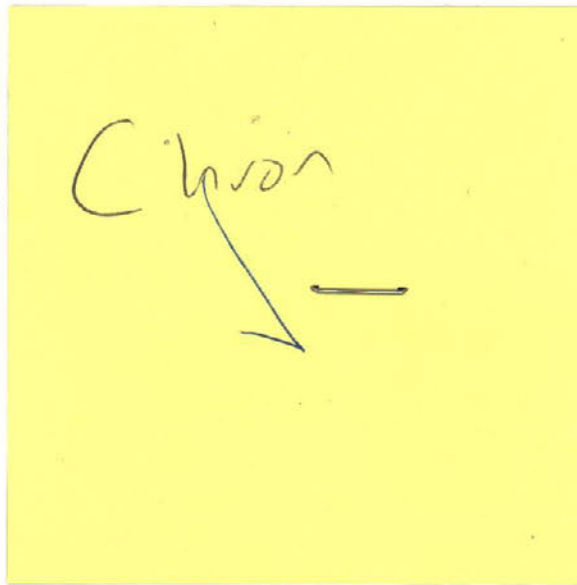

On April 14, 1997, the National Race for the Cure® will be reaching out to the community by having a family day at Camden Yards. The Baltimore Orioles have graciously agreed to name this day the "Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure Day at Camden Yards" in honor of our cause. This day will be dedicated to survivors, and as the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation is celebrating their 15th anniversary this year, they will be present at the event helping us celebrate life and survivorship. Survivors will be the guests of honor that day, participating in all events. The proceeds from the sale of tickets to this event will be dedicated to the fight against breast cancer by funding research, education and community programs.

The Baltimore Orioles will be playing the Minnesota Twins that day, stepping up to the plate for breast cancer and the Race for the Cure. This event will have multiple levels of participation including a family reception in the Bull Pen picnic area. Members of Congress, the Administration, baseball celebrities and sponsors will all be participating in this widely publicized event. What follows is a summary of the day's events and the areas where we would appreciate the participation of the President and his family.

Monday, April 14, 1997

- 3:00 p.m. The National Race for the Cure® will be holding a reception at Union Station for participants of this event. This reception will be for the President of the United States and his family, Members of Congress and the Administration who are Honorary members of the 1997 National Race for the Cure® Baseball Committee, retired and current baseball celebrities including Reggie Jackson and Joe DiMaggio, sponsors and ticket-holders of this event.
- 4:00 p.m. After the reception, the participants will take The National Race for the Cure train directly to Camden Yards.
- 5:00 p.m. Once at Camden Yards, a "Ball Park" style buffet dinner will be held at the Warehouse.
- 7:00 p.m. Participants will watch the game from private boxes on the Club Level of the Stadium donated to the Race by the Orioles and other private owners.
President Clinton and his family will watch the game from the President's box.
- 7:30 p.m. The game begins and the first ball will be thrown out by one of the baseball celebrities participating in the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure Day at Camden Yards. During the game, many of these retired and current players will meet and greet participants and ticket holders.

At the game, the National Race for the Cure® will present President Clinton with the "Virginia Kelly Grant" given in honor of his mother who passed away from breast cancer.

Participants will be transported back to Union Station by train after the game. The National Race for the Cure® would be honored to have President Clinton and his family's participation in the day's activities.

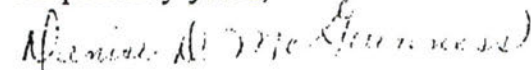

We applaud your leadership in highlighting the central role federally funded research must play in preparing the nation for the twenty-first century. Your commitment to preserve and strengthen America's leadership in science and technology, voiced repeatedly and with growing force in recent months, is deeply appreciated.

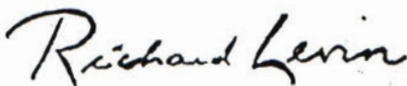
As you know, our nation's current economic and strategic pre-eminence is due in large part to the historic partnership forged more than fifty years ago between the federal government and universities across the nation. Federally funded research at academic institutions has spawned entire industries, spurred American competitive success and immeasurably improved living standards in the United States.

