Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to inform you that I will be leaving the Administration in the beginning of February. I wish to thank you for the opportunity that you have given me to serve in your Administration during the past four years. Being part of your economic team has been the most exhilarating experience of my life. I feel lucky to have had the chance to work with economists of the caliber, good nature, and dedication of Laura Tyson, Alan Blinder, Alicia Munnell, Martin Baily and Jeff Frankel. I think we can be proud of our economic policies and our accomplishments. For me, it was particularly exciting to be able to help translate New Democratic principles into practical policies that have the promise of increasing opportunity and raising living standards for all Americans. I believe we have changed the economic course of the country, and the vision will influence policy for years to come.

As I mentioned to you, when I was first approached by the World Bank, I hesitated: for an economist, there can hardly be a job more exciting or fascinating than Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, participating in every aspect of economic decision making. But as I thought about the matter more, I decided that it would be a tremendous opportunity to work to reduce the dire poverty and economic stagnation that afflict so much of the world, and to assist the former socialist economies trying to make a transition to market economies. To me, it is clear that the United States is set on the right economic course; greater economic challenges lie in the third world. The "third way" that we have pioneered in the United States, between the extremes of too much and too little government, has much to contribute to the development of policies that will combine rapid sustainable growth with the alleviation of poverty.

I, and the entire Council, appreciate the support you have given us. The engagement you have shown with the economic ideas that we have discussed has energized all of us. It has been particularly rewarding to see some of these ideas reach fruition in the form of legislation, changes in regulation, or Administration initiatives. While much has been accomplished, you are as keenly aware as any of us of the many challenges ahead--from those posed by our aging population and our inner cities, to the necessity of maintaining our intellectual leadership through continued strong support of science and technology, to the redefinition of our role in the international economy in the post post-cold war era. I hope that you will feel free to count on my help in the coming years.

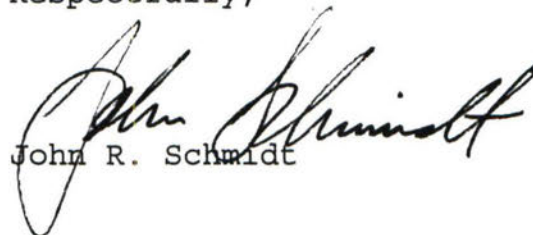
Dear Mr. President:

I hereby submit my resignation as Associate Attorney General effective January 20, 1997.

It has been a great honor for me to serve as Associate Attorney General. I cannot imagine a job which would have been more satisfying or one where, day-in and day-out, I would have had a greater sense that I was working on matters -- implementing the 1994 Crime Law, enforcing civil rights laws, protecting our environment, promoting religious liberty, maintaining the openness of competitive markets and more -- that are central to the lives of the American people. I believe the record of the Department of Justice and of your Administration as a whole on these issues is one which justifiably gives us all great pride and which rightly has the overwhelming support of the American people.

As you know, for almost four years I have been away from my family in Chicago five days a week (and even more than that during the first year that I spent mostly in Geneva). For personal reasons it is time for me to go home. I leave with great reluctance a Department of Justice and an Administration in which I am enormously proud to have served. re: Noncareer Ambassadors

**Issue:**

The issue for discussion is the rotation of noncareer ambassadors in 1997.

**Background:**

The Department of State rotates senior career foreign service officers every three years. The previous Administration followed this three year term length criteria for its noncareer ambassadors too.

It is our understanding that no guidance regarding term length was provided to your appointees when they were nominated.

During your first term, you selected fifty-six (56) noncareer ambassadors. The assignments include the following mix of appointments:

Forty-five (45) Country Ambassadors,  
Ten (10) Chief of Missions, and  
One (1) Consul General.

In addition to the noncareer Ambassadorial appointments during the first term, we have requested the State Department delay assigning career Ambassadors to several posts for the summer 1997 rotation. The State Department would like for you to make a decision on whether you want any of these posts to move to noncareer status. If you don't, they need to move ahead on rotation of career ambassadors in these posts as soon as possible.

All of the ambassadors posted during your first term are listed under Tab A. The chart includes the name, date of appointment, country, sponsor, and a comments section. The comments section includes specific information gathered via phone calls to the ambassadors by the State Department. *The information in the comments column was gathered by Talbot and Tarnoff.* These phone calls were made at about the time of the election.

