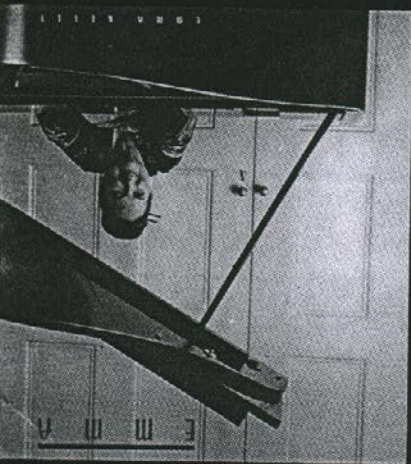
Finally I wish to thank you for your hearty reception at the White House, and may God bless you and your family.

INFORMATIONAL MEMORANDUM FOR PRESIDENT CLINTON

SUBJECT: Farm Income Forecasts

The Department of Agriculture recently released several noteworthy indicators of the aggregate financial performance of the U.S. farm economy. Net farm income is estimated to be \$51 billion in 1996, a record high. Net farm income is the annual value of agricultural production after accounting for all production costs, including depreciation. The 1996 net farm income estimate is 46 percent above the 1995 level and 5 percent above the previous record high set in 1994. Farm cash receipts in 1996, at \$200 billion, will be 8 percent higher than a year ago, and a new record high, although cattle receipts will be the lowest in the 1990's.

Other financial indicators also reveal the underlying strength of the farm economy. Net cash income of farmers--cash revenues minus cash expenses--are expected to be the second highest ever in 1996. The value of farm assets at the end of 1996 is expected to exceed \$1 billion, up 4.2 percent from 1995. Total farm debt is rising, but slowly, so farm debt will remain manageable and decline relative to assets.

While the increase in net farm income is due, in part, to the high grain prices this year and producer payments under the new Farm Bill, I believe this Administration can take credit for a number of factors that have contributed to the record high income level:

- The Clinton Administration has improved the financial situation of family farmers by following sound monetary and fiscal policies that have kept interest rates and inflation at low levels.
- The Clinton Administration has improved the ability of family farmers to increase their income by pursuing more flexible agricultural programs. During the 1996 Farm Bill debate, the Administration successfully argued for increased planting flexibility for farmers. Under the new Farm Bill, farmers can choose to plant those crops that will provide the greatest return without foregoing farm program payments. This will permit farmers to reap the benefits of an expanding world market.
- The Clinton Administration has enhanced farm prices and the incomes of family farmers by expanding exports of agricultural products. This Administration has opened new markets for agricultural producers by negotiating new trade agreements, and we are using whatever measures are available to ensure that existing trade agreements are met, such as using the World Trade Organization to pry open the European Union market to U.S. beef. For FY 1996, U.S. agricultural exports are estimated at a record \$60 billion, up 60 percent from just five years ago. While U.S. agricultural exports are projected to decline slightly to \$58 billion in FY 1997, this would still be the second highest export level ever.

We can accomplish all of this by concentrating our work creation efforts in the growth industry sector that is the focus of our day to day business - the Information Technology Industry.

