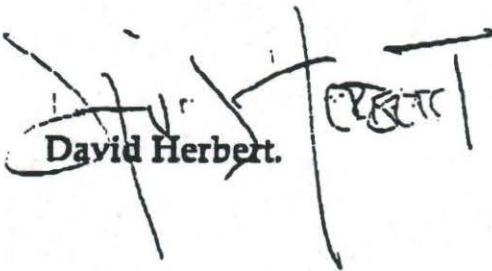

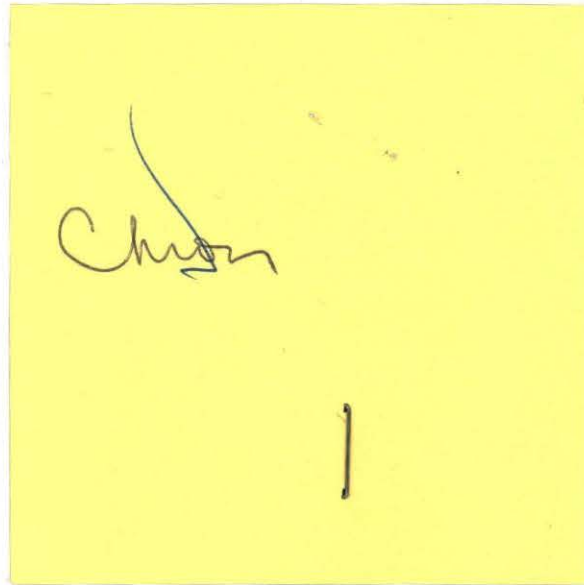

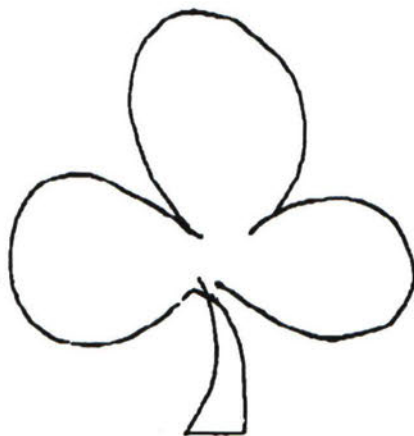

Dear Bill Clinton:

Warm congratulations on your success. It is a victory for the nation: when you took office, we were a dispirited, aimless and cynical people-- conditions created by your predecessors, and due, among other things, to their emphasis on runaway foreign policies carried on outside the bounds of legality (which was a REAL scandal!).

Today the nation is again a community of peoples; it is hopeful, and cynicism is diminishing (perhaps even in the Third Estate!).

Now it is very necessary to turn to reinvestment in global community, as you have already done nationally. You can reestablish the US as a reasonable, cooperative and moral member of that community. This has not been the case at all in the two previous administrations.

There are three areas I want to bring to your attention:

1. Uses of NATO
2. Development of Global Community
3. The Trap of Unilateral Action

1. Reliance on military alliances as major elements of world community building is doubtful. I refer to your statement about extension of NATO. Born of war and instrumental in the Cold War, NATO is not a useful venue for developing community among Europe, Eastern Europe, and the Soviet Union. It is deeply suspect by the latter, and rightly so. Such a policy suggests serious paucity of insight by those who are pushing that role for NATO on you.

As you so clearly know, community is built out of societal elements: trade and aid, political, economic and cultural ties. And most of all, out of trust. Please do follow your instincts and intuition in this area, rather than those who continue to think in adversarial terms.

2. The second area concerns the major existing system for the development of global community, and which originated with the United States. That is, of course, the United Nations; and beyond the structure, the viewpoint for which it stands.

When Mr. Reagan took office, a high UN official, personal friend, was taken to lunch by the reframers of US-UN policy. He was bluntly told: "We are going to destroy the UN." The US nearly destroyed UNESCO, and still remains outside of this major organ: and while it is certainly

true that improvement is always desirable, the US has savaged the UN and deeply damaged it. Morale there has fallen nearly to zero -- a tragedy if one is aware that most of the personnel have come there to work out of high ideals and the desire to see the world get it together in mutuality and community.

The large exception to this idealism has been the pressures of governments, especially the Host Government, who wish to approve and appoint which of their nationals serve in the UN civil service. While Dag Hammarskjold set a policy of impartiality and non-interference by governments, this has been strongly breached in recent years, helping to destroy the concept of a non-national and impartial civil service.

3. The Unilateral Trap: Unilateral action by nations in the world community rapidly erodes trust, and the community. And if wide support is not found for it, the action may often be very counterproductive in the end. In the just past administrations, the US built up a reputation as "Lone Ranger" of the world. This has wrought havoc with concepts and practices of community decision-making and action; and has, in fact, set up the US as prime target for terrorist attack. There is much remedial work to be done here, on US attitudes -- how it sees the world and its role.

Because the US and USSR (usefully) stayed out of UN Peacekeeping, its historic and valuable role is not part of the repertoire of these States. And it is not examined or explained to the US public. In the past administration, in this information gap, the US fell into the attitude of using the UN as a fig leaf for what it wished to do -- in the Sudan, for example, and then the UN was shamelessly blamed for the US failure!