#### **Discussion:**

Ambassadorial appointments are highly coveted positions; it is important we keep our standards high as we did in the first term. There is an intense interest in these appointments from a large number of highly qualified individuals. (A list of interested individuals is attached behind Tab B.) We think that this list will expand when it becomes known that positions are available. Certainly, the level of interest that is being expressed by qualified individuals is greater than the number of posts that can be made available.

Some of the noncareer ambassadors that are currently at post have proven to be excellent representatives of the United States and your Administration. On the other hand, there are some whose performance would be described in less than enthusiastic terms.

Based on the time that it generally takes to get someone selected, vetted, nominated, and confirmed, it will, in all likelihood, be the end of June before the majority of replacement ambassadors are confirmed and ready to send to post.

#### **Recommendation:**

Therefore, we recommend that all noncareer ambassadors, who were nominated and confirmed before December 31, 1994, be told as soon as possible that their tenure will expire on or about June 30, 1997. Exceptions should be made on a case by case basis. This will free up approximately forty-four (44) posts to which you can immediately make appointments for your second term.

For your convenience, we have sorted the attached list by appointment date so that it is easy for you to see who was appointed before December 31, 1994. We have provided a place on the chart for you to act on each appointment individually or you may provide a blanket approval or disapproval below.

Dear Mr. President:

Congratulations on your victory in the recent national election. Your second term is the most heartening thing that has happened in American politics in a very long time. I wish also to thank you for the very great honor of having had dinner with you and Mrs. Clinton the night before the San Diego debate. Jayme and I were not only thrilled, but delighted to have a chance to see how you were doing and to express our best wishes.

✓ For my mother, it was perhaps the most exciting event of her life. We lost my father, the old Baptist preacher, a year ago this Friday, and she has been struggling with making a new life for herself alone after more than fifty years of marriage. This one event did more to enliven her prospects than almost anything else could have. She has become, as a result, and as you might imagine, a local hero back in Jasper, Texas. As a former teacher, the opportunity to speak briefly with Mrs. Clinton about education meant the world to her. So I thank you on her behalf as well.

We faxed you a letter of thanks and support shortly afterwards, but this was during the heat of the campaign, and the lines were very active, and I am not certain it got through, so I am including a copy of that letter with this one.

I still plan a longer letter in the near future, when the pressures of my own small campaigns abate--the end of the semester, a January 1 deadline on the new novel (in which you have a couple of entirely favorable cameos, incidentally). For the moment, I wanted to suggest a few poets for your consideration for the inaugural ceremonies.

I understand that you may very well have already come to a decision on this matter, and I also understand that you may very well have been flooded with letters of petition from every hopeful poet in the country once word got out. Nevertheless, in the off chance that my information may be useful, I'll recommend a short list of three people. All of them have impeccable credentials in the literary world, and all of them write a poetry that is not only profound and highly sophisticated but also clear, musically beautiful, and available to any intelligent reader--unlike the great majority of those poems which have been foisted on the literary scene in the last few decades.

✓ The first is Paul Lake, who teaches at Arkansas Tech in Russellville, Arkansas. Paul is a leader in the strongest new movement in poetry in recent years, the Expansive Poetry movement. He writes a magnificent line, and the depth of his social awareness would allow him to create an occasional poem for the inauguration worthy of Robert Frost. Paul is also the winner of Arkansas's highest literary award, The Porter Fund. (In the year that Paul won, Senator Dale Bumpers was the presenter.)

The second is Frederick Turner, Founders Professor of Humanities at the University of Texas in Dallas. Perhaps the most remarkable mind of our generation, Frederick is a master poet, an art critic of national reputation, a world-renowned ecologist. His genius embraces science, in which he is immensely well-trained, as easily as it does the arts, and is surpassed only by his warmth and humanity. Selecting Fred would be like selecting a cross between Albert Schweitzer and Leonardo da Vinci. Except that Fred doesn't draw, I think.

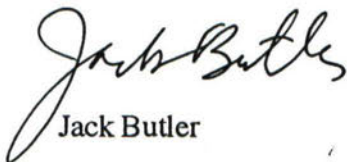
The third is myself. I know, I know. There's no modest way to put myself forward, so I will forgo modesty. I must put myself forward if I am to come to your attention, because it is unlikely anyone else will do so. I am chiefly known as a novelist now, but before the novels began doing well, I was chiefly known as a poet. Although I long ago lost patience with the infighting of the poetry scene--po-biz, as they call it--I have published frequently in journals such as The New Yorker, Atlantic, and Poetry. I can never win the Porter Fund award, because, in 1983, I founded it, along with Phillip McMath. I have published two collections of poetry, and my new and selected poems are forthcoming from Story Line Press. Far more importantly, I am about as good as they get. My poetic reputation is still an underground reputation, but I believe a great many people, including the poets I describe above, will avouch that this is the case.