Like you, we believe America's global leadership in science and technology is at risk. We are referring to the threats posed by projected sharp federal research budget cuts and reduced U.S. private sector investment in all but the most immediate-range research. Unless these trends are reversed, our major international competitors will, in only a few years, overtake the U.S. in absolute dollar as well as per capita investment in R&D. We are equally concerned that the very foundation of America's dominance in science and technology -- the federal-university partnership -- has grown fragile. If this enterprise were to be seriously weakened, it would take decades to rebuild the infrastructure of laboratories and instrumentation and to overcome the loss of an entire generation of highly-trained young scientists and engineers.

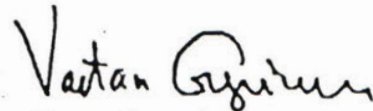
We would like to assemble a small group, composed of business leaders as well as scientists and university presidents, to meet with you in December, or at your earliest convenience, to discuss these threats and the steps necessary to sustain U.S. scientific and technological pre-eminence into the next century. President Levin, on our behalf, would be pleased to discuss this request in greater detail with your staff.

Again, thank you for making research such a strong personal and national priority.

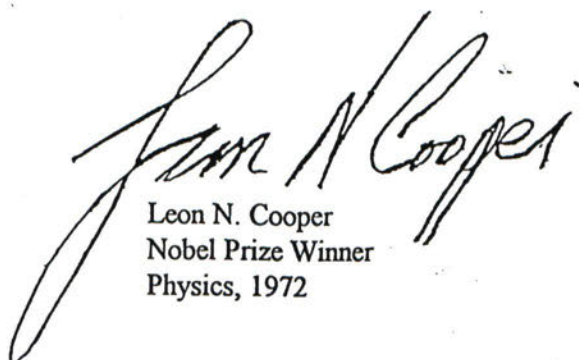

To this end, I do intend to consult with leaders of the university and business communities, both to help chart our course and to help reestablish bipartisan commitment across our science, technology, and education portfolio. I appreciate very much the willingness of the Association of American Universities to participate in that process. The Administration will certainly draw upon your expertise over the next several months in pursuit of our common goals.

Dear Mr. President,

How are you my friend? We send our love to you and your family.

To borrow a theme from John Lennon, "Imagine" what would happen if marijuana were legal, or at least decriminalized, and you could concentrate all your efforts on destroying those substances that truly harm our citizens. Imagine this Mr. President, and have the courage to make it happen.

Linda Moore suggested I write to you regarding this matter. The purpose of this letter is two-fold: I am writing to introduce you to the East Lake Community Foundation and our mission and goals in the Atlanta community. Secondly, I am asking for the President's support and endorsement of an annual event we are beginning in the fall of this year, The East Lake Charity Classic.

In 1994, the East Lake Community Foundation began its dream of uniting the three separate worlds of the East Lake community; the historic East Lake Golf Club, home course of golfing legend Bobby Jones (and site of the 1998 TOUR Championship and 2001 U.S. Amateur); the surrounding neighborhood of single family homes and East Lake Meadows, a dense, isolated and poorly constructed public housing project. Through their efforts, the ELCF has purchased the East Lake Golf Club, restored the clubhouse and golf course to its original pristine condition and have created a memorial to Bobby Jones. More importantly, they have linked the Club to the community by pledging to contribute its surplus cash flow to fund long-term neighborhood programs.

The Foundation has formed a joint-venture with the Atlanta Housing Authority to tear down the current housing project and construct a more economically viable, mixed-income housing community. A golf and tennis academy, as well as a caddie program have already begun and are showing outstanding acceptance amongst the neighborhood youth. We believe the Foundation is bringing new hope, education, ingenuity and work ethic back into the community.

