Jewish Policy Leaders' Study Group

MEMO

To: Members of the Jewish Policy Leaders' Study Group
From: Rabbi Sidney Schwarz
Re: Study Group Meeting
Date: April 18, 1997

Our study group has now completed two distinct topics, "Jewish Views on Law and Justice" and "Judaism and Civil Disobedience". Each of these topics included a study of classical Jewish texts (Biblical and Rabbinic) as well as a variety of Jewish and non-Jewish philosophical viewpoints.

The group decided to begin a study of one of the most famous classical texts of ethical literature, *Pirke Avot* (The Ethics of our Ancestors). We will start with Chapter 1 and move through the text in order. Since we have only two more sessions for the year (May 2 and June 6) before we break for the summer, we will re-evaluate after the June session how the study of this text is going. The attraction of studying *Pirke Avot* is that it includes much source material on the kinds of things that sparked much interest and discussion in the course of the year (e.g. good and evil; the nature of human beings; obligations to humanity and society; life and death; etc.).

I will bring copies of Chapter 1 in Hebrew and English. What would enrich our study together is if people brought some edition of *Pirke Avot* with a commentary. There are literally dozens of such volumes in print. You can borrow from a library or buy a volume that appeals to you. In that way, people can share views on the texts from a variety of sources.

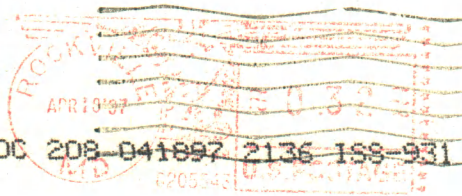

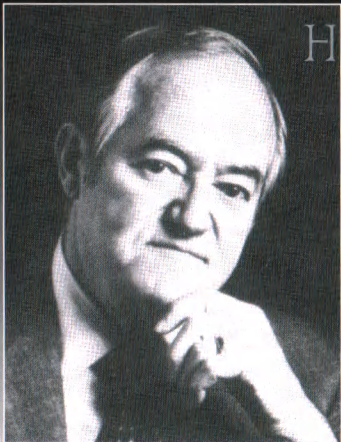

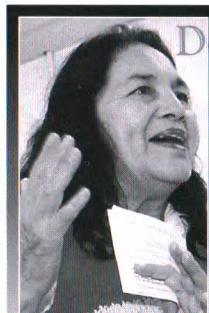
Hubert H. Humphrey devoted his life to public service and to fighting for the civil rights of people everywhere. His political career began in Minneapolis with his election as Mayor in 1945 with a vow to clean up the city. In 1948, Humphrey moved forcefully onto the national scene when he delivered an eloquent appeal for the minority civil rights plank at the Democratic National Convention. Passage of that plank split the party, caused the Dixiecrat walkout, but probably won the election for Harry Truman. Building on his success, he went on to become a United States Senator from Minnesota, serving from 1948 to 1964, and leading the fight for the 1964 Civil Rights Act, calling its passage, "one of the landmarks of my life." During his years in the Senate, he also led the battles for Medicare, the Peace Corps, the Food Stamp Program, the Job Corps, the Fair Employment Practices Act, and Headstart. His election as Vice President of the United States in 1964 gave him another forum from which to continue to advocate for "full equality for all Americans." His deep commitment and dedication to our nation are legend. Hubert H. Humphrey changed the face of America with his selfless and devoted service in the cause of equality. He was a true civil rights pioneer.

The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights is proud to honor the leadership of Tipper Gore and Dolores Huerta in improving the quality of life for all persons in our society epitomizing the great tradition of Hubert H. Humphrey.



Tipper Gore

An eloquent spokesperson and well-known child advocate, Tipper Gore serves as Mental Health Policy Advisor to President Bill Clinton. In this capacity, she is committed to eradicating the stigma associated with mental illness. In addition to her work to ensure quality, affordable mental health care, Mrs. Gore is a longtime advocate for the homeless. She co-founded and chaired Families for the Homeless, a non-partisan partnership of families that seeks to raise public awareness of homeless issues, and serves as a Special Advisor to the Interagency Council on the Homeless. An accomplished photographer, Tipper Gore's second book, "Picture This, A Visual Diary," is a personal representation of her life as the wife of the Vice President.



Dolores Huerta

An unyielding advocate for the rights of women, immigrants and persons of color, Dolores Huerta has changed the political landscape of California and the nation. In her quest for social justice, she has faced down strike-breakers on picket lines and police from the dusty fields of the San Joaquin Valley to the streets of San Francisco. Whether leading the grape and lettuce boycotts or campaigning against police brutality, her efforts have brought about major changes including collective bargaining for farm workers, the banning of dangerous pesticides, and an increase in the Federal minimum wage. She co-founded the United Farm Workers Union of America (UFW) with Cesar Chavez, who called her, "totally fearless, both mentally and physically." Dolores Huerta is currently the First Vice President of the UFW of the AFL-CIO.

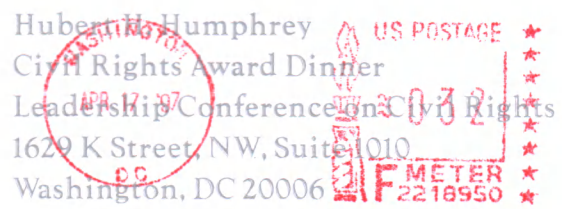

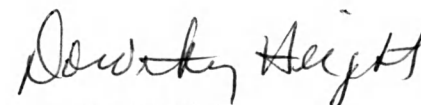