You needn't depend on the opinions of others, however. I am including the best-known (if, of course, out-of-print) edition of my poetry, so that you may, if you desire, judge for yourself. Again, I am aware that you may have already come to a decision, and I am certain that if you have, the person you have chosen will be an excellent representative.

But if, if, if just possibly, any of these suggestions are of use to you, I'd be delighted.

Congratulations again on a wonderful victory. We support you completely in your efforts over the next four years, and we want to wish you and your family a very happy holiday season.

### Biographical Sketch

Jack Butler is the son of a Southern Baptist minister. He was born May 8, 1944, in Alligator, Mississippi, just off Highway 61 in the Mississippi Delta. It was in Clinton, Mississippi, as a high school sophomore, that he first began to write. He lettered in track in high school, and in track and cross country in college. He lived primarily in Arkansas for twenty-five years, since attending the University of Arkansas in the early days of its widely-recognized Creative Writing Program. In 1993, he moved to Santa Fe, New Mexico, to accept a position as Director of Creative Writing at the College of Santa Fe.

In the past, he has worked as a Southern Baptist preacher, a fried-pie salesman, an actuarial analyst, and the Assistant Dean of a college. The father of two girls, Lynnika and Sarah, Mr. Butler is now married to Jayme Tull, a native of Little Rock, Arkansas, and stepfather to her daughters, Catherine and Sherri. He enjoys running, swimming, basketball, camping, travel, physics, math, astronomy, drawing, and cooking (he writes a food column for the *Arkansas Times*). For light reading he prefers mystery and science fiction.

Mr. Butler is the author of six published books: *West of Hollywood* (poetry, August House, 1981); *Hawk Gumbo* (short fiction, August House, 1982); *The Kid Who Wanted to Be A Spaceman* (poetry, August House, 1984); *Jujitsu for Christ* (novel, August House, 1986; Penguin, 1987); *Nightshade* (novel, Atlantic Monthly Press, 1989; Paladin/Grafton, 1991); and *Living in Little Rock with Miss Little Rock* (novel, Knopf, 1993; Penguin, 1994; Abacus, 1994).

He has published poetry, short fiction, and reviews in many national journals, including *The New Yorker*, *New Orleans Review*, *Atlantic*, *The New York Times Book Review*, *Poetry*, and *The Los Angeles Times Book Review*. His reviews for *The New York Times Book Review* have included the works of such authors as Fannie Flagg (*Fried Green Tomatoes at the Whistlestop Cafe*) and Larry McMurtry (*Anything for Billy*.) His works have won numerous prizes and have been included in several anthologies, among them *The Made Thing: An Anthology of Contemporary Southern Poetry* (1985); *Formal Introductions* (forthcoming); *The Future of Southern Letters* (Oxford University Press, 1996); and the poetry and fiction volumes of *Mississippi Writers: Reflections of Childhood and Youth*.

*Jujitsu for Christ*, his first novel, was widely praised, receiving critical acclaim in *Village Voice*, *The New York Times Book Review*, *The New Yorker*, *The Los Angeles Times*, and many other publications. The book, which focuses on one family's tragedy during the Civil Rights movement in Mississippi in the early 1960's, was selected for a trade paper edition by the Penguin Contemporary American Fiction series. It has been optioned for the screen.

*Nightshade*, his second novel, again received raves--*The New York Times Book Review*, *The Washington Post*, *Wall Street Journal*, *Arkansas Gazette*, *Los Angeles Times Book Review*, and *Fort Lauderdale Sun*, among others, celebrated it as a tour de force. *Nightshade* was chosen as one of the best books of 1989 by *Connoisseur* magazine and *The New York Times Book Review*. The British edition (Paladin/Grafton) appeared in the spring of 1991.

*Living in Little Rock with Miss Little Rock*, his third novel, appeared with Alfred A. Knopf in April of 1993. The Viking/Penguin trade paper edition, again in the Contemporary American Fiction series, appeared in July of 1994. Two British editions have appeared, both by Little, Brown under their Abacus imprint, and sales are high in the United Kingdom. The novel was nominated for the 1993 Pulitzer Prize and the 1993 Pen/Faulkner award, and a selection from the book appeared in *Chicago Review* and was nominated for the Pushcart awards.

