As you know, USAID has a major role in the climate change effort, both because of our \$1 billion Developing Country Initiative and our role in working with developing countries leading up to Kyoto. Administrator Atwood will be meeting with stakeholders domestically and abroad to promote the Initiative including NGOs, representatives of the insurance and energy industries and U.S. businesses that stand to profit from an increase demand in the renewable energy market.

Atwood will also deliver the message to developing countries that the U.S. wants to work with them to develop policies that are good for business and good for the environment. He travels to India in mid-September.

United Nations Special Session on Environment and Development

The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) plays the lead role in U.S. government efforts to slow global climate in developing countries and nations making the transition from communism. The agency has programs relating to global climate change, such as promoting energy efficiency and encouraging forest conservation, in 44 countries around the globe. USAID works with governments, business and a host of non-governmental organizations in its efforts to foster economic growth that does not adversely effect the climate.

President Clinton has committed the United States to provide one billion dollars in assistance over the next five years to help developing nations reduce greenhouse gases by supporting energy efficiency, developing alternative energy sources and improving resource management. By using resources more efficiently, developing nations can considerably enhance their potential for economic growth while reducing serious health and environmental threats to their own citizens.

Why Address Climate Change

The science is clear and compelling: humans are changing the global climate. Concentrations of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere are the highest in 200,000 years, and climbing sharply.

- If this trend continues, scientists expect the seas to rise two feet or more over the next century. In the United States, 9,000 square miles of coastal areas would be flooded. Island chains such as the Maldives and coastal nations such as Bangladesh would be even more greatly devastated.

- Climate change disrupts agriculture, causes severe droughts and floods and helps speed the spread of infectious diseases.
- Developing countries will be the most vulnerable to the impacts of climate change -- and the least prepared to cope. Early in the next century, developing countries are expected to overtake developed nations as the largest source of greenhouse gas emissions.

The Developing Country Climate Change Initiative

President Clinton's climate change initiative represents a multi-year commitment of \$1 billion in grant and credit assistance over five years and an additional \$25 million for an inter-agency program. A five year action plan is now being developed with USAID missions, the private sector, other U.S. government agencies and other stakeholders to determine how funds under the Initiative will be allocated.

USAID's strategy is based on the premise that a less carbon-intensive path to development is a "win win" proposition for the environment and economic progress. USAID has identified approximately 20 developing and formerly communist countries that are significant contributors to global greenhouse emissions. The agency's efforts will focus on mitigating the effects of climate change within key countries and pivotal sectors of this group of nations.

Key Countries: Mexico, Brazil, India, Indonesia, Philippines, Russia, Ukraine, Poland, Kazakstan, and the Central Africa region.

Key Elements: Policy reform, capacity building, market development, technology cooperation and financial leveraging.

The Global Climate Change Initiative: What's New?

- The climate change represents the first multi-year commitment by the U.S. government to this issue. A minimum of \$750 million in grant assistance over five years will be provided for climate-related programs by USAID primarily in energy and forestry. In addition, a "floor" will be set on current levels of climate-related assistance.
- The initiative will use loan and loan guarantees for global climate change projects. USAID and the World bank will work in close collaboration on global climate change.

Results

U.S. development assistance is based on partnerships with developing country governments, businesses and NGOs. By bringing together U.S. technological, institutional and human resources with our partners in developing nations, the capacity of countries to pursue their own path to sustainable development is strengthened. Examples of recent successes include:

- The USAID forest management program in Mexico has reduced the deforestation rate on 3.1 million hectares of protected land by more than 30 percent.
- The agency's Sustainable Forestry Practices Initiative has reduced the damage caused by poor land management on over 3.4 million hectares of forests by 70 percent.
- A rural electrification program in the Philippines has reduced power line losses by three percent and reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 250,000 metric tons.
- Integrated resource planning in India improved efficiency of coal-fired power plants, saving up to 10 million tons of coal per year, reducing the demand for energy by seven percent, and producing a potential 5.5 million metric ton reduction of carbon dioxide.
- USAID's program to promote bagasse co-generation has increased the commercial production of renewable energy and cut carbon dioxide emissions by two million metric tons.

SECRETARY PEÑA'S SEPTEMBER CLIMATE CHANGE EVENTS

In response to your request, we have the following climate change events tentatively scheduled for September.

September 11-12:

Secretary Peña will be in California and will visit the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory where he will speak on climate change, highlighting the role that new technologies can play in reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

September 15:

Secretary Peña participates in a dinner for CEOs hosted by Secretary Daley.

