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WE WEREN'T the only ones who were confused when told that ARKKids First was to be for families who made much to qualify for Medicaid not enough to afford their own insurance.

The feds must have thought the thing, because when a third of families that enrolled would have been eligible for straight Medicaid, the feds blew the whistle. Which is a shame because ARKKids is a good program, a necessary program. It's also a fine example of how government can and should encourage folks who need a hand but don't want a handout, to borrow an overused line from a fellow Washington.

If tens of thousands of Arkies have too much pride to accept help without paying a little in return, we think that's fine. We think it's just a kind of self-respect and self-reliance that government should be encouraging, not discouraging.

Unfortunately, the feds say that couldn't be legal. They also seem to have some deep-rooted bias against folks trying to do as much for themselves as possible. They talk about the stigma of accepting welfare and how to overcome it—rather than the pride in being a self-reliant citizen who insists on paying at least part of his own way, thank you. Why are we not surprised that this big "problem" should have arisen in a state like Arkansas rather than, say, New York? It's the culture, stupid. And anybody who knows the state could have foreseen it. But bureaucrats are paid to know the rules. Hey, somebody has to.

And according to the bureaucrats, at least for now, they have no choice but to insist that the Huckabee administration stop signing up folks for ARKKids First when they're eligible for straight Medicaid instead. It's the bureaucrats say. Or at least they, which may be a lot holier in their eyes.

It's understandable how state officials got confused—that is, if it's really Little Rock and not Washington that's confused. We're still not sure. But experience tells us this much is certain: Bureaucratic jargon is often so jumbled that you could line up all the federal and state administrators in the world, and they still wouldn't reach the same conclusion. They certainly haven't in this case.

Here is an example—steel yourself—of the kind of wordsludge that the state had to interpret to get this reform under way. To initiate ARKKids First, said the feds, the state (1) had to "offer a different package to demonstration participants than is being offered to the traditional Medicaid population," and (2) extend "health insurance coverage to children through age 18 with family income at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level,

who would not otherwise be eligible for Medicaid." Got that? Clear as micromanaged mud, isn't it?

So what was our governor's response to this government-size mud-die? He holds a press conference, blasts the feds like some raffish governor of the Ross Barnett mold back in the bad old days and, just for old times' sake, ties a yellow ribbon around the old... bust of Bill Clinton on the lawn of the Governor's Mansion.

Really now. Everybody knows Mike Huckabee has all the showmanship of a frustrated vaudevillian, but just how does his latest little act actually solve the problem and make sure our kids are insured? Quick, somebody get the hook. The Guv needs to be making policy, not scenes. Instead, he made a flamboyant appeal to the president. (It's become a standard rule of American politics: When in doubt, try to embarrass Bill Clinton. Even Bill Clinton has tried it.)

So what's the president supposed to do, issue a warrant? Arrest a couple of Cabinet members? Plow his way through all the rules and regulations? (Talk about cruel and unusual punishment. That's what he's got bureaucrats for.) Naturally the president responded with one of his non-responses—one long Clinton clause. But what else could he do—ignore the law? This isn't campaign finance reform, after all, or testifying under oath. This is policy.

IF THE GOVERNOR wants to change the law, he needs to appeal not to the president but the legislative branch of government. We understand he has some influential friends in Congress. Or if he thinks it's the feds who are violating the law, the courts are open to all citizens, even governors.

Best of all, if Mike Huckabee thinks he can make a reasonable case for extending ARKKids to Medicaid-qualified families—and, who knows, maybe he can—why not be reasonable? Call up the head of this federal agency and talk. Or invite him over to that quiet little study on the first floor of the Governor's Mansion. In those surroundings, even a New Yorker like Rudy Giuliani seemed to relax and get into the spirit of Southern civility. Instead, the Guv starts waving his arms and tying yellow ribbons. C'mon, Guv, this ain't Branson.

A quiet talk among friends isn't as dramatic a technique as all these goings-on, and it certainly doesn't qualify as a great foto-op, but it could prove a lot more effective. At last report, there was talk of working out a compromise between state and federal officials—as if even government officials and bureaucrats could talk things out. Imagine that. Yes, as a last recourse, we recommend reason. It has been known to work.

SUBJECT: Phone Call About Meeting with German Chancellor
Schroeder regarding German Offer on Slave Labor

Background

In early October, the German Government offered to contribute two billion, and German corporations four billion, D-Marks toward a six billion D-Mark settlement of slave and forced labor claims. This is well below what both key victim groups and attorneys for the class action will require to settle the lawsuits. I believe that it will take at least 10 billion D-Marks to dismiss the lawsuits against German companies in U.S. courts and obtain the legal peace sought by German companies. Based on my conversations with my counterpart, Count Lambsdorff, Chancellor Schroeder may be ready to improve his government's offer, but he still needs your encouragement.