More recently, he has had two of his poems selected as among twelve finalists in the Howard Nemerov sonnet contest, has completed a third book of poetry, *The Lost Poems*, has read several times in the Barnes and Noble Poetry Series in Manhattan, has been featured as the lead interview in *Bloomsbury Review*, and has been featured at the annual conference of the European Association for American Studies.

Mr Butler is currently completing a fourth book of poems, *Short Stories*, and a fourth novel, *Dreamer*, which is set in Santa Fe, and which has been purchased by Sonny Mehta, Editor-in-Chief at Knopf. A collection of his food columns, *Mosey Froghead's Barbecue Sauce (and Other Recipes)* is forthcoming from Algonquin in 1997, and a collection of his poetic works, *New and Selected Poems*, is forthcoming from Story Line Press.

Dear Mr. President:

It looks like you and Hillary had a great time in Australia and the Philippines. Jill and I hope you both got some true rest and relaxation. As much as the two of you traveled the nation during the campaign, you earned some time to recharge. I spent many a day of "R&R" at Subic Bay when a young naval officer.

I have some good friends "down-under" who were eagerly awaiting your visit. They really love their country and always express a special affection for the United States, in large part because of our critical help during World War II, but also because they foresee a special linkage with us during the next decades as the Asian countries grow in power.

With nearly 70% of the Navy's budget being "tail" not "tooth," your next Navy Secretary will be expected to take a tough look at such expenditures and come up with feasible, often private sector-based alternatives.
- Naval Officer and Vietnam Veteran. I was trained as a Regular Midshipman at Ohio State University and immediately after being commissioned as an Ensign in 1964, served two tours of Vietnam duty, including participation in the second Gulf of Tonkin incident and the first raid of the war on Hanoi, less than two months after my graduation from OSU. Since 1994, Sallie Mae has not only "privatized" itself but, based in part on work I did, Sallie has started a new business of "outsourcing" higher education services. Sallie's stock price is now more than 2.5 times its level in 1994.

- Innovation. I have been an innovator in business, government, and politics. In business, I have helped form new small companies and designed new lines of business for major companies, such as Sallie Mae. In government, I have cleaned-up major fraud and abuse using novel techniques. In politics, along with Governor Dick Celeste, I founded a unique political action committee that trains and "contributes" young college students to political campaigns.

Using these experiences and skills, I helped design the Navy's new innovation program, which is currently beginning its second year at the Naval War College Strategic Studies Group.

- Loyal and energetic supporter. I have been a Democrat since my "conversion" by John Kennedy during the 1960 debates. I have worked actively in Ohio Democratic politics since my return to Ohio from Yale Law School in 1972.

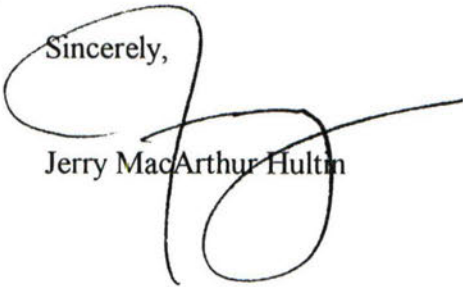

TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES:

I am returning herewith without my approval, H.R. 743, the "Teamwork for Employees and Managers Act of 1995." This act would undermine crucial employee protections.

I strongly support workplace practices that promote cooperative labor-management relations. In order for the United States to remain globally competitive into the next century, employees must recognize their stake in their employer's business, employers must value their employees' labor, and each must work in partnership with the other. Cooperative efforts, by promoting mutual trust and respect, can encourage innovation, improve productivity, and enhance the efficiency and performance of American workplaces.

Current law provides for a wide variety of cooperative workplace efforts. It permits employers to work with employees in quality circles to improve quality, efficiency, and productivity. Current law also allows employers to delegate significant managerial responsibilities to employee work teams, sponsor brainstorming sessions, and solicit employee suggestions and criticisms. Today, 30,000 workplaces across the country have employee involvement plans. According to one recent survey, 96 percent of large employers already have established such programs.

I strongly support further labor-management cooperation within the broad parameters allowed under current law. To the extent that recent National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) decisions have created uncertainty as to the scope of permissible cooperation, the NLRB, in the exercise of its independent authority, should provide guidance to clarify the broad legal boundaries of labor-management teamwork. The Congress rejected a more narrowly defined proposal designed to accomplish that objective.

