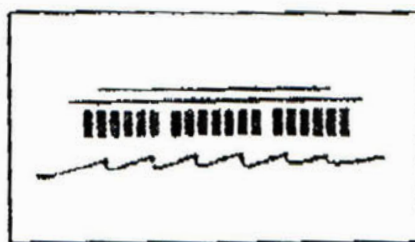

Memo to the President
to the President

- 1.0. We value highly the fact that President Clinton is visiting the African Continent, including South Africa.
- 2.0. We believe that this historic first by a US President presents a unique opportunity for the United States to place itself among those who stand in the forefront as supporters of the peoples of Africa in their struggle to bring about an African Renaissance.
- 3.0. The African Continent poses the greatest development challenge among all regions of the world. The President's African visit would present the appropriate setting for the US Government and people both to state this fact and to indicate that Africa will therefore be an area of special focus for the United States.
- 4.0. The point would then be made that what that special focus would seek is not selfish benefit for the United States or a promotion of its interests to the detriment of both the African countries and third parties, but a contribution to the efforts of the peoples of Africa to secure a better life for themselves.
- 4.1. The point could also be made that the benefit that would accrue to the United States would be to see Africa prosperous, stable and democratic.
- 5.0. Further, the presentation could seek to recall the value system which inspired the birth of the 1920's "New Deal" in the US and the Marshall Plan at the end of World War II, pointing to the immediate relevance of that value system to the President's approach towards Africa.
- 6.0. Equally, the presentation could project the reality of a bipartisan US approach of this kind towards the Continent, as well as the sensitivity of ordinary Americans to the need for them to express solidarity with the peoples of Africa. In other words, the President could speak for the entirety of US society, including the corporate sector.
- 7.0. The President could also speak out strongly in support of the necessity for the sovereign peoples of the Continent to determine their destiny, freely to advance their legitimate interests in an increasingly interdependent world and to play their due role in the decision making

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processes of such important organisations as the UN, the WTO and the Bretton Woods institutions.

7.1. In this context, the President could make reference to the positions the US took during the 1956 "Suez Crisis" (or other relevant examples, Mark Twain on the colonisation of the "Belgian Congo") to indicate that because the US itself was born out of an anti-colonial struggle, it has always been sensitive to the African aspirations for independence and the possibility for the peoples of the Continent to determine their destiny.

7.2. Perhaps as a constant theme of his "African Pilgrimage", the President could recall the words of another great American, W.E.B. du Bois who spoke in London, England at the first Pan-African Congress as the last century ended in 1900 and said :

7.3. " In the metropolis of the modern world, in this closing year of the nineteenth century, there has assembled a Congress of men and women of African blood, to deliberate solemnly upon the present situation and outlook of the darker races of mankind... The problem of the twentieth century is the problem of the colour line..."

8.0. The President could also make reference to his own concern and actions to address the challenge of racism and racial division in the US. In this context, he could make the point that as yet the US has not overcome the legacy of slavery in the US.

8.1. Whereas he has been concerned to deal with this issue as it impacts on US society, his visit to Africa has enabled him to reflect on the abiding impact of the export of slaves on African societies, which, inter alia, meant the removal from African societies, which depended on labour-intensive methods of production, of the most productive members of these societies.

8.2. (Visits to Goree Island in Senegal and Robben Island in South Africa and interaction with the poor and downtrodden in some of the countries the President will visit would make the point about the desire of the US to contribute to the restoration of the human dignity of the peoples of Africa.)

8.3. The point could also be made that the fact of the existence of an African population in the US is the unbreakable umbilical cord which

ties the US to Africa. It guarantees that the President of the US cannot address the concerns of the African-American population without, simultaneously, being concerned about the interests of the peoples of Africa.

9.0. The visit could also be used to indicate that, while it seeks to see the African Continent as a zone of democracy, respect for human rights and individual initiative in the economy, the US respects the indigenous impulses that emanate from African societies.

9.1. Consequently, the US does not seek to impose on African societies development paradigms that might have worked in the US, but which may be seen as a counter-productive and alien imposition if mechanically exported to Africa.

9.1.1. Rather, what the US would like to see is the use of Africa's own history, culture and psychology by the Africans themselves to promote the process of Africa's rebirth.

9.1.2. In the African context, it is important that the US President should make the point firmly that the US, the preeminent power in world politics and the economy, while holding to its basic positions in politics and the economy, is nevertheless sensitive to the "personality" of each region of the world.

9.1.3. Clearly, this would have to be argued with an understanding of the fact of the difficulties that have to be overcome to sustain such a position in the context of US public perceptions about an international agenda that must fit perfectly into what the US electorate considers right or wrong as well as the impact of these positions on Africa relative to policy towards other areas of the world.