In addition, German corporations remain inflexible, and may fail to make an adequate improvement in their offer at the next round of talks on November 16. The original 16 German companies, including giants like DaimlerChrysler, VW, Deutsche Bank, and Siemens, have not increased their original offer (1.6 billion D-Marks) in a year of negotiations. The rest of the four billion offered in early October comes from the 19 additional German companies that have recently pledged to contribute.

A breakdown of these talks could lead to sanctions and boycotts by state and local officials against German companies and create tensions in our bilateral relations with Germany.

Ambassador Kornblum and I have developed a strategy to encourage Schroeder to put additional pressure on the German corporations. Pressure from the Chancellor is needed to get them to increase their offer. We believe a personal phone call from you will be effective in this regard.

Schroeder will meet you in Florence on November 21. Therefore, he will have an incentive to achieve positive results by then. Kornblum and I are also developing other ways to encourage the CEOs of the top 100 German corporations to participate.

Recommendation

That you agree to call Chancellor Schroeder on the need for an improved German offer at the November 16-17 round of negotiations on slave and forced labor compensation. Suggested talking points are attached. These could be followed up at your subsequent meeting with the Chancellor.

TALKING POINTS

Phone Call to German Chancellor Schroeder on Slave Labor

- We appreciate your historic leadership on the German slave and forced labor initiative you launched in February, and your willingness to establish the Foundation for survivors in a difficult budgetary period.
- You have worked hard to improve the German financial offer in the slave labor talks.
- We have invested our time and prestige in this project because it will help us move to a new era in German-American relations. Failure would be a tragedy for the negotiations.
- We are prepared to provide the German companies with the legal closure they seek. With legal procedures never before used by our government, the U.S. Government will file an extensive statement of interest to facilitate dismissal of any potential suit.
- However, I am deeply concerned that German industry won't budge from their opening offer of four billion D-Marks, particularly in light of the extensive legal closure that these companies would receive in U.S. courts.
- Indeed, from our perspective, the 16 original corporate supporters of this project have not increased their financial offer in a year of negotiation.
- Given the importance of this project and the size of the companies, their offer is unacceptable.
- At the next round of talks on November 16-17, the German side needs to increase its offer substantially. I hope that the German Government can increase its contribution, perhaps by dividing it over two fiscal years. This would be a catalyst to encourage the companies to do more. The German corporations alone need to increase their offer to at least 6 billion by the mid-November round.
- A larger German government contribution would be an important incentive to progress. I am well aware of your budgetary problems and support strongly your program. An additional German contribution would likely stimulate

economic growth by improving business relations between the United States and Germany.

- Deputy Secretary Eizenstat believes that, ultimately, the German side (both companies and government) will need to agree to at least 10 billion D-Marks to bring the talks to a successful conclusion.
- The 35 German companies that are ready to contribute to the Foundation can afford to make a much better offer. Your personal intervention with them will be crucial to success. We hope you will come through.
- An improved German offer will bring "legal peace" to the companies and be a significant moral statement by Germany in the next millennium.
- We have been your partners in supporting your effort in order to move German-American relations into a new era. Failure now would be tragic.
- I hope you can meet with Eizenstat in November to discuss the German offer.
- We will see each other in Istanbul (November 18-19) and in Florence (November 20-21). Let's talk more after we see how the Bonn negotiating round turns out.
- In the meantime, I hope you can make Bonn a success. We need this Gerhard. Let's work together.

Dear Mr. Berger:

Upon suggestion of Under Secretary Lieberman, I am transmitting to your care the enclosed letter to the President covering the request of the guides at the 1959 American National Exhibition in Moscow to visit with him in the Oval Office -- 40 years after their visit there with President Eisenhower.

The 75 young Russian-speaking guides we had at the Exhibition were themselves one of the best exhibits. Each day from morning until 11:00 at night they answered thousands of questions from Soviet citizens, 2.7 million of whom visited the Exhibition.

If feasible to his schedule, this might be an opportunity for the President to underscore some points in our current relations with Russia.

These men and women are now, of course, mostly in their sixties. Many continue to keep in touch with friends in Moscow. A few have business connections there.

Many thanks for your courtesy in bringing their request to the President's attention.

Dear Mr. President:

Forty years ago, in 1959, President Eisenhower invited 75 Russian-speaking young Americans (mostly graduate students) to meet with him in the Oval Office before he sent them off to Moscow as guides for the first American National Exhibition ever held in the Soviet Union. At the height of the Cold War, this exhibition was the event that gave millions of Russians their first close-up view of the USA and permitted them to talk directly to Russian-speaking Americans. It was also the occasion of the "Kitchen Debate" between then Vice President Nixon and Premier Khrushchev.