Instead, this legislation, rather than promoting genuine teamwork, would undermine the system of collective bargaining that has served this country so well for many decades. It would

do this by allowing employers to establish company unions where no union currently exists and permitting company-dominated unions where employees are in the process of determining whether to be represented by a union. Rather than encouraging true workplace cooperation, this bill would abolish protections that ensure independent and democratic representation in the workplace.

True cooperative efforts must be based on true partnerships. A context of mutual trust and respect encourages the prospect for achieving workplace innovation, improved productivity, and enhanced efficiency and workplace performance. Any ambiguities in this situation should be resolved, but without weakening or eliminating the fundamental rights of employees to collective bargaining.

Dear Mr. President:

As we prepare for the 105th Congress, I am writing to let you know that I share your concern about the need to enact additional incremental health care reforms that build on the Kassebaum-Kennedy legislation Congress passed earlier this year.

To move the process forward, I will be introducing the "Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1997" on the first legislative day of the 105th Congress. My legislation contains a series of strategic changes to improve upon our current system in a responsible way without comprehensively overhauling the system. This bill is based in great part on legislation I have introduced since 1992, such as the "Health Care Assurance Act of 1995" (S. 18).

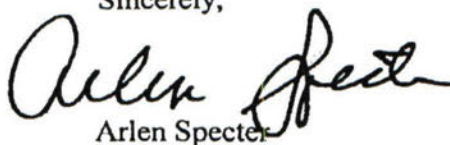
Given that our nation's children are our country's greatest resource, Title I of my legislation includes provisions creating federal vouchers for State programs to provide medical care to poor uninsured children. The States are called upon to design and implement the program in the way that would work best for them.

You have mentioned your desire to move forward with additional modest steps to improve upon our health care system, specifically noting the need for an approach to cover our nation's children. I wholeheartedly agree. As Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services and Education, I have worked to respond to children's health care needs and will continue to do whatever is possible through the appropriations process to help poor children receive the primary, preventive and acute health care services that are essential for their development into healthy adults. However, it is not enough to rely on the annual appropriations process; meaningful reforms on this vital issue require the enactment of carefully crafted authorizing legislation.

I have enclosed an executive summary and draft of my legislation for your review and comment. I am hopeful that your Administration will include a proposal to provide health care to poor uninsured children in its budget proposal for fiscal year 1998 and I am extremely interested in working with you on this important issue.

## Homeless in the Heart

When the word homeless is mentioned, one quickly pictures a poor soul huddled in a box, eating the few scraps of food they can find. Or a person too mentally imbalanced to lead a productive life in society, wandering down the street babbling in words only he or she can understand. In Jo Goodwin Parker's short story, "What is Poverty?", Parker tells her graphic and incisive experience with homelessness. She accounts the times when she had nothing to eat for herself, only her children. The hard nights on the street with the cold biting at her side, with no ability to warm herself, she curls up with her children in a cardboard box. The painful feeling of not being able to feed her children runs deep into the heart. This mother had no means of supporting herself or her children, but she valiantly continues to mother them in the best way she can. This woman felt so much humility and shame throughout her life, it is amazing she has any courage or strength left at all. Although her account was sad and full of despair, not all stories of homelessness are as shocking. Many families live in the same predicament with shelter. I have been a homeless child who lived in a community shelter. I too have shared the same fear and sadness, the shame of society, and the gained strength of independence from surviving the loss of my home.

My social status throughout my life has never been one of wealth, but far from poverty. My family lived in a beautiful country cottage for twelve years, while raising two boys and launching a prosperous business. We lived the American lifestyle. There was always dinner on the table, and presents under the tree at Christmas. Our needs and wants were always met.

When I was twelve my parents began suffering serious marital distress. Unable to resolve the issues that can sometimes never be resolved, my mother told my father to leave. With no other suitable and stable means of income my mother, brother, and I began to have financial problems. Unable to pay the rent, our landlord promptly served us with an eviction notice. Within thirty days we had nowhere to go, and nobody to turn to; reluctantly my abridged family moved into a nearby motel for a week. I recall that week as one of the most disorienting times in my life. When I came home to our motel room I had no bed to call my own, no kitchen to make myself a snack as we were living out of an ice box, and nothing to call my own anymore, just the bag that I came with. I constantly questioned my mother where we were going to move and she always replied, "I don't know son." Two days before our stay at the motel was up my mother told my brother and I that we were going to move into a family shelter in Santa Barbara. My heart sank into my shoes. Shelters were for people who lived in alleys. Shelters were for the people who had no family. Shelters were for people who had no place to go, and we had nowhere to go. Within two days we had moved our remaining valuable possessions into an eight by ten room. The shelter we moved into had five bedrooms crammed with bunk beds, clothes, and children. Each room housed a mother and her children, and a large restaurant style kitchen which served as our collective eatery. The floors were dirty, the kitchen smelled of rotting vegetables, but I was with my family and we were safe. The first night we were there I tried with all my might to decorate my room as if it were my home, but the walls felt as if they were cardboard, liable to disappear at any moment. I laid in bed that night, struggling with my emotions, and wondering if I would ever have a home again.