First, the historic East Lake Golf Club, home course of golfing legend Bobby Jones and one of the great golf courses in the world. 2. *Re-define public housing.* In a first of its kind, the East Lake Community Foundation has formed a joint-venture with the Atlanta Housing Authority to tear down the East Lake Meadows housing project, and replace it with an economically viable, mixed-income housing community (50% public housing and 50% market units). The affordable housing community will be constructed over a 175-acre site that includes a new 18-hole public golf course, tennis courts, parks, a YMCA, and an elementary school.
3. *Re-establish community programs.* The East Lake Community Foundation will fund and operate support programs focused on neighborhood children, designed to permanently break the cycle of poverty. The public golf course, tennis courts, YMCA and elementary school will all be sites of innovative after-school educational and recreational programs.

In addition, the Foundation's spiritual life initiative will strengthen the outreach programs of neighborhood religious institutions. And in partnership with the Atlanta Board of Education, the Foundation's educational initiative will work to strengthen the five neighborhood schools.

Most of the money necessary for the project is already in hand. Together the Atlanta Housing Authority (through a \$32.5 million HUD grant) and respected private developers will contribute at least \$65 million for the housing component. Important to me is that the private developers will construct and manage all the housing units — both public and private.

Tom Cousins' charitable foundation has already made a lead grant of \$15 million to restore the golf club.

The East Lake Community Foundation, which will be responsible for the educational, social service, spiritual and recreational programs is now turning to a small group of committed corporate citizens to complete the project. Within a year, our goal is to raise \$25 million from these socially responsible corporations.

I invite you to become one of just 100 national companies that will join the East Lake Golf Club and contribute to the East Lake Community Foundation. The East Lake Junior Golf Academy, modeled after the pioneering Chi Chi Rodriguez Youth Academy in Clearwater, Florida, will be located at the new golf course that will form the centerpiece of the mixed-income housing community. Young people will receive not only golf instruction, but tutoring and mentoring from professional teachers.

JUNIOR TENNIS ACADEMY

A Junior Tennis Academy will be held in a new, state-of-the-art tennis center. Like the Golf Academy, the Tennis Academy is first and foremost an educational program. Each day, tennis instruction will begin only after homework is completed.

CADDIE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Young people from the neighborhood will have the opportunity to receive caddie training at the Golf Club. Boys and girls 14 and over learn golf from the ground up—and earn money in the process. Like the academies, the caddie program makes academic performance a top priority and provides help with school work. Through the Western Golf Association, every young East Lake caddie will be eligible for a four-year college scholarship.

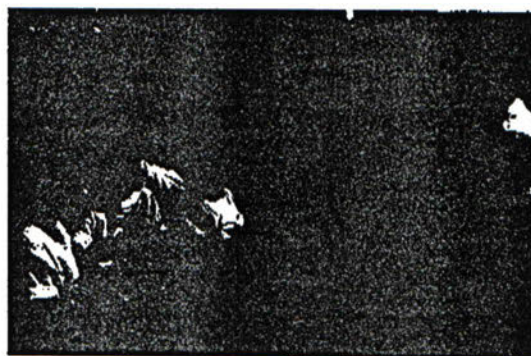
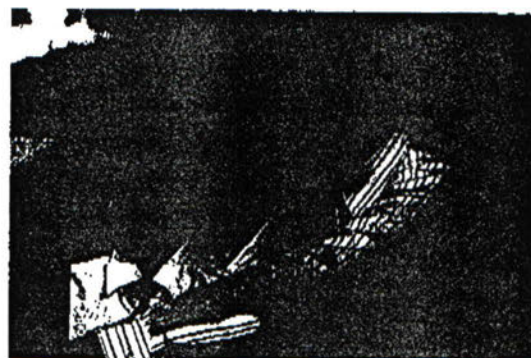

I hope you remember me from Little Rock/Pine Bluff where I first knew you when you served with the Voter Education Bureau. Wiley and Lucille Branton were my best friends until his tragic death a couple of years ago. Talked with Lucille in Atlanta recently on the phone.

I taught at Arkansas AM&N College during the early 1960's and after completing the doctorate at the University of Arkansas, I came back to North Carolina A&T State University in 1962 as full professor of English and later established the department of speech and theater arts.

