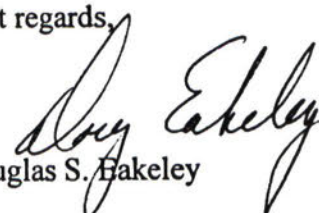

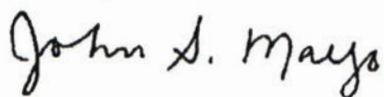

Cleveland named to U.S. team finds few flaws in Bosnia voting

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Cleveland lawyer Tom McDonald figured out a way to tour the beautiful river valleys and ancient cities of eastern Bosnia for free.

The U.S. government even threw in three armored Humvees and a van to escort him, each with its own Army Special Forces troops equipped with 5.56-caliber automatic carbines and 9 mm pistols, just in case.

McDonald, partner with Arter & Hadden, was one of 19 observers, including four congressmen, appointed by President Clinton to assess the fairness of Saturday's historic elections in Bosnia.

The delegation was headed by Richard Holbrooke, the former U.S. diplomat who was architect of the Bosnian peace plan negotiated near Dayton last year.

McDonald, 42, who also observed the landmark 1994 elections in South Africa after authoring a position paper for the Clinton campaign, saw only one problem voting place out of about a dozen he visited in troubled eastern Bosnia, where hundreds of thousands were forced from their homes during the war and thousands of Muslims were killed.

"Overall, it was quite a smooth day," he said yesterday, after jogging past Sarajevo's battle-scarred buildings. "The United States should be very proud of its role."

He said most people "were excited to vote," and that organization was smooth.

The exception was a once-Muslim suburb called Kopaci, just outside fiercely contested Gorazde, the only city in eastern Bosnia held by the Muslim-led government.

Thousands of Serbs who were expelled or escaped from Gorazde now call Kopaci "Serb Gorazde" and returned to vote there.

But thousands of Muslims who fled Kopaci during a 1994 Serb of-

fensive also wanted to return to vote and were subjected to what McDonald said were "tactics being used by the Bosnian Serbs to slow the process down" and discourage the Muslim vote.

He said these included only opening one polling place for Muslims (a second opened in early afternoon) and taking 10 minutes per voter to process the ballots. Other observers said these problems were alleviated by late afternoon, and that everyone with the patience to vote was eventually allowed to do so.

McDonald said his group also observed Serb election authorities refusing to accept paper slips provided by election overseers from the 53-nation Organization for Cooperation and Security in Europe as proof of voting eligibility.

"There were probably several hundred who were not allowed to vote" because of that, said McDonald.

"No one has reported that there was a systematic problem with this," said OSCE spokesman Tom Leary in Sarajevo late yesterday.

But he said it would constitute a clear breach of the rules and that anyone so affected had 72 hours to file a complaint. Leary added that as of late Saturday, the OSCE had already received about 60 complaints, but he wasn't able to say what they concerned.

McDonald, who spent two months in Cambodia last year advising that government on its elections, noted Bosnia's were "very complicated elections with four ballots" and with tremendous logistical problems, most of which were overcome.

Partly that was because the expected human tidal wave of hundreds of thousands of refugees on the move on Bosnia's narrow, winding roads, all trying to vote in old hometowns or new ones where they wanted to influence elections, did not materialize.

Election observers from the OSCE and the European Parliament speculated this was largely because local elections had been postponed.

But Kris Janowski, spokesman in Sarajevo for the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, said he was "quite disturbed and surprised" by the small number of people who crossed internal boundary lines to vote. He attributed it largely to fear.

An estimated 20,000 crossed from Muslim-Croat territory to Serb land to vote, and 4,000 went the other way, according to the NATO-led peace force.

The polling was the first for an independent Bosnia-Herzegovina since it broke away from the old Yugoslavia and civil war engulfed the land in 1992.

Results of the balloting, for a three-member presidency of the nation, for ethnically based leaders and for parliamentary posts, won't be known until tomorrow at the earliest. Nationalist Muslim, Serb and Croat parties are expected to win by a wide margin.