The next day while commuting to school , I tried to decide what I would tell my friends. How could I gracefully tell them, most of whom were all wealthy, that I had moved into a homeless shelter? I had never felt so much shame, and I had never felt so small. While my friends were going out to dinner every Friday night, I was at my dirty shelter cooking macaroni and cheese watching my brother and helping him with his homework. I could never leave him alone, or family services would come and take us both away from our mother. While my friends' parents were having dinner parties, my mother was out working extra hours to save for rent, and to put food on the table. Many nights I had to come home from school to baby-sit my brother while my mom was out. This made a social life completely unattainable. We were not allowed any visitors inside the shelter, so when friends came over, I shamefully told them to wait outside while I grabbed my things. They all asked where I lived and I told them I lived in an apartment complex, ashamed to tell them the truth. I had no extra money to spend on fun, as most of it was used on gas and maintenance on my car to get to school. My whole existence as a carefree teenager became the duty of a father to my brother, a confidant to my mother, and a starving student living in shame of his existence.

As time slowly passed by we became accustomed to the makeshift home we lived in. My mother continued saving money every day to move out, since we were only allowed six months to stay. I continued with school into my senior year, and was doing remarkably well. My brother, who used to be a shut in, began making friends at his new school in Santa Barbara. We trudged through day after day living in the shelter with screaming babies, and beaten wives, finding strength in places we never knew about. I began to cook more often, and enjoyed the simple satisfaction of serving my mother and brother dinner.

My mother became so strong and driven I couldn't help but to admire her courage and her grace in such a time of despair. My own strength grew as well and I began to see that everyone can have happiness if they choose to. I began to love the small family that lived in the shelter; the mothers, the babies, and the bond that we all shared by having nothing but one another. Coming towards the end of the sixth month, my mother found a home. She had finally saved enough money to move and our time in the shelter had come to an end. Six months of struggle, six months of humility, and six months of strength would now send us out into the world. Our dreams still intact, and our happiness soaring, we moved into our first house we could call our own.

Three years later I still look back upon that time in my life and smile. It was then when I truly found my strength and happiness. I had never been so close to my family until everything we had was taken from us. Becoming homeless can be the most horrible and humbling experience in a person's life, but it can also be the most empowering. Homelessness is not always bums on the sidewalk, it can be good decent families that have stumbled into hard times, unable to fight the power of money. My experience of being without a home was the most painful time in my life, but in a way it was the brightest. It was then I found myself and my strength. It was then when I found my family. It was when I had nothing, that I found everything. I will never forget our shelter on De La Vina street, and the person I found there

**A** FRIEND of President Bill Clinton and the head of Stet, Italy's state telecommunications company, have been drawn into an investigation into influence-peddling following a separate inquiry into the sale of forged securities and Weimar Republic Gold Bonds to the Russian government.

A magistrate in the Alpine town of Aosta last week formally notified Ernesto Pascale, Stet managing director, that he was under investigation for alleged membership of an illegal secret society that had attempted to interfere in the Italian democratic process.

The inquiry centres on the relationship between Pascale and Enzo De Chiara, a Washington businessman and consultant to Stet. Media reports have painted an alarming picture involving politicians, freemasons and secret service agents in a scandal that is ill-timed for Stet, due to be privatised early next year.

De Chiara, 61, is a friend of President Clinton and has acted as an informal White House foreign policy adviser. In the past he advised the US Republican Party. The Naples-born businessman, who became an American citizen in 1977, is accused by Aosta public prosecutor David Monti of having interfered in the selection of the interior minister in the 1994 government of prime minister Silvio Berlusconi, and of tip-

ping off a fraud suspect about a police phone tap.