I served in that capacity for a total of 23 years before taking a disability retirement in 1981. However, during my tenure at A&T, I founded and directed the Paul Robeson Theater for eleven years. Concurrently, I founded the Carolina Peacemaker, Guilford County's African-American community newspaper on April 4, 1967, one year to the day before Dr. King was assassinated. This newspaper has won a number of national awards for excellence and has published each week without a hiatus since its first edition. But let me get to the point because I know you are a very busy man.

I want you to use your good offices and influence with President Bill Clinton to persuade him to come to Greensboro to speak at our 30th Anniversary Celebration of the establishment of the Carolina Peacemaker. The Peacemaker was the first newspaper in the nation to come out editorially for Bill Clinton as President of the United States when he was the keynote at the State Democratic Party Convention held in Raleigh back in 1988. He was still Governor of the State of Arkansas.

This, then, is the essence of my letter to you. I phoned you last week and talked to your secretary. You were out to lunch. Please let the president know that this would be a crucial opportunity for him to express his domestic policy to the nation.

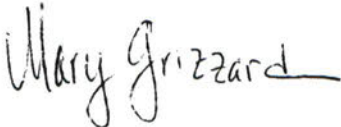

Were you to make me your Ambassador, the Mexican political cultural elite would perceive the appointment of an especially well-qualified personal friend of long-standing as a particularly significant gesture of appreciation and recognition by your administration of their not inconsiderable efforts.
- I have complete fluency in Spanish, with a perceptible Mexican accent appropriate to this role. My time as a visiting professor at The National University of Mexico (UNAM), and some 45 publications to my credit, have established my name as a cultural historian in Mexico and elsewhere in Latin America.
- I am experienced in the United States government interagency process, and while at the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA) I was a successful facilitator of U.S. policy on numerous occasions. As you know, I have a Ph.D. in Spanish History, with 15 years experience teaching Latin American studies, including a successful experience of working with representatives of the government of Mexico and its academic counterparts.
- Ever since my first scholarship in Mexico, at the age of 15 (awarded by Henry Cisneros' grandfather), I have remained in contact with a number of families, who, over the years, have played a dominant role in Mexican politics. In the last presidential elective cycle, three of the four candidates were known to me personally and professionally. While I do not know President Zedillo, I know others in the relatively small circle of the Mexican

elite who know him well, and would vouch for me as an intelligent and perceptive observer of the Mexican scene for over 35 years.

- You should know that I went through a complete background investigation three years ago, and received a Top Secret clearance to work as a Senior Fellow at ACDA. This is a round-about way of saying that there are no skeletons in my closet!
- With my background, experience, and languages, I particularly feel that I am playing to my strengths in Mexico, as well as elsewhere in Latin America.

SUBJECT: *Golden Venture* detainees

You are scheduled to meet with Rep. Bill Goodling tomorrow at 12:30 pm to talk about education issues, but the *Golden Venture* matter could come up. The attached memo from Sandy Berger recommends that you approve the supervised release of the 57 Chinese immigrants remaining in custody. *You don't have to decide this tonight, but we wanted you to see it in case you wanted to make a decision, or wanted to discuss it before the meeting.*

Background. In August 1996, Tony Lake sought your approval of a "supervised release" program for the detainees -- they would be released to responsible persons who would post bail until the cases were resolved. Tony, Carol Rasco and George all favored this option. Based on a note you wrote to Leon in September, you were inclined to go with this option as well, but asked Leon his opinion. A February 3, *New York Times* article summarized the situation and you asked Sandy, "I thought we were going to do something about this."

Immigration bill. The immigration bill was part of the Omnibus Appropriations Act you signed on September 30. The bill contained a provision making aliens with a well-founded fear of persecution based on coercive family planning practices eligible for asylum. This replaced the administrative scheme you approved in 1994.