Most speculation centers on whether Bosnian Serb hard-liner Momcilo Krajisnik will gain the first chairmanship of the three-member presidency.

Krajisnik had been Bosnia's parliamentary speaker before the war, holding the second most

powerful post in Bosnia after the presidency, headed by Alija Izetbegovic.

Although voters in different regions were restricted on whom they could vote for in the race for president, the presidential candidate with the most votes nationwide will get first rotation in the chairman's job. Based on raw numbers, Izetbegovic should be the top vote-getter, since before the war Muslims were 43 percent of the population to 31 percent for Serbs.

But Muslims, choosing among eight presidential candidates vs. only four for Serbs, could split their vote. If there is a high enough turnout among Serbs, Krajisnik's votes could surpass Izetbegovic's.

Izetbegovic's Party of Democratic Action, or SDA, was so worried about this possibility it put out a flier encouraging Muslims who planned to vote on Serb territory to cast presidential ballots for Miladin Ivanic — misspelling his last name "Ivancic" — the candidate supported by Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic, not exactly seen as a friend to Muslims.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to you to express my growing concerns over the escalation of U.S. military activity in and around the Persian Gulf and to urge you to promptly seek a resolution from Congress authorizing the use of force in the Gulf. There is no emergency which would require escalation of the use of force by you in your role as Commander-in-Chief. The constitutional role of Congress as the sole authority to declare war should be respected, as it was in 1991, with the Congress determining national policy on our objectives, the conditions of allied burden sharing, an exit strategy and an overall policy which is lacking at the present time. A further statement of my reasons follows.

First, let me repeat my publicly stated support for the policy of containment of Saddam Hussein's regime and for the practice of United States military involvement in the enforcement of the United Nations' ordered no-fly zone in southern Iraq. No less than in 1991, when I voted to support the use of force in the Gulf War, the United States has vital interests in this region which must be protected.

Second, I strongly support the bravery and professionalism of our military men and women who are carrying out your orders at substantial risk to their lives.

All this having been said, I believe your current course of gradual escalation against Iraq, starting with the missile attacks on September 4, (for which you sought no prior authorization from Congress) constitutes the involvement of our armed forces in the sorts of hostile and potentially hostile situations so as to trigger the limit of your authority as commander-in-chief established by the War Powers Act.

Moreover, this present course of escalation -- especially the reported possible dispatch of 3-5,000 ground troops to Kuwait -- could well lead to a renewal of full scale war between the United States and Iraq. For example, if, heaven forbid, our Army units were to sustain losses from any form of Iraqi attack, this country would be duty-bound to respond with massive force.

I know you understand, particularly in view of this country's bitter experiences with undeclared wars in Korea and Vietnam, the paramount importance of the constitutional principle that only Congress can declare war. It is an unavoidable concomitant of this principle that the President cannot have unilateral authority to set up a trip-wire which, if breached, would surely commit this nation to war. Your present posture toward Iraq, however, may be creating just such a trip-wire.

Beyond the always vital matter of honoring basic constitutional principle, I urge you to promptly seek Congressional authority for the use of force against Iraq because, just as in 1991, this democratic exercise is by far the best way to clarify both the legitimate means and the legitimate ends which underlie our national policy towards Saddam Hussein.

A congressional debate now will focus you and the Congress, and ultimately the American people, on what our policy should be at this time in the Persian Gulf. It will define national understanding and hopefully shape a national consensus on the key questions which must be answered as the potential for deeper conflict grows -- questions such as the proper burden sharing we must demand from our allies in the region and around the world and, most importantly, about an exit strategy to ensure a way back home, in reasonable time and at reasonable cost, for the troops we so rapidly send today into harm's way.

Thank you for your consideration.