September 17 or 18:

Secretary Peña and Secretary Daley tour the Bethlehem Steel plant in Burns Harbor, IN (just south of Chicago). This plant has installed many advanced efficiency technologies in the past few years, enabling it to compete effectively in world steel markets. After the tour, they host a roundtable discussion with local business leaders on the opportunities presented by possible climate change strategies.

We also note that the Department of Energy plans to release a study showing how technologies can significantly lower the costs of reducing greenhouse gas emissions (*Scenarios of U.S. Carbon Reductions*) once concerns raised by the economic agencies can be addressed. This release should occur sometime in August.

Global Climate Change

This memorandum is a written confirmation of proposals, forwarded at last week's meeting, by the Federal Emergency Management Agency to assist in the Administration's efforts to promote public awareness of the impact of global climate change upon the lives of Americans. Specifically, it is FEMA's intent to highlight concerns that global climate change has contributed to an increase in weather-related natural disasters. The documented rise in sea level, and in the frequency and intensity of flood, drought, tornado and hurricane events, makes the agency's top priority of mitigation through risk reduction and prevention even more expedient.

As a first step, FEMA's senior officials will utilize key upcoming events and the introduction of its new Disaster Resistant Communities Initiative as opportunities to reference global climate change in the context of promoting mitigation. Also, the agency's ongoing support of research projects by various academic, scientific and other non-profit organizations will be reviewed to create additional resource material for FEMA and the Administration to utilize in furthering public education on the effects of global climate change.

August 25, 1997: Director James Lee Witt addresses a plenary session of the National Emergency Management Association Annual Conference, Boston

August 25, 1997: Director James Lee Witt addresses the annual United States/Canada Emergency Management Consultative Meeting, Boston

September 1997 (date to be determined): Associate Director Michael J. Armstrong guest column on mitigation in the Sunday Denver Post

October 7, 1997: Annual World Disaster Awareness Day Commemoration – various outreach activities

Autumn 1997: Community Forums at the designated first-year pilot Disaster Resistant Community sites. Dates to be announced pending final agreement between FEMA and nominated communities. The nominees are: City of Oakland, California; City of Deerfield Beach, Florida; Allegany County, Maryland; City of Pascagoula, Mississippi; City of Wilmington and New Hanover County, North Carolina; City of Seattle and King County, Washington; and Randolph County, Tucker County and City of Parsons, West Virginia. Upon acceptance of the nomination, the community forums will highlight public/private partnerships and community support of pursuing significant mitigation initiatives, with participation from the FEMA Director, elected officials and key members of the business community.

As Associate Director for Mitigation, I will also commence participation in monthly meetings hosted by Undersecretary of State for Global Affairs Timothy Wirth to review global climate change issues with other federal agency representatives. As a newly confirmed appointee of the Administration, I am anxious to work with other federal representatives on this important issue.

While FEMA has only recently been asked to participate in this initiative, we are eager to lend our support to the efforts to spotlight the impact of global climate change in the context of our Agency's mission, and in consort with the entire federal family. We expect to forward further information on our activities to you in the near future.

By bringing together U.S. technological, institutional and human resources with our partners in developing nations, the capacity of countries to pursue their own path to sustainable development is strengthened. Examples of recent successes include:

- The USAID forest management program in Mexico has reduced the deforestation rate on 3.1 million hectares of protected land by more than 30 percent.
- The agency's Sustainable Forestry Practices Initiative has reduced the damage caused by poor land management on over 3.4 million hectares of forests by 70 percent.
- A rural electrification program in the Philippines has reduced power line losses by three percent and reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 250,000 metric tons.
- Integrated resource planning in India improved efficiency of coal-fired power plants, saving up to 10 million tons of coal per year, reducing the demand for energy by seven percent, and producing a potential 5.5 million metric ton reduction of carbon dioxide.
- USAID's program to promote bagasse co-generation has increased the commercial production of renewable energy and cut carbon dioxide emissions by two million metric tons.