The investigation began last year when a small-time criminal from Aosta was caught trying to sell three stolen certificates of deposit from the Banca di Roma, with a face value of L3-billion (\$2 million), to a Swiss businessman in the Swiss town of Martigny. Police phone taps identified an alleged network of conspirators involved in a L20,000bn fraud based on stolen and forged certificates of deposit and German Gold Bonds dating from the Weimar Republic, which were of doubtful validity.

Neither De Chiara nor Pascale are accused of being involved in the fraud. But they became caught up in a second strand of the inquiry involving allegations of illegal political lobbying as a result of contacts between De Chiara and an alleged participant in the fraud, Gianmario Ferramonti. De Chiara is charged with tipping off Ferramonti that his mobile phone was tapped.

The allegation that De Chiara helped influence the choice of interior minister is partly based on the testimony of Ferramonti. A computer expert and former director of a financial firm controlled by the Northern League, Ferramonti told magistrates in April that he had contributed to the choice of the Northern League's Roberto Maroni for the post "and in that regard I had meetings with the then

head of the police, Prefect Vincenzo Parisi, and with Enzo De Chiara".

Ferramonti said the unusual and unconstitutional procedure was because of the enormous personal influence of Parisi, while De Chiara's presence at the meetings was ascribed to his long relationship with Parisi and powerful US government contacts. Magistrates believe Pascale attended at least one of these meetings.

A 1982 law specifically outlaws membership of secret associations. It was passed after the discovery of the P2 masonic lodge, which infiltrated members into key sectors of the Italian state and is now widely considered to have been a conduit for US influence in Italy.

Prosecutor Monti evidently considered that the activities of De Chiara, Pascale and other unidentified associates violated the provisions of the law. In a statement on 31 October Pascale, 62, said the idea that he might have participated in a secret association was baseless fantasy. "I am flabbergasted. There is absolutely nothing secret about my life," he said.

The head of Stet, which has an annual turnover of L37,000bn and profits of L2,500bn, said he was ready to clear up the issue at any

time and would resign if he were unable to convince magistrates of the propriety of his behaviour. "I cannot refrain from pointing out the singular coincidence that all this should happen in a delicate phase of the privatisation of Stet," he said.

**P**ASCALE's discomfort stems from Stet's consultancy relationship with De Chiara, for which the Italo-American was paid \$75,000 a year, with the use of a suite at the Ambasciatori Hotel and a car and chauffeur when in Rome. The relationship dates back to when both men worked for Italcable, the long-distance telephone company now part of Stet subsidiary Telecom Italia.

De Chiara's services appear to have been much in demand. He has worked as consultant to Italian arms manufacturers such as Aermacchi and Intermarine USA, cementing his reputation for excellent secret service contacts on both sides of the Atlantic.

Until recently, he was paid \$390,000 a year by the state railway company Ferrovie dello Stato. Lorenzo Necci, the former rail managing director who hired him, has just been released into house arrest by anti-corruption magistrates in La Spezia. Necci is also under

investigation in Aosta.

Newspapers have reported that investigators have been unable to find any evidence of De Chiara's work in searches of Stet headquarters in Rome. "I have been unable to discover what he really did as a consultant," Monti told *The European* last week. "I have questioned directors of the companies and they have been unable to enlighten me."

The 41-year-old magistrate said it was unlikely that anyone could confirm whether De Chiara had worked for the US Central Intelligence Agency. He said: "It seems evident to me that people who work in connection with the arms industry inevitably have contacts with the secret services. The world of the economy is now the main priority for the intelligence services, and the greater part of their efforts are devoted to it."

Monti suggested that De Chiara may have been in contact with Ferramonti to keep an eye on his activities, which included an attempt to sell German Gold Bonds to Russia and contacts with a London-based US busi-

nessman thought to own some of the bonds worth around \$1.5bn. "If Germany finds the bonds being presented for redemption by individuals, that is one thing. It would be quite another if they were presented by the Russian government."

De Chiara denied that he had done anything wrong and attributed his Italian legal problems to false accusations made by Ferramonti in order to gain release from prison. Speaking on the telephone from Washington, he said: "Monti is a scavenger trying to find dirt. He will not find it in my case. There is no evidence that could be held against me in any court of justice in the world."

De Chiara, the former owner of Washington's prestigious Romeo and Juliet restaurant, confirmed that he had reported on a regular basis both to the US National Security Council and to President Clinton, but denied working for the CIA.