A notion that the US should unilaterally decide to drop nuclear weapons on Libya, and that it did, in fact, try to kill its rightly hated ruler by flights using NATO bases, means that there is a basic self-examination that our country needs to carry through in regard to itself and its role in the world.

At the outset of your new term, with the opportunity to do for the world community what you have already done for the National community, I would truly urge you to sit down with a few persons who have a broader view than the emissaries to you from State and other Departments. Here are a few:

Brian Urquhart. (Now Sir Brian). One of the original triumvirate who made the UN into something: Urquhart, Hammarskjold, and our own Ralph Bunche. Brian carries the entire history, is extremely knowledgeable and able. He can transfer the entire gestalt to you. Urquhart is now at the Ford Foundation in New York. See HAMMARSKJOLD, the biography by Urquhart (Knopf, 1972), and his own biography: A LIFE IN PEACE AND WAR, (Harper & Row, 1987).

Louis B. Sohn. Woodruff Professor of International Law, University of Georgia; (formerly Harvard Law School), former UN legal officer and counselor to the US State Department, and President of the American Society of International Law.

Donald F. McHenry. Professor of Diplomacy and International Affairs, Georgetown University. Former US Foreign Service Officer and Ambassador to the UN.

Charles William Maynes. Was with the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, across from the UN; served briefly as Undersecretary of State for International Organizations in Carter Administration; now editor for FOREIGN POLICY Magazine, 11 Dupont Circle, 797-6420

Andrew (Andy) Young. You probably know him quite well. He served briefly and well as US Ambassador to the UN. Coretta King regards him as the most direct disciple of Martin Luther King, Jr.

.. Please decide to build world community through world community organizations!

Or, an entirely different matter: since the Jean Houston connection has surfaced, I offer an informed opinion: while brilliant, she is on the manipulative side, and more of an experimenter than a counsellor. I can recommend among other fine persons:

Jacqueline "Jackie" Doyle, former President of Association for Humanistic Psychology (AHP), Tiburon, California.

Martha Crampton, 215 West 88th Street, New York 10024, (212) 496-2285. Martha is a Psychosynthesis counsellor, and personal pupil of the founder, Roberto Assagioli. It is a more holistic psychology -- both spiritual and humanistic.

Dear President and Mrs. Clinton,

We are writing to you today to appropriate steps to enhance NIH funding for now determined to be the most common in retardation. I appeal to you because our and because we are close to a solution --

Fragile X affects 1 of every 1200 female babies with such disabilities learning disabilities, and autism. At least a carrier, usually without knowing it (although a test is now available). It is not rare. It requires a lifetime custodial care. A recent University of California study found that this care costs from 1 to 4 million dollars per patient. Most of this is borne by the public.

Recent research has identified the gene, and the protein it fails to produce. This protein can now be "manufactured." NIH can find a way to deliver this protein -- with your help.

In short, Fragile X is a recently identified, very common, very expensive disease whose time has come. With your interest and compassion helping to provide this impending breakthrough, a crushing burden can be lifted from many thousands of families like ours -- and from the nation's health care system.

We are asking for your help at this time because the campaign season is upon us and all of America will be listening to your message even more intently. Up until this point, no one has publicly championed research for Fragile X and a push during this season may be just what we need to increase the NIH funding necessary to find the cure for Fragile X.

Please help us by urging NIH to increase funding for Fragile X research. We would appreciate a copy of your letter or letters.

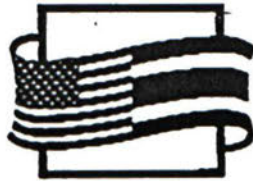

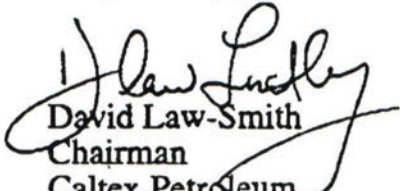

The epidemic of HIV and AIDS constitutes a public health crisis of unprecedented proportions. For fifteen years, this terrible tragedy has devastated far too many lives in the U.S. and around the world. HIV is a disease that we can defeat -- just as we have eradicated smallpox from our planet and polio from the western hemisphere. We have made tremendous progress in our understanding of HIV and HIV disease, improving treatments and preventing infections, and we have increased federal funding for AIDS research, prevention, care, and housing by more than 50 percent in the past four years.

But we have much more work to do, and we must build on the public-private partnerships that have begun to work so well. That is why I am so pleased to share with you the first-ever National AIDS Strategy, a historic document that articulates our national goals and establishes a blueprint for achieving them. Our goals are simple but direct:

- . To develop a cure for those who are living with HIV/AIDS and a vaccine to protect all of us from this virus;
- . To reduce and eventually eliminate new HIV infections among adults and children;
- . To guarantee that all people living with HIV have access to the care and services they require;
- . To fight AIDS-related discrimination at every turn;
- . To maintain our leadership role in the international response to this global pandemic; and
- . To ensure that our advances in science are quickly translated into improved care and prevention.

To achieve these noble objectives we must all stand shoulder-to-shoulder in our fight against HIV and AIDS. None of us can afford to sit by and watch this epidemic continue to take our neighbors, friends, and loved ones from us. HIV/AIDS affects us all, and we must wage this battle together until we can proclaim victory. With your involvement and the commitment of nations around the world, I am confident that we will succeed.