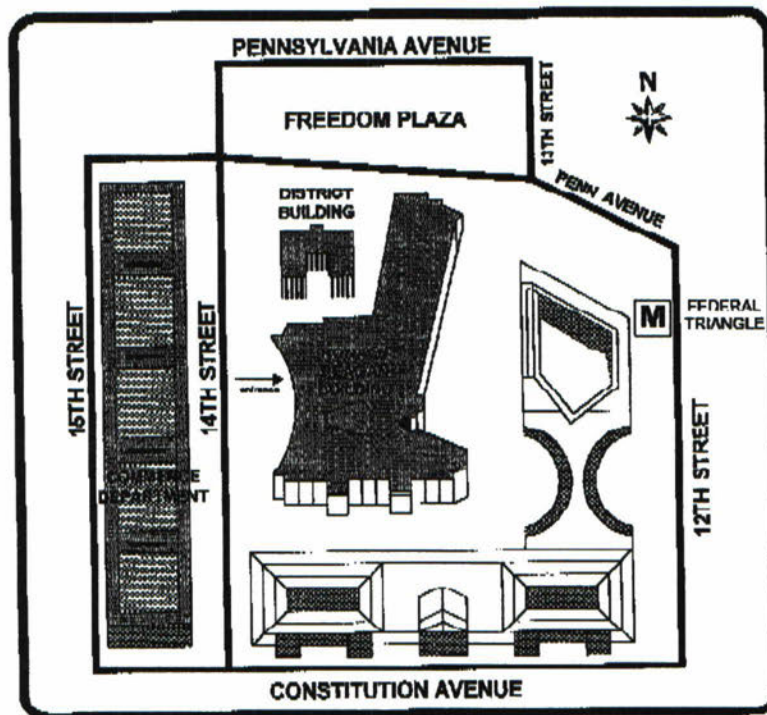

Stabilizing greenhouse gas concentrations will require concerted action by all Parties to the Framework Convention on Climate Change (FCCC). While developing countries currently contribute a relatively small percentage of greenhouse gas (GhG) emissions, the rate of growth in their net emissions far exceeds that of developed nations; by 2035 the developing country share of emissions will match or exceed that of developed countries. To be effective, any concerted global effort to address climate change will have to involve developed and developing country Parties to the Framework Convention on Climate Change.

The United States recognizes that developed countries must work in partnership with developing countries to demonstrate that economic growth and "climate friendly" development are compatible goals. The U.S. also believes that it can assist developing nations by facilitating technology transfer and private sector investment.

U.S. collaboration with developing countries to combat the growth in greenhouse gas emissions flowered after the U.S. signed the FCCC in 1992 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. As we approach the fifth Anniversary of the Rio Earth Summit and the third Conference of the Parties to the FCCC, the U.S. would like to reassert its commitment to work in partnership with developing countries by announcing a \$1 billion 5-year Developing Country Climate Change Initiative (DC³I). The objective of the Initiative will be to help developing countries plot a "climate friendly" path to development. The primary component of the DC³I will be a five-year minimum of at least \$150 million per year in bilateral foreign assistance for climate change-related programs¹ and the potential to use development credits dedicated to "climate friendly" investment projects. The Initiative will also include a \$25 million 5-year inter-agency program to assist developing nations to meet the terms and spirit of the FCCC. The Inter-Agency Climate Change Program will build on the U.S. Country Studies Program and the U.S. Initiative on Joint Implementation.

U.S. bilateral assistance for climate change-related activities will focus on providing technical assistance and training to promote improved forest and energy sector management. For example, the U.S. will promote energy efficiency and renewable energy, and foster low impact logging and sustainable forest management. Assuming Congressional approval, the U.S. government will also examine how it can use credit tools to induce greater U.S. private sector involvement in transferring "climate friendly" technologies.

¹"Climate change-related programs" refers to (i) climate change-dedicated programs and (ii) sector programs, predominantly energy, forestry and agriculture, that are critical in advancing a climate change agenda in developing countries.

The President's Developing Country Initiative is an integral part of the U.S. Government's efforts to address the causes and effects of climate change. It will be fully effective only if well-coordinated with other U.S. Government efforts. We look forward to working closely with you during its implementation, and welcome your advice and counsel as the program evolves.

SUBJECT: HUD Activities To Highlight Global Climate Change

The existing building stock produces one-third of all carbon emissions. As a result, programs for emissions reduction are extremely important to the Department and the Administration's effort to reduce global warming.

As you are aware, HUD staff have been participating in the planning of Partnership For Advancing Technologies in Housing (PATH), a new public/private initiative that looks at developing new building technologies to reducing carbon emissions from housing while also reducing housing costs. The Secretary has decided that HUD will take on the leadership of this effort. The Administration's amplification of climate control provides an excellent opportunity to announce this new partnership between HUD, other Federal agencies and key industries involved in PATH. We would like to hold a meeting in September to be hosted by the Secretary with industry leaders and other agencies to kick off the detailed planning of PATH as a true partnership. This meeting will be the precursor to a formal kick-off in October.

HUD has also been taking an active role in decreasing global warming through its energy efficiency and land-use programs. Through these efforts, the Department has developed the following list of accomplishments and activities which we are prepared to highlight during the Secretary's travel and during press interviews in September.