De Chiara said he was a telecommunications specialist and had been sending monthly reports to Stet despite being suspended as a result of the Aosta inquiry.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: JACK QUINN

SUBJECT: California Civil Rights Initiative  
(Prop 209) Litigation

This memorandum updates you on the status of the litigation challenging the "California Civil Rights Initiative" (CCRI), also known as Proposition 209, and the Justice Department's advice today to defer a decision about joining the litigation.

As you know, Prop. 209 was adopted by referendum on November 5, 1996. The referendum amends the California constitution to provide that governmental entities "shall not discriminate against or grant preferential treatment to any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin in the operation of public employment, public education or public contracting."

A number of civil rights groups have brought a challenge to CCRI in federal district court. On November 27th, Chief Judge Thelton Henderson issued a Temporary Restraining Order against implementation of CCRI, ruling that the plaintiffs had "demonstrated a strong probability of success on the merits" of their constitutional claim. A Preliminary Injunction hearing on the matter will be held on Monday, December 16th.

Numerous leaders in the civil rights community have urged the White House and the Justice Department to join the plaintiffs' case. The Justice Department had initially led us to believe that it favored intervention. However, based on advice just received from the Solicitor General, the Attorney General today concluded that a more thorough review of the difficult legal issues involved in this litigation is necessary before the Department can make a final recommendation. Consequently, the Department will not intervene in the case before the Preliminary Injunction hearing on Monday.

The gravamen of the plaintiffs' case is that CCRI is unconstitutional because the referendum makes it more difficult

for minorities and women, but not other groups (e.g., veterans), to petition state and local entities for the enactment of preference programs to protect their interests. The plaintiffs rely primarily on the Supreme Court's 1982 decision in Washington v. Seattle School District No. 1, which invalidated a statewide referendum in Washington that prohibited local school districts from engaging in student busing to promote racial integration, but provided numerous exceptions which allowed student busing for other purposes. The Supreme Court reasoned that the referendum imposed an unconstitutional and unique burden on minorities who were seeking busing for the purpose of racial integration since they were required to surmount a much higher political hurdle -- either petitioning the state legislature to overturn the referendum or seeking adoption of a referendum reversing the anti-busing proposition -- in order to achieve their goal. Persons seeking busing for other reasons, by contrast, bore no such burden.

Judge Henderson likened CCRI to the Seattle referendum and concluded that CCRI may very well also be unconstitutional. Like the Seattle referendum, CCRI imposes a higher political burden -- re-amending the state constitution -- on women and racial minorities when they seek affirmative action programs based on race or gender than on groups who seek other types of "preference" programs, such as those based on age, disability, veteran or legacy status, and so forth.

The Justice Department believes that, since the lower courts are bound by Seattle, the plaintiffs' chances up to the Circuit Court level are encouraging. Certainly, given Judge Henderson's ruling on the plaintiffs' TRO motion, it is very likely that, at least, the plaintiffs will prevail on their preliminary injunction motion. Until today, particularly in light of this likelihood of success at the lower court level, there was an inclination at the Department to join the litigation prior to the preliminary injunction hearing on December 16th.

However, the acting Solicitor General today expressed reservations about joining the case. Specifically, Mr. Dellinger has expressed doubts about the claim that CCRI is analogous to the referendum at issue in Seattle and about the continued validity of the Seattle decision itself. Dellinger has therefore urged caution in proceeding with this litigation until his concerns regarding the strength of the constitutional challenge to CCRI have been more fully considered.

In addition, there appears to be a consensus within the Department that it is unlikely that the current Supreme Court would invalidate CCRI even if the Court agreed that CCRI was similar to the referendum in Seattle. Although Justice Stevens voted with the majority in Seattle, Chief Justice Rehnquist and Justice O'Connor both dissented in the case. Justices Kennedy,

Scalia and Thomas are believed likely to vote with Rehnquist and O'Connor once this case is brought before them. Although this fact, in and of itself, does not compel a conclusion against Justice Department participation, it is a further reason to fully analyze the constitutional issues involved in this case before the Department proceeds.

[ The Attorney General therefore has determined that a short delay (from two to four weeks) in joining the CCRI litigation will not prejudice the Department's ability to join the case subsequent to the preliminary injunction stage. Thus, she has further concluded that the Department should not join the case prior to the December 16th preliminary injunction hearing, but that a decision as to whether or not the Department should join the case be made once the more thorough legal analysis now underway within the Department is finalized. I anticipate that this Justice Department review should be completed and the Department should be prepared to render a recommendation regarding the strength of our legal arguments within the next two weeks.
