FOREWORD
PUBLIC PAPERS OF THE PRESIDENT
JULY THROUGH DECEMBER 1995

The period from July through December 1995 was an exceptional time. On fundamental issues -- the role of Government, our role in the world, and how we can build a strong American community -- our people came together after intense debate to forge new approaches that applied our enduring values to the challenges of new times.

During this period, the American people engaged in a great national debate about how best to balance the budget. I proposed and fought for a plan to balance the budget in a way that reflected our values, by strengthening Medicare, Medicaid, education, and the environment. The congressional majority put forward a plan that I believed did not honor our fundamental values; I vetoed that plan. By year's end, after the congressional majority twice shut down the Government, it was clear that the American people had rallied to our view. We need a smaller Government, but one strong enough to give people the tools to make the most of their own lives.

America also decisively reasserted its role as the world's indispensable nation. On my remarkable trip to Northern Ireland and Ireland -- and to Jerusalem, for the funeral of Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin -- Americans were once again reminded of our unique obligation to lead and to be a force for peace where possible. And in Bosnia, America led the way to bring to an end the bloodiest conflict in Europe since World War II. By committing our troops to help maintain the peace in Bosnia, we recommitted ourselves to being the world's strongest force for peace, freedom, and prosperity.

Perhaps most important, this was a time when we worked to find common ground and bridge the intense divisions of race, religion, and geography that threaten to pull us apart. In a series of speeches, I called on Americans to find common ground. At Georgetown University, I urged a new tone of civility based on the common values that bind us together. In speeches on affirmative action at the National Archives in Washington and in Austin, Texas, I called on all Americans to clean their house of the racism that is still too real among us. And I spoke about the proper role of religion in our lives and communities, arguing that our schools need not be prayer-free zones.

The closing months of 1995 set the course for how our Nation can move confidently toward the 21st century. By holding true to our values -- opportunity for all, responsibility from all, and building a strong American community -- our Nation passed through this moment of decision stronger than ever before.

Foreword

The first half of 1995 was a time of challenge and change. The election of a new Republican Congress set the stage for a fundamental public debate over the role of government, the country's values, and the way we could move forward as one people. Throughout this debate, I remained firmly committed to this ideal: America is strong only when America is united, and when we leave no one behind.

As I made clear in my State of the Union Address, we have an obligation to offer the American people a new kind of government for new times. My Administration recognizes that there isn't a program for every problem, but that we can produce a government that works better and costs less. We launched a top-to-bottom overhaul of Federal rules in an effort to bring common sense to often complex regulation. We streamlined the regulatory process by abolishing 16,000 pages of regulations. We reformed environmental workplace safety and pharmaceutical regulation and we trimmed red tape and business burdens, without hurting public safety and health. We eliminated the 10,000 page Federal personnel manual and we cut 136,000 positions from the Federal work force.

As we celebrated the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II in Europe, we reaffirmed our commitment to lead for peace and freedom. At a summit meeting in Russia, I joined the Russian leader in advancing the security of our people and the world—by deepening our common efforts to reduce the nuclear threat, agreeing to improve our cooperation against terrorism, and pledging to work as partners for an undivided Europe. In Haiti, I thanked our troops for securing the transition from dictatorship to democracy. And at the 50th anniversary of the United Nations, we took stock of half a century of achievement and pledged to adapt the UN for the challenges of the 21st century.

Pursuing our mission to create a safer world, the United States led the international effort among 170 countries to secure the indefinite and unconditional extension of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. And by applying steady, patient pressure to North Korea, we secured an agreement that froze its dangerous nuclear program.

In furthering our commitment to open markets and expand opportunities for U.S. exports, we reached an historic agreement with Japan to open further its automotive market to potentially billions of dollars worth of American cars and parts.

In April, our Nation was shaken by the tragic terrorist bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City. One hundred sixty-eight Americans lost their lives. But moments of tragedy often bring out the best in people, and thousands of Americans turned their energy and prayers toward helping the people of Oklahoma endure and overcome their enormous loss.