- The Energy Efficient Mortgage (EEM) Pilot was expanded to a nation-wide program in October 1995. To date, 3,500 EEMs have been insured in 34 States under this program.
- HUD will play a critical role in efforts to reduce carbon emissions, energy use, and waste products from housing. Emissions from housing can be substantially reduced through technological innovation, while at the same time improving the quality and safety of housing. HUD will undertake a more aggressive dissemination strategy on rehabilitation and energy efficiency to both HUD program participants as well as the housing market at large.
- The Secretary has issued guidelines for cost effective energy efficient property rehabilitation. These guidelines have been supplemented with new guidebooks and computer software.

- In March of 1995, HUD and the Department of Energy (DOE) agreed to continue a joint partnership and launch a new 5-Year Initiative, which adopted a new 5-year Partnership Goal for the year 2000 of reducing energy consumption 30 percent in one million public and assisted housing units.

Specifically, when the Secretary travels to Fort Wayne, Indiana to address the U.S. Conference of Mayors Leadership Meeting he could mention:

- The Department's work with the American Planning Association to produce "Growing Smart" model statutes affecting planning and the management of change in urban and rural areas. These statutes are development tools that if localities put in place will produce denser communities, reduce urban sprawl, and decrease dependency on automobiles.

Conspiracy Theory...

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, the perpetually sad-faced Arizonan, recently took to the airwaves to assert that people who disagree with the administration about global warming are part of a conspiracy - and not just any conspiracy, but an "un-American" conspiracy.

The Wall Street Journal last week quoted his remarks on National Public Radio on July 21: "It's an unhappy fact that the oil companies and the coal companies in the U.S. have joined in a conspiracy to hire pseudo scientists to deny the facts and then begin raising political arguments that are essentially fraudulent. ... I think the energy companies need to be called to account because what they are doing is un-American in the most basic sense."

Such an outburst from a top Republican would quickly summon denunciations of McCarthyism. But on the left it's a given that there is little more evil than an oil or coal company, unless of course it's a tobacco company. And there is nothing more un-American than trying to make a buck. The fact that people continue to buy gas, oil, electricity - and family cars - only proves the depths of the conspiracy.

Never mind that scores of scientists, including Nobel Prize winners, continue to express doubts about the global warming hypothesis. Among other things, they note that satellite temperature readings, the most accurate record of climate trends, show no warming trend in recent decades. Bruce Babbitt feels the earth's pain, you see, and that makes him morally qualified to pass judgment on other people's motives.

Unfortunately for Mr. Babbitt, things seem to be getting a little complicated. The list of un-American conspirators is growing. They include the auto industry, which understands that it lies directly in the cross-hairs of Vice-President Al Gore's global warming enthusiasm. And the U.S. Senate voted with only one dissent several weeks ago to forbid the Clinton administration from agreeing to any global warming treaty that developing countries won't agree to, a sign that the whole venture may be in trouble.

Even the administration's friends in organized labor are growing wary. AFL-CIO spokesman Bill Cunningham recently noted that labor finds it "amazing that harsh, arbitrary flat rate reductions in greenhouse gas emissions are being proposed and contemplated without regard to their impact on working people."

.... [It's] even more galling when we find that there is no scientific evidence [this] will solve the greenhouse problem. In fact it might even exacerbate it."

The shrillness of Mr. Babbitt's outburst suggests that he knows the momentum for a government-led crusade against "global warming" may be slipping away - and with it a grand opportunity for a huge leap forward in government power over the lives of ordinary citizens. The leading guru of global warming, Stephen Schneider, once proposed rewriting the Constitution to empower a fourth branch of government to dictate environmental solutions to such problems as climate change.

Talk about un-American.

Attached are (1) alternative language following up last week's discussion of classification v. labeling and hazard v. risk; and (2) an opening discussion draft for a U.S. position on the scope clarification thought-starter, reflecting comments received and what I heard in previous discussions. This draft aims to raise questions and provoke discussion to see where we can reach consensus: think of it as a straw man for internal discussion purposes only.

FDA sent brief comments, which are incorporated in the discussion draft. I have not received any comments from stakeholders outside government. (I checked my records and confirmed that we did send out the paper to our industry/NGO list, with a cover letter stating that comments should be sent to CG/HCCS members by August 15.)

As discussed, our agenda for Thursday will include a continuation of last week's discussion of hazard v. risk (how best to address CPSC's concern that classification should not automatically result in labeling or other regulatory consequences for consumer products); U.S. comments on the thought starter paper; and plans for the September OECD advisory group meeting. I would also like to propose a regular meeting/conference call beginning in September and a fall public meeting. (I am on vacation August 11-September 2, but reachable.)

Please join us on Wednesday, August 13 (tomorrow) at 1:00 pm in room 476 OEOB to discuss details of cabinet participation leading up to the White House Conference on Climate Change on October 6, 1997. We will review the general context of the Climate Change roll-out, as well as work through each agency's proposed travel and media plans.