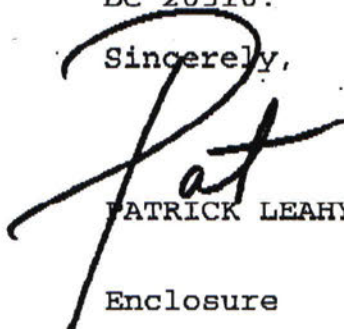

Coach Cozza to Quit After 32 Years at Yale

NEW HAVEN, Sept. 7. — Carm Cozza, the latest — and the longest lasting — in a pantheon of legendary coaches at Yale, announced today that he would step down at the end of the current football season.

About to begin his 32d season as the head coach at Yale, the 66-year-old Cozza made his announcement at a news conference in the Smilow Field Center near the Yale Bowl before a practice scrimmage.

With the 14 seniors on this year's Yale team standing behind him and with a host of former players on hand, Cozza said that he had made his decision at the end of last season after talking it over with his wife, Jean, who also attended the news conference.

"But I wanted to tell my players before this season started, before making an announcement," said Cozza, wearing his trademark navy blue blazer with a "Y" over the breast pocket. "I didn't want to wait until the end of the season and let people think I was leaving because we had a rough year, which the prognosticators say we may have."

Asked if the fact that Yale has not had a winning season since 1991 had a bearing, he said: "That's a part of it because I hate to lose, as anyone who plays racquetball with me will tell you. But it's not the main reason. Thirty-two years is a long time."

The Yale athletic director, Tom Beckett, said that a search for a successor will begin immediately. "We hope to name someone by January," he said.

Cozza came to Yale in 1963 as an assistant coach when a former football teammate at Miami University of Ohio, John Pont, was named the head coach. Forty different coaches have worked at the seven other Ivy League schools while Cozza has been at Yale.

Cozza choked up in recounting the team meeting on Thursday.

"The players have always been like family to me, and Thursday was a very difficult day," he said haltingly. "It was very difficult for me to tell them that this was going to be my last year."

Cozza's departure will mark the end of an era during which Yale won 10 Ivy championships and 177 games (against 111 defeats and 5 ties).

No other Yale coach comes close

to matching Cozza in longevity in a football program that began in 1872. The closest is Jordan Olivar, who was the head coach for 11 years, from 1951 to 1962.

Cozza was 34 in 1963 when he was named to succeed Pont, who left Yale to become the head coach at Indiana. Following two losing seasons, Cozza coached the Bulldogs to successful records in 14 of the next 15 years. Players on those teams included Chuck Mercein, Calvin Hill, Brian Dowling, John Spagnola, Dick Jauron, Gary Fencik, Ken Hill and Rich Piana.

An apostle of the scholar-athlete concept championed by the Ivy League, Cozza has said over the years that he is as proud of the three Yale players who went on to become Rhodes Scholars as he is of the players who have made it to the pros (20 at last count). "I'm also very proud

that only 7 of my players have not received degrees in 32 years," he said. "And I might note that the only unique thing any of them ever got were over their studies and not over football."

Cozza's chances of going out as a winner are slim. As was the case with his first Yale team in 1963, this year's squad is inexperienced, with only six starters returning from 1995. But Cozza will leave with a winning record over all and, perhaps more importantly, with winning marks against Harvard (16-14-1 going into this season) and Princeton (27-9 through the 1995 season). Indeed, he will depart with a winning record against every team Yale has played regularly since his arrival, except Dartmouth, which holds a 16-14-1 edge over the Ell.

What were his most memorable games? "Most recently, the victory over Princeton last year," he said, referring to the Ell upset of a previously undefeated Princeton team. "And then one I'd like to forget — the loss to Harvard in the last game."

COLLEGE FOOTBALL**Cozza Will Retire From Yale After Season**

CARM COZZA, who has graced Yale's sideline for more than three decades and coached the Elis to 10 Ivy League football championships, confirmed this will be his final season, The Yale Daily News reported yesterday.

"It was a very difficult decision for me," Cozza told the school newspaper. "I have very mixed emotions, but the time has come in my career to think about what's best for the team and for myself."

Cozza's remarks came on the eve of a news conference that had been scheduled amid speculation about his retirement plans. All 24 senior team members will attend the conference.

