembled chemical munitions at the Lexington/Blue Grass and other sites.

Mr. President, let me be very blunt about the reason I've chosen the Department of Energy to do this study and not the Army. In my opinion, no one trusts the Army to be objective on this matter. Not only Kentuckians, but citizens throughout this country have the perception that the Army has spent so much money over the past years for "Baseline Incineration" that they simply won't look at an alternative program in an unbiased manner.

From the information I've received, I believe DOE is the best agency to conduct this pilot program. My amendment gives DOE the flexibility to set up a cost-sharing arrangement with a private contractor if the Secretary finds that such an arrangement is feasible. But, under my amendment a private contractor must indemnify the Government up to fifty million dollars for any damages, injury, death or other loss resulting from the activities of the contractor under the pilot program. Mr. President, this should ensure that only qualified companies will take part in this program and not fly-by-flight operations.

Mr. President, let me assure my colleagues that this amendment in no way effects the Army's current pilot program to determine if there are alternative technologies for the destruction of bulk chemicals. That's because the amendment specifies that of the \$802,847,000 authorized to be appropriated for fiscal year 1997, \$60 million will be transferred to the Department of Energy for the demilitarization of assembled chemical munitions, and that none of the \$60 million will come from the funds for the alternative technologies bulk pilot program.

While the amendment prohibits the Army from entering into any contract for the construction of incinerators at the Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot, I understand some members would also like to see sites in their states included this prohibition. Mr. President, I would be happy to add their sites to my amendment.

Clearly something must be done. With good reason, the state of Kentucky will not issue a permit to the Army. But, it would also be a mistake to simply walk away from the problem. I believe my amendment makes sense for both the Army, the Kentuckians who live in that area, and for other depots that will eventually confront this same problem.

Mr. President, I look forward to working with my colleagues to ensure that the Army moves forward in a way that will not place a single Kentuckian at risk.

CHEMICAL DEMILITARIZATION AMENDMENT

Question: Why the Department of Energy?

- Need a Broker Today there is a lack of communication and trust between the Army, State and local governments and the communities where these obsolete chemical weapons reside. I am proposing that the Department of Energy (DOE) be brought into this process for its technical merits and for its expertise in dealing with State and local governments and their communities. A new player needs to be brought to the table to break the logjam.
- Community Relations DOE has used some of the most creative and effective methods for involving local communities and environmental groups in the evaluation of cleaning up nuclear and radioactive wastes. They are breaking new ground in the cooperative decision making process, which could be applied to the chemical demilitarization program. Chemical demilitarization could be expedited through a collaborative effort among regulators, federal agencies, environmental groups, and local communities.
- Technical Expertise The Department of Energy and its national laboratories have been involved in the demilitarization program from its inception. The laboratories have produced a programmatic environmental impact statement for the entire program; in addition, DOE has done various environmental impact and assessment statements.

Question: How do you know that there will not be local opposition to pilot testing an alternative technology?

Answer: I am hopeful that the pilot program will include a decision making process that will include State and local governments, local community groups and that all parties in this process will reach a consensus. With a consensus I believe that there will be less local opposition to the pilot testing of an alternative technology, and in future years destruction of obsolete chemical weapons will be allowed to proceed.

Question: Why hold up all of the contracts with chemical demilitarization until the funds are transferred to the Department of Energy?

Answer: We want to ensure that the funds are transferred in the most expedited manner. Transfer of funds between federal agencies can be done quickly and we do not expect any contracts to be held up.

Question: Where will the pilot project take place?

Answer: Site selection will be decided contingent on the technical merits of the technology chosen for evaluation and the best place for that technology to be tested.

Pedals for Progress (PFP) began in 1991 with a simple mission: while simultaneously improving the mobility of the poor in developing countries to reduce the amount of needless waste going into our landfills. PFP collects as many bicycles as possible and sends them along with spare parts to countries in Africa, the Caribbean, Latin America and the Pacific region. To date PFP has shipped over 7,200 bicycles to counterpart organizations in Barbados, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Fiji, Haiti, Mozambique, Nicaragua and Peru.

In these countries, the bicycles are distributed to those most in need. They carry people to work, school, health care facilities, plots of farmland and church on Sunday. PFP establishes bike shops for each project, which assures that the bicycles are maintained and repaired and creates jobs. In some projects people are asked to donate labor to a community development project in lieu of cash for the bicycle they take home. For example, on the outskirts of Rivas, Nicaragua two outlying neighborhoods had potable water lines installed into their village with labor supplied in exchange for PFP bikes. In Mao, Dominican Republic, PFP labor is helping to construct an old age home for the poor elderly of the community.

Thirty dollars covers the cost to collect, process, ship and distribute a single bicycle. 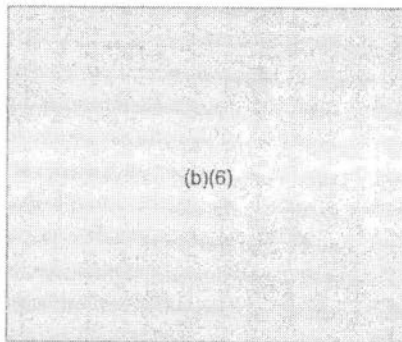