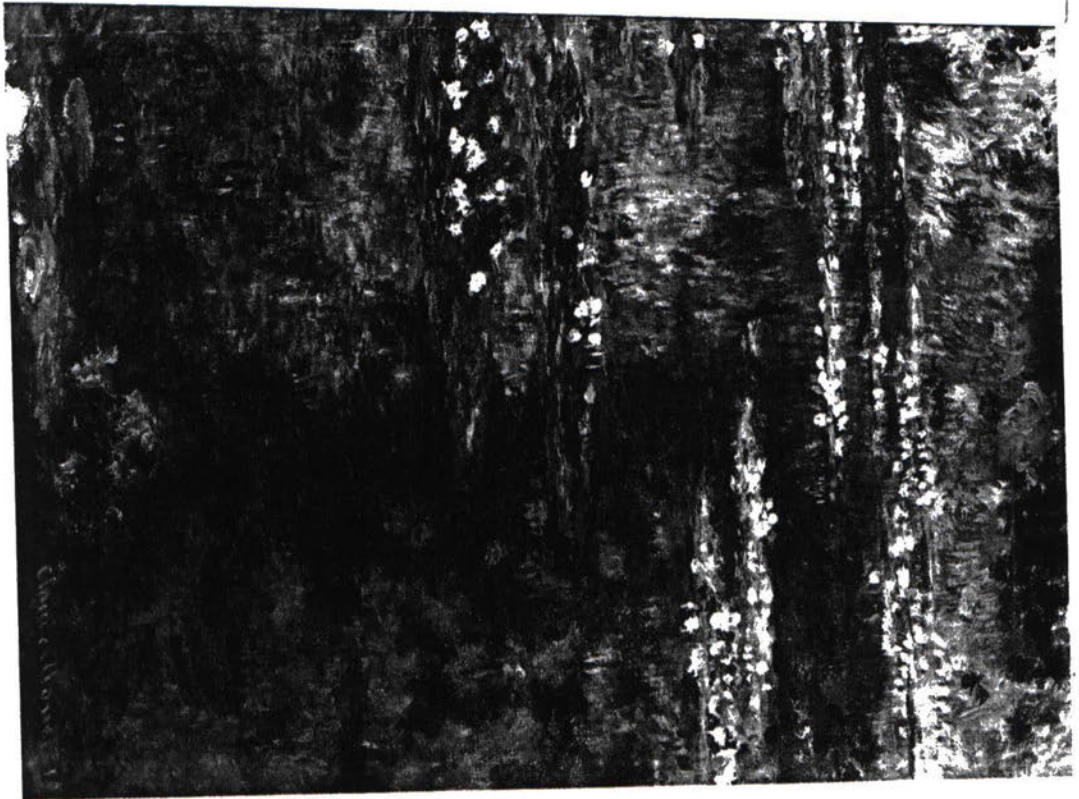
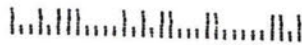

# PACKARD CHILDREN'S HealthVan 11

**P**ackard Children's HealthVan 11 is a health clinic on wheels for children. It travels to the neighborhoods listed to provide children's health services such as immunizations, physical examinations, treatment for childhood illnesses and hearing and vision testing. Physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses, and outreach workers from Lucile Salter Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford staff our mobile clinic. These services are for families who do not have insurance. Families of children with insurance or Medi-Cal will receive assistance finding a primary care provider.

Packard Children's HealthVan 11 staff work closely with schools, community groups, other health care providers and community leaders to bring care to children in areas where they may have difficulty finding a regular doctor. Health education, referral to other community services and family support information is provided by the HealthVan staff.

The Packard Children's HealthVan 11 is made possible by a generous grant from Blue Cross of California and promotional sponsorship from ABC affiliate, KNTV Channel 11 in San Jose.

Visits are on a first-come, first-serve basis. Routine school physicals are usually available until 1 p.m., although sick children are given priority. All children **MUST** be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian to receive services. Please bring any health or immunization records with you when you visit the Packard Children's HealthVan 11! 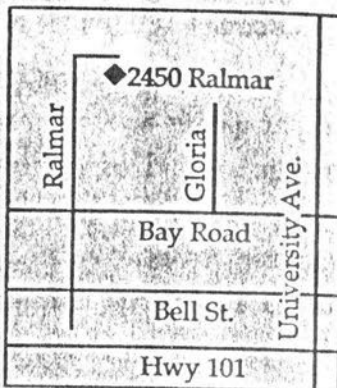

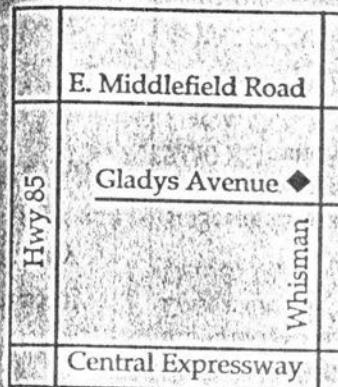

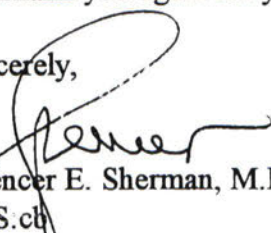