In December of this year, these Russian-speaking Americans, both men and women, who served with distinction in helping open the doors to international economic and cultural exchanges between the United States and the USSR, will celebrate the 40th anniversary of the event with a reunion in Washington, D. C.

In 1959, as Deputy Director of USIA, I served as coordinator of the project with the White House and other government agencies. For that reason the spokesperson for the group, Bill Davis of Potomac, Maryland, has tasked me with being in touch with you to determine whether it might be possible for them to visit the Oval Office for a second time and -- 40 years after the visit with President Eisenhower -- have an audience with you. Since so much time has gone by, this may be the last opportunity for some of them to get together.

The reunion will take place, including some Russian counterparts, at a suitable location such as the Smithsonian, the date for which will be fixed to coincide with whatever date in December you are able to meet with them.

Of the original 75 guides, Bill Davis believes that between 30 to 40 would come to Washington for the reunion and a visit with you.

He is in touch with many of them. Most have gone on to distinguished careers, in government and the private sector. Some married Russians.

Such an Oval Office visit would underscore the role that these dedicated citizens played as spokespersons for American democracy. Their work and the work of others like them was an important part of the century that is about to end.

DEAR PRESIDENT CLINTON:

During the last few days, there have been persistent indications that the Central American nations are under consideration for inclusion in this year's list of major drug producing and drug transit countries (the "Majors" list) under the terms of Sections 489 and 490 of the Foreign assistance Act.

As President Pro-témpore of the Central American Integration System, and after previous consultations with the other Central American Presidents, I must, with all due respect, earnestly request a careful estimation of the negative consequences such inclusion would have on regional efforts to achieve higher levels of development through international trade and investments. Actual and potential international investors could be discouraged from, or even become afraid of, pursuing business interests in our countries. This undesirable result would be not only extremely detrimental to our region's economic recovery and growth, but also thwart significantly your Administration's own endeavors to assist the Central American nations on the path to further economic and human development.

Mr. President, you have repeatedly shown yourself as a true friend of Central America. Presently, and in view of the extremely difficult circumstances faced by the region in the wake of Hurricane Mitch, we shall view all attention given to this request as yet another manifestation of your continued trust and support.

Dear Ms Currie,

I am writing to you because I need help. Don Hironimus, a mutual friend, has spoken of you several times to me, and that is how I have your name. I have had little experience writing letters of this kind, so please bear with me.

We are trying to establish a Complete Accounts Receivable Management business for Medical Doctors. We have already determined that there is a need and a market for this business. We have invested in state of the art software and do have two computers now, which are set up to do this business. In addition to the above we have had training in using the software. And, I have just begun to market the business to doctors.

Our plan is to contract to doctors to do their accounts receivables, outsourced from their offices, and then to contract others to work with us in this business. I plan to do this business for as many doctors as we can contract, by contracting out the data entry to stay-at-home moms and others who would want to work with us. The others would need their own computer. We would set up a network and train the others to use it and the software.

My wife has over 20 years of experience working in billing for doctors in their offices, and I have experience working in billing in a hospital. I am also an Insurance Broker and have been since 1975. We do have the knowledge and the experience to do this business.

What we need is a Government Grant to get the business up and going. The ideal amount we need is \$250,000. Of that we need to use about \$50,000 for living expenses so I can devote more time to marketing the business. The rest of the money would be used to pay for marketing expenses and other supplies to get the business going and three more computers. Next would be the expense for setting up the network system which would make it capable to do this business nationally.

We know that there are government programs designed to help people start up businesses. I have tried to contact some of these agencies, but have gotten little helpful information.

Jus so you know, we, my wife and I, are not just looking for a hand out. We are both working now, she words for doctors 40 plus hours per week and I am presently selling insurance and I also work about 20 part time in retail sales on weekends and evenings, in addition to marketing this business to doctors. We need a little help.

I thought that, in your position, you may know or be able to find someone in President Clinton's administration who could help us. If you could help us or tell us how to get the help we need, we would be forever grateful. If you think this is worthy to show to President Clinton, we would thank you. We would sincerely appreciate any help you could give us.

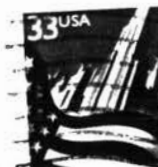

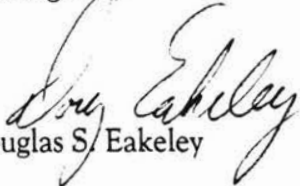

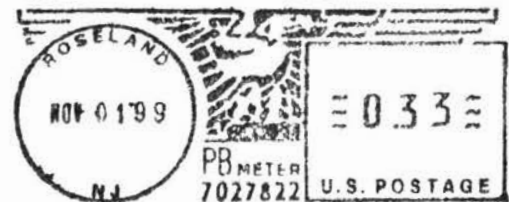
