FRC began in 1994, and the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), a major source of funding for this program, has stated that FRC is one of the most successful programs of its kind in the nation and it is used as a model for CSAT's twenty other programs.

While success rates in substance abuse treatment programs are traditionally low, *an average below 30%, the program at FRC is consistent at 44% for women who complete the twelve month program and transition into the community..*

Since 1994:

- 33 babies have been born drug free
- 176 women have participated in the program
- 158 children have received care
- 35 women have successfully graduated and transitioned into the community

SUBJECT: Military Retirement Benefits

You recently sent me a note to have someone evaluate an idea suggested by Janet Cohen that a 401(k) plan be established for military personnel. Initial discussions of the idea with OMB and DOD suggest that creating such a plan probably would require legislation, which might be difficult to gain. However, the idea is worth exploring and I have asked DOD to prepare an assessment of the costs and benefits of a 401(k) plan for military personnel. Frank Raines and I will review that assessment and send you a recommendation on whether or not we should submit to the Congress a legislative proposal for such a plan.