Cozza, 66, who is entering his 32d season as head coach, told his players of his plans in an emotional speech before practice Thursday. Cozza has a 177-111-5 record, making him the school's leader in coaching victories.

"Carm Cozza is a Yale legend," RICHARD LEVIN, the university president, said. "He has really very few equals in the coaching profession in Yale history."

Warm greetings to everyone observing Yom Kippur, this holiest of Jewish holidays.

On this day, Jews across our nation and around the world gather to pray for forgiveness and to atone for any transgressions they may have committed against God and their fellow human beings. It is during this solemn observance that people who have been torn by differences seek reconciliation with friends, family, and neighbors in an earnest effort to improve their lives and to strengthen their relationships with others.

With its emphasis on collective responsibility, Yom Kippur is a powerful reminder that what we do as individuals has a profound effect on our entire community. The choices we make, whether shortsighted or wise, self-centered or generous, make a difference not only in our own lives but in the lives of our families, our community, and our nation.

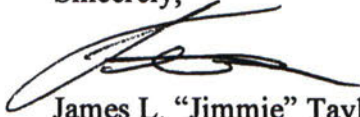

Dear Steny:

I am writing to urge that you vote to uphold my veto of H.R. 1833, a bill banning so-called partial-birth abortions. My views on this legislation have been widely misrepresented, so I would like to take a moment to state my position clearly.

First, I am against late-term abortions and have long opposed them, except, as the Supreme Court requires, where necessary to protect the life or health of the mother. As Governor of Arkansas, I signed into law a bill that barred third trimester abortions, with an appropriate exception for life or health. I would sign a bill to do the same thing at the federal level if it were presented to me.

The procedure aimed at in H.R. 1833 poses a difficult and disturbing issue. Initially, I anticipated that I would support the bill. But after I studied the matter and learned more about it, I came to believe that it should be permitted as a last resort when doctors judge it necessary to save a woman's life or to avert serious consequences to her health.

In April, I was joined in the White House by five women who were devastated to learn that their babies had fatal conditions. These women wanted anything other than an abortion, but were advised by their doctors that this procedure was their best chance to avert the risk of death or grave harm, including, in some cases, an inability to bear children. These women gave moving testimony. For them, this was not about choice. Their babies were certain to perish before, during or shortly after birth. The only question was how much grave damage the women were going to suffer. One of them described the serious risks to her health that she faced, including the possibility of hemorrhaging, a ruptured cervix and loss of her ability to bear children in the future. She talked of her predicament:

"Our little boy had...hydrocephaly. All the doctors told us there was no hope. We asked about in utero surgery, about shunts to remove the fluid, but there was absolutely nothing we could do. I cannot express the pain we still feel. This was our precious little baby, and he was being taken from us before we even had him. This was not our choice, for not only was our son going to die, but the complications of the pregnancy put my health in danger, as well."

Some have raised the question whether this procedure is ever most appropriate as a matter of medical practice. The best answer comes from the medical community, which believes that, in those rare cases where a woman's serious health interests are at stake, the decision of whether to use the procedure should be left to the best exercise of their medical judgment.

The problem with H.R. 1833 is that it provides an exception to the ban on this procedure only when a doctor is convinced that a woman's life is at risk, but not when the doctor believes she faces real, grave risks to her health.

Let me be clear. I do not contend that this procedure, today, is always used in circumstances that meet my standard. The procedure may well be used in situations where a woman's serious health interests are not at risk. But I do not support such uses, I do not defend them, and I would sign appropriate legislation banning them.

At the same time, I cannot and will not accept a ban on this procedure in those cases where it represents the best hope for a woman to avoid serious risks to her health.

I also understand that many who support this bill believe that a health exception could be stretched to cover almost anything, such as emotional stress, financial hardship or inconvenience. That is not the kind of exception I support. I support an exception that takes effect only where a woman faces real, serious risks to her health. Some have cited cases where fraudulent health reasons are relied upon as an excuse -- excuses I could never condone. But people of good faith must recognize that there are also cases where the health risks facing a woman are deadly serious and real. It is in those cases that I believe an exception to the general ban on the procedure should be allowed.