Finally, in June, I introduced a balanced budget plan that reflected the values of the American people: opportunity, responsibility, the duty we owe one another, strong families, a strong America. This plan built on our success in reducing the deficit by nearly one half during the first two and one-half years of my Administration. This reflected an attempt to reach out to the Congress and find common ground on the budget. And it set the stage for a climactic debate: not about whether to balance the budget, but how.

Foreword

During the second half of 1994, America continued to move forward to help strengthen the American Dream of prosperity here at home and help spread peace and democracy around the world.

The American people saw the rewards that grew out of our efforts in the first 18 months of my Administration. Economic growth increased in strength, and the number of new jobs created during my Administration rose to 4.7 million. After 6 years of delay, the American people had a Crime Bill, which will put 100,000 police officers on our streets and take 19 deadly assault weapons off the street. We saw our National Service initiative become a reality as I swore in the first 20,000 AmeriCorps members, giving them the opportunity to serve their country and to earn money for their education. I signed the Community Development Banking and Financial Institutions Act of 1994, which will make capital available to Americans who have been denied access to basic banking services for far too long.

As we gave our citizens the means to make America stronger at home, we also continued our efforts to assert American leadership in the world. The Congress passed and I signed the implementing legislation for the Uruguay Round Agreement of the GATT, the most comprehensive international trade agreement in history. It helped to put in place expanded export opportunities for American products that will create more jobs and produce higher incomes for our people for years to come. I travelled to Indonesia for a meeting of the Asian Pacific Economic Cooperation forum in order to expand free trade with the world's most dynamic economies. In December, at the Summit of the Americas in Miami, the leaders of the 34 democratically elected countries in this hemisphere agreed to negotiate on a free trade area for the Americas by 2005, to work together to preserve our natural resources, and to advance democracy and social justice, holding out promise of greater prosperity throughout the hemisphere.

The United States also continued to help bring an end to ancient disputes around the world. We actively supported the efforts of the people of Northern Ireland to work toward a peaceful resolution after many years of conflict. Building on our work to bring peace to the Middle East, I had the great privilege to witness the signing of an historic peace treaty between Israel and Jordan. And closer to home, in our own hemisphere, America took active steps to promote democracy. Our Armed Forces again proved their strength, flexibility, and devotion to freedom as they helped give a second chance to the long-suffering people of Haiti, and renewed hope to freedom-loving people throughout the world.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan made his semi-annual "Humphrey-Hawkins" testimony to the Senate Banking Committee today. Although an immediate action is unlikely, Greenspan explicitly stated that a preemptive monetary tightening could be necessary to prevent inflation from rising. He also voiced more caution about the rapid rise in the stock market than he has in the past. Financial markets reacted with higher interest rates and falling stock prices.

The potential need for a preemptive increase in interest rates. Although Chairman Greenspan acknowledged that the economy has recently been able to operate at lower unemployment rates than in the past, he cautioned that the effect may only last as long as anxious workers are willing to trade wage gains for employment security. If demand remains strong, workers will eventually press for greater wage increases. The FOMC, according to Greenspan, is watching for signs either that demand is picking up or that the more conventional relationship between unemployment and inflation is reasserting itself. Because of the lags in the effectiveness of monetary policy, he argued that it is important to prevent inflation from increasing, rather than waiting to lower it until after it has already picked up. Greenspan did, however, hint that with the current high real Federal funds rate any tightening would be much smaller than the 300 basis point increase between February 1994 and February 1995.

The possible overvaluation of the stock market. Chairman Greenspan devoted almost one-quarter of his testimony to the question of whether the stock market is overvalued. Stock market prices are high because of optimistic long-term earnings projections and a perception of reduced risk throughout the financial markets. Although Greenspan thinks that a case can be made that the fundamentals justify the current level of the stock market, he was clearly warning investors that we have not "repealed" the business cycle. Greenspan's concern about the possible overvaluation of the stock market stems from his observation that investment bubbles have historically been one of the two main causes of an end to economic expansions (the other is inventory buildups which are not a threat to the current expansion).