Options. Sandy's memo presents two options: 1) *Keep detainees in detention* (supported by State, DoD and Coast Guard). Proponents of this option argue that releasing them could encourage future smuggling as our policy is to detain smuggled aliens until the end of their detention. They also argue that some of the detainees could flee and that they are unlikely to prevail on their asylum claims as the INS already denied asylum under the administrative regime you established in 1994 now codified. 2) *Permit supervised release* pending final resolution of their cases (supported by Sandy and John Podesta, and Tony, Carol and George last fall -- we haven't heard from Rahm yet). Supporters of this option argue that the exceptional length of detention justifies a humanitarian response and that, if not released, they are likely to remain in detention for a significant amount of time while their appeals are heard under the new law. Also, supporters note that supervised release will not undermine our deterrence policy because the prolonged detention has already provided such an effect as will the new "expedited exclusion provisions" of the immigration law that eliminates several avenues of appeal for smuggled aliens. Finally, these detainees are not likely to flee if released -- to date, 40 detainees have been paroled on various grounds and all have been showing up for their court interviews, most likely because of the strong community bonds they've established.

SUBJECT: *Golden Venture Detainees*

Purpose

To decide whether to parole the *Golden Venture* detainees and place them under supervised release.

Background

Status of Golden Venture Detainees: A total of 55 migrants from the *Golden Venture* -- 52 men and 3 women -- currently remain in detention. Their asylum claims were rejected by the immigration courts, and the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) subsequently found that they did not qualify under its humanitarian relief program for victims of -- or those threatened by -- coercive family planning. Most of the detainees now have habeas claims in federal courts. In all but four cases, the claims are based on fear of coercive family planning practices.

Impact of Immigration Bill: When the migrants' claims were rejected by the immigration courts, fear of coercive family planning practices did not constitute a recognized basis for asylum. *This was changed by the recently enacted immigration bill.* As a result the INS has agreed that many of the asylum cases should be reconsidered under the terms of the new law. However, the INS has not agreed to the demand of the detainees' advocates and supporters that all migrants be released pending disposition of their cases. Press, congressional and public interest has been rekindled by this change in the law. (Twenty-eight Members of Congress have written urging release, including Representatives Goodling, Gilman, Hyde, Smith, Berman and Pelosi).

Discussion

Arguments in Favor of Maintaining in Detention (Option supported by the Departments of Justice and State and by the Coast Guard.)

- Releasing the detainees could encourage future smuggling. An element of our strategy to deter smuggling has been to detain smuggled aliens until the end of their exclusion proceedings. Releasing the migrants could undermine this strategy, which has been largely successful. While we have detained the *Golden Venture* migrants for over three years, this is a result of their repeated legal challenges; releasing them would encourage use of such tactics to soften the Administration's resolve.
- If released, a number of migrants are likely to flee in order to avoid deportation.
- The detainees are unlikely to prevail on their asylum claims. The INS already determined that the aliens remaining in detention did not qualify under its administrative relief program, which was designed to protect persons with well-founded fears of return to coercive family planning practices. Most are therefore unlikely to be granted asylum when their cases are reheard by immigration courts under the new law.

Argument in Favor of Supervised Release (Option supported by NSC)

- The exceptional length of detention justifies a humanitarian response. Because of the legal issues raised by the aliens (which involved allegations of political interference that ultimately were rejected), they have now spent over three and a half years in detention. This far exceeds the 62-day average time for similarly situated illegal aliens. Indeed, the INS is unaware of any other noncriminal alien currently in detention who has been held for over three years awaiting termination of his exclusion proceedings.
- If not released, the migrants are likely to remain in detention for a significant amount of time. Because of the asylum provision in the immigration bill, the detainees will reopen their cases which once again will make their way before immigration judges, the Board of Immigration Appeals and federal district courts if necessary -- a process that could take several months at a minimum.
- Releasing the migrants will not undermine our deterrence policy. Much of the desired deterrent effect has been achieved by the prolonged detention period. More importantly, the expedited exclusion provisions of the new immigration bill provide us with long-sought ability to hasten the processing of illegal migrants by eliminating several avenues of legal appeal. Beginning April 1, 1997, undocumented illegal

migrants will be processed in a matter of weeks. This change should more than outweigh any possible loss of deterrence due to the release of the 55 detainees.