Further, I reject the view of those who say it is impossible to draft a bill imposing real, stringent limits on the use of this procedure -- a bill making crystal clear that the procedure may be used only in cases where a woman risks death or serious damage to her health, and in no other case. Working in a bipartisan manner, Congress could fashion such a bill.

That is why I asked Congress, by letter dated February 28 and in my veto message, to add a limited exemption for the small number of compelling cases where use of the procedure is necessary to avoid serious health consequences. As I have said before, if Congress produced a bill with such an exemption, I would sign it.

In short, I do not support the use of this procedure on demand or on the strength of mild or fraudulent health complaints. But I do believe that it is wrong to abandon women, like the women I spoke with, whose doctors advise them that they need the procedure to avoid serious injury. That, in my judgment, would be the true inhumanity. Accordingly, I urge that you vote to uphold my veto of H.R. 1833.

I continue to hope that a solution can be reached on this painful issue. But enacting H.R. 1833 would not be that solution.

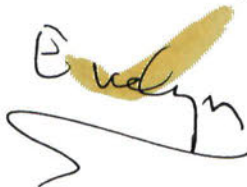

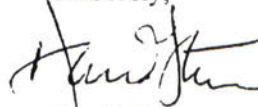

NAPIL was founded in 1986 by law students on 15 campuses to surmount the obstacles that bar access to equal justice for millions of poor and disadvantaged Americans. NAPIL has since grown into a national coalition of student organizations on 139 campuses -- over seventy-five percent of all ABA-approved law schools. NAPIL is the largest organization in the country devoted exclusively to training the next generation of public service lawyers.

NAPIL's accomplishments as a leadership training coalition for public interest law students are remarkable. Highlights of the student coalition's successes include:

National Summer Justice Corps. In the 1994/95 school year, NAPIL law students raised more than \$2.1 million through campus-based fundraising drives to fund over 1,100 law student interns at community legal services offices, environmental and consumer groups, and other nonprofit agencies. Since NAPIL's inception in 1986, law students have raised over \$11 million through pledge drives, services auctions, and other special events, providing grants for more than 5,000 summer legal internships. On the national level, since 1987 nearly 100 law firms have joined NAPIL's *Public Service Challenge*, contributing more than \$900,000 to support law student internships. Combined, *Challenge* and campus-based fundraising efforts have enabled thousands of students to meet their living expenses while creating a national summer justice corps for the underrepresented.

NAPIL Fellowships for Equal Justice (NFEJ). In essence a domestic Peace Corps for lawyers, NFEJ was established with the support of two federal district court judges who awarded \$3.1 million in settlement reserve funds to launch the program. Twenty-two Equal Justice Fellows have been selected from 750 applicants to serve vastly underrepresented constituencies, bringing creative legal strategies to bear on some of our nation's greatest challenges, including AIDS, the needs of Native Americans and at-risk youth, domestic violence, the exploitation of immigrant workers, and environmental racism.

National Service Legal Corps. In 1993, NAPIL launched a campaign to promote the involvement of public interest lawyers in AmeriCorps, the landmark national service initiative. As a result of NAPIL's organizing and program development efforts, a major new national program, the National Service Legal Corps (NSLC), began in September 1994. As a tribute to its success, the NSLC has been renewed for 1995-96.

The NSLC teams lawyers with paralegals, social workers and educators to implement model strategies to address the legal needs of poor communities. The skilled legal teams, working at 11 local legal services programs across the country, are preventing homelessness, protecting victims of domestic violence, creating jobs and affordable housing, improving public health, and ensuring opportunities for at-risk youth. NAPIL is the lead coordinator of the NSLC, in partnership with the Legal Services Corporation, the National Legal Aid and Defender Association, the Project Advisory Group, and the 11 legal services sponsoring sites.