10.0. In the context of the foregoing, it would be useful if the President could:

10.1. Support the determination (with which the World Bank agrees), that Africa constitutes the world's preeminent development challenge;

10.2. Announce additional measures to expedite debt relief especially to the poorest African countries;

- 10.3. Reflect further on the issue of the "Eligibility Requirements" contained in the draft "African Growth and Opportunity Act".
- 10.3.1. One of our concerns is that the imposition of these requirements will defeat the very purpose of the Act, which is to expedite African development.
- 10.3.2. Another is that this approach communicates the unfortunate message that the US is prepared to exploit the hunger and poverty of the peoples of Africa to impose its own agenda on the Continent.
- 10.3.3. Further, it demonstrates a lack of understanding of the interconnection between socio-economic underdevelopment and political instability and could lead to the worsening of the conditions leading to such instability.
- 10.3.4. It assumes the availability of institutional capacity in many countries which, in fact, does not exist, thus making it impossible to meet the requirements set, even if the will to meet these exists. Part of the problem in this regard, emanates from the fact that, as far as we are aware, the Act does not emanate from a comprehensive analysis of the African development challenge which would have informed the US legislators on the issues to be tackled in order to achieve sustained African development.
- 10.3.5. (We raise these matters not because they affect our own country directly. Our own domestic policies, expressive of the sovereign will of our people, are consistent with these "requirements". However, we are concerned about their impact on other sister African countries.)
- 10.4. Express support for an approach which says that the post-Lome EU-APC arrangements should not put African countries in worse conditions than they were under the Lome Convention, as well as an approach by the WTO which discriminates in favour of the least developed countries;
- 10.5. Make the point that with regard to the "African Crisis Response Initiative", the US would like the African countries to lead this initiative and accordingly pledges to extend all possible logistic support to the initiative to ensure that it succeeds, adding to the capacity of the UN Security Council to discharge its peace making and keeping responsibilities;

10.6. Express support for effective African participation in the decision-making processes of multilateral bodies such as the UN Security Council, the WTO and the Bretton Woods institutions; and,

10.7. Indicate measures to strengthen existing initiatives to assist in the process of African development, including those being carried out by such bodies as USAID and OPIC.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 1004

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION, Urging the United States Senate to reject the Kyoto Protocol on global warming.

WHEREAS, the United States is a signatory to the 1992 Rio Framework Convention on Global Climate Change and has participated in international negotiations pursuant to a United Nations agreement negotiated in Berlin in 1995 to expand the scope of the Rio Convention; and

WHEREAS, the Berlin Mandate required the United States and other advanced industrial nations ("Annex I parties") to negotiate legally binding quantified emission limitation and reduction objectives for greenhouse gases for the post-2000 period without increasing the responsibilities of non-Annex I developing countries; and

WHEREAS, the United States and other Annex I parties to the Rio Convention on December 10, 1997, in Kyoto, Japan, agreed to the "Kyoto Protocol" that would require industrialized nations to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide by six percent below 1990 levels by the years 2008-2012; and

WHEREAS, manmade emissions of greenhouse gases are caused primarily by the combustion of oil, coal, and natural gas fuels by industries, automobiles, and other consumptive uses of energy; and

WHEREAS, the United States relies on fossil fuels for more than ninety percent of its total energy supply and has among the lowest energy prices among all industrial nations; and

WHEREAS, the United States will have great difficulty in meeting its emission reduction target due to economic and population growth, notwithstanding the development of numerous energy conservation and efficiency programs implemented by government and industry; and

WHEREAS, developing countries exempt from the Kyoto Protocol are expected to increase their rates of economic growth and fossil fuel use over the next two decades and to surpass the United States and other Annex I parties in total emissions of greenhouse gases; and

WHEREAS, the imposition of legally binding requirements for the reduction of greenhouse gases by the United States and other Annex I parties would entail fundamental changes in our patterns of energy production, consumption, and prices with potentially severe adverse implications for workers, consumers, and industries dependent upon the production or use of fossil fuel; and

WHEREAS, the exemption in the Kyoto Protocol for emission control obligations by developing countries could create an unfair competitive imbalance between industrial and developing nations to the detriment of job growth and economic development in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the Kyoto Protocol could lead to the transfer of energy-intensive industries overseas and increased emissions of greenhouse gases by developing nations, thereby offsetting any environmental benefits associated with reductions achieved by the United States and other Annex I parties; and

WHEREAS, emission reductions by Annex I parties alone cannot meaningfully change future concentrations of atmospheric greenhouse gases or avert the risk of environmental damage from climate change without global participation in the Rio Convention; and

WHEREAS, the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions can be achieved most cost-effectively by the gradual retirement and replacement of existing buildings, appliances, industrial plants, equipment, and vehicles with more energy-efficient alternatives:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-third Legislature of the State of South Dakota, the Senate concurring therein, that this body calls upon the United States Senate not to ratify any commitments pursuant to the Kyoto Protocol that could lead to the loss of jobs, income, or economic development in the United States without definite commitments by developing nations to participate in future global greenhouse emission reduction efforts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature of South Dakota calls upon the President of the United States to renegotiate the Kyoto Protocol or to take other appropriate steps to ensure that all nations have made equal commitments to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases, and to provide a timetable for emission reduction by Annex I parties consistent with the orderly retirement and replacement of existing capital stock and equipment; and

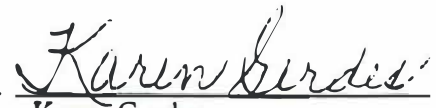
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature of South Dakota calls upon the United States Senate to reject any proposed protocol or other amendment to the Rio Convention that is inconsistent with this resolution or that does not ensure that at least seventy-five percent of the signatory parties to the Rio Convention, as measured by their 1995 populations, would be legally bound by the terms of an emission reduction program undertaken pursuant to the proposed protocol or other amendment; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that suitable copies of this resolution be forwarded to the President of the United States and the Majority and Minority Leaders of the United States Senate.

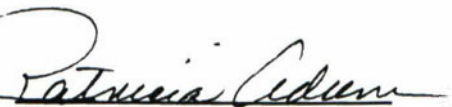