Long-term interest rates rose sharply; the stock market fell. The interest rate on 10-year Treasury notes rose 16 basis points, the largest one-day rise since July 1996. The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 55.03 points. The Federal funds futures market suggests that traders sharply revised up their expectation of a moderate tightening by the Federal Reserve by July. The market continues to see little chance of tightening at the next FOMC meeting on March 25th.

Dear Mr. President:

I had the honor and privilege of serving as your special adviser for Cuba from May 1995 until April 1996. When we met to discuss your response to the downing of two unarmed civilian aircraft by Cuban MiGs in February 1996, you joked about how challenging it is to work on Cuban issues. Yet, I was proud to have the opportunity to serve you in advancing the prospects for a peaceful, democratic transition in Cuba and never regretted taking the assignment.

That is why I write now with deep sadness to inform you of my decision to resign in protest from your Administration. I left my position as your special adviser willingly when it became clear to me that I could no longer advance the cause of democracy in Cuba. But I leave your Administration unwillingly, because of an action by the CIA to exact revenge on me for my part in the revelations by Senator Robert Torricelli about CIA misconduct in Guatemala.

I want you to know Mr. President that I acted to protect your policies and the national interest when I informed then-Congressman Torricelli in March 1995 that the CIA had misled me and the Congress about its involvement in the murder of an American citizen and the husband of an American citizen. Despite the conclusions of the Star Chamber proceedings to which I have been subjected, I faced no easy choices in March 1995. I had given my word to the Congress that your Administration was not covering up wrongdoing in Guatemala. When it became clear to me that the CIA was, I felt obliged to tell the truth to the people's elected representatives. I made a choice that was consistent with the values of your Administration and the law, and gave Congress the ability to provide real oversight of intelligence activities. For that act of conscience the CIA is being allowed to end my service in your Administration.

Mr. President, the United States is a "witness of honor" to the Guatemalan peace process. There were no interests of our country in 1994 and 1995 that justified the withholding of critical information from your ambassador to Guatemala and

from senior officials here in Washington about the participation of CIA assets in human rights abuses. You still do not know the full truth about this matter because the CIA continues to value the protection of its assets over adherence to the policies that you have articulated. The CIA refuses to recognize that the "friends" it acquired during the Cold War are now the principal enemies of the policies of democracy and human rights that you placed at the center of our policy toward Latin America and the Caribbean.

I also want you to know that to avoid embarrassing the Administration I refrained for many months from defending myself publicly against the specious allegations made about my conduct by the CIA, the Justice Department, the State Department's Inspector General, and the chairman of the House Intelligence Committee. I only spoke out when it became clear to me this past fall that I would be given no due process by the CIA. After the CIA took its revenge, denying me the possibility of continuing to work on foreign policy issues for you, I tried again to avoid public criticism of the Administration by offering to resign if you would restore my clearance, or to accept an appointment to a domestic policy position if it were a clear promotion and, therefore, a rejection of the CIA's vindictive action. Neither of these compromises were pursued effectively by your advisers.

I leave your Administration to join Senator Torricelli in an effort to achieve real reform at the CIA. Senator Torricelli has offered me the opportunity to continue to work on foreign policy when the CIA hoped to end my career. Senator Torricelli has stood with me and defended me and my reputation. Your Administration has not. I believed that in taking on such controversial assignments as Cuba and Guatemala I could count on my Administration when the inevitable controversies arose. I was mistaken.

Observers and retired CIA officers refer euphemistically to "morale" problems at the CIA. The public criticism by the CIA's Operations Directorate of CIA leadership and its rejection of attempts to reign in the participation of CIA assets in systematic human rights violations are not symptoms of morale problems, but of mutiny. The Directorate is rebelling against the policies of your Administration. The denial of my SCI access is but a minor trophy in this resistance to change. If you do not take decisive steps to bring the Agency under control, far graver damage to our democracy will result than the denial of a clearance to one individual.