- Precedent suggests that the detainees will not abscond if released. To date, over 40 *Golden Venture* detainees have been paroled on various grounds and placed under supervised release. INS reports that unlike other Chinese migrants, all have been showing up for their court interviews. Advocates attribute this difference in behavior to the community bonds the *Golden Venture* detainees have established over time.

RECOMMENDATION

On balance, we believe there no longer exists a policy reason for maintaining the aliens in detention sufficient to outweigh our humanitarian concerns given that our deterrence goals can be achieved by implementing the new expedited exclusion provisions. Therefore, we recommend that the detainees be released subject to reasonable conditions and pending final resolution of the deportation cases.

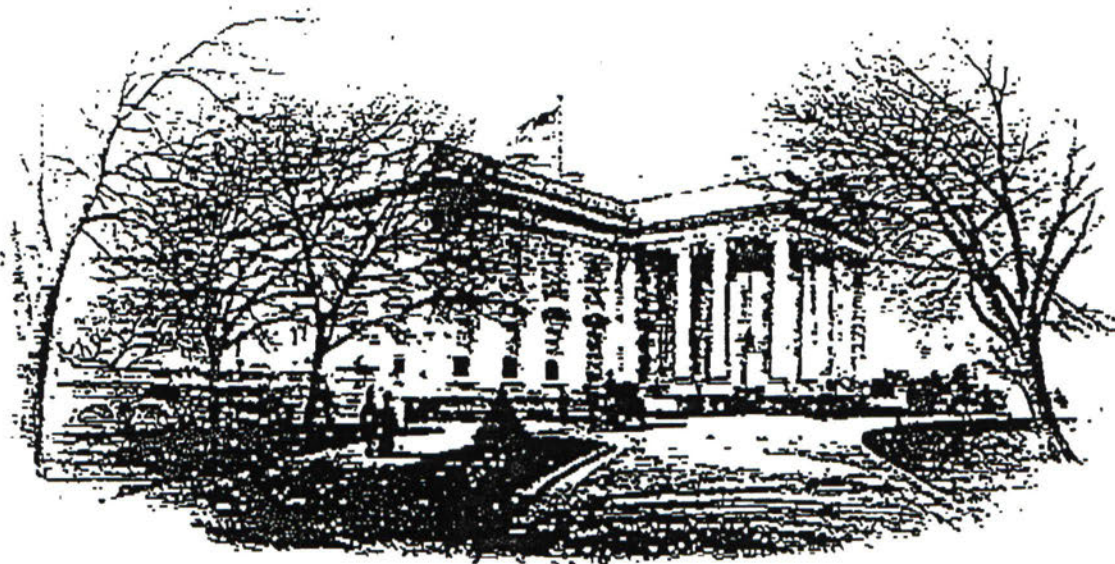

I am writing to request your immediate intervention in the labor dispute between American Airlines (American) and the Allied Pilots Association (APA).

With a strike threat set for Saturday, February 15th, the potential exists for economic losses in New York City, as well as other major urban centers with busy airports that serve as international gateways and domestic hubs. Across the nation, hundreds of thousands of jobs are supported, directly and indirectly, by American's operations. The vital economic sectors of commerce, trade, and tourism are heavily dependent on American's network of passenger and cargo service.

A study released by American last week estimated that a 60-day strike would cause a loss of \$5 billion to the nation's economy in lost wages, reduced spending by employees and suppliers, lost tourism, and decreased tax revenues.

American is the dominant carrier between New York and Los Angeles, the nation's busiest long-haul domestic route. It is also the leading airline from New York to Miami, San Juan, and Dallas. At John F. Kennedy International Airport, American is the largest domestic carrier, accounting for 27 percent of domestic arrival capacity, along with almost 17 percent of international traffic. American is also one of the top three airlines at LaGuardia Airport.
