Erskine Bowles' Meeting with Senate Democratic Caucus

On January 8, Erskine addressed the lunch meeting of the Senate Democratic Caucus. He set forth your priorities for the new Congress, as well as your commitment to their political needs as 1998 approaches. The senators took advantage of the opportunity to raise a number of issues, including the following:

(1) Robert Byrd: He strongly protested the Department of Justice's decision in the line-item veto litigation to challenge the standing of members of Congress to bring the constitutional suit at this time.

(2) Patrick Leahy, Joe Biden & Barbara Boxer: Each focused their comments on the importance of your appointments to the federal judiciary. Leahy praised the fact that 22 judicial nominations were sent up on the Senate's first day and urged you to keep up the pace of nominations. Biden stressed that the Republicans will continue to drag out the process and pleaded for the Administration to send up by June 30th nominations for all vacancies (now numbering about 90). Boxer noted that the Republicans had delayed terrific moderate judges, and pleaded that the White House not be distracted from this important task.

-- Erskine (and I) expressed your deep appreciation of the importance of these judicial appointments to the country, as well as to your legacy. We have asked Jack Quinn's office to develop a workable, written plan and timetable for nominating 100 judges by June 30th. We hope to forward that plan to you by the end of the week.

(3) Paul Wellstone, Barbara Boxer & Edward Kennedy: Each expressed concern about the possible impact of your proposed budget on the more vulnerable populations. In particular, Kennedy said he was working with Frank Raines on the education budget and SSI for children; Boxer focused on the need to exempt children and senior citizens from the newly-imposed citizenship requirements for federal benefits.

(4) John Kerry: In a private conversation with Susan Brophy and me, asked that you at least consider what would constitute a "palatable" balanced budget amendment.

(5) John Glenn: Expressed to Erskine in a private conversation that he might not run again. You may want to call Glenn to talk to him about this.

SUBJECT: LINE ITEM VETO ACT LITIGATION

This memorandum responds to your questions regarding the position the Department of Justice intends to take on the issue of the plaintiffs' standing in Senator Robert C. Byrd, et al. v. Franklin D. Raines, et al., the line item veto act case.

The statute expressly provides standing to Members of Congress or "any individual adversely affected." The Department of Justice's first line of reasoning in defending the statute is that, at the moment, no one at all has standing to sue because no one has been injured yet -- the President has not yet used the line item veto, and there are not even any bills currently pending for his signature or veto. But DOJ's argument goes even further: even though Congress purported to give its Members standing to sue regardless of whether they have been injured, Congress cannot simply deem its Members to have met the constitutional requirements of standing, including actual injury. This is a fundamental constitutional issue in two dimensions: first, Congress cannot overcome the Constitution by enacting a statute and second, the Constitution allows the courts to adjudicate only those disputes that are justiciable because, among other criteria, they are presented by proper parties.

A private party that could have standing, for example, would be a community college whose appropriation was struck by use of the line item veto. The community college could sue, and could challenge the constitutionality of the statute, and Members of Congress could participate as intervenors or as amici.

Regarding Congressional standing, it is not yet clear how high DOJ, in its brief, will place the injury bar (i.e., the point at which plaintiffs, from DOJ's perspective, have been injured and, therefore, have standing). DOJ plans to argue, at the very least, that there has been no injury until the vote of a Member of Congress has been nullified, in effect, by the President's exercise of the line item veto. DOJ may go further, however, and argue that nullification will not have occurred until Congress has failed to override the President's veto.

DOJ's motion to dismiss is due next Thursday, January 16. The plaintiffs must respond to that and file a motion for summary judgment on the merits by January 27. DOJ's response to the motion for summary judgment is due February 26, and oral argument is set for March 21.

Thanks for receiving the information I gave to you recently regarding Mack Statham. I suggested his name to you as a possible organist to play the Postlude at the end of the National Prayer Service on Monday, January 20, 1997. Apart from being an excellent musician, I suggested Dr. Statham for two additional reasons which I now want to bring to your attention.

First, Dr. Statham is local; he lives in Laurel. He wrote and performed a musical trilogy about the life of Dr. Martin Luther King ("Trilogy of Dreams"), and it was performed last year with the Baltimore Symphony. He is not a friend of mine, though I respect his work enormously, and regard him as a first rate musician. His postludes, many of which are original, at our church have been powerful, and have often evoked both ovations and tears of joy.

Second, Dr. Statham is Minister of Music at Asbury United Methodist Church. Asbury is a 160 years old downtown church with a predominantly African-American congregation. Its sanctuary is registered as a National Historic landmark, and it is one of the largest churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. More significantly, Asbury was born out of the Foundry United Methodist Church, which, if I am not mistaken, is the church in Washington most frequently attended by the President and First Lady. For many years prior to the Emancipation, black parishioners worshipped in the balcony of Foundry. At some point, the black worshippers began to outnumber the white ones, and the Methodist conference at that time made a land grant for the blacks to start and build their own church. Asbury has been a church home to a number of prominent national and local citizens, including Mary McLeod Bethune, Althea Gibson, Carol Thompson Cole, Clive Callender, among others. I say all of this to suggest that it would be an honor not just for Dr. Statham to render the postlude at the church service, but a source of pride for all Asburyans.

I do not know what relevance this will have on your decision, but I felt it important to catalog some of these thoughts. I hope that you will call upon Dr. Statham, but, if not, I appreciate the effort you have made to try.

Dear Mr. Stern:

I write at the suggestion of my father, Morton David Goldberg, the copyright lawyer, whom you may recall from your intellectual property days on the Hill and in Geneva at W.I.P.O.

I am Deputy Counsel to the Minority Leader of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. I've enjoyed working in this position both now and serving the same official just previously, with the fortuities of politics, in his capacity as Speaker of the House. My position has given me good additional experience in legislative affairs and parliamentary procedure, but I'd very much like to return to DC to work for the Clinton White House. I would be grateful if I might discuss career possibilities with you.

Working for the White House is, I know, a consuming job, but I'm fully committed to the concept of working long hours for the President and a Democratic Administration. It took a long time for us to win back the White House in 1992, and I'd regret not doing my modest part to assist in the Administration's success in the next four years.

While in DC, I worked for the DNC, Congressman Bart Gordon, the '88 Gore for President Campaign, and for a congressional campaign. Since passing the bar, I've had legal and policy responsibilities for the Pennsylvania Attorney General and now for Bill DeWeese, presently the House Minority Leader.

As Deputy Counsel, I assist in managing the floor business for the Leader, advise on parliamentary strategies and tactics for carrying it out, and explain the bills and amendments to members. When we are not in session, my focus is on policy planning and litigation that involves the caucus or affects its interests.

I know you receive many letters like this one. For that reason, I'd be especially appreciative if I might speak to you at whatever time would be least inconvenient for you. I will call you the week of January 13 to see if a time can be set up.
